Lt. Col. A.J. CAMPBELL was replaced by Lt. Col. F.G. GREEN who has taken over the Acting Directorship of this Branch.

Major ROWORTH & Capt. WARREN are working as liaison Officers in Northern Italy carrying out the A/Director's policy in Bolzano and Milan.

Major STRACHAN-JUDAS returned from leave in U.K. to await reappointment on the Python Scheme and is temporarily employed as Executive Staff Officer to the A/Director.

2. Releases.

The total number of releases made this month to the Italian Government through A.R.R. is 47.

The total number of outstanding acceptances from A.R.R. is 134.

3. Northern Italy.

The CEM liaison officers in the North, (Major Roworth & Capt. Warren), are working in Bolzano and Milan arranging for the final disposal to the Italian Government of Residues of Dumps of Materials, and vehicles still outstanding. It is not estimated that the amount of outstanding material is very large.

4. Salvage.

The collection of outstanding Salvage Debts from Italian firms is proceeding. It is estimated that A.R.R. will be able to complete this collection on behalf of C.E.M. Branch, as the Branch has insufficient staff to carry out this task.

5. Fixed Assets.

The British Embassy is endeavouring to arrange with the Italian Government to designate an organization to act on their behalf for the taking over of all British Fixed Assets in Italy.

6. A.F.H.Q. Directive (See para 1)

During the month A.F.H.Q. have issued two directives to army formations, dealing with C.E.M.

The first deals with C.E.M. material held by units surplus to unit requirements which they are now instructed to hand over to Italian Government forthwith.

The second deals with dumps of materials which are in the custody of army formations; in regard to these the order directs that all material required for army purposes is to be withdrawn forthwith from such dumps, the remainder of the property in the dumps being inventoried with the object of passing this over immediately to the Italian authorities.

From the above it will be seen that the work of liquidating C.E.M. in the hands of the Allies is being expedited and in a few weeks should have made noticeable progress.

MONTHLY REPORT FOR CAPTURED ENEMY MATERIALS BRANCH FOR JUNE 1946.

1. In June a large value in C.E. Material was handed over to the Italian Government. The number of releases made were fewer than in the previous month (79 as against 95) but the quantitative amount and currency value were considerably greater. Information is to hand that there will be large quantities of valuable C.E. telephone equipment turned over to the Branch during July.

2. There is still much material and many vehicles to be disposed of in the Bolzano Area, none of which was released to the Branch by 2 District. It is essential to get this area cleared up quickly, and for this reason it has been decided to send a special officer to Bolzano early in July with a view to listing and handing over to the Italian Government the readily accessible bulk, including many scattered Ammunition dumps. It is intended that an A.R.A.R. representative shall accompany the officer chosen for this task and that handover shall be done from day to day as dumps etc. are visited and a signature obtained for each handover. It is realised that it will be impossible to hand over in a very short space of time all the C.E. Material in the Area, and the intention is to hand over the bulk. The disposition of material not handed over will be left to ARAR who will furnish a list monthly of any and all materials collected.

The procedure adhered to hitherto has been for District to list and release to C.E.M. Branch for hand over to the Italian Government all material and vehicles in the area not required for military purposes, but that method is inevitably a slow one, and if the hand over of material has to be hastened these direct release by A.C. to ARAR is undoubtedly the answer, this particularly applies to the Bolzano area where there has been such an enormous mass of material to be disposed of, and which in many instances is only discovered from day to day.

3. The administration side of A.R.A.R. is improving, proof of this being the accelerated manner in which signed acceptance notes /

- are being returned to the Branch. This is no doubt largely owing to the fact that the Italian elections are over and that there are now more personnel available for general duties, plus a better realization on the part of A.R.A.R. of the importance of quick clearance and rapid turnover of materials to industry.

4. Total releases for the month numbered 79. Releases in the North were of a very general nature and in the South were made up of such material as follows:

613 Assorted Vehicles.
130 Assorted Road Making Machines.
50 tons of Light Ferrous Metal.
28 Kms of Telephone and high tensionable.
500 Industrial Gas Cylinders.
700 Wooden telegraph poles.

The above articles alone representing a very considerable cash value.

5. It is understood that the Executive Commissioner intends that R.U.K. files and files pertaining to R.U.K. should be handed over to Archives Branch, Allied Commission early in July 1946. These files deal with matters of enormous financial, economic and political importance both to the Allies and Italy, and in view of the fact that their contents are largely of a C.E.M. nature their passing to another Branch unversed in the disposal of captured enemy material is regretted.

6. C.E.M. Staff at this H.Q. and in the field has been cut to the barest minimum commensurate with efficient working, and until final closing down of the Branch it is not considered that any further reductions can be made if the work of the Branch has to continue without great delays and the lengthening of the closing date.

DAILY REPORT FOR CAPTURED ENEMY MATERIALS BRANCH FOR MAY 1946.

1. The following report will show that while most of the C.E.M. has been released and handed over to the Italian Government there still remains the outstanding question of certain equipments of C.E.M. still in use which units and installations for which an alternative method of hand over has to be made if the C.E.M. Branch of Allied Commission ceases to function.

2. Releases of material to the Italian Government have shown a decided drop during the month, and from available information received from 5 District and A.F.H.I. It is expected that releases for the next two months will be more or less steady at the present figure. A total of 15 releases were made to A.M.I. and 90 signed and completed release notes received up to.

Comparing the figures of April and May it is interesting to note that various releases in the North have dropped from 269 to 51 whereas an increase in the South from 24 in April to 37 in May. A large proportion of the material now being released is that which has been held by units and installations which are now gradually being cleared down.

3. A considerable amount of time has been wasted owing to lack of essential information from District and Units regarding exact location of the various depots, this lack of information has also impeded A.M.I. in taking over.

A.F.H.I. and 5 District have been approached on this matter and it is anticipated that greater care will be taken in future.

4. Against the releases made in the South there were 696 assorted vehicles, most of which can be described as hulks. They comprised trucks, buses, cars, trailers and motor cycles. 92 scrap vehicles of various types were released in the North.

5. Other Information:

(a) The large division of Varese, Monza and Taliado are in control⁷ of breakdown at the Factory of Rivolta Soravia (Amoletti & Co). An inspection of the above factory will be carried out by this branch during next week, to control operations.

(b) 10 lorries have been handed over recently by A.M.I. to U.L.R. (Unione Lavorazione Liturgica e Impianti Residuati) for carrying out transportation of munition from the day to the factories. These lorries are now being overhauled and a program as to their employment will be submitted by U.L.R. to this branch shortly.

6. Files.

All files, material and staff were moved from Bolzano to Rome on the 11 May 46. Files have now been set up in the new location and work on them is continuing under the close direction.

It would appear that the three main points of issue to be taken from the files are: (a) the amount of credits (both financial and in materials) given to Italian industrialists and others by Germany; (b) information concerning the use of industrial machinery from factories in Italy or Germany factories in Austria and Germany. Until further notice, all files concerning the use to which files will be put the work on the files will consist of extracting information set out under the two paragraphs (a) and (b).

7. Bolzano.

The C.I.D. Bolzano has advised the Branch that there are some hundreds of G.I. Vehicles in circulation in the area, a large proportion of which are being used by the Italian Army without any authority.

The Branch Director proposes to go into this matter early in June 46 in a view to moving the vehicles listed and handed over to AFHQ for normal disposal.

8. Sudetenland Police, Merano.

The SD Park was released by 2 District to G.I. Branch in January 46 and handed over to AFHQ between the 10-20 February 46. A portion of the Park was retained by 2 District. 2 District have now left the area without giving disposal instructions for the remainder part. 3 District have now taken over from 2 District in the north and they have indicated to make release as soon as possible otherwise it is feared that pilfering on a large scale will greatly reduce the value of the material to be handed over to AFHQ.

9. G.I. Timber.

Units of G.I. Timber in the North have been compiled and submitted to 3 District for release, but up to date release orders have not yet been received.

Units of G.I. timber at extraction plant, Castelbello have also been compiled and sent to 3 District and release orders are not awaited.

10. Administration.

A further reduction of 2 male executive and 2 female administrative assistants has been made in the North, making the total now employed 5 male and 6 female civilians.

11. Officers.

There are now only 2 officers employed in G.I. Branch to cover the whole of the North and considering the material still being released and passing through the office and also the problems still existing in the Bolzano area their time is very fully occupied.

7. On instruction from 2 District the GSA Officers in Lombard region disposed of a considerable amount of inventories prior to 30 Dec 45 which resulted in the receipt of 1,301,140 lire. The necessary AFM records and vouchers have been passed to AFM for this amount.

8. The Italian Government has now commenced breaking down communication in accordance with AFHQ directive AG 306.3 Q(43)-40 dated 2 Oct 45 and amendment AG 306.3 (R43)-40 dated 8 Feb 46. Ten Jumbo RCV have been secured and the contents passed to Factories for breaking down.

9. Work on the AFK records continues and over and above the identification of the records, information showing the destination of Italian material and equipment sent out of Italy by the Germans was listed and submitted. Arrangements were made to loan to a number of former AFK personnel now serving the Italian War Department. The situation of the AFK funds and assets in the country is limited regarding their disposal. A further AFM Directive dated 15/2/46 in addition to AFM 15/1/46 authorizes AFM to hand over index of all AFK, Justizratarkontor, etc, G., S. and C. Commands or HQS and German embassy files in the keeping of this AFM unit. All arrangements to move files, material and staff to new location (including packing of approximately 400 cases) were completed by 30 April and movement to Rome will take place early in May.

10. AFK files were examined for information concerning orders made by the German Command on Factories in Sicily for blankets. It is hoped that this information may help to elucidate the questions outstanding concerning the Sicilian blankets.

11. The information received from 3 District and Air HQ there is will be on quantity of oil to be released for handing over to the Italian Government.

NOTICE FROM CAPTURED ENEMY MATERIALS BRANCH FOR MARCH 1946.

1. As result of the tremendous amount of work put in during the months of February in preparing documents and inventories, the turnover to the Italian Government of C.E. Depot No. 1 Bolzano and C.E. Depots Nos. 1 and 2 was carried out with remarkable smoothness. Thus the two weeks of which were present at the headquarter, handing over completed on the 14th March. Inventories and documents were in perfect condition and just check disclosed no discrepancies between inventories and stocks. The Chief representative of DIAE, Pott, Dr. Benassati, was accompanied by a large staff and a press reporter.

The materials handed over from No. 1 Camp Bolzano represent millions of dollars, engineering material, carpentry equipment, vehicle body parts, building material, boatmakers equipment, marine material (metal), rubber tyres, vehicle tyres (several), cycle tyres and miscellaneous equipment etc. Pott, Dr. Benassati and his Italian staff expressed the opinion that, without having seen this depot, it was impossible to believe the magnitude of the material. The two depots at Bolzano contained mainly and large quantities of finished garments and carpets. There were also carpets, table cutlery, silver trays etc. The value in dollars approximated will be considerable, and the closing value of main importance to Italy.

2. On completion of the turnover, all the officials concerned sat in the office at Bolzano where turnover documents were signed by the Director AEA, representing the Italian Government. Dr. De Bussolati was most enthusiastic at the way the turnover had been done and signed the document with, at this time, a asset value to Italy. In fact, in the spring of 1945, the official government agency, A.E.A. (Agenzia di Espropriazione Residuati), took the unusual course of issuing a circular to the Director, copy of which

Materials handed over from No. 1 Durap Bolzano represent millions

3. On completion of the handover, all the officials concerned met
in the CMI office at Bolzano where numerous documents were signed by
the Director CMI, Dr. Schatz, representing the Allied Commission and by Lott, re Ben-
dicti, Director AIAA, representing the Italian Government. Dr. Dr. Benedetti
was most enterprising at the way the handover was begun and, under his direction, the
material was, at this time, of great value to Italy. As a result of his
own representation, the official government agency, with (as some believe)
allowances (resiliants) took the unusual course of sending a letter of appre-
ciation to the Director, copy of which is at Appendix "B". A copy of this document
comes back of over 500 car and truck carcasses, all com-
plete, given at the same time.

4. About 1500 of considerable importance was the CT. Machine oper-
ating in public institutions. Two 12.500 load carrying vehicles
located under Location Form TR5017 (CIA)
used 1st March 1945, and the vehicles duly transferred to the Italian Government.

MONTHLY REPORT FOR CAPTURED ENEMY MATERIALS BRANCH FOR FEBRUARY 1946

1. During the month under review the work of handing over all types of CEM to the Italian Government continued.

2. The two main handovers were the Pharmaceutical Plant and Stores and Building at Merano and the Automobile Spare Parts Depot at L'ives.

3. The Pharmaceutical Plant covered 360 acres and included the release of such material as:

- (a) 3000/3500 Tons of raw material (for the manufacture of drugs).
- (b) Medical instruments and hospital equipment of all types.
- (c) Manufactured drugs including very large quantities of Vitamin tablets, Cocaine, Morphine, Caffein and Opium (valued at many millions of dollars).

The handover of the Depot and stores commenced 18 February and was completed by noon 20 February. Present at the handover were the DEMS District, the Director of CEM Branch and Ing. Valerio, Director of AFA.

4. The L'ives dump containing 6500 tons of truck and car spare parts for all classes of Italian vehicles (mostly new) was handed over to ARAR on 17 February.

5. Other releases and handovers during February included:

- (a) 92 Ammunition Dumps, consisting of thousands of tons of all types of ammunition;
- (b) 88 small dumps and depots of consumer goods etc;
- (c) 23 Vehicle Parks containing 2000 passenger and load carrying vehicles, of which 60% were mostly salvage and scrap.

6. A considerable quantity of Vehicle hulls was disposed of to individuals already in possession, payment of 1,614,947 Lire, being made to AFA.

7. The investigation regarding the number of CEM vehicles held by the Ufficio Autotrasporti, and which have still to be released by AFHQ prior to handover to ARAR, was continued and final lists were received from each of the four provinces, Lombardia, Piemonte, Liguria and Venetia. The lists were consolidated showing that over 12,000 captured vehicles were held by different bodies in the Ufficio Autotrasporti. These lists are being delivered to AFHQ for examination and authority to release, and it is hoped to complete the handover to the Ministry of Transport early in March. The Italian Government requested that the Autotrasporti vehicles be handed over direct to the Ministry of Transport and not through ARAR.

8. Instructions as to disposal and handling of the RAY documents and files has been requested. The view was taken by the American and British Embassies that it would be beneficial if the files were micro-filmed. No. 5 Micro-film Unit left Rome for Bolzano on 7 February and after a consultation between Lt. Col. Campbell, CEM Branch and Lt. Col. Innes, CM Section, AFHQ, at Bolzano it was decided to commence filming and a start was made on 21 February. A total of 7176 negative prints were despatched to the Air Ministry, London, covering the period up to 21 February.

9. It has to be noted that the handling of CEM ammunition released to the Italian Government is not very satisfactory. Although 150 dummy boxes have been handed over, in no case has any breaking down process commenced. Lack of transport is given as the reason, but some attempt could be made, and there is now certain local transport in the Autotrasporti which could be used.

10. ARAR continue to be dilatory in the forwarding of completed release notes and the president has been requested to issue the necessary instructions to all concerned to see that release notes are completed and signed and returned when the handover is made.

MONTHLY REPORT OF CAPTURED ENEMY MATERIALS BRANCH FOR JANUARY 1946.

1. The Director of this Branch, Lt. Col. J. J. CAMPBELL, made a complete tour of the North including Ljubljana and inspected the dumps at Bolzano and Merano including that of pharmaceutical items prior to the hand-over to the Italian Govt. unit.
2. The future of Pak (questioning and Kriegsproduktion) files was one of the major items concerning the Director. Inspection of the files was made and a full report called for. The report is now in hand and copies are available in this branch.
3. Great difficulty is still being experienced in getting up to date with releases made to the G.M. Branch. Much time is spent in attempting to make ATO understand that a full turnover of these to the Industrialists of the country is essential for the early recovery of economic life.
4. Undisbursed scrap. Sales from this source during the month totalled 400,000 lire, this being the results of sale of 44 vehicles, and made under authority of No. 2 District letter 1265/3 dated 5 October 1945.
5. Availability. Lt. Col. JAMES, Q.M.C., G-6 Section, AMG, who was in the North during Col. CAMPBELL's visit emphasized the fact that the responsibility for collecting and making inventories of all military equipment.
6. Inventories. An inventory dated 20 January 1946 was made by the Director of handing over No. 1 dump, Bolzano. Inventory was sent to the Director, who found it necessary to subtract many items for military purposes. This has delayed the early handover of the dump to the Italian Government. Now that a ruling has been given that the taking of inventories is a military commitment further hold-ups for such a reason should cease.

10. Visitors. Liaison with AAF has been satisfactory and contacts have been made between all allied units dealing with GM and AAF.
11. Driver dump. It is put on record that this dump was handed over to GM Branch during the month and that the dump was in very bad condition, quantities of valuable material having been left unburned at the mercy of the weather. The GM Branch put a representative in charge of the dump and arranged for the necessary supplies. In agreement with 2 District - GM group was responsible to GM for the dump and take a general inventory.
12. Dumps handed over to AAF. ... a few days ago handed over the following, not in most respects.
- Lengiano, Brusico, Lodigio, Sogno, Montebello, Ponte S. Pietro. In the latter dump only were found a number of running and repairable road vehicles. These have already been released to AAF.
13. It is hoped to close the Turks and Geno offices off with a view to the end of February when will allow us to concern more important areas of operations.

MONTHLY REPORT OF CAPTURED MILITARY MATERIALS BRANCH FOR DECEMBER 45

1. The Italian division of the CMB Branch had over 90 releases of Dumps and Civilian material during December.
 - (a) A further release of 47 Ammunition Dumps was issued.
 - (b) Prompt action by AMIC has not been taken and few releases have as yet been returned by the Italian Government, and in many instances the big releases have not even been issued. Action has been taken with AFAR to obtain payment of release note receipts. The matter is also being referred to the Italian Government.
2. Carry-over Credits. The work in connection with the collection of certain Credits held by Italian industrial and commercial concerns was re-instituted on receipt of AFAR instructions. Actual collections will be made during the month of January.
3. Return of Industrial Plant to Italian Government. The question of the return of industrial plant moved to the Molise area continues to be studied with a view to making a complete hand-over to the Italian Government in order that they can now use it efficiently and settle all claims without this Branch being called in to take any part.
4. Turnover. Numerous efforts are being made by this Branch to effect a rapid turnover of dumps and materials to the Italian government. This is being achieved but it is recognized that the Italian Government is making no effort to pass on the released material to industry in any appreciable quantity.

MONTHLY REPORT OF CAPTURED ENEMY MATERIALS BRANCH FOR NOVEMBER 1945.

1. The setting up of A.M.M.B. (a Department within one of the Italian Ministers) to specialize in the handing of all C.E.M. released by the Italian Government is a definite step forward.
2. Release of some 4,000 load carrying vehicles (of Italian origin) was made to A.R.M.C. during the month.
3. On the 1st November 1945 a directive was issued altering the A.M.M.B. Sub Commission to C.E.M. Branch of Supply Group, Economic Section.
4. A decision was made by AFHQ that the blankets in stock were C.E.M. and would be issued in accordance with AFHQ releases. An estimate concerned is 600,000.
5. The U.S.A. Division in Bolzano handled over 95 releases of material in November 1945.
6. Investigations by the Division in Bolzano on questions concerning material received from Italian Factories continue. Over 770 pieces of equipment and subsections of material was returned to Italian Industry for identification and safe keeping pending decision as to ultimate disposal.
7. Investigations into German Credits on Manufacturers Books disclosed a sum of Lire 2,750,000,000. This important work continues although the question of collection has been suspended for the present.
8. The closest contact has been kept with Milan Office and reports show that much work remains to be done especially on the R.R.K. documents if considerable sums, which could otherwise have to be spent by the Allied Nations on re-establishment of Italian Economy etc., have to be saved.

MONTHLY REPORT OF WAR MATERIALS DISPOSAL SUB COMMISSION FOR OCTOBER 1945.

1. SALVAGE.

The following issues were made during the month,

Miscellaneous Scrap: 550 tons

Press and Copper: 150 tons

The smallness of these totals is explained by the fact that the AFHQ directive AG 386.3 Q(AE)-O of 2 October 1945, which instructs Salvage Depots to deal direct with Italian Ministry of Transportation, is now in effect.

2. This Sub-Commission now holds complete lists and details of all Italian vehicles, held in Parks throughout ITALY. These Parks are in the process of being handed over to the Italian Government as soon as they are able to organise Guards.

3. VEHICLES.

This Sub-Commission has ceased its former policy of entering into contracts with Italian Civilians to rebuild wrecked vehicles for operating with AFAC but is completing contracts already made. These vehicles are re-valued, and after allowance is made for cost of reconditioning, the balance is paid to AFA a/c No. 1 in Bank of Italy. 170 such valuations were made during October 1945.

MONTHLY REPORT OF WAR MATERIALS DISPOSAL SUB COMMISSION FOR SEPTEMBER 1945.

1. TITLES.

40,070 ton. issued from British Salvage and 5,000 from American Salvage.

Note: Of the tonnage from British Salvage, 10,000 were assigned for new truck and heavy assembly lines in Northern Italy.

2. PASS AND CAPTURE.

3,71 tons were issued under the Copper Sulphate programme.
A further 3,500 tons are awaiting disposition.

3. GENERAL SALVAGE.

Approximately 25,000 tons were issued, 30% of which was from American sources.

4. CAPTURED ARMY MATERIAL.

A total of 1,401 German and Italian gas cylinders were handed over from American engineer depots for Italian oxygen demands. A quantity of captured Italian equipment, mainly Vehicle Spares, were shipped via Italy East for the Italian Government.

5. VEHICLES.

No routine inspections of vehicles, spare parts and tyres were made, including 73 wrecked vehicles, valued for first valuation, and deposited with the Bank of Italy.

Deliveries were accounted for 105 German types and the total amount received by bank of Italy was 2,780,400 lire.

6. COMMISSION.

The Director of the Sub Commission attended a Conference at AFHQ on Friday 20th September 1945, on "Disposal of Captured Army Material."

A new directive is being issued immediately. This directive authorizes release of captured civilian material to the Italian Government through War Materials Disposal Sub Commission.
