With reference to minute 202, I am inclined to agree with Brigadier Lush's view.

I do not think that this Headquarters, in conjunction with AMG G-5, should attempt to control policy in this matter and the number of newspapers published. We have no grounds for assuming that a wrong policy is being applied and from Folio 184 it does not appear that we could intervene on the grounds of the number of Italian papers at present published.

I think it was a pity that we committed ourselves so far with the Prime Minister at Folio 185, and even went so far as to send him a copy of Colonel Bowman's letter. On the other hand one would have expected Colonel Bowman to have been aware of the Corps' policy and not to have led us on in the way he did.



1. In May last the Italian Prime Minister approached this Commission with a view to gaining authority for a new Independent paper: "IL GIORNALE DI TRIESTE" to be published.

2. This request was passed to XIII Corps for their approval and a reply was received to the effect that if a formal application was made by the Manager of the paper it would have a fair chance of success. The principal objection quoted was the lack of Printing facilities in the area.

3. This information was passed to the Italian Government and a formal application was made.

4. The application was refused on the grounds that the Corps policy directs that no new publications be considered at present.

~~100~~

5. The attached list showing the number of papers published in Venezia Giulia would give the impression that this policy is justified for of the 6 daily papers, four are Italian and two Slovene. But the Prime Minister himself, who discussed this matter with me recently, has pointed out that the breakdown of the political and national views of these daily papers give a very different picture.

6. This breakdown shows that two of the dailies are Neutral in attitude (Giornale Alleato (Italian) and Giornale Alleato (Slovene)), three are definitely pro-Yugoslav (Corriere di Trieste (Italian)), Primorski (Slovene). Il Lavoratore (Italian) and one only is pro-Italian, namely the Voce Libera.

7. In view of the above Signor de Gasperi renewed verbally his request to me that an additional Italian daily paper to be called Giornale de Trieste be authorised and I strongly recommend that XIII Corps be requested to review their policy on these grounds.

With reference to your letter No. 9255 of 13 June 1946, I confirm to you what has been agreed by correspondence and with the agreements made between the Allied Commission and the Italian Government, with regard to the policy to be followed in the question of the property of newspapers which are under confidential control.

As you have been able to ascertain, all major editing companies of the most diffused newspapers in this country have been returned to the owners only when the complete suspension of the news had resulted from the operation process.

In this matter the Italian Government issued Decree from the offices followed by Law - as in the case of "Anello XII" of Genoa - of following the example to the proprietors when no charge result against them from the re-introduction (trial).

In compliance with this what you expressed in paragraph 1 of the mentioned letter, I enclose a list illustrating the present status of the major Italian newspapers and editorial companies.

As per the final settlement of the properties - mentioned in para. 1 para. 2 of your letter - this must be considered only for those documents which cannot be returned to their proprietors inasmuch as these result public to the effect of the law on operation, and the Italian Government will take steps according to what the court sentenced will do so with regard to the extent of the punishment to be inflicted to the defendants.

With regard to paragraph 2 of your letter, it is not quite exact to speak of projects for the re-activation of the Stefanini Agency. It is only a question of validating the charters and the renewal of the Stefanini which have actually remained inactive, and to this purpose negotiations are now going on between the Stefanini and the Information Agency (ISA) in order to conclude a plan for the re-employment of said materials and of the reorganization concerned.

As you see, the policy followed by the Italian Government in this matter adheres to the principles contained in letter b of paragraph 7 of the "Provis. Plan for Northern Italy", as well as to the second part of letter a of the same paragraph 7 which says:

"As soon as the Commissar can prove that the operation has been completed, these newspapers can re-appear under their historical names, but in the quality of information papers which do not depend from any party".

This rule has been applied to the "Nuovo Giornale d'Italia", "Avanguardia" of Rome and the "Nuovo Corriere della Sera", mentioned in your letter.

It has equally been a constant care of the Italian Government to maintain, in the last six months, the balance set by the A.P.D.B. In conformity to the declarations made by our representative, Dr. Vito Lanza, at the last meeting of the Allied Publications Board, held on 18 January 1946. Thus, during the delicate electoral period, the press of all parties and all tendencies, as well as the independent press, could freely publicize its own political creeds according to the principles of the soundest democracy.

In this regard, I am pleased to announce to you that consideration of exports is being started in those days which will meet the necessary material if the preparation of a new law on the press which will be elaborated by our about legislative bodies on the basis of the fundamental canons of democracy, in substitution of the Decree 14 January 1944 No. 16 which was valid for the war period and will therefore expire shortly.

As to the question of non-cooperation, the Undersecretary responsible informs me that he had taken already the necessary steps so that the Informing Law is non-existent.

Referred to your letter of 22 May 1946, addressed to General Stone, Chief Commissioner, and our reply to you of 5 June 1946, with respect to your recommendation for authorisation for publication of a new independent Italian daily newspaper, "Il Giornale di Trieste", in that city"

We have now received a communication from Colonel Alfred C. Bowman, Service Civil Affairs Officer, Headquarters, AG, 15 Corps, dated 13 June 1946, stating that this matter was discussed at a meeting of the A.I.D. Policy Board.

As no formal application for this paper was made, however, no definitive action was taken, but Colonel Bowman thinks there is a fair chance of reversal when the matter is officially presented if all the facts are as they have been represented.

Principal objection to any newspaper, Colonel Bowman adds, is lack of printing facilities. There is some doubt in the minds of A.I.D. officials as to whether there are any printing facilities in Trieste not "now being used by other newspapers".

Colonel Bowman suggests that you kindly request the Manager of the proposed paper to make formal application at an early date.

Copy of Colonel Bowman's letter is attached for your information.

1. Signor De Gasperi's recommendation to the Chief Commissioner for authorisation for the publication of a new independent Italian Daily "Il Giornale di "Piccolo" was discussed at the last meeting of the AIS Policy Board.

2. As no formal application for this paper has been made, no definitive action was taken but I think there is a fair chance of approval when the matter is officially presented if all facts are as they have apparently been represented to you.

3. As I have told you, the principal objection to any new paper is lack of printing facilities. There is some doubt in the minds of AIS officials as to whether there are any local printing facilities not 'now used by other newspapers'.

4. I suggest that Signor De Gasperi cause the Manager of the proposed paper to make formal application at an early date.

On May 16 we received a cable (reference 1067) from the Department informing us about an exchange of letters between Michael Chicago, Mayor of Trieste here, and Admiral Stone, Chief Commandant of the Allied Commission, concerning AIS in Trieste. Undoubtedly you are familiar with the subject.

I have obtained copies of the correspondence, including Mr. Moffly's comments, and they are enclosed herewith. I believe they are self-explanatory.

Personally I believe Chicago properly considered good the situation to beaten a decision on the entry of private news agencies into Venezia Giulia. When I was in Trieste I discussed this matter with the Commanding General, 15th Corps, 1st Col. Johnson, A.A. Civil Affairs Officer, Mr. Joseph Green, U.S. Political representative of U.S., and 1st Col. Street and Mr. Moffly. None of them seemed anxious, because of the delicate political situation in Trieste, to permit the entry of private news agencies at this time.

As you know Mr. Moffly has been anxious to subscribe to at least one American news agency to give better balance to the official news service supplied by AIS to the newspapers in Venezia Giulia. The only agency which seems ready to sell its service is D.N.C. which is being preferred by Mr. Moffly and Col. Street.

On my return to Rome I had a talk with Mr. Palma and he could produce no proof of his ability to sell D.N.C. news. He admitted that the only reason why D.N.C. could not sell its service direct to the newspapers in Venezia Giulia was the prohibition of APN.

He did not tell me, however, that negotiations were in progress between his office in New York and the OII in Washington for the sale of AIS service to AIS Trieste. He said he had been asked to quote a price and had suggested \$200. weekly for his daily file, already translated into Italian and delivered to Trieste by teleprinter from Rome. I expressed the personal view that this was a preposterous price. It is true that the service would be delivered in Italian, making it unnecessary for AIS Trieste to monitor and translate the newscast. He said he thought a price of \$200. weekly would be fair if Trieste monitored and translated the newscast.

To me this still seems exorbitant so I understand from Mr. Moffly that AIS only pays \$200. monthly for Ruter's world report.

My dear Mr. Prime Minister:

The Allied Commission and the British and American  
embassies as well are keenly interested in what the Italian Government  
proposes to do concerning the eventual disposition of the ownership  
of former Fascist newspapers in Italy.

As you may recall, the "Nuovo Giornale d'Italia"  
ceased publication in late 8 April. "Il Messaggero di Roma" re-  
sumed publication in one on 11 April. In Milan there is now the  
"Nuovo Corriere della Sera", the new name being assumed on 8 May,  
and it is reported that a decree returning control of this paper to  
the persons who owned it under the Fascist regime is being prepared.  
Further, we understand the same agents are seeking a licence to  
operate.

In this connection, it is useful to recall to your  
attention the "Press Plan for Northern Italy" of 20 April 1945 from  
which I quote the following salient sentence (the last one under  
(b), of paragraph 3):

"...position of ownership and eventual political control will  
then be settled in accordance with procedure to be laid  
down by the Italian Government, which has agreed that none  
of these papers will be returned to the control of Fascist  
owners."

This statement of policy might well apply to newspapers other than those in the North.

The reference from the "Press Plan", together with  
other alternatives, was presented by me to Prime Minister Bonomi in  
a letter of 10 March 1945, to which he replied on 24 March 1945,

Lastly, as recorded in the minutes of the last meeting of the allied publication board in Rome on 14 January 1946, Mr. Lazzara, representing the Italian residency of the Council, stated, on behalf of the Italian Government, that his Government informed continuing the policies of the Allied Publication Board, which Agency was one of the initiators of the "Press Plan".

In view of the above history and the importance the entire problem has for the democratic future of Italy, would you be kind enough to inform me at your early convenience on the following points:

- (1) What is the precise status, including present management and ownership, of the major former Fascist newspapers in Italy today?
- (2) What is the attitude of the Italian Government regarding the final disposition of these properties?
- (3) What are the plans of the Italian Government with respect to the reactivation of Stefani Agency?

I would also like to draw your attention to a related matter at this time. I have been informed by the Allied Commission Chief Liaison Officer in Milan that the Commissioner for the "Nuovo Corriere della Sera", Avv. Capoccia, has not yet turned in his report required of him concerning his activities during the period of A.G. administration which ended December 31, 1945.

In the nearly five and a half months since that date Avv. Capoccia has been requested many times to make his report and to date has not done so. You are aware of the fact that Avv. Capoccia was appointed Commissioner by AMG, on the recommendation of the U.S.A. of Northern Italy, and his failure to send in the necessary report is a direct contravention of the terms of his appointment.

Will you please ensure that Avv. Capoccia sends his report to us at once.

I am most happy to inform you that an International Association for the organization of peace has been founded in Rome; it aims at developing in the conscience and public opinion of the world principles of morality applied to international relations, and such a sense of justice as is most necessary for the establishment of a real and lasting peace among nations. Many Italian and foreign personalities of the scientific and diplomatic world have already joined the movement. The Association won't join any political or religious current.

An international monthly magazine called "Nuova Era della Pace" will be the official organ of the Association. We received many articles, chiefly of American university Professors; we hoped that the Italian Authorities would allocate newsprint to us and we have been greatly disappointed for no allocation was made to us.

Before sending back the various articles we received to their writers, the Committee decided to appeal to you, hoping that you may help us and let us have enough newsprint to publish a couple of numbers of our magazine.

We heard that there are in Naples, at the Disposition of the Allies, 1.500 quintals of newsprint, as well as several hundreds quintals in Rome. Couldn't you issue orders to have a few quintals allocated to our Association.

Trusting that you won't reject our request, and that you will help us to carry out our plan which is in agreement with the great program for international peace, we remain,

The zone and border newspapers will shortly have to suspend their publication because of a shortage.

Within the last few days, the papers of central and southern Italy will also have to suspend their publication.

In Milan, the I.C.A. warehouse has 300 lbs of allied newspaper which isn't being used for the time being.

We vainly asked all allied offices to be allowed to purchase and receive print, or at least, get part of it in town.

Unfortunately, our attempts have failed, though we are in no way responsible for the situation caused by the ever larger number of documents issued by the anti-trust, and we don't know how to cope with the situation.

The output of the presses of central and southern Italy is greatly inferior to requirements, and to make up for that, we didn't hesitate in purchasing a considerable amount of newspaper in northern Italy.

But still no, because of transport difficulties, we haven't succeeded in getting e.g. from the 300 lbs of news which we purchased in northern Italy.

Besides, it turns, we can only obtain a sort of paper to be imported from North America.

However, the present difficulty can only be overcome, if you, Sir, who are always so much concerned about freedom of press in Italy, intervene to let us have part of the newspaper which is in stores, at the disposition of major cities.

OC AIS Trieste reports as follows.

1. The editor of the "Vita Nuova" has only made an informal verbal request for a daily newspaper. If he had made a formal written request he would have been given full and written reasons for refusal.
2. The technical printing position in Trieste does not permit the printing of another daily paper.
3. It is considered inadvisable from the point of view of the balance of the press that there should be a daily R.C. religious newspaper.
4. The "Vita Nuova" has caused great trouble and has frequently grossly contravened the existing regulations, and it needs constant checking to keep to its licensed status as a R.C. religious paper, as it frequently descends to indiscriminate politics and scurrilities.

Today, we sent the hereby enclosed letter to the President of the Council of Ministers, Acciuccio Turri, Vice President Giulio Cesare, and Undersecretary Arpesani.

We bring this fact to your attention, knowing that the United Nations want all political tendencies, i.e. all parties to be able freely to participate in the Italian political elections. And to refuse to a political party the authorization of publishing a daily paper, for the elections, means stifling it. The more so as the extremist parties have been allowed to publish their daily in all the largest Italian towns.

Nothing could be more painful for us, Italians, to be obliged to ask the representatives of foreign powers for their intervention, to have the freedom of the press, desired by the Allies, respected, while it depends from a government of six parties which grants approval only when it deems it convenient.

1. I received a telephone call to-night at 1815 from Maj. Noble, APB secretary in Milan. He told me that AVANTI and UNITA' confronted with the penalty of one day's suspension appealed to the Regional Commissioner and while admitting the justice of the penalty asked that instead their circulation might be cut proportionally rather than lose a day's issue. The Regional Commissioner agreed to this on condition that both papers would publish a public apology. As this indeed had been discussed in the APB meeting as an alternative penalty and as public acknowledgment of their error might prove more salutary than arbitrary suspension the Regional Commissioner agreed. Asked by Maj. Noble what I thought of the matter I also agreed.

2. Text of apology to appear in both papers - as read to me by Maj. Noble:

"On Saturday last we received a communique from APB that as a disciplinary measure resulting from unauthorized publication we are to be suspended for one day.

"However (sic) we admit the fault of publishing an unauthorized edition and the justice of the sentence and we are grateful to the Allied authorities for upholding our appeal against interruption of publication and imposing instead a reduction of circulation.

3. The APB acted on the suggestion of the Regional Commissioner, Lombardy Region, and the vote to suspend was in accordance with his wishes and allowed him discretion in the matter.

2. Livio CAPUTO is an extremely brainy child of twelve. He is spending his spare time typing a four-page foolscap news-sheet entitled RESISTENZA. He writes all the articles himself. They have a strong Communist flavour, but there is nothing anti-Allied about them. He says he disapproves of the Allies because they disapprove of the Communists. The effect of this newspaper is perhaps limited by the fact that so much time is demanded by the composition of articles, the drawing of letter-press headings, and what not, that he has no time to print more than one copy. He is a most engaging child, with an excellent brain. His father is Direttore Responsabile of the GAZZETTA D'ITALIA and a man whose liberal sympathies are well-known. Livio's Communist sympathies were apparently aroused by the fact that a neighbour to the east was compelled to work hard for a meagre living, whilst a neighbour to the west lived off the fat of the land and never did a hand's turn. He has decided to put this state of things right. His ardour has been cooled lately by the attacks in UNITA against his father, whom UNITA describes as a "reactionary Fascist".  
Livio is in no sense "a danger to Security".

At this meeting it was decided to grant a license to the Labour Democrat Party to publish a daily newspaper of 35,000 copies in Milan, the name of the paper to be determined later. It was further decided that inasmuch as the title of the old pre-Fascist newspaper, IL SECOLO, to which you referred in your letters, was owned by another company and the property has been placed under a Commissario, APB could not legally authorize the Labour Democrats to use this or an almost similar name, IL NUOVO SECOLO.

Since the Labour Democrats are now assured of a newspaper in Milan, I trust you will agree with this decision.

To the Representative of P.M.B. in Milan.

Will you kindly allow me, as editor of the daily paper 'Il Nuovo Secolo', and writer of the request for the permission to publish the said paper, several times sent to this office since last April, to draw your attention on a few facts concerning the authorization refused to the paper.

To my knowledge, the motives which made this office refuse the permission to publish the paper are the following:

- a) the Allies pledged themselves at first not to publish in Italy, during the period of the occupation, any newspaper besides those considered as the expression of the Nazis;
- b) the fact that the paper supported by my group couldn't be considered as the expression of a determined political party;
- c) lack of paper.

The first motive can now be considered as no longer existing, as two papers at least had the honor of being granted permission by this office: 'il Corriere Lombardo' and 'Milano Ora'.

The second argument used to reject my request should also be considered as no longer valid, for in a previous request, myself and my group proved that the paper 'Il Nuovo Secolo' could not should be considered as the daily organ of labour democracy, party belonging to the Government coalition, who admitted, also in writing, into the last in the activity of the regional committees for liberation.

About the third motive (shortage of paper) I have nothing to say.

Nevertheless, I heard about a request made by a group of manufacturers, represented by Mr. Targetti, of the Argotti wood-mill, to be allowed to publish a daily paper, using the heading (testata) of the 'Secolo'. This heading belongs to the Soc. A. I. S., whose funds and assets have been registered by the national government, for they formerly belonged to Benito Mussolini's patrimony.

I have no intention of discussing whether Mr. Targetti and the group he represents may seriously be held as the followers of a democratic trend or compensated by the daily paper 'Secolo', or whether they should be preferred to Eng. Cesare Pontremoli, who will be joint editor of the 'Nuovo Secolo' with me, and who was the last owner of the 'Secolo' during the free regime; to Ivonne Bonomi, first president of the Italian government of liberation, and former joint editor of the 'Secolo', together with Leonida Bisolati; to Luigi Gattinotto, political representative of the Democracy of Lombardia. I only hope that the paper shortage

which has been used as a pretense to reject, till now, the request we made, will also prove an obstacle impossible to overcome for those who have made or will make requests for the publication of a daily paper.

I also consider it strange and significant that, considering that the ~~provinces~~ are soon to be handed over to the national government, the group represented by Mr. Rappetti does not even wait for this passage, but tries to obtain by surprise from his office, the permission which was refused to me, using as an argument the fact that the province of Isonzo is shortly to go back under the national government, and that the Italian Government should therefore decide about my request.

Finally, and to have this office correctly informed, let me point out that, considering all the assets of the same are sequestered, including the more the heading of the Secolo, there is no serious and lawful possibility for the sequesterer to let temporarily or sell the heading, for the powers of the sequesterer are limited to the safeguarding of the patrimony that has been sequestered, for the national government hasn't yet fixed anything about what is to be done with the property of the ex-duces.

I took the liberty of explaining these facts so that the office shall be fully informed before making any decision.

As editor of the periodical 'UNIONE EUROPEA', and adviser to the Italian section of the International Institute for the European Federalistic movement whose seat is in Bern, I take the liberty of drawing your attention on what follows:

On October 13th, 1944, the former Undersecretary for Press allowed me to publish a weekly called 'Unione Europea', to create and develop among European states, without party spirit, a sound and efficacious cooperation on the economic and financial ground, uniting, in this sense the movements that already exist in the various countries.

Later on, an international institute based on this program, and with branches in the various states, was formed in Bern; to cooperate with and spread its propaganda action, I wrote on July 1st to the presidency of the Council, (Undersecretary Ardeani asking for the weekly to be transformed in to a daily paper.

During our many meetings, Undersecretary Ardeani approved of program enthusiastically, and said assured me that my request would soon be granted. I must also add that my request has been warmly supported by our Minister of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Cesari.

However, after two months, I haven't yet seen the official communication of the promised permission, and this because there are other requests for new dailies, the publication of which is causing apprehension among extremist parties; for this reason, they won't make an exception from the successive criterion which has been adopted for similar requests.

Without mentioning that such an attitude is in complete contrast with the freedom of the press and unfairly favours the privileged position of a few parties, it is a fact that while the various political groups already have their paper, the movement for European Union is the only one which isn't one.

Therefore, and not to lengthen a waiting which, in the present difficult time, is hampering the reconstruction work which inspires our initiative, I take the liberty of asking for your intervention with the president of the Council, prof. Farinetti, knowing it will cause my request to be accepted, even if it is only a recommendation; the presidency is already favourably disposed.

I shall be most happy if my paper contributes to carry out the indications which the farsighted policy of President Roosevelt gave for the formation of a new world based on liberty and justice.

EXTRACT

.....Reference your letter 9254/101/EC of 13 August 1945. The matters concerned have been dealt with primarily by Lt. Col. Street, commanding the local A.I.S. (ex P.W.B.). He has submitted the following statement:

'The attitude of the editorial staff of this newspaper, and of the Bishop himself, has not always been cooperative. After authorisation was granted to it to publish, in the first week, it exceeded its allocation of rotary newsprint. In its second week, after having been asked to print on flat bed and not on rotary, it failed to comply with the request and again exceeded its circulation figures. In order to modify the balance in the newsprint pool AIS cut its circulation from 40,000 to 10,000 for three weeks. At that time there was a shortage of newsprint which threatened to have political repercussions until reserves were accumulated. The only newsprint available was from Lubiana which gave the Yugoslav authorities a certain undesirable advantage in political discussions. Care, therefore, was necessary to maintain reserves of paper and in addition we would have laid ourselves open to a grave charge of partiality if these breaches of regulations by "Vita Nova" (misspelled in original) had gone unnoticed by the Allied authorities. In the third week they failed to submit their newspaper to censorship.

At the present moment all weekly newspapers, be they religious, political or of entertainment value, print on flat bed paper. It would be impossible to grant permission for any one weekly to print on the rotaries without causing technical difficulties and without permitting others to do so.

At the present moment "Vita Nova" has permission to print as many copies as they wish and they have one privilege the other weekly newspapers do not have, namely, they can set up their type in the newspaper printing offices prior to having it printed on flat bed in other print shops of the town.

The action taken by AIS with regard to "Vita Nova" was in every case fully discussed and approved at a weekly meeting at which the Senior Civil Affairs Officer, Allied Military Government, 13 Corps, was present, and at which Brigadier Archibald presided.'


