

1. Reference is made to your CCG/18301/7 of 2 May, INC (CCB)
2043/38 of 8 May and your cable 2772 of 16 May.

2. The matter has been referred to the Ministers and the following is an extract from a letter of 27 May received from the Office of the British Resident Minister and concurred in by the Office of the American Political Advisor:-

"1. As explained to Major Jackman on the telephone we would have no direct means to ascertaining whether mail reached Italian Prisoners of War in Germany and if so in what quantities. The only channel through which such information might be obtained is the International Red Cross and it is suggested that you might ask the local representative to make enquiries through his Head Office. When the Foreign Office have wanted to obtain information about the position of Italians held in Germany, they have generally addressed themselves to the International Red Cross, because the German Government do not recognise any third Government as entitled to protect Italian interests in Germany. We suggest that you should ask the International Red Cross to find out (a) whether any mail from southern Italy reaches Italians held in Germany; (b) if so, in what quantities, and whether there is any distinction between letters written on special forms and letters written haphazardly.

2. We also suggest that pending a reply to this enquiry, which may be expected to take a long time, you should request the Control Commission to notify the Italian public through the Italian postal authorities that there can be no certainty that letters addressed to Italians held in Germany will reach their destination; and that any relatives of such Italians who can obtain official German reply forms, whether enclosed in letters received from Italians in Germany or by other means, should make use of them in preference to any other form of letter."

3. Inquiries are accordingly being made of the I.A.C. and you will be advised of the result as soon as possible. In the meantime you will no doubt act as suggested in para 2 of the above extract.

SUBJECT:- Correspondence for Italian P.O.W. in Germany.

TO:- The Under Secretary of State for Posts and Telegraphs.

1. Information has been received from the Prisoner of War Censorship Unit APO 759 that letters and cards from Italian Prisoners of War held in Germany have contained remarks by German censors that no incoming mails to these Prisoners of War will be accepted unless written on the official German duplicate form.
2. Resulting from correspondence with Allied Force HQs. on the matter endeavour is being made to ascertain whether any distinction is actually being applied in Germany as between the ordinary P.O.W. letters and those written on special forms.
3. Pending the receipt of further information, which will probably take some time to obtain, it is considered that it would be well to advise the Italian public that there can be no certainty that letters addressed to Italian Prisoners of War held in Germany will reach their destination; and that any relatives of such Italians who can obtain official German reply forms, whether enclosed in letters received from Italians in Germany or by other means, should make use of them in preference to any other form of letter. Arrangements are being made to publicise this information in Allied Government territory.

Colonel Holloman opened the meeting and explained that the purpose for which it had been called was to draw up an agreed line of action in relation to the aspects mentioned in the attached Conference Notes.

After discussion it was agreed as follows:

Planned Services.

1. Post Offices to be re-opened for the operation of Postal services as soon as the conditions were suitable. The basis upon which the services would agree to be initiated in a revised version of Executive Memorandum No. 16 will be being drawn up by the Communications and Finance Sub-Committee.

2. In connection with the provision of money to Post Offices and the conveyance of documents relating to the various transactions, it was agreed that the Finance Sub-Committee would hold itself responsible for supplying the necessary funds, and that the documents would be transmitted under the following conditions:

To be enclosed in open letters and passed - Mr. G.O.W.'s where necessary - to the Provincial Finance Officer. The letter to advise the contents of each such letter to ensure that no intimate correspondence was enclosed, and then to stamp the outer cover with his office stamp and close it down. The letters then to be forwarded, by carrier or other similar means to those areas where the mail or post office service has not commenced.

P.O.W. Letters.

3. P.O.W. communications come to hand for delivery prior to the opening of the normal office and until received, and it is considered necessary to effect delivery, and afford collection facilities for letters posted to P.O.W., as early as possible after territory has been occupied. It was agreed that the post officeable areas of authority, namely, in the absence of a normal mail service, was as follows:

Confidential Notes

INTRODUCTION

1. When the question arose of actually re-starting Post Offices and anti-Security Bank etc followed, using the same as necessary for the conveyance of cash and documents.

2. Up to date in Italy, there has been no completely co-ordinated or collaborated AD-OC-AL plan of development, owing essentially to changes in the needs of the moment and to an initial shortage of specialized Postal and additional postal offices were set going first;

FINANCIAL SERVICES

3. The Plenipos Sub-Commission takes the view - with which the Commissions the Executive in its present - that Post Offices should be re-opened at positions as similar to that governing the maintenance of banking facilities. This need arises well before an ordinary movement of funds can be given. To satisfy it there must be provision for banking facilities in the former areas involved, bringing in security interests and transportation problems.

The manner in which these considerations can all be tied up is the first order of business to be settled.

MAIL SERVICES

4. The second matter is that of the ordinary mail services, and the following considerations arise:

(a) Advance facilities for letters to and from prisoners of war (? and Red Cross forms).

3. Sub-Commission takes the view - with which the Commissions share - that Post Offices should be reopened at the earliest moment for the payment, collection and transmission of money related to social services; taxes, savings. This need arises well before an ordinary mail service can be given. To satisfy it there must be provision for maintaining supplies of such, and for safe interchange of documents. To a large extent the position is similar to that concerning the maintenance of banking facilities. Movement of "Carrier services" in the forward areas is involved, bringing in Security interests and transportation problems.

The manner in which these considerations can all be tied up is the first main item to be settled.

MILITARY SERVICES.

4. The second matter is that of the ordinary mail services, and the following considerations arise:

(a) Adequate facilities for letters to and from Province of War (? and Red Cross home).

(b) To meet Comorality and other requirements, each province must function as a sole control delivery area, with all correspondence passing first through the capital, from which delivery services will radiate.

(c) A delivery at the outset restricted to the capital town itself is not worthwhile - except perhaps for psychological effect - in other than large towns.

(d) Delivery from the capital to part of a province involves many complications and is undesirable. The issue arises only when military operations become static.

(e) It is desirable to have agreement to one or other of the following plans:

(i) Post Army boundary line - or a fixed distance behind it - to be regarded as the forward limit for postal delivery. Commissions sub-Commission to be kept advised (?) by A.A.I. of changes in such boundary line, and they will then automatically set services going.

(ii) Someone (?) A.A.I. to advise Commissions Sub-Commission, as each case arises, to the effect that "Province X is now clear for the introduction of postal deliveries".

(Note: Does "or" notification, in either case, go to A.M.C., and relating Regional Commissions?)

(f) Et cetera.....

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- (?) It is assumed that when a new network has been opened up, its services may be linked as soon as possible with those already operating in Italy, Sicily and Sardinia, and with the existing and existing ~~existing~~ ~~existing~~ networks.

SUBJ CT : Prisoner of War correspondence to and from parts of the Province of Naples in which a normal postal service is not yet authorized.
 To : The Provincial Director P.P.C.T., Naples.

1. Correspondence from Italian Prisoners of War addressed to places in the Province of Naples where a normal postal service is not yet authorized should be dealt with as follows:-

(a) Despatched in special sealed mails addressed to the normal delivery ~~xxxxxx~~ office. These mails must be closed under the supervision of a reliable supervising officer and will be liable to check by an A.O.C. Officer.

(b) On arrival at the delivery Office the letters will be prepared for delivery to callers, delivery by the Post Office to the residences of addressees will not be permitted.

(c) It may be left to the discretion of the Vice-Vitore concerned to fix the times and days when the delivery to callers is available and it is suggested that the Sindaci be informed locally of the arrangements.

2. Correspondence from residents in the area concerned to Italian prisoners of war.

(1) Such correspondence should be handed in at the local post offices.

(2) This correspondence must then be enclosed in sealed mails, containing no other correspondence.

(3) These special prisoner of war mails must be addressed to "Allied Censor Control", Naples, and forwarded in the same way as is laid down for the disposal of unauthorized official correspondence from the Office concerned.

1. It is agreed that the tpt from NAPLES to this HQ (not necessarily 8 Army tpt - see your 361/47/CA dated 27 Apr 44) and from this HQ to CAMPOBASSO may well be inadequate for moving large quantities of POW mail.

2. The services which tpt official correspondence (see para 2) from this HQ to Provinces is 8 ARMY E.L.S. and nothing except certified official mail is carried. The army would certainly not consent to carry POW correspondence by E.L.S. which is normally a D.R. or Jeep. There is no other service transporting official correspondence in this area from AMG HQ to Provinces or formations.

3. As this HQ will probably be constantly on the move from now on for some time, the system is not workable because of lack of means to tpt POW mail.

- (a) From Naples to 8 Army HQ.
- (b) From AMG HQ to Provinces HQ's with which contact is maintained solely by official E.L.S.

1. Ref. is made to RC and MG Section's communication no 85/30/CA of 12 May to AMG 5 and 8 Armies and Region V. The scheme therein outlined seems to be an entirely practicable one, and in anticipation of its adoption it is thought well to consider now the question of the circulation of correspondence to and from the provinces concerned.

2. The procedure mentioned in para 2 of the letter quoted meets the position so far as distribution and collection within each individual province is concerned. The question of the "feeder" services between those provinces and Naples and Bari should, geographically, be on the basis that Foggia and Campobasso (?) and Chieti, which is operating financial services) should work to and from BARI; and Naples and Benevento to and from NAPLES. (Each of the two key points would interchange POW correspondence for the other's area).

3. Conformity with such an arrangement rests mainly upon transportation facilities between BARI-Foggia-Campobasso-Chieti? . Bari and Foggia are linked by a military train, or perhaps an official courier service could be utilised. The Regional Commissioner, Region V could no doubt arrange from Foggia forward. NAPLES-Benevento will present no difficulty. If Foggia and Campobasso could be more conveniently served from NAPLES, the latter could function as the distribution centre for all the correspondence concerned.

4. Perhaps these further points can be put to the addressees of your enquiries of the 12th May. Copies of this letter are being forwarded to the Postal Officers Regions II and III for enquiry and report so far as they are concerned.

1. With regard to incoming correspondence, (paragraph 2a), there is no objection to mail being delivered to local Post Offices by the method suggested. There is also, no objection to mail being delivered by house to house delivery, provided that the postman conforms to the existing movement regulations.

2. With regard to outgoing correspondence, (paragraph 2b), it is requested that the existing procedure be continued by which such mail is forwarded to the International Red Cross by means of the official courier service, as it is not considered desirable to have any mail of any kind carried to the rear in Post Office vans.

3. This Headquarters will welcome the extension of P.O.W. Mail facilities on the lines outlined above.

As a consequential result of uncensored correspondence from Italian POW's to addresses in the "closed areas" (North Ingles frontier, Novara, Cremona and Poggio) is falling to us in Naples and Rome. As naturally temporary and not very satisfactory arrangement was made with the International Red Cross and with the Red Army sharing the letters transport, as and when available, and to be loaded with some of this mail for transport to Caspagozzo from which town it was to be the responsibility of the International Red Cross to arrange distribution. (362/7/1a of 27 April 1944 to Region III with copies to ABD-BIO Army, Communications Headquarters, and International Red Cross referred). The present amount of mail awaiting distribution is much larger than could possibly be handled by such an irregular arrangement.

2. While appreciating that the present is not the time to ask the Allies to agree to postal delivery services by the post offices, I consider that no objection can be made to using the post offices in the following manner:

a. Correspondence from POW to recipient in "closed" areas.
To be sent to the local post offices in special bags to be made up under supervision of the provincial Headquarters Post Office and despatched by the carriers to transport the official correspondence and mail (once or twice weekly) in conjunction with post office financial services. The correspondence to be called for at the local post office.

b. Correspondence to POW from persons living in "closed" areas.
The correspondence to be handed in at the local post offices and despatched thence (by the transport service referred to in a) in sealed bags addressed not to the local post office, but to the Allied Control Council at the provincial capitals. This would prevent the service being resisted.

3. I think our scheme would involve no breach of security and, while not so satisfactory as a house to house delivery, it would at least satisfy the desire for news of relatives expressed in a number of appeals that have reached this Headquarters.

4. Please inform this section as early as possible whether or not you consider the scheme would be satisfactory.

SUBJECT: Correspondence from Italian Prisoners of war for addresses in liberated territory where normal postal deliveries are not yet authorised.

TO : RC and MC Section, HQ, A.C.C.

1. At the present time the normal arrangement concerning correspondence from Italian Prisoners of War to their relatives living in the "closed" area (North Naples Province, Benevento, Campobasso and Foggia) is that it should be held at Naples or Bari pending authorisation of deliveries.

2. The delegate of the International Red Cross, who was receiving many enquiries (partly as a result of the non delivery of this correspondence) sought and obtained your permission for such correspondence to be transported to the Capoluoghi concerned with a view to its delivery at his responsibility through the instrumentality of the Italian Red Cross.

3. There have however been large arrivals of POW mail recently and he finds that the task of delivery is likely to be quite outside the capacity of the Italian Red Cross and asks whether it would be possible for the Post Office to undertake the work.

4. The present time is perhaps not a propitious one for asking the Armies concerned to agree to postal delivery services and it is therefore suggested that the following arrangements be introduced.

a. Correspondence from POW to relatives in "closed" areas.
To be sent to the local Post Offices in special mails to be made up under supervision at the Provincial Headquarters Post Office and despatched by the services which transport the official correspondence and cash (once or twice weekly) in connection with Post Office Financial Services. The correspondence to be called for at the local Post Offices.

b. Correspondence to POW from relatives living in "closed" areas.

1. The information contained in the accompanying communication CCG/16301 - 6 of April 29th from the Civil Censorship Group is the first intimation received here regarding a veto being placed by the Germans on the transmission of ordinary letters to Italian Prisoners of War held by them. More precise information, not yet received, may have been communicated through official UK and US channels, but it is considered that the position should be referred to the War Office immediately by cable. In anticipation of that being done, and in view of the unusual means by which the information has been notified from Germany, it is not proposed to issue any notification to the Italian public unless and until some confirmation of the restrictions is received, or to take any steps towards holding up ordinary letters now being posted.

2. The regulations issued to the public in the UK in February of this year permit of the posting of ordinary letters to British P.O.W. in German hands.

Ref. your OA/4 of 2 April 44. and further our 321/15/CA of 23 Mar.

1. It is considered that, with the possibility of an increasing volume of traffic, O.A.O.S. would be assuming a burden that they should not be asked to bear.
2. Would you therefore further consider entrusting this entire matter to the Agency of the Italian Red Cross who could handle it until additional postal services are inaugurated in the area.
3. Italian Red Cross agencies and Directors of Postal Services in other areas have expressed a willingness to undertake similar work.
4. Failing that, the Sindaci should be requested to co-operate under the supervision of O.A.O.S.

2. A copy of this R.C. letter to the SCAO's of the Army areas and the Regional Commissioner for FOGGIA Province of 23 March 1944 is enclosed for your information. Your attention is drawn to the first sentence of para.1 as this is relevant to the security point raised in para.2 of your letter under reference. As will, as requested, submit the final instructions to you before issuing.

3. In regard to para.3 of your letter, a copy of the instructions relative to the International Red Cross and P.O.W. Services issued by A.C.C. R.C. is enclosed. From the enemy side these arrangements are now in operation, but from this side the start has been delayed by discussions as to the price to be paid for the forms. This has, however, now been settled and it is expected that the Services from both ends will be working within a few days.

Procedure for distribution and transmission
of International Red Cross Message Forms
in Italy, Sicily, and Sardinia.

1. International Red Cross Agencies have been established in collaboration between I.R.C. and the I.R.C.O. Agency, for Italy, Mr. Giacomo, President and Secretary Mr. G. Mancini, Florence. An I.R.C. Agency is also being established in Sicily, by Mr. Gattuso, President of the Sicilian Branch of the Italian Red Cross, will function for the I.R.C.O. so far as the I.R.C. Service Section is concerned.

2. Other forms will be printed at Naples (for Italy) and at Palermo for Sicily and Sardinia (Mr. Gattuso will receive his supplies from Mr. Mancini).

3. The forms will be sold to the public at Post Offices, at a charge of 15 lire, each which amount will cover all the postage work undertaken by all departments concerned. The figure of 15 lire is the sum required in Sicily, for the service already started, and is related to 15 lines. If less than 15 lines, 10 lire will be charged by the Italian Post Office to the I.R.C., and will be then deducted in appropriate proportion to the Italian Red Cross. It is anticipated that the control of supplies from Postal Authorities to the I.R.C. (in respect of the three territories concerned) will be centralized on the office of the Under Secretary of State for Posts and Telegraphs at Palermo. This point has yet to be settled.

4. The service will operate between the areas open for civil mail services and areas occupied territories in Italy and Sicily.

- Reference your 361/15/Ck of 21 March 1944.
1. (a) Campobasso Province. The Italian Red Cross and the Director of Posts are both willing to undertake this work. The Post Offices throughout the Province are open for certain financial transactions, and a limited mail service based on Campobasso and covering the whole Province is in operation. The mail is carried by a civil transportation company, and is used by A.M.G. and by the Italian Administration, subject to censorship.
 - (b) Voglia Province. The Post Offices are open as above, and a similar mail service is in operation, but carried in this case by Carabinieri motorcyclists, between Isernia and the various Postas. The Post Offices Authorities state that they could handle this additional traffic, and that collection or distribution would be done by the Postas, or by the Post Offices.
 2. It is proposed, since the Post Offices are open and since a mail service, of sorts, is in operation in both Provinces, that the Post Office should handle the work, routed through the Head Offices at Campobasso and Isernia.

1. The International Red Cross has arranged for its Civil Message, Inquiry, and P.O.W. correspondence services to be carried out through the medium of the Italian postal services in those parts of Italy where postal services are now in operation. An announcement giving details of these services will be issued in a few days.

2. There remains the 5th and 6th armies areas and Poggio Province in which the Italian postal services are not operating but where the need for the facilities afforded by the International Red Cross, is equally pressing.

3. Provision is required for the following:

(I) Receipt from the International Red Cross, Naples, of Civil Message forms (originating in enemy territory) their distribution to addressees and their collection and return to the International Red Cross, Naples, after the reply has been written on the back of the forms.

(II) Receipt from the International Red Cross, Naples, of inquiry forms, the tracing of those inquiries for and the forwarding of answers to the International Red Cross, Naples.

(III) Receipt from the International Red Cross, Naples, of P.O.W. correspondence from enemy occupied territory and forwarding to addressees.

(IV) The selling of International Red Cross, Civil Message forms at 15 lire each to those wishing to correspond with persons in enemy occupied territory and the forwarding of the forms to the International Red Cross, Naples.

(V) Forwarding of letter to International Red Cross, Naples, asking that inquiry be made for persons in enemy occupied territory.

(VI) Forwarding to International Red Cross, Naples, of correspondence for P.O.W. in enemy occupied territory.

4. All censoring of incoming and outgoing correspondence is done in Naples. There is no objection to the use of the Italian Red Cross or any other responsible agency in carrying out this work. The only transaction in which money is involved is that detailed in par. 3(IV) above.

Please inform this M^y, at a very early date how you propose to deal with this correspondence in your area, so that the necessary details can be forwarded to the International Red Cross in Naples and appropriate arrangements can be made for the handling of the small sum of money involved.

AMC CIVILIAN MESSAGE SERVICE TO COMMAND

Rating--purely civilian messages of not more than 25 words which contain friendly news may now be sent from Berlin to all German or enemy-occupied countries through a service set up here by the International Red Cross. Northern and Central Italy are included in the service.

Red Cross representatives have announced the plan whereby messages must be free of any mention of politics, war or finance. Correspondence with POWs and interned civilians will not be affected by the new service and must continue to go through regular channels. In cases where it is an urgent necessity to verify the status of either military or civilian personnel in enemy hands, however, the International Red Cross provides a special inquiry message service.

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
