SUBJECT: Displaced Persons - Closed Camp, Bari

TO : Headquarters, Allied Control Commission

Reference is made to your 73/94/CA of 15 March.

1. The recommendation contained in your memorandum under reference has been referred to the Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, at this Headquarters who have stated that it is considered essential that all permanent residents of the closed camp at Bari shall be removed in order that the registration and security interrogation of refugees may be effected with the safeguards necessary to the efficient conduct of these matters. Most recent reports received in the Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, from Security authorities in the field do not accord with the opinion of the local Security authorities as expressed in your memorandum.

2. The considerations underlying the opinion expressed by G-2, AFHQ, are explained in their memorandum B-389.506/80 of 10 March, which was forwarded under MGS 254 of 12 March. It is held that in this matter the claims of security must be considered paramount, and you should therefore arrange to remove all static members from this camp to other locations.

It is estimated that the former P. I. Maritz Dan Co. Ltd. has

type of vessel we are reporting from Venezuela has already materialized in the  
last few years, and instead of serving a cross-section of the population of the  
islands off the Malabar coast, to serve foreign old people, disabled women  
and orphan children. A ship which arrived recently had 90 million children  
aboard. These people are coming from the mainland of Venezuela and are coming  
through the German Islands. Presently 42 German consider them of no  
value and do not care to feed them. These people are in very poor shape  
physically when they arrive due to exposure and were hospitalized.  
All of this was instated with 1969. It is therefore imperative that they be  
dissested without delay and that they have some opportunity of recovery from  
their privations and exposure before being sent in best case and dinner south.

The question of screening these people has been discussed with the  
local COMIC representatives, Brigadier Hill-Mullen and General Mills, who state  
that it will be sufficient to take out not more than 2 units for the accommodation  
of those who should be kept under close surveillance. If 2 or 3 units can be  
made it is suggested.

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The situation of German Jews remains bad, associated with the  
loss of their possessions, confinement to their homes and command of officials.  
But Hitler has sufficient to care for his subjects. If the whole camp is  
left alone he should revert to his old ways. If the whole camp is  
to be set free and turned loose all requires a heavy currency or something  
else to sustain it.

This concentration has no room for the Jews and it does not seem  
possible to find another at this time.

We have successfully evaded holding any of our Jews here on the  
pretext of a concentration camp. It is believed to be very wise  
and would cause serious repercussions if the Nazi Camp had the experience of  
concentration camps. However, because of the type of refugees we are  
now taking in, and myself, I am afraid that they may have to make  
arrangements and commitments upon the larger number of arrivals when and  
if Hitler's如意境.

The movement of refugees who have, however, been here or less  
permanent are said to have averaged 20%.

It is believed that the arrangements completed with the Local Office  
representatives cover the necessary and, at the same time, sufficient  
protection of the refugee camp and for the most important uses.

I have discussed the question with the local security authorities. It will be unnecessary to evacuate the static part of this camp. They do not carry on business from the camp but are permanent residents therein. Evacuation would involve the necessity of building a far larger camp elsewhere. I therefore recommend that the authorities on the spot, realising the desirability, be allowed to arrange the camp in the best manner possible. SUBJECT: Formation of an Interrogation and Registration *Headquarters* for Refugees at BARI

TO : HQ. Allied Armies in Italy.  
Military Government Section, A.F.H.Q.

1. The registration and interrogation of refugees from Yugoslavia and the Dalmatian Coast on entry into Italy is considered a matter of primary importance for security reasons. It is known that the enemy intends trying to send agents under this cover. After consultation with the various authorities on the spot arrangements have been made for an interrogation team under Major Rice, Security Intelligence Liaison Office, C.M.F., to carry out this work at the Displaced Persons Camp (formerly the Venables Camp) near Bari. Before such registration and interrogation can be adequately performed it will be necessary to evacuate a large number of refugees who have made the Camp their home and who are now carrying on their businesses and occupations from this centre. It is understood that this situation is recognised as being undesirable and that steps are being taken to arrange for the removal of these people. It cannot be emphasised too strongly that their evacuation is a matter of the utmost necessity and urgency. In certain cases the bona fides of persons who have undergone the primary registration and interrogation are likely to be found to require detailed examination. Such persons must be kept in a secure place. It has been agreed with the local authorities that a portion of the Camp suitable for the accomodation of some 200 individuals shall be wired off so that persons requiring detailed interrogation can be safely confined. The wiring off of this section of the Camp should be commenced at once.

2. Although it is recognised that the wiring off of the whole Camp may be rather an extensive work and that some political capital may be made of the fact that by so doing we are confining friendly refugees, it is felt strongly that such an arrangement is desirable and that it should be attempted if at all possible. The registration (a most important matter) of refugees on arrival in Italy is made much more difficult if it is performed in an open Camp from which egress is easy and uncontrolled. It is considered that no serious political issue will be encountered if it is explained that this is done in the interests of the refugees themselves and those of the United Nations.

Reference your 72/36/54 of the 20th instant, it is observed that this letter is also taken up in the attachment to UO-391, 711 Yugoslavia, of the 26th February, 1946, which copy was sent to this Headquarters where the question of dealing with Partisans is also being dealt with.

2. General Jason MacCormick, on his recent visit, stated that the question of running camps for Yugoslavs being trained for combat duties was a question for the Ministry, rather than for Allied Control Commission. It is understood that No. 2 District was informed accordingly.
3. The Executive Commissioner on his visit arranged that, as a temporary measure to help LSS forces, this sub-Commission would administer a camp which is being set up at SAIL for Yugoslavs being trained for combat duties. The setting up of this camp will enable GANTUA Camp to be handed back to No. 2 District, in accordance with timely requirements, and will clear No. 1 Camp at SAIL of its large percentage of Yugoslavs under training. It is stressed, however, that this arrangement was temporary only.
4. Commander Lord, representing SMC, visited this Headquarters for the purpose of discussing screening of refugees, particularly Yugoslavs. His present care is inadequate. He did not desire to take over the whole of No. 1 Transit Camp at SAIL, nor to bring into force 100 per cent screening of Yugoslavs, as he believed this to be impracticable. His requirements, as stated by him, were one or two huts to be set aside to which would be sent refugees designated by SMC whose past records they particularly wish to investigate. The huts in question would be wired off from the rest of the camp, and guards would be provided by his organization.
5. The transit Camp at SAIL is required by this Sub-Commission for the handling of Yugoslav refugees, and displaced persons from other sources. The bulk of these persons arrive at SAIL and the first and main responsibility is dissemination. This necessitates both a clean and dirty side of the camp, and materially affects total capacity.

5. The transit camp at Zara is required by this Sub-Commission for the Isolation of Yugoslav refugees, and displaced persons from other sources. The bulk of these persons arrive at Zara and the first and main responsibility is disinfection. This necessitates both a clean and dirty side of the camp, and materially affects total capacity.

6. It is essential that this disinfection should take place at the earliest possible moment and that the Zara camp is, therefore, the obvious place. Therefore, that the present arrangement agreed to by local representatives of CIO to be allowed to stand - viz. (1) that the No. 1 P.W. Camp be continued to be used as an reception camp for Yugoslav refugees and other mixed displaced persons and (2) that a part of the camp of not more than two huts be set aside for the use of CIO as outlined above; (3) that all participants in training for combat be removed from CIO.

7. It is also desired to stress that the Partisans who are undergoing military training are a purely military organization and not refugees and displaced persons in the usual sense of the word, and that they deal direct with military formations on all matters, receiving military rations, etc., and it is therefore submitted that their administration does not fall within the scope of this sub-Commission.

1. ADV HQ FORCE 133 at BARI are undertaking a number of commitments in connection with PARTISANS in ITALY which are not strictly their concern and for which the HQ is not designed.

2. The kind of activities undertaken are:-

(a) PARTISAN wounded.

Arrangements for reception and treatment of PARTISAN wounded arriving from YUGOSLAVIA. This has now been organised and is dealt with by 2 District, but constant reference to Adv FORCE 133 is still necessary.

(b) Refugees.

Reception and consequent disposal. 2 District are dealing with this, but here again Adv FORCE 133 is involved.

(c) Training of PARTISANS.

Marshal TITO's representatives in ITALY are constantly finding new recruits of YUGOSLAV origin. They are handed over to Adv FORCE 133 who have to make arrangements to house, clothe, feed, arm and train them.

(d) Training of MT Drivers, and Tank Drivers.

Marshal TITO has sent out about 100 MT Drivers for training and 50 Tank drivers. Adv FORCE 133 has to try to get these men trained, and also has to clothe, feed and accommodate them.

(e) Air Force Trainees.

There are 220 trainees accommodated by Adv FORCE 133 at MONOPOLI awaiting disposal. RAF ME have the matter of their training in hand.

(a) Training of MT Drivers, and Tank Drivers.

Marshall TTO has sent out about 100 MT Drivers for Training and 50 tank drivers. ADV FORCE 133 has to try to get these men trained, and also has to clothe, feed and accommodate them.

(e) Air Force Trainees.

There are 220 trainees accommodated by ADV FORCE 133 at MONCOPOLI awaiting disposal. R.A.F. ME have the matter of their training in hand.

3. It will be seen that there are two problems involved - a general administrative problem and a training problem. As regards the administrative problem, it would seem that 2 District must inevitably get involved, as indicated in paras 2(a) and (b) above. It would seem logical, therefore, and more in conformity with normal procedure, if full responsibility for the administrative problem could be made entirely that of 2 District. Though this might lead to a slight increase in the staff of 2 District, it would enable ADV FORCE 133 to devote their full energies to their proper tasks - the despatch of spms and equipment to the BALKANS and the operational support of Marshall TTO. The matter is urgent as ADV FORCE 133 is overloaded and their work is suffering. Any measures you may be able to take to ease this situation will be much appreciated.

4. The training problem referred to above, is being dealt with in a separate letter.

G-1 and MGS Hospital treatment of partisan wounded must eventually devolve on the Br Medical Service as N.A.L. have neither the personnel nor the material to carry it out.

This problem is being studied at the moment and certain proposals are under active consideration. Whatever solution is found, however, the assistance of Force 133 will continue to be needed in directing casualties to the hospitals, collecting personnel discharged from hospitals, provision of interpreters, etc. It is also essential that the N.A.L. themselves make the utmost possible contribution in the matter of providing Medical Officers, nurses, orderlies, etc. Adequate numbers of UK personnel are not available to undertake the whole of this responsibility which is additional to all commitments for which provision has been made. It is agreed that the executive work will be carried out by No. 2 District utilising medical personnel allotted for that purpose. The policy will be decided by AFHQ. It is not possible to submit any further recommendations at present.

Para 2(b).

This problem concerns ACC and MGS rather than G-1(B). At present P/W Camp staffs and other military personnel are being employed for this purpose. It is very desirable to regularise the position. It is agreed that here again it will never be possible to dispense entirely with assistance from and collaboration with Adv Force 133.

Para 2(c), (d) and (e).

These are training problems which do not affect G-1(B). It is noted that they are being dealt with in a separate letter.

1. It is considered that the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission should be primarily responsible for the reception, administration, and disposal of Yugoslav Partisan refugees in Italy.
  2. At the request of G-2 (AFHQ) instructions have been issued that the camp at Bari, to which the majority of Partisan refugees are now directed on arrival in Italy, should be formed into a closed transit camp where refugees will be held pending screening and interrogation by the Security authorities, and whilst arrangements can be made for their disposal. Operation and control of this camp will be the responsibility of the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission who are to provide camp administrative personnel and, if possible guards, although it may be necessary to call upon other agencies to assist in the provision of guards if sufficient numbers of suitable personnel are not available from within the resources of the Sub-Commission.

3. As indicated in Article 2, however, the assistance of Force 133 will still be required in directing refugee both to the camp, and, after interrogation in certain cases, to locations where they may be used as recruits for the Partisan forces (vide para 2 (c) of basic letter). Refugees who are not selected either for recruits for the Partisan forces, or for evacuation to Mideast, will be moved from the closed transit camp by Displaced Persons Sub-Commission, who will also be responsible for their continued accommodation and administration in camps or communities elsewhere in Italy.

4. It will be appreciated that the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission has recently been re-organized and re-inforced, and that whilst it will undoubtedly be able to take a more active part and assume more responsibility in matters pertaining to refugees in the future, the limits of its activities have still to be worked out in conjunction with other interested authorities in the field. In order, therefore, that maximum assistance may be given to Force 133 a communication is being despatched to the Sub-Commission directing them to contact Force 133, and to make arrangements which will afford the latter all possible aid.

Reference is made to the attached copy of a memorandum, reference number B-389.506/80 of 16 February, from the Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff G-2, AFHQ.

1. The need for the establishment of a closed camp, which will permit the effective control and screening of refugees arriving in Southern Italy from the Balkans, is agreed. You should, therefore, take the necessary steps at once, in conjunction with other interested authorities, to establish such a camp. It is suggested that the camp lately administered by the PW Sub-Commission (Venables Camp) at Bari might prove the most suitable.

2. It should be understood that this will be a transit camp, and that, with the exception of guards and camp staff, there must be no permanent residents. This is a matter of importance to the Security authorities. Personnel whom you have taken over from the late PW Sub-Commission could be employed as guards, although it is appreciated that the number available may not be sufficient for this and other tasks to which you may consider it necessary that they be assigned. If it is found that you have insufficient personnel to provide guards the matter should be referred to this Headquarters.

3. G-2 Section at A.F.H.Q. have agreed to issue instructions for co-operation in the registration and screening of refugees to their subordinate Headquarters, with whom it will be necessary that you work out details. No advantage can be seen in the adoption of a standard registration form, but it will be necessary that a representative of the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission shall be present at the interrogation of refugees in order that whilst the details required by C.I.C. and F.S.P. are obtained, those required in the compilation of records by the Displaced Persons Records Bureau may also be noted. The work of registration which will be carried out in this camp will later be of assistance in the performance of the wider task of the registration of all Displaced Persons in Southern Italy, which yet remains to be undertaken.

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4. The political implications raised by the establishment of such a camp have been discussed with the Offices of the Resident Ministers at A.F.H.Q., who have indicated that there can be no valid objections put forward to the proposal. Similar procedure has long obtained in the United Kingdom for all refugees entering that country from the continent.

5. It should be established that Accredited Representatives of the Governments of the Allied Nations, attached to your Sub-Commission, do not have right of access to the camp, although they may be invited to enter either for purposes of inspection or to give assistance in the interrogation of refugees. This policy should also be understood to exclude from the camp, except on invitation, all persons not being British or American military personnel. It is known to be the wish of the Security authorities that members of the Yugoslav Partisan movement should be admitted to the camp for the purpose of assisting in the majority of cases for interrogation. In all cases where a member or members of this movement are invited to be present at, or to assist in the interrogation of refugees you should ensure that an Accredited representative of the Royal Yugoslav government is also invited to attend.

SUBJECT: Closed Displaced Persons Sub-Commission Camp at Bari  
(Venables Camp)

TO : Military Government Section, A.F.H.Q.

1. As you are aware, refugees, chiefly of Yugo-Slav nationality continue to arrive at Bari and elsewhere on the Adriatic Coast from Yugo-Slavia in large numbers. Although it has been arranged that Partisan refugees, who are not of military age will proceed to Middle East, it is quite clear under present arrangements that only those, who wish to do so will actually embark. Only a very small proportion of the total number arriving are either registered or screened, and no organisation in fact knows who is entering S. Italy at the present time.

2. Although it was thought originally that the security dangers from this large influx of refugees would not be great, it has now been determined that considerable numbers of those evacuated have only recently arrived from the mainland from points as far afield as Belgrade. In the circumstances the dangers to the security of the Allied Forces in Italy cannot be underestimated, and there is now strong reason to believe that the Germans will attempt to mingle agents with the refugees in due course if they have not already done so.

3. The view is strongly taken that there is only one way in which the problem can be dealt with satisfactorily, namely that refugees arriving in large bodies be placed in a closed camp, where registration and preliminary screening can take place. Those who require further interrogation may be sent to C.S.D.I.C., and the rest may be released to other camps under arrangements made by the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission.

4. It is understood that the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission will shortly take over the Prisoner of War Sub-Commission Camp (Venables Camp) at Bari together with a proportion of the staff. If you would agree to make this a closed camp, it would in our view meet the security problem. It is understood that it would also assist in meeting the problem of registration of all Aliens in S. Italy now facing the Allied Control Commission.

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Such registration would appreciably reduce the security dangers, and while the existence of a closed camp would ensure the registration of all refugees entering Italy, A.C.C. would no doubt be placed in a better position to register those already in the country.

5. The work of registration in the camp could be undertaken jointly by C.I.C. or F.S.P., representatives of the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission and selected Partisan Officers, who are already co-operating with our officers in screening a limited number of refugees in Bari. It is considered that a standard Registration form should be agreed for use, both by your representatives and ours. It would be undesirable to enlist the assistance of the representatives of the Royal Yugo-Slav Government, for obvious reasons, but no doubt they would be satisfied if your own officers looked after their interests and informed them of any Cetniks on release to your open camps. It would be equally undesirable to permit missions of other Allied Governments to operate in the camp.

6. If political objections are raised to a closed camp by the Partisans, it is suggested that they should be informed that the collection of refugees in a closed camp is purely for convenience in screening them, is a normal procedure on entering a foreign country and is essential for their own security and that of Allied Forces.

7. It is considered that the question is one of urgency, and it is felt that unless the problem is tackled now, the security of the Allied Forces in S. Italy may be seriously jeopardised. Your early comments and/or your concurrence in the above proposal would be appreciated.
