1. Reference is made to your letter No. 373 of 22 August 44.
2. It has now been ascertained that two Yugoslav subjects in question have been handed over to Yugoslav Officers and were taken to Bari on or about the 15 August 44.
3. These two Yugoslavs appear to have been held in connection with the murder of an Italian but no facts are available.
4. No investigation as to the alleged ill-treatment can be made without full details as to dates etc. as both F.S.S. and G.C.R.R. personnel have been moved. All documents concerning the case are in the hands of Yugoslav Officers.
5. You will no doubt wish to pursue the matter through your own channels at BARI, where the Yugoslavs are at present. Should you wish us to investigate the matter concerning the alleged ill-treatment please let us have further information when we shall take the matter up again with the Region concerned.

1. On 28 August you wrote Region IV sending them original letter from Royal Yugoslav Delegation concerning alleged illtreatment of two Yugoslav Officers.
2. Region IV reply that these two men were arrested for being concerned in a murder. They were handed over to Yugoslav Officers and taken to BARI on 15 August.
3. As F.S.S. and CC.RR. personnel have moved and all documents are with the Yugoslav Officers little more can be done by Region IV until fuller information as to dates etc is received.
4. It would appear that when the letter from Royal Yugoslav Delegation was written they were in ignorance of the fact that the two Officers were in Yugoslav hands at BARI.
5. I attach a draft letter which I propose sending to the Royal Yugoslav Commission. The letter can be passed through Political Section. *The Ex. Com. may wish to approve of the draft as it should go out under his signature*


The two men were arrested for being concerned in the murder of an Italian. After investigation, when it was found that they were members of the Royal Yugoslav Army, they were handed over to Yugoslav Officers and, it is believed, were taken to Bari on or about 15 August.

No investigation as to alleged ill-treatment can be made without full details as to dates, etc as both FSS and CCR personnel have moved and all documents are in the hands of the Yugoslav Officers mentioned above.

The Royal Yugoslav Delegation to the Advisory Council for Italy has the honour to inform the Allied Control Commission of the following case of two Yugoslav subjects detained in the prison of Perugia (Carcere giudiziario):

- 1) Milan DOBRIC, of Gračac, born November 11th 1919, student of economics, lieutenant of reserve of the Yugoslav army;
- 2) Dragoljub MARKOVIĆ, of Belgrade, born March 6th 1922, student at the commercial school, lance corporal of the Yugoslav army;


According to the statement of the aforesaid prison of Perugia they have both been accused of participation in homicide and are being detained on account of the act of arrest of the carabinieri station at Foligno, and are now at the disposal of the Italian Royal Procura of Perugia. According to information we gathered from the above named authority it results clearly that not only this accusation is entirely lacking of foundation, but that for territorial incompetence of the said Procura the whole case will be turned over to the Italian Royal Procura of Spoleto, which, on the other hand, has not yet notified the prison of Perugia to hand Dobric and Markovic over to her.

According to further information gathered on the spot the two abovenamed detained Yugoslav subjects have referred their whole case to our official on August 11th 1944, stating what follows:

are now at the disposal of the Italian Royal Procura of Perugia. According to information we gathered from the above named authority it results clearly that not only this accusation is entirely lacking of foundation, but that for territorial incompetence of the said Procura the whole case will be turned over to the Italian Royal Procura of Spoleto, which, on the other hand, has not yet notified the prison of Perugia to hand Dobric and Markovic over to her.

According to further information gathered on the spot the two abovenamed detained Yugoslav subjects have referred their whole case to our official on August 11th 1944, stating what follows :

Milan DOBRIC was in command of the batalion Velebit of the Yugoslav national army of liberation, and as such he was arrested on November 27th 1941 by the Italians in Dalmatia, ill treated (the marks thereof are still visible nowadays) and sent before the Italian Special Military Tribunal at Sibenik where the Italian Attorney-General asked for the death penalty for him, but finally he was sentenced to 15 years jail and deported to the prison of Spoleto where he was detained for 17 months. After the Italian Armistice, the prisoners, amongst whom there were 200 other Yugoslav political prisoners, managed in October 1943 to break out of jail and to escape into the woods, where Dobric then joined the armed band of Captain MELIS, famous for its revolts against the Axis forces, and was appointed commander of this group (about 100 men). Markovic had been a prisoner of war at the camps of Bergamo, Corte Maggiore, Oriano (Spoleto) and Bastardo. After the armistice he escaped and joined the Dobric group.

After the arrival in Spoleto of the British troops on June 15th 1944, the Dobric band had occupied three places (Montefalco, Giano and Castel Ribaldi) and Dobric, authorised by the Allied Governor, Lieutenant GUTMAN (?), was put in charge of the police service in the said three localities with 11 men. His duty was to oblige the Fascists of these places to present themselves every day at the police station. As the fascist and "squadrista" Guido ALESSANDRINI refused to obey this order, Dobric ordered the Yugoslav sergeants Dobrivoje ARANDJELOVIC and MARKOVIC and an Italian civilian to put him under arrest. But the said Alessandrini offered resistance and thus it came to shooting, and both Alessandrini and Arandjelovic were killed.

These are the exact facts. Any different interpretation is an intentional misrepresentation of the facts by ex fascists, and we beg the competent Allied authorities to bear this well in mind.


So it is that the wife of the killed Alessandrini accused - obviously as a vengeance - both Dobric and Markovic to having participated in the homicide of her husband and pretended that they had obtained from him by black-mail, two million lire.

When Dobric and Markovic came to report the case to the Allied Governor of the zone of Foligno, Captain NN, they both were arrested on July 6th 1944 by the F.S.S.

Both consider themselves victims of the lieutenant of the carabinieri of Foligno who is alleged to have been a fascist, and with whom they had previously quarrelled. Furthermore, in the F.S.S. a great number of Italian carabinieri and Italian detectives, who naturally are loathing the Yugoslavs, are serving. Dobric and Markovic ignore the name of the above-mentioned lieutenant, who, they say, was threatening and menacing them. According to the information he is the commander of the carabinieri.

Both consider themselves victims of the lieutenant of the carabinieri of Foligno who is alleged to have been a fascist, and with whom they had previously quarrelled. Furthermore, in the F.S.S. a great number of Italian carabinieri and Italian detectives, who naturally are loathing the Yugoslavs, are serving. Dobrić and Marković ignore the name of the above-mentioned lieutenant, who, they say, was threatening and menacing them. According to our information he is the commander of the carabinieri at Foligno, Lt. FRACASSINI. It would be advisable to examine the past of the said Italian officer.

Dobrić and Marković have been detained in the prison of Foligno for ten days, interrogated by British police and ill-treated by them, and then handed over to the Italian carabinieri who have refused to give them food, pretending that the prison at Foligno had been too badly damaged by Allied bombs.... Therefore, they had been sent over to the mandamental prison at Devagna for six days and, later, to the prison of the tribunal of Perugia where they still are awaiting the solution of their case.

It is with profound regret and pain that we are learning about the above mentioned ill-treatments of the aforesaid two Yugoslav subjects, who have not even yet been condemned by a court and who have been: 1./ beaten and 2./ forbidden to receive food. It would not surprise us if these measures had been taken by Italian organs, but we are very sorry indeed, if such statements are true, that this procedure should have been adopted by the Allied Authorities, i.e. the police and others. Unhappily according to further information we have been able to gather, no doubts are left about it, that our two Yugoslav subjects have been treated worse than enemies. We therefore hope that You and the competent authorities will share our standpoint in this matter and that You will kindly provide for the necessary steps in order that similar cases will not occur again and that the two Yugoslav subjects, Dobrić and Marković, who have so gallantly fought for the Allied cause, both in Dalmatia and in Italy against the common enemies, will be immediately set free and given satisfaction.

This also applies to the fact, that the two Yugoslavs were allowed to be handled by Italian police authorities, their enemies, whereas their case ought only to have been submitted to the Allied Authorities.



The Royal Yugoslav Delegation to the Advisory Council for Italy has the honour to inform the Allied Control Commission of the following case of two Yugoslav subjects detained in the prison of Perugia (Carcere giudiziario):

1) Milan DOBRIC, of Gracao, born November 11th 1919, student of economics, lieutenant of reserve of the Yugoslav army;

2) Dragoljub MARKOVIC, of Belgrade, born March 6th 1922, student at the commercial school, lance corporal of the Yugoslav army;

According to the statement of the aforesaid prison of Perugia they have both been accused of participation in homicide and are being detained on account of the act of arrest of the carabinieri station at Foligno, and are now at the disposal of the Italian Royal Procura of Perugia. According to information we gathered from the above named authority it results clearly that not only this accusation is entirely lacking of foundation, but that for territorial incompetence of the said Procura the whole case will be turned over to the Italian Royal Questura of Spoleto, which, on the other hand, has not yet notified the prison of Perugia to hand Dobric and Markovic over to her.

According to further information gathered on the spot the two above named detained Yugoslav subjects have referred their whole case to our official on August 17th 1944, stating what follows:

Milan DOBRIC was in command of the battalion Velibit of the Yugoslav national army of liberation, and as such he was arrested on November 27th 1941 by the Italians in Dalmatia, ill treated (the marks thereof are still visible nowadays) and sent before the Italian Special Military Tribunal at Sibenik where the Italian Attorney-General asked for the death penalty for him, but finally he was sentenced to 15 years jail and deported to the prison of Spoleto where he was detained for 17 months. After the Italian armistice, the prisoners, amongst whom there were 200 other Yugoslav political prisoners, managed in October 1943 to break out of jail and to escape into the woods, where Dobric then joined the armed band of Captain BELIC, famous for its revolts against the Axis forces, and was appointed

commander of this group (about 100 men). Markovic had been a prisoner of war at the camps of Bergamo, Corte Maggiore, Orsano (Spoleto) and Bastardo. After the armistice he escaped and joined the Dobric group.

After the arrival in Spoleto of the British troops on June 15th 1944, the Dobric band had occupied three places (Montefalco, Giano and Castel di Guido) and Dobric, authorized by the Allied Governor, Lieutenant GUTHRIE (?), was put in charge of the police service in the said three localities with 11 men. His duty was to oblige the fascists of these places to present themselves every day at the police station. As the fascist and "squadrists" Guido ALESSANDRINI refused to obey this order, Dobric ordered the Yugoslav sergeants Dobrivoje ARANDJELOVIC and MARKOVIC and an Italian civilian to put him under arrest. But the said Alessandrini offered resistance and thus it came to shooting, and both Alessandrini and Arandjelevic were killed.

These are the exact facts. Any different interpretation is an intentional misrepresentation of the facts by ex-fascists, and we beg the competent Allied authorities to bear this well in mind.

So it is that the wife of the killed Alessandrini accused - obviously as a vengeance - both Dobric and Markovic to have participated in the homicide of her husband and pretended that they had obtained from him, by black-mail, two million lire.

When Dobric and Markovic came to report the case to the Allied Governor of the zone of Foligno, Captain M., they both were arrested on July 6th 1944 by the F.S.S.

Both consider themselves victims of the Lieutenant of the carabinieri of Foligno who is alleged to have been a fascist, and with whom they had previously quarrelled. Furthermore, in the F.S.S. a great number of Italian carabinieri and Italian detectives, who naturally are loathing the Yugoslavs, are serving. Dobric and Markovic ignore the name of the abovesmentioned Lieutenant, who, they say, was threatening and menacing them. According to our information he is the commander of the carabinieri at Foligno, Lt. FRASCINI. It would be advisable to examine the past of the said Italian officer.

Dobric and Markovic have been detained in the prison of Foligno for ten days, interrogated by British police and ill treated by them, and then handed over to the Italian carabinieri who have refused to give them food, pretending that the prison at Foligno had been too badly damaged by Allied bombs... Therefore, they had been sent over to the cardamontal prison at Bevagna for six days and, later, to the prison of the tribunal of Perugia where they still are awaiting the solution of their case.

It is with profound regret and pain that we are learning about the above mentioned ill treatments of the aforesaid two Yugoslav subjects, who have not even yet been condemned by a court and who have been: 1. beaten and 2. forbidden to receive food. It would not surprise us if these measures had been taken by Italian organs, but we are very sorry indeed if such

statements are true, that this procedure should have been adopted by the Allied Authorities, i.e. the police and others. Unhappily according to further information we have been able to gather, no doubts are left about it, that our two Yugoslav subjects have been treated worse than enemies. We therefore hope that you and the competent authorities will share our standpoint in this matter and that you will kindly provide for the necessary steps in order that similar cases will not occur again and that the two Yugoslav subjects, Dobric and Markovic, who have so gallantly fought for the Allied cause, both in Dalmatia and in Italy against the common enemies, will be immediately set free and given satisfaction.

This also applies to the fact, that the two Yugoslavs were allowed to be handled by Italian police authorities, their enemies, whereas their case ought only to have been submitted to the Allied Authorities.

I have the honour to inform you that three Yugoslav nationals, by name ZANONICH (father and son) and OBRILASH, have recently arrived in SPERA bearing a pass from the Yugoslav Legation to the Holy See and stating that they are en route for FLORENCE where they intend to assist Yugoslav refugees in the FLORENCE area.

I should be grateful if you would bring to the notice of the Yugoslav Legation through the Holy See that it is forbidden to enter the Army areas without a special permit. Applications for these permits should be made through the Allied Control Commission and unless they are in possession of them, travellers will inevitably be held up as is the case with the three Yugoslavs in question.

For operational reasons it is impossible to allow these persons to enter FLORENCE for a considerable time and they will be returned to ROME as soon as transport is available.

I cannot emphasize too strongly the necessity for close adherence to military regulations with regard to control of travel and I should be most grateful if you would acquaint the Yugoslav Legation of this.

In reply to your letter of 28 March 1944 Ref., PS/35 on the four Yugo--Slavs held at the Avigliano Reformatory.

On the 8 April I went to Avigliano and collected the following information from the records of the four boys and also from talking to them personally.

Vjekoslav VUJICH is held in the reformatory on several counts of robbery. He was tried and convicted by an Italian Court in Spalato, Yugoslavia. He was put into the reformatory on the 30 August 1942 but the court has never forwarded his sentence to Avigliano. He is 18, and in talking to the boy he gave his reasons for stealing and robbing because of the shortage of food and clothing. He claims the robbing was done from his own people and not the Italians.

The other three; Bozo MAMULA 16, Jovan NIKSHICH 18, and Jobe ZIGMAN 18 are all held for political reasons. Bozo has been in the reformatory since 7 Oct. 1942, Jovan since 3 Sept. 1943 and Jose since 23 March 1942. One of the boys says he belw up a bridge, another spread propaganda against the Axis and the other for assisting in anti-Axis demonstrations.

Reference is made to the attached copy of a memorandum, under file 13630/5/AG1 (ALS), dated 24 March, from G.H.Q. MEF.

1. In this, and similar cases where the request for evacuation is initiated and approved by GHQ MEF the procedure specified in our MGS 383.7 of 11 January ( copy attached ) need not be followed.

2. If, as is anticipated, you see no objection to the movement of this family to Mideast it will be sufficient if the two adult members of the family are passed for evacuation by Forward Counter Intelligence, and that their movement orders should be signed by a British or American officer, be stamped with an official stamp, and should quote the number of the attached memorandum from GHQ MEF as authority to enter Egypt. ETA of the party should be notified to GHQ MEF in advance.

3. It is not necessary for this case to be referred to this Headquarters unless unforeseen developments should occur.

CONDITIONS AT YUGOSLAV EVACUEES CAMP AT SUZE - (MERRA)

I. The following is an account of conditions prevailing at the evacuees camp near Suez (MERRA) observed by a representative of our Labor section during a visit to the camp on Feb. 13, 1944.

The camp is under British jurisdiction and is still in an organizational stage, but the evacuees are left to conduct the camp's affairs themselves.

The supreme authority, responsible to the British Commander in Chief of Refugee Camps and to the British Commander of the Yugoslav Camp, is a Council (Vijece). The members of the Vijece were elected back home by the people of different places and they, as a matter of fact, have their duties extended in exile. All the various committees, from which the evacuees camp, are represented in the Vijece. The Vijece elected the officials who are managing the various departments at the camp.

The main departments are:

1. General Administration (records, filing etc.)
2. Food and tents.
3. Medical and sanitation.
4. Work.
5. Education.

TENTS AND FOOD. - The evacuees live under British Military tents, approximately 12 to 20 persons to a tent. Responsibility for order and hygiene conditions rests on a person designated by the Vijece. The equipment in the tents is extremely poor. There are no beds or other furniture even the most primitive; sheets and blankets are scarce. In contrast to the bare appearance of the quarters their cleanliness, neatness and order are conspicuous. The people themselves are very poorly dressed, but immaculately clean. No electric power was available in the camp.

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There are three kitchens with adjacent messrooms. They are managed by the Vijece. The work brigade supplies the manpower (cooks and other personnel). The distribution of meals is so organized as to accommodate all of 5000 people in an hours' time.

The food is rationed by the British, and judging by the lunch of that day, is insufficient. This is the menu: one bowl of soup with rice, one slice of bread, one two-square-inch piece of cheese, one orange, water. This quality and quantity of food, if other meals are similar to this one, are definitely inadequate for people who were for a long time undernourished to the point of starvation. For a certain period these people require nourishment according to the needs of their physical recuperation and improvement.

No complaints were heard except for a man who expressed the wish for a cup of tea instead of an orange. The surprising fact is, that the children and the youth are exceptionally healthy and good looking. On the other hand, the elderly people are weak and signs of strain are obvious. It looks as though the older people leaurived themselves for the children's sake. That is true for both men and women. The older people were evacuated by the Partisans because of their unfitness for fighting and other war jobs. It appears that the majority of older people is sick or otherwise affected. Nevertheless, the mortality rate is very low, only three cases since they left Yugoslavia: 84, 71 and 71 years of age respectively, which is, more or less, the natural limit of life under normal conditions.

MEDICAL AND SANITATION.

The weakened physical condition of the people is best revealed by the prolonged nature of an epidemic of gripe. Dr. Viskovic, who is the only doctor in the camp, explained that the length of sickness is regularly over the normal time, and in many cases exceeds twice the normal. Gripe complications are almost a regular occurrence; especially the ears are affected (otitis.) Another epidemic is the scabies, which the evacuees got during their sojourn in Italy.

The treatment of both of these epidemics, as well as other diseases - scarlet fever is handicapped by the lack of medicaments. The British supply the daily allotment on the basis of rations for the army camps where, of course, soldiers in good health are living. For instance, the supply of aspirins and sulfa-drugs, as Dr. Viskovic pointed out, is far below the most essential needs.

There are bathing facilities, but the soap is extremely scarce; a small piece per tent for 12 to 20 persons.

A work brigade, sub-divided in squads, was organized when the evacuees were still en route to Suez. It is primarily composed of the youth - they are called pioneers - but there is also a considerable number of older people.

Different branches are established such as: carpenters, house-builders, mechanics, printers, etc. The brigade is under the command of two engineers. That very day the brigade was busy in preparing everything necessary to accommodate an additional incoming 2000 evacuees. No one received any pay for his work since it is considered a special honor next to fighting.

The immediate tasks of the squads are: improvement of sanitary conditions, building of a church, schools, closed mess-rooms to replace the tents, improvement of path-roads and water system. The work they will perform depends on the supply of material. The British authorities are sympathetic toward this plan and are trying to supply as much material as is possible.

All works are planned in advance and, as a matter of fact, there is a general plan worked out by the Vijsse in connection with the most urgent necessities of the camp.

The brigade numbers about 400 men including the "pioneers". It has at its disposal a certain number of trucks and the British already had, supplied it with necessary tools.

EDUCATION:- The Vijece is making special efforts to establish an educational system, which will comprise: normal school, high school and college. In this field, the difficulties are enormous because of the lack of technical accessories such as books, paper, pencils, etc. For the present the Vijece asks for 20,000 sheets of mimeograph paper, a machine and stencils. The project is to print books themselves. Special attention will be paid to learning the English language, for which purposes special evening classes will be organized, which will enable a large number of people to attend.

Discipline in the camp is exemplary. They address each other with "ti" and "drug" (comrade) regardless of age. This custom is completely new among these people. In pre-war times even the son addressed his father with "vi", and the "ti" was used only in case of intimate relations (brothers, husband-wife, father and mother to the children, the aged to the youngsters, school-mates).

Commands are obeyed without any hesitation or inquiry. The attention of the youngsters when receiving orders from the officials is spontaneous and the expression on their faces is that of a man who is completely concentrated on a subject and duty to be performed. The discipline of the officials doesn't differ from others'. They refuse to speak or discuss certain questions (political, out-camp relations etc.), without the permission of the Government at home. Everybody has the right to criticize, which is regularly done at meetings, expose others' mistakes, make suggestions and defend his views.

When we wanted to obtain some information from the Vijece about the general conditions under enemy occupation, they refused to give us any and asked us to call upon the people. They wanted us to get the information from the people in the belief that any doubt about the impartiality of the Vijece had to be eliminated.

Although political talks and discussion with foreign people are avoided and refused by the evacuees, their political stand can be noticed by their attitude in meeting foreigners. Before giving us any information they wanted to know if any connection existed between us and the Yugoslav Government-in-Exile in Cairo. After our assurance

After our assurance that we, as Americans, were totally impartial and that our mission had no political aims whatsoever, they were very friendly towards us and gave us the information, which is the subject of this report. We asked an explanation of their refusal to speak to the people connected with the Yugoslav Government-in-Exile. The answer was very short: "The King and the Government instead of preventing the civil war inspired the government officials in the country to fight us when we were engaged in a war of death or life against the most cruel enemy in all our national history".

The evacuees are from the Croat province of Dalmatia. They do not call themselves Croats, but Yugoslavs. The secretary of the Vijece is a Serb. They refer to the Serbs as "the brothers from Serbia", and from all their talk it is obvious that the unity of all South Slavs has been achieved in the present liberation war as never before.
