Subject: Railway Disaster at Balvano.

To: Executive Commissioner, Allied Control Commission  
R.C. & M.G. Section, A.P.O. 394, U.S. Army

1. Acknowledgment is made of your favor of 27 March 1944, on the subject of railway disaster at Balvano which has been delayed in answering by my being absent from Headquarters.

2. As indicated in the official report and in special reports, there have been previous and subsequent instances of difficulties from gasses in the tunnels on this railroad which is one of the most heavily tunneled as well as one of the most steep graded pieces of railroad I have ever seen. As indicated in my forwarding letter with the Board's official report, this particular disaster was occasioned by a combination of natural factors. This railroad should long ago have been electrified by the Italian Government because of the presence of so many tunnels, but it is believed that the reason it was not electrified as other portions of the railroad was because not until military traffic started to move over it was there any great amount of train service regularly run.

3. In America and elsewhere difficulty has been experienced in using coal burning locomotives in mountainous territory where long tunnels are prevalent. There is no opportunity, justification or time to electrify this line. Every reasonable precaution such as the operation of Diesel locomotives to as large an extent as possible supplemented by oil burning American locomotives have been placed in service and it is believed that that precaution together with very close supervision does not continue a hazard there any greater than is the hazard of handling the vast amount of gasoline, ammunition and high explosives which are handled on every freight train and which pass and are passed by passenger trains constantly.

SUBJECT: Railway Disaster at BALVANO.

TO : Director-General, Allied Military Railway Services.

1. With regard to the recent disaster in the tunnel at BALVANO, it has been drawn to the attention of this H.Q. by the Regional Commissioner, Region II, that there have been other incidents, some of them fatal, of the same nature over the previous few months.
2. For instance, on March 6th a train stalled in a tunnel close to the Railway Station of CAMPOBAGGIONI, Potenza Province. The train was reversed and backed from the tunnel but the fireman and engineer of the locomotive collapsed from the effect of the fumes and the fireman later died.
3. On March 7th a troop train proceeding from SALERNO to POERENZA passed through these tunnels without stopping but at a low rate of speed. Three soldiers collapsed from the effects of the gas fumes but were revived.
4. It is also reported that there have been other cases of members of train crews having died during the past few months from the effect of fumes.
5. If these reports are correct it would appear that the BALVANO disaster was not an isolated incident. No doubt this matter is being considered by you from the point of view of danger to military passengers, and it would be much appreciated if an expression of your views on the likelihood of a recurrence of such an incident might be given.

### AN "ACT OF GOD"

UNITY JAGH March 27 1944

Natural causes rather than the negligence of man or machine failure caused the railway tunnel catastrophe in which 426 persons died at one a.m., on March 2, in southern Italy. It is officially announced in a report issued by the Director-General of Allied Force Military Railway Services.

Among the causes were the murky atmospheric conditions, lack of any wind velocity preventing complete natural ventilation of the tunnel, wet rails, etc., which ordinarily occur singly, but which in this instance occurred simultaneously, or in rapid succession.

The train stopped because of slippery rails and the engine crew were overcome by gas poisoning before they could move the train out of the tunnel, and

the unauthorized passengers were asphyxiated before they realized it.

"There is every justification for saying that this accident should be properly classified in legal phraseology as an act of God rather than negligence of man or machine failure," the report concludes.

To: Executive Commissioner, R.C. and M.G. Section,  
ACC Headquarters, Naples.

1. Supplementing my verbal report to you on 6 Mar concerning the railroad disaster at Balvano, Potenza Province, on the morning of March 3rd, I am pleased to report that with typical Italian inaccuracy, instead of 503 dead, it was found that only 436 bodies were buried. I am attaching a copy of the interim post mortem report by the civilian authorities. It will be noted that the final report will not be ready for two months.

2. I also wish to call attention to the fact that on Mar 6 another train stalled in a tunnel close to the railroad station of Campomaggiore, Potenza Province. The train was reversed and backed from the tunnel, but the fireman and engineer on one locomotive collapsed from the effect of the fumes and the fireman later died.

3. On March 7, a troop train proceeding from Salerno to Potenza passed through these tunnels without stopping, but at a low rate of speed. Three soldiers collapsed from the effect of the gas fumes, but were revived.

4. The Provincial Police Officer of Potenza states that he has been informed that 8 or 10 train crew members have died during the past few months from similar gas poisoning.

5. In view of the fact that the Balvano disaster was not an isolated incident, it is respectfully requested that serious consideration be given to the possibility of a trainload of troops being caught in one of these tunnels and serious casualties resulting from the combination of narrow, unventilated tunnels, inadequate motor-power and noxious fumes in the coal.

REPORT ON DESCRIPTION AND IDENTIFICATION OF CORPSE AND AUTOPSY 3

On the 5th of March of 1944, at 100hrs, at Balvano, in the local cemetery, we, "Cav. Uff." (titles) Dr. Oronzo Citti, "Procuratore del Re" at Potenza, attended by the Undersigned First Secretary;

Since, in the railway accident occurred on the night between the 2nd and the 3rd of this month, in a tunnel near the Balvano Station, in which a great number of people died for asphyxia, it was necessary to make an autopsy on some of the corpses (which lay on the ground of the local cemetery) in order to ascertain all the circumstances causing the death, namely the kind of gas, which caused said asphyxia.

1. Dr. Mazarone Rocco, son of Giuseppe, aged 31, Surgeon from Tricarico, living at Potenza;
  2. Dr. Marini Egidio, son of Luigi, aged 42, from Pola, living at Potenza, Professor of Chemistry, Director of the Hygiene and Prophylaxis Institute;
- the operations were executed for the said purpose.

Every part of the body can be easily moved, on account of the lack of rigor mortis..... spots, not very strong, on the lower regions and also in other. After this, the experts have started the following operations:

AUTOPSY

First of all, chest and stomach are opened.

Chest: the organs have normal shape, size and location. At the opening of the pericardio they find a small quantity of yellow liquid. The heart has normal weight, the shape is spherical (both the diameter across and the longitudinal one are roughly the same: auricle and specially right ventricle have greater size than normal), and it is flaccid - at the opening of the two holes, there is a small quantity of fluid blood of a shining red. This blood was kept in two test-tubes as a sample.

The valves are in good condition. Nothing is remarkable in the great vein, pulmonary artery and coronary arteries.

Lungs: fibrous adhesions of the right diaphragmatic pleura; external colour: pinkish; pressing the bronca, a pinkish liquid comes out together with a little air, and, cutting, they notice on the surface a dark colour, and, pressing, also from there a pinkish liquid comes out together with air. The pulmonary parenchyma has lost its elasticity. They take for test some fragments of pulmonary tissue. The respiratory mucose is in the first channels, pinkish.

Abdominal cavity: All the viscera have normal shape, size and location liver, spleen; kidneys and intestines are congested. Nothing else to notice. They take fragments of liver, spleen and kidneys for test. They don't think necessary to open the cranium.

CONCLUSION

As we said before, it can be stated that death has been caused by asphyxia, that said asphyxia has developed in an acute form, and therefore, has had the regular results of an acute asphyxia. Probably, between the asphyxia attack and death one hour has passed, although this is not sure.

At present we cannot say what kind of gas caused this asphyxia: therefore, we must wait for the results of laboratory tests, to be done on the blood and on the said fragments of organs.

The "Procuratore del Re", having agreed with the experts' request, give the term of two months to Dr. Marino, and one month to Dr. Mazarone, starting from today.
