1. With further reference to my RC/433 of 13 SEP 44, I have discussed these matters with the High Commissioner, who returned on 16 SEP from a visit to ROME.
2. The High Commissioner informed me that instructions authorising a special retention allowance of wheat for farm workers and a similar retention of barley, etc. for farm animals had been issued to Provinces in error. The High Commissioner agreed to send instructions to Prefects to suspend action in these two matters pending further advice from me.
3. As stated in my letter under reference, the payment of L.100 per quintal to farmers as a contribution towards transport cost of wheat is already enforced in SICILY.
4. I should be glad to be informed as early as possible whether I am to raise objections on grounds of general policy to the two outstanding matters, i.e.:-
 - a. special retention allowance for farm workers of 25 Kg. of wheat per hectare to be cultivated.
 - b. special retention allowance of oats, barley etc. for farm animals.

1. With further reference to my RC/433 of 7 SEP 44, I have explicit instructions from your Headquarters not to approve of or give any support to any proposal which affects general policy unless the necessary approval has been given by your Headquarters.

After my return from the recent Regional Commissioners' Conference and at my first conference with the High Commissioner for SICILY on 2 SEP, the High Commissioner raised with me three matters which, in my opinion, very much affect general policy.

As reported in my letter under reference, these matters were:-

- (a) Payment of L.100 per quintal to farmers as a contribution towards transport cost of wheat. This, in effect, raises the price to be paid for wheat from L.1000 to L.1100 per quintal.
- (b) A special retention allowance of 25 KG of wheat per hectare, for farm workers.
- (c) A special retention of barley, oats etc. for farm animals.

2. I informed the High Commissioner that so far as I was aware all these proposals were contrary to existing policy, though I had myself raised those referred to under (b) and (c) above with Headquarters A.C.C., and that I could not approve of any action being taken in these matters.

As I understood at the time, however, that the High Commissioner had issued instructions to Prefects regarding the L. 100 payment for transportation charges, I informed him that the matter could stand and that I would report it immediately to Headquarters A.C.C.

The information regarding the payment for transport charges appeared in the press the following day, but no mention was made of the other two proposals except to state in general terms that other proposals were under consideration but that they had not been approved by the Allied authorities.

3. Today I received a copy of the enclosed document from the High Commissioner's office. It will be observed that all the Prefects and authorities concerned have been informed that they can put the proposals referred to above into effect. It should be noted that they are given as having been approved by the Council of Ministers.

TO : His Excellency the Minister of Agriculture

1. Quoted below is telegram just received from Southern Region, regarding above mentioned subject.

"DIRECTIVE FROM MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE WILL PRESENT ESSENTIAL NEXT STEP IN AMASSING NAMELY LEGAL PROSECUTIONS AND HEAVY SENTENCES WHICH MAY HAVE SERIOUS EFFECT NOT ONLY ON WHEAT BUT ALSO ON FORTHCOMING OLIVE OIL AMASSING. STRONGLY RECOMMEND IMMEDIATE CANCELLATION MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE'S TELEGRAM 179177 DATED 30 AUGUST."

2. The Agricultural Officer in Region I, Sicily, informed this Sub-Commission this morning that the Sicilian Chief High Commissioner published in today's paper, on authority granted him in Conference with you and other High Italian Officials in Rome recently, the following:-

- a) Authority to grant a transportation subsidy to farmers of 100 lire per quintal of wheat.
- b) Authority for farmers to retain 25 kilos of wheat per casual worker.
- c) Authority for farmers to retain an unknown amount of barley for edible purposes, in addition to legal wheat retentions.

3. Since neither this Sub-Commission, nor the Executive Officer or Vice President of the Economic Section had in advance notice of the above referred to action by the Ministry, we are unable to transmit to Allied Officers in the field, any reasonable justification for action taken. The above referred to action, if taken on approval of the Italian Government, places A.C.C. in an embarrassing position, because such action is directly contrary to agreed upon procedures. Furthermore, it is more than probable, in our opinion, that such action will make it necessary to revise plans for importation of food from Allied countries.

4. It is hereby requested that detailed explanation be prepared and submitted to A.C.C. at the earliest possible date.

1. By the time I had returned to Region I Headquarters after the recent conferences at your Headquarters, the High Commissioner for SICILY was away in ROME where, I understand, he attended a meeting of the Council of Ministers. The High Commissioner returned to SICILY on 1st September and I had a long conference with him on 2nd September on matters relating mainly to the Granai del Popolo.

2. The High Commissioner stated that the following matters had been agreed with or had been proposed by his Government with a view to speeding up the collection of grain in SICILY and ensuring, as far as possible, the success of the Granai del Popolo:-

(a) Definite steps were to be taken to get all denunzie produtione completed and checked by Sept 15. In cases where local committees were not functioning properly they were to be ignored. If UPSEA officials were not capable of carrying out their duties they were to be replaced. In the meantime, amassing was to continue at maximum.

I agreed in principle with the steps proposed. I had discussed the matter the previous day with my agricultural officer and had formed the opinion that action on these lines was necessary. *me 78*

(b) The High Commissioner stated that his Government had given verbal authority for a payment of lire 100 per quintal to be made to farmers as a contribution towards transport cost of wheat between the threshing floor and the warehouse in all cases.

I stated that this was a matter of high policy, that any such decision might have far-reaching repercussions and that I had received no instructions from higher authority in the matter. The High Commissioner explained that SICILY had problems peculiar to itself in this matter, but it seemed to

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The High Commissioner had already given instructions in the matter to the Prefects and other Italian authorities concerned for the scheme to be put into effect. As this decision runs contrary to the amassing decrees and is one of general policy, you will probably wish to take this matter up with the Italian Government and it will be appreciated if this Headquarters could be given further information as to the position. Your Headquarters (Agricultural Sub-Commission) were notified as early as possible by telephone of the situation.

(c) The High Commissioner stated that it was proposed to approve a special retention allowance of 25 Kg. of wheat per hectare (which was to be put under cultivation) for "lavoratori braccianti". I informed the High Commissioner that as this affected the existing authorized ration scales, I could *sup*

not give any support to this proposal.

I raised this matter when I was Regional Commissioner of Region 6, when I suggested that this category of workers might be deserving of a ration scale above that of the normal consumer. I also understood, when at your Headquarters recently, that this matter was under consideration and I should be glad to be informed as early as possible how this matter stands.

(d) The High Commissioner stated that he had received verbal authority from his Government for arrangements to be made for farmers to retain a certain amount of barley etc. as forage for farm animals.

I informed the High Commissioner that I could not agree to any action being taken in this matter as I had received no instruction from higher authority in regard to it. I raised this question with the Food Sub-Commission during my recent visit to your Headquarters and I should be glad to know whether any decision has yet been taken.

3. The High Commissioner seemed to be in a pessimistic mood about the success of the Granai del Popolo campaign. I indicated to him that there were at times disadvantages in making concessions and giving way to popular clamour. I impressed upon him the necessity of making full use of the resources at his disposal and of setting the existing administration to function as efficiently as possible.

SUBJECT: Police Duties and Powers in the Grain Campaign.

TO : All Officers, Region I.

The following is a summary of the duties and powers of the Italian Police Forces in connection with the Grain Campaign.

1. POLICE FORCES include:

- (a) CARABINIERI REALI - Controlled through the following chain of Command:
 - (i) VI BRIGADE : Commander - General A. BRANCA at PALERMO
 - (ii) PALERMO Legion - Commander - Col. CALABRO' MESSINA Legion - Commander - Col. ANDREOLI
 - (iii) GROUPS - In each Province, commanded generally by a Major with H.Q. at Carabinieri barracks in the Provincial Capital.
 - (iv) Each Commune has a local CC, RR, Command. According to its importance the commune may have a Captain or Lieutenant and up to 100 Carabinieri, or only 4 to 16 or 20 or 30 under a Brigadiere or Maresciallo.

(b) GUARDIE DI FINANZA - Under two Commands:

- (i) PALERMO Legion - Commander Col. BIONDI
- (ii) MESSINA Legion - Commander f. Col. MAGLIO (Temp) CC, FF. are installed in all so-called "industrially" flour-mills with the duty of checking in-coming grain and out-going flour.

(c) AGENTS of PUBLIC SAFETY - In each province are under the control of the Carabinieri. The latter are subject

- (c) AGENTS of PUBLIC SAFETY - In each province are under the control of the Questore at the Questura. The Questori are subject to direction of High Commissioner thru the Regional Director of Public Safety - Dott. MODICA.
- (d) RAILROAD POLICE - These are posted at the principal railway stations and are under direction of Dott. CASTELLANI at PALERMO.

2. ITALIAN ARMY in SICILY. - Detachments of the Italian military forces are being placed at the disposal of the CC.RR. in certain communes, to strengthen their numbers and for use in grain duties of checking and searching, and in road-blocks.
3. MAIN AGENCY. - The CC.RR. will be the principal police agency concerned with the collection of grain, and on which the other forces, as above, will mainly depend.
4. POLICE CONTROL. - The Police Forces are at the disposition of each Prefect, but must not be employed in a manner which conflicts with the orders of their respective higher commands.
5. POLICE POWERS:
 - (a) In addition to normal powers under Italian law and the Ministerial decrees, special powers have been conferred in connection with the grain programme.
 - (b) The police have been instructed to give special attention to the supervision of farms, warehouses, granaries and mills and to employ every possible measure to restrict and prevent the illegal transport of grain. The supervision of bakeries and the possession of unauthorised ration cards are also matters which are receiving police attention.
 - (c) The police have authority to inspect and investigate all administrative measures which are being employed in the grain collection plan and to report any irregularities or deficiencies to the proper authorities.
 - (d) The CC.RR. have authority to requisition transport

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- (c) The police have authority to inspect and investigate all administrative measures which are being employed in the grain collection plan and to report any irregularities or deficiencies to the proper authorities.
- (d) The CC.RR. have authority to requisition transport of any kind that they require for the performance of their duties in connection with grain collection.
- (e) The local CC.RR. commander is a member of the communal and provincial committee and is responsible for reporting any procrastination or inefficiency on their part.
- (f) The police have been ordered to report any circumstances in which officials or organizations fail to perform their duties or in any way impede the programme.

(c) Such reports respecting officials and organizations will be made locally to the Prefect as well as direct to the High Commissioner through the chain of command of the reporting service.

All A.C.C. Officers functioning in the field, will report irregularities which come to their notice locally to communal and provincial authorities, and in addition forward copies of all such reports to the Regional Commissioner with any recommendations for his information and action.

1. The Allied Authorities, the High Commissioner and Prefects are complaining, on good grounds, against the insufficient action on the part of the CC.PP. in connection with the delivery of grain to the public storehouses.
2. I have personally questioned patrolling Carabinieri and have noticed that although they were ordered on a vigilance service of the transportation of grain, they ignored the conditions governing such transportation, and the action to be taken by the Carabinieri in the country and villages concerning grain with-held from the Amasso.
3. I have personally noticed that the action of the Commanders of the Stations is not energetic, and is affected by the hostility that local authorities and agriculturals feel for the delivery of their grain.
4. Since Italy has been supplied with grain until 4th July, and that after that date the Island shall supply its own people with its own grain, it is obvious that should not the grain be taken into the Amasso it will not be possible to feed the population, therefore serious disorders and disturbances of public order would be unavoidable in which Carabinieri will be involved with serious consequences.
5. THEREFORE, ACCORDING TO WHAT I HAVE ALREADY ORDERED, OFFICERS, NCOs AND CARABINIERI SHALL CONSIDER THEMSELVES MOBILIZED UNTIL FURTHER ORDER FOR THE EXECUTION OF PERTINENT SERVICES, WHICH SHALL HAVE PRIORITY OVER ALL THE OTHER SERVICES AND SHALL BE EXECUTED EVEN BY THE OFFICERS WITHOUT ALLOWING THEMSELVES BUT THE SHORTEST REST.
6. Municipal Commissions shall function, agriculturals shall be induced to deliver their grain, injunctions to be followed by searches and arrests; threshing floors to be watched.
7. Employ informers, send them into the countries in order to discover hiding places chosen by the farmers for their

6. Municipal Commissions shall function, agriculturclists shall be induced to deliver their grain, injunctions to be followed by searches and arrests; threshing floors to be watched.

7. Employ informers, send them into the countries in order to discover hiding places chosen by the farmers for their products.

8. Patrolling service, concealments, places of mobile road blocks (not fixed because farmers knowing that one street has been blocked chose another, and if necessary cross fields or hide their products for transportation at better opportunity) shall be executed by continuance, and I repeat, without granting rest to themselves, because the matter has an essential importance, and should the matter of the amassos fail, we shall, within a short time drift into serious difficulties.

9. The Commander of the Caltanissetta Group shall transfer himself to the coast zone, where the harvest has already taken place, and he shall direct the services. The Commanders of the Groups of Agrigento and Catania shall do the same.

10. The Commander of other Groups shall bear in mind also that they are held personally responsible for the Good functioning of the services, that they personally shall preside and direct without limiting themselves to fleeting and occasional inspections.
11. All the Commanders of Groups are authorized to execute temporary movements of personnel from the zones where the harvest has not yet been started to those where it is taking place, so that it will be possible to concentrate the best effort in the harvest zones.
12. When there is suspicion of stealing, arrests shall be made, and the production confiscated from the same threshing floor.
13. The Commanders of the Groups are authorized to request the cooperation of Army Units (who, through the Command of the 12th Army Corps, shall be dispersed in all the chief places of the Province), of the R. Finance Guards, and of all other police forces, including the groups attached to Regional P.S. sectors.
14. Specially, the Commanders of the Groups of Catania, Agrigento and Caltanissetta (in the territory where a general evasion has already been noticed, assisted by the absence of CC.RR. and by the tacit complicity of local authorities), shall move themselves into action, taking the initiative and placing themselves in a position so as to be able to face any situation, and to modify it according to the interests of the masses.
15. It must be borne in mind that the Provinces of Messina and Palermo shall supply themselves in the next few days, the former from the Province of Catania, and the latter from the Provinces of Agrigento, Enna and Caltanissetta.
16. Point out to me at once those Mayors and local authorities who are not giving to the Carabinieri all their impulsive cooperation required in the matter, point out to me eventual inconveniences, propose transfers of Officers, NCOs, and Carabinieri who are not active and zealous: make proposals for the happy attainment of our purposes, but first of all act taking the initiative to provide for the grain to pour into the stores for the supply needed for feeding of the population.

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17. The Commanders of the Legions shall readily assent to the requests for reinforcement of and the removal of personnel.

18. I deem now that all my dependents and the Commanders of Groups, particularly, must have understood the very serious responsibility incumbent upon them, and that I am steadily decided to adopt any measure should not the grain gathered in from the lands of the Island go towards the purpose marked by the Allied Authorities and the National Government.

19. Orders and Directions will be issued on the matter with a special ordinance.

At a recent meeting held at Palermo, being present Colonel Hancock, Regional Control Commissioner, Col. Young and other Allied Officers, also the High Commissioner and other personalities concerned in the coordination of duties respecting "Granai del Popolo", it was decided to give to the Commanders of the CC.RR. Stations the following charges :-

1. Checking transportation authorizations issued by U.P.S.E.A. Offices for the transport of grain. Eventual abuses, apart from being communicated in the usual returns, must be reported direct by the Stations to this Brigade which in turn will inform the competent authorities for what action deemed necessary against the Directors of such Offices. Information has been received that there are in circulation authorizations in which the indication of time to transport the grain is made in pencil and not in ink and the quantities of grain to be transported is marked incorrectly. Orders must be given to CC.RR. personnel to immediately seize such quantities in cases where the above irregularities have been ascertained. Moreover in order to avoid one authorization being used for other transportations the CC.RR. must sign, putting date and hour in full in ink or copying pencil on the bills already checked, in such a way that these cannot be used again.

Checking the regularity of the distribution of ration cards because information shows that ration cards are being used which were issued to people now dead or removed, etc. The Commanders of CC.RR. Stations are authorized to go to the Vital Statistics Office in the Comune or to the Ration Card Office to obtain all necessary information to control the issue.
3. Checking the functioning of the Communal Committees :
The Commanders of CC.RR. Stations have the power -
(a) To order the local responsible authorities to constitute Communal Committees wherever this has not been done.

(b) To order meetings of such communal committees if they are not held often enough to deal with the number of declarations already forwarded to the competent offices. Consequently the Commanders are authorized:

(c) To examine all declarations forwarded by the producers and take notice of those decisions arrived at by the Communal Committees which they think irregular concerning:

- (i) Issuing of Milling Cards,
- (ii) Grain detained for the use of families or managements,
- (iii) Quantities of cereals to be amassed by every producer.

The Station Commanders must inform the Commanders of Group or this Brigade:

- (a) Direct by telegram - if Communal Committees have not been appointed or if meetings are not being held,
- (b) by letter - all irregularities as above stated.

4. Officers must continuously check the action taken by the dependent MCOs, and to this end until further order, at least twice monthly they must visit the Communes of their jurisdiction to ascertain whether the Station Commanders are fully aware of their duties, noting unfavorable results in the collection of grain forwarding this information together with their recommendations.

5. The Commanders of Groups, who in their turn are responsible for the happy results of the drive in the respective provinces, must be in a position to know:

- (a) The activity of each officer and Station Commander,
- (b) The results progressively attained, in such a way as to eliminate those who are proved unfit and report both to Prefects and to this Brigade all deficiencies which must be readily obviated.

In conclusion the CC.R. Officers and Station Commanders have been entrusted with the protection of the interests of the Nation and of the Italian people in connection

(iii) Quantities of cereals to be assessed by every producer.
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In conclusion the CC.R. Officers and Station Commanders have been entrusted with the protection of the interests of the Nation and of the Italian people in connection with the collection of grain.

I am fully confident in the action of directing, coordinating and controlling taken by the Commanders of Groups.

1. Contact in Communes
 - a. At the Municipio: Mayor and Communal Secretary (Mayor is honorary, C.S. is a Civil Servant)
 - b. At CC.PP. Station: Station Commander Carabinieri who is a Member of the Communal Agricultural Committee.
 - c. UPSEA officer may have separate office or be accommodated at the Municipio.
 - d. Consorzio Agrario representative in charge of granary.
2. UPSEA officer should be requested to
 - a. Give details of number of farms under his jurisdiction and of the estimated total crop of wheat and barley.
 - b. Check number of declarations made to date and initiate action through CC.PP. against farmers who have failed to comply with the regulations.
Final notice to be served that legal action will be taken if declaration not completed within 3 days.
Ascertain from UPSEA officer whether all necessary forms are now available for dealing with deliveries of wheat and barley to Consorzio Agrario warehouses.

3. Ascertain from Mayor
 - a. How often Communal Agriculture Committee has met to date and how many declarations have been dealt with. When nothing has been done see that a meeting is called making CC.PP. responsible that all members attend.
Insist that meetings continue to be convened at least by-weekly during harvesting and that all declarations are checked so that total quota of wheat and barley to be turned into the granaries can be definitely assessed.
 - b. It will be necessary to check declarations against previous issues to existing declarations.

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3. Ascertain from Mayor
 - a. How often Communal Agriculture Committee has met to date and how many declarations have been dealt with. When nothing has been done see that a meeting is called making CC.RR. responsible that all members attend.
Insist that meetings continue to be convened at least by-weekly during harvesting and that all declarations are checked so that total quota of wheat and barley to be turned into the granaries can be definitely assessed.
 - b. It will be necessary to check declarations against previous year's figures and for committees to examine deficiencies.
 - c. Committees will have to name dates between which farmers will turn in their quotas.
4. Drouses may be made that declarations have been forwarded to the Provincial Agricultural Committees direct. Even if this is the case, which is open to doubt, it does not exempt the farmer from making a declaration to the Communal Agricultural Committee.
5. Local UPSEA officials are failing in their duty if their records are not complete. They should submit progress reports to their Provincial Offices at frequent intervals with copies to Provincial Agriculture Inspector.

6. transport check

a. Find out what facilities CG.RR. have of operating road blocks and checking transport of wheat and barley.

b. Submit recommendations when found to be insufficient.

7. Local committees must shoulder their responsibilities and be prepared to request force and the application of the law in all instances of apparent evasion.

A.C.C. officers will initiate any action they consider necessary to achieve this end.

8. The wheat target for Sicily is 3,500,000 quintals to feed the population for a year at the rate of 300 grs per head per day (200 grs bread daily, plus 550 grs. pasta weekly). This commitment requires almost 900 tons (9,000 quintals) of wheat daily. During the harvesting season, which normally ends about 15 Sept, deliveries to the warehouses should total at least 4,000 tons (40,000 quintals) daily.

Find out what should be total quota due in each commune you visit. This is the target figure.

9. Look out for the middleman speculator and bring him to justice without CG. sanction.

10. Ration Cards

a. It is estimated that in round figures, 3,000,000 non-producer ration cards are issued in Sicily. The issuing authority in each province is the Sezione Provinciale dell'Alimentazione ("SEPRAL") of which the Prefect is the Chairman.

b. Although instructions have been issued by the High Commissioner to Prefects to check the ration card holders in the communes, it is not certain that such a check has in fact been effectivly and officiently carried out.

c. Officers will therefore inspect communal ration card offices and obtain from the Mayor a written declaration of the official number of ration card holders. Each commune has an Ufficio Anagrafe or Registry office which, if up to date, should have an exact figure of local residents. This figure should balance with the number of ration card holders as registered by the communal ration card office plus producer milling cards outstanding.

1. The Officials.

(a) Sicilian officials are in many cases energetically doing their best to secure the maximum grain collection. The majority however are not sufficiently interested or aware of their responsibilities. They seem reluctant to display firmness towards Sicilians and appear to regard popularity of greater importance than duty.

(b) The communal agricultural Committees have generally been most disappointing in the work done and in their appreciation of the importance of their function. Procrastination and indecision are both common.

2. The ration.

Much misunderstanding still exists not only in the minds of the public but also in the minds of the officials regarding the stability of the bread and/or pasta ration.

Early in July the ration was temporarily raised to 300 grs. only to be reduced to 200 after a few days. Catania province has been promised a pasta supplement but this has not yet been issued. The local situation in Sicily does not at present justify a supplementary pasta ration although in other regions this is being given. I am of the opinion that if it be possible, a great advantage would be obtained in assuring the public of a minimum ration for a season in advance and making such standard throughout the whole of liberated Italy.

3. The Grain.

To feed Sicily for a year upon the 300 grs. ration, approximately 3,100,000 quintali are needed. Those who are qualified to judge are of the opinion that an amount of grain approximate to this has been grown in the island this year. Up to the 27th July only 196,275 quintali or 6.3% has been collected. Of this total more than half had been received in the preceding eight days. There is no doubt that the curve of the rate of collection is rising steadily but not until the end of July did it exceed that of consumption.

I believe that many Sicilians still are of the opinion that the Allied grain shipments are inexhaustible and will continue indefinitely.

There is a good deal to justify criticism of the price level of 1000 lire per quintal but in my view a higher price would have only ameliorated and not by itself have solved the difficulty of grain collection.

Many farmers still hope for a better price and are holding back either for this or for the opportunity to sell a substantial proportion on the black market. I have been assured that all producers feel morally entitled to sell grain on the black market provided they surrender the substantial part of their crop in the proper way.

It is yet too early to predict results, but by the end of this month I believe it will be much easier to forecast the eventual position.

4. Law enforcement.

To collect the grain entirely by force of law is, of course not possible, the proportion of force to be applied is therefore a matter of great importance. The policy prevailing is one of regarding the situation of having two phases. The first is which the producers must be persuaded by all means possible to surrender their crops and the second to enforce the law against offenders but this to be applied only after persuasion has failed.

At the present time the law enforcement agencies are concentrated upon two principles. One, to scrutinize the workings of the administrative machinery, i. e., the Agricultural Committee, the ASMA and to report any shortcomings to authorities who can see that the job is properly done and the other to prevent grain being transported or transferred to unlawful destinations.

At all times special attention will be paid to the middle-man speculator who will be brought to justice as speedily as possible.

I am more than satisfied with these arrangements and in particular cannot praise the work of the Carabinieri too highly. They are being assisted in their work by detachments of Italian military forces placed at their disposal by the Italian Military commander who has proved extremely co-operative and helpful.

Transport is still a cogent difficulty of law enforcement units but recently the situation has been slightly improved by giving the Carabinieri authority to requisition motor transport.

Courts are dealing with offenders expeditiously and firmly but at present the majority of culprits have not been charged with particularly serious breaches of the law.

5. General.

I am entirely satisfied with the measures which have already been taken and that the officials have been properly impressed with the priority and importance of their task.

During the month of June however, three events have taken place, all of which have tended to embarrass the success of grain collection.

(a) The ration having been increased to 300 grs. was reduced to 200 after only a few days, creating an impression of uncertainty and instability.

(b) The newspaper in Catania announced that the Italian Police forces were being re-organized and that after the end of August those now serving may not be required for further service. This was related as an official statement from this Minister of the Interior and therefore did much to prejudice the morale of law enforcement agencies.

(c) The replacement of the High Commissioner, Mussotto, which by some is interpreted as dissatisfaction with his handling of the grain situation and by others as a mistake of "changing horses in midstream".

In general, I observed no causes for anxiety either with regard to public order or to unified resistance to grain collection. Such faults as were apparent were in my view indicative of the low standard of Sicilian administration only, and not of any particular desire to sabotage the grain collection scheme. The efficiency of Sicily local government and of Sicilian officials is a limited factor. The sense of public spirit and of disinterestedness is not high. Until these fundamental components are themselves improved, I do not believe there is much more that can be done. The means are limited but undoubtedly they are fully employed.

Dear Brigadier Latta,

I am now able to give you a general impression of what I have found in Sicily regarding the law enforcement aspect of the collection of grain.

In the first place, all are agreed that our price of 1000 lire per quintal is low. The suggestions for an adequate level vary between 1350 and 2000 lire. Nevertheless the senior Sicilian officials who are responsible for the collection of grain are displaying a good sense of duty about their work and are generally trying hard to accomplish their task.

In particular the Carabinieri have been splendid. They are commanded by General Brance, who is first class, and are devoting most of their energies to getting in the grain. At the present time they have worked hard upon a very large number of cases, most of which have in themselves been somewhat insignificant, but nevertheless in total, the effect has been quite considerable.

The minor officials who are responsible for general administration, seem to me to be, with a few exceptions, rather weak and perhaps not unnaturally oversympathetic with the producers. There is a lack of control in the communes by the committees and by the UPSEA officials upon whom so much depends. It is most difficult to impress upon these people the urgency of their work and the necessity for efficiency and fairness. In almost every instance, this communal work has been disappointing.

Referring to the Sicilian Officials in general, I think it is fair comment to say that they are viewing the progressively decreasing Allied representation in this island as an indication that soon perhaps it will be gone altogether and that then, as they realize, they will be dependent for their position and authority upon Sicilian people and upon Sicilian politics. It is probably for this reason that they are at present reluctant to display any firmness that they consider would be likely to impair their future popularity.

On paper and in principle, they appear to be doing their job but I am by no means satisfied that they are all really putting their backs into it as they could. This aspect is being dealt with.

The Public Safety measures which have already been taken are wholly satisfactory and I believe we have at our disposal all the authority necessary. Transport is still one of the greatest problems but it has now been arranged for the Carabinieri to be given the power of requisition which the Prefects have been so reluctant to exercise.

The policy of law enforcement which is being followed should ensure an attitude of firm persuasion for approximately another month after which time, when the work of the committees has been completed, it will be possible to employ much stronger and more energetic measures against those who do not comply with the law. We are purposely avoiding filling the courts with hundreds of trivial offenders which would merely encourage resentment besides increasing our difficulties, including those of prison accommodation, without really producing the grain. We are instead, concentrating upon the more serious offender first, both at the present time and again later if such stronger measures prove necessary.

I have already visited several Provinces in the south of the island and find that the picture varies from place to place according to local conditions as well as to the views and personality of either the Allied or Sicilian official. The harvest is going well, but it is much too early to forecast what results we are going to achieve. Opinions of Allied officers differ on this point but my own is that there is at present no reason for despondency and that if we pursue the whole programme as vigorously as we can, the chances are that we shall have a satisfactory result. First class work is being done by Lt. Col. Walker who is putting on the pressure just where it is needed by his trips to the grain producing communes.

Even if things go badly at first, there are still several additional measures which could be considered, such as for instance, total requisitioning of all grain from the producers and the issue to them of ration cards in lieu of grain retention. This, from the law enforcement aspect, would considerably simplify collection, since the possession of any grain would constitute an offence and no argument as to the amount which could be properly retained would be necessary.

52

This would also relieve the Communal Committees of most of their responsibility, since no quotas would have to be fixed by them since All grain would have to be surrendered.

I realise however that this is rather late in the day to talk of new schemes and that we must do all we can to make the existing one succeed.

Co-operation is good all round. I have seen the heads of all the services concerned and am more than satisfied with their goodwill. I have made suggestions which I believe should count for greater uniformity between one district and another and serve also to fix the responsibility for the efficiency of Sicilian law enforcement upon individuals rather than upon a number of unrelated persons.

As you know, there are but four Public Safety officers in this Region at present and I do hope that it will be possible to leave them all here until the harvest is over. I mention this particularly because at least one, Capt. Noble has already been alerted for a move. These officers have the local knowledge which is so essential and they are doing the sort of job which one has come to expect from the Public Safety officers in Sicily.

Following a conference with Provincial Commissioners tomorrow, I intend to proceed to the northern provinces to see what the situation is in that part of the Region, after which I propose, with Col. Hancock's agreement, to return to Rome. I feel that in about a week's time there will be little left for me to do here which could not just as well be done by the Regional Public Safety Officer, but nevertheless I will remain here as long as I consider my presence is required.

In conclusion, I believe that taking all things into consideration, events are moving reasonably well but that it will be some weeks before we shall be able to get a real indication of the final result. At any rate you can be sure that the efforts being made here will at least deserve success whether or not they will command it.

You will be disappointed to receive news of the appointment of Aldisio as High Commissioner and the Acting Chief Commissioner wants me to tell you that your telegram of 18th July and your letter of 12th July did receive consideration at this Headquarters. Captain Stone was in the process of recommending to the Italian Government that an alternative for Musotto other than Aldisio should be found, but it developed that the alternative candidate would not accept the appointment and plans had proceeded too far with the six parties with regard to Aldisio to make a change.

I know that the appointment of A or B or C as High Commissioner will make no difference to you as a good civil servant in your efforts to get the administration of the Island on a decent basis. We shall always be faced with political considerations on the part of a political Government and others and it will not always be possible to guide the Government into what we consider correct channels.

Your letter regarding plans for the enforcement of the collection scheme is very satisfactory and I hope that the great efforts that you and your staff are making will give the Italian authorities into action and produce successful results.

Let me know how things are going and if we can help you in any way from here either by action with the Italian Government or in any other way.

My dear Brigadier,

1. Immediately on my return to Palermo I convened a meeting of the officers most closely concerned to inform them of the decisions taken at Naples regarding the enforcement of grain collection and the action to be taken.

2. Lt Col Walker and Major Clarke arrived last Saturday and Col Young yesterday. Plans are being formulated rapidly and the first phase of the drive will start at once.

3. The south coast lowlands from the Gela plain westwards thru Agrigento Province to Trapani Province, where the harvest is now finished will be tackled first, followed by the lower islands by stages to the higher altitudes where harvesting will be in progress until early September. The attached instruction explains how the first phase is to function.

4. Meanwhile, Col Young is consulting with General Mariotti, 12th Army Corps, and General Branch, C.C. Carabinieri, as to concerted action for the enforcement of wheat collection laws and regulations. Col Young will go to Agrigento tomorrow.

5. I was unable to see His Excellency V.E. Orlando until Saturday morning owing to his numerous engagements but had a number of conversations with him before his departure for Naples and Rome at 1500 hrs yesterday. Our first talk provided themes for a powerful speech which he delivered in Palermo on Sunday morning and which I persuaded him to broadcast from Radio Palermo the same evening. The wheat price and problem was very adroitly worked into the speech with all the skill of the master-orator. His brief stay here did not enable him to make any tours and, also he carried his 66 years marvellously well, I doubt whether he could withstand the fatigue of a propaganda tour of the island.

6. The press and radio campaign goes on unabated and some excellent articles have been submitted for publication and broadcast including a translation of Col Bellar's appeal.

7. The courts are alerted to deal expeditiously with offenders to the utmost rigour of the law.

8. I have had several conversations with the High Commissioner, but not yet with the giunta consultiva due to the fact that on his recent visit to Palermo it was decided with General not to convene the giunta until its composition and status are clarified.

9 Action and more action is the order of the day for everyone and this was impressed upon the Prefects at their meeting with the High Commissioner yesterday.

10 Implementation of the other measures indicated in Appendix "A" to 205/28/CA of 8 July 1944 is now awaited.

11 Total grain collected to date is just over 5000 tons or about 6 day's supply.

1. In answer to your request to my provincial coordinator officials, it is noted that the wheat situation in Italy is briefly as follows:

The price of wheat in Liberate Italy was fixed at 120,000 per 100 kilos and 120,000 for soft. Attached circular letter to, etc. relating to my provincial coordinators and heads of divisions refers.

The "directive for the organization of agricultural and forestry" issued by the Italian Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry in agreement with the Agricultural Sub-commission, which I also visited, explains in detail how the harvesting and turning in of wheat and barley to the people's production is to be effected.

AGC officers have been following closely the production of provincial and provincial agricultural committees in close contact has been maintained by my Headquarters and the Italian regional technical and executive officials. The High Coordinator has issued additional instructions as per copy translated (regret no English translation).

From the point of view of organization all provincial committees have well left the price, which is substantially below Italian provincial levels, as indicated by factors, especially the small size of the program, to hold on tight and not deliver to the people's production. I believe showing the average cost is attached.

Since March I have strongly advocated to my provincial coordinators a price of 120,000 per quintal for Italy and I have every reason to believe that the coordinators are the obstacle to my program.

Under these circumstances the only way to get the wheat to the provinces is to be tough. In this case I believe a comparison has already been made between the various activities of all Italian provincial agencies including Province heads together with inspectors of agriculture and High Coordinator's representative to whom I pointed out the gravity of the situation and that wheat, lower than our day's supply of wheat had been issued to.

Plans were made to coordinate policy and way to an independent drive which is now under way in the provinces which are under study, especially, Sicily, Calabria, Puglia and Basilicata.

The High Commissioner has issued additional instructions to provincial officials (reprint in English translation).

From the point of view of organization, all concerned here have well met the price, which is substantially below Italian production costs, in ensuring the farmers, especially the small share-croppers, to hold on tight and not deliver to the people granaries. A table showing the average cost is attached.

Since March I have strongly advocated to my constant valiant support a price of 1400 per quintal for MILK and I have every reason to believe that the cooperatives are the obstacles to my initiative.

Under these circumstances the only way to get the wheat to the granaries is to be tough. To this end I called a conference last Thursday evening which General Mariotti attended of all Italian police agencies including Province Guards together with inspectors of Agriculture and High Commissioner's delegates to whom I pointed out the gravity of the situation and that wheat, less than one day's supply of wheat had been turned in.

Plans were made to coordinate police and army in an enforcement drive which is now under way in the provinces chiefly concerned namely, Livorno, GALFANINAZZA, SENA and CASERTA.

Resistance is likely to be encountered but to what extent there may be real trouble is not possible to estimate. General Mariotti and the police are fully alive to this.

2. My command is fully informed of the situation and is trying to hasten the dispatch of another Italian division which is already enroute.

3. I have been called to MILANO by air on Monday to attend a meeting at which the price of wheat for MILK will again be discussed, but whatever the outcome it will be necessary to apply these now at the beginning of the harvest, in order to obtain sufficient grain to feed the population for a year.

SUBJECT: Inducement Scheme for Collection of Grains

TO : Acting Chief Commissioner.

1. If the inducement plan first recommended some months ago and endorsed by Regional Commissioners on May 30th is to be prosecuted, I recommend that it be carried out on the lines suggested by Mr. Villa.
2. As the remaining paragraphs of Vice President, Economic Section's memorandum are directed against such action, I submit my comments:-

- (a) I do not agree with the Vice President's approach to the enforcement of law. Certainly we must do all we can to make the people respect the law (which incidentally is Italian law and not ACC law) but in a fairly long administrative experience I have always found that an appeal to the better senses of the people by making them realize that they have everything to gain by obeying the law, is better than resort to threats and indications of what will happen if the law is not observed. Moreover, I have tried the inducement plan with success elsewhere. The experiences of Colonel Walker, who has come from Syria to help us here, are that the use of force was not the best way to collect wheat but the employment of my means which would be likely to secure for the Government the goodwill of the peasants. - (d) The lack of manufactured articles is a serious handicap. Have we ever asked for an increased allotment in order to launch an inducement plan? But I believe that we should attempt to make the plan work.

1. I wish to make the following comments on the proposals attached for an inducement scheme to encourage Sicilian farmers to hand over their grain.

2. I favour any proposal such as the attached one which is likely to secure for us the goodwill of the peasant. Our experience in Syria was that the use of force was not the best way to collect wheat, and that it was only when cultivators realised that they had everything to gain by delivering to the official organisation that the scheme became a success. The atmosphere to be created is that the Granai del Popolo is the farmer's friend.

later 3. The objection to the payment of a cash bonus might be overcome by ~~the~~ declaration stating that the price offered at present will be reduced at a ~~certain~~ date. This would be equivalent to the payment of a bonus but would avoid the suggestion of bribery.

4. As regards the danger of bringing the law into contempt referred to in the letter of the V.P. Economic Section, it must also be considered that the enforcement of delivery is exceedingly difficult to maintain in all cases, and respect for the law suffers with every evasion. Any means therefore which can be used to obtain the goodwill of the farmer is to be welcomed.

- (a) Sunday's incident at MESSINA was entirely a military concern. British Navy admittedly at fault. Brigadier Cripps, O.C. 56 Area, visited MESSINA to ascertain facts and was at PALERMO yesterday. Apologies tendered to 12th Army Corps, General Mariotti, and harmony restored.
- (b) Meeting at PALERMO yesterday, Brigadier Cripps, General Mariotti, and ACC officers re enforcement of wheat harvest programme. Brigadier Cripps agrees force is necessary solution. He will also apply for reinforcements to Italian 12th Army Corps, *through his channel.*
- (c) Prefect of AGRIGENTO is proving obstinate over removals of grain from his Province and refuses to reduce bread ration from 500 to 200 grams until sufficient wheat is available for the pasta ration. His objections are based on public security. Under Secretary of State for War on visit to Sicily went to AGRIGENTO to see the Prefect and is reported to have come away dissatisfied. Prefect Pancano, 72 years old, offered his resignation to Bonomi by telegram about a fortnight ago. In view of his attitude, early replacement by a younger and stronger man is recommended.

1. I send Lieut. Colonel Whipp (Civil Affairs Branch) to Sicily. He has telephoned to say that the harvest is not coming into the granaries only 250 tons have arrived to date. He regards the situation as serious and states that the reason is the price which is considered too low.

2. I have confidence in Lieut. Colonel Whipp's judgment which confirms your Regional Commissioner's considered opinion. And, after the inspection which I gathered from this morning's conference, I feel bound to remind you again that the Chief Commissioner has committed himself to assistance in the way of a war bonus - certainly personally to Colonel Husebeck. May I suggest, therefore, that before the proposal is rejected, which appears to be the present intention, Colonel Husebeck should be given an opportunity of expressing his views to yourself and Vice President, Economic Section. I am not impressed by Insetto's declaration: he has an axe to grind with the Italian Government and the Allied Control Commission. I do not think that we should disregard the recommendation of the Regional Commissioner especially in light of Lieut. Colonel Whipp's report, without further discussion, C.S., at a Vice President's meeting.

The organization for the collection is progressing, but it is considered that unless very rigorous measures are taken to enforce the surrender of the grain the campaign will be a failure. transport difficulties are very great, but not unsurmountable. Concern is felt with regard to the ability of the authorities to enforce the surrender of the grain."

1. On Monday 12 June I visited four of the main wheat growing areas in Caltanissetta Province namely Mazzarino - Sommatino - Garraditello and Marescotti, a total of about 120 miles. In addition to the local sindaco, Comitato Comunale degli Agricoltori, Marescotti G.R.R. and U.P.S.L.A. representatives, 10 Mayors of neighbouring communes were also seen, together with members of their Communist Agricultural Committees. I was accompanied by the Caltanissetta Provincial Inspector of Agriculture, the Provincial Commissioner, Public Supply Officer and my Executive Officer.

2. A very fine harvest is in sight and the following are the impressions I received from talks and observations in the above centres.

- a. The price of L. 1000 per quintal is genuinely below cost of production in Sicily. Consequent reluctance on part of farmers to come forward as prescribed by the regulations to declare extension of land under cereal production.
- b. An early announcement of a ration increase was strongly advocated as a strike for hoarding or disposal of wheat in small parcels at black market prices. Bread ration increase has now been officially announced.
- c. Harvesting is in progress and it is reported that wheat is already flowing to black market operators. This was confirmed yesterday by Provincial Commissioner Catania who reported that over 20 carts from the Gela plain (Caltanissetta province) loaded with wheat were intercepted on their way to Galtaniferone (Catania) for account of speculators. Carts, animals and wheat have been sequestered and stern action will be taken against the drivers.
- d. The Communist Committees are eager to do a good job but are preoccupied about the price of wheat and

growing areas in Caltanissetta Province namely Mazzarino - Scusabino - Serradifalco and Mussomeli, a tour of about 120 miles. In addition to the local Sindaco, Comitato Comunale degli Agricoltori, Meresciolio CC.RR and U.P.3.I.A. representative, 10 Mayors of neighbouring communes were also seen, together with members of their Communal Agricultural Committees. I was accompanied by the Caltanissetta Provincial Inspector of Agriculture, the Provincial Commissioner, Public Supply Officer and my Executive Officer.

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- d. The Communal Committees are eager to do a good job but are preoccupied about the price of wheat and the repercussions on peasant mentality.
- e. It is practically impossible to control animal threshing by small farmers.
- f. There is anxiety, fostered by separatist propaganda that wheat will be compulsorily exported from Sicily.

3. I was well impressed by the general desire to combat black market activity. This, however, is coupled with a reluctance to enforce grain collection on a laborious and unwilling people.

4. I feel that the following steps are very urgently re-
quired:

a. A prompt declaration of the prospected War Bonus and other suggested inducements. The War Bonus to be paid only to the actual producer. I again recommend a bonus of L. 300 per quintal.

b. The co-operation of the Italian Army to enforce collection if all other measures fail.

c. An early declaration of penalties for evasion.

5. Failing urgent action there is a constant danger that much of the harvest will go underground or be sold on the black market with resultant suffering, tension, labor unrest and disturbances such as experienced last year before imported flour became available.

6. Instances are reported that farmers are taking deposits to supply wheat at L. 18000 per 224 kilos (local measure known as a "salino") equal to L. 70 per filo.

The High Commissioner and the Regional and provincial Agriculture Inspectors are sparing no effort to put the harvest-
ing programme into effect. The first named, in conjunction with the Regional Agriculture Inspector, has circulated precise in-

1. The ACC has raised the question of the movement of harvesters and of the difficulties likely to arise from the civilian movement restrictions during the weeks of the harvest.
2. We have informed ACC that we cannot agree to any general relaxation of the existing movement restrictions, either in the Army areas or in rear of such areas.
3. We have suggested that, in specific cases, where harvest labour requirements cannot reasonably be met (owing to large numbers or other circumstances) by the issue of AMG passes, Regional or Provincial commissioners, SCAO's or CAO's should consult with Ib/CI in the areas in question with a view to reaching a working arrangement satisfactory to both parties.
4. It should be possible to meet the needs of AMG/ACC without prejudice to security, and in view of the great importance of ensuring a good harvest, you are requested to give your fullest co-operation in this matter.

SUBJECT: Wheat Price - 1944 Harvest

1. The first reactions to the wheat price for 1944 harvest are disillusionment, dismay and disapproval.
2. High Commissioner and Regional Commissioner in visiting 5 Provinces between 17th and 19th inst. obtained first hand impressions, which ranged from despair to an undercurrent of sullen mistrust and determination to resist what is considered an imposition on Sicilian agriculture.
3. The separatists are jubilant and ready to make capital out of the wheat price to further their cause and gain new adherents.
4. Popular sympathy is with the farmer and in such an atmosphere enforcement of delivery to the people's granaries would be of scant effect.
5. The statement made in the document entitled "Directives of Organization and of Operation" which says "This Ministry will arrange to fix, in agreement with the Allied control commission, the prices of wheat and of other products which are to be placed under ammasso control, in a quite remunerative measure so that the price will not constitute an incentive to evasion, but to delivery." is commented upon as a complete mockery.
6. Nevertheless, the High Commissioner and Regional Commissioner are forcing ahead the formation of Provincial and communal commissions as set out in the documents attached to the official decree recently published. To this end it is felt that, owing to the wave of resentment and consequent apathy, provincial supply officers will have to accompany the Provincial Agricultural Inspectors to the principal communes to give the necessary drive and impetus for the creation of the local agencies to be set up. In this connection it is strongly recommended that the contemplated withdrawal of experienced Provincial Supply Officers from this Region be deferred until the organization of the people's granaries and relative commissions is completed.

The Committee of the Union of Agriculturalists of the province of ~~Naples~~ ^{Palermo} met on the 18th. May 1944 to examine the situation arising from the price of Lire 1000 per ql of hard wheat and of Lire 900 per ql of soft wheat having been fixed by the Government; Considering it to be of vital importance for the success of wheat to be a success at the present time, so much for the producers as for the consumers of the island;

Reconfirming that, apart from the system of ammasso its success depends chiefly ^{upon} the price, and recalling that this conviction is unanimous and has been recently and officially stressed by the members of the Government themselves, who have rightly attributed the failure of previous ammassi to the disproportion between prices and costs of production;

Having ascertained that in all the meetings they have attended, the representatives of agriculturalists have clearly shown a high understanding for the necessities of consumers and their utmost good will to make a success of the ammasso operation, advertising this point of view among its own members;

Considering that the prices fixed by the Government are absolutely out of proportion to the cost of production (exceeded by the reality of today) as compared to the estimates of about a month ago) which at the time was ascertained by the High Commissioner, Prefects of the Island, by the Regional Superintendent for Alimentation, by the Departmental Inspector, by the Provincial Inspectors for Agriculture, by the Committee of the Economic Front, to be not *less than* Lire 1500 per ql. and for some areas, even much higher.

Considering that the sacrifice now imposed on agriculturalists is excessive and altogether not to be borne by the small direct producers (be they owners, tenants, farmers or *metayers*) who relied already on the profitable price promised both by the representatives of the Italian Government and by the Allies, as stated by the Prime Minister in his appeal to the Italian agriculturalists and by Col. Poletti, who in his broadcast of the 10th. inst. made the following statement:

"We give them (the agriculturalists) formal assurance that they will be neither oppressed nor vexed with fascist systems, that wheat will not be paid, as in the past, a price lower than the value of their work. We want to liberate them from the nightmare of the black market, and from the fear which arises from the fact of having to hide and conceal oneself in order to make a profit necessary to make a living;"

Concerned of the serious consequences that the certain failure of the wheat crop will have on the mass and particularly on the poorest classes;

Recalling that the fixing of a fair price would have made the Union feel responsible for the success of the ammasso in regard to the Authorities and consumers of all classes;

Considering that Lire 10 today have less purchasing power than the Lire 3.60 of 1941-1943; 6

Considering that another serious consequence of the low price will be the reduction in future campaigns of the sowing of wheat and of cultural advances;

DELIBERATES

1) to propose to the responsible Authorities that the advised price be urgently and with a realistic understanding re-examined, taking into consideration the real conditions of Agriculture and of the Sicilian economy, stating emphatically that the price of Lire 1000 per ql. of hard wheat and L.900 per ql. of soft wheat is absolutely out of proportion to the actual cost of production, which is continuously on the increase and therefore cannot be accepted.

2) to reject all responsibility regarding the certain failure the s-masse would turn out to be, should the measure already adopted in regard to the price be maintained, placing said responsibility upon those to whom it appertains;

3) to telegraph to H.E. the Minister for Agriculture in the following terms:

"Agriculturalists point out that recently announced price of wheat does not correspond to profitable price officially promised by Italian and Allied authorities stop Sure of complete failure of wheat collecting operations, conscious serious injustice done to them and prejudice to production next year by maintaining advised price, point out urgent necessity to re-view problem and ask for price acknowledged to be fair by all parties' representatives, economic associations, technical organs and Regional Authorities - President Agriculturalists Union for the Province of Palermo - Giardinelli"

4) to send copy of the present deliberation to the competent Authorities and acquaint the public with it.
