Reference AFHQ/2511/Q Mairt dated 26 August 1944 and
AAI 1047/5/01 dated 1 September 1944 (copies attached).

1. The situation as regards food of Allied Nationals
(approx. 7,000) in Rome is as follows:

A daily additional 100 grams of bread on payment (making
300 grams) (on a special ration card).

A "medical" ration of some 1,100 calories (free) on
medical certificate, issued by I.D.F.S.C. and supplied by A.C.C.
(approx. 1,000).

2. On 27th August 1944 I.D.F.S.C. applied to Food Sub-
Commission for a further monthly ration on payment for Allied
Nationals in Rome, as under

4 lb Corned Beef
2 lb Soup powder
1 lb Tea
2 lb Sugar
2 lb Soap
1 lb Salt
4 lb Condensed Milk

3. The above extra ration was asked for as a result of
requests from all Allied National Groups in Rome. There is no doubt
that, after 4 years of internment or other illtreatment many of the
Allied Nationals are in a very bad way.

4. As regards the suggestion made in the AFHQ letter that
American and British Nationals should be permitted to purchase
extra rations through their Consuls,

I am entirely in agreement provided other Allied Nationals
have a similar facility. I do not consider that it would be equitable
or politic to treat American and British Nationals preferentially.

5. A.C.C. stocks at present do not permit of issuing the whole
of the extra ration suggested in para 2 to Allied Nationals.

Reference AFHQ/2511/Q Haint dated 26 August 1944 and
AAI 1047/5/01 dated 1 September 1944 (copies attached).

1. The situation as regards food of Allied Nationals
(approx. 7,000) in Rome is as follows:

A daily additional 100 grams of bread on payment (making
300 grams) (on a special ration card).

A "medical" ration of some 1,100 calories (free) on
medical certificates, issued by I.D.F.S.C. and supplied by A.C.C.
(approx. 1,000).

2. On 27th August 1944 I.D.P.S.C. applied to Food Sub-
Commission for a further monthly ration on payment for Allied
Nationals in Rome, as under

4 lb Corned Beef
2 lb Soup powder
1 lb Tea
2 lb Sugar
2 lb Soap
1 lb Salt
4 lb Condensed Milk

3. The above extra ration was asked for as a result of
requests from all Allied National Groups in Rome. There is no doubt
that, after 4 years of interment or other illtreatment many of the
Allied Nationals are in a very bad way.

4. As regards the suggestion made in the AFHQ letter that
American and British Nationals should be permitted to purchase
extra rations through their Consuls.

I am entirely in agreement provided other Allied Nationals
have a similar facility. I do not consider that it would be equitable
or politic to treat American and British Nationals preferentially.

5. A.C.C. stocks at present do not permit of issuing the whole of
the extra ration suggested in para 2 to Allied Nationals.

In view of the offer in para 4 I would appreciate very
much if AFHQ would approve of issuing to A.C.C. (on repayment) the
items of which they are short in para 2.

Food Sub-Commission A.C.C. would then issue the total ration
to Allied Nationals on repayment.

6. I consider this should apply to Allied Nationals in all
towns in Italy over 75,000.

POINTS FOR GENERAL ALEXANDER

- E X T R A C T -

Allied civilians. Approximately 4000. Large number of women and children (e.g. at the British School 300 odd Maltese, including 150 children under 12 years). Includes British (mostly women), American, Maltese, Yugoslavs, Greeks and Poles. Many from civilian internment camps. Most have homes or accommodation. Very short of food - get same as when Rome was occupied by the Germans. Financial assistance no good. Most have money but cannot buy food.

Suggestion. That 4000 extra rations consisting of sugar, Milk, (especially for children), Tea, Oil, Rice and Flour or Pasta, be issued issued to Major Sampson i/c Mis-placed Persons, for passing on to the Committee of each nationality (each nationality has already got its own means of distribution).

1. Some 5000 displaced persons residing in their homes in Rome are now in the care of, but are not rationed by, the Internees and Displaced Persons Sub-Commission. Leaders of National Groups have been asked to submit lists of those requiring, on purely medical grounds, food additional to or differing from what they can now buy. Pending receipt of these lists it is estimated that some 10% will require such diet supplement.
2. The items required are milk, sugar, cocoa, cornflour, custard powder, tea and margarine.
3. All the above items except tea and margarine were authorised by you for refugees in the Southern Camps. HQ 2 District 1592 Q.1 dated 27 April 1944 refers. Tea and margarine were not then required because tea and olive oil were included in Ration Scale 30.
4. A.C.C. Food Sub-Commission have agreed to supply milk and sugar and your approval for supply of the remaining items is requested. Monthly requirements on the 10% basis referred to above are as below:

1. Ref attached copy correspondence from AAI and Food Sub-Commission - rationing of displaced persons and Yugoslavs in camps under control this Sub-Commission.

2. It is appreciated that the feeding of refugees and displaced persons should be the responsibility of ACC, but before the change over from the present scale of rationing takes place it is desired to submit the following factors which call for detailed planning and organization, and the defining of a policy to be adopted in regard to feeding of Displaced Persons.

(a) Appx "A" shows scales of rations which are at present being supplied from Army sources.

(b) Appx "B" shows proposed ACC scale of rationing which does not appear to provide for the various categories of refugees as shown in Appx "A".

(c) It will be noted that the new scale of rationing falls far short of the present army scale.

(d) From time to time during the past six months representations have been made to this Hq for revisions of the present Scale 30 which the Yugoslavs consider inadequate to rebuild the constitutions of the people who have undergone much privation. These complaints have been settled effectively, but it is felt that unless the present scale of rationing is continued by ACC, we are going to have dissatisfaction in our camps.

(e) With reference to our permanent staffs-working refugees. (f) At present our holding camps are scattered throughout S. Eastern Italy and rations are drawn from the Army DID at Maglie, which is conveniently situated for the purpose. The Maglie DID will not be available to ACC as a distributing center as this DID is supplying army units in S.E. Italy.

(g) At present hospital patients are being rationed on FRS and in addition are receiving extra issues of medical comforts on recommendation of Allied Medical Officers.

Is it intended that hospitals will continue to be rationed by the Army or are ACC undertaking this responsibility?

(h) Extra rations for expectant mothers and undernourished Children may also be drawn from army sources on recommendation of an Allied Medical Officer.

Will ACC supplies cater for these issues?
