TO : Headquarters, Allied Control Commission
Public Works & Utilities Sub-Commission
(att. Lt. Col. V.S. Thompson).

1. After inspecting the prisons at Favignana, Augusta, Caltanissetta, Ustica and Lipari I contacted Col. Hancock to submit a copy of my report as suggested in your letter, he introduced me to Brig. Carr who is the new Regional Commissioner of Region I. Brig. Carr called in Lt. Col. Snook (RPSO) of Region I and we discussed the prisons mentioned above.

2. It was decided that the prisons at Favignana, Augusta, Caltanissetta, which are being repaired should be finished as soon as possible.

3. There is a prison at Columbaia off the coast of Trapani that we have asked the Genio Civile of Trapani to receive bids for the repair and remodeling. The plans and estimates have been finished.

4. Nothing will be done with the prison at Lipari at the present time and if the other prisons mentioned above accommodate all the prisoners it will not be used.

5. The prisons at Ustica will not be used.

6. It was decided if stockades are to be built they should be built on the mainland of Sicily and not on the islands.

7. Brig. Carr asked Lt. Col. Snook to work with Major Boyd and dott. Columbo the representative of the Minister of Grace and Justice and carry out the above plan.

SUBJECT : Prisons.

TO : His Excellency, Minister of
Grace and Justice.

1. It is understood that your Ministry will become responsible for Italian Military Prisoners who are serving sentences in excess of 30 days, or who are awaiting trial over 30 days. Further, that these prisoners will be fed on the civilian scale and not on Army scale rations.

2. It is not proposed to transfer military prisoners to civil jails, as no accommodation is available. In fact, civil jails are already overcrowded.

3. Arrangements are being made to transfer certain military jails to the civil authority. The accommodation thus made available will be sufficient to house all military prisoners, including those at present in civil jails.

4. The effect of this arrangement should be, that more accommodation will be available in civil jails for civil prisoners. For example, it will enable 459 Military prisoners to be moved from BARI prison, and 285 from LEGGE prison.

5. The question of staffing the military prisons handed over, is one of some difficulty, but it is hoped that some arrangement can be made with the Minister of War.

6. Pending the completion of the above scheme, it is suggested that Prison Directors be informed that no further Military Prisoners should be accepted into civil jails.

7. The Military Mission to the Italian Army is formulating this scheme in conjunction with the Minister of War, and it is anticipated that concrete proposals will be put forward to you in the very near future.

TO : Regional Commissioner Region I. ¹⁹⁴

1. Reference your PMS 013.06/PLV dated 14 July 1944.
2. The construction of a prison camp in North Africa to accommodate prisoners sentenced for violation of the grain laws is not considered advisable.
3. The completion of the prison rebuilding and repair programme in Sicily, will provide accommodation for an additional 1,152 prisoners. In addition, authority has been obtained from H.Q. AAI to use USTICA and LIPARI islands as prison settlements.
4. It is anticipated that 1000 prisoners can be accommodated at USTICA, and 300 at LIPARI. Together with the rebuilding in Sicily, the above programme should provide for 2,452 prisoners. If this is insufficient, stockades could be constructed.
5. Major Hyland of Public Works and Utilities Sub-Commission will proceed to Sicily by air to deal with the problem. He will expedite the repair of Favignana, Augusta and Caltanissetta, inspect Ustica and Lipari, and see that work is put in hand with a view to their use at the earliest opportunity.
6. The Minister of Grace and Justice has authorised Dott. Colombara, Director of Palermo Prison, to accompany Major Hyland, and represent the Ministry during his inspection.

SUBJECT : Prisons - Sicily.

TO : Director Public Works and Utilities Sub-Commission.

1. Prisons of Sicily are overcrowded, and on 28 June 1944 arrangements were made by your Sub-Commission for the repair and rebuilding of:-

1st Priority:- PAVIGLIANA - Penal. Region I.

Closed on 26/3/43 because of poor hygienic conditions and war damage. To make quickly available, work can be done in two stages.
a) Undamaged premises renovated using labor of convicted masons. This can be done in 1 month and provide accommodation for 400.
b) Repair work on Sections 4 and 5. This can be done in 3 months and provide accommodation for 150.

2nd Priority:- AGRIETTA - Penal - Region I.

Has been requisitioned until recently. Requires a) Repair of several sections of collapsed roofs. b) General inspection of roofing. c) Repair of locks and gates. Time to be taken 2 months. Accommodation for 500.

3rd Priority:- CAIMARI SICILIA. - Judicial. Region I.
Repair 44 cells and 15 dormitories. Time to be taken 3 months. Accommodation for 102.

Completion of this building and repair programme will provide accommodation for a further 1,152 prisoners.

2. On 14 July 44 Col. A. Hancock Regional Commissioner, Sicily, wrote to Executive Commissioner pointing out the serious prison overcrowding that would arise as a result of enforcement of the grain laws in the island. A special drive is being made against farmers who are not surrendering grain with the result that up to 28 July, 2000 had been denounced. These offenders will be firmly dealt with at court, and the necessary extra prison accommodation does not exist on the island. The main prisons taken together are already holding 1000 more prisoners than their normal capacity.
3. Colonel Hancock suggested the construction of a prison camp in North Africa but this is not approved.
4. Two islands - Ustica and Milos - situated north of Sicily could be used as penal settlements.
5. Ustica was used for prisons purposes by the Italian authorities until our occupation in September 43. The Colony consists of 31 stone buildings, and also a number of houses with window gratings, and barred doors with padlocks. One stone building is in use by G.C.R.R., and four are occupied by an R.A.F. store. The remaining 26 buildings provide accommodation for 600. One hundred specially adapted houses are available giving accommodation for 400. Total accommodation available 1000.
6. Almost all the premises are in fair condition and do not need substantial repairs. However, whitewashing, painting and repairs to doors and windows, adjustment of hydraulic and sanitary plants are needed.
7. The hydraulic plant is served by a cistern placed about 50 metres above sea level with a capacity of 20 tons into which is pumped water carried by steamers in

service between Palermo and Ustica. Another pump can carry the water from the first well to another large well situated on the highest point on the island with a capacity of 2000 tons.

5. If a prison is set up in the island, the water service now twice weekly (Tuesday and Thursday) will need to be increased to 3 or 4 trips weekly. The water reserve in the large well will have to be built up.

6. Kitchen facilities available could cater for a 1500 meal capacity.

10. The existing buildings at LIPARI are used as a school. They are in bad repair and could hold at least 300 prisoners. Electric lights is available and they meet hygiene requirements. The local water system is insufficient, and water is brought from Messina. Other tanks could be constructed on the island on the stockade principle using prison labour.

11. The use of USTICA and LIPARI will be cleared with H.A.I., and a cable forwarded to Col. Hancock when this has been done.

12. As a result of a conference with Col. Jenny at Hyland 11.30 am., 1st August it is understood that Major ~~H. J. W. H. J. W.~~ of your Sub-Commission will proceed to Sicily to arrange

- (a) The repair of Favignana, Augusta and Galatani ports at the earliest opportunity.
- (b) Inspection of USTICA and LIPARI with a view to their use as prison settlements, at the earliest opportunity.

13. Col. Hancock and Lt. Col. Snook (R.A.M.C) are at Palermo and will give every assistance to your representative.

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14. The Minister of Grace and Justice has been spoken to, and he has appointed Dott. Columbo at present at Palermo to represent the Italian Authorities in this matter. A letter of authority to Dott. Columbo from the Minister is attached.

1. Reference letter from R.C.I. dated 14 July 44 suggesting that a concentration camp be set up in North Africa to detain prisoners sentenced for violation of the grain collection decree.

2. While it may be necessary to set up a camp to deal with the large number of prisoners involved, such a camp should be in Sicily, or in a small island such as Ustica, or one of the Lipari islands. The idea of a camp in North Africa is not favoured.

3. On 28 June 44, R.C.I. was informed that arrangements have been made for the rebuilding and repair of the following prisons:-

FAVIGNANA - accommodation for 550 within 3 months.

AUGUSTA - accommodation for 500 within 2 months.

CAITANISSETTA - accommodation for 102 within 3 months.

The completion of this building and repair program will provide accommodation for a further 1,152 prisoners.

4. The island of Ustica was used for prison purposes by the Italian authorities until our occupation in September 43. The Colony consists of 31 stone buildings, and also a number of houses with window gratings, and barred doors with padlocks. One stone building is in use by C.O.R.R., and four are occupied as an RAF Store. The remaining 26 buildings provide accommodation for 600. One hundred specially adapted houses are available giving accommodation for 400. Total accommodation available 1000.

5. Almost all the premises are in fair condition and do not need substantial repairs. However, whitewashing, painting and repairs to doors and windows, adjustment of hydraulic and sanitary plants are needed.

8. Kitchen facilities available could cater for a 1500 meal capacity.

9. The existing buildings at LIPARI are used as a school. They are in good repair and could hold at least 300 prisoners. Electric lights are available and they meet hygiene requirements. The local water system is insufficient, and water is brought from Messina. Other camps could be constructed on the island on the stockade principle using prison labour.

10. On 1st June 44, AAI gave authority for the use of the LIPARI islands for Italian Military Prisoners but it is not now proposed to use the Islands for this purpose. The use of USTICA for civil prisoners will need to be cleared with AAI.

11. It is recommended that LIPARI and USTICA be used for civil prisoners. They would provide accommodation for 1300 prisoners. The rebuilding program is for 1,152 prisoners.

Total 2,452

If this is found to be insufficient, stockades could be constructed as suggested in para 9.

12. A Prison Inspector for Sicily will be appointed by the Ministry of Grace and Justice in the next few days. Steps will be taken to expedite his travel to Sicily, in order that he can co-operate with ACC Officers in dealing with this problem of prison accommodation.

1. Reference letter from Region I, I have discussed this point with Col. Wilcox and Major Wilson.
2. I think that there is no doubt that Col. Hancock will have a large number of delinquents to deal with due to his harvesting drive. The citrep for the third week in July stated there were some 1600 awaiting trial, some of whom will of course be acquitted.
3. Major Wilson says that there is a building programme in progress which will alleviate the situation, but this does not in my opinion entirely cover the problem. The use of the island Ustica for the more serious cases was put forward and if you are of the opinion that this should be followed up, ~~and~~ a definite recommendation to that effect, I will take it up with HQ. AM.
4. The suggestion of course of a concentration camp in North Africa is out of the question.
5. Would you please obtain the comments of the Public Safety Sub-Commission to Col. Hancock's letter and to the very tentative arrangements talked over between Major Wilson and myself so that a reply can be sent to Region I.

TO : Executive Commissioner - A.C.C. Headquarters.
R.C.M.G.

1. This office has from time to time been informed that the prisons in Sicily are extremely overcrowded and the handling of future prisoners will become most difficult if not almost impossible. The Regional Legal Officer has stressed this situation in his monthly reports of May and June to this Regional Headquarters and to the Legal Sub-Commission, Headquarters A.C.C. To date no remedial measures have been taken either by the responsible Italian Authorities nor by A.C.C. Headquarters. The continuance of such prison conditions not only interferes with the functions of the necessary prison activities, but is also fast becoming a dangerous health menace.

2. It is anticipated that a large number of persons will be apprehended and convicted for violation of the grain collection decree, and this will necessitate prison space in which to house those convicted. The number of arrests up to July 1st was 759 and it can be safely assumed that that figure has now surpassed the thousand mark. The prisons will not be able to accommodate these additional prisoners and it is therefore suggested that a concentration camp be set up, preferably somewhere in North Africa or elsewhere outside of Italy. This plan would serve two purposes, first it would be a temporary solution of the prison situation and secondly it would serve as a deterrent to future offenders because the fear of being sent to a concentration camp in North Africa would go far to destroy any desire to blackmarket their grain. The Regional Legal Officer has discussed this plan with the Procuratore Generale del Regno of Palermo, who has expressed his approval, but the plan must first be approved by the Minister of Justice.

3. It is recommended that in view of the present 6.3.1/ overcrowded prison conditions that representations be made to the

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Italian Government through the Minister of Justice to the effect
that plans be formulated for the establishment of concentration
camps somewhere in North Africa for those convicted of violations
of the grain collection decree.

1. On 5th May, 1944 a meeting was held at Reg nr HQ ACC to discuss proposals for the improvement of the prison situation. One of the proposals adopted was the forming of Labour Battalions, for civil prisoners.
2. It was thought that the scheme should be tried in Region 3. Regional Commissioner Region III was seen, and the suggestion made to him that prisoners serving short sentences be attached to labour Battalions and housed in camps. It was agreed to form a camp of 500 prisoners.
3. A suitable site has now been found on the Naples - ~~Campi~~ road about 4 miles NORTH of Aversa. It is situated in an agricultural area so that employment for prisoners can be found on the scene. If successful, the idea could be extended to other sites.
4. Water Supply is the LAGNA river, but the water is fairly good and can be used with a pump and water purifying plant. Other camps have been set up in this area in the past, and there is an American Disciplinary Training Stockade within 6 miles. Army water pumps and purifiers are said to be located in this Area.

Overcrowding of Prisons - Italian Military

1. Reference folios 137 and 138.
2. Folio 137 sets out the serious position which has arisen at BARI Prison. A large number of the population there are Italian military prisoners. MCA directed that Italian prisoners serving sentences over 30 days would become a civilian responsibility. Therefore all prisoners over 30 days could not be placed in TUTURANO Camp.
3. MIA in their letter (folio 135) indicates that such members of the Italian Forces are struck off the effective strength of the Armed Forces for maintenance on Army scale and after a period of 30 days are only entitled to civilian scale rations. There is an implied suggestion that these men are no longer members of the Italian Armed Forces as they go on in their letter to state that on completion of their sentence or release from custody they may be reinstated as effective members of the Italian Armed Forces for maintenance on Army scale.
4. Legal have stated that a wrong interpretation has been placed on this letter. These men even while in prison are still members of the Armed Forces until properly discharged and MIA cannot get rid of their responsibilities simply because these men are serving more than 30 days. It would appear that it had been decided that such soldiers were a civilian responsibility.
5. These soldiers are serving a military sentence imposed by the Italian authorities and housed in civilian goals for purposes of convenience. If it is correct, and I believe it to be so, that these soldiers are by Italian law a Military responsibility whatever length of sentence, whether housed in civilian prisons or not, then MIA should not be allowed to assume and act as if they were a civilian responsibility. This is the crux of the whole situation, and the matter should be put before the Chief Commissioner for his ruling.
6. If the Chief Commissioner rules on the advice of Legal that they are a military responsibility, then MIA should be asked to remove these soldiers from civilian prisons to Tuturano and provide guards necessary for their custody. If these people can be got out of civilian prisons the prison situation would be considerably eased.
7. If the Italian Army do not require the services of these men they should be properly discharged at the expiration of their sentence and they should not be allowed simply to wash their hands of them and say that because they are on civilian rations after a period of 30 days while in a civilian prison they are a civilian responsibility.

- 3 When the above policy is fully understood by the Italian military authorities, it will result in the transfer from military prisons to Civil jails are ordered by 2,465; of this number 1,784 are Italian military prisoners.

4 Attention is called to a cable dated 22 Jun 44 from MIA to the Minister of War and Public Safety Sub-Commission (Encl. "C"). 6 The new policy regarding Italian military prisoners was brought into being without any prior reference to the Ministry of War and Justice, legal Sub-Commission or Public Safety Sub-Commission. If this had been done, the Italian, British and American Administrators would have been informed.

- 3 When the above policy is fully understood by the Italian military authorities, it will result in the transfer from military prisons to Civil Prisons, of all soldiers serving sentences of over 30 days. This point is raised in Army General Staff letter ref. G/11/1 dated 28 Jun 44, addressed to the Italian Army General Staff. (Incl. "B"). At the present time, no agreement exists in civil jails. In fact, the latest figures show that 2,463 of this number 1,734 are Italian military prisoners.

- 4 Attention is called to a cable dated 22 Jun 44 from RDU to the Minister of War and Public Safety Sub-Commission (Incl. "C"). This states that Italian Army personnel picked up as a result of the advance of the Allied Armies, will not be considered members of the active Italian Army until screened and returned to an active unit of the Italian Army. Those not returned to full duty become civilians, and if they are to be confined for trial, they must be confined in Civil Prisons.

- 5 The advice of the Chief Legal Officer, Colonel G.R. UPTON has been taken, and the following opinion expressed by him -
"A soldier does not cease to be a soldier merely because he is serving a sentence in excess of 30 days.
The Ministry of War may have issued some ministerial decree which affects their position, but this Sub-Commission has no knowledge of such." A soldier serving a sentence even in excess of 30 days should do so in a military establishment, see art 26 Military Penal Code of Peace.

- 6 The new policy regarding Italian military prisoners was brought into being without any prior reference to the Ministry of Grace and Justice, Legal Sub-Commission or Public Safety Sub-Commission. If this had been done, the legal position would have been made clear, and the effect on civil prison warding exploited.
- 7 It is thought that the policy came into being by a misunderstanding. It arose as a result of the necessity of reducing the quantity of food being supplied for Italian military rations. To accomplish this, RDU are cutting down the number of ineffective prisoners in the ration strength. According to the present policy as at present it stated, but the point at issue was the supply of food. The policy as at present stated, and understood by RDU, changes the actual status of the soldier and makes him a civilian, liable to be tried in law.
- 8 Arrangements were in hand by the Minister of War to form two major battalions of Italian Army prisoners. On 1 Jun 44, RDU gave assent to the general treatment of all Italian military prisoners in the LIGURIA Islands.  - g) Personnel temporarily in transit camps and authorized rations will not be included in the strength of the transit camp staff or in the strength of the "unassigned attached" since they are already accounted for under the unit to which they are assigned. These personnel will be shown on a separate line, headed "attached for ration", below the entry "unassigned attached" and only in columns 15 and 16. Personnel on leave are not entitled to rations until they rejoin their assigned unit and will therefore be shown in the strength of the unit to which they are assigned.

SUBJECT: Overcrowding of Prisons (Italian Military).

TO : Executive Commissioner, (Through W.P. Admin. Section).

1. A serious overcrowding problem has arisen at BARI PRISON. The capacity of the prison is 700; present population 1710, of whom 167 are Italian Military Prisoners.
2. Arrangements were being made to move these military prisoners to TUTURANO Camp, where accommodation had been offered for 500 prisoners by Col. Findlay of Displaced Persons Sub-Commission. It then became known that an instruction had been issued by Army Sub-Commission, Main HQ (MSIA), INQUIRE, directing that all Italian prisoners serving sentences of over 30 days, or awaiting trial over 30 days, would be confined in civil prisons and become a civil responsibility. As a result, any military prisoner serving a term of more than 30 days could not be removed from BARI Prison and placed in TUTURANO Camp. All the prisoners concerned are in the "over 30 days" category. It was also stated that TUTURANO Camp is at the disposal of the Italian Army in exchange for TAFFA, Brindisi.
3. This new policy arose from a letter Ref. AQ/B dated 23 May 44 from Main HQ (MSIA) to the Minister of War. (Copy attached). Particulars of this letter were obtained, and as the subject matter appeared to be concerned with the feeding of Italian Military Prisoners, it was thought by this Sub-Commission that a misunderstanding had arisen. It was agreed that after 30 days imprisonment, Italian Military Prisoners would be fed on the civilian scale, but this in itself did not make military prisoners a civil responsibility.
4. Accordingly, on 2 June 44, a cable was sent to HQ MSIA (copy attached) explaining the position at BARI, asking for agreement to the transfer of the prisoners to TUTURANO, and the provision there of an Italian Army Guard. On 3 June 44 a reply was received (copy attached) pointing out that these prisoners were now a civil responsibility.
5. On 4 June 44, a further cable was sent to HQ MSIA (copy attached) in which it was stated that the new policy was contrary to the declared policy of the Commission, as agreed with the Italian War Minister. It was also mentioned that if the new policy was put into effect, it would prevent the removal of about 2000 military prisoners from civil prisons.
6. On 6 June a reply was received (copy attached) stating that the new policy had been approved by Chief Commissioner and remains effective. Further, that Penal Battalions are not being, or to be formed.
7. This new statement of policy regarding Italian Military Prisoners is absolutely contrary to the views expressed by all authorities concerned in the amelioration of the present Civil Jail overcrowding problem. The presence of

over 2000 Italian Military prisoners in the civil jails of Italy, raises an extremely urgent problem. The coming summer weather will make conditions in these prisons unbearable. It is known that sanitation is not up to Allied standards, and in addition, there is no bedding. Prisoners are lying on straw in passages and corridors.

8. I consider it absolutely essential that all Italian Military prisoners be moved from Civil prisons. The occupation of Italian prisons by British military must be expected in cases of operational necessity. There is no excuse for Italian military prisoners being kept in civil prisons, when they could be housed in stockade camps, or moved to an island settlement.

9. I ask that this question of the civil responsibility for all Italian Military Prisoners serving sentences of over 30 days, be taken up with the Chief Commissioner.

In continuation of the policy that the Allied Governments will maintain on Army Scale only the Italian Armed Forces who are in fact effective, it is necessary to examine the position of the Italian Armed Forces who become NON-effective through serving sentences of imprisonment in jail or through awaiting trial in jail.
2. I am directed, therefore, to inform you that no member of the Italian Armed Forces may be absent from duty, either through awaiting trial or through serving a sentence of imprisonment, for a period longer than 30 days and remain on the effective strength of those Armed Forces for maintenance on Army Scale.
3. Any member of the Italian Armed Forces will, after absences from duty awaiting trial for 30 days or on being sentenced to a term of imprisonment for a period exceeding 30 days, be:-
 either (A) struck off the effective strength of the Italian Armed Forces for maintenance on Army Scale, and no Army rations will thereafter be issued to them until they again become effective members of the Italian Armed Forces. These prisoners will then be eligible only for the Civilian Scale of rations. On completion of their sentence or release from custody, they may be re-instated as effective members of the Italian Armed Forces for maintenance on Army Scale.
4. (A) I am further directed to say that Civil prisons will be used only for non-effective Italian Armed Forces prisoners serving sentence of over 30 days or awaiting trial over 30 days.
 (B) The remainder of Italian Armed Forces prisoners will be retained in Italian Armed Forces prisons or punishment camps to be established by you.

2. The only prisons known to be damaged in this Region are:
 - a. Carceri Gindiziarie of GALLINA,
 - b. Carceri Gindiziarie of PALMIboth situated in REGGIO Province.
3. GALLINA prison has not been used since the Allied occupation, having been rendered uninhabitable by bomb damage to the roof and ceilings. Normal capacity 100 prisoners.
4. PALMI prison was originally damaged by earth-quake in 1908, and the top storey was never rebuilt. Further damage was suffered by bombing during the Allied invasion. Now houses its maximum normal capacity of 75 prisoners.
5. The question of repair has been taken up with the Reg. Public Works Officer who is making an examination and assessment of what is required to re-instate GALLINA prison. It is thought that not a great deal of labour or expense will be incurred and if this is borne out by the Public Works Officer's report, direct action will be taken accordingly.
6. The PALMI prison has not been inspected in view of the report made in April by the Prison Officer, Region II, to the effect that it is most unsatisfactory and should be closed permanently. This was mentioned in his report to Pub. Safety Sub-Commission dated 29 April, 44 and has been reiterated by the Public Safety Officer this Hq in a similar report dated 31 May, 44.
7. The overcrowding of prisons in this Region is not considerable and the question of the minor readjustments necessary is being taken up locally with the prison directors.

1. On 26th May 44 Major Tatton of this Sub-Commission visited A.A.T. HQ., where he saw Brigadier Zatton J.A.G. The question of prisons was fully discussed, and the Brigadier professed to be most understanding and appreciative of the difficulties experienced by A.T. officers in the field.

It was agreed that the requisitioning of Civil Prisons by Army authorities in the past, had contributed in no small measure, to the present overwhelming problem.

2. Brigadier Tatton stated that he was taking steps to ensure the de-requisitioning of those Prisons at present held by the Army. It was explained that at San Severo, the army commander had expressed himself unable to find alternative accommodation. The Brigadier then said he would deal with the matter through General Robertson.

3. Lists of Penal and Remandantelli Prisons in North and Central Italy were supplied to the Brigadier. He promised to circulate the information to all Army Commanders, and issue a directive that the buildings mentioned were on no account to be requisitioned for Army purposes: the necessary proviso of "operational necessity" was understood. It was agreed that copies of the lists would be sent to R.C. Regions IV and V and to SOAC's 5th and 6th Army. (These copies were forwarded on 27th May 1944)

4. It can be seen that Brigadier Tatton is well aware of the prison situation, and quite prepared to take strong action to help us in this matter. 

1. Alterations and repairs are now being made to certain premises in Foggia so as to convert them into a prison to replace the prison totally destroyed. When this work has been completed, the capacity of the institution will be about 100 men and 20 women. It is expected that a part of the institution will be ready for occupancy in a week's time.

2. (a) A request has been made through HQ. Region 5 for 1000 meters of hemp cloth suitable for clothing for prisoners. This material is now available and can be secured through the Hemp Control Office at Naples after the release of this material has been obtained from a Colonel Reiter with offices in the Province Building. We understand that the above material is not desired by the Army.

(b) An urgent request is being made for mgs. (sc. Meters) 510, Mil. 30 think, pine or chestnut; for 120 pieces of the same wood, 6 cent. sq., 4 meters long; and for 91 kilograms of nails between 5 and 6 cent. long. The wood is available and can be secured through the Forestry Division in Provincial Bldg. The material is to be used for making of oots. As far as can be ascertained, no oots are available in this vicinity of elsewhere in Italy.

3. The prisons and jails of this province have been inspected and all of the institutions have been completely renovated. They have also been classified as to their condition and as to the length of sentence to be served therein. A capacity for both men and women has been established for each institution.

4. The distribution of inmates between the different institutions is difficult due to lack of communication with jails located in isolated mountainous parts of the Province and to the lack of equipment for transportation. At the present time the total estimated capacity of Lucera Prison and the 24 jails is 670 men and 159 women. The total population this date is 592 men and 49 women.



The following telegram received from the Questura of Messina in regard to the premises of the ex confine-colony of Lipari is transcribed,-

"Premises ex confine colony Lipari now used elementary school technical commercial Institute. Same are of masonry good state of repair can hold over 300 internees, electrically lighted and meet hygiene requirements. Rain water collected cisterns but insufficient and formerly furnished with motor-cisterns from Messina. It is possible lodge about 30 guards and offices (sic) there is not now boat service nor possibility of early activation. However there is motor-boat belonging closed P.S. Office and capable transporting about 20 persons. Barracks equipment furnished private firm in mediocre state and insufficient because partially destroyed by English Governor because used by tubercular patients".
