SUBJECT: Pilfering on Rail

TO : Officer Commanding AMG 5th Army

1. Reference your OA/82 dated 27 Aug.
2. We have discussed this matter with the Food and Transportation Sub-Commissions and steps have been taken to carry out the suggestion contained in para 5 of your letter. It is felt that if the document showing the contents of the wagon were to be placed in a sealed envelope and nailed inside the wagon that this would be an extra security measure, and we are therefore proposing to make arrangements for this to be done.
3. With regard to para 3 of your letter, the difficulty about insecure wiring of wagons is that up to the present it has been impossible to obtain a stronger type of wire than is now being used.
4. We have been making repeated efforts for some time to obtain numbered metal seals from ADCS but without success. An officer of the Food Sub-Commission is at present in NAPLES and he is making further efforts in this direction. We agree that if these seals can be obtained it would assist very materially towards eliminating pilferage.

2. Enclosed, as required by you, is a list of twelve persons who have received the heaviest sentences for theft of Allied property according to a survey of records at the Legal Sub-Commission. These cases were all decided by AMC Courts.
3. In submitting this list which is not at all representative of the average run of sentences for theft of Allied property, I again raise the question of the desirability of publishing this one-sided list either as a whole or as separate cases and the adverse effect on the Italian people who are apt to think of such sentences as average rather than as extraordinary sentences.

Subject: Army Newspapers - Anti-Sabotage Campaign.

To: HQ. AAI.

1. I refer to AAI/5045/5/A(19) of July 23.
2. The question of running a propaganda campaign in the Italian press directed against civilian theft has been carefully considered. In the opinion of the Public Relations Office here, the only angle of publicity which is likely to have any effect on thieving civilians, is giving prominence to stiff punishments given to convicted persons. With this opinion, I agree.
3. To this end therefore, the Legal Sub-Commission have been asked to produce say a dozen instances of heavy sentences for theft by Italians of Allied property and on receipt of this information, action will be taken to publicize these cases in the Italian Press.

Maj. Talbot and a legal captain whose name I unfortunately did not get discussed ad nauseam a campaign to tell the Italians that it is wrong to have or take Allied property or goods. I told him the sentences are so small as to have nil deterrent effect and that there were few heavy sentences. Legal said he would collect and collate some heavy ones. Talbot said we should write a letter to every paper in Italy, urging them to editorialize on the points of the attached letter and giving the sentences, and also ask FWB and the Italian Press Office to do the same. Maj. Hendrickson of Rome Region also has sent in a breakdown of such sentences we might also use (see attached), though it shows the usual small sentences as previously indicated.

I myself am bored with the whole thing.

They seem to want it enough to insist.

I said I would refer the matter to your judgment.

1. An examination of 1001 cases which have been desposed of by our Courts recently shows as follows :

a) Possession of fire arms .....	34
b) Larceny of Allied property.....	50
c) Wrongful possession of Allied property....	473
D) Curfew violations .....	355
e) Other violations .....	89.
	<u>1001</u>

2. The fines for curfew violations run between 50 Lire and 500 Lire depending upon the circumstances.

3. Penalties for possession of arms have varied from 500 Lires to one year in prison, depending upon the circumstances in the individual cases.

4. The wrongful possession cases have carried penalties varying from a 50 Lire fine to three months imprisonment with a 25,000 Lire fine. There was one case which carried a penalty of 5 years in prison, but this was tried in the Superior Court.

5. The average penalty for all cases in the Summary Courts would probably run about one month.

SUBJECT: Anti-Saboteurs

Executive Com-Inspector,  
A.C.C.

1. As you are aware, our forces in ITALY are suffering serious losses of stores and equipment by theft.

2. In an attempt to combat theft by members of the forces an Anti-Theft campaign has been instituted in all Army newspapers. The greater part of the thefts that occur are not, however, committed by members of the forces but by civilians, and it is therefore desired that propaganda directed against civilian thefts shall appear in the Italian press.

3. Will you please consider whether such action would be likely to have a useful effect, and if so further consider what type of propaganda should be employed.

4. The following are possible angles of approach but it is doubtful whether any but (c) would be likely to carry any weight with those responsible for thefts.

(a) The Good Name of ITALY.

The prevalence of theft by civilians is giving to the Allied soldiers the impression that ITALY is a nation of thieves. If such an impression takes firm hold among the United Nations it will not readily be removed.

(b) Effect on the Duration of the War

The cumulative effect of the thefts is to delay the ejection of the Germans, the end of the War, and the evacuation of ITALY by Allied troops.

(c) Individual Punishment

Punishment should be given to the perpetrators revealed to convicted persons, and to the inclusion suggested by those who are shot or mutilated by police dogs while engaged in stealing.

5. Please inform this HQ what action you are taking.

(a) The Good Name of ITALY

(b) Effect on the duration of the War

Punishment should be given to the punishments awarded to convicted persons, and to the injuries suffered by those who are shot or maimed by poison dogs while engaged in stealing.

1. Reference is made to your 319/79/CA dated 24th June 1944, on the subject of interference by civilians with the explosives and chemicals dump in the neighbourhood of Marcianise.

2. Owing to so many recent changes, it has been impossible to trace the CAO at Caserta who made the very unnecessary request that instructions should be in writing.

3. Precise instructions have now been issued to the Sindaco of Marcianise, local police and others concerned to prevent interference and to warn the public of the danger. A check will be made from time to time to see that these instructions are observed.

2. Apparently this refers to what has been called the "Train rante Train Robbery Case". If so it is not one case, but, as subsequent investigation by this Hq. shows, a series of approximately 23 separate offences by different and various persons at different and various times and places. None of these has been tried by an AGO Court and it is not expected that any will be so tried unless on further investigation the AGO *Sub J* advises that there are additional circumstances warranting the trials of the two more important cases and such recommendation is approved at Hq. ACC.

SUBJECT: Interference by Civilians with Military Dumps.

TO : R.C. Region III.

1. Capt. Fraser from P.B.S. came to see me this morning about civilians interfering with dumps of explosives and chemicals at Dump C. 157 belonging to 21 Chemical Coy in the neighbourhood of MARCIANISE. The 2nd-in-Command who is actually on the spot at MARCIANISE apparently went to see the C.A.O. at Caserta, who said that instructions must be given in writing. This appears to have been unnecessarily *ostentatious* *pedantic* as arrangements could ~~apparently~~ *apparently* be made on the spot such better than by letter.

2. The position as explained to me is as follows :

This dump extends over a large area and civilians have been given permission to enter the area in order to cultivate the land. This concession has been abused as civilians apparently tamper with the various dumps either with the object of getting wood or removing the 12 bore cartridges from shells. This situation was brought to a head the other day by a small boy who blew himself up, and a lengthy inquiry had to be held into his decease. The Officer in charge was perfectly reasonable and did not wish the people to be prevented from cultivating their crops, but stated that unless they refrained from tampering with his dumps he would have no alternative but to close the area. He thought that the C.A.O. might be able to put up notices or otherwise publish to the Italians the danger in tampering with the dumps.

3. Would you please take urgent steps to ensure that the civilians in this area comply with the wishes of the military.

After this answer and always with arrogance he said that he would give a severe lesson on account of that, and went away.

The undersigned guesses that the above mentioned interpreter was a British

officer but he had not the rank distinctions used by the British Army, but on the dark helmet he had a royal gold embroidered crown, and the Tufariello thought that this distinctive was the sign of an officially recognised interpreter.

Before the undersigned went away from Frignano Maggiore the undersigned charged the new Station Commanding Officer to prosecute the investigations about the tires-theft.

He denies to have had an insolent appearance and a feeling of non-cooperation.

It is not true that he said he would like the British Army loose every thing.

One of the things that we are always at, as you know, is pilfering, and you on your part, I appreciate, are doing all you can to speed up the trial of offenders and to ensure the award of adequate sentences.

There are two further ways in which I would like to enlist your help.

(a) Could you have special Italian notices printed and posted up in the vicinity of important base depots, drawing attention to the penalties for stealing military property belonging to the Allied forces, in particular food, clothing and ammunition, and stating that severe punishment will be meted out to persons convicted of such offences?

Food, clothing, and components of ammunition are the things which attract Italians most.

If this idea appeals to you in principle I can let you have a list of the places where we would like such notices displayed.

(b) Could you also bring it home to local Mayors and civil officials that such things, if committed in the vicinity of their town or village, reflect on their ability to keep order, and might even render them liable to be removed from office.

I don't presume to dictate to ACC/AMG in this matter, but what I am after is that personal responsibility for stopping the theft of military property should be brought home to Italian officials. You may be able to think of some more effective means of doing so.

We are taking all the purely military steps we can think of to stop both pilfering and also organised stealing on the grand scale, and I shall be most grateful for what help you can give us over this from your side.

(b) Could you also bring it home to local Mayors and civil officials that such things, if committed in the vicinity of their town or village, reflect on their ability to keep order, and might even render them liable to be removed from office.

I don't presume to dictate to ACC/AMG in this matter, but what I am after is that personal responsibility for stopping the theft of military property should be brought home to Italian officials. You may be able to think of some more effective means of doing so.

We are taking all the purely military steps we can think of to stop both pilfering and also organised stealing on the grand scale, and I shall be most grateful for what help you can give us over this from your side.

1. Refer to your AAI/5092/A(PC) of 16 April 1944.
2. Careful consideration has been given to your request that instructions be issued that in Italian occupied territory all serious charges of thefts by Italian civilians of Allied property must be tried by Allied Military Courts.
3. The Chief Legal Officer has just returned from Region II where he made an extensive and detailed investigation of the operation of the Italian Courts in dealing with thefts of Allied property, especially in Apulia. He says that the system whereby reports of all cases affecting Allied interests are received and their progress watched through the Courts is working well and that generally speaking entirely adequate sentences are being imposed. In a few cases inadequate sentences have been given and these individual cases are taken up with the local authority by the Legal Liaison Officer.
4. In the opinion of this Headquarters this system which, as noted above, is already working well, should be given further trial since it is in accordance with the established policy that only exceptional cases should be tried by Allied Military Courts in Italian occupied territory.
5. You can be certain that the Legal Sub-Commission is treating this matter as one of great importance, and is keeping and will continue to keep a watchful eye on the operation of the system described in para 3 above.

1. Reference your RSI/319/16/C. dated 22 April 1944.

2. The policy of the Chief Commissioner is that only in exceptional cases will Allied Military Courts sit in unoccupied territory. In this connection please see my letter of 22 April 1944 to the Executive Commissioner (ref. ACC/4129/L) which amplifies this policy.

3. Since I wrote the above mentioned letter Col. Upjohn has returned from a tour of Region 2 when he made an extensive and detailed investigation of the operation of the Italian Courts in dealing with thefts of Allied property, especially in Apulia. He is satisfied that in Taranto and Brindisi the system whereby reports of all cases affecting Allied interests are received and their progress watched through the Courts is working well and that generally speaking entirely adequate sentences are ~~being~~ imposed. In a few cases inadequate sentences may have been ~~imposed~~ and these individual cases are taken up with the local authority by the Legal Liaison Officer. The Legal Liaison Officer makes weekly reports to the DPM at Brindisi and Taranto and Col. Upjohn understands that they are well satisfied with the progress that is being made.

4. In Bari the situation is not quite so satisfactory owing to the heavy arrears of cases there but the same system is being laid on there as is already working in Taranto and Brindisi and Major Cohen, the Legal Liaison officer, is working very closely with Col. Blair, the DPM at Bari. In Col. Upjohn's opinion this system must be given a chance to operate and he proposes to pay another visit to Bari in the near future to study its operation. Col. Upjohn's general conclusion was that the Italians generally realized the seriousness of the situation and are grappling with the problem as well as can be expected.

5. May I point out that although recommendations for tightening up the distribution system at Bari with a view to preventing thefts were made by the C.I.D. Section XII Air Force as long ago as 15 Feb. Col. Upjohn could not discover that any of them had been put into effect.

SUBJECT: Appointment of Military Court.

To : Executive Commissioner, ACC.

1. The Legal SubCommission has received two requests from Region 1 with respect to the appointment of Allied Military Courts to try two cases that have arisen there recently. As the decision was reached some time ago that Allied Military Courts would not be used in unoccupied territory except in extreme cases I am writing to you concerning these cases.

2. At AUGUSTA, Sicily, about one month ago a British seaman was stabbed to death without there being any apparent personal cause and it would appear from the papers that the real culprit, a noted criminal, has been arrested. The Regional Commissioner, writing through the Regional Legal Officer to this Subcommission, has requested that a General Court be constituted for the trial of the case. I recommend that this request be approved.

3. The other case is that of an American sailor who was stabbed and apparently not severely wounded by a Sicilian at PALERMO as a result of a somewhat drunken altercation. It has been recommended by the Regional Commissioner, through the Regional Legal Officer, that the case be referred again to the Italian Court. However the United States Naval Authorities requested that the case be referred to an Allied Military Court. Upon receipt of this request the case was withdrawn from the Italian Court awaiting decision at this Headquarters.

Since receiving the above mentioned communication, there has been received by this Subcommission a letter dated 18 April 1944 from the Chief of the Military Government Section, AFHQ, referring to this same case, and enclosing copies of additional correspondence. The Naval Authorities take the position that all cases involving injuries to Allied Forces personnel should be tried exclusively in Allied Military Courts.

4. As to the last mentioned case, I think there is some doubt if an Allied Military Court, on the facts as thus far stated, would convict the accused or in any event give a severe sentence in view of

the surrounding circumstances. On the other hand I am inclined to think that an Italian Court, in view of the very strong directives sent out by the Minister of Justice, would be apt to go as far as it can to give a stiff sentence. 20

5. In my recent conversation with the First Presidents of the Courts of Appeals in Sicily and the Procuratori Generali attached to these courts, I gained the very definite impression that they were determined to do their best to satisfy us in trying cases involving damage to or theft of Allied property and injuries to Allied personnel. Therefore, despite the representations made by the Naval Authorities I recommend that no Allied Military Court be appointed to try this case and that it be referred again to the Italian Court for trial.

6. In view of the situation with which you are thoroughly familiar, I recommend that the Italian Courts try all injury cases, except extreme cases, such as the murder first above mentioned and except where after experience it is found the Italian Courts in any particular place are not performing this function adequately or except where there is a series of inflicted injuries which it is believed can best be stopped by quick and vigorous action by an Allied Military Court. Obviously, without material increase in legal personnel it will be impossible to keep various Allied Military Courts going in various places in unoccupied territory to try all cases of injury to Allied personnel.

7. I am sending to you by Major Van Deusen this letter and the letter and file above referred, received from MGS, AFHQ.

8. I will appreciate your views in order that I may advise the RLO, Region 1 as to how the two cases shall be dealt with. If you wish me to do so I will be glad to draft a reply for HQ ACC to send to MGS, AFHQ.

SUBJECT: Allied Military Courts in Unoccupied Territory.  
TO : Regional Commissioner, Regions I, II, III & VI.

1. On the handing back to the Italian Government of territory now occupied by the Allied Forces, General, Superior and Summary Military Courts will cease to function except to deal with pending cases. Offences against the Allied Forces created by Proclamations and Orders will no longer exist as such.

2. The Allied Forces have reserved to themselves the right to hold military courts in unoccupied territory including the four provinces of Apulia and Sardinia, for the trial of acts hostile to the Allied Forces. An extract from the decree conferring this power upon Allied Courts is appended hereto as Appendix "A". Such Courts will try only cases of a serious nature such as would normally have been brought before a General Military Court during occupation.

3. Where cases of this nature are alleged to have occurred it will be the duty of the Regional Commissioner to have the facts investigated and if he considers that trial by an Allied Military, as opposed to an Italian civil court, is necessary he will so report to HQ., A.C.C. with a request that a Military Court be appointed.

4. All such courts will be convened only by order of H.Q., A.C.C. and as appears from the decree will punish offenders in accordance with the Italian Codes, but will follow their own procedure.

(a) In view of these facts all charges will be framed under the Italian codes by H.Q., A.C.C. and, therefore, it is essential that in requesting a Military Court pursuant to paragraph 3 hereof, full and complete facts be supplied in order that the charges may be properly framed.

(b) Normally a member of the Department of Special Prosecutions

Courts will cease to function and sentences against the Allied Forces created by Proclamations and Orders will no longer exist as such.

2. The Allied Forces have reserved to themselves the right to hold military courts in unoccupied territory including the four provinces of Apulia and Sardinia, for the trial of acts hostile to the Allied Forces. An extract from the decree conferring this power upon Allied Courts is appended hereto as Appendix "A". Such Courts will try only cases of a serious nature such as would normally have been brought before a General Military Court during occupation.

3. Where cases of this nature are alleged to have occurred it will be the duty of the Regional Commissioner to have the facts investigated and if he considers that trial by an Allied Military, as opposed to an Italian civil court, is necessary he will so report to HQ, A.C.C. with a request that a Military Court be appointed.

(b) Normally a member of the Department of Special Prosecutions will undertake the prosecution.

(c) Where it transpires in the course of hearing that there is established against the accused (i) any other fact constituting an offence not expressed in the charge, or (ii) evidence of aggravating circumstances (Art. 61, Penal Code) not mentioned in the citation or charge, then on such question being raised by the President or submitted by the Prosecutor, the accused may apply for an adjournment of not more than 5 days to prepare his defence (ref. 444,445 and 446 Code Penal Procedure).

If the accused does not ask for time, the offence in question or the aggravating circumstances are forthwith to be included in the charge and the trial proceeded with.

A note of compliance with these rules of procedure must appear on the record.

(d) The procedure to be followed will be the same as the procedure in a General Military Court in occupied territory, except, of course, that all sentences will be imposed in accordance with the applicable Penal Code.

(e) Reviews and appeals are dealt with in paras. 7, 8 and 9 below.

5. Where a Regional Commissioner requests that a military court shall be appointed, his request will also specify the names of officers available to sit on the court (a court will normally consist of not fewer than 3 officers), the interpreter, the officer to act as prosecuting officer in case none is available from the Department of Special Prosecutions, and the officer to act for the defence in the event of the accused not being represented by an advocate.

6. Every accused will be defended by a legal representative. Where the financial position of the accused does not permit him to engage the services of a legal representative on his own account, arrangements should be made by the Regional Commissioner for the provision of a legal representative in accordance with the provisions of the Italian Code of Penal Procedure (Article 128) and of the Rules of Penal Procedure contained in the Decree No 502 of 28 May 1931 (Article 2 et seq). This procedure provides that in such cases nomination of defending counsel be made forthwith and in conformity with the competent Italian jurisdiction for each case by one of the following judicial officials:

- (a) an examining magistrate (giudice istruttore);
- (b) the public Minister (procuratore del Re o procuratore generale);
- (c) president of a tribunal (presidente di tribunale);
- (d) the praetor (pretore).

The several jurisdictions of Italian courts being determined by somewhat complicated rules, applications should be addressed in the first instance to the praetor of the local court or to a procurator of a tribunal, whichever is the most expeditious or convenient, so that this official may determine the proper functionary having the power to take immediate action in each instance. A.C.C. for confirmation of such sentence by the Chief Commissioner.

10. The above directive does not apply in any area which has been declared a military zone. If any area is hereafter declared to be a military zone further instructions will be issued for that area concerning the holding of Allied Military Courts.

Article 3 of Royal Decree Law No 31,

Whoever within the liberated Italian territory commits a hostile act or crime against property to the prejudice of the Allied Military Forces or of any member thereof or of any functionary, representative or agent of United Nations, or whoever takes part in seditious manifestations against the Allied Forces or commits any act which in whatever way may hamper the war effort or help the enemy, shall be punishable under Italian penal law and shall be tried in Allied Military Courts according to their own procedure.

In the case contemplated by the preceding paragraph 1 any member of the Allied Armed Forces can effect the arrest of any person who may be reasonably believed to be implicated in acts herein above contemplated, except where an Italian officer or high government official is concerned, in which case the Italian Government or the appropriate superior local authority will be requested to co-operate in the premises to the extent necessary.

1. Thefts of WD property by civilians are becoming increasingly common and cause serious losses. In order to stop this wastage of war material, it is considered that soldiers should be empowered to use their weapons to prevent it.

2. It is desired to publish an order on these lines:-

"Thefts of WD property by civilians cause serious losses of essential material and obstruct the war effort. It is the duty of every officer and soldier to prevent any theft that he sees being committed, even to the extent of using arms. Every officer and soldier is entitled to use his arms against civilians found stealing WD property, or to prevent the escape of such thieves, under the following conditions:

A

- (a) It is impossible to prevent the theft, or the escape of the thief, by less violent means,
- (b) The thief has failed to halt when called upon to do so,
- (c) It is certain that a theft is really being committed or attempted,
- (d) The lives of innocent persons are not endangered.

Similar action may be taken against civilians who are found on land occupied by the Allied Forces, and who run away when ordered to halt."

3. Will you please advise this HQ if, in your view, such an order can be issued. If so, can steps be taken, both in King's and in Occupied ITALY, to bring this order to the notice of the civil population.

SUBJECT: Carabinieri - non-Co-operation

TO : HQ A.C.S.

1. G-1(B) have shown to this Section the Proceedings of a Court of Inquiry which show an instance of apparent non-co-operation of the officer commanding the Carabinieri at FRIGNANO MAGGIORE (north of Naples).

35. 2. The circumstances are briefly that on Jan. 17 of this year it was found that a dump of tyre covers and tubes stored under a tarpaulin in the Square at FRIGNANO MAGGIORE had been tampered with and that 21 covers and 14 tubes were missing. The dump, which belonged to 201 (Guards) Brigade Workshops REME, had been checked over on 14 January and found to be correct and had been guarded by REME personnel by means of roving picquets.

3. Forming part of the proceedings is a statement by an Italian interpreter attached to the Workshops, who interviewed the local Chief of Carabinieri and reported the loss. As will be seen from the statement, it is alleged that the local Chief of Carabinieri was definitely non-co-operative.

4. You will no doubt make inquiries into the matter, and it would be appreciated if the result could be communicated to this Section.

NOCELLETO - 7 February 1944

About 20 days ago there was an investigation by the Comd. of 201 Guards Brigade with Maj. Taylor of 88 P/Shops into the loss by theft of 40 tyres ~~and~~ inner tubes.

I went to the Brigadier of Carabinieri of FRIGNANO MAGGIORE to ask him to initiate an investigation concerning the theft but the Brigadier refused to go.

I was surprised to hear the Brigadier's remarks to the effect that he would not go with me. The Brigadier then explained that probably these materials had been sold by the English soldiers.

I returned 10 days ago to FRIGNANO MAGGIORE to discover the Brigadier's intentions on this matter - he was very abrupt and provocative. He showed me one piece of an inner tube and said "This is the result of my investigation." I remonstrated with him saying "Is this the only respect you have for the English military authorities?"

I asked the Brigadier for his name but he refused to give it to me. I was of the opinion that the Brigadier Comandante la Stazione dei CCRR FRIGNANO MAGGIORE was not willing to co-operate in finding the missing materials which belonged to the English Armed Forces. During the whole proceedings the Brigadier appeared totally indifferent.

1. The Chairman of the Central Electrical Board, A.C.M.F. has brought to the attention of the Chief Commissioner the increasing incidence of theft of transmission line, conductor and other electrical material connected with electrical supply.
2. These incidents are seriously interfering with the war effort and unless they are stopped the supply of power for military and essential civilian requirements will be seriously curtailed and the transmission of power to Rome and the North prevented in the future. Cases of theft are particularly bad from the transmission line Frattocchiore-Liri in the vicinity of Villa Iserno and Cellata Croceella.
3. Regional Commissioners will take immediate action to prevent these incidents. Directions or advice should be given to the C.C.H. and the courts in order to ensure that rigorous punishment is meted out to convicted offenders. The question of collective punishment should be considered and everything possible should be done to bring this type of theft to an end.

SUBJECT: Theft and Destruction of Power Line.

TO : Commanding General, Fifth Army, APO 464, U.S. Army.

1. Attention is invited to the attached letter to the Chief Commissioner, ACC, which requests assistance in preventing the theft and destruction of power lines. Investigation shows that, while much damage has been done to power lines by unauthorized use of fire arms by military personnel, the most serious damage is being done by the theft and removal of the line materials by civilians. The fact that some thieves have been electricuted by attempting to steal live wire has not stopped the stealing. Only salutary action will produce effective results. It is noted that the center of the main difficulty is located within the Fifth Army boundaries.

2. It is presumed that ACC will take prompt and effective measures to apprehend and properly punish civil offenders in areas in rear of army boundaries.

1. The theft of transmission line conductor and other electrical material continues to increase. This is seriously interfering with the war effort. Unless it is stopped the supply of power for military and essential civilian requirements will be seriously curtailed and the transmission of power to Rome prevented.
