TO : Petroleum Section, A.P.H.Q.,

1. I refer to your letter No. 177/394 of the 10th of August and to subsequent conversation between Col. Lyles and Major Neakes on the subject. The matter has been carefully considered and while it is appreciated that these men have given good service to the Allied Cause, it must be remembered that there are many cases like this throughout the country to which no recognition has yet been given.

2. Up to the present the only public recognition so far made has been to partisans, who have been given certificates for services rendered and to those who have helped P.O.W. who receive a military reward. It is not considered that these men are in either of these categories.

3. If public recognition were to be made of a case such as this, it would create a precedent which it is desired to avoid at the present moment. Recognition could be given, it is thought, more suitably at the proper time on a national basis and conveyed to individuals through the Italian authorities.

4. There would be no objection, however, for an officer of the Petroleum Section to call at the installation at FALCONARA and thank them publicly on behalf of the Allies.

RECOGNITION FOR ASSISTANCE RENDERED TO THE ALLIES

1. FOLIO 30 is a letter from Petroleum Section(10 Aug) listing the names of 25 Italians who through their own efforts were responsible for removing to a safe place vital parts of the oil installation at Falconara. The men with one exception are now employed by the Allies in the plant at Falconara.
2. Pet Section, AAI desire that some public recognition be given them for their assistance even if it took the form of public recommendation.
3. The only thing I can think of doing is giving them a certificate on the lines of that given to patriots but I fear this might be a dangerous precedent and would tend to reduce the value of such certificates. Public commendation is I feel out the question as there must be literally thousands who should be treated in this matter. The solution might be for an Officer of Pet Section calling the together and behalf of the Allies thanking the particular persons for their services.

Subject: Workmen's Compensation in Italian Territory.

To : See Distribution.

1. In the event of a civilian employed locally by the Allied Forces in Italy, Sicily and Sardinia, sustaining death, injury or illness arising out of and in the course of such employment, the O. C. employing unit will:

- a. Cease paying his salary or wages as from the date he stops work.
- b. Give him, or his dependents, a certificate of injury in the forms set out.
- c. Advise him, or his dependents, to apply to the local Office of the Istituto per l'Assicurazione Contro gli Infortuni sul Lavoro, for such medical attention and or compensation as he or his dependents are entitled to receive. The address of the local office of the Istituto and of the doctors employed by them can be ascertained from the Mayor (Podesta). In Rome injured persons should, if possible be sent to Ospedaliero dell'Istituto Nazionale Infortuni - No. 9 via Monte della Gioie - where not practicable send to any civilian hospital.

2. No compensation or medical attention (other than first-aid treatment) should be given, as the above Istituto is organized to deal with them. It has an office in all towns of sufficient importance and will arrange to have the injured person collected by ambulance on being so requested.

3. The certificate of injury referred to in par. 1 above 3642 be in the following form. It will be made out in quadruplicate and signed by the C.O. of the employing unit. The first copy, on which neither his rank nor his unit will be shown, will be given to the injured person or his dependents, to be handed to the Istituto.

The second copy, on which the rank, unit and its location will be added will be sent to the Claims Commission, CMF, for British Units and U.S. Citizens Service, Region 6, APO 794 for US Forces.

The third copy, similarly completed, will be sent to D.A.D. Labor (Civil) Lt Area or Formation HQ for British Units, and to Labor Supply Office, Rome Region, RAC APO 794, for US Forces. The

You will be able to say whether you fulfill the qualifications required under Art. 190 of the Manual of Military Law.

2. If you still consider you should seek insurance cover for third party risks we suggest you take the matter up with such an Insurance Company as :

1. With reference to your 393/25/CA dated 28 July.
2. In order to further advise C.V.W.W. on the status of civilian employees employed by them, we have thought it advisable to ascertain the views of the Legal Sub-Commission on the relationship of this organisation to the Armed Forces.
3. If it can be held that the C.V.W.W. comes within the terms of MML. Amendment 12, Ch. XIV paras 189, 190 and 191 relating to Voluntary Aid Societies, then it would appear that they are entitled to the same treatment as other Italian Civilians employed by Allied Forces.
4. The views of the Legal Sub-Commission are as follows:-

"Whether the voluntary organisations referred to in your " 13187/F of 3 August 44 come or not within the terms of " MML.amendment 12 paras 189 and following remains a " question of fact and not of law.
" If the Societies have been duly recognized and authorized under the provisions of Art. 190 of MML and of the " Red Cross Convention of Geneva then their personnel become " subject to military law and no doubt Italian civilians " employed by these organizations would be assimilated to " those employed by Allied Forces and their insurance covered through the same channels".
5. It now remains a question as to whether the various bodies in membership with the C.V.W.W. fulfil the qualifications referred to above and the C.V.W.W. can no doubt confirm this aspect of the matter.

We are anxious to clear and cover the responsibility of the Bodies concerned in the matter of motor vehicles. All vehicles sent from England are insured against theft and accident, but we are anxious to cover ourselves also in the case of vehicles bought from the War Department in this theatre. There is also the advisability, if not the necessity, of covering ourselves against third party risks and I shall be glad to know if there is any Italian Insurance Company whom you would recommend and who would carry such a cover for us.

1. It is desired to bring to your notice the fact that the Italian civilians listed on the attached sheet have been of material assistance to the Allied cause. Under the general direction of Engineer Perotti, Signor Foncini with the aid of other Italians listed, removed the vital parts of the oil installation at Falconara and hid them away. When the Allies captured the installation, information as to the whereabouts of this material was promptly disclosed and every assistance has been given to the Allies in rehabilitating the plant. With the exception of Engineer Perotti, the men listed on the attached are now employed by the Allies on the plant at Falconara.

2. This matter has been referred already to HQ. A.M.G. 8th Army, who advised they have no authority to make any awards or recognition for this type of assistance. It is requested that some public recognition of the assistance rendered to the Allies would be advantageous, if this merely took the form of public commendation.



Help extended to British Troops:

1. With ref to your letter K5/507/3 and copy of letter received from Brigadier BOUCHER respecting help extended to him whilst a prisoner of war at large in this area.

2. Discreet enquiries have been made, and it has been ascertained that the whole village were equally helpful, but additional risks were taken by the men named, who were assisted by SYLVESTRI Pasquale, a iso of Cavata. This villa ge is actually a street under the control of Guimone.

3. Three persons were the main leaders of the German troops in their efforts to catch the escaped prisoners, but they have now left the area, apparently having gone with the German troops at the time of the retreat. The names of these persons are: - (1) DANTUONO Guerrino; (2) GRILLI Giovanni and (3) Capt RICCIOLIETTI, the latter being a member of the Italian armed forces, either Militia or regular army. he was last known to be in Chiti, and such information as is necessary has been passed to the local R.S.S. for necessary action.

4. The 2 former named are well known to be ardent Fascists and are both included in the 8th Army "Black List". It is therefore anticipated that they will be suitably dealt with when caught.

5. Such help as is possible under the conditions prevailing in this area at the present time, has been extended to the persons concerned. It is stated by all that their action was a humanitarian one, owing to the exceptional weather prevailing at the time, rather than for personal gain.

We escaped from the Sulmons (General Camo, Villa Orsini, on the collapse of Italy, and were sheltered and fed in the most generous manner in the village Brizzone di Cavate, 3 miles south of Sulmona, by Eugenio Di Censi, Via Cavate 113, Sulmona, Province of Aquila, Abruzzi. The whole village committed, under the leadership of this man, to feed our, for them, large party - 2 Brigadiers and 3 O.Ps, and to form a defensive ring round our shelter to warn us of the approach of German troops or local Fascists - the latter were by far the greater danger and it is my earnest hope that they will be suitably dealt with. They are well known locally. On our departure in our final attempt to break through at the end of October 1943, these men, Eugenio, Palmendo, Rossoimo and Tacino - all Di Censi - gave us invaluable assistance over the first stage of our escape and helped us with food and money. One of them, Liberato Di Censi, a lad of 17, came with us throughout and when we got through, joined the Italian Army. I hear his address is Primo Campioni, Lungopromontorio No 7, 12th Bn, recently at TRICASE, P Lecce. I hope to visit these old friends when the situation permits and meanwhile I write to ask for:-

- (1) An assurance that they will be suitably rewarded.
(2) An assurance the local Fascists will be hanged.
(3) Details of both, when completed.

1. Reference to your 393/17/CA dated 3 July 44.
2. I am not familiar with the organization mentioned or its component members, which makes it difficult to answer the first question of responsibility. In any event it may well be that at least the person locally in charge of the direction of the organization would be subject to suit even if the organization itself were not.
3. There would seem to be two types of insurance that may be taken out (a) workmen's compensation insurance to cover injuries to employees and (b) insurance against injuries to third persons or property of third persons. I am not familiar with insurance in Italy. Either Finance Sub-Commission or Industry & Commerce Sub-Commission would know something about Italian insurance.
4. As a practical matter, assuming the members of C.V.W.W. are organizations similar to the American Red Cross, I suggest the same enquiry be made at the American Red Cross where undoubtedly the whole field has been explored and appropriate means adopted.

3. In order to give soldiers and officers a proper incentive to do this work, which is much more strenuous than their daily duties, and to make it worth their while to look after Allied interests, it is necessary to compensate this military personnel to a certain extent. It is not necessary that they receive the full civilian rate, in fact, it would be a mistake to pay them that much. On the other hand it is to the benefit of the Allies to pay these soldiers sufficient to raise their scale of pay by 20 Lire a day and to pay officers a proportionate increase, say not to exceed 100 Lire per day.
4. The Italian Army is willing to release personnel for this duty and has no objection to their soldiers being paid in addition to their Army pay. Some soldiers in CATANZARO are now working for civilian firms and being paid. The Army Sub-Commission (Col. PDSLEY) has no objection. To give Italian military personnel a slight increase in pay will be much more economical than paying civilians. As an aside, the reduced amount of money put out for the same service will be an anti-inflation measure.
5. It is therefore recommended that this Region be authorized, with the approval of the Italian military authorities, obtained through the local representatives of the Army Sub-Commission, to hire Italian military personnel to perform work for which Allied personnel is not available, and to compensate them at the rate to not exceed 20 Lire per day for soldiers and 100 Lire per day for officers.





1. Reference Ref/166/20/CA of 2 April and enclosures relating to compensation of the widow of Giuseppe Carriero.

2. Letter from HQ Claims Commission, CMF, No. CH/41/C/25 of 22 March points out that the widow has no legal claim against the Allied Forces, and that any payment made her would have to be in the nature of a gratuity.

3. This Sub-Commission is, of course, not in a position to pass upon the merits of claims for reward such as are involved in this case and no means at present exist for payment. We have, however, suggested (Reference 13048/F of 17 March, addressed to Executive Commissioner) the establishment of a mechanism whereby rewards could be paid in cases in which Italian civilians perform acts of bravery or risk while aiding Allied Armies in the field. Such a mechanism might be expanded to cover the Carriero case if it were desired to do so.

With reference to the correspondence on File 173/CA, I am of the opinion that recognition should be given in the form of a reward both (a) to the families of Italian civilians who lose their lives while aiding the Allied Armies in the field; and (b) to Italian civilians who perform acts of bravery or risk their lives to aid the personnel or operations of the Allied forces.

As regards (a) I suggest that we should make a lump sum payment of 25,000 lire as compensation. This figure is based on, and is rather higher than, the scale laid down for fatal accidents to Italian farm workers.

As regards (b) I suggest that a cash reward of 5,000 lire should be made.

As we have no directive from the CCS authorizing such out-payments I should be grateful to receive general authority from the Chief Commissioner or from you signing on his behalf.

1. Forwarded herewith is letter No. 2201/52/A of 26 March, also letter for Hq. Claims Commission, CMP, No. CH/41/C/25 of 22 March; letter from HLO Region II, No. 2201/52 A of 15 March, and undated petitions and translation thereof made by Zara Albina Palmieri Vedova Carriero.

2. It would appear, from the record evidence submitted, that (1) Giuseppe Carriero was in the employ of ACC; (2) that during the course of said employment he rode in a jeep; (3) that thru no fault of his own the jeep became stalled in a desolate place and under severe weather conditions and (4) by reason of the last contributing factor, he suffered exposure and died.

3. Under the analysis made in par. 2 above, it would appear, the widow's petition is well founded.

4. Will you please advise how proper compensation may be paid the widow of Giuseppe Carriero?

2. The correspondence sent therewith is returned, as there is no possible way in which this Commission can deal with the petition.

2. Even if the deceased man had been a paid workman to assist in the requisitioning of mules, that type of employment would not entitle him to any compensation under the Workmens' Compensation Law of Italy. The only other form of claim which might lie against the Allied Forces is on the grounds of negligence, and the circumstances of the accident do not show any negligence.

4. While it is agreed that the case may be one for compassionate payment on policy grounds, it would appear that unless some instructions exist in your organisation to handle such matters, the widow can only be advised as to the position.

TO THE ALLIED MILITARY GOVERNMENT

I, the undersigned, Zara Albina Palmieri, vedova Carriero, living at Potenza, state as follows:

In the first days of the current month my husband, Avv. Giuseppe Carriero, was asked by the supply officer at A.M.G. Potenza, to requisition some miles necessary to the Allied Army. He explained that owing to the cold weather and to his old age, would be difficult to him but as the supply officer insisted in having him (my husband being in past time an Italian Captain appointed to a Requisition Commission), he could only obey and accept this office.

On the 4th of January 1944, he started requisitioning with a small car (camionetta Jeep) driven by an Indian soldier, kept at his disposal by A.M.G., and went to the Communes of Arighiano - Rusti - Bella - Baragiano.

On the 5th Jan. at 13:30 hrs he left Rusti by the same car, but on his way back to Potenza, near the locality Montechio, the car was blocked by snow storm or by a sudden of the engine. As it was extremely cold in that open country, more than 1000 meters in height, and the Indian driver to whom he could not speak, was unwilling to leave his car, we may think that my unlucky husband resolved to go and look for shelter. Presently the snow storm and the nervous breakdown caused by the unexpected accident made him loose his way and he proceeded farther into the country struggling hard with deep snow. His strength failed him, he probably got chilled and died miserably. It is stated that after about two days, his dead body was found at 600 or 700 meters from the place where the car was stopped. It appears that the Indian driver was suffering from a frost bitten arm or leg.

The tragic death of my husband left without assistance his beloved family, consisting of his wife and four unmarried daughters. A son of his is employed in Naples and another son, who is actually fighting the Germans with the Allied Army, has got his own family.

As it cannot be denied that my husband died during the execution of an order given by the Allied Military authorities and owing to the same requisition office, a kindly claim on behalf of my daughters and myself for an indemnity or a life annuity (pension).

I must add too that my husband, who was never inscribed in the Fascist Party and did never yield to intimidations of the same, was seriously hindered in his profession as a lawyer and could not attain the position to which he was entitled by his intelligence.

Therefore he died in poverty and left no money to his children.
