MacMillan, Vychinsky and others had an all day interview with leaders of sixth political parties.

a. President and Secretary of the Sixth Party Committee. This was formed before the armistice and reconstituted after the armistice as the Committee for the Liberation. That its views are divided. Some in principle are Royalists, some Republicans. This matter must be decided by the Italian people. King Victor has signed every Fascist decree and the people have no confidence in him. The committee, most public opinion and all parties demand his abdication and they wish a strong government and popular support for the government not forthcoming until after the abdication; this makes matters urgent. Complain their activities in Naples have been curbed. Vychinsky asked how you get public opinion; answer, "these views are in everybody's lips". Asked how did it work, the witness replied that the Crown Prince was a Fascist that a Regency would be needed. Asked by Vychinsky what recent; answer Some one said Badoglio form a committee of regency. Vychinsky asked "would abdication affect the loyalty and discipline of the troops"; answer: "On the contrary, volunteers would increase in numbers and some very senior officers may suggest to retain King Victor, but a regency would meet their case. The Navy is more royalist than the Army.

Daily wages too low, e.g., a professor's wage is only sufficient to buy a few potatoes, a great difference between provinces, a better distribution needed, and the grain ration is too small, and appeal to more grain impulse.

Unemployment heavy but less than previously.

The witness has no touch with Sicily or with other parts of

Italy. Their program has a new outlook, they have peasant and worker supporters.

b. Liberation Party - Florio. Their undertakings in agriculture which could be revived for

The housing crisis and overcrowding produce typhus. Figures are rising, now reach 28 cases per day.

The unemployed march out to the country, get a sack of potatoes, march many miles in order to make a living. Black market bread is 100 lire a kilo. The land fertility has been reduced by the "battaglia di grano".

c. Rector of University. A Christian democrat. Wants a strong government to wage allied war. Wants abdication of King and Crown Prince with Regency for Prince of Naples by the Christians. Must be reserved for the whole Italian people to decide. Shortage of good men due to 20 years of Fascism. A strong government must be created. To decide the question of monarchy after the liberation. Urgent need for a "depurazione". The Regent could be a member of the House of Savoy, not the Duke of Aosta, but the Duke of Genoa. Unless the constitution is changed Humbert automatically becomes king on the abdication of Victor. Under the constitution the Regent should be the nearest relative who has not renounced the crown. This would be the Duke of Aosta but he should be forced to make way for the Duke of Genoa as the last compromise of the royalists.

Although they do not like it they recognize the sad necessity for the foreign allied governments to get rid of Victor and Humbert for them by moral pressure.

There is not yet freedom of press, meetings and no communications. Parties are therefore handicapped in their activities.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF CIVIL AFFAIRS.

SUBJECT: Educational Reconnaissance and Administration in Occupied Areas.

1. Constructive criticism of the Educational Reconnaissance preparatory to the occupation of Sicily, and recommendations as to planning for educational administration in areas yet to be liberated are contained in the attached report (Tab A) of Major G. E. Zookman, Chief of the Education Division, Region I.

2. The attached booklet "Programmi Di Studio" (Tab B) was prepared and distributed for the AMG. It is designed to replace instructions previously issued by fascist educators. The "avvertenza" found on page 3, a translation of which follows, indicates the purpose of this publication.

"This is the program for the scholastic year 1943-44 for all the schools of liberated Italy. It was prepared by commissions of officers, scholastic functionaries, professors and elementary teachers, and consists of two parts: the first is the basic program--that is, the old program well known by all teachers but without the fascist element; the second is the work of an eminent pedagogue of an Italian university, which tends to orient teaching towards a more modern sense of culture nearer to the world democratic movement. Teachers that feel themselves prepared for this can advance gradually this orientation."

3. It is further explained in the "Programma" (page 3), that the scope of these programs is to indicate to the teacher what results the State expects from his work for each school year, at the same time leaving him free to determine for himself how these results can be best attained. Each subject treated in the curriculum is discussed in a general way in the "avvertenza Generale" (pages 11 to 13), while the various programs for each of the five classes are discussed in more detail in the rest of the volume.

4. The second volume mentioned on page 3 of the "Programmi Di Studio" was printed, but before distribution could be made, it was discovered that it had to be withdrawn for correction. The "Concordato del Vaticano" between the Pope and the Italian government provides that religious instruction in Italian elementary schools should be obligatory, but Volume II contained a statement to the effect that religious instruction was optional. In order to avoid any confusion or bad feeling this volume was corrected.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF CIVIL AFFAIRS DIVISION.

SUBJECT: Damage to Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives by Allied Troops in Sicily and Italy.

1. In spite of the efforts of the President of the United States, and of the American Commission for the Protection and Salvage of Artistic and Historical Monuments in Europe, of which Mr. Justice Owen D. Roberts is chairman, and of the work of the American Council of Learned Societies, and the American Defense Committee on the Protection of Monuments, and of other groups of the United Nations, and of the Civil Affairs Division of the War Department in making available qualified experts for duty in Sicily and Italy, there is a mass of tragic evidence of vandalism and looting and careless damage or destruction of historical monuments, of priceless art treasures, scientific collections and irreplaceable libraries.

2. Damage was done from the walls in the Royal Palace in Naples. More than a hundred microscopes in the University of Naples were robbed of essential parts; one instrument valued at 1,000,000 lire before the war was ruined; rare stuffed birds from the museum were taken to decorate barrack rooms and thrown out in the weather when their new owners grew tired of looking at them; paintings were cut from their frames in private villas; boxes of paintings and other art treasures that had been packed and stored for safe keeping or removal were broken open and the contents removed or damaged; 18th Century chairs from the Royal Palace were used for GI camp furniture.

3. These and many other stories are freely circulated; most of it is verified by AFSA; much of it I have seen. Aside from the aesthetic and moral considerations, the judgment before the war of world opinion, and the cost in claims, it is also a fact that monuments, fine arts and archives represent Italy's greatest economic assets.

4. While all of this was going on, the AFSA officers were not at the front. They were at Elzi Gusea and in Sicily! Even the Regional AFSA officers were not with troops. Most of the damage, it is said, was done in the first ten days, but not so much, in the opinion of at least one Civil Affairs officer, by combat troops as by the first service troops immediately following. In Sicily, it was said, most of the damage was done by combat troops and by civilians. In the opinion of officers interviewed, 90% of the damage is due to ignorance and lack of discipline, 10% is due to deliberate looting, and most of all of it is preventable.

5. Two instances of deliberate vandalism are reported during the German occupation: one, the burning of the collections of the Royal Society of Naples and the other, the burning of the State Archives of Naples together with the most valuable treasures from Count Pallagieri's private collection. Both were said to be in retaliation for alleged crimes committed in the vicinity.

6. Lt. Colonel Sir Leonard Woolley, Archaeological Advisor to the PCA, came out from the War Office in London, and initiated a letter which was transmitted to the C-in-C as a result of which a Commission of Inquiry was appointed on 28 Decem-

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ber 1943, consisting of Major General Collier (British), Colonel Mullis, of the American Claims Commission, Lt. Colonel Macgibbon, of the British Claims Commission, Major Theodore Sizer, (American), and Captain Farrell, (British). This commission is now conducting its inquiry in Naples.

7. Attached is an excellent memorandum by Captain Mason Hammond on "Needs of the AMG Sub-Commission and Regional officers for NFASA, with appendix 1 giving a list of NFASA personnel in the theatre, and appendix 2, a memorandum by Captain Hammond on "Damage to Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives by Allied Troops in Sicily". Because of the forthcoming report of the Commission of Inquiry, no report has been prepared on the damage to NFASA in Italy.

8. It will be noted that among other important recommendations Captain Hammond proposes that a Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives officer be assigned to the Civil Affairs Division of the War Department, whose sole duty would be in connection with this work. He also recommends that greater effort be made to secure the issuance of orders to tactical troops down to the smallest unit commander for the protection of NFASA during the first stages of occupation, and that NFASA officers be assigned or attached to AMG headquarters in the military operational headquarters.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF CIVIL AFFAIRS DIVISION.

SUBJECT: Meeting of Civil Affairs Officers of Palermo Province, 19 December 1943.

1. Attached is a copy of the agenda of a typical conference of Provincial Civil Affairs officers (Palermo Province, 19 Dec. 1943). Colonel R. V. Jordan, chief regular officer, who had been serving as SCAG during the illness of Major Gorman, presided and reported on the recent conference of SCAGs. He explained that the forthcoming turn-over to the Italian government would not mark the end of the work of the SCAGs but a transition to a new phase and a change of emphasis. He discussed conditions in the Province which he regarded as improving. It was suggested a check list be prepared of the duties of SCAGs on the occasion of the turn-over of authority to the Italian government.

2. The crime situation was discussed and jail contacts recommended for curfew violators. There was a report of increased counterfeiting of AM currency which first took the form of raising of notes by amateur but now revealed a professional technique.

3. The critical food situation was the subject of considerable discussion. The time for the collection of the 50-30 kg contribution from the retention of wheat allowed growers and tenants for personal consumption had been extended to 15 December. The question was what to do with those who failed to comply. The sentiment of those present was unanimously opposed to the use of troops but favored strict control on the millers, a report by the Carabinieri or those failing to comply, vigorous prosecution of the guilty, and a gesture to those that did comply - e.g., fertilizer distribution for the new crop only to those complying.

4. The suggested use of the "Scheda Personale" for the "vetting" of Italian office holders and other civilians was commented on favorably. This is discussed in a separate report.

5. In the discussion of educational matters complaint was expressed at the Army occupying school buildings in Sicily at this late date. A suggestion was made for the use of Gioventù Italiana del Littorio funds for scholarships for Italians similar to the Owen and Rhodes scholarships.

6. A report was made of the progress of road repair work. It was pointed out that in addition to demolition by the Germans, road maintenance has been neglected in Sicily in recent years. The principal bottle necks in road repair work was lack of materials, especially cement, and transportation. Road repair was being used for some of the bridges and the Army had furnished some materials for the more urgently needed repairs. The general subject of road maintenance and internal transportation in Sicily is dealt with in another report.

1. This officer has been with A.M.G. Eighth Army for a period of 4 months, during which his work in the field has been carefully observed. As the result of observation, it is considered that he is of a type and temperament totally unsuited for work in Military Government.
2. This officer entirely lacks any administrative ability or initiative, and he is unable to deal satisfactorily with normal administrative problems, in addition he has failed to carry out his instructions in certain matters of procedure, such as the use of the proper pass forms and legal forms, both of which were in his possession.
3. In fairness to him, it should be stated that since landing in Italy last year, he was involved in a serious motor-accident when he suffered a broken leg and head injuries. It may, therefore, well be that his unsatisfactory work can be attributed to reasons of ill-health, resulting from this accident.
4. In view of the foregoing and my entire lack of confidence in this officer may the necessary measures please be taken to replace him in this formation.

It is important, therefore, that the Commissioner himself should be free to leave his HQ for considerable periods and that his 2 i/c should be competent to carry on and make decisions in his absence.

2. I had some dealings with Lieutenant Commander MUSMANNO about four months ago. He did not make a good impression. At the Naples Conference, however, he was recommended as suitable for retention at Bari.

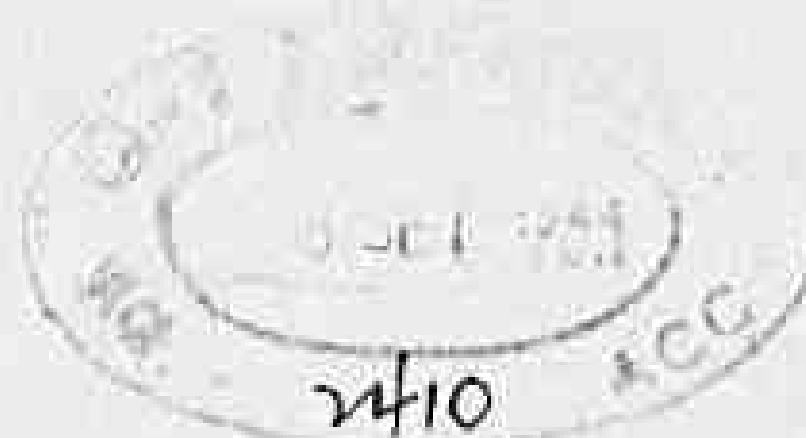
3. My original opinion has now been confirmed by a number of officers who have been associated with him. It is considered that, while Lieutenant Commander MUSMANNO would do very well in an active job requiring initiative up north, he lacks the application and balance necessary for the position of sole assistant to the Commissioner of Bari "Zone".

4. This is not an adverse report on Lieutenant Commander MUSMANNO, but a request that he should be substituted by a steadier officer, if this is at all possible.

TO : Director, Agriculture Sub Commission, ACC

1. In compliance with your request for a report regarding Lt. N. J. Barbato, recently assigned to duty at this office under my supervision, I regret to report that he is not suited to the type of work required.

a Lacking training or experience in business, the officer is unable to effectively execute assignments of a routine nature. To assist the Federation in the location of warehouse facilities, or in the verification of availability of binder twine, the officer is required to either know from experience, or from native ability, the way to work with both military and civilian groups and obtain sound information.

b Lacking self-control in the execution of assignments, the maintenance of an impersonal attitude seems extremely difficult for the officer when dealing with Italians. It is deemed essential in this work that a fair hearing be given in all cases of controversy, and judgement be reserved - but the officer's emotional condition or his previous connections among the Italians have made it impossible to defer responsibility of contact with civilians to him, because in several instances lack of self-control has required intervention to effect a clear understanding. It is to be noted that the officer is deeply concerned with personal problems that have no relation to this office, and that may be a factor.

2. It is requested that the officer be relieved from his present assignment, and it is recommended that consideration be given to relief from ACC work, for possibly because of his excellent knowledge of the language or his extreme youth, his approach seems to be entirely too personal to be sound.

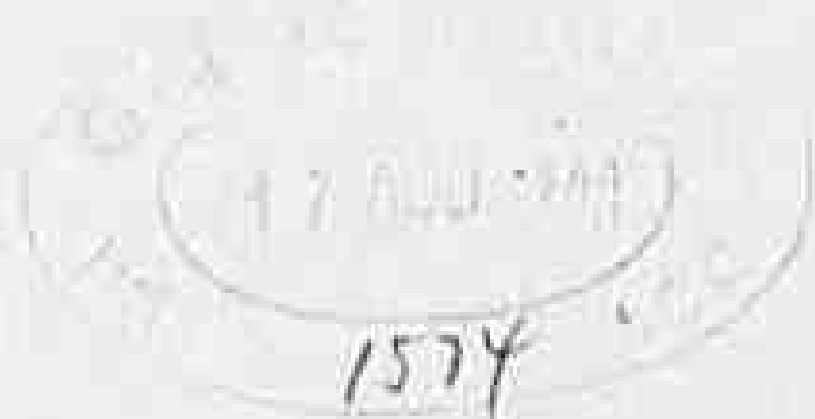

1. On 10 August 1944 at 1100 hours a meeting was held in the office of Marchese Farace to organize an Italian Government Requisitioning Agency to screen requests for the requisitioning of civilian vehicles on behalf of Ministries of the Italian Government.

2. The meeting was attended by 1st Lt. F. J. Amoroso, Asst. G-4, ACC. General Petterelli Lallata appointed President of Requisitioning Agency and Marchese Farace, Liaison Representative of Italian Government to ACC. Two additional members to the Requisitioning Agency to be appointed.

3. Policy and procedure to be adopted and enforced by the newly created Agency were explained by Lt. Amoroso; which included preparing requisition forms, processing of same; procedure to be followed in obtaining circulation permits for the requisitioned cars. The new Italian State Service sticker to be placed on the vehicles above the regular circulation permits was also discussed.

4. The Italian Government Requisitioning Agency will be located at the Palazzo Viminale, Rome, in Room 11.

5. The meeting terminated at 1245 hours and the undersigned assured both General Petterelli Lallata and Marchese Farace that the G-4 office would be happy to advise General Petterelli Lallata and his staff on any matters arising in connection with their new task and help them in any way possible.

1. Reference is made to my letter ref. 16031/1/G-1, subject WE/TO - Ho Allied Control Commission, dated 24 April 1944. While the total officer strength of Allied Control Commission now approaches the ceiling set in my letter, there are serious deficiencies in Specialist Officers necessary for the efficient functioning of the Commission. We have been unable to obtain these Specialist Officers in this theatre and urgently request that you make every effort to obtain these officers for us from the United States or the United Kingdom. The specialists required are as follows:

Agriculture - total 10 officers

- a. 1 Experienced Agricultural Economist - not above rank of Major.
- b. 2 Experienced Crop Estimators - not above rank of Major.
- c. 1 Forestry Administrator - not above rank of Major.
- d. 6 General Agriculturists with specific knowledge of the industry and practical experience in "field" operations - not above the rank of Captain.

Public Works and Utilities - total 26 officers

- a. 1 Experienced Public Works Officer as assistant to the Chief in charge of the Public Works Division. Extended experience necessary in charge of Public Works, such as Water, Sewers, Gas, Streets, and Buildings - Major.
- b. 1 Materials and Supply Officer. A qualified engineer with construction experience and Construction Material supply - Captain or Lieutenant.
- c. 1 Building Construction Officer. A qualified engineer with practical experience in Building Construction - Captain or Lieutenant.
- d. 1 Designing Engineer. An engineer experienced in structural theories and design with drafting room procedure experience - Captain or Lieutenant.
- e. 4 Public Works Engineers with experience in responsible charge of such installations as Water, Sewers, Gas, Streets, and Buildings. General engineering and construction experience is preferred if specialists are not available - 1 Major, 3 Junior Officers.
- f. 6 Electrical Engineers with the experience of electrical distribution problems, operation and maintenance of distribution systems, sub-stations, power flow calculations and consumers records - 1 Major, 5 Junior Officers.

- g. 12 General Engineers with basic knowledge and experience in all phases of Highway and Bridge Construction - Junior Officers.

Labor - total 22 Officers.

The qualification requirement is for thoroughly competent officers who are properly trained labor men with actual experience in the many phases of Organization, negotiation, and Control of labor problems - Junior Officers preferred.

2. The Vice President of the Economic Section assures me that these officers are needed for operation in the field, and that they cannot be efficiently replaced by civilian specialists. It might be possible that civilians could replace a, b, and c, of the agricultural requirements but this is not recommended. A small percentage of both the Public Works and Utilities and Labor Officers might be civilians but effectiveness would be less than if they were commissioned officers. If the addition of these specialists should increase the strength of AGC over that in the reference letter, officers of general qualifications can be released for other assignment to keep our strength within the required limit. It is quite probable that this will be unnecessary due to normal losses from our present strength.

It must be appreciated that the low ceiling placed on our strength requires that the officers assigned be highly specialized and highly efficient.

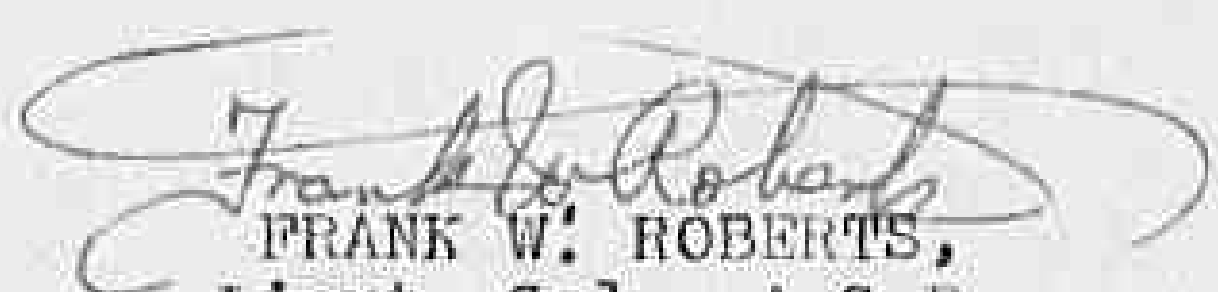

It is believed that these two groups are not units under the regulation governing battle participation awards and therefore are not entitled to unit battle honors.
3. If Allied Military Mission and Headquarters AMGOT, Sicily were activated units, it is recommended that a new communication be originated outlining in full the details of organization, dates these units were in battle areas; percentage of assigned personnel present in the battle area and such other information as would justify including them among the units entitled to battle participation awards.
4. Individuals who served under competent orders in Sicily or in Italy are entitled to battle stars regardless of their assignment status. Mere membership in a unit entitled to battle honors does not of itself entitle the individual to a battle star. He must have been physically present in the prescribed area to receive such an award.

1. This is in reference to our conversation relative to the inadequacy of Legion of Merit Award quotas for Army and Navy personnel of the Allied Control Commission through the 2675th Regiment.
2. It appears that a quota of one award (enlisted man) has been allotted to the 2675th Regiment for period ending 31 May 1944. Attached for your information is copy of letter 200.6 Hq 2675th Regiment dated 11 March with three indorsements. The quota was allotted in the 2nd Ind. Also attached is copy of letter dated 28 March 44 from the Regiment to "All Concerned".
3. Allotments of a certain number of awards to major commands are to be made each three months by Hq NATOUSA under provisions of paragraph 2c, Circular Number 26, Hq NATOUSA, 6 March 1944.

The Board is authorized to deal directly with the Commanding General, Fifth Army, the Commanding General, Rome Area Command, the Commanding General, MAAF, and such other commands as may be necessary to secure essential witnesses and evidence. All movements of the Board and its members into and within Rome will be coordinated by the Commanding General, Fifth Army, who is requested to facilitate the activities of Board to the greatest extent practicable.

3. Evidence will be as comprehensive as the requirements for expeditious completion of the inventory report permits. The gist of all pertinent testimony will be recorded, and all pertinent documents and written records will be incorporated in the record of proceedings. It is stressed that photographs, sketches and diagrams are of great assistance in securing clarity of understanding. Ten complete copies of the report of proceedings will be furnished CG Headquarters, Allied Armies in Italy.

4. If in the opinion of the Board a partial or preliminary report of the findings of the Board is desirable such a report will be rendered.

5. The report is intended to cover damage, whether direct or indirect due to aerial bombardment to non-military objectives. If there is doubt as to where damage is due to aerial bombardment or as to whether the objective was a true military one the report will include such cases in the inventory with proper explanatory remarks.

6. The report of inventory will contain no findings of praise or criticism of bombing or other military action and no recommendation as to repair or rehabilitation of any damaged objectives. Any military lessons learned from the survey or any conclusions reached by individual members of the Board may be transmitted by those individual members to their respective commanders for such separate action as may be desirable.

1. Higher headquarters has authorized direct communication on matters of routine between Hq. A.C.C. and the British and American Governments at London and Washington. Matters of routine are interpreted to include technical matters of interest to various ministries, departments and agencies of the respective governments.

2. Any matters to be communicated directly must be authorized by a Vice President or an officer authorized by him for the purpose, and will be dispatched by the Secretary General. A copy of each such communication will be kept as a part of the records of Hq. A.C.C.

3. For general instructions and directives and all matters of policy the channel of communication remains through AFHQ to and from the combined Chiefs of Staff.

If there was no armies occupation the king would be forced to go at once under pressure of public opinion. It is the protection of the Allies that keeps him there. Witness made general attack on the under-secretaries and general Army and Navy officers who had been appointed. Regency a possibility but the king had violated the constitution and all royalists were compromised. For head an eminent man must be chose; for example, Curci. Witness does not think rank and file of the service are royalists. A puratation of higher ranks needed.

Sforza and Curci would do to start a government, afterwards men from the north would arrive. Prices no means of organizing public opinion and king is surrounded by Fascists.

e. Porzio - Labor Socialist. - Present ration 125 grams a day and not every day. People very disappointed after the Allied promises, no meat, no milk for children, no medicine, bad houses. Coal lacking although gas supply repaired after the Germans have left not operating; no soap, clothes and underclothes lacking, impossible to fill their needs from the provinces. The Fascists have closed each province as a war measure. Wants the currency stabilized otherwise wage rates cannot be fixed. Expenditure of USA soldier about \$2 a day; this raises prices. 100,000 skilled munitions workers formerly available now unemployed.

Wants more liberty for the general meetings, etc., in Naples. The police soaked in Fascism. Italian soldiers need arms and they would fight. Demands a left wing government and work with the Liberation Committee. Abdication of the king made of secondary importance by the ⁹¹⁸urgence. They are republicans and want a government of parties, not men. Names suggested: Sinbona, Nigni, or the witness himself, Porzio. Party membership 3,000.

f. Communist: - Dr. Reale. Wants democratic government and abdication of the king. Puration should be started with the king, otherwise a sham. Badoglio hasnt a single anti-Fascist. Naples Committee in disagreement with the AMG as to constitution of Puration Commission. AMG insists on Prefect being on the commission but he is an old Fascist and he himself should go.

It is impossible to get war volunteers if they must fight for Badoglio whose officers are Fascist. There has been no puration of the Army or the Navy. Referred to the disbandment of the volunteer corps under General Pavoni in Naples (NOTE: This appears to be due to the heavy pay they demanded). These volunteers would turn into an Italian army under oath of allegiance to the king. Italians regard ex-Fascist officers as still being Hitler's agents.

Witness could name no party leaders, stated they are in the North, America, Tunis and Russia, they wont come back. They want this government at once. Willing to wait to settle the monarchy question till the whole of Italy can decide. Badoglio could be regent, or Sforza. Important thing is that the government is to have a left wing program: confiscation of war fortunes, etc.

Wants freedom of the press and pamphlets. There are underground papers, but at Bari a communist paper is allowed.

Black market bread 100 to 120 lire a kilogram. Should be brought from the provinces. The political promises made to Italy have not been kept. The unemployed walk into the country and get food for sale as described by a previous witness.

g. Democratic Labor. The man's name was Florencio Cerobuona. Formerly a socialist reformist. Party of Buonami and Bissoleti, middle group.; king and prince must go. He does not object to regency. Quest-

ion of monarchy must wait till Italy is free, but they are republicans.

They want the Allies to get rid of Victor who is determined to remain. The regency must not become itself a party government, but the government must be of all parties. Badoglio has put monarchists in the government and carries on propaganda for the monarchy. Many Fascists appointed. Unless they are rooted out they will come out again as soon as they can get a chance. Food situation in Naples very bad. Oil (240 lire) a litre, bread 150 to 160 lire a kilogram, coal 15 to 18 lire a kilogram.

b. Ex service men and mutilati. Non political but members of the Liberation Committee. In order to provide national unity demand that the big Fascists should be punished like the little ones. Their appeal to the soldier has been made to them, not as soldiers of the king but as soldiers of Italy. Demand that the king and crown prince should go at once. General question can wait till after the war. In the province of Naples there are 20,000 ex service men and 11,000 mutilati. These two witnesses have replaced the Fascist leaders of the organization and themselves are carrying out a purazione, and demand a free press.

1. Allied Advisory Council examined Badoglio, Reale - Interior, Cuomo - Education, and Jung - Finance. Badoglio wants to participate actively in the war. For example, has troops in Sardinia and wants arms for them. Already the Italian Air Forces and the Navy are fighting. The Italian troops would be better than the Allies in the mountains.

"All parties are united against the Germans, the Royalist would give loyal cooperation, but don't treat me as an enemy, treat me as a friend and an old soldier". To discuss Italians without Italian participation not a friendly act. (Apparently wishes membership of the Advisory Council). Emphasized the fact that all Mediterranean interests

were one.

MacMillan seemed to reply that the Advisory Council should have consulted the Italian government, who could not be members of it, but what may come of that impossible to say. MacMillan asked "does the type of government in the south and alleged contentions of fascism affect the morale on the other side of the line". Badoglio replies "fascism has permeated every organization, could not be eradicated all at once. Government influence restricted by lack of communications. Government at present is in Brindisi, Bari, Lecce and Salerno. Badoglio wants to go to Salerno but first the province must be handed over then his government would be all together.

Vychinsky explained ACC is not to govern but to advise. Badoglio replies "we can give better information on Italy because we are Italians". They want membership of the council. Cites the safety of which dumps of ammunition enjoy unguarded.

Vychinsky points out only three ministers, all the rest under-secretaries. Can Badoglio come to terms with Committee of Liberation which opposes the government. National union needed. Badoglio replied the leaders are at Rome just waiting for a government embracing the leaders of all the parties to present to the king. The two aims of the present government are anti-Fascist, anti-German. Badoglio says he is a soldier not a politician and wants to give up his task. Cannot form a real government in Salerno

All parties desire national unity. Vychinsky asks have the party leaders their conditions. Badoglio replies if he cant accept their conditions he will ask other people. Vychinsky but the conditions come from parties not from individuals. Badoglio, some parties are all center and no supporters. The liberals, the Christians, Democrats and social Communists are the real parties.

Badoglio says the king requires for unity, e.g., Army and Navy. Reale supports him, though a republican. Reale declares the opposition to the king strengthens the government. Later the people would be free. The question is not urgent and could be settled a year hence. Cuomo says parties are sectional, the government has only two aims: Anti-Fascist, anti-Hun. Jung expresses his agreement with the Marshal. Badoglio makes it clear that when Italy is free he still desires to be allowed to fight with the Allies.

Monday 10 January Advisory Council interviews Badoglio and the government.
We explained findings.

Tuesday 11 January. Gredy, Taylor, Spofford and Stensgate to Universal
to meet MacMillan and commission. Discuss only the best form of orgen-
ization of ACC work. Report from Makins to follow.

Wednesday 12 January Meeting of Central Economic Committee that Stensgate
attended Committee decided prices of oil, wheat, coal and other commod-
ities. The chairman had made it clear that it was a coordinating com-
mittee and indicated that within a month or so, it would hand over to
ACC.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF, CIVIL AFFAIRS DIVISION.

SUBJECT: Insurance Problems in Occupied Areas.

1. Reference is made

- a. To the undersigned's memorandum of 16 November 1943, "Insurance Problems in Occupied Areas".
- b. To the memorandum on the same subject addressed to Mr. George L. Harrison by 1st Lt. Adrian S. Fisher dated 27 November 1943, and
- c. To OEW report 166 "Private Insurance in Italy: Recommendation and Guide".

2. These documents have been reviewed with finance officers in this theatre and particularly with Lt. Colonel Carl Miller, Comptroller, Financial Institutions, AMG/ACC. The principal recommendation of OEW Report 166 is the appointment of a coordinator of insurance by "the United Nations for the purpose of supervising all insurance agencies of the Italian State, coordinating the efforts of United Nations agencies in the field of insurance and performing other duties as are enumerated herein. The coordinator should be assisted by a staff of insurance experts who are citizens of the United Nations". It is the opinion of the Comptroller of Financial Institutions, AMG/ACC, in which the undersigned concurs, that this is unnecessary and unwise for the following reasons:

- a. The Finance Sub-Commission, through the Comptroller of Financial Institutions, has ample power to deal with the problem, to the extent of the area under its jurisdiction.
- b. That the recommendation is contrary to the established policy of restoring the Italian economy through the Italian institutions functioning under the supervision and in accordance with policies of the United Nations. As to recommendation No. 8 of the OEW Report that the coordinator should permit branches of insurance companies whose home offices are in the enemy occupied area to operate in the liberated area, the Comptroller of Financial Institutions is working on this problem. It is hoped that it may be possible to create a pool which would permit branch offices to collect premiums and pay claims, financing their operations through the banks with the aid of the Italian Government, if necessary AMFA furnishing funds as needed for this purpose for the account of the Italian Government.

3. The recommendation for a pool for new life insurance business is not considered practicable from an underwriting standpoint. Provision can be made for the writing of new life business by Italian companies as soon as Rome is occupied. The important thing is to protect existing equities and pay claims in the meantime. This can be done under the arrangements proposed by the Finance Sub-Commission.

4. As to recommendation No. 5, that the German insurance assets should be immediately sequestered, this has been done.

5. With the statement of the problem by 1st Lieutenant Fisher, the undersigned and the Comptroller of Financial Institutions are in agreement, with the following exceptions:

a. In paragraph 6 Lieutenant Fisher states that "issue must be taken however with the statement in Colonel Glabaugh's Memorandum of 16 November 1943, that economic warfare measures are outside the field of Civil Affairs". Lieutenant Fisher obviously misread this part of the memorandum of 16 November which stated: "Economic warfare measures, e.g., acting to embarrass German companies by making it difficult for them to replace with neutrals the reinsurance formerly carried with Italian companies.....is outside the field of Civil Affairs". Lieutenant Fisher states "the Finance Sub-Commission clearly has power to compel the use of the finance power of the Italian companies in the manner most hostile to the enemy". Agreed. And this has been done by the severance of relations between the Italian and German companies under the "trading with the enemy" provisions. However, the statement in my memorandum of 16 November had to do with efforts to prevent insurance companies in neutral countries, e.g., Zurich, Switzerland, from accepting the German reinsurance formerly ceded to the Italian companies. This is a diplomatic and economic warfare measure to be undertaken in neutral countries and is entirely outside the scope or reach of the Civil Affairs Division and military government in the occupied areas.

b. It is considered that the present authority of the Finance Sub-Commission is ample to take whatever steps are necessary and practicable to re-establish some form of commercial insurance in liberated Italy on a temporary basis until such time as all Italy comes under the jurisdiction of the Italian government and A.G.C. Until the Allies control all of Italy, any arrangements are a temporary makeshift and stop-gap until the head offices of the three leading companies (one at Rome and two at Trieste) come within the jurisdiction of the Italian government.

c. Of course, in all of the foregoing it must be realized that at present the Finance Sub-Commission has no authority to deal with Regions 3 and 4, which are under the jurisdiction of the 15th Army Group.
