With reference to our to-day's conversation regarding my appli= cation for a post with the Foreign Trade Section, I beg to give you below, as requested, a short report on my past activities: Date and place of birth: 28.5.10, London (British Subject). Address in England: 8, Thurlby Rd., London S.E.27. Education: Dulwich College, London, 1924-27; Ecole Supérieure de Commerce, Lausanne, 1927-30. I speak and write English, French, Italian, German and Spanish. Business career: 1930-33. With King, David & Co., Genoa, Agents for Italy of the Royal Netherlands Steamship Company, the Holland-America Line, the Holland-British India Line and the North German Iloyd. My father was the London partner of this firm up to his death in 1930. I gained considerable experience in shipping and operations in the Port of Genoa during my 3 years with this firm. 1933-36. With L. Schumacher & Co., Genoa, a Swiss firm of For= warding and Shipping Agents. In this firm I held the post of manager of the department for Italian and Swiss exports to the U.S.A., Africa, British India, Australia and the Far East. During these three years I gained a thorough insight into Ita= lian industry and commerce. 1936- June, 1940. Buying Agent in Italy, France, Germany and Czechoslovakia for John E. Dallas & Sons, Ltd., Ridgmount St., London W.C.1 (now at Cray Avenue, St. Mary Cray Kent) and the Carl Fischer Musical Instrument Co., Inc., 56-62, Cooper Square, New York, the largest distributors of musical instruments in Great Britain and the United States respectively; also for T. Garratt, Johannesburg, H. Parsonage & Co., Sydney and "Casa America", Buenos Aires, in Italy only. For this purpose I took 2709

up my residence in Osimo (Ancona). My annual buying in Italy amounted to approximately Lit. 10'000'000.- pre-war currency. France, Germany and Czechoslovakia together accounted for a similar amount. I travelled extensive= ly during this period, visiting London and Paris five times a year. In 1938 I spent six weeks in New York and Chicago. My yearly income from all my clients amounted to \$7500.- pre-war currency. During this period I acquir= ed valuable experience in banking, insurance and foreign currency transactions.

1939- Sept., 1943. I left Italy in August, 1939, but returned at my firms' request in September of the same year. In spring, 1940 I began to collaborate with the British Consul, Florence, on contraband control (Certificates of Origin and Interest for musical instruments). I was of= fered the post of Hon. British Vice-Consul in Ancona in this connection in May, 1940. I accepted and remained in Italy, expecting that the appointment would come through immediately and thus save me from the possibility of intern= ment in case of war being declared. My appointment did not come through before 10th June, however. I was arrested on that day, at 18.40 hrs. and imprisoned, then confined and subsequently interned in the Concentration Camp of Monte= chiarugolo (Parma). In 1942 I was able to see my dossier and gathered that my relations with the Consul in Florence were known to the Italian authorities and that I was suspect= ed of espionage.

Sept., 1943 - Dec., 1944. On 10.9.43 I escaped from the Concentration Camp and got through the lines on 9.7.44, reaching Rome. I endeavoured to return to England, which proved to be impossible. Thereupon I tried to join up in Italy, also unsuccessfully. I volunteered for service with special units, but at that time the general opinion was that the war would be over in a matter of months, so my applica= tions were not taken into consideration. Finally I obtain= ed a post with the Information Division of A.C.C. on 8.8.44, whilst endeavouring to get in touch with my brother, whom I finally traced at P.O.Box 111, Bletchley, Bucks (Capt. J.W. Liebi - German Intelligence). Through him I obtained the post of Civilian Intelligence Officer in P.W.B. on 8.9.44, where I am at present.

The reason why I am applying for a post is because I feel that my knowledge and experience could be put to much better use in your Section than in my present position. It has also been suggested that I should take up the post of Vice-Con= sul in a city further North, where I could do more than in P.W. B., but I consider that this post as well would not enable me
