1. It is respectfully submitted that the proposed establishment for S-2, Liaison Hqs. at Livorno, of 2 officers and 3 enlisted men is too small.
2. The Livorno Hqs. will liaison all of Tuscana as well as P.S.S. Then too, it must be considered that the Port of Leghorn, the large military installations, and the troop concentration in the area add to the problems with which the Hqs. will be confronted. Also most of the military installations of Naples will be moved to Leghorn.
3. I am frank to say that it is beyond my comprehension (and I am thoroughly familiar with the duties and work involved) why there should be any difference in the size of Bologna's and Livorno's Liaison Groups. Nor can I comprehend why Naples needs 10 E/A - O/A's while Livorno is expected to get along on 3 E/A - O/A's.
4. I recommend that, exclusive of the Warehouse and Post Liaison Staff, that the complement for Livorno be set at four officers, and five enlisted personnel, to be assigned as follows:

1 S-2 Liaison Officer	-	1st Lt. M.P. Reilly. (A)
3 Public Safety L.O.	-	Capt. Stanley Beatty. (A)
1 Administration Officer.	-	1st Lieut. Charles J. Bayles. (A)
1 Legal L.O.	-	1

Eric Feldman, Yugoslav Royal Army, 353, expatriate serving as a civilian employee, in the capacity of Executive Legal Assistant, is handling the Livorno S.M.G. Legal Office most efficiently. Lt. Feldman, who is a lawyer, has served the Legal Subcommittee for two years past. If he could remain in Livorno, no American or British legal officer would be needed.

1st Lieut. Bayles acts as the Sub-Secretary for this Hq. and is also the acting V.T.O., and assists on P.D.I. and D.P. matters.

As to E/A's and O/A's the minimum needs are as follows.

1 Sgt. - to serve as Chief Clerk. Cpl. C.F.J. Bull (R) serves in that capacity now. He should remain, and receive a greatly deserved promotion.

1. Reference is made to para 1d of your Report No. 2175/451 of 22 October.
2. The information available at this Headquarters as to Captain Ingrascia is as follows:

"Captain Ingrascia joined USG in August 1943 and was sent to Sicily. In the fall of 1943 (exact date unknown) he was sent to the Island of Lampedusa as CAG. This island has always been under the jurisdiction of USG in Sicily. As a result, all administrative matters concerning Captain Ingrascia were taken up with the Regional Commissioner there. Reports of his work sent to this office were always graded excellent or better. In the summer of 1944 he was recommended for promotion from the grade of Lt. to Capt. This promotion was effected in September 1944. Shortly thereafter the need for qualified CAG's for the Northern Regions caused the Allied Commission to transfer Captain Ingrascia from Lampedusa and assign him to Lombardy Region. 

Pantelleria and Lampedusa.

To: 1- H.Q. Allied Commission, LPO 154.

1. INTRODUCTION.

(a) On 12th September 43, I took over from Lt-Col Ingham as Liaison Officer for the whole Island of Sicily. Major Bentley left Catania on 14th September 43, and the Catania office was closed on 17th September 43. Capt. Moore left Lampedusa on 17th September 43 and took sick in a private house, he reported on 13th September and was sent to Hospital suffering from Malaria. A request was made to G-1 B for another Officer to take his place as Capt. Moore was not allowed to undertake a sea voyage before the expiration of 30 days from 18th September 43. Capt. Parker was relieved at Pantelleria by Lt. Wilkie on 12 September; the latter carried with him an order for Capt. Parker to go to Lampedusa, pursuant to request to G-1 B. However, as Capt. Parker gave several reasons for not carrying out this order, I sent word for him to come to Palermo and then report to Rome.

(b) I visited the two islands of Pantelleria and Lampedusa in a motor launch loaned by the British Navy. The trip took 6 days because of bad weather but a great deal was learned from it. For instance, I have found that an Anson aeroplane can land on Lampedusa and a Halibut can easily land on Pantelleria. The R.I.P. will assist us by flying an Anson once every 3 weeks. This will enable the CGO to get a day or two on the island occasionally - a much needed holiday as I have never seen a more desolate spot than Lampedusa and Pantelleria is not very different. There is said to be some on each island and Lt. Wilkie is doing exceedingly well to date on Pantelleria. I suggest that only CGOs who can speak Italian be sent to the islands as there are NO interpreters.

(c) I feel that there should be a British soldier on each island with the Officers, or at least one who can move between the islands to

For instance, I have found that an Amazon aeroplane can land on Lampedusa and a Belliniere can easily land on Pantelleria. The R.A.F. will assist us by flying an Amazon once every 3 weeks. This will enable the HQ to get a day or two on the mainland occasionally - a much needed holiday as I have never seen a more desolate spot than Lampedusa and Pantelleria is not very far off. There is much to be done on each island and Lt. Wilkie is doing exceedingly well to-date on Pantelleria. I suggest that only 2000 who can speak Italian be sent to the islands as there are no interpreters.

(c) I feel that there should be a British soldier on each island with the Officer, or at least one who can serve between the islands to act as liaison between the islands and Sicily. Quite often an allied military messenger needs to go to Sicily from the islands and as the return trip is not always secured at once, the soldier's absence would not inconvenience the administration to the same extent as that of an officer's.

(d) I consider that an enquiry should be instituted into the activities of 1st Lieut (now Capt) Anthony Ingrascia, whilst C.O., at Lampedusa. The people on the island are making accusations and his case should be cleared if he is innocent.

2. VEHICLES.

(e) All vehicles have been concentrated at Palermo, except the jeep No 209634 which is at Pantelleria. All the island transport was found

in bad shape as follows:-

- 2 Lancia Astura
 - 3 " Aprilia
 - 1 " Augusta
 - 1 Fiat 1500
- 1 completely worn out.
 - 1 completely worn out, 1 in very bad shape.
 - No record of it but found in I.C. Garage at Catania.
 - Partly cannibalized at Messina.

It is intended to de-requisition immediately 1 Lancia Astura, 2 Lancia Aprilia and the Fiat 1500. This information is received about the Lancia Augusta, that will also be de-requisitioned. Two vehicles are being repaired, 1 Aprilia and 1 Astura, both of which came from Catania.

3. MILITARY AND MARINE.

- (a) The I.C. Officers' Mess is now functioning and is capable of handling 4 extra Officers at a time passing through for quarters and messing.
 - (b) The C.M.'s Mess can handle 4 extra but blankets and messing equipment should be brought by visitors. There is cut, however, any accommodation for soldiers' wives, etc.
 - (c) The British Transit Messes have closed down and the prices of meals are exorbitant in the civilian restaurants. The American Naval Messes welcome transients, of course, but accommodation for quarters is not always easy.
- Any personnel passing through here would assist if they notified us two days ahead.

SUBJECT: Communications with the A.S. Islands and Malta.
TO : HQ, Allied Commission, APO 394

1. This office has long been receiving complaints from the A.S. Officers stationed at Pantelleria and Lampedusa concerning difficulties of transportation and communication between these Islands and Sicily. Mail is sometimes delayed as long as a month in going between these Islands and Palermo. At present both mail and personnel are dependent on slow and irregular voyages of privately-owned motor schooners.

2. Officers on the Island have no means under their own control to leave the Islands nor to communicate with Sicily or Malta. An officer having occasion to visit either Island for even the briefest duty could rarely go and return in less than two weeks. Indeed such a trip might require the greater part of a month. Absolutely no means of regular communication is available. A regular and reliable means of communication between the above-mentioned centres for the transport of Allied personnel, the supply of rations, and the carrying of mail and other messages is therefore urgently needed.

3. It is suggested that the possibility be explored of securing a small naval craft for this purpose. The vessel should preferably be manned by Allied personnel. In view of the fact that Malta is in British hands it would seem desirable that the boat be under Royal Navy control. If the Craft were based on Malta it could easily touch all necessary ports at least once each week. The recommended trip (Malta-Lampedusa-Pantelleria-Porto-Lampadusa-Malta) could be made in four days and the remaining two or three days could be spent in Malta. The departure could be made from Malta on a regular weekly schedule unless an emergency called for a special trip to one or the other of the two Islands. The Liaison Officer at Palermo should be given authority to call on the Naval Command at Malta for such exceptional trips when necessary.

4. If Allied Commission Headquarters approve of the plan, the Liaison Officer at Palermo would be willing to assume responsibility for working out its details. In order that the Naval Commander at Malta may know of the nature of this proposal (in case Allied Commission desires to consult Malta concerning its feasibility from Royal Navy's point of view) a copy of this letter is being mailed directly to Malta for information only.

On 18 May, under the subject "Communication with the AMG islands and Malta", I recommended to ALCOH that a request be made to the Royal Navy at Malta for a naval craft to serve as courier between Malta, Lampedusa, Pantelleria, and Porto Empedocle. My letter pointed out the present unsatisfactory state of communications for mail and personnel. Indeed conditions are even worse than I reported: there have been cases where letters have been two months en route between Lampedusa and Palermo.

2. What I now desire to suggest is that if a suitable small naval vessel were provided for use between these islands, one of the two present officers could probably be released for other duty. It is my opinion that one energetic officer could suffice for both Lampedusa and Pantelleria, provided that a satisfactory means of transportation were provided for him to visit each of the islands at frequent intervals. With the present unsatisfactory communications, of course any such combination seems utterly out of the question; but with a good boat, under his own control, one officer could supervise both islands.

3. My idea would be that the officer maintain quarters on both Pantelleria and Lampedusa. He could then remain where his presence seemed most needed at the time, but would have the means to proceed to the other island for a similar stay when conditions called for it.

4. I submit this suggestion in connection with my earlier request for suitable communications. Even with two officers a new means of communication is needed; but with a new means of transporting mail and for travel between the islands I am rather sure that one able officer could look after both islands.

SUBJECT: Communications with the AMG Islands and Malta.

1. This office has long been receiving complaints from the ALCOM Officers stationed at Pantelleria and Lampedusa concerning difficulties of transportation and communication between these Islands and Sicily. Mail is sometimes delayed as long as a month in going between these Islands and Palermo. At present both mail and personnel are dependent on slow and irregular voyages of privately-owned motor schooners.

2. Officers on the Island have no means under their own control to leave the islands nor to communicate with Sicily or Malta. An officer having occasion to visit either Island for even the briefest duty could rarely go and return in less than two weeks. Indeed such a trip might require the greater part of a month. Absolutely no means of secret communication is available. A regular and reliable means of communication between the above-mentioned centres for the transport of Allied personnel, the supply of rations, and the carrying of mail and other messages is therefore urgently needed.

3. It is suggested that the possibility be explored of securing a small naval craft for this purpose. The vessel should preferably be manned by Allied personnel. In view of the fact that Malta is in British hands it would seem desirable that the boat be under Royal Navy control. If the Craft were based on Malta it could easily touch all necessary ports at least once each week. The recommended trip (Malta-Lampedusa-Pantelleria-Porto Kapodocke-Malta) could be made in four days and the remaining two or three days could be spent in Malta. The departure could be made from Malta on ³1

regular weekly schedule unless an emergency called for a special trip to one or the other of the two islands. The Liaison Officer at Palermo should be given authority to call on the Naval Command at Malta for such exceptional trips when necessary. (1a)

4. If Allied Commission Headquarters approve of the plan, the Liaison Officer at Palermo would be willing to assume responsibility for working out its details. In order that the Naval Commander at Malta may know of the nature of this proposal (in case Allied Commission desires to consult Malta concerning its feasibility from Royal Navy's point of view) a copy of this letter is being mailed directly to Malta for information only.
