1. Reference your C-5/134-53 of 20 June 54. The answers to para 2 are as follows :-

- a) IRR's terms of reference are long-term planning and the development of practical measures for the relief and relocation of "stateless" refugees, i.e. those who have had to leave their homes and countries of residence because of danger to their lives and liberties on account of race, religion or political beliefs.
- b) IRR's needs are substantially those set out in UNR Administration Memorandum No 6 of 10 Feb. 54. The principal needs being welfare, FCR, transport, accommodation and the right to work for those and related items on military status and services.
- c) IRR's present work is described as :-

"The search for current information and the survey and classification of likely resident and well-defined groups of refugees; negotiations with Governments for the temporary or permanent solution of refugees; assistance to individual persons (other than mere physical relief or repatriation in such matters as welfare, negotiations, temporary employment, search for relatives, migration formalities and identity or travel documents. 1. Reference is made to your G-5: 334-58, 19 June 1945.
2. With particular reference to par 2 of the above-cited letter, the following points are pertinent:
 - a. IOCR's terms of reference are: long-term planning and the development of practical measures for the relief and re-location of "stateless" refugees; those who have had to leave their homes and countries of residence because of danger to their lives and liberties ~~because~~ of race, religion or political belief.
 - b. IOCR's needs are substantially those set forth in AFHQ Administrative Memorandum No 6, 10 February 1945: principally, rations, POL, transport, and accommodations, and the right to draw on military stocks and services, subject to availabilities, for those, and related items.

3. The duplication of work between IOCR and the Displaced Persons and Repatriation Sub-Commission is slight, if existent. IOCR, in practice, takes up where DPA leaves off, since DPA is engaged principally in mass repatriation, which is not IOCR's province. The two organizations, of course, work in close harmony.

4. It is pointed out that, according to the problems arising with resettlement and documentation of "stateless" refugees, as opposed to those capable of being returned to their former homes, it is probable that IOCR's work will undergo a growing expansion in months to come. In line with the policy which has been followed with UNRRA, it would appear advisable to put IOCR on as nearly self-sustaining a basis from an administrative point of view, as is practicable. It is, therefore, most strongly urged that the terms of AFPC Administrative Memorandum Number 6, 10 February 1945, be extended to include IOCR, as the most consistent and logical method of handling their situation.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL COMMITTEE ON REFUGEES

The Intergovernmental Committee on Refugees was formed as a result of the Nyas Conference on Refugees convened in July 1956 on the initiative of President Roosevelt.

The Committee is an official international humanitarian organization consisting of official representatives of thirty-six member governments, and held its Fourth Plenary Session in London during August 1964 under the chairmanship of the Right Honourable S.L. Bruce, High Commissioner for Australia.

The Executive Committee now consists of representatives of the following Governments: Brazil, Canada, Czechoslovakia, France, Mexico, Netherlands, U.S.S.R., United Kingdom and the United States of America.

The Committee's mandate covers all those persons, wherever they may be, who, as a result of events in Europe, have had to leave their countries of residence because of the danger to their lives or liberties on account of their race, religion or political beliefs.

It may be hoped that the great majority of the persons now displaced from their homes will have been repatriated by military authorities, Governments or UNRWA acting separately or in cooperation, so that the practical task so far as the Intergovernmental Committee is concerned is largely confined to those unfortunate people who for one reason or another will eventually be unable to return to their homes.

This entails long-term planning for the relocation and resettlement of the residue, a problem which presents peculiar difficulties and may extend over a long period.

The practical task covers: the search for current information and the survey and classification of likely residual and well defined groups of refugees; negotiations with governments for the temporary or permanent asylum of refugees; assistance to individual persons (other than mass physical relief or repatriation) in such matters as welfare, aspirations, temporary employment, search for relatives, migration formalities and identity or travel documents. Financial assistance is given where distress is caused through lack of other representation (subject to certain principles of eligibility).

The Committee's object in these tasks is to avoid duplication of effort and to maintain cordial working relations with all other national and international bodies and voluntary organizations.
