SUBJECT: Travel Orders - UNRRA Personnel (Italy) Mission

To : Mr. Spyros N. Kounay, UNRRA (Italy) Mission (Chief)  
(Thru: Colonel IRVINE F. BRIGGS, Liaison Officer, UNRRA, this HQ)

1. At a meeting held earlier this month between the Headquarters Commandant, this headquarters, and Rome Area Allied Command, it was agreed that travel rations for UNRRA personnel were no longer to be issued by this headquarters.

2. Since UNRRA was never attached to this headquarters by any specific written orders but by verbal agreement between this headquarters and UNRRA officials, it is requested that, effective 1 July 1945, UNRRA publish their own travel orders within Italy except beyond those boundaries which require permission from ANG and SOAOs concerned.

3. Inasmuch as the UNRRA (Yugoslav) Mission now publishes its own travel orders, it is felt that UNRRA (Italy) Mission can do likewise.

4. In the event that travel orders for travel by air within Italy or travel to be performed outside of the theater boundaries which may be required in the future by UNRRA (Italy) Mission, this headquarters will publish same upon a formal request.

5. Travel outside this Theater of Operations requires the approval of Allied Force Headquarters.

SUBJECT: Relationships between UNRRA (Italy) and  
Allied Commission

TO : Headquarters, Allied Commission  
A.P.C. 39a

1. Reference is made to 66/17/85 of 9 April 1945 and copies  
of attached correspondence.

2. This Headquarters is in agreement with the opinions  
expressed in paragraphs 2 (b) and (c) of your letter. It is con-  
sidered, however, that the domestic issues raised are such as  
should be properly solved by consultation between Allied Commission  
and UNRRA, so that the latter have a clear understanding of the  
situation, and of the channels which should be employed in order  
to make the most efficient use of the military resources. In  
coming to such an agreement you will, no doubt, bear in mind that  
UNRRA will have tended in the past to deal predominately with AC  
as being the most convenient, or, indeed, the only channel known  
to UNRRA; and that the process of familiarizing them with a more  
direct means of self-assistance will entail careful instruction by  
you.

3. The matter has been discussed with UNRRA representatives,  
who have promised to cooperate.

MEMO: Relationships Between UGMA (Italy) and Allied Commission

TO : C-S, AFSC

23

1. Your attention is invited to the attached copy of letter from UGMA (Italy) of 30 March 1945, and in particular Par 5 thereof.

2. It is the understanding of the Allied Commission that responsibilities toward, and its relationships with, UGMA (Italy), are governed by the provisions of Administrative Memorandum No. 6, AFSC, 10 February 1945. Inasmuch as there appears to be some divergence in interpretation of this directive, the following points are developed for your information and comment:

a. Par 3, Administrative Memorandum No. 6 states:

"British Army and/or United States Army sources may be drawn upon under this Administrative Memorandum at the convenience of UGMA (Italy) and local availability may dictate, except that, where separate facilities are available locally, British personnel will use British facilities and United States personnel will use United States facilities."

"The resources of the Allied Commission may be drawn upon hereunder, and the term "the military" as used herein includes the Allied Commission."

b. It is the opinion of the Allied Commission that the clear intention of the above-cited portion of Administrative Memorandum No. 6 is to place UGMA in the category of a military unit, insofar as supply, maintenance and the provision of accompanying facilities are concerned. That is, by the provisions of this directive, entitled to request, through military channels, and from military supply sources, such items of supply as are necessary to its proper functioning, and to ask for and receive such assistance in matters of requisitioning, and the allotment of space for billets, office space, and related requirements as its operations may require. In this connection, in accordance with the provisions of Par 4 of the Memorandum in question, the facilities of the Allied Commission may be drawn upon in the sense that it is a military unit.

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## (Relationships Between USRA (Italy) and Allied Commission - Cont'd)

g. The position of the Allied Commission, however, is similar to that of USRA, in that Allied Commission draws its supply requirements from military sources. In this connection, attention is invited to Par 6, Administrative Memorandum No. 6:

"b. Indents - Indents or requisitions will be submitted in the normal manner in accordance with the local military procedure. Where available, transient mess facilities will be extended under the same conditions as for military personnel."

The local military procedure, and the channels through which units in the Rome area draw rations, is through the submission of requisitions to US Supply Point No. 1, and of indents to 92 R.D., the established military supply units, American and British. As a military unit, the Commission itself follows this procedure, since it is not itself a military supply unit. Allied Commission operates no transient messes. A number of transient messes are operated in Rome by the local military supply and administrative unit - Rome Area Allied Command.

d. Administrative Memorandum No. 6 further states:

"6 b. Accommodation - Accommodation for personnel and vehicles, and provision for office and work space."

Attention is invited to the fact that Allied Commission, in common with other military units in Rome, is not authorized to requisition billet or work space. The authorized authority for such requisitioning is Rome Area Allied Command, through which Allied Commission procures its requisitioned buildings.

j. It is, from the foregoing, considered that Allied Commission bears such the same relationship toward USRA as does any other military unit, the duties of which are not the provision of supply and housekeeping facilities. Allied Commission has cooperated, and will continue to cooperate with USRA to the limit of its ability in the provision of housekeeping facilities, subject to its own requirements, as laid down in Par 4 of Administrative Memorandum No. 6. It is pointed out, however, that the operational requirements of Allied Commission are subject to rapid change, with the demands made by the military government activities, and that provision of a given service may become impracticable without warning. Billets are a case in point. It is, therefore, most advisable in the opinion of the Allied Commission that USRA make as full use as possible of the established military supply and housekeeping sources, such as peninsular Base Section, Rome Area Allied Command, and the appropriate Districts and Areas, for the provision of its needs.

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b. Inasmuch as the views expressed in this letter do not appear to coincide with those set forth in Par 5 of the attached letter, dated 30 March, from USSR, might the position be clarified by your Board, further, please, so that any possibility of misinterpretation may be avoided.

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MEMORANDUM RELATING TO THE REVENGE OF THE ITALIAN MISSION

RECORDED

30 March 1945

TO : H.Q. Allied Commission  
 (Adm. Major R. P. Dow, Economic Section)

FROM : Division of Finance and Administration,  
 UNRRA Italian Mission.

SUBJECT : Relationship of UNRRA to A.C.

1. Further to my memorandum of 23 March 45 on the above-mentioned subject, I am happy to be able to tell you that the question of the issuing of travel orders has been cleared with Major Quilliffe. It would appear that his staff were acting under a misapprehension and that there will be no more difficulty in this connection.

2. With regard to the recreational passes, however, I understand from Major Quilliffe that this is a matter which will have to be cleared through the Headquarters Commandant, Colonial Robertson. I have pointed out to Major Quilliffe that the withdrawal of this privilege will make it difficult for our British staff to avail themselves of the amenities of, for example, the Barberini Theatre, and I am awaiting further news from him in this connection.

3. Since my previous letter, two other matters have been reported to me and in connection with which I should be grateful for your assistance. It appears that there is a new proposal under consideration by the Headquarters Commandant concerning UNRRA facilities for British personnel. I do not know any of the details of this but I gather from Major Quilliffe, through our Miss Ainsworth, that in the near future the facilities for dealing with A.C. UNRRA will be withdrawn. Again, I learn that our Lieut. Col. Rookie was yesterday refused the use of the A.C. taxi service on the grounds that such transportation of UNRRA personnel was no longer to be provided by A.C.

4. We assume, in general, that the privileges enjoyed by this Mission in the past will be continued. For the purposes of efficient administration we request that any plans for the withdrawal of any of these privileges should be laid before us for our information, and, if necessary, discussion, prior to their being put into operation by the various sections of A.C.

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5. In the matter of facilities and services to be extended by the Military to the Mission, the Chief of Mission takes the position that A.P.M.C. Memo No. 6, dated 10 Feb. 45 gives us the right to request those facilities and services listed therein, and that, in particular, para. 3(b) of that Memo places Allied Command under the definite obligation to provide those facilities and services properly requested by us, subject only to the qualifications detailed in para. 4 of that Memorandum, that is to say, (i) operational requirements, (ii) providing the military situation permits, and (iii) to the extent that demand for civilian requirements permits. If, therefore, it is considered by A.G. that the provisions of para. 4 make possible the refusal of any particular request for facilities and services by UNRRA, then it is felt that this refusal should be made in writing to the Chief of Mission, and should include a definite statement as to which of the three conditions operate against the ability of A.G. to comply with our request. Such a procedure would then afford UNRRA the opportunity of referring any refusal to A.P.M.C. for arbitration should it be the desire of the Chief of Mission so to do.



SUBJECT: Transfer from Allied Commission to UNRRA (Italy) Administration of Accommodation Centers and other installations for Displaced Persons

TO : President, Allied Commission, HQ 394,  
 UNRRA Representative (Governor Cochrane)

1. In order to permit the release of Allied Commission military personnel for duty elsewhere and to launch UNRRA in actual relief operations in Italy, the plan evolved in recent discussions with representatives of UNRRA (Italy), Allied Commission and their successors, as hereinafter set forth, will be implemented as soon as possible. This plan is applicable to the accommodation centers and installations specified in the attached Appendix "A", but will also apply to other centers and installations where UNRRA is prepared to assume responsibility.

2. Notwithstanding problems which remain to be solved before transfer of administrative responsibility can be effected, Allied Commission will provide forthwith for the infiltration of UNRRA (Italy) personnel and for their participation in administration at the specified centers and installations. With this understanding UNRRA (Italy) personnel are now being called forward. The details and the scheduling of such infiltration at the various centers are to be worked out by Allied Commission and UNRRA (Italy).

3. During the transitional period, that is, after infiltration of personnel has commence<sup>d</sup> and until administrative responsibility is transferred to UNRRA (Italy), the Allied Commission will remain responsible for operation of these centers under directives now in force. In their capacity as civilians of United Nations nationality working for the military in a theater of operations, infiltrated UNRRA (Italy) personnel will be subject to Allied Commission command and control. Their status is defined in AMHQ Administrative Instruction Number 6, 1945.

4. Allied Commission is directed and authorized to find and accommodate infiltrated UNRRA personnel and to furnish them such other material assistance as may be necessary upon the same conditions as apply to comparable Allied Commission personnel for whom they are to be substituted. Such assistance shall not be charged to, or paid by UNRRA (Italy) but the UNRRA (Italy) personnel will pay the usual charges required in the case of civilian personnel attached to the military. After administrative responsibility is transferred to UNRRA (Italy), facilities or services which may be extended by Allied Commission to UNRRA (Italy) personnel at the centers shall be made available upon payment as provided in the AMHQ Administrative Instruction Number 6. In no event will Allied Commission be called upon to pay UNRRA (Italy) personnel.

5. Until administrative responsibility for the centers is transferred to UNRRA (Italy) such vehicles or any other non-expendable items contributed by UNRRA (Italy) during the transitional period will become part of existing stocks, to be serviced, maintained and repaired as if military property.

6. UNRRA (Italy) Offices are to be established at the centers as quickly as possible, so as to relieve Allied Commission of a major part of the actual task of administration, to a point where Allied Commission is satisfied to leave only top executive personnel, personnel concerned with local transport operations, and personnel to assist UNRRA (Italy) in dealing with the local military and in the handling of indigenous civilian labor problems. In order to release Allied Commission military personnel, slow progress or even failure on the part of UNRRA to build up its own supply line to various centers shall not be cause for delay in effecting transfer of administrative responsibility. Transfer must wait, however, until UNRRA (Italy) has assembled the necessary complement of administrative personnel and has completed satisfactory arrangements to obtain sufficient living necessities to meet pay rolls and other current expenses in the operation of the centers. In the event of any other emergency which may delay transfer, notice shall immediately be sent to this Headquarters.

7. As soon as Allied Commission determines that effective operation and maintenance of the centers is reasonably assured under UNRRA (Italy) administration, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in paragraph 6, above, the transfer shall be effected, and notice thereof sent to this Headquarters. It or after the time of transfer Allied Commission will leave at the centers such liaison and other personnel as may be appropriate to ensure smooth transfer of responsibility. Allied Commission will also make periodical inspections of the centers and obtain reports from UNRRA (Italy) to make certain that centers transferred are being efficiently administered for the accommodation of Displaced Persons.

8. If the accommodation centers are filled to capacity, Allied Commission will establish priorities for admission to these centers for the guidance of UNRRA. Allied Commission will continue to be responsible for the initial movement of Displaced Persons to and from these centers.

9. After the conditions set forth above are met, Allied Commission is authorized to transfer to UNRRA (Italy) the administrative responsibility and control of the Accommodation Centers listed in Appendix "A". This will include all appurtenant premises, accommodation stores, supplies, vehicles and other equipment. Appropriate arrangements for the transfer are to be worked out between Allied Commission and UNRRA (Italy) on the following basis:

a. A list of premises and accommodations and non-expendable items (other than such contributed by UNRRA (Italy)) shall be prepared by Allied Commission and UNRRA (Italy) as of the date of transfer.

b. The property so listed shall be accounted for by Allied Commission as on charge to UNRRA (Italy) but no payment therefor by UNRRA (Italy) will be required except as provided below.

8. So long as this property remains on charge to the Trustee, it  
shall not be sold or otherwise disposed of without the written  
consent of the Majority of the members of the Board of Directors  
of the Company, except for appropriate maintenance, repair,  
and replacement. The cost of replacement, repair or damage will be paid by the  
Company. The final disposition of this property will be at the discretion  
of the Majority of the members of the Board of Directors.

6. The mentioned procedure and documentation will continue to be held by the relevant authority until appropriate testing results to ensure elimination of the risk for the re-introduction of dangerous viruses. In due course (e.g. Italy), the relevant authority will then inform the Italian Government or otherwise, about the results.

10. According to whom transfer to UNRWA (Italy) administration consists  
that UNRWA will remain responsible for provision of the vehicles necessary  
for delivery of the cars to UNRWA (Italy) in its transition to assume this  
responsibility. It adds no condition about the date of transfer, UNRWA (Italy)  
will take over the vehicles from the Italian Government the vehicles which are at present  
assigned to the centers. UNRWA Committee will not be called upon to make  
any arrangements or replace the vehicles it assigned except insofar as it may be able to  
do so in suitable replacement funds on an interim basis through negotiation of  
local contract institutions. The vehicles including UNRWA (Italy) vehicles will be  
under UNRWA Central control until UNRWA (Italy) assumes complete responsibility.  
After transfer of the vehicles from to UNRWA (Italy) administration,  
the provision by UNRWA committee for local motor transportation teams will  
also be other facility or service provided to assist UNRWA (Italy) in operation  
of this service, to be arranged upon payment, in accordance with the terms and  
conditions mentioned earlier.

12. Four units of 200-1000 are supplied by the 111th Cavalry Regt. for the operation of Jagdpanzer IV Fuchs, which will replace M102 Gunners, via the 111th and 112th, and all mounting will be a matter of course, and the 111th Regt., second, is on the same line as in 1947 Americanized by Major G.

12. Although the administration of the occupied territories  
has to be turned over to the (Polish) military, responsibility therefor  
will rest with the Commissars, who will be given the  
right to remain in their posts.

1. Attached is a carbon copy of a letter from Col. Robertson, addressed to Mr. Leff, UNRRA Administrative Officer, subject "Hotel accommodations."

2. Mr. Keeney spoke to me about this and seemed quite upset over the request made and also over the manner of its making. I told Mr. Keeney that I could see nothing wrong with the manner of the request, it having been addressed to his Administrative Officer, apparently as a confirmation of a previous conversation. Mr. Keeney then said that he had requested his liaison officer at AFHQ to take this question up with AFHQ, with a view to having the request withdrawn. I told Mr. Keeney, in no uncertain terms, that I felt that he was entirely out of order in such action; that if he had any quarrel with the request issued from AC Headquarters, that he first should take it up with the AC Headquarters and not go over our heads to UNRRA.

3. It may be that the question of accommodations is one that AC will have to continue to give them considerable assistance on, because of the following provision in CDO concerning UNRRA, which has been approved by this Headquarters and is now resulting in clauses by AFHQ. The following paragraph refers:

"a. The following facilities and services will be available:  
\* \* \*

(b) Accommodation. Accommodation for personnel and vehicles and provision for work space."

SUBJECT : Policy regarding AC Responsibilities to UNRRA  
TO : Deputy Chief of Staff

1. Yesterday a copy was located of the approved UNRRA/AFHQ draft of the proposed General Routine Order to be issued by AFHQ. (It is # 295 of the Economic Section file I, 32, UNRRA Vol. I.) This was sent to AFHQ - 6 January.

2. In anticipation of its being issued, the following pertinent (and it is hoped not hortatory) suggestions are made.

A. A Formal Agreement should be made, between UNRRA and AC, stating AC's responsibilities for:

1. Civilian Mess and Maintenance
2. Civilian Billets and Maintenance
3. Civilian Office Space and Maintenance
4. Civilian Transportation and Maintenance
5. Civilian Office Administration (Travel Orders etc.)
6. Civilian use of unit PX and NAAFI (Attention should be given to Nationalities other than American & British)
7. Civilian use of AC dispensaries
8. Civilian use of AC recreational facilities
9. Civilian use of AC Post Offices and Branches.

B. Because the General Routine Order considers AC's relationship to UNRRA to be on the same basis as any other military establishment (#3b) and because it implies that UNRRA is an independent UNIT(#6), the agreement in "A" above should include a date of termination of all obligations which may be incurred.

C. The earliest possible divorce of AC and UNRRA is recommended inasmuch as (#5) states that no payment will be required for

facilities and services extended. (UNRRA has made the unusual offer of being willing to cut their own expense accounts in order to lessen the financial inequalities which exist between them and the military--, (see attached note). Nevertheless, (#5) concludes by stating "However, the issue or service shall be charged to UNRRA (Italy) and accounted for by the military ultimate settlement to be effected by UNRRA with British and U.S. Governments, respectively". This seems to throw the responsibility on AC for reporting to higher Headquarters the amount of Army billeting space which have been assigned to Civilians of UNRRA (Italian) Mission.

4. From an administrative point, UNRRA seems to be well enough established now to operate its own Headquarters, therefore it is recommended, that an early date be set in the agreement for its independence.

5. AC should negotiate similar agreements with all other Missions and Agencies which thus far are associated with this Headquarters only by some vague verbal arrangement. A forthright policy in such matters should save much misunderstanding as these agencies and their problems increase.

Since the document will cover both U.S. and British personnel, it would be helpful to have comments from both U.S. and British legal advisers. I should also like to have it checked by the appropriate authorities to make sure that it covers the important operating questions that are likely to arise.

SUBJECT: Operations of United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation  
Administration in Italy.

1. The United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration was established by agreement of the 44 United Nations (November 1945), as an organization for the relief and rehabilitation of the victims of the war. It has recently been authorized to undertake programs in Italy of two general types:
- a. Relief of Italian nationals and
  - b. Relief of United Nations nationals in Italy.
2. As relief to Italian nationals, UNRRA proposes to engage in supplementary feeding and medical assistance to children and expectant and nursing mothers and to assist Italian refugees.
3. As relief to United Nations nationals in Italy, UNRRA proposes to take over, in the near future, responsibility for the operation of camps and hospitals in southern Italy, previously operated by the military authorities, in which care is being given to displaced United Nations nationals, particularly Yugoslavs and Greeks. In the meantime, envelope and with the concurrence of the military authorities, UNRRA may expand this program by acquiring additional facilities and by engaging in other forms of assistance for displaced persons of United Nations nationality.
4. UNRRA will be acting in Italy subject to the same degree of military control as any other civilian organization to the extent that military requisition facilities, and supplies

to general policies laid down by the Allied Commission, so far as questions of a civil nature are concerned. Administratively, however, it is an independent organization with its own chain of command, and as an international body, it is, naturally, free to determine, within the above stated limits, its own objectives and methods of operation.

5. All military authorities in this theatre will give UNRRA every possible assistance in the execution of its programs in Italy. The programs for displaced persons of United Nations nationality will relieve the military of an existing obligation. The other programs will supplement the efforts, already a military responsibility, to guard the Italian civilian population from hunger and disease. All of these programs are undertaken as a result of action initiated by the U.S. Government, supported by the British Government, and encouraged in by all the other 44 United Nations.

6. Specifically, the military authorities will afford to the UNRRA organization in carrying out these programs the same facilities as they now afford to the Allied Commission. UNRRA will be given assistance in securing space, supplies and other real and personal property by every means, including requisitioning where necessary. UNRRA will be permitted to draw medical and sanitary supplies, upon payment, from the Central Medical Depot and will participate in the military transport pool.

7. The following conditions will apply to UNRRA personnel while serving in Italy in connection with these programs. For these purposes, the term 'UNRRA personnel' includes non-indigenous voluntary society personnel acting under the authority of UNRRA in operations for which UNRRA has ~~direct~~ responsibility. It does not include, however, Italian nationals.

- 3 -

- a. UNPA personnel will be subject to military law as persons accompanying the armed forces on active service; they <sup>will</sup> ~~will~~ not be liable to summary punishment.
- b. They will refrain from propaganda or political activities, and avoid any action which might bring discredit upon UNPA or the military authorities -- including speculation, bartering, or profiteering.
- c. They will be liable to removal from the theatre for misconduct or for other reasons, at the request of the military authorities.
- d. They will be regarded as "persons following the armed forces in the field without directly belonging thereto", and will consequently be covered by Article 81 of the Prisoners of War Convention; as such, they will receive certificates under that article, stating that they have a right to be treated as prisoners of war if captured, and setting out the equivalent rank for purposes of status and pay, if captured.
- e. UNPA personnel, for whom the rank set forth pursuant to subparagraph d) above is that of an officer, shall have the status of officers for other purposes, in order to enable them to perform their functions in conjunction with the military authorities. This status will carry with it the privilege of such facilities, where available, as are appropriate to officers of the forces; e.g., first-class travel and officers' messes. All such facilities, however, are to be granted only upon the terms referred to in subparagraph f) below.
- f. Subject to military operational requirements and to the extent available, the military authorities will

provide UNRRA personnel with the following facilities, upon payment of appropriate charges therefor, either by the individual concerned or by UNRRA, in accordance with arrangements hereafter to be made:

- 1. Use of Army postal service (subject to military censorship)
- 2. Lodging (wherever)
- 3. Food
- 4. Transportation
- 5. Medical and dental treatment and hospitalization
- 6. Clothing
- 7. Personnel equipment
- 8. Post exchange and UNI facilities

Where these facilities are separately organized for British and U.S. military personnel, and both are available, UNRRA personnel of British nationality will use British facilities and UNRRA personnel of U.S. or other nationality will use U.S. facilities. Otherwise, such facilities shall be available to UNRRA personnel of any nationality.
