SUBJECT: Administrative problems involving UNRRA's personnel.

TO : Establishment Section in Rome. **AC.**

1. Request that policy be established for the administrative relationship between the Allied Commission and UNRRA for the coming period of consolidation and acceptance by UNRRA of supply responsibility from the Allied Commission.
2. Specific ruling on such questions as the following would avoid great misunderstandings and confusion:
 - a) Will UNRRA's personnel travel on AC travel orders? If not, will UNRRA's travel orders entitle them to the same privileges of Allied civilians of the Allied Commission?
 - b) Will they be charged for billeting or will they be billeted in Military accommodations?
 - c) Will they be entitled to eat at the Military mess? If so, what would the charge be?
 - d) Will they be entitled to M.A.A.F.I. and P.X. rations? If so, what ration is given to Nationals other than British or American?
 - e) Will this Office be responsible for motor vehicles transportation free of charge?
 - f) If UNRRA vehicles are used, is this Office responsible for repairs and POL?
 - g) Will they be entitled to office space in the Headquarters of this Office? If so, how much is it anticipated they will need?
 - h) Will they bring their own office supplies and equipment? If not, how much should we plan to supply?

3. Another solution may be for UERRA to open its own Office in Milan, as it has done in Rome. If so, some of the above questions are automatically cancelled by such a step.

4. In closing, it is hoped that you understand that these questions are asked in an attempt to avoid misunderstanding and confusion, rather than trying to make work for your Office. Because we have already encountered the problems in a small degree and can foresee its growth, it is felt it must be given some thought before it reaches too great proportions.

1. Reference is made to CG/17/ES of 9 April 1945 and copies of attached correspondence.

2. This Headquarters is in agreement with the opinions expressed in paragraphs 2 (b) and (c) of your letter. It is considered, however, that the domestic issues raised are such as should be properly solved by consultation between Allied Commission and UNRRA, so that the latter have a clear understanding of the situation, and of the channels which should be employed in order to make most efficient use of the military resources. In coming to such an agreement you will, no doubt, bear in mind that UNRRA will have tended in the past to deal predominately with AG as being the most convenient, or, indeed, the only channel known to UNRRA; and that the process of familiarizing them with a more direct means of self-assistance will entail careful instruction by you.

3. The matter has been discussed with UNRRA representatives, who have promised to cooperate.

TO : O-5, AFHQ

1. Your attention is invited to the attached copy of letter from UNRRA (Italy) of 30 March 1945, and in particular Par 5 thereof.

2. It is the understanding of the Allied Commission that responsibilities toward, and its relationships with, UNRRA (Italy), are governed by the provisions of Administrative Memorandum No. 6, AFHQ, 10 February 1945. Inasmuch as there appears to be some divergence in interpretation of this directive, the following points are developed for your information and comment:

a. Par 3, Administrative Memorandum No. 6 states:

"British Army and/or United States Army sources may be drawn upon under this Administrative Memorandum as the convenience of UNRRA (Italy) and local availabilities may dictate, except that, where separate facilities are available locally, British personnel will use British facilities and United States personnel will use United States facilities."

"The resources of the Allied Commission may be drawn upon hereunder, and the term 'the military' as used herein includes the Allied Commission."

b. It is the opinion of the Allied Commission that the clear intention of the above-cited portion of Administrative Memorandum No. 6 is to place UNRRA in the category of a military unit, insofar as supply, maintenance and the provision of housekeeping facilities are concerned. UNRRA is, by the provisions of this directive, entitled to request, through military channels, and from military supply sources, such items of supply as are necessary to its proper functioning, and to ask for and receive such assistance in matters of requisitioning, and the allotment of space for billets, office space, and related requirements as its operations may require. In this connection, in accordance with the provisions of Par 4 of the Memorandum in question, the facilities of the Allied Commission may be drawn upon in the sense that it is a military unit.

c. The position of the Allied Commission, however, is

UNRRA is, by the provisions of this directive, entitled to request, through military channels, and from military supply sources, such items of supply as are necessary to its proper functioning, and to ask for and receive such assistance in matters of requisitioning, and the allotment of space for billets, office space, and related requirements as its operations may require. In this connection, in accordance with the provisions of Par 4 of the Memorandum in question, the facilities of the Allied Commission may be drawn upon in the sense that it is a military unit.

c. The position of the Allied Commission, however, is similar to that of UNRRA, in that Allied Commission draws its supply requirements from military sources. In this connection, attention is invited to Par 6, Administrative Memorandum No. 6:

"a. Rations - Indents or requisitions will be submitted in the normal manner in accordance with the local military procedure. Where available, transient mess facilities will be extended under the same conditions as for military personnel."

The local military procedure, and the channels through which units in the Rome area draw rations, is through the submission of requisitions to PMS Supply Point No. 1, and of indents to 92 DID, the established military supply units, American and British. As a military unit, the Commission itself follows this procedure, since it is not itself a military supply unit. Allied Commission operates no transient messes. A number of transient messes are operated in Rome by the local military supply and administrative unit - Rome Area Allied Command.

(Relationships Between UNHRA (Italy) and Allied Commission- Cont'd)

d. Administrative Memorandum No. 6 further states:

"6 b. Accommodation - Accommodation for personnel and vehicles, and provision for office and work space."

Attention is invited to the fact that Allied Commission, in common with other military units in Rome, is not authorized to requisition billet or work space. The authorized authority for such requisitioning is Rome Area Allied Command, through which Allied Commission procures its requisitioned buildings.

3. It is, from the foregoing, considered that Allied Commission bears much the same relationship toward UNHRA as does any other military unit, the duties of which are not the provision of supply and housekeeping facilities. Allied Commission has cooperated, and will continue to cooperate with UNHRA to the limit of its ability in the provision of housekeeping facilities, subject to its own requirements, as laid down in Par 4 of Administrative Memorandum No. 6. It is pointed out, however, that the operation requirements of Allied Commission are subject to rapid change, with the demands made by its military government activities, and that provision of a given service may become impracticable without warning. Billets are a case in point. It is, therefore, most advisable in the opinion of the Allied Commission that UNHRA make as full use as possible of the established military supply and housekeeping sources, such as Peninsular Base Section, Rome Area Allied Command, and the appropriate Districts and Areas, for the provision of its needs.

SUBJECT: Relationship of UNRRA to A.C.

1. Further to my memorandum of 23 March 45 on the above-mentioned subject, I am happy to be able to tell you that the question of the issuing of Travel Orders has been cleared with Major Cunliffe. It would appear that his staff were acting under a misapprehension and that there will be no more difficulty in this connection.

2. With regard to the recreational passes, however, I understand from Major Cunliffe that this is a matter which will have to be cleared through the Headquarters Commandant, Colonel Robertson. I have pointed out to Major Cunliffe that the withdrawal of this privilege will make it difficult for our British staff to avail themselves of the amenities of, for example, the Barberini Theatre, and I am awaiting further news from him in this connection.

3. Since my previous letter, two other matters have been reported to me and in connection with which I should be grateful for your assistance. It appears that there is a new proposal under consideration by the Headquarters Commandant concerning NAAP facilities for British personnel. I do not know any of the details of this but I gather from Major Cunliffe, through Mr. Miss Almsworth, that in the near future the facilities for dealing with A.C. NAAP will be withdrawn. Again, I learn that our Lieut. Col. Reekie was yesterday refused the use of the A.C. taxi service on the grounds that such transportation of UNRRA personnel was no longer to be provided by A.C.

4. We assume, in general, that the privileges enjoyed by this Mission in the past will be continued. For the purposes of efficient administration we request that any plans for the withdrawal of any of these privileges should be laid before us for our information, and, if necessary, discussion, prior to their being put into operation by the various sections of A.C.

5. In the matter of facilities and services to be extended by the Military to this Mission, the Chief of Mission takes the position that A.P.H.C. Memo. No. 8, dated 10 Feb 45 gives us the right to request these facilities and services listed therein, and that, in particular, para. 3(b) of that Memo. places Allied Commission under the definite obligation to provide those facilities and services properly requested by us, subject only to the qualifications

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that there will be no more activity in this connection.

2. With regard to the recreational passes, however, I understand from Major Cunliffe that this is a matter which will have to be cleared through the Headquarters Commandant, Colonel Robertson. I have pointed out to Major Cunliffe that the withdrawal of this privilege will make it difficult for our British staff to avail themselves of the amenities of, for example, the Barberini Theatre, and I am awaiting further news from him in this connection.

3. Since my previous letter, two other matters have been reported to me and in connection with which I should be grateful for your assistance. It appears that there is a new proposal under consideration by the Headquarters Commandant concerning NAAPF facilities for British personnel. I do not know any of the details of this but I gather from Major Cunliffe, through Mr. Miss Ainsworth, that in the near future the facilities for dealing with A.C. NAAPF will be withdrawn. Again, I learn that our Lieut. Col. Noekie was yesterday refused the use of the A.C. taxi service on the grounds that such transportation of UNRRA personnel was no longer to be provided by A.C.

4. We assume, in general, that the privileges enjoyed by this Mission in the past will be continued. For the purposes of efficient administration we request that any plans for the withdrawal of any of these privileges should be laid before us for our information, and, if necessary, discussion, prior to their being put into operation by the various sections of A.C.

5. In the matter of facilities and services to be extended by the Military to this Mission, the Chief of Mission takes the position that A.F.M.Q. Memo. No. 8, dated 10 Feb 48 gives us the right to request those facilities and services listed therein, and that, in particular, para. 3(b) of that Memo. places Allied Commission under the definite obligation to provide those facilities and services properly requested by us, subject only to the qualifications detailed in para. 4 of that Memorandum, that is to say, (a) Operational requirements, (ii) providing the military situation permits, and (iii) to the extent that demand for civilian requirements permits. If, therefore, it is considered by A.C. that the provisions of Para. 4 make possible the refusal of any particular request for facilities and services by UNRRA, then it is felt that this refusal should be made in writing to the Chief of Mission, and should include a definite statement as to which of the three conditions operate against the ability of A.C. to comply with our request. Such a procedure would then afford UNRRA the opportunity of referring any refusal to A.F.M.Q. for arbitration should it be the desire of the Chief of Mission so to do.

1. Your attention is invited to the attached copy of letter from UNRRA (Italy) of 30 March 1945, ^{and in} ~~particular attention is invited to~~ Par 5 thereof.
2. It is the understanding of the Allied Commission that responsibilities toward, and its relationships with, UNRRA (Italy), are governed by the provisions of Administrative Memorandum No. 6, AFHQ, 10 February 1945. Inasmuch as there appears to be some divergence in interpretation of this directive, the following points are developed for your information and comment:

a. Par 3, Administrative Memorandum No. 6, states:

"British Army and/or United States Army sources may be drawn upon under this Administrative Memorandum as the convenience of UNRRA (Italy) and local availabilities may dictate, except that, where separate facilities are available locally, British personnel will use British facilities and United States personnel will use United States facilities."

"The resources of the Allied Commission may be drawn upon hereunder, and the term 'the military' as used herein includes the Allied Commission."

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b. It is the opinion of the Allied Commission that the clear intention of the above-cited portion of Administrative Memorandum No. 6 is to place UNHRA in the category of a military unit, insofar as supply, maintenance and the provision of housekeeping facilities are concerned. UNHRA is, by the provisions of this directive, entitled to request, through military channels, and from military supply sources, such items of supply as are necessary to its proper functioning, and to ask for and receive such assistance in matters of requisitioning, and the allotment of space for billets, office space, and related requirements as its operations may require. In this connection, in accordance with the provisions of Par 4 of the Memorandum in question, the facilities of the Allied Commission may be drawn upon in the sense that it is a military unit.

The authorized authority for such requisitioning is Rome Area Allied Command, through which Allied Commission procures its requisitioned buildings.

3. It is, from the foregoing, considered that Allied Commission bears much the same relationship toward USMRA as does any other military unit, the duties of which are not the provision of supply and housekeeping facilities. Allied Commission has cooperated, and will continue to cooperate with USMRA to the limit of its ability in the provision of housekeeping facilities, subject to its own requirements, as laid down in Par 4 of Administrative Memorandum No. 6. It is pointed out, however, that the operational requirements of Allied Commission are subject to rapid change, with the demands made by its military government activities, and that provision of a given service may become impracticable without warning. Billets are a case in point. It is, therefore, most advisable in the opinion of the Allied Commission that USMRA make as full use as possible of the established military supply and housekeeping sources, such as Peninsular Base Section, Rome Area Allied Command, and the appropriate Districts and Areas, for the provision of its needs.

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4. Inasmuch as the views expressed in this letter do not appear to coincide with those set forth in Par 5 of the attached letter, dated 30 March, from UNRRA, might the position be clarified by your Headquarters, please, so that any possibility of misunderstanding may be avoided.

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SUBJECT: Status of relationship USMA-A.C.

TO: Standardization Section, (Attn Major DOD)

1. Circulation of the Agreement of 10 March 45, was made. (See distribution on letter).

2. The Adjutant's Office will put all orders legitimately requested by USMA, for travel by military transportation and where military orders are necessary. It was understood, when the agreement was made, that USMA would use its own assignment orders and as far as possible follow the precedent of USMA's Departmental Mission in writing and having accepted its own travel orders for traveling within Italian Government Territory. This policy seems reasonable in as much as USMA personnel has arrived at this Headquarters with nothing but USMA authority.

3. Your attention is invited to paragraph 3 of the letter of this Section of 14 March and Mr. Redgate's agreement thereto in paragraph 2 of his letter of 28 Mar. From this it can be seen that the agreement was made because USMA is considered an independent agency of the United Nations and that it was therefore thought, it could much more efficiently deal directly with the organizations concerned for facilities, privileges and passes, rather than through my sub-section of this Headquarters. It is suggested that USMA arrange to have its own identity certificate or pass honored at the various clubs and other places at which it desires privileges and facilities and thus not open the inconvenient multitude of passes, which are not issued and carried by all concerned. As far as the Refraction pass is concerned, this I Office will stop issuance and collect previously issued passes, since civilians are invited to show AOC cards or A.A.A.C. passes to enter the Barberini Cinema.

4. Administrative Memorandum No. 6 Par. 3 states, that USMA may issue upon the military "as the convenience of USMA and local availability may dictate". "Military" does not mean A.C. only and since facilities are available directly at their source here in Rome, the situation seems to indicate such procedure to be followed.

5. Since USMA personnel is not on duty with this Headquarters, all people who were temporarily attached during the activation period are to be detached as of the 1st of April 45.

SUBJECT: Relationship of UNRRA to A.C.

1. As a result of representations made by Major Cunliffe, it was agreed on the 12 March 45 that the processing of UNRRA personnel should be handled by this office. This Agreement was confirmed by our letter of that date, copy of which is attached hereto.
2. On 14 March 45 we received a letter from Major Cunliffe (copy attached) informing us that the above-mentioned Agreement had been approved by A.C. Headquarters with effect from 15 March 45. The extent of the changes of procedure was clearly defined in our letter, and equally clearly, though more briefly, set forth in para. 3. of Major Cunliffe's letter.
3. There does, however, appear to be some misunderstanding of the new position on the part of certain sections of A.C., notably the Adjutant's Office and the Office of the Headquarter's Commandant. The Adjutant's Office has today refused to issue Military Movement Orders to certain of our staff, and the Headquarter's Commandant's Office has refused to issue directly to us Recreational Passes. The misunderstanding therefore goes two ways, on the one hand the new arrangement is assumed by the Adjutant's Office to cover more than it actually does, and by Headquarter's Commandant's Office not to cover points which in fact are covered.
4. It would be appreciated if the Agreement detailed in our letter of 12 March 45 and approved by A.C. Headquarters could be circulated to all Departments concerned so that they may be aware of the true extent of the alterations in procedural relations as far as UNRRA personnel are concerned.
5. Reverting to the subject of Military Movement Orders, it is quite clearly stated in Administrative Order No. 6. (Section 6 (d)) that Military Travel Orders may be requested of A.C. by UNRRA, and I am sure that you appreciate how necessary it is for such Military Travel Orders to be issued in order that our people may travel around the country without question as to their right so to do.

1. Confirming the decision reached at this afternoon's conference between yourself, representing Allied Civilian Personnel Section, Mr. A.B. Hayes, Legal Advisor to this Mission, and myself, UNRRA Italian Mission is agreeable to accepting the proposed following changes in procedure with effect from the 15 March 1945:-

- (a) That A.C. will no longer require personnel of the UNRRA Italian Mission to be processed as indicated in Establishments Memorandum No. 35, and that in future UNRRA will undertake this processing;
- (b) That UNRRA Italian Mission will write its own Assignment Orders and will render to A.C., for information, a monthly location statement of all personnel throughout Italy, and a weekly schedule of arrivals at and departures from Miss Headquarters, showing:
