Dear Mr. Ambassador:

I have had under discussion for some time, with the competent military authorities, the matter which you referred to me in transmitting a copy of note number 84031/SA of September 18, 1944 from the Vatican, asking that greater freedom be accorded Vatican vehicles for circulation in Italian territory. I am happy to reply that as a result of the discussion, Vatican vehicles which have been properly registered will be accorded freedom of movement anywhere in Italian Government territory excepting in the province of Foggia, which is restricted by air force operation.

The area under Allied Military Government is, for purposes of circulation, divided into two zones, separated by a line known as the Army Control Line, which is presently the line Cecina - Volterra - Siena - Sinalunga - Perugia - north of Lago Trasimeno - Fabriano - Jesi - Fiumesino. To circulate north of this line, permission must be obtained, through the Liaison Officer at this Headquarters, from the 8th and 8th Armies. This permission is granted only for purposes which will facilitate military operations. South of this line, permission may be obtained directly from the Liaison Officer of this Headquarters. The same rules apply with respect to personnel.

All of the above refers to permission to circulate and not to the transport of food and materials. With respect to food, the Food Subcommission of the Allied Control Commission has worked out directly with the Vatican the means of handling the necessary permits, which appears to be working satisfactorily. As regards other materials, the Liaison Officer will be glad to arrange that any requests are referred to the proper parties for action.

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The Commission desires to do everything possible to facilitate Vatican administration, as it affects Italian Government and Military Government territory and I trust that these modifications of the restrictions on movement will meet the Vatican's desires as expressed in the above-mentioned note.

Dear Colonel Fiske,

Many thanks for your letter 100/1,5/CA of September 21st regarding direct communication between the A.C.C. and the Vatican. The instructions you enclose seem to me to meet all needs. The only thing I am not sure about is whether I should make any communication to the Secretariat of State regarding the channel and subjects of direct communication, as suggested in my Memorandum, or whether your Liaison Division will take care of this. Colonel Brown is always most helpful and I think that the proposed arrangement should work out all right.

2. As regards the proposed weekly meeting, which I agree will be most helpful, I am very sorry indeed that I cannot come to-day as I am involved with one of my colleagues at 4.30. I have already put him off once and cannot do so again. But if you think a meeting desirable before to-day week I can come any time. Until I am in my new chancery, which I hope will be in a fortnight or three weeks I cannot offer hospitality for the purpose of the meeting.

The liaison division may deal directly with intelligence
of the liaison service in its liaison missions only where such
direct contact is deemed necessary and mutually advantageous,
and the liaison mission shall not exceed one year in duration.
The liaison division will not furnish intelligence services
to the armed forces without prior approval of the commanding general
and the commanding general may furnish intelligence services
only with written authority from the liaison division.
Intelligence services will be furnished through liaison
officers of the liaison division who are detailed from the
intelligence section of the liaison division for liaison purposes.
These liaison officers shall be responsible to the commanding
general of the liaison division and shall be relieved of
all other duties and responsibilities, except liaison, etc.,
and shall have no other responsibilities except liaison, etc.,
in addition to their regular military duties.

The liaison division may detail liaison officers to the
intelligence sections of the armed forces and the liaison
officer will be detailed to the commandant of the
army corps or chief of staff of the army service area
and will carry out the functions of the liaison
officer to the armed forces of the army corps or
chief of staff. The liaison division may detail
intelligence officers to the bureaus of the department
of war to furnish liaison between these bureaus and
the liaison division. These liaison officers will be
selected from the members of the army corps or
chief of staff of the army service area or the
army corps or chief of staff of the army service
area or the bureau concerned. The liaison
officer will be responsible to the commanding
general of the army corps or chief of staff of the
army service area or the bureau concerned.
Consequently, in the event of a change in
commander of the army corps or chief of staff of
the army service area or the bureau concerned,
the liaison officer will be relieved and will be replaced
by another member of the army corps or chief of staff
or the bureau concerned.

Standard procedure for dealing with various Vatican matters by
Vatican Affairs Section, ADC.

1. Determine if subject pertains to officials, citizens, institutions or property of the Vatican State.
2. If subject does not come within above mentioned category it will be referred to Paragraph IV for action.

3. Those matters within the above mentioned category can be divided generally into the following classes:

- a) Food and beverage requirements for the Vatican officials through local resources.
- b) Supplies for maintenance of property of the Vatican State to be obtained through local resources.
- c) Heating and cooking fuels.
- d) Electrical and lighting requirements.
- e) Licenses for motor cars.
- f) Automobile accessories.
- g) Gasoline and lubricants.
- h) Travel permits.
- i) Military transportation by air.
- j) Replaced persons.

- k) Matters pertaining to the military formations.

Instructions to Liaison Division for dealing

with matters pertaining to the Vatican

Under existing instructions the channel of communication between the military authorities and the Vatican State is through the Charge d'Affairs, United States of America to the Holy See and the British Minister to the Holy See. It has further been laid down by A.A.C. that Vatican "questions relating to the position of the civilian population should be dealt with by the Allied Control Commission", i.e., non-military matters. The Liaison Division of the Commission is the agency through which those affairs will be handled in the Commission.

The great mass of the matters to be dealt with are of a routine nature involving travel facilities, automobile licensing, gasoline and lubricants, food and materials, etc., and the Liaison Division ~~In the Regional Control and Military Government Sections~~ will be responsible for following these matters through. This ~~section~~ ^{Division} will have no policy functions with respect to Vatican affairs: it will carry out the policies communicated to it by the appropriate Section of the Commission.

The Liaison Division may deal directly with officials of the Vatican State in routine matters only where such direct communication has been specifically authorized. This authorization shall not extend to the arrangement of audiences with the Pope. The Division will concern itself only with matters pertaining to officials, citizens, institutions and property of the Vatican State. Ecclesiastics who are citizens of the Italian State and church institutions and property

which are not the property of the Vatican will be dealt with directly by Allied Military Government in the field and by the Italian Government in territory under its control in the same manner as other individuals and property.

Relations of military formations with the Vatican are handled direct between the diplomatic missions to the Vatican and AFHQ, AAI and the Rome Allied Area Command as prescribed by letter 5062/QD, 10 August 1944, HQ AAI to the diplomatic mission concerned.
