clearly determined to hold on to those two ports as much as do they to the  
Russians as for their own worth to him. The whole German position in Eastern Baltic  
waters is thus endangered - a threat while it existed would have the greatest  
consequences for the twenty-odd enemy divisions at present isolated in LATVIA.  
Russia's enemy front stance is to be expected as the Soviets drew nearer to these  
primal bases and ports. However the German efforts to break through the  
Russian wedge which isolates East PRUSSIA seem to have abated. The results so  
far indicate nothing but a slow attrition of these attacks is not clear. There are no claims

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or positions that the Soviet wedge has been broken, but this proves little, for the Russians did not admit a setback nor the Germans that they were ever really firmly isolated. It is clear however that in the past week, the Russians have been able to broaden their salient to the West and are within seven miles of DANZIG. Further to the S. n. RONDOVSKY has made satisfactory progress in extending the left flank of his 2 White Russian Army Group across the German frontier on a broad front S.E. of STETTIN. SCHLESWIG, at the junction of seven railway lines remains however an isolated garrison in enemy hands behind the front. This obstacle combined with the marshy lake country of POLENIA is likely to make the advance on STETTIN a formidable business.

Marshal Zhukov's First White Russian Army Group continues its advance to the ODER though at a much reduced pace. The main news of the week is from Dalmatia, where the enemy has completed at a start maneuver from the Moslavina region, in the direction of the Dalmatian coast. This drive was probably conducted by elements of 369 German-Orant Division supported by 9 Croatian Div. and seems to have taken the Partisans completely by surprise. KRALJEVAC (709) was quickly overwhelmed, RETROGRADE to VELIKI KARLOVAC, the stock of arms RETROGRADE in the BREZNA, about seven miles from the coast. A wedge was thus driven which prevented Partisan movement between Northern and Southern Dalmatia. In hint that the enemy occupation was not to be permanent however, was given when the Germans block the bridges over the BREZNA, the RETROGRADE across. This was followed by a withdrawal RETROGRADE to VELIKI KARLOVAC, which was abandoned by the enemy on 1 Feb after heavy fighting. The Germans are thus almost back to their start line of a week ago. The Partisans however see more in the sell-in than this and suggest that it may have been designed to cover the withdrawal of supplies and troops from MOSLAVINA. Further reports here indicate indeed been received this week of supplies landing MOSLAVINA, but such stories have been circulating for nearly a month now, and stronger evidence will be needed before we can assume that the withdrawal from the SPLIT area has been resumed. A more plausible explanation is that the enemy wishes to tighten his hold on the bridgeheads in the BREZNA area, and to increase partisan concentrations which might threaten them. Now that he has lost a night through Allied forces of areas in Upper SPLIT, he may be loth to abandon a voluntarily held position of concrete strength, however small, in other regions.

There has also been a continuation of reports of heavy eastward road movement from ZAGREB, CROATIA to SPLIT. This likely continues about all those reports are that both KSTB and VISEGRAD are in enemy hands, and that VISEGRAD, the third outpost covering SPLIT is being used by the enemy as a base for a new drive Northward. This drive has led to the capture of DRNIK in the Drini Valley, 20 miles N. of SPLIT, and the enemy is now advancing Northwards down the Drini Valley in the direction of ZENIK. His objective here appears to be two-fold: firstly to open up the Lj. of C through the TIN, Valley to YUGOSLAVIA; and secondly to follow last week's orders of the DIVISIONAL front, forming a flank for my GRADAS in the Balkans along the river.

1. RECENT STRIKE

On the 8 Army front the enemy is at the moment in process of building another bridge across the LAONE. After an unsuccessful attempt to establish a bridgehead across the LAONE on the 5th in the area N.W. of RUSSI (the enemy counter-attacked strongly with S.P. guns and drove us back East of the river) two attacks were launched on the night 10/11 Dec and by the following morning we were firmly on the West bank of the LAONE. One of those attacks went in N.E. of RUSSI where the previous attempt had failed and by first light had pushed 114 Rocco Unit back behind the ROSSO VECCHIO, a canal some 2,000 yards East of BAGNACAVALLI. The other bridgehead was made about 5,000 yards to the North and quickly captured VILLANOVA M. L. 51 from 711 Jaeger Regt and seized the bridge at 128300 hours. Counter-attacks later in the day by 190 Recce Unit, assisted by some 5-6 Tigers, against the right wing of this bridgehead in the area N. 4502 were repulsed and by nightfall the enemy was west of the ROSSO VECCHIO between the 37 and 42 Mortar lines. Day's fighting brought us in some 300 prisoners from 114 and 356 Divs.

Whereas the enemy appeared to be expecting the first attack over the LAONE on 5 Dec, the crossing on the night of the 10th seems to have taken him unprepared as is evidenced by the large number of prisoners and the capture intact of the bridge. A prisoner statement that the third rest of 362 Div - 956 G.R. - had gone in to the West of 1059 G.R. is interesting, and taken in conjunction with the finding of two bodies from 362 Fusilier Bn as far West as L 8632 would be surprising if the enemy were to take 65 Div as well as 29 P.G. out of the line and hand over the vital Route 65 sector to a single Div - and a division which though recently reformed has not a very high fighting reputation - but such a possibility cannot be altogether ignored: ITALY 4 Para Rest lost prisoners at L 9732, which is further West than we have previously had from prisoners, and as a result 42 Jaeger Div may also have sidesteped slightly West into the old 29 P.G. Div sector, reducing the area to be taken over by 362 Div. In addition 4 Para Div with only one regt in the line has for long been on a narrow front, but now both 21 and 12 Para Regts are forward. It may have extended slightly Eastwards into 65 Div sector. This reshuffle, if it has in fact taken place, might enable both 29 and 65 Divs to go out of the line and at the same time leave 362 Div with a sector of reasonable width. Even then the withdrawal of two divisions from the line South of BOLOGNA would imply that the enemy prepared an attack by 5 Army as unlikely for the moment: there is no evidence that such is his apprehension and finding further information it is wisest to carry 65 Div still in the line though on a narrow front with probably only one regiment forward.

In North West Italy most of 157 Mtn Div has now been taken to have left, and its place along the frontier has been taken by LITTORIO and 5 Mtn, with an Alpine Regt of the former in the ASTA Valley and 100 Mtn Regt in the cross of Mt CERIS pass. In the old 5 Mtn Div sector 85 Mtn Regt is in the N.E. CENTRE area South to the FELLINE River while the rest of LITTORIO appears to have moved into the OTTOS area with responsibilities on the Col de La MALLEU. 34 Mtn regiments unchanged in the Southern part of the Alps. In N.E. ITALY Mountain troops have been reported arriving - on 24 Nov a detachment had reached the area South of UDINE from FRIULI and more troops were reported arriving in the UDINE area in early December. BIEGELBÜHL, NEUWIEDER and WIGISCHAU have fallen and finally, after a week's hard fighting, the capture of HÜRTGEN has opened the last approaches to the Siegfried line in this area. In the SÄGERHEIM sector the loss of SÄGERHEIM led to a substantial advance which has brought us to a line from REICHENBACH to SÜDERTHÜM. #### A. HUNGARY AND THE BALKANS

In Northern HUNGARY fierce fighting has taken place throughout the week in the MECSEK sector. Little progress has been made, but the Russians consolidated their previous gains by advancing some 5 miles along the railway leading North from the city.

Events to the North of the Hungarian capital have taken a new and dramatic turn and threaten to outshine the victories reported elsewhere by Marshal SOLODOVNIKOV. Marshal MULHOYER in a drive from the direction of HUNGARY reached and captured VACS on the DANUBE, and striking North is reported to have reached the Slovakian frontier on a 15 mile front beyond BUDAPEST. BUDAPEST, now surrounded from North, South and East, is facing the N.E. - one of its periods of German domination. Russian spearheads were 8 miles away to the North on the 10th while to the Northeast our allies have reached to within 10 miles of the city. Romanian troops are reported to be in the fore - and no better incentive could be offered to them than the capture of the Hungarian capital.

 The Russian breakthrough in Southern HUNGARY has been further exploited. By 6 Dec the whole of the Southern shore of Lake BALATON was reported clear of enemy and a further crossing of the DANUBE south of BUDAPEST had been effected. Advancing N.E. from BALATON our allies linked up in the area of Lake VOLKSEN and are now threatening the important communications centre of SZEGES-TERESSZER. The capture of this latter town would open up for the Russians one of the best routes to VIENNA. There is evidence that the enemy has hastily strengthened this sector, and one report states that the HUNGARIAN S.S. DIV is being hastily organised in the VELLOSI, D 85 area. This DIV is composed of young Hungarian volunteers from TRANSYLVANIA.

Meanwhile, the army on the ERZSA front has been given no respite. The Russians crossed the river Southeast of BURCS on the 9th and claim to hold a substantial bridgehead. BURCS lies firmly in Russian hands and unconfirmed reports state that VIROVITICA P 69 and SUDETEN P 68 have fallen to our allies thereby still further increasing the quantity of Army Group E.

To the Southeast fighting is taking place in the SEMI, centred on the Russian bridgehead at VUKOVAR X 18. German communiques claim they have virtually eliminated the Russian forces to the N.E. of the city but the Russians and Partisans are advancing N.W. along the railway or VUKOVAC X 18 which they claim to be threatening. The capture of VUKOVAC by our allies would render the German positions in VUKOVAC, and indeed the whole pocket from OSLET down the DANUBE to SONIN, untenable.

The figures for S Army are heavily weighted by 136 Russians and 153 Italians, all deserters, who make up about two-thirds of the whole; however, of a total of 83 Germans, 16 or 56% and of 22 Austrians 17 or 77% were deserters. The main explanation must lie in the difference between a static and an active front. On S Army Front opportunities for actually crossing the lines were much fewer than on the more fluid and mountainous Western sector of S Army Front; a deserter can take the easier option of remaining bold and when his comrades withdraw. In the latter case he is usually classified as an ordinary prisoner and not a deserter, an additional incentive for him but confusing for our statistics. It is dangerous therefore to build theories on enemy morale on these figures but the high proportion of pure German deserters on S Army Front is certainly encouraging.

We have further news this week of changes in Northern Italy. 162 division, whose withdrawal from the line in the RAVENNA sector was reported on 15 Nov, has been, but hardly identified at FIGLIZZO. It is apparently to take part in an anti-Partisan drive in the mountains to the SW. which is about 51 miles from the Junc track in N... ITALY before the Junc crisis and it necessary to put it onto the line, an experiment which has not been successful. In N... ITALY's usually reliable source states that, 157 Mtn Division is being withdrawn from the Alps and the troops of they are going to the BOLZOGNO front. It makes much more probably the move of 5 Mtn Div as this would leave the Junc of the France-Italian frontier to only 34 Div and LITZCHIO; in any case units apparently of 5 Mtn Div were reported moving up towards the frontier on 15 Nov in the V.M. IT. SUB. It seems very likely that 5 Mtn and LITZCHIO together will take over the Central and Northern part of the frontier, probably intermingled so as to avoid constructing one large sector in LITZCHIO. The various lost reports which have suggested a move of 5 Mtn Div may have been based on a mistaken identity of 157 Mtn Div or of 3 and 4 Alpine Div. In North-Eastern ITALY two further reports from good sources mention the departure of 44 Div, one by its number and the other by the word of the Divisional Commander, Gen von HOLTZ. In both cases its destination is given as HISTRI.

## 2. WESTERN FRONT

The rapid drive of French forces on to the RHINE North of BASE last week did not go unchallenged. Although MACQUIN and BELNAT soon fell to the French, 19 Army realized sufficiently to launch a limited counter-attack with the object of cutting through to the Swiss frontier South of BELFORT. The attack was there but the flesh was weak and the armour too constant. Doubtless 19 Army had hoped to do at BELFORT what RAFFET failed to do at CHAMBERS, but all he achieved was a certain limited infiltration into our positions which has not been reported yet. Nevertheless the tactics were sound, 19 Army's situation in the VOSGES is serious and would be disastrous if the Allies succeeded in driving Northern Vosges towards COLMAR combined with a Southern push from STRASBURG. Divisions are all represented. What they amount to on the 3rd, 2d is a different matter. Their inability to stop the armies crossing the German frontier on a 20-mile front east of SIEGEN can hardly be encouraging to the enemy. Notwithstanding their presence in this sector it is an indication that it enjoys a priority second only to that of the AACHEN area.

West of AACHEN German resistance has shown no sign of slackening in the course of the past week. Impeded by thick rainfields and difficult dining hillside progress has been slow. Some advances have been made in the HINDENBURG Forest, but the most important advance of the week has been along the ESCHEMILLER - DUESSEN road where REICHENBERG and FERNDORF to the North-East have been captured, an advance of about 5 miles in all. Progress has also been made in the direction of JUNGEN, and we hold the high ground about a mile west of the town. Although nothing in the way of an Allied breakthrough has been achieved in this area, there are indications that HINDENBURG is under pressure. 5 Pz Army has been reinforced by 10 SS, 12 Pz Div from the AACHEN area, and more important still, no regiment of 1 S.S. Pz Div of 6 Pz Army has been identified North-East of ESCHEMILLER. This may preage the collapse of the whole of 6 Pz Army - the army's last armoured reserve. It certainly implies a lack of confidence regarding the ability of his present forces to check the Allied assault unassisted.

North of AACHEN heavy rain and extended flooding have reduced operations in the Arnsberg area markedly.

South of VELD the enemy has abandoned the whole of the West bank of the MAAS, although clinging to a bridgehead at VELD itself. Further North, after acting through mind and motor-bogged country, we have reached the last 15 miles North of VELD against light resistance, the enemy now has only light security forces on the West bank of the MAAS here and the administration of this bridgehead is only a matter of time.

The enemy's prospects have thus deteriorated still further in the past week. In the South, the last 10 army can now hope only to get itself back intact across the RHINE. In the Central sector the allied threat in the Saar area soon to even more disastrous than that from AACHEN. Only in the AACHEN area has RUNDSTEDT come near to executing the plan which German propaganda has assured us we shall have to pay for every yard of German soil. The enemy now has only light garrison forces on the West bank of the Maas here and the elimination of this bridgehead is only a matter of time.

The enemy's prospects are, thus, deteriorated still further in the past week. In the South, the West 29 Army can now hope for is to get itself back intact across the RHINE. In the Central sector the Allied threat in the Saar may soon be even more serious than that from AGRAIL. German Panzer Corps is reported operating in the BIALA area under Lt.Gen KLEINLY, one time commander of 90 Light Division in the desert, and later of assault Division KONES.

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In Northern Yugoslavia, the Germans have reported throughout the week Soviet attacks from the DUNAV bridgeheads at ZAGREB, and PELJEŠAC. MDSOM has remained silent about these, but it seems very probable that an attempt is being made to link up those two bridgeheads with the object of establishing a firm base on the west bank of the DANUBE preparatory to a drive North of the DANUBA into South WEST HUNGARY.

In W.E. YUGOSLAVIA, the enemy is still trying to open up the UZZICE (C 61) - ZAGREB (C 12) road. The fact that the enemy allows the Partisans to operate so near to KRALJEVO suggests that Army Group E is here for the most part North of a line NOVI PRAZAK - R.S.D. and the day may not be far distant when the whole front will start pivoting back on KRALJEVO. H.Q. Army Group E is now reported at SARAJEVO with 22 1sttn Corps and 91 & 117 Corps coming up from the South. Between these formations have under command four fairly weak divisions with battle groups of two others.

The withdrawal of Army Group B from MONTENEGRO (J 30) last week left 21 Mtn Corps isolated in MONTENEGRO and Northumbria (R.N.M.). These Notes have been introduced to meet the requirements of certain units not normally in receipt of the ordinary Intelligence Summary issued by this HQ. Their purpose is to keep such units in the general battle picture.

1. SITUATION

There has been but little change in enemy forward dispositions this weekend and that all at the extreme Eastern end of his line. Further South, however, in the sector of 9 P.G.R. and 39 G.A.P. we were able to make better progress in an area where the enemy has not the same advantage of winter obstacles, capturing CASALDUG, N 316 and the stubbornly defended Monte FORTINO, N 324, and advancing some two kilometers further North at both points. It seems likely that in this area the enemy will next try to hold a line shown on a captured map (as Led GRILLI, probably a junction line from the original GRILLI) which follows the upper reaches of the river COSTA to MONTE RICCI N 328, and then presumably backs itself on the river MARSHIC. Monte RICCI is particularly important as it affords dominating observation over the low ground below the present enemy line and over ZENZA and 37. Further advances in this sector must make the MONTONE line, at least in the neighbourhood of 5530

On the whole of the rest of the front there have been only minor operations. In the Centre MEZZ has been forced, and the MOULID crossed in strength, while at AIGEN and to the North British and American forces have made slow but steady progress over terrain vital to the enemy against stubborn German resistance.

In the South LG Army, with a collection of formations presenting an army more formidable on paper than on the ground, was unable to resist for long before the MESSINA Gap and by 19 November its left wing had completely collapsed and the French forces by a double thrust to occupy BELFIORE and push along the Sicilian frontier to the TUNESE on a ten mile stretch North of BISKRA. 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Division which has been identified just North of TETR was set up in POLAND some six weeks ago and has only just arrived in FRANCE. PW from this formation say that they were accorded to the West by yet another Volksgrenadier division, this time from CZECHOSLOVAKIA. The fact that the enemy considers it necessary to bring formations all across EUROPE from the East at the present time is a clear indication of the priority which the Western front enjoys in his eyes.

In the AGDEN sector the fiercest fighting of the week has taken place. In the face of savage enemy resistance and horrors very extensive minefields, our advance has been slow. This is the vital sector of the front for the enemy and he must cling to every yard of German soil in order to keep the allies from the RHINE. Nevertheless progress has been made in the past week. We are only six miles from DUREN, ESCHE LIN has been entered, and GELSENKIRCHEN is entirely in our hands. An assortment of Infantry divisions backed up by armour in the form of 9 and 116 Pz and 3 and 15 Pz, G Divisions that sort of the five missing Panzer divisions have now gotten ready to participate in the battle. No real improvement is reported in Rose's food situation during the last month. The soaring cost of transportation and local corruption are keeping prices at high levels and are causing considerable discontent. (See JICA Rome Report No. RD-146, Black Market in Rome).

At its meeting on 23 October, the Italian Cabinet voted to authorize the Ministry of the Treasury to make available through banks and credit institutions a credit of two billion lire, to be used for financing industrial reconstruction.

The Christian Democrats took issue and refused to have anything to do with the reforms at this time. Toward the latter part of the week, the inter-party polemics in the press quieted down and at the ministerial meeting of 20 October, tranquility reigned.

Clement: This recurrence of agitation on the part of the extremist parties shows how fragile is the present collaboration of the parties in the government. The government is facing a number of difficult questions, particularly financial and currency difficulties, raising of wages, and concerning separation in Sicily. The extremist parties are counting upon "a wind which will blow down from the North" to bring about a solution in their favor.

acts of violence which are to be related to the general political and economic unrest are increasing in gravity. Most serious of this week's episodes was the Palermo outbreak over which the people and the government are deeply concerned.

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It is said that peasants invaded lands belonging to Prince TYZIAK, following the brahmins in negotiations through which they had hoped to gain authorisation to cultivate those lands. Some hundreds of peasants are reported to have been involved and to have refused to obey the orders of the guards and cartridges to halt. Thereon, the guard opened fire, killing one and wounding five peasants. The Socialist and Communist press are very much wrought up over this incident.

The Polish peasant party has complained to SET of a series of incidents between Polish troops and members of their party. The DPPS also reported that the latter has been abusing the aggressors in all cases, taken up with the concern of Polish troops and that a cessation of trials is hoped for.

There is very little change in the subversive situation from previous reports. A local intelligence agency is investigating unconfirmed reports that Fascist elements are re-organizing in Rome for the purpose of carrying on Fifth Column activity. According to these reports, Fascist sympathizers are leaving the territory near the front and moving down to Rome where they will be able to conduct their activity with less surveillance on the part of Allied military authorities. The fact that former collaborators are leaving forward areas, is confirmed by numerous reports of numerous arrests of Nazi-Fascist collaborators who are no longer active but who are returning to Rome with the hope of remaining out of sight until conditions return to normal.

The crime rate continues to be a very serious problem in the city of Rome. Right patrols are being increased and it is expected that conditions will improve somewhat. The Italian police continue to be poorly organized, poorly equipped and greatly underpaid. Reports in concerning on the action of the Italian police during the Garibaldi lynching, is reported to have said, "that can you expect of police who eat only one meal per day". It is reliably reported that, except for the commanding generals of the Italian police force, no one earns more than \$50 per month.

#### IV. LOYALTY OF THE ITALIAN TROOPS

Morale of the Italian troops who are under the command of Allied units is reported to be very high. The welfare and comfort of Italian soldiers is usually provided on a par with that of allied troops. Italian formations, on the other hand, do not have those welfare facilities and apparently make little attempt to improve the soldiers' morale. As a result, there is much discontent and many more desertions from Italian units than from those under Allied command. Desertions among the Italian soldiers are fairly numerous for the following reasons:

1. Italy has been almost constantly at war since 1936 and soldiers are non-vary.
2. They are dissatisfied with the general conditions in the Army.
3. Many soldiers want to return to their families to help during the bad economic crisis which Italy is now undergoing.
4. Deserters are fairly safe from being caught and punished because Italian military authorities do not have the necessary facilities for apprehending them.

A principal factor that contributes to the lowering of the discipline of the Italian soldier is because the Italian officers and non-commissioned officers do not have the same control or have the same personal contact and comradeship with the men as exists in the Allied forces.

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V. CURRENT SITUATION

The ominous atmosphere of the past two weeks which resulted from the improvement in Italian-Ally relations, has now threatened by internal disturbances. Several distinct events are in evidence.

Lots of violence are breeding in number and in gravity. By far the most serious is the massacre in Sicily. Further instances of the resort to violence in settling disputes are hardly less disturbing and they indicate the fundamental distrust of the government's ability to solve these problems with speed and justice.

The result of discord between two of the strongest parties participating in the Ministry again accentuates the fundamental weakness of the present government based as it is on artificial, unrepresentative inherently hostile factions.

No particular improvement in the economic situation is apparent but there is promise in the government's action in providing for financing reconstruction and attempting to remedy the basic conditions underlying Sicilian unrest.

#### II. Economic

##### 3. Reconstruction

Some changes have been made in the general reconstruction  
structure of the country. The former "Industrial Committee for Reconstruction"  
(made up of the Ministries of Communications, Finance, Treasury, Agriculture,  
Industry, Fisheries and Labor), and meeting separately under the President of  
Soviet, sometimes or one of the Ministers without Portfolio, held two meetings  
this week. The second was devoted exclusively to consideration of a special  
plan for the economic rehabilitation of Sicily.

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CONFIDENTIAL The Cabinet approved a measure making available a Government credit amounting to 2 billion lire to be used in the reconstruction of industry.

The Allies Control Commission has issued a long report detailing the accomplishments of the Allies and the Italian working together in the rehabilitation of public works and utilities in southern and central Italy. (Report published in Basic News 18 Oct).

## 4. Electric Power Shortage

The serious electric current situation, which has been causing so much discontent among the Roman populace, is to be somewhat improved. Details have been announced for a change in the distribution scheme, which, it is hoped, will be more suitable and do away with at least a part of the complaints which fill the daily press. Three of Rome's daily papers did not appear on the afternoon of the 16th in protest against what they termed to be the injustice and unreasonableness of the present distribution of available current.

5. The food situation remains unchanged for the most part, with food supplies fairly abundant on the black-market, but at prices beyond the reach of working classes (see Point 4c subject: The Black-market).

## III. MISCELLANEOUS

## 7. Welfare

a. A central relief organization has been formed in Rome, "Unione Romana Assistenza", to coordinate all activities on the several relief associations. Ten political parties and fifteen welfare agencies are listed as members (Corriere di Roma 17 Oct).

b. The week beginning 22 October has been designated Italian Red Cross Week. Rome is to be divided into 8 zones and a systematic collection of clothing will be undertaken for the benefit of the more unfortunate. The Corriere di Roma is conducting a campaign to collect subscriptions. **5,000** benefits are to be held.

Comment: It will be interesting to see whether this well organized campaign appealing to the people of Rome to help others less fortunate than themselves, will meet with greater success than have the previous, more amateurish attempts (see Weekly News Summary dated 25 Sept, p. 12).

## 8. Education

The original date set for re-opening the schools has had to be advanced because the school buildings were not ready in time. However, 8 November has been fixed for resumption of instruction in the secondary schools.

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#### 8. Education

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A great deal of criticism of the Allies has appeared in the press because of the requisitioning of so many school buildings. At present sufficient buildings have been returned to the Italian authorities to make possible a resumption of classes on a basis of two or three shifts per day.

Comment: The Education Sub-Commission AGC confirmed the shortage of school buildings now available. Many are still occupied by military organizations which are using them for hospitals or barracks. Some others have been taken over for housing bombed-out families and refugees. This latter group, however, offers no serious problem, since they can be evicted and the building returned to its proper use, as soon as it has been cleaned and disinfected.
