To : Mac-Power Commission, A.C.

1. AFHQ has ruled that when Radio stations are released by Allied Military Agencies for operation by Italians, Allied Commission will assume the responsibility for security control of such stations.
2. The minimum personnel with which such control can be effected has been agreed to by AFHQ as 2 Officers as supervisory staff and 3 EM/CRs per city in which a station or group of stations is allowed to operate.
3. AFHQ has now authorized return to Italian operation of a limited number of Radio stations in Rome and is arranging for the assignment to A.C. of personnel necessary for security control.
4. As exercise of such control is a technical communication problem it clearly falls within the scope of this Sub Commission personnel assigned to A.C. for such purpose should therefore be assigned to this Sub Commission. However when authorized strength of this Sub Commission was established, exercise of control of Radio stations was not envisaged. It will therefore be necessary to authorize an increase in strength.
5. Request authorized strength of this Sub Commission be increased by 2 officers and 3 EM/CRs.

1. A study of the duties of the "Civilian Personnel Director" of the Allied Commission will show the following military aspects which make it essential that the director be a military person.

- (1) He must accomplish the military duties marked in Red on the attached Memorandum No.35
- (2) He must answer or find the answers to questions involving the relationship of the military organization and the various civilian agencies connected with this Headquarters shown on the attached list. (See copy of our Civilian Report.)

2. It is thought that this office above all others, because it is the one focal point for civilians to contact the Allied Commission should have the prestige of military rank and be directed by a Military Officer. Furthermore, a civilian has neither the experience, nor training required to deal with the many problems of military procedure and organization; whereas, an officer with a general army background is better able to meet the situation.

CIVILIAN PERSONNEL PROCEDURE

1. GENERAL.

- a. The standard operating procedure for reception, assignment and departure of all Allied civilian personnel, reporting to the Commission is established in order to centralize the general administration and prevent duplication of effort by the agencies, sub-commissions and civilians concerned.
- b. The Civilian Personnel Director will be responsible to the Vice-President of the Establishment Section for the execution of this plan.

2. DEFINITIONS.

- a. "Attached" will be used in relationship to all personnel who do not come under the assigning jurisdiction of any Allied Commission official, but are officially connected with this Commission for their daily work.

3. PROCEDURE.

- (1) The Head of the civilian agency will give advanced warning of new arrivals and have them report immediately to the Civilian Personnel Director, (or Duty Officer after office hours), with all credentials. *The officer must know military orders.*
- (2) No responsibility or privilege shall be allowed any civilian until the registration formalities are completed.

- (1) Each Allied Civilian will present a copy of his orders and sign the appropriate Headquarters Register upon arrival and departure.

c. Classification.

(1) The Civilian Personnel Director will determine the "assigned", "attached", or "miscellaneous" status and the degree of Allied Commission responsibility. *The officer must understand the meaning of these terms.*

(2) If assimilated rank is not stated by the Home Office of the Parent agency, the Civilian Personnel Director will recommend the case to the Allied Commission adjutant for an appropriate letter of identification. *Army Administration Section*

d. Assignment.

(1) Initial Allied Commission Section assignments will be made by the Civilian Personnel Director. *It is the policy of the AC to handle assignments through the AC.*

Subject: Officer Requirements - Northern Italy & Austria.

To: C.A. Section for Manpower Committee

1. at this date Displaced Persons and Repatriation Sub-Commission hold 55 officers on their books with one officer (Lt.Col. KERR) awaiting re-assignment out of an Establishment of 57 officers.
2. Of the above 55 officers, 6 officers have been remarked or assigned for Austria. (Appendix "A"). Major DUBOUR and Captain Y. KLEY have actually reported to the Austria Planning Set Up. I understand that further officers will be required for Austria and it is impossible to port with the above or give up more, unless replacements are forthcoming immediately. Camp Commanders require training like other men, and as their duty will be supervising Italian Military personnel it is essential that they be allied Officers and NOT Civilians.
3. I have now studied in detail my requirements when North West Italy is occupied (Phase I), and the results are shown in Appendix "B". (under Phase I) a total of 64 officers.
It will be observed that in Phase I, five Group H.Q. are requested for ten "Centres" (each of 5,000)
They have the additional function of liaison with Military, Region and Provincial Headquarters.
In Phase II they will control a further 12 Centres (each of 5,000) and 20 Frontier Repatriation Posts (each of 1,000)
4. For Phase II an extra 36 officers will be required for the 12 additional Centres and 20 Frontier Repatriation Posts as shown in Appendix "B" (under Phase II)
5. I consider that if these officers cannot be obtained from within the ceiling allowed to the Allied Commission, immediate application should be made to A.F.H.Q. for further officers for this very important commitment.

NOTES of Meeting of Manpower & Reorganisation Committee held on

Saturday 30 Dec 44.

Chief of Staff presided.

The first item under discussion was personnel required by Transportation Sub Commission and Mr. M. H. Taylor read a letter giving details of the requirements of this Sub Commission.

The demands submitted for members of officers and W/Os did not include those who would be required for operating certain HQ Transportation functions, as it was understood that they would be the responsibility of Establishment Section. A planning staff of 3 officers was suggested for the work of long range planning, liaison with various Italian Government officials, and all planning required for the N. E. Regions.

Rail Division. Mr. Taylor explained that it was necessary for these officers to keep in close touch, and in fact work by the side, of Italian railway officials, to concentrate on locomotive repairs, and on repairs of all rolling stock, and to maintain an active supervision in regard to the upkeep of the whole railway system of Italy.

Port Shipment and Warehouse Division. Personnel was discussed without adverse comments.

Road Division. Personnel was discussed without adverse comments. Administration Branch. The duties of the 2 officers required should be to collate all matters on personnel from Regions, to deal with operational problems of road transport on regional and provincial basis, and operation of railway employees. Brig. Upjohn thought that perhaps Transportation Sub Commission was becoming too much involved in the Italian rail system. Col. Denmore stated that Transportation Sub Commission and Public Works & Utilities Sub Commission were alike in this matter and that it was essential in both cases for them to extend their activities in this direction rather more than other Sub Commissions. Brig. Upjohn then expressed the opinion that the one officer for operation would not have a full time job and would have time for other duties, but generally speaking he was in agreement.

Shipping Division. It was unanimously agreed that a great deal more help could be given by this Division.

Stores, Accounting & Issuing Spares Part and Motor Transport. The responsibility for the accounting and issuing of spare parts, tyres etc. for use on both military and civilian vehicles operated by the Transportation Sub Committee was discussed. At this point Col. Evans, Director of Commerce Sub Commission was called in to the Committee and asked whether he could undertake this responsibility in the same way as he was already handling locally manufactured articles. Col. Evans agreed to do this, and it was decided that Col. Denmore, Col. Evans and Mr. Taylor should discuss the whole subject.

Mr. Taylor stated that Mr. Vaughan, Director of Industry Sub Commission was willing to assume responsibility for supervision of factories.

for the work of long range planning, liaison with various Italian Government officials, and all planning required for the N.E. Regions.

- c) Planning Staff - 3 Officers. These officers are now available in Priorities & Movements Division and will perform their present functions as members of Transportation Sub-Commission.
- d) Movements Division - 16 Officers, 1 Warrant Officer, 8 ESM/OSs. This corresponds to the British Army Movement Control. The division will be divided into rail, road, and shipping branches, which will be responsible for seeing that the priorities determined by the Priorities Board are carried out. The division will make programs of what is to be carried by rail, road, and sea and keep records of the tonnages transported; but it will not be responsible for the technical supervision of the carrying agency which is the concern of the Rail, Road, and Port Divisions referred to below. The set-up meets the requirements of G-4 (Mov & Tr), AFHQ. This constitutes an increase in personnel of Transportation Sub-Commission of 11 Officers and 6 ESM/OSs.
- e) Rail Division - 14 Officers, 4 ESM/OSs. This constitutes an increase of 4 officers and 3 ESM/OSs. This increase in officer strength is covered in Transportation Sub-Commission's memorandum 11 December 44, which has been previously agreed by the Manpower Committee. Additional ESM/OS strength is necessary to conduct increased volume of clerical work.
- f) Port, Shipment & Warehouse Division - 7 Officers, 2 ESM/OSs. This constitutes an increase of 3 officers in addition to those presently available. It is proposed they be distributed as follows:
 - 1) A Division Chief.
 - 2) Ports Branch - 3 Officers to plan for and give technical instructions to regional officers and inspect port operations.
 - 3) Warehouse & Forwarding Branch - 2 Officers, 1 ESM/OS, to inspect and plan for procurement of warehouses; give technical instructions in this connection.
 - 4) Operations Branch - 1 Officer, 1 ESM/OS, to formulate policy and give technical advice in connection with schooner and shipping operations; maintain liaison with COGEMA and other shipping authorities.
- g) Road Division - 10 Officers, 1 Warrant Officer, 9 ESM/OSs. This constitutes an increase of 5 Officers, 8 ESM/OSs. The responsibilities of Road Division will be centralized at Transportation Sub-Commission HQ instead of being generally distributed between field and HQ operations. Proposed composition of Road Division is as follows:
 - 1) Division Chief.
 - 2) Administrative Branch - 2 Officers, 1 Warrant Officer, 2 ESM/OSs. Administrative Branch of this size is necessitated by the large number of field personnel in the various

regions and the paper work necessary to provide maintenance facilities and deal with operational problems of road transport on regional and provincial basis.

- 3) Maintenance Branch - 3 Officers, 5 EME/ONS. This personnel will give technical assistance in maintenance matters, form inspection teams to assist regional and provincial maintenance officers, develop policies in connection with maintenance practice and maintain direct liaison with appropriate Italian officials.
- 4) Operations Branch - 2 Officers, 1 EM/OR. This branch will assist Italian Government with placing in operation of EMAC plan and given technical advice concerning the efficient operation of highway vehicles to insure the maximum utilization thereof.
- 5) Supply Branch - 2 Officers, 1 EM/OR. This branch will plan and accumulate regional requirements of supplies necessary for highway transport and will be responsible for the preparation of proper requisitions for supply and distribution thereof to the regions and other operating agencies.
- b) Administration Division - 3 Officers, 2 Warrant Officers, 5 EME/ONS. This constitutes a reduction in officer strength of 2 Officers, 1 additional Warrant Officer, 3 additional EME/ONS, or net personnel increase of 2. Functions of the administrative division cover the keeping of personnel records which will be done by the Chief Administrative Officer.
- i) Accounting Branch - 2 Officers, 1 Warrant Officer, 2 EME/ONS. This branch will keep all warehouse accounts and furnish necessary information to Principal Accountant, Finance Sub-Commission; accumulate and provide all necessary statistics to movements division.
- j) Chief Clerk Branch - 1 Warrant Officer, 4 EME/ONS. This branch will operate the central files and will provide stenographic and secretarial services to other divisions and branches.

2. The total proposed strength of Transportation Sub-Commission constitutes an increase of 21 Officers, 2 Warrant Officers, and 21 EME/ONS. Four of these officers have already been authorized, 7 are attached, and not yet assigned; 3 EME/ONS are attached and not yet assigned. The attached and not assigned officers and EME/ONS are composed principally of men supplied by G-4 (Move & Tr) AFHQ.

GAINS AND LOSSES IN OFFICER STRENGTH

The 2675th Regiment, since the 1st of October, has lost an average of 16 officers a month by what might be called "normal attrition". This includes those going home on rotation, those transferred to other units, and so on.

The gains, since the 1st of October, have come, with only one or two exceptions, from officers on TD with the 2675th Regiment, from other units or from replacement depots, being assigned to fill the vacancies left by the departure of other officers. For example, of 20 officers actually picked up in the last thirty days, 10 came direct from Replacement Depots, one came from hospital (a former AC officer), and the balance from other units. Of these last the bulk had been working with AC for some time on TD.

1. I am enclosing an appreciation prepared by General Browning of the Land Forces Subcommission concerning the repatriation of ex-Italian military personnel. From the point of view of the Land Forces Subcommission, all returning Italian military personnel, either prisoners of war or not, are considered as civilians. Nevertheless, the Italian War Ministry is the agency of the Italian Government designated to receive, document and distribute to their homes, to military units, or to hospitals, these former soldiers. 3. I propose that the Italian Prisoners of War section of the Italian Prisoners of War and War Material Disposal Subcommission be transferred to the Land Forces Subcommission. This will require from AFHQ an alteration of the existing directive to MMIA and the authorization of such additional means as may be required. I, therefore, suggest that the matter be studied by your Headquarters in the light of the attached memorandum and that the appropriate sections of your staff confer with General Browning on the details of the organization.

MEMORANDUM

1. In order to meet enlarged responsibilities placed upon Transportation Sub-Commission by DMPS, three Railway Engineers are needed. At present only two engineers are available in Rail Division. These enlarged responsibilities in general are:

- a) Planning and directing the rebuilding of bridges on lines under control of DMPS.
- b) Planning and directing rebuilding of railway between Ancona and Ortona.
- c) Planning and directing reconstruction of line Arezzo-Florence.
- d) Plan and direct reconstruction of Arno River line, Leghorn-Bologna.
- e) Plan and direct double tracking Rome-Orte, Route 65.
- f) Plan and direct reconstruction of rail lines in NW Italy.
- g) A large responsibility already rests on the Rail Division, Transportation Sub-Commission for reconstruction and rehabilitation of lines which are not a military requirement. Much work in this category is already in progress.

2. In order to provide an adequate field force for Northern Italy, eight experienced Railway Officers should be made available so that they may commence working with Teams already formed for Northern Italy.

3. This additional Officer personnel is urgently needed at the earliest possible date.

1. At the man power meeting held on Monday 4 December 1944 the Chairman directed that an investigation be carried out and a report submitted as to the desirability of organising the Displaced Persons and Repatriation Sub-Commission on a Regional basis.

2. After careful and thorough investigation by G-1 British, CA Section and this Sub-Commission it is considered that it is not desirable to organise the Displaced Persons and Repatriation Sub-Commission on a Regional basis for the following reasons:-

(a) Policy regarding Displaced Persons and War Refugees would be dealt with by eight Regional Commissioners - Appendix 'A'.

(b) The demand for Camp Staff, Reception Centres, Accommodation Centres and Hospitals remains the same as shown in Appendix 'B'. The only saving would be (after U.N.R.R.A. has taken over Southern Camps) Sub-Section No. for Northern Italy 4 Officers and 12 OR/EN.

(c) Regions in which camps are in existence and are contemplated is as shown in Appendix 'C'. A total of eight Regions are affected which would require 16 Officers and 12 OR/EN. This would result in an increase of staff to deal with questions on Regional level.

(d) The DPT & PR Officers would deal with many questions concerning organisation and set up of camps, Reception Centres, Accommodation Centres and Hospitals which cannot be decided on Regional level and must be referred to Sub-Commission HQ. resulting in a lengthening of the chain of Command. (e) The organization based on Sub-Sections working direct with this Sub-Commission's HQ, which has direct contact with other Sub-Commissions, AAI and G-5 A.F.H.Q. results in speedy decisions and smooth and efficient dealing with the many important and urgent questions concerning Allied Nationals and Italian Refugees.

(F) A Regional Representative was appointed by this Sub-Commission to Region 2 and the Staff Officer merely became a post office, causing unnecessary delays.

Similar experience when the Sub-Commission had a Liaison Officer at A.C.C.I.C.

In both cases the appointment was cancelled.

3. In conclusion we saving in man power would be achieved by putting Displaced Persons Sub-Committee on a Regional basis. This would be lost and chain of Command become confused. It is suggested that the organization as it stands is more efficient and workable than if placed on a Regional basis.

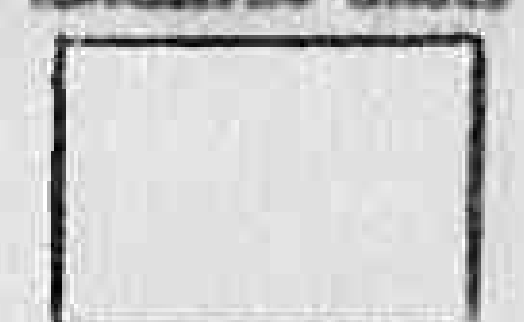
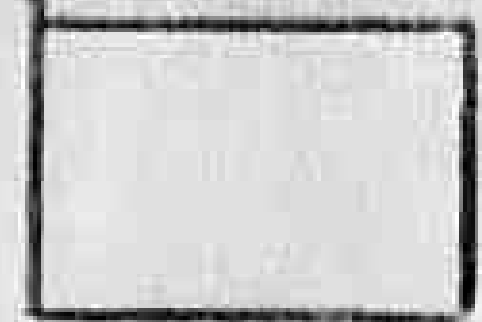

TO: The Secretary,

1. Reference is made to conversation (Col. A.P. Graftey-Smith - Lt-Col. J.L. Jones) and to this Sub-Commission's letters 13015/F dated 9 November 1944 and 30 November 1944 addressed respectively to Executive Officer (9) and to Deputy Chief of Staff, Establishments Section, copies of which are attached for reference.

2. Attached at Appendix 'A' is a chart showing present assigned strengths at Headquarters, in Regions and with AMG Armies; though it is pointed out that many of the officers assigned to Northern Regions are attached for duty to Regions in the South, subject to recall by their Regional Commissioners at 48 hours notice. The total finance officer strength is 145.

3. Appendix 'B' shows the proposed allocation of Finance Officers for the administration of the whole of Italy assuming a ceiling of 160 officers. It will be seen that the aim of this increased allocation is to strengthen the greatly weakened Provincial Finance Officer strengths in the Northern Regions. It has been the experience of this Sub-Commission that on taking over newly liberated territory, a Regional Commissioner endeavours to assign one Provincial Finance Officer to each Province in his Region, an aim with which the Joint Directors are fully in agreement. It will be seen that in the case of, for example, Venezia Region, the number of Provincial Finance Officers has been reduced to six, a number quite inadequate efficiently to administer the fifteen Provinces within that Region. The increase of two officers at Headquarters is assuming approval to the increase in Headquarters Officer ceiling strength applied for in 13015/F dated 30 November 1944.

4. The transfer to another theatre of at least nine officers leaves this Sub-Commission in the position that it would not be able properly to fulfil its functions were there a rapid evacuation by the enemy of the four Regions in the North of Italy. In these circumstances, it is stressed that every endeavour should be made to secure the services of suitably qualified officers for immediate assignment to Regional Finance Staffs for training, within a ceiling of 160 officers.

2. The total Finance officer strength of 129 is presumably made up as follows:

3. In addition, there are 17 Property Control Officers with Regions, bringing total Finance officer strength to 146.

4. It is not considered desirable by this Sub-Commission to differentiate between Finance and Property Control Officers at Headquarters and in the field; and it is requested that a new combined ceiling of 160 officers be allotted to Finance Sub-Commission for these functions efficiently to be carried out.

5. It is pointed out that all of the additional officers are not required immediately; but it is clear that when the whole of Italian territory is liberated, it will not be possible to withdraw sufficient officers from the South to staff the new Regions. As an example, the recent withdrawal from the strength of Venezia Region of Major Curtis and Major Nash has left this Region with but seven Provincial Finance Officers, a number that is totally inadequate and must be supplemented. It is felt, however, that if suitable officers can be found and assigned now to financial duties with the Allied Commission, this should be done within the ceiling of 160 officers.

6. In these circumstances it is urged that the Finance ceiling be increased to 160, and every endeavour made to obtain suitably qualified officers up to this figure.

1. The Allied Financial Agency, a sub-section of the Finance Sub-Commission, is now engaged in unloading an order of thirty billion L.M. Lire (approximately 3,000 boxes) in the ports of Livorno and Naples for shipment and storage at the Allied Financial Agency branches at Naples, Rome and Florence.

2. This L.M. Lire is the sole currency available for paying Allied troops in Italy and for providing funds to the banking system in case of emergency. Early in January 1945 the Allied Financial Agency will be engaged in receiving, shipping and storing for the Italian Government 18,000 boxes of currency coming to ports in Italy from the United States in approximately 36 ships over a period of 3 or 4 months. These shipments total in bulk and entail more work than all the shipments of currency previously received in Italy to date by the Allied Financial Agency.

3. It is therefore strongly recommended that the officer strength of the Finance Sub-Commission be increased by two officers and the enlisted personnel strength be increased by four in order to handle this extremely large volume of currency with the necessary safeguards. The officers are required for arrangements, supervision and checking; the enlisted men are required for record keeping and particularly for guarding the currency in transit.

6. I have not at any time agreed that the allotment of staff decided by Manpower and Reorganization Committee would be sufficient to run the Sub-Commission efficiently.

After operating for 2 months I am still convinced that the ceiling figures are inadequate. I reiterate that until such time as I can withdraw my staff from the South Italy Reorganization Centres I estimate I will need at least a minimum additional 15 officers and 30 GIs if we are to operate efficiently in Northern Italy as and when liberated.

It is also brought to your notice that I have approximately 30 British GIs who are eligible for return to ME on long service grounds and who may be withdrawn at any time. These GIs are holding key positions and must be replaced on their return to ME.

7. (a) The functions of the Sub-Commission are varied and executive and in view of the high proportion of civilian staff employed in the Reorganization Centres, Allied personnel are absolutely essential to supervise relations, transport and hygiene.

(b) My transport problem is a serious one and unless I retain qualified supervising Allied military personnel the maintenance of my present allotment of vehicles will suffer.

8. The repatriation problem is developing daily and recently we have been asked to provide connecting trains of Allied military personnel and Italian military. On the present strength of personnel I cannot continue to do this unless additional personnel are made available.

9. During the past year leave for officers and GIs has not been possible without seriously affecting the organization and in cases of illness in key positions a heavy burden is thrown on the limited staff available.

10. I understand that there is a proposal that I should take over the administration and care of the remnants of the Partisan Division in four camps in the GRAZIA Area with a capacity of some 20,000. These were previously dealt with by 2nd Military Division, whose military functions in training of partisan soldiers has come to an end and their present problem is merely a refugee one. I cannot hope to do this with my present strength of personnel.

(a) agreement to hold additional to my establishment, officers who are posted to MAC 5th and 8th Armies in excess of the 8 which I agreed should be provided by me to 5th and 8th Armies out of my ceiling strength.

(b) agreement that my total GIs establishment shall be ¹⁴² ~~140~~.

(c) agreement that Allied Medical Officers and GIs will not count against establishment personnel.

(d) Further, I consider it is essential for me to hold 8 additional officers on my establishment to provide for the following:

(i) to maintain Transit Camps to deal with emergency repatriation to and from Italy.

(ii) to provide conducting teams to and from Italy as has occurred recently

(iii) to provide Forward Representatives to Military Formations as and when necessary. I now have 3 officers and 4 GIs as Forward Representatives. This was not anticipated in the original appropriation.

(iv) to allow for leave and illness.

12. My future requirements, if Northern Italy is liberated prior to my heading over South Italy Accommodation Centres to UNRRA, are at least an additional 15 officers and 50 GIs.

13. I request that the personnel question of this Sub-Commission be reviewed and strong representation be made for the increase in the ceiling strength.

MEMORANDUM:

TO : Deputy Chief of Staff (Establishment Section), Allied Commission.

1. Since 19 September 1944, the following events have occurred which have greatly increased the work of the 2675th Regiment, and consequently the Establishment Section:

a. The 1st Truck Battalion, 2675th Regiment, was organized 6 October 1944. This battalion will have eight (8) companies which almost doubles the work of the Adjutant and Personnel Adjutant office of the Regiment. The supplies for this battalion will equal $3/4$ of the present supplies of the Regiment, which means that the S-4 office will very soon require an increase in officer personnel.

b. Most of our supplies for the PX (US) and the Regiment are required to be hauled from Naples since 28 September 1944, as the supply point here in Rome never have sufficient stock on hand.

c. The records of approximately 300 trucks of the Transportation Sub-Commission have been turned over to the Regimental S-4 office for accountability. I regret to report that an inspection of these records show that they are in very poor shape. A great deal of research will be required by officers who will have to complete the survey for the lost and stolen vehicles.

d. At present, AG Headquarters is undergoing a reorganization which is throwing additional duties on the Establishment Section.

e. The Civil Employee Section under O-1 (A), has had its work greatly increased to secure high caliber civilians to replace SA/CM's needed in the northern regions. The officer in charge has been declared surplus and the work is now being done by a Sergeant under the supervision of O-1 (A).

f. May I point out that among the ~~subordinates~~ ^{officers} (13) US officers in the Establishment Section, seven (7) are required by US Army Regulations.

SUBJECT : Office of the Chief of Staff

8 November 1944

TO : Secretary Personnel Organisation Committee.

1. The personnel of the Office of the Chief of Staff are all Staff Officers in the accepted sense, and as an introduction to an examination of their duties it is proposed to give an overall picture of the staff work entitled and common to each of them, as follows :

(a) Primarily to coordinate the work of the Headquarters.

This involves not only constant study of correspondence and reports emanating from both inside and outside this Headquarters, but also visits to sections and sub-Commissions as coordinating work cannot be done from the desk alone.

(b) To carry out such work as is necessary to implement the decisions made by the Acting Chief Commissioner or the Chief of Staff on matters of major policy, or to pass downwards matters emanating from the Acting Chief Commissioner or Chief of Staff as the result of DO letters, visits, or conferences.

This frequently means spending much time on minute scrutiny of a subject, possibly with the assistance of the specialist officer concerned, in order to prepare a draft letter for submission.

(c) The Office of the Chief of Staff is informed broadly on all matters dealt with in the Headquarters and therefore, apart from visitors to the Acting Chief Commissioner and Chief of Staff, the Staff Officers must find time to receive a variety of visiting officers both from inside and outside the Headquarters who come for information.

(d) No Staff Officer can properly carry out his work unless he is aware of conditions in the field. Therefore, there must be allowance made for visits to Armies and Regions.

(e) The work is on a high level and must be first class in every respect, but good work is useless unless it is done in time. If pressure of work in the Office is such that time cannot be spared to prepare, for example, a brief, at a time when it is required, it is so much work wasted.

(f) At least one Staff Officer must be available to accompany the Chief of Staff to conferences for the purpose of taking minutes, etc. This particular duty does not end with the conference, as careful preparation of the minutes of the conference has to be carried out afterwards. These conferences may be at this Headquarters or elsewhere.

2. The organization of the Office consists of :

- (a) A Chief ~~of~~ Staff Officer.
- (b) A S.O. 2 who understudies the CSO.
- (c) Five other Staff Officers comprising 1-S.O.2, 4 - S.O. 3 (includes 2 J/Oir ATS)

3. It will be seen from Appendix "A" that the work of the Office is divided into four sections, two in charge of a S.O. 2 and two handled by a S.O. 3 with the assistance of a Junior Commander.

4. After a Month's operation the officer personnel have settled down as a team and the distribution of work decided upon has proved equitable. The organization of HJ AG resulted initially in very heavy work for the office of the Chief of Staff and the available staff worked long hours to cope with it. Now a smoother flow has been achieved it is possible to suggest an economy. J/Cair Hopkins-Badulovic is due to proceed to U.K. within a month, having served her maximum allowable service overseas, and it is not intended to apply for replacement. With this reduction it is considered the Staff will be the very minimum which can handle the work of the Office commensurate with efficiency.

1. GENERAL

As requested verbally by the Executive Commissioner (now Chief of Staff) I am making suggestions to provide for a further reduction in the staff of this Region. So long as we have commitments on the Island in the way of Allied troops or quasi military requirements for minerals, coal etc. I feel it will be essential that some A.C.C. staff should remain. The High Commissioner's Office is also not yet functioning with sufficient efficiency to be left to itself.

I do not consider that we should attempt to run Italian affairs and would be content to leave subjects of such universal importance as Finance and Health to the Italians, provided that we could get occasional advice and help from A.C.C. visiting Officers. I am also omitting all reference to the coal mines at CARRARA. If the Coal Section consider special control there is still necessary then an Officer, clerk and vehicle will be required for that place.

There is, however, still a lack of spirit and direction in Italian administration, and I suggest that, to be sure of no impediment to the war effort and to obtain tranquillity in the period immediately after general hostilities cease, the Allies should keep a helping hand in, and supervision over, the essentials of community life; namely:-

I put the subjects in the above order deliberately. Although Public Order (Police and Law) is, of course, of primary importance, it should be possible to hand this subject over to the Italians sooner than it will be possible to hand over all control of imported foodstuffs.

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- (c) Labour and Industry

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At least one senior Officer will be necessary to deal with the High Commissioner, give him some backing and represent his problems to A.C.C., and all Officers of a small staff will require to be experienced so as to form a sound team.

I believe the retention of a small A.C.C. staff would be welcomed by the Italians and greatly strengthen the elements working for reconstruction. I shall confine myself to suggestions for an A.C.C. staff and shall not include military staff or transport required for running the military office of O.C. Troops in the Island as I have not yet received information of what that may entail with its Signals, Intelligence, etc.

2. ASSUMPTIONS

In arriving at the suggestions below I have made the following assumptions:

- (a) The staff will act in an advisory capacity working in close touch

/ (a)

with the High Commissioner's Office. Specialist written reports will cease.

- (b) Individual departmental work, as such, would cease, though Officers would still be responsible for certain types of work and we shall still need Officers with specialist knowledge.
- (c) Where possible, work now carried out by A.C.C. personnel would be wholly transferred to the Italian officials; e.g. the control and supervision of civilian movement has reached a point where from three to four hours daily has to be devoted exclusively to this work by the Public Safety Office. Actual screening and security is done by the High Commissioner's Office through the Questure. The Public Safety Department, however, interviews about ten persons daily and maintains constant liaison with the High Commissioner's Office and with the Army Sub Commission (in connection with cruiser travel). Public Safety also issues A.M.G. travel permits and maintain complete file records of all persons moved. Up to the end of August over 700 persons had been moved to the mainland and 256 travel permits were issued in that month alone. With A.C.C. permission this special supervision could cease.

- (d) The small staff must be mobile and be prepared to go out and visit Provinces so that they maintain personal contact in the Provinces and show themselves. Regional H.Q. is located in CAGLIARI near the Office of the High Commissioner. CAGLIARI is, however, situated at one end of the Island and distances are considerable, four hours each way to either of the Provincial Headquarters at SASSARI or NUORO. I have made use of seaplane (Italian), Diesel rail car and ordinary M.T. to get about, but find that much time has necessarily to be spent travelling. The comparative smallness of the population in the Region does not save travelling time.

3. STAFF SUGGESTED.

- (a) Administrative Staff

Regional Commissioner, a senior Officer so as to be able to deal with the High Commissioner and meet Italian senior officials and Commanders with proper authority. The Regional Commissioner will be able to back up decisions of the High Commissioner and represent his problems to A.C.C. H.Q. 1037

Deputy Commissioner, Lt. Colonel. His duties would be to act for the Regional Commissioner in his absence and share the duties of touring to keep contact with the Provinces. If British he would also be Officer Commanding Other Banks, if American he would be Company Commander.

One other Officer, Captain or Lieutenant, to supervise the Office and deal with general administration.

(b) Six Experienced Specialist Officers as follows:

- (i) An Officer to advise on food supplies and agriculture. His duty would be to check food produced in the Island, check rationing required and work out bulk demands for food to be imported. He would also check proposed exports of surplus foods.
- (ii) An Officer to advise on transportation. He would have the particular responsibility of advice on road transport and fuel requirements. His main duty would be to advise on distribution throughout the Island.
- (iii) An Officer to advise on labour and industry. He would also deal with public works and his task would be to ensure the correct flow of exports of such commodities as minerals and coal. He would advise on policy so as to avoid unemployment and discontent.

If the coal mines at CARBONIA are considered to require special supervision an additional Officer will be required to live there. I am assuming coal will be handed over to the Italians as far as detail is concerned.

(iv) An Officer to deal with Public Relations and the Press. The comparatively smooth acceptance of the recent reduction in workers' rations has again demonstrated the great value of the work done by P.W.B. I feel, therefore, that even if there is a very small staff a P.R.O. Officer should be left as an integral part of the Regional Commissioner's staff in a detached Island such as SARDINIA.

(v) An Officer with Legal training to give legal advice, at present a very big subject.

(vi) A Police Officer. Even if A.C.C. work on passes etc could be cut, the Police work of this Region is a really responsible job requiring an Office of rank and standing, and it should not be combined with the Legal side.

4. OTHER RANKS AND EMPLOYED MEN

On the basis of 1.2 O.Rs. or N.M. for each Officer we should require eleven (11) for our reduced establishment. At least one senior experienced clerk for the office and a good transport N.C.O. will be essential.

Italian office staff and Italian interpreters, who would also be required, are unfortunately not easy to find locally.

An additional clerk will be required for CARBONIA if an Allied Officer is specially left there.

5. TRANSPORT

The Region would require at least two reliable Government passenger vehicles for touring on indifferent roads, and one heavy vehicle to draw rations etc.

In making allowances for requisitioned cars, we have to provide for unexpected calls from many different sources, for example, touring Officers come to SARDINIA by air or sea and do not as a rule bring transport with them. Then we get unexpected outside calls which we are obliged to meet. We had to help, at short notice, with some transport, 22 Italian Government Officials sent over by the Economic and Supply Section. A labour detachment of four Russians and three or four others is also expected by air this month and no mention is made of transport. The Camp Commandant gets demands for transport and help from military personnel on ships and other parts of the Island which have to be met. Apart from this, requisitioned cars are

6. MILITARY REQUIREMENTS

In making my suggestions, as I have pointed out above, I am unable to say what work will be involved if the Regional Commissioner is made Officer Commanding British and American troops in the Island. So far there has

been a very large staff in Allied Garrison of Sardinia and 42nd Wing Headquarters, it still numbers over 20 Officers although 42nd Wing has gone.

The future relationship of O.G. Troops with Allied Navy and the R.A.F. personnel who have been augmented by the arrival of the Staging Unit, and with Italian Navy, Army and Airforce personnel left on the Island, will require to be clearly defined.

An important item, for example, concerns requisitions. I am informed that for SARDINIA as a whole there have been about 3,000 military requisitions, exclusive of requisitions for motor cars. Many of the premises occupied will now be given up by Allied troops, but this is the precise time when much work and correspondence is likely to arise. A whole time Officer and some staff will almost certainly be required to investigate claims etc.

Apart from administrative staff we shall also presumably have a Signals commitment and an Intelligence commitment. For example, the enemy is, for some reason, still sending to SARDINIA a small but steady stream of agents. He has thought it worth while to drop by parachute over SARDINIA in the last three months nine agents, and this side of Intelligence will have to be covered.

The office staff and transport required for this side of the work will have to be worked out separately.

7. DATE OF REDUCTION

As regards the date when the change over to a smaller staff can take place I suggest it depends on the departure of the troops and the degree of efficiency of the High Commissioner's Office. Possibly some time in December would provide a suitable opportunity for this reduction.

As team work will be essential if the staff is reduced, I hope that the Regional Commissioner may be consulted before final decisions are taken and Officers and O.Re. and S.M. selected for the staff of the Region.

FOREWORD

The present critical electrical situation here demands that everything possible be done to accelerate the rehabilitation of electric facilities in Italy.

The Electrical Division of the Public Works and Utilities Sub-Commission is especially concerned with bettering the situation because:

(a) APHQ has issued an Administrative Memorandum making ACC responsible for the planning and supervision of all electrical rehabilitation.

(b) The present scarcity of electricity in Rome is apt to cause reactions which will be very unfavourable to the Commission.

Many legitimate reasons can be given for the present scarcity of electricity in Central Italy.

A shortage of materials, construction equipment, repair shops and skilled civilian personnel has prevented the rapid restoration of the German-damaged plants. These shortages will continue.

However, their effects can be minimized by an increase in competent engineering personnel in the ACC organization.

With this increase in personnel, ACC will be able to provide leadership in electrical rehabilitation which, up to now has been lacking because of insufficient personnel. Already work at power plants has been hindered because local supplies have not been released in a expedient manner. Already repairs to transmission lines have been held up because of difficulties in obtaining permission for workmen and vehicles to circulate in the area where the work needs to be done. Many other examples of slow progress could be given. These remarks are not intended to reflect upon the agencies which are charged with releasing supplies, or granting permits.

The remarks instead are made to show the necessity of having sufficient personnel to follow through on the important work. The idea of utilizing personnel for this purpose is not new. In America, each large construction project has one or more expeditors, whose only job is to see that the work is ^{being} run smoothly and to take all personal action necessary to keep it

Sufficient personnel are available for the work. Each day officers who are experienced electrical engineers come to headquarters, explaining that there is a possibility of being released from their present unit, and that they would appreciate an opportunity to participate in this activity.

In consideration of the foregoing, permission is required to increase the electrical personnel of the Public Works and Utilities Sub-Commission, and of the regions, as shown in the attached tabulations and charts.

This work will be done by the regions. The number of officers needed for each region depends upon the amount of electric facilities there. In some cases, an officer has been especially designated to obtain supplies of electrical material. The number of regional officers required to follow generation and transmission rehabilitation work has been based upon the number of facilities in the region.

(7) Will issue all orders necessary to implement the program to Italian Power Companies or other civilian agencies.

The orders will be initiated by the Public Works and Utilities Sub-Commission, Hq. ACC, or from the appropriate regional officer, depending upon the scope of the order.

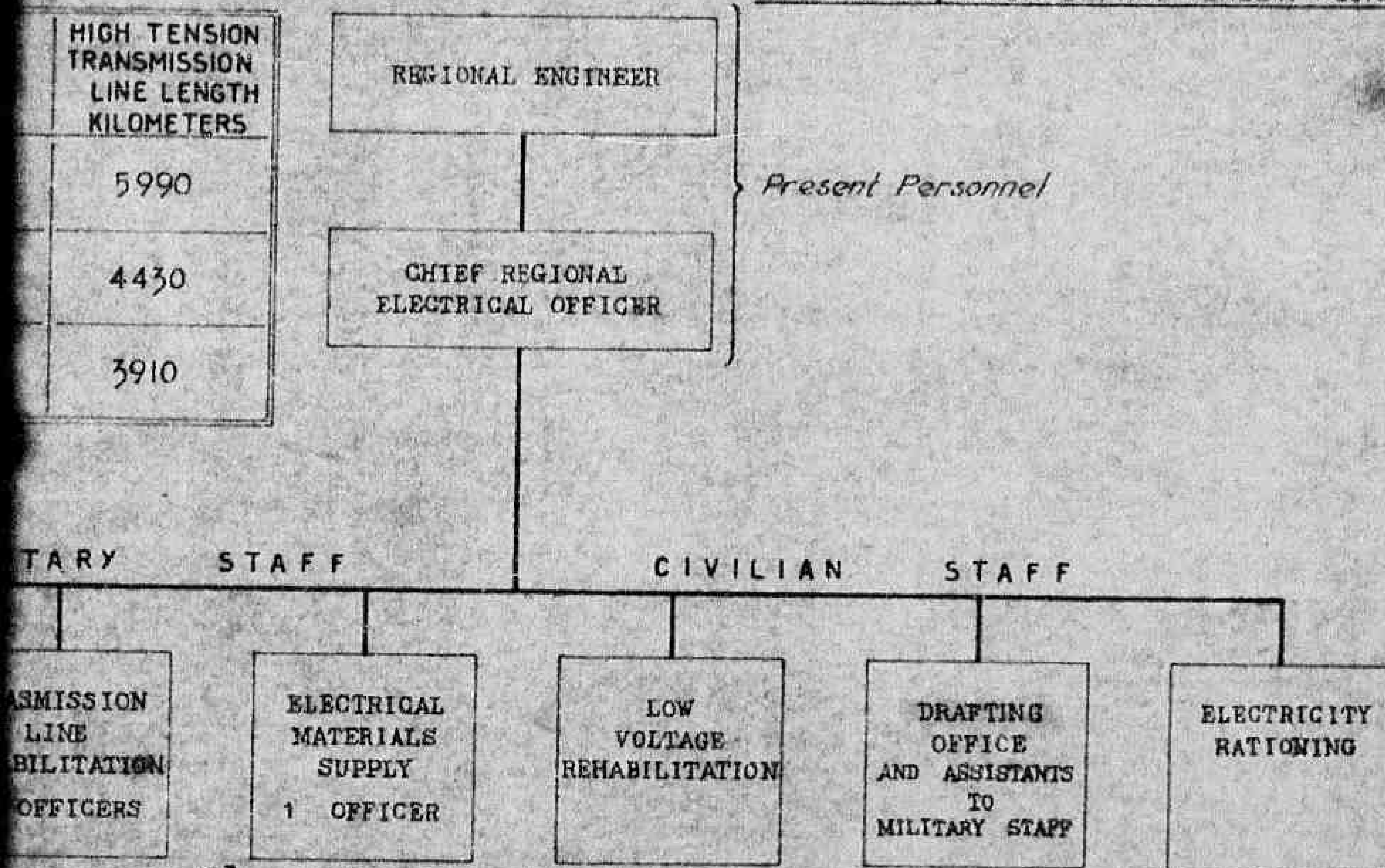

To : Executive Commissioner, A.C.C.

1. Reference your memorandum of 17 September, attached. These figures are not accurate. The figure 329 was what the various branches and Subcommissions appearing before the Committee said they had. It is probable that they did not include many officers who are assigned to Headquarters but who actually have been sent into the field by the Subcommissions for specific work but have not been assigned to the Regions in which they are working. I am having the figures 423 rechecked to determine its accuracy.

2. Region IV is now reinforced by one team from Region IX and one team will soon be made available from Region XI. Region IV will, therefore, now be stripped to its Appendix C allocation as regards Provincial Officers and Police Officers and most Specialists. However, Legal Specialists and Finance Specialists are not being assigned as yet to the Northern Regions and the Subcommissions concerned do not wish to assign them until they are needed and they reserve to themselves the right to determine when they are needed. I see no objection to this since the head officers have been assigned and since the responsibility is up to the Subcommissions concerned. The Regional Commissioners can plan accordingly.

3. Similarly, Region VIII has had made available to it four Provincial Teams from Region IX and so far one Provincial team from Piemonte Region - another is now ready. Liguria Region and Lombardia Region should each be able to make available to Region VIII at least two teams immediately. I see no reason, therefore, why Region VIII should not be stripped at once to its permanent Appendix C strength.

4. By the end of the week, Region IV and VIII will be stripped down to Appendix C on their permanent roll except as to specialists and the latter will be either assigned to forward Regions or definitely earmarked for such assignment.

5. The 423 figure at Headquarters I shall report on later. I shall have by Friday night a complete newly checked nominal roll of all officer personnel of the Commission by sections, subcommissions, branches and similar subdivisions.

1. Please see attached statement of existing strengths handed to me by Establishment Officer.

2. If these are accurate there is something very amiss for

HQ stands at 423 instead of 329 present establishment;
Region IV is 107 against 75 in Appendix "C".
Region VIII is 147 against 76 in Appendix "C".

and Regions X, XI, Liguria and XII are well below a strength which enables the Regional Commissioners to begin real planning.

3. The time has come now when we must get the Northern Regions up to strength - at any rate up to 75%. We must be drastic with the 423 at HQ and the 107 in Region IV. We must convert earmarking into assignment and get the Provincial teams formed at once, and then put them into action with existing Regions if not required in the North. But we cannot at this stage remain satisfied with 227 for Northern Regions against a target strength of 423. It is not right that we should ask Regional Commissioners to plan on such inadequate strengths - they are not at all happy about this side of the planning.

4. Will you take this up and get the works into full action so that by the end of the week the Northern Regional Commissioners may have adequate forces to form provinces, plan ahead and feel that they have a nucleus on which to work. I am not satisfied that at the moment we have done for them all that we should or that Sub-Commissions and E.O. are in harmony over the planning.
