SUBJECT :- Official visits to Elba.

DATE :- August 17th. 1944.

- (1) Reliable information has been received to the effect that an Officer , affecting to be a representative of the Director of Prisons at Hqrs. A.C.C, visited Elba and Pianosa on Tuesday, August 15th., 1944.
- (2) The Officer in question is reported to have visited the Penal Settlement and Prison on Pianosa ; and to have visited Porto Longone where he made certain enquiries of the French Captain responsible for part of the prison. Apparently he did not actually visit the prison referred to.
- (3) As far as can be discovered no attempt was made to get in touch with the S.C.A.O. here , and neither did the officer report to any member of the A.M.G. team.
- (4) The above information is passed on to you without comment.

instant. It reached me via Piombino on the 11th.  
Glad to hear you enjoyed your short visit.  
What can I say in reply except that you should come again  
as soon as possible - before the weather breaks!

I await with great interest your further  
advices with regard to the appointment of a Vice Prefect.  
I personally cannot see the slightest objection to the  
scheme; and we have the man for the job.

The quality of the Iron Ore is, I believe  
you will find, much higher than you have been given to

SUBJECT: Handover of the Island of Elba.

TO : Regional Commissioner,  
Toscana Region.

1. This Headquarters is advised today by telephone that shipping has been arranged for removal of the French garrison and equipment from Elba. The evacuation will take place as soon as weather conditions permit.

2. Following the removal of the French garrison, Executive Memorandum No. 78 which provides that the administration of the Island is taken over by Toscana Region, becomes effective. Toscana Region will therefore be in readiness to assume control of the territory upon receipt of advise that the French garrison has been cleared.

3. Establishment Section are advised by means of a copy of this letter that present transfer or movement of present A.C.C. personnel on Elba is to be coordinated with Regional Commissioner, Toscana Region. It is proposed that Major Murchie, SCAO will be at the disposal of Toscana Region for a period of one week following the handover to give such assistance and advise as may be required.

4. Extracts of a report of the 7th of October by Lt. Col. Laboon, Provincial Commissioner, Livorno relating to important local problems are forwarded as an attachment to Sections concerned.

5. The SCAO Elba has recommended that the French garrison be replaced by an Allied one and further that present C.C.RH be exchanged for C.C.RH in the pool. This recommendation has been passed to Civil Affairs Section, with the comment that no Allied or Italian military garrison will be provided.

EXTRACTS

11. The French C.O. is arresting people, is cancelling passes issued by Major GOODACHE, is sending people to Corsica to jail, is searching every carabinieri coming to or leaving the Island and pretty much doing as he pleases. 15 Italians were arrested last week by the French accused of being Republican Fascists and were sent to Corsica where they are supposed to be given a good going over. 100 such cases have already been sent to Corsica recently.

12. A French doctor took all the surgical instruments, amounting to an inventory of 400,000 lire from the Italian Hospital at Rio Marino, Cape Livorno.

15. I much prefer Capt. SMITH to Major BENTLEY and regret that the change was made. Either a supply officer like Capt. SMITH or a Police Officer like Major GOODACHE are the types most needed for ELBA if only one officer is to be left behind and under the circumstances I hope Major BENTLEY can be relieved in favor of either a Supply Officer or a Public Safety Officer.

16. Conditions on ELBA are not good. Unemployment is the most serious menace aside from lack of food. The people are willing to work. At least 2500 men are unemployed.

17. In addition to the unemployed there are 2000 Italian Marines and soldiers who have become separated from their units and are living on the Island. A Marine Officer (Italian) is now at work on ELBA to gather together the 500 odd marines. All of these 2000 should be removed from ELBA.

18. The food situation will be much improved if fishing could be permitted. I went into this matter thoroughly during my visit.

19. The Prison situation must be thoroughly investigated and clarified on all three islands where prisons are located.

SUBJECT: Assignment of Officers for duty on the Island of Elba.

TO : Chief of Staff, HQ. Allied Control Commission.

1. Confirming oral arrangement made yesterday and with reference to RVIII/16/44 dated 10 Oct. 44 I request that if this Region is to continue to administer the Island of Elba, the officers now on duty on that Island, including Major MURCHIE, be transferred and assigned to Toscana Region for assignment to Livorno Province for duty on the Island of Elba so long as the French Military Commander remains there.

2. It is further recommended that steps be taken to relieve the French Military Commander of his duty as Deputy Military Governor on the Island of Elba. If it is necessary for him to stay there he should stay in the capacity of French Garrison Commander only with no responsibility for civil affairs.
