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Dear Chuck:

I am enclosing a breakdown of the U.S. officer personnel of the Regiment, by Sections, Subcommissions and Regions, at Headquarters and in the field. This has been done on the basis of assignment of all U.S. officers to Headquarters and to the AMG Regions, namely:

with the exception of six liaison officers and specialists who will continue, for the time being, in Italian Government territory as liaison officers with the various military formations, legal officers conducting AMG courts, rail transportation and supply. I am enclosing, also, the Austria list, as finally agreed by us. From this list, practically all of the officers on duty with the 5th Army AMG have been designated for Austria, with the understanding that they remain with the combat units until such time as those units enter Austria.

I do not see how we can help you very much more, as we can not furnish officers with the qualifications which you require without reducing specialist categories out of proportion to the determined percentage.

Poletti says that he does not want Smith and puts up a strong case for Lane, inasmuch as he is going into a territory where the labor problem will be one of his worst headaches, infinitely more difficult than it would be in Salzburg and Oberdonau. I know General Hume has a personal preference for Lane, but that, of course, is your decision. We are in an embarrassing situation in respect to Smith and his assignment to Austria would certainly be a way out. Incidentally, he speaks German very well.

1. In order to implement the policies and decisions taken by the Chief of Staff at the conference held 5 February 1945, the following action in respect to the provision of personnel and troop basis for military government of Austria is directed:

a. Officer Personnel: Allied Commission will furnish a total of 168 trained civil affairs officers for military government of Austria. Of these, 40 officers will be furnished forthwith and the balance earmarked to be withdrawn for training or for final deployment in military government of Austria as directed by CG MTOUSA through G-5 MTOUSA.

The officers will represent a cross section in experience and general ability and qualifications of all the officers serving with Allied Commission. These personnel will be withdrawn from their present units for a 2 week period of schooling as required by the AC, returned to their units, and earmarked and thereafter will be available for duty as necessitated by operations. AC will furnish numbers and specifications of officers required for this purpose to G-5 MTOUSA 14 days in advance of the date which it is desired schooling begin.

1. Reference letter dated 10 February 1945, your headquarters, subject: "T/O for EM for Military Government Operations in Italy and Austria", and confirming telephone conversation between Lt. Col. Uhler and Colonel J. Murray Mitchell, this headquarters requires for its operations and commitments in Italy at least a total of 1089 enlisted men.

2. After the final exchange of enlisted personnel with the replacement depot, the strength of the Regiment will be exactly 1109. Additional commitments are being made from time to time and especially in view of the fact that the control of radio stations will be turned over to the Allied Commission, our strength will be, in the next few weeks, well over the figure quoted above.

3. Reference para. 6 supra, it will be possible to include in our transfer to Company "B" an equitable percentage of the newly received limited assignment personnel. In this connection, we would like to have, if possible, a breakdown of the MOS's for the hundred enlisted men which this headquarters will furnish.

MEMORANDUM TO: All Concerned.

SUBJECT : Tables of Organization, Table of Equipment, and Plan for the Acquisition of and Accounting for, Personnel for Military Government Operations, Austria.

The following action will be taken in the organization of personnel for the Military Government of Austria. This confirms instructions issued by the Chief of Staff, MTOUSA, at the Conference, 5 February 1945:

1. General Flory is charged with the U. S. planning for both the Group Control Council of Austria and the Military Government of Austria. General Hume will act as his deputy for this planning, being particularly charged with phases of military government undertaken under SACRED control, and the procurement of Gm personnel. G-5, MTOUSA, is responsible for general staff supervision of this activity.

2. G-3 will study the T/O for the nucleus U. S. Group Control Council submitted by General Flory and will submit recommendations by 7 February. Consideration will be given to reductions that can be made by the use of available personnel of 5th Army Headquarters. The table will include planning personnel for the Gm organization.

3. General Flory will submit to G-1 his recommendations for the procurement of civilians to augment the nucleus Control Group.

4. G-1 will prepare a directive for General Flory authorizing him to procure personnel assigned to MTOUSA and transfer them to MTOUSA.

5. General Flory will furnish G-5, through General Hume, a list of the qualifications of personnel required to augment the personnel furnished by MTO to complete the strength authorized by the approved T/O. G-5 will furnish G-1 recommendations for the transfer of this personnel. This personnel will be assigned to a company of the 2675 CA Regiment Ovhd, designated to contain personnel earmarked for Austria. In addition, G-5 will recommend the transfer of personnel to this company from the remainder of the Regiment so as to equalize the percentages of trained AC personnel in the company and in the remainder of the Regiment. For this purpose, the authorized strength of the company will be the approved T/O's of the Gm organization of Austria plus the nucleus Group Control Council. The Gm organization is approved at a strength of 200 officers and 482 EM's. The authorized strength of the 2675 CA Regiment Ovhd, less the Austrian Company is set at 600 officers plus a number of enlisted men to be determined by G-5.

6. Upon reply by SHAEF to General McHarney's letter relative to the transfer of grades for the nucleus Control Group, consideration will be given to making a request upon the War Department for an increase in overhead allotments to cover the Control Group. If such a request is made, troop basis inactivation will be offered to the War Department to either cover the whole group or the deficit above the amount transferred from ETO. 129

7. G-5 will furnish G-1 a list of the qualifications of personnel required to fill the approved T/O's for Italy and Austria after AG personnel has been distributed. G-1 will earmark this personnel from units throughout the Theater. This personnel will be withdrawn for, not to exceed two weeks training, and then returned to their normal assignments. Plans will be made to make this personnel available when required for military government work in Italy and Austria. At that time, if they are covered by overhead allotment, the overhead allotment will be transferred; and if they are members of T/O units, they will be placed on detached service with the Military Government organization.

8. After the request for grades for the Group Control Council is settled, G-3 will make a definite allotment between the Austrian company of the 2675 CA Regt and the remainder of the Regiment.

9. Personnel will not be transferred from the Austrian company of 2675 CA Regt without the approval of G-5.

There was no headquarters administration unit to coordinate the group. There was no organization provided for normal administration. This T/O only provided one officer for each key spot.

General Pence then asked how many AC officers at the AC Headquarters in Italy. Colonel Fluke answered 62 officers and 50 enlisted men.

General Pence then asked why 115 officers and 341 enlisted men were required for the Austrian operation. Colonel Fluke answered that in the initial phases it required more officers and enlisted men in Italy than they are now using at AC, and that Austria will be a de novo operation and organization.

Colonel Carey then corrected the 341 figure for enlisted men to 205 enlisted men.

General Pence then asked if AC used civil personnel. Colonel Fluke answered that they did.

General White then asked to what extent will the military in the later or occupation stage assist in taking off the load on military government? General Flory answered they may have to help.

- a. The use of occupational troops on operational equipment in military government has not worked out. Military government is a full-time job. AGC equipment must be assigned to such tasks solely.
- b. The army commanders are not predisposed to allow their men to do a military government job.
- c. Army men may have to move around in the performance of their military jobs, their movements being at variance with their AGC responsibilities.

SECRET

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d. There will be a question of divided loyalty on the part of those officers serving both in the military capacity and in the military government capacity.

e. The question of training of occupational forces for military government work gives concern.

Major General White then commented that the figures submitted were too large, and that the use of occupational troops for assistance in military government after operations ceased would be required.

Lt. Colonel Adams then commented that 5th Army Headquarters and most of their staff can be absorbed to do part of the military government work in Austria.

Brigadier General Pence then commented as follows:

a. What we want to know is the number of officers and enlisted men required for the plan.

b. We want to approve a T/O for what you need right now for the planning phase.

c. There are too many clerks for the number of officers set forth.

General White then questioned the number of bodies now at hand for the operation.

General Flory answered 60 officers, 36 enlisted men, in U.S.G.C.C.

General Flory then said that he had a tentative working arrangement with SHAFF for the transfer to the Mediterranean Theater of some bodies required for military government work.

General Flory then pointed out that in examining the qualifications of officers for military government, an examination of their civilian background as differentiated from their military background is required.

General Pence then commented as follows: Why can't you take the additional 60 officers required for planning from AC? Colonel Fiske commented, we can help on the specialist branches.

General Pence then commented that the final table of organization should combine the AMB/USGOC element, but that the group required for planning did not number more than 120, that this number should be made up from the number General Flory had on hand, the balance to come from AC.

General Pence then commented that we should start to get civilians

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General Pence then commented that the final table of organization should combine the AMG/USGTC element, but that the group required for planning did not number more than 120, that this number should be made up from the number General Flory had on hand, the balance to come from AC.

General Pence then commented that we should start to get civilians right away to assist in military government and to requisition these 5% civilians from the U.S.

On this point, General Flory commented that we must get top notch men because they would compete with top notch men of the United Kingdom and Russia.

General Pence then stated we will ask the U.S. to get civilians and to requisition them. General Pence then asked if there were any objections to the use of civilians. Colonel Fiske answered no.

General Pence then stated, we want a table of organization for planning right now. We can then mark those places that can be filled by civilians and ask Washington to fill the civilian positions by requisition. On this point Colonel Mitchell commented that the civilian deal worried him, and that the time element operated against the plan, since it required several months for civilians to get to the theater.

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General Pence then said that civilians would be cut out of the planning phase and could be brought in at a later phase. General White commenting on civilians, said civilians will not leave their civilian jobs to come over to work as civilians, but they will come over if they are put into uniform.

General Flory then asked: Is there any objection to our interviewing people of the ETO for military government work? General Pence answered, what we want before we start transferring people from other theaters is this T/O for the planning phase. I do not think 205 enlisted men is in line. General Flory answered, these men are needed because we need a lot of interpreters, people who can speak Russian, etc.

General Pence then commented that the figures still looked big alongside the Italian figures. Colonel Fiske then answered that the U.S. Contingent has received considerable help from the British, whereas the ratio should be 50/50 between British and American enlisted men, it is in reality one EM to two GIs.

Colonel Fiske then protested that leaving him with 600 officers to administer 28,000,000 people would hinder AC in its functions, especially since there was a civil war in the North and 60,000 armed patriots needing to be disarmed. Colonel Fiske stated that AC is willing to help in the furnishing of personnel for the Austrian operation, but stated that AC could not carry on with less bodies than the 600 proposed.

General Pence then commented we only have a certain number of trained people and these have to be apportioned.

General White then commented if anyone has to stretch his organization it will have to be here in Italy, since this organization can afford to stretch more than the Austrian one. Colonel Fiske then asked if the replacement camps could not be employed as a source for company grade officers for training in military government. General White answered that there were very few company grade officers in the replacement camps, hardly any who could be satisfactorily used in military government.

Colonel Fiske then asked if there was any chance of sending officers from combat units back for training now. General White's answer was that this might be possible.

General Hume commented that if these men could be obtained and trained they could be sent back to their unit to await later call.

General Pence then commented that the present trained personnel available would have to be allotted on an equitable basis.

Colonel Fiske then asked: does that mean that you will ask me for 100 officers right now? General Pence answered: you have 700, we will

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General Pence then commented that the present trained personnel available would have to be allotted on an equitable basis.

Colonel Fiske then asked: does that mean that you will ask me for 100 officers right now? General Pence answered: you have 700, we will get 30 from you now for the planning phase, leaving you 670. 200 are needed for the Gane organization. You have 670. You will be reduced to about 450 and the difference between 450 and 600 will be made up by some officers taken out of combat units and possibly from this Headquarters who will be trained and then turned over to you. We will assign 160 inexperienced officers to make up your 600 from 440. The 160 taken away from AC will be used on the Austrian program. Colonel Fiske then said that the cream had already been skinned by General McSherry and by the French operation.

General White then commented: well, you'll just have to get along as though they had been killed.

Colonel Fiske then stated that they could spare specialists, but that CAO's were not available. CAO's would have to be trained for the job.

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General Huse then asked, if the army commander consents, would I be authorized to obtain and pull out combat officers for training? General White indicated that they could be detached on detached service for training.

General Pence then asked how much time would be required for schooling, would two weeks do? Colonel Fiske answered yes.

General Foster then pointed out that there was some PAB personnel, especially non-com, who could speak foreign languages that might be used.

General Pence then asked what the enlisted men's duties would be. Colonel Gevers answered that they would be used as clerks, interpreters and drivers.

General Pence then asked if these men needed any special training and whether earmarking of men for military government without actual present transfer would suffice. Colonel Gevers answered that generally speaking this was satisfactory.

General White then commented that German speaking enlisted men could be pulled out when required.

General Pence then stated that the AC personnel (PM) would have to be divided on an equitable basis and that the balance required would be earmarked.

General Pence then stated: I am willing to take 600 for Italy and I am willing to take 200 officers for Gase administration and the number of enlisted men as set forth for Gase administration as a firm figure.

General Pence then commented upon the subject of grades and pointed out that 800 grades would be required. Grades however, stated General Pence, was not a serious problem since the bodies and the grades could be matched and pulled out.

General White then commented: we are accepting your 600 figure, Colonel Fiske. The General then stated that 30-40 officers would be turned over by AC now to fill out the planning T/O, but that in addition AC would lose something less than 200 officers for Gase administration.

Colonel Fiske countered with the proposal that he give up 100 trained officers and that 100 combat officers be obtained and trained and earmarked for the Austrian operation.

General Pence answered in the negative and stated that experienced trained men were required for the Austrian operation, that they would need to come from AC and that AC would have the use of them until they were pulled out and that finally AC would have 600 men, their losses being made

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Colonel Fiske countered with the proposal that he give up 120 trained officers and that 100 combat officers be obtained and trained and earmarked for the Austrian operation.

General Pence answered in the negative and stated that experienced trained men were required for the Austrian operation, that they would need to come from AC and that AC would have the use of them until they were pulled out and that finally AC would have 600 men, their losses being made up by the combat officers receiving two weeks schooling and turned over to AC.

General Pence then commented upon the "organization" phase and stated that personnel would be earmarked for Austria from AC, and that these would be attached or assigned to a new company. The officers would be transferred with grades to this company, but attached back to AC. When they were needed, the new company to which they had been attached would pull out these men assigned to this company, ^{which men} would be frozen into that company and could not be transferred without consent of AFHQ.

Colonel Mitchell then asked what of equipment? G-4 answered, we can publish the list of equipment. Part of the equipment will come from this theater, part from outside the theater.

Colonel Fiske then asked that if in the training of men, wherever possible combat officers be taken from the Corps going into Austria for

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training for Austrian military government and that combat officers be taken from Corps going into Northern Italy for training in Italian military government.

General White then commented to Colonel Fisker get a memorandum of what you want.

General Pence then stated:

a. General Flory, G-3 and G-5 would determine the requirements of the T/O.

b. General Flory will have transferred to the company to be established any people he could pick up, and that G-1 would have to give General Flory authority to do this.

General White indicated that G-1 would instruct as to how this could be done.

General Pence then stated that General Flory would indicate to General Huse what personnel requirements would be needed for AC, that General Huse would carry on the task of obtaining these bodies.

General Foster then turned the C-3 phase of the Conference over to Colonel Harris and expounded Colonel Harris to represent C-3.

Colonel Harris stated that the job required was to put to the Chief of Staff a T/O setting forth the minimum number required for the operation.

Colonel Carey then commented that the planning T/O was "firms", but that Brigadier General Hume's situation needed study and work.

Brigadier General Flory then commented that it was his impression that only the planning T/O was to be ready for the morning.

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Colonel Harris then stated: we want to know your T/O size for planning, including Brigadier General Huse's organization.

Colonel Harris then asked for information as to what the planning and military government group was going to do.

The meeting ended. General Flory, General Huse, Colonel Carey, Colonel Cavers all indicating that additional time was required to determine the T/O of General Huse's organization.

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1. The military component plan for the government of Italy contemplates British and American participation on a 50-50 basis.

2. It envisages 1400 officers as the maximum overall figure for all activities in Italy. Italian government territory is excluded to the maximum extent possible.

3. Italy (less Italian Government territory) has a population of approximately 28,000,000. (breakdown here with). The ratio is therefore 1 officer per 20,000 population.

4. Presently being occupied Italy has a population of . It is highly industrialized and is in fact the heart of Italy. Partisan activity sponsored or encouraged by us is widespread. As the net is drawn up the Fascist big fish are being caught up in the North where they may be expected to go underground. The present Italian government will certainly have to be revamped when we reach the North. It appears therefore highly probable

That we shall be confronted by a governmental crisis, widespread unrest and unemployment, armed conflict between patriots and Fascists, a breakdown in public order which will be conducive to banditry and terrorism. The longer occupation is postponed the more these adverse conditions will develop.

5. All of Venezia Giulia (1,034,345) and Venezia Tridentina (710,321) must be governed entirely by AMG w/o recourse to Italian administration, police or officials.

TO : All concerned.

I. - Object.

1. To secure the approval of the T/O's and T/E for the Military Government Operation, Austria,
2. To obtain a permanent nucleus group for planning and administration,
3. To provide a plan for procuring, earmarking and training personnel, and
4. To provide a means for administration of this personnel.

II. - Historical.

1. The planning for the occupation of Austria, originally a SHAEF commitment, has been made the responsibility of SACMED. The Commanding General, MTOUSA, has been charged with the responsibility for U.S. planning and participation.
2. The U.S. participation in Austria, as planned, is substantially as follows:
 - a. The U.S. will participate on a tripartite basis on the national level and in the administration of Gau Vienna.
 - b. It is expected that the U.S. may administer the Gaue of Tirol-Vorarlberg, Salzburg and Oberdonau.
 - c. It is expected that the Task Force for the occupation of the U.S. Zone will be furnished by the 5th Army. A G-5 Staff will be required for this Task Force.
 - d. Steps have been taken to transfer to MTO the U.S. Group Control Council (Austria), (established by section I, General Order Number 21, Headquarters MTOUSA, dated 30 January 1945), to ETO. It is planned that the group, together with the G-5 Staff, U.S. Task Force, will be combined for inclusion in the U.S. component of the Austrian Control Council.

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number 2
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III. - Assumptions.

1. CASE A: That the occupation of Northern Italy in advance of Austria will permit the roll-up of the Military Government carpet in Italy, south of the present battle line and in the southern provinces of Northern Italy, thus releasing personnel for Austria.
2. CASE B: That the occupation of Northern Italy and Austria will occur as simultaneous operations.

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IV. - Personnel Requirements.

1. T/O's and T/E, as at present contemplated for the entire Military Government commitment, exclusive of the USGCC (AUSTRIA), have been prepared and are in the process of informal coordination within AFH. A resume of the requirements outlined in the T/O's is as follows:

2. T/O for the USGCC (AUSTRIA) provides for 118 officers and 340 enlisted men.
3. Justification of the T/O's tabulated in Section IV, Paragraph 1 above, is given below:

a. It is believed that, from a manpower standpoint, the size of the projected T/O for the G-5 Staff, U.S. Task Force is of small matter since, subject to the views of Deputy Commissioner USGCC (AUSTRIA), it is planned to reserve places on the USGCC (AUSTRIA) for the entire G-5 Staff, U.S. Task Force. Under this plan, the G-5 Staff, U.S. Task Force, after functioning temporarily as a staff section, will ultimately become part of the Austrian Control Council (U.S. Component) and be absorbed within the T/O of the Council.

b. All Tables of Organization have been influenced by the following considerations:

- 1) There is little evidence to support a belief that, as in Italy, any appreciable portion of the population will be sympathetic and cooperative with the occupation forces. The ratio of officer personnel planned for one-third of the Gau Vienna is approximately 1 to 10,000 population. The approximate corresponding ratio for Rome was 1 to 13,000 of population. Unlike Rome, however, Vienna must be assumed to be hostile.

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2) With the exception of the G-5 Staff, U.S. Task Force, the Tables of Organization include the recommendations of the U.S. Group Control Council, Austria. These recommendations represent the opinion of specially trained and qualified officers working in London in close cooperation with the German Control Council and the European Advisory Council. The recommendations of the USGCC (AUSTRIA) have been based on population, geography, communication facilities, and also upon available knowledge concerning the industries located in the various Gaue and Kreise, including war industries which have increased the various populations above the figures used in the computations in constructing the T/O's. 118

3) The original British plans for handling the same responsibilities as are now a responsibility of the CG, MTOUSA, are in line with the personnel provided in the T/O's. Such British figures were approved by the Chief Civil Affairs Officer, 8th Army, now also G-5 Designate, British Task Force, Austria.

4) The T/O's have been prepared under the supervision of a senior officer, formerly with the Allied Commission, Italy, who has had a wealth of experience in both the planning and operational phases of Military Government in Italy.

4. Justification for the proposed T/E is based on a list of equipment authorized as a basis of issue and replacement of equipment for the 2678th CA Regt (Ovhd) by CG, MTOUSA, in AG 400.34/120 D-O, 2 August 1944. The list of equipment proved sound in actual operations and is, therefore, accepted with minor changes to fit the Military Government operation at hand.

V. - Sources of Personnel.

1. Under provisions of present directives from the War Department, no authority exists for requisitioning personnel from sources outside of MTO. This in effect means that the 2675th CA Regt (Ovhd), as virtually the only available source of manpower trained in military government, will be called upon to furnish the bulk of the personnel, officer and enlisted, for the Military Government Operation, Austria.

2. For the U.S. participation in the Military Government of Italy in accordance with directive contained in FAN 487, a minimum of 600 officers will be required. The present strength (authorized) of the 2675th CA Regt (Ovhd) is 700 officers.* As officers are released from the Allied Commission functions by virtue of civilianization, 100 spaces in the troop basis may be made available to Austria.

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(In these circumstances, parity between US and UK commitments, as required by CCS, FAW 351, in Italy will of course not be maintained. On the British side the W/E was increased from approximately 700 officers to approximately 900 officers in anticipation of the occupation of North Italy, with the understanding that 100 might eventually be called for service elsewhere.)

3. The extent to which Allied Commission may be able to supply additional officer personnel will depend entirely on the pattern which the occupation takes and on the conditions that prevail in the populous and highly industrialized North Italy when occupation is effected. If occupation is progressive and if effective control is established early, it may be entirely practicable to release sufficient trained personnel to supply the Austrian need as it arises. If on the other hand, the advance is relatively rapid and the entire North has to be occupied almost at once; and if, as may be expected, there is a government crisis accompanied by widespread public unrest, the Commission may be forced to ask for increased personnel to cope with the situation in Italy itself. 117

4. In the event of a collapse and the simultaneous occupation of both North Italy and Austria, it is presumed that sufficient additional officers, enlisted men, and transport could be made available from combat troop sources. It is estimated that 25% of the requirements of officer personnel for each country could then be met by combat officers untrained in military government.

5. It is proposed:

a. That 27 spaces required for G-5 Staff, U.S. Task Force be allocated by USGCC (AUSTRIA).

b. That 100 spaces be allocated by the Allied Commission. It is anticipated that civilianization and gradual withdrawal from the South, will make this possible. Thirty of these spaces to be allocated at once. The remaining 70 to be allocated when required, as determined by G-5, for personnel needed for Austria.

c. That the personnel to fill these spaces be drawn in part from Allied Commission and in part from replacement depots or other sources. In order that the individuals may be properly prepared they will be given an indoctrination course at the Austrian school at Portici, then return to military government duty with the Commission or be assigned thereto until needed for Austria.

d. That the remaining 100 spaces required for the proposed T/O be allocated from elsewhere in the Theater overhead. If operations permit, the Allied Commission is willing to send to the indoctrination course at Portici, an additional 100 officers, but it is most insistent that their ultimate release to Austria will depend upon many unforeseeable factors and the Commission must therefore decide when they can be released, ~~unless replaced~~. Therefore, spaces additional to the present allocation to the Commission are necessary to furnish such replacement.

6. The situation in the Allied Commission with respect to enlisted personnel is much more acute. Civilian replacement is practicable only to a very limited extent. As the Military Government operations become more extensive

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in North Italy, the requirement increases. At the present time drafts for combat units have taken a great number of enlisted men especially qualified by training and linguistic ability for military government. Limited service replacements have been without such qualifications. The 2675th CA Regt (Ovhd) is presently overstrength due to receiving replacements prior to combat drafts. This will correct itself in a few days and the regiment will return approximately to strength.

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7. It is proposed:

a. That Company C, 2675th CA Regt (Ovhd), (Naples), be designated to receive the Austria personnel until such time as a T/O/TE is established.

b. That the present strength of the Company (about 100 men) be designated for eventual inclusion in the T/O for Austria (see Section VI. This requires that the balance of 415 be obtained by earmarked from other sources.

VI. - Method of Accounting.

1. Identification of the military government personnel necessary for the Austrian Operation with that of the present 2675th CA Regt (Ovhd) is believed unsound and confusing as long as that regiment has obligations and commitments in Italy.

2. The organization of a new Civil Affairs Regiment would provide a simple, sound basis for the procurement and holding of all personnel designated for Austria, both commissioned and enlisted, including personnel from:

a. USGCC (AUSTRIA), whose T/O and T/E could be merged with the T/O and T/E of the new regiment.

b. Allied Commission, Italy, obtained as a result of its civilianization and the potential decrease in the need for military government personnel in Italy if, and as, the AMG carpet is rolled up in the North.

c. The G-5 Staff, U.S. Task Force (Austria).

d. Other sources.

3. The new regiment could also establish its own T/E independently of the 2675th CA Regt (Ovhd), thereby meeting any special requirements incidental to Austrian occupational needs and avoiding the difficulties occasioned by a dual mission for the 2675th CA Regt (Ovhd).

4. Until the Austrian Operation is actually under way the proposed regiment would consist of the USGCC (AUSTRIA) plus a skeleton cadre of a few planning, liaison and administrative officers and enlisted men. All other officers earmarked for Austria, from whatever source derived, would be withdrawn for training only, remaining assigned to their present organizations until called for duty for Austria. All other enlisted men would remain with their present organizations until called.

VII. - Decisions Required.

1. The following decisions are required for submission to CG, MTO.
 - a. Approval of T/O's and T/E for military government operation, Austria.
 - b. Approval of space allocations in Section V, Paragraph Above.
 - c. Approval of plan for procurement, training and earmarking of personnel for military government operation, Austria.
 - d. Approval for activation of a new Civil Affairs Regiment for military government operation, Austria.

TO : All Concerned.

1. Memorandum 30 January, subject as above, distribution G-1, G-3 Org, G-4, G-5 and Allied Commission, is withdrawn and the following substituted therefor.

2. There will be a meeting on Monday, 5 February 1945 at 1130 hours in the G-5 Conference Room to discuss the T/O's and T/E for United States military government operation in Austria, and sources and methods by which personnel will be secured.

3. A draft outline plan will be presented to addressees for study in advance of the meeting. It is hoped that this plan will be in the hands of addressees by 1200 hours, 3 February.

EXTRACT**I - ESTABLISHMENT OF UNITED STATES GROUP CONTROL COUNCIL (AUSTRIA)**

1. In compliance with the provisions of JCS 1169/2, subject: "Planning for Military Government in Austria," dated 16 December 1944, and of JCS 1169/3, subject: "Acceptance by the United States of Zone of Occupation in Austria," dated 25 December 1944, and Message WX-83322, there is hereby established a US nucleus planning staff designated as the US Group Control Council (Austria).

2. The Commanding General, Mediterranean Theater of Operations, U.S. Army, assumes command of the US Group Control Council (Austria).

3. Brigadier General LESTER D. FLORY, 012320, USA, is designated as Acting Deputy USGCC (Austria), and is charged with the following mission:

a. Developing, for approval by the Commanding General, MTOUSA, detailed plans for:

- (1) The organization, personnel, and equipment requirements of USGCC (Austria).
- (2) The requirements of army, navy and air disarmament, demobilization and related agencies to be employed in the US zone of occupation.

b. Acting as the Theater Commander's agent in carrying out liaison with the US Delegation on the European Advisory Commission with respect to the development of US policy in Austria.

c. Developing, for approval by the Commanding General, MTOUSA, policies consistent with those of higher authority which will give effect to US views with respect to Austria and which will serve as the basis for US negotiations and conversations.

d. Coordinating with Military Government planning agencies at CEHQ the preparation of plans for initial functioning of elements of the USGCC (Austria) introduced into Austria during the period of the Supreme Allied Commander, Mediterranean Theater's responsibility.

e. Liaison with the Allied counterparts of the US Group and with USGCC (Germany).

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~~SECRET~~ ~~General Orders~~ #21 (cont'd)

4. To facilitate initial planning and to maintain close liaison with the European Advisory Commission, with the Allied counterparts of the staff referred to in paragraph 1 above, and with the USGCC (Germany), the US Group Control Council (Austria) will be located temporarily in London at a place to be designated by the Commanding General, ETOUSA. Liaison will be maintained with this Headquarters.

5. General Flory will report periodically to the Commanding General, ETOUSA. The assistance of the General Staff at this Headquarters will be available to him in formulating plans for the organization of the USGCC (Austria) and in the procurement of the necessary facilities and personnel therefor.

6. With the concurrence of the Commanding General, ETOUSA, General Flory is authorized to deal directly with the Commanding General, Communications Zone, ETOUSA for accommodations, personnel, and equipment to the extent available. Such additional personnel as may be needed will be requested from this Headquarters.

SUBJECT: Planning for the Occupation of Austria.

TO : Headquarters, Allied Commission, APO 394
(Attn: Chief Commissioner).

1. The planning for the occupation of Austria, originally a SHAEF commitment, has been made the responsibility of SACMED. The Commanding General, MTOUSA has been charged with the responsibility for U.S. planning and participation.

2. The U.S. participation in Austria, as planned, is substantially as follows:

a. The U.S. will participate on a tripartite basis on the National level and in the administration of Gau Vienna.

b. It is also expected that the U.S. may administer the Gaue of Tirol-Vorarlberg, Salzburg and Oberdonau.

c. It is expected that the task force for the occupation of the U.S. zone will be furnished by the 5th Army. A G-5 Staff will be required for this task force.

d. Steps have been initiated to transfer to MTO the Nucleus U.S. Group, Austrian Control Council, now in ETO. It is planned that this group together with the G-5 Staff, U.S. Task Force, will be combined to form part of the U.S. component of the Austrian Control Council.

3. Under provisions of present directives from the War Department, no authority exists for requisitioning personnel from other sources. This, in effect, means that the 2675th Regiment, Allied Commission, (Overhead), as virtually the only available source of manpower trained in military government, will be called upon to furnish the bulk of the personnel, officer and enlisted, for Austria.

4. As at present contemplated officer personnel requirements for the American component, exclusive of the Nucleus U.S.

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Group, Austrian Control Council, are 227 officers. Enlisted personnel required will be 515.

5. Cooperation of the Allied Commission is hereby requested toward furnishing officer and enlisted personnel for Austria in general accordance with the following plan: - 108

a. Fifteen officers already requested and ordered for immediate assignment for permanent duty with the Austrian Planning Group now located at Caserta. These officers, by name, are shown in Appendix "A".

b. Two hundred twelve officers to be earmarked for duty in Austria, and to be ordered, in groups of from 20 to 30, to attend a course of instruction for not to exceed two weeks at a school of military government for Austria at Portici, upon completion of which they will return to their normal stations with the Allied Commission for duty, until called for duty in Austria as required. The first session of this school opens 5 February. Partially completed lists of these officers, by name, are shown in Appendices "B" and "C".

c. Enlisted personnel in numbers and grades indicated in Appendix "D", to be earmarked and called for duty when needed in the Austrian operation.

6. Every effort will be made to insure that the procurement and training of this personnel will be so handled as to cause the minimum inconvenience to the Allied Commission.
