SUBJECT : Draft Instructions re Military
Travel Authorisations.

TO : Director, Public Safety Sub-Commission.

1. The attached draft instructions differ little from the instructions previously issued except that all classes of persons exempted from the requirements to obtain M.T.A's are listed (para.2).

2. The draft instructions have been discussed with Political Section and Displaced Persons and Repatriation Sub-Commission and the following suggestion is submitted :-

Para 3 Owing to the paucity of A.C.C. officers in some Regions,
after "officer" in line 4
add, "or such other officer or agency as ~~may~~ ^{be} ~~deputed~~
Delete from "and" in line 4 to "supervision" in line 5.

3. With regard to the distribution list attached to the instruction it would seem that the two A.M.C. organisations mentioned at the end of the list should be deleted and H.Q., A.C.C. substituted.

4. With regard to paragraph 2 of the covering letter to the instructions, it will be noted that a wider distribution of the instructions in A.C.C. is suggested.

5. As far as A.C.C. is concerned, the instructions regarding M.T.A's are contained in Executive Memorandum No.61, dated 25 May, 1944 (copy attached), which was given the widest possible distribution.

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6. Nothing is known at this Headquarters of the point raised in the last sentence in paragraph 2 as two Sub-Commissions only are authorized to transmit applications to A.F.H.Q., viz :-

Displaced Persons and Repatriation S/C
in the case of Refugees

Public Safety Sub-Commission
in all other cases.

These Sub-Commissions do not forward applications to A.F.H.Q. until FSS/CIC have been consulted.

7. With regard to paragraph 3 of the covering letter, the present practice was adopted, and Executive Memorandum No. 61 sent out in a simplified form, in order to reduce the work in Regions to a minimum.

8. It will be noted that this Headquarters screen all requests before the requisite application forms are completed, photographs obtained, and FSS/CIC make their enquiries. Much useless work is thus eliminated.

9. In channelling all applications through this Headquarters, applications are transmitted to A.F.H.Q. in a proper form and a uniform procedure is followed for the whole of liberated Italy.

10. It is strongly recommended that the present procedure be continued, and that A.F.H.Q. be asked to make the necessary amendment to their draft instructions.

Confirming our conversation this morning, it is requested that approval be given to the proposal to exchange information between JICA and the various Sub-Commissions of ACC. Specifically, it would be appreciated if the officers of JICA/RAAC could be given access from time to time to special reports of the Sub-Commissions or other information in their possession, in order to carry out the functions of JICA, as outlined in the attached AFHQ Staff Memorandum No. 81.

On the other hand, JICA officers are required to be in close touch with Italian political affairs and any reports prepared by this section or any information in its possession on political or other matters, are available at any time to interested agencies of ACC.

You will recall that close cooperation of this sort existed between your organization and ours in Sicily and it is believed that the results were mutually beneficial.

You will note from the attached staff memorandum that JICA is constituted as a special staff section, operating under the Supreme Allied Commander. Copies of all reports prepared by this section are furnished to G-2, AFHQ and other combined agencies and are thus available to London, as well as to Washington. In addition, a British liaison officer is permanently assigned to JICA.

 Functions of JICANA Section II

I -- COMMUNICATIONS WITH SHAEF

1. In compliance with request of SHAEF, all messages transmitted to that headquarters will be addressed to the Echelon of Supreme Headquarters concerned, in cases where the address of the action section in that headquarters is known.
2. Messages of operational nature for SCE, G-1, G-2, G-3, G-4, Engineer Signal Division, Air Defense Division and Headquarters Command, will be addressed to Forward Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force in cases where there is doubt as to the address of the action addresses.

II - FUNCTIONS OF JICANA SECTION

1. The Joint Intelligence Collection Agency, North Africa, hereafter referred to as JICANA, is a joint agency of the U.S. War and Navy Departments attached to and operating under the Supreme Allied Commander as a separate staff section of his command.
2. The principle mission of JICANA is to furnish the War and Navy Departments such military intelligence as they desire for planning and like purposes. In addition, it will provide such lateral dissemination of pertinent intelligence between the various agencies, both military and civil within the Theater, as directed by the Supreme Allied Commander. Specifically, the duties of JICANA will be:
 - a. To initiate procedure which will search out and procure from any and all intelligence agencies, both military and civil within the Theater, all available intelligence of value to the War and Navy Departments. This procedure in all cases, will utilize appropriate existing Theater agencies and channels. Where no such appropriate agencies or channels exist, the intelligence will be procured by personnel or procedure directly available to JICANA.
 - b. To select from the available intelligence pertinent items for transmission to the War and Navy Departments.
 - c. To function as the collecting and disseminating agency for the Supreme Allied Commander concerning such intelligence as he desires from the War and Navy Departments, civil agencies, and other theaters.

(cont'd)

3. JICANA will not engage in counterintelligence activities, but will procure such counterintelligence as is of value to the War and Navy Departments, from the proper agencies within the Theater.
4. JICANA will be kept informed of and assist in the coordination of the intelligence activities of all Military and Naval Attaches, permanent and temporary Military and Navy Observers, within the Theater.
5. The efficient coordination of effort requires the occasional interchange of officers between the War and Navy Departments and JICANA for temporary duty. Such officers will transmit oral or written material of a secret or urgent nature and will be given highest travel priority.
6. All highly classified material forwarded by JICANA by Air Pouch or other means shall be accorded the highest priority.
7. Nothing in this directive shall be interpreted as preventing the direct flow of intelligence from agencies within the Theater to Washington, provided copies of such intelligence communications as are within the scope of JICANA are furnished concurrently to JICANA. Such copies will indicate distribution made by the originator.

TO: Commanding General, Rome Allied Area Command.

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1. The Transportation Sub-Commission does not under any circumstances requisition civilian motor vehicles for ACC. The language of the letter was ill advised.

2. Pursuant to authority vested in this Headquarters by Headquarters NATOUSA, this Headquarters has for the past fifteen months done its own requisitioning of civilian vehicles. This question came up while General Johnson was in command of RAAC and was duly regularized to the satisfaction

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of all concerned in a conference held by representatives of RAAO and ACC Headquarters. At present, requisitioning is done by our G-4 (A) through your G-4, so in effect this Headquarters does not actually complete the requisitioning. We agreed to this procedure in order to establish a definite channel for requisitioning and in order that the records of all requisitioned vehicles might remain in one central filing point.

3. The writer has recently had several discussions with your Chief of Staff along these lines and it is believed that we are in complete agreement on the above procedure.

4. This Headquarters is anxious to cooperate in every way possible with your Headquarters and, to that end, the writer is available for any conferences or discussions you may desire on this subject.

SUBJECT: Establishment of OR/EM.

TO : Headquarters, Allied Control Commission
(Attention: Establishment Officer).

1. At the conference held at Region 3 HQ on 4 August 1944 to decide the set-up of Southern Region, the general opinion of the three Regional Commissioners there present was that it would be impossible to conduct the operational and administrative work of Region HQ, unless there were available 1.6 OR/EM for each officer.

2. Experience to date has shown that the vast distances covered by this region make administration particularly complicated and the necessity for a 1.6 ration at Region HQ has been fully confirmed. It is not believed that the work can be carried out with less.

3. First Lieutenant THEODORE, G-1 (A) of your HQ in his letter G-1 (A) NPT/pd of 18 September denies that the ratio of 1.6 is operative. May it be confirmed, please, that the ratio as agreed with the Executive Commissioner is to continue. The matter is of some urgency, as G-1 are anxious to move forward EM/OR without delay and the number available cannot be settled until the ratio has been agreed.

4. Naturally as the number of officers in this Region are reduced, the number of EM/OR will be reduced pari passu - thus making more available for Northern Regions

TO : Establishment Branch.

September : The following is extracted from AMG 5 Army Sitrep for period 20-24

" Considerable confusion is being caused by the ordering away by Establishments Branch of officers' in Region VIII provinces not yet fully occupied for re-assignment to forward Regions. It is appreciated that Region VIII officers must be earmarked for new duties in the North, but the policy of pulling them out from newly occupied communes with the innumerable problems that arise in the period immediately after the tide of war has passed and sending them down south to a concentration area for re-assignment seems completely unrealistic. It is realized that there is a great shortage of military transport in AOC and it is therefore not expected that new provincial teams should come up with more than three or four vehicles; however the Spezia team who reported this week-end have only one jeep between seven officers. Their usefulness is therefore very limited. This is the lowest point we have yet reached and it is hoped that future teams can be better equipped."

TO : Executive Officer, (American)

1. Reference the attached note from Italian Refugee Branch, the communication in question was received on 29 August, the day delivered to addressee.
2. I conducted a personal check of communications received from 8th Army, which showed the following:

3. We do not maintain a record of the date any particular envelope was mailed from 8th Army; however, a periodic check is made of mail communications with all Regions by sending test letters, a copy of which is attached. The most recent one shows the following: one letter which was received at 8th Army at 1230 on August 12th was received back at 1230 August 17th; a second such letter, received at 8th Army on 13 August 1940 hours was received back at 1500 on 16 August. The second letter had air service, as it was classified "Secret".

4. It has been noticed in the past, and may be seen from the tabulation in Par 2, above, that very frequently correspondence is not dispatched on the date written. Such a delay might account, at least in part, for the apparently excessive transmission time of the refugee report.

5. In reply to the question implicit in Par 1 of 5, Italian Refugee Branch's note, the indicated length of time required for communications from AMO 8th Army to reach this Hq is, on the average, 3-4 days, maximum 5 days, minimum 2 days.
