FROM: The Resident Representative, IGCR, Italy.

Mr. Eugene R. Hammond, an American, has recently joined us from the American Field Service, where he held the rank of lieutenant. He is 2½ years old.

He has come here as my assistant, and the appointment is without any question one of officer status. His actual cash remuneration has been fixed at the equivalent of £600 per annum, which will adequately provide for his maintenance here and contribute to some extent towards the cost of his household in the U.S.A.

The HQ of the IGCR is situated in London, and salaries etcetera are based on British rates of pay. In this respect we differ from UNRRA, whose administrative instructions are given by Washington.

Under British administrative arrangements officer status is not primarily based on salary, and indeed, certain voluntary workers who receive no salary at all are rightly considered of that rank.

I would point out that, apart from his normal duties while I am here, he will act for me as Resident Representative of this Committee in Italy in my absence.

We are having difficulty about the various passes etcetera with which he must be issued by the American authorities. I should be extremely grateful for any help which you can give us in the matter, so that his status as my assistant can be properly established.

SUBJECT: Equivalent treatment for civilians and the military

To : Headquarters, Allied Commission, APO 394

1. This Headquarters is now considering the problems created by the increasing influx of civilians into the theatre. A morale problem is created by the fact that in some cases civilians are given privileges i. e. accommodations, messes etc., on a level above that granted to military personnel doing the same type of work. Steps are now being initiated to correct this situation. It is requested that you will take great care not to disseminate Assistant N.M. and O.R.s at your Headquarters granting to civilians of commissariate status, privileges not allowed to the non-commissioned grades of the military.
2. The general policy is for assimilated rank and accompanying privil- leges to be given on the basis of the responsibility and the duty performed, of which the salary of the civilian is the best index. This rank is only effective in case of capture. On the U. S. side you are cautioned to follow closely the plan of assimilated rank set forth in War Department Circular 343, 1943 series.
3. The following example will serve to illustrate the rule: where an enlisted man has been replaced by a civilian secretary, the secretary should not be given the privileges of an officer but should that of a civilian who may use the M's P.X. or O.R.'s WAFI, be billeted in equivalent accommoda- tions to M/O's, or be housed in special civilian billets which is wholly unconnected with the military.

It is requested that you will take great care not to discriminate against E.M. and O.R.s at your Headquarters granting to civilians of commensurate status, privileges not allowed to the non-commissioned grades of the military.

2. The general policy is for assimilated rank and accompanying privileges to be given on the basis of the responsibility and the duty performed, of which the salary of the civilian is the best index. This rank is only effective in case of capture. On the U. S. side you are cautioned to follow closely the plan of assimilated rank set forth in War Department Circular 343, 1943 series.

3. The following example will serve to illustrate the rule: where an enlisted man has been replaced by a civilian secretary, the secretary should not be given the privileges of an officer but should that of as civilian who may use the EN's P.X. or O.R.'s NAFI, be billeted in equivalent accommodations to EN/O.R.s, or be housed in special civilian billets which is wholly unconnected with the military.

4. It should be noted that present salaries and allowances of civilians are considered adequate to meet their needs where military privileges are not accorded. In principle, military privileges involving the use of billets, requisitions by the Army, access to PX and NAFI stores and the provisions of army rations are granted only where such facilities are, practically speaking, unavailable to the civilians in the open market.

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5. In view of the fact that the Allied Commission will be progressively civilianised, it is considered that the most careful attention should be paid to the problems outlined above, with particular emphasis on the morale problem created by any practice under which the military personnel are maintained on a scale of living inferior to that accorded to their associates performing the same duties.

SUBJECT: Officer status of civilians.

MEMO TO: Vice President, Establishment Section.

In establishing officer status of civilian employees, it is readily apparent that those to be classified fall into two classes:

a. Those sent from the United States and the United Kingdom, who are already classified by their respective Governments before being sent into this theatre.

b. Those employed locally.

Only those in b. above are in question and those fall into three categories:

- a. Allied Nationals
- b. Italian citizens
- c. Neutrals

It is recommended that the following method be employed in establishing officer status of civilians:

Cont'd

a. Bona fide Allied Nationals who are paid at a monthly rate equivalent to those sent direct from the United States or United Kingdom be given officer status as follows:

\$ 250 or lower	- 2nd Lt
250 to 350	- 1st "
350 to 500	- Capt
500 to 700	- Maj
700 to 1,000	- Lt Col
1,000 to 1,250	- Col
1,250 to 1,500	- Brig Gen
1,500 and above	- Maj Gen

b. Co-belligerents and neutrals not to be given officer status in any case.

SUBJECT: Assault on American Civilian.

TO : Acting Vice President, Economic Section, Allied Commission.

1. Reference is made to your letter file 1.61/ES dated 1 May 1945.

2. I phoned your office on 1 May, and in your absence I left a message for you to the effect that American female Civilian employees of this Headquarters who are billeted at the Esperia Hotel, could telephone the Duty Officer for a taxi cab, when occasions made it necessary for them to use this mode of transport in the evenings, to get back to their hotel.

3. Nothing can be done toward assignment of recreational transport at this time. The Headquarters Commandant advises that available transport is currently being used in moving supplies, equipment and personnel to Northern Italy.

4. The matter of recreational transport will be brought up at the next Establishment Meeting, on 3 May.
