Subject: Supply Responsibility for ACC and AMC in PBS.

To : Military Severament Section, APHQ, APO 512.

1. Please refer to your letter of 5 April 19hh, some subject so above, file No. MOS 450.2, and previous correspondence mentioned in Pars. I thereof.

2. Phile we are getting the figures requested in your Fara. 3 it is felt that an interis reply is indicated.

3. The question of rations, while of importance, is not nearly so serious as the matter of general supplies and equipment. It must be appreciated that the operations of ACC are fluid, and that while some parts of the organization remain more or less static other parts very markedly in the volume of their work. As the volume and nature of the sork increase and decrease more or less supplies and equipment are required. As a case in point I cite - recent occurrence in the Italian Refugees Dub-Commission. The Sub-Consission was required to receive, feet and shelter a number of refugees from the beachhead who were to arrive at about dark. This situation required the use of some 50 lanterns for use in handling the arrivals, and later in the tents in which they were to be housed. These lanterns were in stock at PhS, and PRS was willing to issue them, but only for administrative use. In short, under their present instructions, PBS could not issue the lasterns for use by refugees. This is typical of the instances we are continually required to solve.

4. Present instructions require us to "borrow" from PBS, and to replace the "horrowed" items at a later date. In order to obtain the replacement supplies we must requisition on APIEL through MOS. When the requisition is eventually approved and returned to this Headquarters we must take it to Pas to draw the supplies for return to them. This is obviously a clumsy and time consuming method.

5. It would be far simpler and faster if PBS were instructed to honor our requisitions for any and all types of supplies and equipment direct. Provided, of course, that such issued would be subject to the demands of the combat troops, preference naturally being given to them.

1. a. Strengths involved are as follows:

It must be borne in mindthat strength wartes so rapidly that figures for any one day, do not necessarily reflect an accurate statement of the situation. This Headquarters is in effect a holding center. For example shipments of personnel out of this area or theater are assembled here, pending availability of transport. Also, shipments into the theater are assembled here for further assignment. These groups vary in size from small numbers to as many as two-hundred, both British and American. All must be absorbed into existing messes and billete.

- b. Supplies in question are principally building material, i.e.; brick, tile, mortar, fixtures, etc., as well as numerous other items which may be referred to as supplies in general.
- 2. Information required by Para. IId. Section II. NATOUSA Circular No. 14, follows:
- a. Headquarters Allied Control Commission, Region III ACC (less Salerno Province), Region IV ACC.

(2): The strength of Regions III and IV is widely scattered throughout their Provinces, where smaller musbers are constantly shifting in proportionate strength between British and American forces.

b. Location of unite:

Hendquarters ACC - Haples

- Maples and contiguous provinces Hq. Region III Hq. Region IV - Maples and provinces to the north.

c. Rations will be required on a diminishing basis, as long as headquarters of the above units remain in Maples.

3. a. It is contemplated that reductions in strength will be made as rapidly as is consistent with the policy of turning over territory to the Italian Government. Thus, Region III will be reduced in strength. On the other hand, Region IV will require an increase as the combat zone advances, and more small messes will be required as more territory comes under military government.

- b. Another factor contributing to fluctuations in strength, are such incidents as the recent volcanic eruption, requiring evacuation on a comparatively large scale and a shift of military personnel to supervise the work. Also, tactical operations require movements of our personnel from one area to another for evacuation of civilians.
- h. Reason for requesting U.S. rations is that a single source of supply has proven more satisfactory than the dual source. It has been found that Americans in British areas are more efficiently supplied from British sources. The same is true of British in American areas. British supplies and rations are being furnished to ACC and AMC units in District 1 and District 2. Also, our units in Salermo are being supplied by a District 2 sub-base. Considerable simplification and improvement in efficiency would be achieved by designating Peninsular Base Section as responsible for normal routine supply of our units in the PBS area.
- 5. This authorisation should include all ACC/AMC units in the Peninsular Base Section area.

SUBJECT: Supply Responsibility for ACC and AMC in Peninsular Base Section Area.

TO : Commanding General, EQ. Allied Force, APO 512.

- 1. Request that the Peninsular Base Section be given responsibility for the normal routine supply of Headquarters ACC and AMG units located in the Peninsular Base area. These units consist of both British and American personnel working in the same offices and eating in the same messes.
- 2. The percentages of British and American officers in any of the headquarters and units is constantly shifting due to the necessity for moving officers from one assignment to another on short notice. It is impracticable to operate separate messes or separate billets for the officers and at the same time to economize on the necessary personnel overhead. The Enlisted Men and Other Ranks' messes are being kept separately where numbers present make it possible and British rations are used for British Other Ranks in messes where numbers are more or less constant. British supplies and rations are being furnished to ACC and AMG units in District 1 and District 2. That part of Headquarters ACC which is located at Salerno, is also, being supplied by a District 2 sub-base. It is only logical, therefore, that the Peninsular Base Section supply the combined British and American units and headquarters located within the Base area.
- 3. Equipment, as opposed to supplies, is issued to AGC and AMG units on approved British G-1098 and American Table of Equipment. The question of responsibility for supplies arises only on the question of rations and normal routine supplies for the repair and upkeep of effices, billets and messes where it is impracticable to operate as a combined unit and where British supplies are not easily available.
