I am nure that Vice Presidents will appreciate that operations being now in progress, the SCAO's of Amsice and Regional Considuationers with their stairs are faced with urgent operational matters in the newly occupied territory. HO Allied Consdission can greatly assist foreard AMD's in THE WAYER (a) By refraining from sending to them any correspondence except that of the most urgent nature. Regional Commissioners will have little time to read long directives and instructions which, in my case, should have been forwarded to them in the planning period. If instructions now have to be sent, let them be concise and short. (b) By prohibiting the visits of officers to the newly occupied Regions, except on the most uncont matters or unless called for by the BCAC's or negional Commissioners thouselves. We should have planned sufficiently well to make such visits unnecessary in the initial stages. We must leave it to the Megional Comudacioners and SGAO's to send us the necessary information rather than send troupes of officers who will only harmes the AND staff in their dirricult initial work. Vice Presidents will, therefore, ensure: (a) That directives and instructions of any length or consequence are submitted to thom for signature before despatch, and should call for the sirdses of paper work (no long questionnaires). That written communications are restricted to the sindenes. That no officer or civilian official visits the forward areas wishout their personal approval. =1-4566 85/KOA

Please do not publish the Combined List of Officer Assignments, for the following reasons:

- l. It will list officers already assigned to the Region.
- 2. It will not show the previous status from which transferred.
- 3. It is a waste of paper to show the status of officers, when the status is already known and not changed.
- 4. There will be a lengthy delay in issuance of Regimental Orders, because it will be necessary to conduct research to execute the transfers required by American Army Administration. (The AC lists were weeks in preparation, whereas the Regiment will have to begin from scratch, now).
- 5. Locating the name of an officer on the appendices is a lengthy process, (as has been proven by past experience with Special Order No. 59, Hq AC 1944).
- 6. One copy for each American Officer concerned, (about 600), and one for his 201 file, will result in the use of 36,000 sheets of paper for this purpose alone.
- 7. The Regiment and G-1 (A), spent months untangling the snarled American administration, which resulted from the publication of a similar order last year. (80 59, Hq, AC).
- 8. Issuance of the standard type of transfer order, will result in:
 - a. clear, concise and undisputable orders 106/
 - b. easy reference to a paragraph, and Special Order number.
 - c. quick and accurate issuance of Regimental

- d. Economy of paper.
- e. Copies of the transfer order for the officer's 201 file.
- 9. An all-inclusive order, listing the assignments of American and British Officers in the Allied Commission, should be classified as "Confidential". Distribution of the required number of copies would place an unnecessary burden on all Message Centers concerned, if the document was classified as "Confidential".
