SUBJECT: Employment of German Prisoners of War

TO: All Concerned

1. It is planned to employ German Prisoners of War to the maximum extent possible.
2. As responsibility for accommodation rests with the major command using such personnel, attention is directed to MTOUSA Administrative Memorandum Number 4, 1945, subject: "Scale of Accommodations and Standards of Construction for Enemy Personnel in Labor Camps."
3. Plans will be made at the earliest practicable date to accommodate the German Prisoners of War so that there will be a minimum delay in accepting this personnel.
4. As Italian service units will be replaced, full use will be made of existing accommodations.



SUBJECT: Employment of German and Austrian Prisoners of War.

TO : All Concerned.

1. All previous requests for Prisoners of War will be disregarded.
2. All units and staff sections of this command will make an immediate survey of their requirements for German and Austrian prisoners of war. This survey will include prisoner personnel required at the present time. It is anticipated that an early shipment of prisoners of war can be expected.
3. Report will be made so as to reach this headquarters not later than 30 June 1945, as follows:
 - a. Number of prisoners of war by classification, which can be utilized by your unit and/or section.
 - b. Length of time prisoners may be usefully employed.
4. In the event no report is received from your unit and/or section, it will be assumed that no prisoners of war are desired.

SUBJECT: Close-out of Major Commands.
TO: All Concerned.

1. Letter, this Headquarters, file AG 370.01/612 C/S-O, dated 2 August 1945, subject: "Redeployment Planning", is rescinded.
2. The following basic planning assumptions are published for the information and guidance of all concerned. They are based on the results of past action and the best estimates of future action as available at this time.
 - a. Headquarters MTOUSA closes 1 December when MTO is to be absorbed by UNREP.
 - b. Cecchignola RMA closes 15 October.
 - c. University Training Command closes 25 November.
 - d. Rome Area, MTOUSA, continues for an indefinite period dependent upon future US commitments in Rome, which commitments are presently under study.
 - e. Allied Commission to be gradually reduced to a total of 700 on 1 December.
 - f. MMIA to continue for an indefinite period, the size of the US contingent depending on the results of a study which is determining the US requirement.
 - g. Adriatic Base Command closes 1 November.
 - h. The 27th Replacement Depot, Pisa, will become inactive effective 31 October 1945, after which date all casual personnel shipments will be via 7th Replacement Depot and port of Naples. Provision of limited number of casualties to fill passenger spaces on ships sailing from Leghorn will be the responsibility of Peninsular Base Section through the staging area at Leghorn.
 - i. Army Air Forces, MTO, becomes non-operational 1 October and will be inactivated 15 October, the residual units coming under Army Air Force Service Command, MTO on 10 October. Army Air Force Service Command, MTO becomes a major command under MTOUSA 1 October.
 - j. Peninsular Base Section reduces progressively to a US troop strength of about 30,000 as of 1 December.

k. 88th Division relieves 34th Division about 1 October as US Force in Venezia Giulia.

l. 34th Division, with high-score personnel only, departs for US about 15 October.

m. 92d Division, with high-score personnel only, departs for US about 25 October.

n. POW Command is discontinued as of 25 September. All functions of POW Command become the responsibility of Peninsular Base Section except the guard and administration of GSUs assigned to Army Air Force Service Command, MTO, which become AFSC/MTO responsibility.

o. The Florence Area Command will be inactivated about 1 December.

p. Activities and responsibilities of special staff sections of this headquarters, are progressively being turned over to Peninsular Base Section. (Reference letter, this headquarters, file AG 370.01/612 C-O, dated 20 September 1945, subject: "Reduction of Headquarters MTUSA").

q. Headquarters Command, Allied Force, will close as of 1 December.

r. All units in the theater are now Category IV. Those which will remain in theater after 1 January 1946 will be redesignated Category I. Category IV units will be inactivated in the theater, except those presently designated to return to the United States as carrier units.

s. Low-score personnel are being requisitioned from the War Department to bring Category I units up to T/O strength.

t. An estimated theater strength forecast is as follows:

- u. Other personnel, not included in sub-paragraph t above, who will require support, are ATC (1,000) and US Navy (3,500).
3. The effect of the transfer of responsibilities to Peninsular Base Section, coupled with the rapid reduction of personnel, requires that all MCUSA staff sections and headquarters of major commands, review carefully administrative procedures and operational requirements with a view to reducing the work load, not only on office personnel but also on operational units. Much needless waste of time, effort and material is evident. Among the items which will be reviewed are:
- a. Reports required.
 - b. Use of signal communications.
 - c. Construction of any type.
 - d. Motor transportation.
 - e. The substitution of train or bus transportation orders for air travel orders.
 - f. Consolidation of facilities to release personnel, equipment and property.
 - g. Release of GJUs who are performing no constructive mission.
 - h. The release of US-ITAs and other Italian Army units presently supporting US activities.

SUBJECT: Abbreviations of Unit Designations.

To: All Concerned.

1. Letter, this Headquarters, file and subject as above, dated 28 December 1944, and amendment thereto, dated 24 March 1945, are rescinded. Either the full designation of a unit or an authorized abbreviation, as listed below, will be used in the heading and texts of messages to be transmitted by electrical means.

2. Reference is made to AFM Signal Instructions, Item 2, Section V, subject "Submarine Cable Communications", for listing of authorized telegraphic addresses. A telegraphic address is a short meaningless word assigned currently to a civil, diplomatic, or political agency only, for use in routing traffic via commercial communication channels; whereas an authorized abbreviation is used by a military organization in lieu of the full official designation in the text of a message or in the heading when routing is in plain language by secure signal channels.

3. The list of authorized abbreviations below is not intended to include all headquarters and units in the theater. It has been restricted to those to which traffic is particularly heavy and whose designation lends itself to an intelligible abbreviation. The list must be kept short enough to permit complete familiarity by all personnel who must use it. Therefore, additions to the list will be kept to a minimum.

SUBJECT: United States Government Property Mailed to United States
by Members of the Armed Forces Overseas

TO: All Concerned

1. The Bureau of Customs has reported to the War Department that examiners are finding ~~many~~ items of stolen United States Government equipment in packages mailed by members of the Armed Forces abroad to friends and relatives in the United States.

2. To provide effective control of this problem, unit commanders will initiate strong supervisory action. The seriousness of mailing unauthorized objects will be publicized by all unit commanders and an educational program will be initiated at once to acquaint all military personnel with the nature of unauthorized objects, pointing out that packages can be inspected by Customs authorities without their being opened.

3. The following are examples of unauthorized articles: Pistols, revolvers or other firearms concealable on the person; inflammable, combustible or other explosive material; captured enemy material (see MTGOM Circular No 60, cs); United States or Allied Government property; currency or postage stamps (except in limited quantities); and Army Exchange Service supplies. (Extract WD Circular 155, cs, attached)

4. Effective immediately the following will apply to all packages mailed in this theater:

a. For packages containing war trophies:

(1) A certificate by officers/affidavit by enlisted men, in duplicate will be made as follows and both copies inclosed inside the package:

'The undersigned certifies that this package, addressed to _____, does not contain United States property or other items unauthorized for mailing and that the war trophies contained herein comply with the provisions of Section VI, Circular 155, War Department, 1945.'

E X T R A C T

WAR TROPHY--Retention--Sec III, WD Cir 353, 1944, rescinded-----VI

VI--WAR TROPHY.--1. In order to improve the morale of the United States forces in the theaters of operations, the retention of war trophies by military personnel, merchant seamen, and civilians serving with the United States Army overseas is authorized under the conditions set forth in the following instructions:

a. Retention by individuals of captured enemy equipment as war trophies in accordance with the instructions contained herein is considered to be for the service of the United States and not in violation of the 79th and 80th Articles of War.

b. It is to be noted that the 79th Article of War provides:

All public property taken from the enemy is the property of the United States and shall be secured for the service of the United States, and any person subject to military law who neglects to secure such property or is guilty of wrongful appropriation thereof shall be punished as a court martial may direct.

c. It is also to be noted that the 80th Article of War provides:

Any person subject to military law who buys, sells, trades, or in any way deals in or disposes of captured or abandoned property, whereby he shall receive or expect any profit, benefit, or advantage to himself or to any other person directly or indirectly connected with himself, or who fails whenever such property comes into his possession or custody or within his control to give notice thereof to the proper authority and to turn over such property to the proper authority without delay, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by fine or imprisonment, or by such other punishment as a court martial, military commission, or other military tribunal may adjudge, or by any or all of said penalties.

d. It is not the intention of these instructions to permit the return of war trophies for sale or barter in the United States. The return of several of any similar items of enemy equipment by an individual under this regulation may be considered an indication of intent to traffic in war trophies and can be cause for confiscation of all such items shipped or brought into the United States by the individual.

2. War trophies will be taken only in a manner strictly consistent with the following principles of international law:

a. Article 6 of the Geneva (Prisoners of War) Convention of 1929 (par. 79, FM 27-10; Ch 6, TM 27-251 (p. 69) provides:

All effects and objects of personal use--except arms, horses, military equipment, and military papers--shall remain in the possession of prisoners of war, as well as metal helmets and gas masks.

Money in the possession of prisoners may not be taken away from them except by order of an officer and after the amount is determined. A receipt shall be given. Money thus taken away shall be returned to the account of each prisoner.

Identification documents, insignia of rank, decorations, and objects of value may not be taken from prisoners.

b. Metal helmets and gas masks may be taken from prisoners by the proper authorities when prisoners have reached a place where they are no longer needed for protection.

c. Article 3 of the Geneva (Red Cross) Convention of 1929 (Par. 176, FM 27-10; Ch. 7, FM 27-251 (p. 131) provides:

After every engagement, the belligerent who remains in possession of the field of battle shall take measures to search the wounded and the dead and to protect them from robbery and ill treatment.

d. The taking of decorations, insignia of rank, or objects of value either from prisoners of war or from the wounded or dead (otherwise than officially for examination and safe keeping) is a violation of international law. There is nothing unlawful, however, in a soldier of our Army picking up and retaining small objects found on the battlefield, or buying articles from prisoners of war of the sort which, under the articles quoted, it is unlawful for him to take from a prisoner, the wounded, or the dead. In view of the practical difficulty of determining in a particular case whether an object has been acquired from a prisoner by coercion or otherwise obtained in a manner contrary to international law, commanding officers will take appropriate measures to prevent violation or evasion of either the letter or spirit of the conventions. Under no circumstances may war trophies include any item which in itself is evidence of disrespectful treatment of any kind.

e. a. With the exception noted in h below, military personnel returning to the United States from theaters of operations may be permitted to bring back small items of enemy equipment which have not been obtained in violation of the articles of the Geneva Convention as quoted in paragraph 2.

b. The following items are prohibited:

(1) Weapons taken from any kind of equipment (these will not be removed from captured equipment except by specifically authorized military personnel).

(2) Live ammunition, explosives, or any other items containing explosives. (Violation of this prohibition is a serious and punishable offense as grave injuries have resulted from the possession or shipment of explosives).

- (3) Firearms of the automatic type (or component parts) such as machine guns, sub-machine guns, or any type gun in which a number of shots or bullets may be discharged with one continuous pull of the trigger.
- (4) Radio or radar equipment (or component parts) of any type.
- (5) Inflammables of any nature.
- (6) Items of which the value as trophies, as determined by the theater commander, is outweighed by their usefulness in the service or for research or training purposes in the theater of operations or elsewhere, or by their value as critical scrap material.

c. In view of the various laws, both Federal and State, pertaining to the transportation, registration, and ownership of firearms and other items necessary to register such firearms or other weapons with proper authorities and otherwise comply with Federal, State, and local laws, depending on the locality in which these firearms or weapons are to be retained. Failure to register this type of equipment, which includes rifles, civil arms, swords, bayonets, bayonet-holsters, shot-shells, billies, bludgeons, metal knuckles, and the like, may result in the confiscation by authorities of such items and also the prosecutions of the individuals in whose unauthorized possession such articles are found.

d. When military personnel returning to the United States bring in trophies not prohibited above, each person must have a certificate, in duplicate, signed by his superior commissioned officer, and bearing appropriate official theater stamp (see par. 3n) indicating that the bearer is officially authorized by the theater commander, under the provisions of this regulation, to retain as his personal property the articles listed on the certificate. The signed duplicate certificates will be taken up by an officer at the port of embarkation (and a consolidated certificate accomplished) or by the Customs Bureau or military authorities at the port of debarkation. The original will be retained by the bearer.

e. Military personnel in theaters of operations may be permitted to mail to the United States war trophies not prohibited in paragraph 3b, except that the mailing of all firearms, or component parts, capable of being concealed on the person is prohibited. These weapons are defined by the United States Customs Service as weapons having a barrel length of less than 18 inches from the breech to the tip of the muzzle. This overall length is not to include flash hiders, compensators, the receiver assembly, or related parts. Parcels mailed from overseas which contain war trophies must also contain a certificate in duplicate, both copies signed by the bearer's superior commissioned officer, and bearing appropriate official theater stamp indicating that the bearer is officially authorized by the theater commander to mail the articles listed on the certificate. The Customs Bureau will take up the signed duplicate certificate and leave the signed original inside the parcel.

f. Equipment necessary for loading or unloading war trophies to the United States as souvenirs must secure the required authorization certificate, in duplicate, bearing appropriate official theater stamp. See par. 3n security 4747

United States civilians serving with the United States Army overseas who desire to bring or mail back war trophies to the United States as souvenirs may secure the required authorizing certificate, in duplicate, bearing appropriate official theater stamp from the United States Army officers under whom they are serving. Certificates will not be issued for items the retention of which is restricted by paragraphs 2 and 3 or for any enemy military firearms. Such certificates will be informed by the civilian concerned with his signed statement that the articles are not being taken or mailed to the United States for sale or barter purposes.

8. a. Theater commanders will prescribe the official theater stamp to be used on certificates of authorization for the return of war trophies and will exercise the supervision necessary to prevent the use of forged certificates. They will also take appropriate action to prevent the mailing of unauthorized war trophies.

b. All captured enemy army material brought or shipped to the United States in violation of the instructions contained herein will be seized by the Customs Bureau, military authorities, or any other authorized Federal officers or agents, and the owner will forfeit all claims to the item or items and such convictions will not be passed to the person from whom they were seized. Violators of the provisions of this circular will be subject to the disciplinary or legal action as the circumstances may indicate.

Notifications of the shipping to include a description of the items shipped, will be issued to the Commandant, Bureau of Air Forces, attention: Assistant Chief of Air Staff Intelligence, Washington 25, D. C.

11. Weight of the two bags included in baggage of personnel leaving for foreign and civil is ten pounds, except as to be shipped to the United States, except development of mail, and other civilian publications prescribed by current regulations. The following allowances are authorized by AD letter (AD 24, 18 Aug 44) O-3-S-5107 H, 29 August 1944, subject, "Provision of baggage from overseas," are authorized as follows:

a. Dual officers will be allowed one bag to exceed 25 pounds of baggage if it be twice of his original overseas allowance.

b. In addition to the clothing and equipment authorized in government or naval orders of individuals returning to the United States, the enlisted man in civilian will be authorized not to exceed 25 pounds of baggage for personal items and captured material provided.

SUBJECT: Currency Control.

TO: All Concerned.

1. Reports have been received from the Commanding General, Africa-Middle East Theater of Operations to the effect that excessive amounts of Allied Military Lire are being transported into that theater by personnel from units within the geographical limits of TOUSA.
2. In this connection attention is invited to the provisions of paragraph 6, TOUSA Circular Number 71, 1945, which requires that all persons departing this theater on leave, temporary duty, permanent change of station, or for any other reason, or going to another location within the theater where a different type of currency is used, will, before departure, exchange with the disbursing officer at port of embarkation (or aerial port of embarkation) the local currency in their possession for the proper type of currency.
3. The provisions of the cited circular require that facilities be made available at ports of embarkation (or aerial port of embarkation) for exchanges of currencies and that timely exchanges are made by all concerned.
4. It is directed that commanders review currency control instructions issued by them with a view to ascertaining that such instructions are in accordance with the provisions of the cited circular and that immediate action be taken by all concerned to insure rigid enforcement of theater and local directives regarding currency control.

SUBJECT: Adjustment of Non-Military and Semi-Military Organizations within MTOUSA to Local Sources of Supply

TO: All Concerned

1. Many non-military or semi-military organizations within MTOUSA are presently calling upon US military sources for facilities, supply and maintenance assistance, and in the case of common pool stocks such as Petroleum, from other Allied sources. Such organizations are: United Nations Rehabilitation Relief Association, Allied Commission, Foreign Service Offices of the Department of State, American Red Cross and other organizations not herein specified which contemplate activities after the departure of US military personnel.

2. The purpose of this letter is to insure that such organizations be prepared for eventual supply from their own sources. As part of the redeployment to the Pacific and the United States, the Army must gradually withdraw from its activities in this theater.

3. It is requested that organizations affected by this publication take action to explore and develop their own sources of supply and be able to be self-supporting upon reduction of US Army supply installations.

CIRCULAR LETTER NO. 17

SUBJECT: Treatment of Psychiatric Disorders.

1. Following the Armistice in World War I there was an increase in the number of patients hospitalized in Europe for neuropsychiatric disorders which resulted in an admission rate greater than that which had occurred during periods of active combat. It is probable that there will be an increase in hospital admission rate in this theater, after an initial post-armistice decrease, unless every preventive measure is utilized to its fullest extent.

2. The reasons for this increased admission rate are many. The major causes are inactivity, boredom, fear of being sent to other active theaters, desire to get home, and the knowledge that priority in going to the Zone of Interior is given to the sick and wounded. It is thus to be expected that there will be an increase in the number of patients with frank psychiatric complaints and an increase in the number of those with conscious or unconscious exaggeration of the symptoms arising from minor defects or disorders.

3. In order to minimize this expected increase in the number of psychiatric patients, the following policies will be adopted by all medical officers and medical installations:

a. No individual with a psychiatric disorder will be hospitalized unless he is in actual need of hospitalization.

b. Maximum use will be made of treatment in out-patient clinics.

c. Out-patient clinics for Neuropsychiatry will be established in all general hospitals, evacuation hospitals, station hospitals possessing a psychiatrist, and division clearing stations. Excepting emergency cases, no patient will be admitted to hospitals for a neuropsychiatric disorder until he has been examined, and approved for admission, by an out-patient service. Patients sent to an out-patient clinic for psychiatric examination or treatment will in all cases be accompanied by an adequate description of behavior and the reasons for which examination is requested.

d. Individual medical officers, and particularly those working in unit dispensaries, should themselves make every effort to evaluate completely patients and to give such treatment as can be administered out of hospital. Consultations should not be requested merely for "clearance"; they should be requested

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only when diagnosis cannot be established or treatment given without the assistance of a consultant.

e. Ineffectiveness from poor attitude, lack of motivation, or unwillingness to expend further effort should be differentiated clearly from ineffectiveness resulting from illness or disease. The Medical Department must not be utilized as a means of disposition for soldiers or officers who are undesirable for reasons of inefficiency or misconduct or who, at the most, have minor but nondisabling physical or mental disorders. Where ineffectiveness is not the result of disease or injury, the facts will be reported to the individual's commanding officer.

f. No individual with a psychoneurosis will be evacuated to the Zone of the Interior solely because of psychoneurosis unless he is incapable of performing a day's work in some capacity in the theater.

SUBJECT: Medical Care for Troops Returning to the Zone of the Interior
TO: All Concerned

1. In accordance with War Department instructions, adequate medical care for troops returning to the Zone of the Interior, will require the following minimum medical personnel:

a. For troop capacity of less than 100: 1 surgical technician.

b. For troop capacity of 100-300: 1 Medical Department officer with training of or equivalent to assistant battalion surgeon, and 4 medical department enlisted men.

c. For troop capacity of 301-1500: 1 Medical Corps officer and 12 medical department enlisted men; for each additional 1500 troops or fraction thereof: 1 Medical Corps officer and 12 medical department enlisted men.

2. Permanent medical department personnel aboard Victory and Liberty ships will be provided as a nucleus by the Zone of the Interior where practicable as follows:

a. Liberty ships, blown up to troop capacity of 350: 1 Medical Department NCO.

b. Liberty ships blown up to troop capacity of 500: 1 Medical Department NCO, 1 medical or surgical technician.

c. Victory ships blown up to troop capacity of 1500: 1 MAC officer, 1 Medical Department NCO, 1 medical or surgical technician.

3. The base section commander responsible for the port of embarkation will insure:

a. That adequate medical supplies and medical personnel to cover the requirements in accordance with paragraphs 1 and 2 above, are available for all ships used for the transportation of troops.

- b. That such medical personnel and supplies as necessary to cover any deficits are placed aboard ship.
- c. That the movement of medical personnel is regulated to insure availability for this duty.
- d. That personnel required for duty aboard such ships is embarked 24 hours prior to embarkation of other troops and is reported to the Transport Commander for assignment and instructions.
- e. Regularly organized medical hospital ship platoons (separate) will not be used for the purpose of providing medical care for troops embarked on a duty status.
- f. The Replacement Command commander will furnish medical department personnel from the pool of such personnel awaiting shipment to the Zone of the Interior, if available, upon request from the base section commander concerned, when any particular shipment of troops does not meet the minimum medical personnel requirements outlined in paragraphs 1 and 2 above. Direct communication between the major commands concerned is authorized.
- g. In the event that the minimum medical department personnel required to provide adequate medical care for troops returning to the Zone of the Interior, as outlined above, cannot be met, the base section commander concerned will report shortages and circumstances to this headquarters.

SUBJECT: Bronze Service Star and Bronze Star Medal

TO: All Concerned

1. It is apparent that misunderstanding exists as to correct designation of the Bronze Service Star. This misunderstanding has been the cause of incorrect entries in service records. Because of the departure of individuals and organizations from the theater under Redeployment readjustment, this requires immediate and effective corrective action.

2. Entries which now record "Bronze Battle Star," or "Battle Participation Award" obviously refer to the award of the Bronze Service Star, and need not be changed. Future awards, however, will be recorded to show the correct title, viz., "Bronze Service Star".

3. Entry of award of a Bronze Star Medal and/or a Bronze Service Star will be as shown in the example below:

Examples:

a. Bronze Service Star, followed by the designation of the campaign for which authorized, viz, "Naples-Foggia", and the authority.

b. Bronze Star Medal, followed by authority.

4. These instructions will be furnished promptly to all concerned.
