SUBJECT: Flashlight for CC.RR.

"To : Commanding General P.B.S.
(through Liaison Officer, HQ. ACC).

1. The CC.RR. Railway Nucleo in Naples Province are seriously handicapped in their duties during the hours of darkness, owing to lack of suitable flashlights.

2. In view of the serious crime and black market activities now prevailing, the efforts of the CC.RR. in detecting offenders at the various railway stations and yards is seriously affected and the advantages at night lie almost entirely with the criminal classes.

3. It is essential that these men be provided with flashlights in order to perform their duties.

4. These however cannot be obtained through ordinary commercial channels and it is therefore requested that authority **119** be given for the supply of these, from military resources, either on payment or on loan.

5. The number requested is 121.

TO: Col. P.G. Kirk.
Chief, Public Safety Sub-Commission.

It happens sometimes that officials of Allied M.P.,
conduct searches and investigations inside the Carabinieri
Barracks.

Although most of these investigations are unsuccessful
and end with kind explanations and excuses, the matter pro-
duces a considerable loss of prestige for the Carabinieri,
especially in small villages.

May I ask and suggest that proper representations be made
to the competent Allied Authorities to avoid this inconvenience.
Whenever any suspicion arises with regard to the Carabinieri
work, it should be possible to report the matter to the Cara-
binieri officer and carry out with him all the investigation
wanted. The presence of a Carabinieri officer when searching
would save the CC.RR prestige and give a normal and legal form
from a disciplinary point of view.

In brief, I have no objection for the matter itself but
only stress the importance to proceed in a legal way to avoid
any loss of prestige for the Police Forces.
