SUBJECT: Liaison.

TO : Economic Section.

1. The attached letter dated 28 April 1944 from our Food Sub-Commission to the Provost Marshal, Peninsular Base Section, while no doubt written with the best of motives, has caused highly undesirable repercussions. Brigadier General R.M. Immail disposed of it by forwarding to the Provincial Commissioner, Naples Province, with the remark, "What is this fellow doing writing direct? I do not consider this PBS responsibility but the Municipality's."

2. Direct writing of letters by sub-commissions across channels has in several earlier cases resulted in impairment of our "military public relations" in a degree to which experience has shown to be far greater than the results obtained have justified. In the present instance, regardless of the merits of the matter presented, the results obtained will undoubtedly be nil and the Commission will be the loser in further dealings with Peninsular Base Section.

3. Assistance of this Division was at no time requested in connection with this problem, although our relations with the Provost Marshal, P.M.C., have been of the best, and dealings with Colonel Hardie on behalf of various components of the Commission have met with uniformly sympathetic treatment.

4. It is respectfully requested that you take such action as you feel may be justified to prevent further incidents of this kind.

5. The above comments relate solely to the method of communication adopted, which would seem to be faulty from an administrative, as well as liaison, standpoint. No opinion is expressed on the merits of the Food Sub-Commission's complaints.

SUBJECT: Police protection in areas adjacent to ACC Food warehouses.

TO : Provost Marshall, Naples.

1. Despite numerous verbal requests, sufficient police protection is not provided on streets near various ACC warehouses to prevent theft from vehicles hauling foodstuffs to and from said warehouses.

2. In response to mentioned verbal requests, advice is given that sufficient men and transport equipment is unavailable. In addition, within last short time, number of American guards riding port trucks has been decreased, which has resulted in increases in theft. As recently as today, a truck carrying soup to Depot 676 from the port was pilfered on A route, between Gate 5 and the warehouse, of 7 cases of soup. This is on the MAIN thoroughfare.

3. Organized thievery exists on the three U-shaped streets leading into, parallel to, and from Depot 676, from A Route. In order to properly police these streets, at least 2, and preferably 4 M.P. posts should be established. These men could patrol effectively on foot or bicycle.

4. Organized thievery on a much larger scale exists on the three U-shaped streets leading into, parallel to, and from Depot 677, from A route. At one time these streets were in part policed by Italian Carabinieri. These men are no longer on duty. To effectively police these streets at least 3 posts, and preferably 4 posts should be established. These men could patrol either on foot or bycycle.

5. Patrolling by motorcycle or jeep in the areas mentioned in para. 2 and 3 would NOT be effective, as the thieves have such systems that the warning sound of a vehicle stops their activities.

6. In as much as the entrance to Depot 696 is directly from A route policing in that area need be confined only to routine policing of that main highway, which at present is inadequate. A route carries a large share of the traffic to and from the port including that destined to many other depots in addition to those controlled by ACC.

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7. Protection for Depots 676, 677, and 696, themselves (as distinguished from highway protection) is provided by Italian army guards under Maj. Gabbiani of the 4th Bn. 523 Regt. Although their protection is helpful, it is believed to be far less satisfactory than would be the service of American or British guards.

8. The amount of theft is believed to be of such large quantities that immediate attention is essential.

He explained briefly his duties and stated that he felt that Italian Military Tribunals were not working as hard as the Civil Courts and he wanted Legal Linison Officers in Regions 1, 2, 6 and 7 to get the Military Courts going and if any doubt arose to make full use of the Legal Liaison Officer. A directive on his duties was in course of issue.

d. Follow up by telephone or personal call to assure that contact has been satisfactory to "liaisee" and to determine if there is anything we can do to facilitate business or promote better performance on our side.

3. "...subsequent business in connection with the same subject matter may be conducted directly between officers or headquarters, ACC and the regions, and the officers of the military formations concerned, provided the liaison officer is informed and agrees."

(Par. 2, Exec. Memorandum 26, 24 February 1944)

4. Executive Memorandum 26 is our basic directive, and its provisions, including those of the above-quoted paragraph, and particularly the underlined portions, must be faithfully and strictly observed, as must likewise the elementary liaison dogma that "the customer (liaisee) is (nearly) always right."

5. In general, correspondence should be discouraged, and more "leg-work" encouraged, as a means of initiating new business. Subsequent business should be handled by letter only if and as long as, that method is satisfactory to "liaisee". Frequent checks should be made to insure that such is the case.

Unreasonable multiplicity of contacts with, and applications to, the Port Commander, Port of Naples, by officers of his headquarters and the Negez, has made it necessary to designate one officer to deal with such matters, accordingly, all business of this headquarters and the Negez, according to Negez's authorities, as such, will be conducted exclusively through Major Hartmer. Port masters requiring the attention of the Commanding General, Finnianair Base Section or numbers of his staff other than the Port Commander, will be handled through Lt. Col. Bowman.

5. Lt. Col. Alfreo C. Bowman is announced as Chief, Mission Division, Civil Affairs Branch. He will be assisted at this headquarters by Major Charles P. Lurtrie (B).
