TO : Lt. Col. Bowman, Chief Liaison Officer.

1. Upon examination, the item listed as " 1 box Dynamite Nobel" in the list of sequestered articles submitted to Lt. Col. Nilmer turned out to be gun powder.

2. It is suggested that the matter of sequestration be dropped, as the Port Security Officers only did their duty well.

3. Capt. SCHARTZWALD of the Port Security Office, said that he had the basis for criminal action against the Judge and that he would press it if any difficulty was made. He likewise reported that the Judge was carrying several uncensored letters, presumably for personal delivery at his destination.

SUBJECT: Enforcement of Regional Order No. 13.

TO : Regional Commissioner, Region 3.

1. Colonel Chapman's report of 15 April concerning enforcement of Regional Order No. 13 (prostitution) has been forwarded to the Provost Marshal, Peninsular Base Section.
2. You ask for my comment. It follows.
3. The situation outlined by Colonel Chapman is not peculiar to "morals" offenses, nor is it confined to military courts, or to those in Naples Province. All of us who have ever served as prosecutors are familiar with the fact that policemen, like other human beings, require occasional admonition and education.
4. Insufficiency of information in police reports and inadequate investigation of cases, were subjects of a conference arranged by me about a month ago, attended on one side by Colonel Weber, Capt. (then Lt.) Correa, Lt. Banno and others. The police side was represented by Col. Hardie, PBS Provost Marshal, and his executive, Major Tolve, who control directly or indirectly most of the Military Police units to whom Lt. Col. Chapman's criticism applies. I believe that Lt. Col. Chapman himself also attended.
5. Most of those present have expressed to me since the conference their opinions that it had produced very satisfactory results and that there would be little further difficulty. The present complaint is, in fact, the first one along this line which has come to my attention since that time.
6. Colonel Hardie and his aides have been extremely cooperative, have expressed satisfaction concerning the

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results produced by our courts, and have repeatedly requested me to have our legal officers advise them if the Military Police failed at any time to perform satisfactorily the duties with which they are charged, which include the preparation of workable arrest reports, and proper investigation of cases. If further difficulty is experienced, the remedy, obviously, is not to write "hedge" memoranda to you, but to confer further with Colonel Hardie and Major Tolve with a view to correcting the deficiencies.

7. The facilities of the Liaison Division of this Headquarters are always available to officers of Region 3 in matters of this kind. However, Par. 3 of Executive Memorandum 26 provides that,

"after original contact has been effected through the appropriate liaison officer, subsequent business in connection with the same subject matter may be conducted directly between officers of Headquarters, A.C.C. and the Regions, and the officers of the military formations concerned, provided the liaison officer is informed and agrees."

8. The conditions precedent to further direct relations between your legal officers and the appropriate officers of Peninsular Base Section have been satisfied as to this subject matter and this division, being informed, agrees that further business affecting this subject matter may, if desired, be carried on directly between the parties concerned.

9. No prosecuting officer anywhere can carry on his job satisfactorily without regular current consultation with the police authorities who supply his normal day-to-day witnesses. I suggest that arrangements be made for regular meetings between Col. Weber, Lt. Col. Chapman and his staff on the one side, and on the other, the officers of Peninsular Base Section who are in a position to control and direct the efforts of military witnesses. I am confident that such regular conferences would produce very beneficial results and the elimination within a comparatively short time, of most of the deficiencies in the reporting of cases complained of by Lt. Col. Chapman.

SUBJECT: Enforcement of Regional Order No. 18
TO : Regional Commissioner Region 3

1. This morning I was called into a conference with judges and prosecutors of Allied Military Courts in Naples concerning the enforcement of Regional Order No. 18 and other laws relating to prostitutes and prostitution. The situation demands a report to you, if not to higher authority.

2. The situation is as follows: The police dragnet brings in women who are thrown into jail and eventually arrest reports find their way to the Prosecuting Office of the Allied Military Courts. These arrest reports in most cases fail to contain facts which would constitute any offense. They fail to contain the names of witnesses. They do not contain any summary of expected testimony. The judges reported to me this morning that evidence of commission of offenses is not produced in court. Cases are presented where the only statement is that the accused has a venereal disease, which is not a violation of any law or order. No medical evidence is presented to substitute even that statement. The judges are greatly concerned. They are fully aware of the general conditions which caused Order No. 18 to be issued and they are willing to do their part in enforcement but they have reached the point, and rightly so, where they must release accused against whom no legal charge is made and against whom no satisfactory evidence is produced which would justify conviction. The judges report to me that they are reluctant to take such action because they fear a storm of vitriolic criticism. They feel that they are expected to railroad accused to prison - proof or no proof.

3. I have reported to you before that investigation of criticisms of courts has disclosed in most cases a failure of the police to do their full job. I am attaching herewith for your information two arrest reports which I took from the Prosecuting Office this morning. You will notice that one shows the arrest made March 8 and the other arrest made March 9 and that both reports did not reach the Prosecuting Office until 15 April. You will also notice the complete lack of information. One is signed "Civil Police Prattamaggiore".

4. At the conference preceding the issuance of Order No. 18, it was discussed definitely and thoroughly that women afflicted with venereal disease were not subject to arrest and jailing but should be placed in places for treatment. This is being ignored by the Police in many cases. In those cases in which women have been sent for treatment, I am informed that they are being released in ten days. However, in no case sent to AMG courts has there been either a medical certificate or other medical evidence, to indicate either that the women even had venereal disease, or had been treated for such.

5. The present method of attack on the problem of prostitution appears to be on the way to a definite breakdown because of the absence of adequate police cooperation in the preparation of cases, because of the failure to provide adequate places of treatment of diseased women, and because of the inadequacy of prison and jail accommodation for the number of women arrested. However, and this is one of the reasons for this report, I desire to register now the fact that the breakdown will be laid at the doorstep of the Allied Military Courts and to register my protest and resentment against unjust criticism.

SUBJECT: Prostitution - Venereal Disease.

TO : P.M., Metropolitan Area, P.B.S.
P.M., P.B.S. (thru Liaison Officer SOC)

P.M., No 3 District (thru Provincial Liaison Officer).

1. It is essential that Allied Military Government, in cooperation with other military formations, take all possible steps to prevent the spread of venereal disease amongst Allied troops. While the matter is basically one of discipline in the units and formations themselves, the authorities who administer the law to the civil population have a great responsibility in ensuring that everything is done to reduce prostitution and the evils resulting therefrom.

2. To rigorously and effectively administer the law, it is essential that Military Police know what is an offence and what is not, and this Headquarters would ask that (if not already done) the contents of the attached Regional Order and Administration Instruction No 13 be brought to their attention.

3. Carabinieri and Agenti di Pubblica Sicurezza have been instructed to continue to enforce the law in co-operation with the Military Police.

4. The Executive Commissioner, Allied Control Commission, feels that provided a concerted drive is made by the Allied Military and Italian Police, and provided the Allied Courts deal with cases severely and rapidly, and all concerned with law enforcement realize the menace to the Allied forces which the spread of venereal disease is now causing, much can be done to reduce the disease and assist the Allied troops.

I, Lieutenant Colonel Charles Poletti, Regional Commissioner, Region 3, Allied Control Commission, by virtue of power conferred in me

ORDER

Article I.
Restrictions on Prostitution.

Section 1. It is unlawful for any female person to engage in, or practice, prostitution, in any place other than in a place of prostitution declared as such place under the provisions of Italian law.

Section 2. It is unlawful for any operator, or any occupant, of a place of prostitution whether declared as such or not, to permit any soldier other than a soldier engaged in the performance of official duty, to enter, or to remain in, or to have licentious connection with any female person in such place of prostitution.

Section 3. It is unlawful for any female person who is afflicted with any venereal disease, to have licentious connection with any soldier.

Section 4. It is unlawful for any person, in any manner, to permit, solicit or invite any soldier to have licentious connection with any female person, or invite, or guide, or offer to guide, any soldier to any place of prostitution, whether declared as a place of prostitution or not.

Article II.

Italian Law.

This Order does not revoke, amend or in anywise modify any provision of Italian law relating to prostitution.

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Section 1. It is unlawful for any female person to engage in, or practice, prostitution, in any place other than in a place of prostitution declared as such place under the provisions of Italian law.

Section 2. It is unlawful for any operator, or any occupant, of a place of prostitution whether declared as such or not, to permit any soldier other than a soldier engaged in the performance of official duty, to enter, or to remain in, or to have licentious connection with any female person in such place of prostitution.

Section 3. It is unlawful for any female person who is afflicted with any venereal disease, to have licentious connection with any soldier.

Section 4. It is unlawful for any person, in any manner, to permit, solicit or invite any soldier to have licentious connection with any female person, or invite, or guide, or offer to guide, any soldier to any place of prostitution, whether declared as a place of prostitution or not.

Article II.

Italian Law.

This Order does not revoke, amend or in anywise modify any provision of Italian law relating to prostitution.

Article III.

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Jurisdiction of Courts.

Any person charged with any violation of this Order may be tried either by an Allied Military Court or by the Regi nel Legal Officer, or by an officer empowered by him so to do, and every Pretore shall have competence and jurisdiction to hear and determine, in accordance with Italian criminal procedure, all cases in which a violation of this Order is charged and which have been referred, by such Regional Legal Officer or officer empowered by him, to be tried by any such Pretore. In any ---- trial by a Pretore in which the accused is condemned the penalty shall be such as is provided in Article V hereof.

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Article IV. Definition.

The word "soldier" for the purposes of this Order, shall mean any member of the armed forces or any merchant seaman of any of the United States.

Article V. Penalties.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Order, shall, upon conviction, be punished by imprisonment for not to exceed three (3) months for the first conviction and by imprisonment for not to exceed six (6) months for each subsequent conviction.

Article VI. Extent of Order and Effective Date.

This Order shall extend only to the provinces of Naples, Avellino and Benevento, and shall be in effect from and after the 15th day of March.

SUBJECT: Smallpox

TO : Regional Commissioner

1. Cases Notified.

As far as can be ascertained the total number of verified cases of Smallpox hitherto notified is seventeen. This figure must be regarded as conservative because notification is not rigidly observed and number of suspected cases have gone into hiding to escape hospitalization.

2. Character of Disease.

The disease as manifested so far is of light form.

3. Location.

The majority of the cases notified occurred in the Toledo Area (West of the Via Roma).

4. Preventive Measures.

- a) The Communal authorities have been supplied with an adequate quantity of fresh calf lymph for vaccination in all the offices of the Serione Municipali.
- b) In addition any form of domiciliary vaccination has been instituted and it is hoped that this will be augmented by trained squads from the Typhus Control Service.
- c) The Communes have been advised to publish a press notice warning the public of the danger and inviting all those not vaccinated for three years to seek re-vaccination at the Serione Municipali.
- d) ACC It. have been requested to hold all available stocks of vaccine in Medical Stores for use in this area and to stop up demands to minimum 250,000 doses in case mass vaccination should be required.
- e) The Commune have been advised to insist on vaccination certificates for all children attending schools.

- h) All Military Services have been informed.

SUBJECT: Tyres and Tubes for Italian Vehicles.

TO : The Executive Commissioner.

This matter was passed to Major Enoch Brown. His reply is attached hereto. The following further facts were however elicited from Major Brown:

1. That the instruction precluding the issue of tyres actually exists.

SUBJECT : Class "B" tentage for use as classrooms,
Naples Schools.

TO : LIAISON OFFICER, Allied Control Commission

1. This office has in mind the use of Class "B" tentage on an experimental basis as classrooms to supplement the existing school building facilities. In order to be of use for this purpose, tents would need to equal in space a room with 400 to 600 sq. feet of floor space. Poles, tents pins, etc. would of course be necessary. We contemplate the use of two or three tents, if available to see if the plan is feasible on a larger scale.
2. Reports from the Provveditore agli Studi (Superintendent of Schools) show that 122 school buildings in Naples Province are occupied by Allied Military Units. In addition a large amount of damage has been done by bombing.
3. Classes are operating in many different kinds of improvised situations, even in the houses of some of the teachers. By alternating classes by half days and by days of the week, children are given only from 4 to 8 hours of educational opportunity per week.
4. Information as to the availability, size of tents, and quantity that might be secured for the purpose mentioned in paragraph 1 is desired by this office.

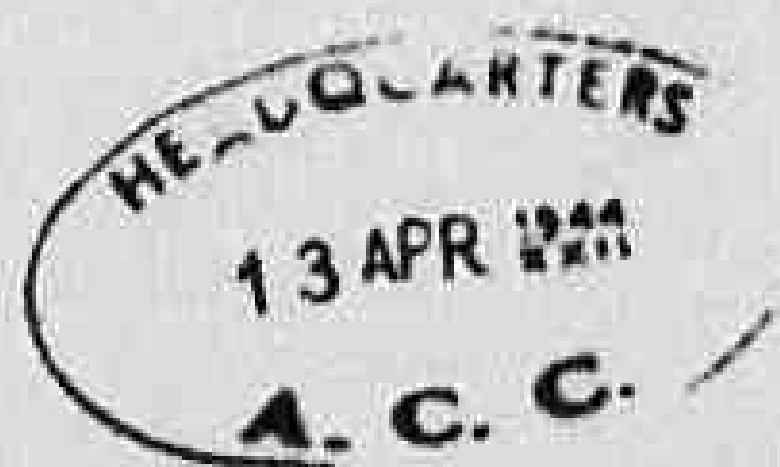

1. I should be glad if you would raise with the PAS the question of finding alternative accommodation for the 713rd Railway Operating Battalion which at present occupies half of the Post Office Sorting Office at the Stazione Ferrovia.

2. I am sorry to have to disturb the unit concerned but this request is made necessary by the reestablishment of civilian inland and foreign postal services which came into effect on the 20th March and which makes essential the restoration of the Sorting Office to its primary purpose.

3. The increased postal traffic which will require to be dealt with by the Italian Post Office at Naples as the service develops will be altogether beyond the capacity of the unsatisfactory temporary premises in the Via Indipendenza where the Sorting and despatching work is at present performed.

4. Telecommunications and Posts Sub-Commission state that a registered letter system will shortly be approved while the introduction of parcel post service is contemplated. Moreover, it is proposed by ARHQ that the incoming foreign mail work for the whole of liberated Italy shall be dealt with at Naples.

5. It is also very desirable that the Allied Censor Control Staff, at present housed in Via d'Avallio, should now be accommodated in the Sorting Office building in order to avoid the loss of time and wastage of transport which is incurred under the present arrangement.

6. The other portion of the Stazione Ferrovia Sorting Office is occupied by the British Army Base Post Office which is using the building for the purpose for which it was designed, and, therefore, has a prior claim to be left in possession.

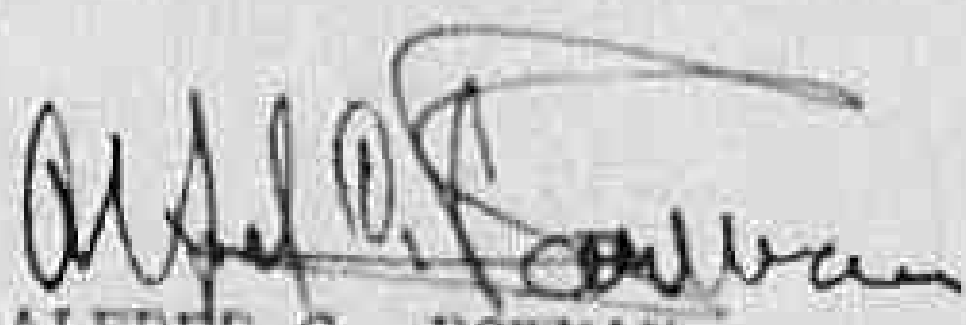

Minimum requests for operation of only the seismographic apparatus of the Vesuvian Observatory.

Under present conditions, the Observatory cannot carry on any work. We would, therefore, have a void during a most critical period in the Vesuvian eruptive activity, that is in a period near a certain violent eruption, ending the eruptive period began in July 1913. To follow the events of the Colcano during that phase, incorporates the very highest interest not only from a scientific point of view (never up to now has it been possible to follow with continuity the life of the volcano either through direct observation or through registration on the various apparatus in operation at the Observatory, or through observation of various characteristics suggested by circumstances and events), but also from a practical point of view, in relation therefore to the possibility of prediction of the paroxysm phases. Even to limit observations to seismology, makes attendance in the Observatory indispensable, the most continuous possible, of one of the scientific personnel who obviously cannot stay in the same room where the seismographical instruments are located, while there can never be a profitable recording without effective supervision. It is therefore requested that for operation of only the seismographic apparatus, the Observatory be authorized at least another room which for instance might be the adjoining one to the one where the seismographic apparatus is set up, and left at the disposal of the Observatory. The selection of this room would also present the advantage of sun observations and therefore other important observations could be carried on, among which those already in progress on absorption of solar radiation by vesuvian fumes. Furthermore, it is vital that, always for the operation of the seismographic functions (and for the carrying on of any activity) and specifically for clock control (knowledge of the exact time is indeed a basic element for analysis of seismograms), the requisitioned radio apparatus be returned to the Observatory, or at least that for short and medium wave (the main transmissions are carried on short wave), as, incidentally, I was assured by the officer who carried out the requisition.

SUBJECT: Letter from Parochial Church of Cardito.

TO : Captain John W. Lummus.

1. A visit to Cardito, followed by an interview with Commandant de Fournel, in charge of the French troops in Cardito, produced negative results.

2. The following comments are offered:

a. Commandant de Fournel, maintains that he is as fervent a Catholic as the Parish Priest of Cardito, that the Tricolour of France has never been considered sacrilegious, and that it must stay where it is.

b. The entry and exit of Italian worshippers to the Church is in no way affected by the guard post referred to.

c. Commandant de Fournel flatly refutes the allegation that "threats and blows" have been administered. Very severe disciplinary action would be taken should any such incidents occur.

d. The references made to the Atlantic Charter appear slightly out of place when studied in relation to the trivial nature of the complaints.

e. It is suggested that the parish Priest of Cardito be orally advised:

(1) That it has not been found possible to remedy the state of affairs to which he takes exception;

(2) That the matter can only be remedied by a speedy termination of the war; and

(3) That the cooperation of the Church in refraining from complaints of a comparatively trivial nature, would contribute materially to this end.

TO : Commanding General,
Peninsular Base Section.

1. The Allied Financial Agency of the Allied Control Commission has stored several billion lire in AM currency in vaults in the Royal Palace, Naples. No other storage space is available.
2. From this and other AFA currency stockpiles, funds are made available to finance officers and paymasters of the Allied forces in Italy for the pay of officers and men. The protection of such stockpiles from fire, theft, and riots is vital.
3. We have just received a visit from a Finance Mission sent over from Washington. The members of the mission were critical of the manner in which the currency stores were guarded. Substantial additional amounts of currency are enroute and most of this money will be stored in the Royal Palace, Naples.
4. The manager of the AFA branch in Naples has been instructed to strengthen the security of the Palace vaults as follows:

" You are instructed to secure guards for your "Palace" storage vault in sufficient number to ensure that the vault will be securely guarded at all times. A guard must be maintained on both front and rear of these vaults at all hours of the day and night in sufficient number, and with communication to large troop units by phone, signal, or radio, so that a mob, a gang or a riot would not endanger the large amounts of currency stored there.

The rear barred windows should be bricked up to prevent the ingress of incendiary matter, and fireproof doors with double lock protection should be installed on the front side. "
5. I should appreciate it if you would give instructions to the appropriate sections under your command that the requests of AFA for additional guards and the indicated construction work be given prompt attention.

3. The work authorized has not been started. It would be highly desirable to complete the work at an early date in order to provide wire paths for state telegraph service for civilian purposes to connect with networks already working in other portions of southern Italy.
4. Work is in progress to provide some limited wire paths between Salerno and Naples for which the cables referred to will be used for entrance to Naples state Telegraph equipment.
5. After the cables are repaired, some portions or even all of them, may be used for military purposes.
6. The Circolo Constructions Co. who do this type of work for the State Telegraph system have the needed material at hand but not the specialist needed for cable splicing.
7. A cable splicer specialist is available in Caserta but would require transport to and from Caserta - Naples daily, or rations for sustenance while working in Naples.
8. Will you please request that P.B.S. signals wire Officer arrange for provision of army rations for one specialist employee (cable splicer) on basis of Military desirability of completing the cable repairs for future possible Military use of the cables.

9. Also please inform the P.B.S. Signals Wire Officer that Region III Telecommunications Officer - Capt. Bridgeman had the said cables checked out and is informed, that the two cables are not in use in any portion of the route and that each cable contains 50 pairs, unquadded and unloaded.

10. In order to coordinate with other parts of telegraph service restoral, early action will be appreciated.

SUBJECT: Division of Responsibility - Education.

TO : Deputy Executive Commissioner.

1. The attached proposed policy directive is of interest to this division as a potential aid in controlling contacts between the Education Sub-Commission, Education officers of Region III, P.B.S., and other commands with whom we maintain liaison. Attention is particularly directed to Item 3 of the list of Responsibilities of Regional Education Officers.

2. There has been a pronounced inclination on the part of certain officers of the Education Sub-Commission to insist that all matters of whatever nature affecting the universities should be reserved to the sub-commission. This has resulted in duplication of effort and contacts which it has been impossible to explain in any logical fashion to our "lisisees".

3. This division has resisted the cited tendency as being contrary to the general rule relating to allocation of functions between levels, but a definitive statement such as that contained in the proposed directive would strengthen our position materially.

4. The director of the sub-commission informs us that the original copy of the proposed directive has been in the hands of the Executive Commissioner for some time.

5. Can you assist in expediting final disposition?

DIVISION OF RESPONSIBILITY

Education Subcommission and Regional Education Officers

The following division of responsibility between the Education Sub-Commission ACC, AMG and Regional Education Officers, applies to all regions while they are under Allied Military Government. It also indicates the general lines of responsibility for advice and assistance to be given to Italian officials in territory under the Italian Government and ACC.

Responsibilities of the Education Sub-Commission will include the following:

1. Establishment of general policies, applicable to more than one region, in regard to:
 - a. Conditions of appointment or approval of all school personnel.
 - b. Conditions under which schools and universities may be opened or closed.
 - c. Matters of school programs, text books, and organization.
2. Any alterations in the existing types of schools.
3. Production, approval or disapproval of all text book or parts thereof.
4. Appointment and approval, in all universities and institutions of university rank, of:
 - a. Rectors and heads;
 - b. Presidents of Faculties;
 - c. Titular professors, all members of the senatus academicus, and personnel of equivalent rank.
5. Establishment and abolition of chairs in universities and other institutions of similar rank.

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 - a. Rectors and heads;
 - b. Presidi of Faculties;
 - c. Titular professors, all members of the senatus academicus, and personnel of equivalent rank.
5. Establishment and abolition of chairs in universities and other institutions of similar rank.

Responsibilities of Regional Education Officers will include the following:

1. Approval and appointment of all Provveditori, inspectors, directors, teachers and other personnel for schools below university rank, subject only to the policies as to conditions affecting appointment.
2. Approval and appointment of all personnel for universities and institutions of University rank, except:
 - a. Rectors or heads of such institutions;
 - b. Presidi of Faculties;

2. Titular, Professors, members of the senatus academicus and persons of corresponding rank subject only to Hq. policies as to conditions affecting such appointments.
3. All local provincial or regional administrative matters connected with universities, and other higher institutions, elementary and secondary schools, kindergartens, and out-of-school youth and adult education programs, and out-general framework of headquarters policies.
4. All arrangements for covering "ordinary" expenses of educational institutions, heretofore paid on a provincial level.
5. All arrangements for covering "extraordinary" expenses for repair of bombed or damaged buildings, etc. subject to approval of this plan by the CPC.
6. The opening of state and church schools, under general policies of Hq.
7. The opening of establishments of new state or church schools subject only to conformity with Hq. policies.
8. Determination of dates of opening and closing schools, (Hq to be kept informed)
9. Same for opening and closing of universities (Names to be added).
