9. REEMPLOYMENT OF MAN POWER.

The following extracts from 314 Sub Area Lette No 450/a dated 16 Jun 45 are published for information:-

At the present time personnel are eligible for service in the Par East who:-

1. are in Age/Service groups 27 and later or being in Age/Service groups 1/26 have been accepted for deferment of release for 1 or 2 years or until General Rehabilitation.
2. Have not more than 2 years qualifying PITCHON Service at the time of embarkation in this theatre.
3. Personnel who are ineligible for service in the Par East are volunteers provided they are willing to undertake to serve in the Par East for a period of 18 months. This may be done either by accepting release or postponing their PITCHON rights.
4. MILAP is now restricted to personnel in Age/Service groups 18 and later and those who have agreed to defer their release.
5. Where units to be dispatched to UK cannot be completed with eligibles and volunteers, they will be made up with personnel due for PITCHON and personnel of Age/Service groups 23 and later who have more than 4 yrs qualifying PITCHON Service.
6. Personnel who return to UK on PITCHON and do not get posted to NW Europe receive only 4 weeks leave, the additional 2 weeks mentioned being substitution leave.

The GOC stated that if this programme was adhered to the accommodation programme as outlined by Commander 19 ACZE would be adequate.

6. The GOC pointed out that it was essential that the 10 Ind Div RE personnel should remain until at least 22 May 45. He thought that this had been accepted. The majority of the work thereafter would be carried out by German Engineers.

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7. It was agreed that all personnel classed under the general heading of Recalcitrants (i.e. SS troops and men required for information by OSI) would be evacuated as soon as possible by rail to 'U' PW Camp at Dala, a corresponding number being first transferred from 'U' PW Camp to the concentration area.

8. Documentation of these recalcitrant personnel would be carried out either before despatch or at 'U' PW Camp and further directions thereon will be issued to 24 Army Tank Bde as soon as possible.

9. DA & GCM stated that there were RE personnel of 10 Ld Div accommodated in a hotel at OBERMAYR which are expected to move in about a week. It was agreed that if possible they should remain there as long as they were working in the area.

10. Commander 24 Army Tank Bde gave the proposed location of the German HQ as being the Ochsengasse MILITARY. He asked that he be assured that the enemy troops should bring with them equipment such as signal equipment and the GOC stated that ALM had instructed 5 Army to ensure that the enemy troops were moved to the concentration area with all belongings and equipment other than arms.

11. Commander 24 Army Tank Bde asked for instructions as to what items both of public and private equipment and money were to be removed from the enemy personnel and at what stage this was to be done. The GOC said a ruling on this would be given as soon as possible but that it was the Allied policy that the would money which the Germans held should not be allowed into circulation. 24 Army Tank Bde would also be notified as soon as possible as to the position with regard to a Protecting Power.

12. The GOC suggested that every endeavour should be made to provide shade suitable material.

15. JMG stated that he would arrange for the necessary Carabinieri to be available for this purpose and that he was providing 50 CME personnel and 20 Traffic Police for the concentration area. Route 16 where it ran through the area had been closed with effect from to-day.

16. PO WRLI asked that as many empty premises as possible in GESPRA should be requisitioned to accommodate persons evicted from the concentration area. DA & JMG replied that he would endeavour to arrange through 247 Area for the requisition of as many small houses as possible but that it was still necessary to retain all larger buildings for possible military requirements.

17. HQ GOC requested that information as to the number of animals to accompany the evacuated forces should be given as soon as possible so that arrangements could be made for watering freight.

18. HQ 1 stated that the GSI work would commence as soon as nominal rolls either from the documentation teams or as produced by the German HQ were available. These would then be checked with lists of known wanted persons. He also reported that two travellers would be available for travelling off the coast to keep all fishing boats away.

19. DEMB reported that medical rep would be attached to the increment as from 17 May 45 and that additional German MAs would be required particularly for the SS troops. It was agreed that endeavours should be made to get MAs from PW Camps at AMOCHA and also to press 5 Army to produce additional German MAs. Commander 24 Army Tank Bde confirmed that he would provide necessary guards at SS PWs as soon as any German sick were accommodated there.

20. Major Roberts, DAGMG, who had just arrived by air from HQ 5 Army, confirmed that the approximate number due to arrive on 17 May 45 was 5,000. All surrendered enemy forces were being sorted in a large area near MDEWA. He stated that the Corps HQ and German Sappers would not now arrive on 17 May 45 but that it was hoped to send them down on 18 May 45 if they could be sorted and collected in time.

SUBJECT: Committees of National Liberation.

TO : All Officers, Emilia, Liguria, Lombardia,
Piemonte and Veneto Regions.
SAC's 5 and 8 Army.
HQ IV Corps

- 1 This directive lays down the policy which will govern the actions of all Officers of Allied Military Government in their relations with the Committees of National Liberation (CLN - "Comitato di Liberazione Nazionale") in Northern Italy.
- 2 CLNs have been organized on a communal, provincial and regional basis throughout German Occupied Territory. Their activities are co-ordinated by an over-all CLN for the whole of the area, known as the CLNAI - ("Comitato di Liberazione Nazionale dell'Alta Italia"). Intelligence reports from the North show that the various Committees of National Liberation have learned a good deal about the art of government in the long struggle against the Fascist, and the Germans. In many districts, "shadow" Governments have been set up, and the various portfolios have been distributed amongst the leaders of the different parties. On the whole it seems that for the time being there is a remarkable degree of unity of purpose in the Committees, and party differences have been sunk in the common desire to chase the Germans from Italy and to punish their fascist collaborators. These Committees have been assisted in their military operations by the Allied authorities and the giving of such assistance necessarily implies a degree of recognition of their position.

- 3 Relations with AMG. - The Supreme Allied Commander has made his own military arrangements with the CLNAI. He has not given political recognition to the CLNs, but under these military arrangements, the CLNs will endeavour to maintain law and order and continue to safeguard economic resources until AMG is established. Thereupon CLNAI has agreed that the CLNs will recognize AMG and hand over to it all authority previously assumed. Likewise all components of the General Command of the Volunteers of Liberty (GVL) will come under the direct command of the C-in-C, 15th Army Group, and will obey any order issued by him (or by AMG on his behalf) including orders to disband and surrender their arms when required to do so. Upon the establishment of AMG the ECAC first, and later the EC, is supreme and possesses all powers of government, and the CLN has no official standing in the conduct of affairs.

But there are other considerations which should be borne in mind in implementing the policy indicated in the above arrangements. It is in the interest of the Allies that there should be a stable Government in Italy and the Allied policy is to support such a Government.

It is in the interest of the Allies that there should be a stable Government in Italy and the Allied policy is to strengthen the legitimate Italian Government in Italy and may possibly. The Italian Government in Rome may not have the entire confidence of the CLNs in the North and, at best, their influence there may be subject to fluctuation. This may be based on several factors. There is the feeling that the North has contributed more generously to the defeat of the Germans than the South, and has suffered far more heavily for Italy. There is criticism of the slow progress made by the Allied Government in the reconstruction of the economy and above all in the pressing economic problems of food supply and inflation, well aware of this antipathy and has an agreement which goes further than that of the Supreme Allied Commander in recognising the CLNAI as its representative in the struggle in the North. The Government has succeeded in exacting a certain measure of recognition from the CLNs in the North, but the possibility cannot be overlooked that they, or their constituent political parties, may not abide by this agreement if circumstances seem favourable for a political upheaval. It is hoped that after liberation the Rome Government will be able to absorb additional members from the North and thereby become more representative.

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5 Relations with the Italian Government. The recognition of the CILs as the representatives of the Government in the struggle against the enemy does not affect the Allies, who are not parties to the arrangement. Moreover, the Italian Government has no authority of any kind in Military Government Territory. Its arrangements with the CILs are not operative in Military Government Territory and do not affect the relations between AMI and the CIL.

6 The problem facing AMI, therefore, is to reconcile the military arrangements of the Supreme Allied Commander with the aspirations of the political leaders of the CILs to self-government, at the same time supporting the authority of the Italian Government in Rome in order that it may be able to administer the Northern Territories once AMI is withdrawn. The solution of this problem may well be found to lie in the administration of a very early date of CILs' accession into the civil administration. If Allied Officers arrive in the North and bluntly inform the CILs that their task is accomplished and that they may now disperse and if, after that, Sindaco and other administrative officials are appointed without the view of CILs being considered, the antagonism will be great and may well be disastrous. The danger of setting up local administrations composed of Italians who are not acceptable to the Patriot organizations cannot be over emphasized. AMI officers are not bound to accept the first suggestions of the CILs, who can always be instructed to submit alternative plans. If, however, this principle is followed out, many of the problems of maintaining law and order will never arise. It will be easier to exploit the local resources of the country in the work of reconstruction and in the work of feeding the population. It will be easier to bring together the former Patriot organizations and the Italian Government, and it will be easier to prepare the ground against the time when the Government in Rome can take over the administration.

7 While the foregoing paragraph lays down a principle which is calculated to reconcile the Military arrangements of the Supreme Allied Commander with the aspirations of the CILs, there are special considerations in regard to the offices of Prefect and Questore.

Prefects, as the official representatives of the Government, are normally appointed by the Government from career officials. Even in the present situation this practice has generally been followed. Similarly the Questore have normally been appointed from Public Safety personnel by the Central Government. Other appointments, such as the Sindaco, etc., are normally local choice.

For obvious reasons the Italian Government wishes to continue the customary practice in regard to Prefects and Questore, and have mind it again very recently. It is the policy of the Allied Commission to support the Government and it would be unwise to depart, entirely, from the normal practice. The Italian Government has, therefore, been advised that any specific nominee whom they put forward for appointment to the post of Prefect or Questore by AMI will receive consideration. At the same time it has been pointed out that it would be quite useless to expect any nominee who is not acceptable in the locality.

Since AMI will not, by this arrangement, lose any of the powers delegated to them. It is their duty, however, in implementing the policy of this Commission, to use their best efforts to obtain local acceptance for the Government nominee, endeavouring to reconcile the views of the CILs with those of the Italian Government. This must be the principle although the practice will always depend finally on the judgment of the GAC or SC.

At the same time it has been pointed out that it would be quite undesirable to appoint any nominee who in not acceptable in the locality.

8 The action is, therefore, as follows: On arrival in a Province it seems almost certain that a Prefect and Quarters appointed by CIA will be found in office. This will be fully in accord with the agreement between the Supreme Allied Commander and CIA. These appointments should not be considered forthwith but the individuals should be normally allowed to remain in office as acting Prefect and acting Quarters respectively solely for the purpose of carrying on routine business pending the final appointment by AG. Nominations should then be invited from the CIA, to whom it will be explained that AGs alone have the right to make the appointment from nominees approved by the Italian Government, CIA and other sources. Nominations may also be sought from other sources, e.g. the local Archdiocese. The names of Government candidates for these two posts will be furnished by this Headquarters as soon as they are available, and local officials should then be sought as to the possible acceptance of the Government's nominees. The appointment should not be hurried and it is not better to allow a reasonable period, say 10-14 days, to elapse so that full consideration can be given to the matter before a final decision is made. In appointing a Quarters, the preference is to be attached to the professional qualifications of the

in those. Purely political appointments to this important office should be avoided. The responsible SAC or EC will inform this HQ of the following details:

- a) Name of Prefect and Quarters found in office
 - b) Name of Prefect and Quarters finally appointed.
- Once again it is stressed that these special circumstances apply only to the Prefect and Quarters. The Italian Government fully associates with the officials are normally local choices and AMG officers will appoint them with due regard to CIG advice.

9 The CIG must be treated with the courtesy due to their political position and their past labors. They should be received regularly by the EC and given the opportunity of expressing their views. They are at liberty to make representations to the EC or the Prefect, both of whom should seek the advice and views of the CIG whenever they think it of use. It is however entirely a matter for the EC to consider whether, in any particular case, the advice of the CIG is to be followed or rejected. It would of course be in keeping with this directive to accept such advice except where it is in conflict with the policy of AMG.

10 It should be noted that, when a member of a CIG is appointed to an administrative position, it is better that he should resign from the CIG. There may be objections to this in individual cases and it is left to the discretion of the EC concerned. It is most desirable, however, that holders of administrative positions should be entirely divorced from the politics of the CIG.

11 It must be made plain to the Prefect and to other officials that they are the servants of AMG and must take no orders from the CIG. On the other hand, the EC must give him full support to the Prefect and the official administrators. If he no longer has confidence in him or officials, the EC should take steps to remove them.
