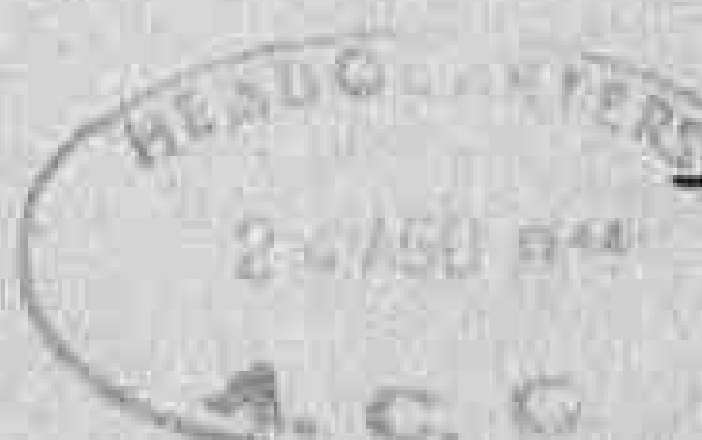
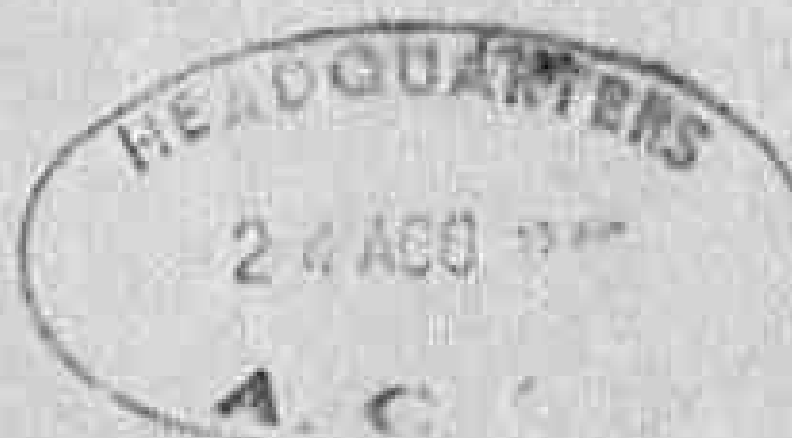

SUBJECT: Army News Service and Camp Newspaper Service.

TO : See Distribution.

1. Maximum intended use is not being made of the facilities of Army News Service and Camp Newspaper Service.

2. On reverse side is appendix A - outline of a letter to New York Branch, War Relocation Service Division, which may be followed in requesting the various services available.

3. Army News Service-

a. Ten or fifteen thousand words of background features and non-timely home front news is admitted daily and includes material written especially for radio, loudspeaker systems, newspapers and mimeographed unit publications and bulletins.

4. Camp Newspaper Service-

a. This service is to maintain the smaller publications which in many areas are the keystone of local information programs. It acts as a central advisory agency which teaches inexperienced Army editors how to go about putting out a newspaper quickly and efficiently and also provides such papers with feature material supplementing local news. Camp Newspaper Service material may be used in official post and unit papers. Publications using CNS must carry a statement in the author's, as follows: "(name of paper) receives Camp Newspaper Service material. Reproductions of credited matter prohibited without permission of CNS, 305 E. 42nd St., N. Y. C., 17, N. Y." Each item should bear individual credit, "CNS". CNS also offers advice and constructive criticism to editors upon request. The specific services available are:

(1) Clip Sheet. This is sent weekly to official Army Publications and other service papers. Data of illustrations are supplied letterpress papers free on request. Requests must be identified by the unit number in cutlines. Offset editors may clip illustrations and paste into a master copy. Pre-cut insert stencils are supplied mimeograph paper editors free on request. Requests must be identified by stencil number in cutlines. Included in the Clip Sheet are popular syndicate and comic strips.... Blondie, Joe & Louie, Terry and the Pirates, etc; also sport panels, "Cheerleader", and cartoons.(2) C. I. C. copy. This is a small weekly news and instructional magazine to give Army editors useful aids on publishing, and to assist in every way possible in the production of worthwhile unit publications.

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(3) Army Editor's Manual. This is a 67-page booklet to acquaint editors and supervising officers of Army papers with the basic rules and mechanics of editing and publishing.

5. The Morale Services Section, 200 Via Roma, Naples, has samples of all materials referred to above.

SUBJECT: Hydropumps taken from the Right Agnena.

We inform you that Units of 5 Army Engineers have taken away a self propeller pump from the Factory of Destra Agnena and a transformer of S. Sossio plant.

From information to hand it seems that said machinery should be used at Punta Fiume (near the Garigliano) to dry the back marshes, which have been filled up owing to the destruction of the water sucking pump at Punta Fiume.

We request that you do everything possible on our behalf in order to retrieve this machinery after they have served their use, as the small pump was destined to be placed at Case Diana to improve the conditions of that zone.

Reference your enquiry of the a/m concerning the above quoted subject.

The Headquarters Medical Officer had a sample of the bathing water taken from the Rest House Beach. This was from the area where British O.R.s bathe, and American E.M.s bathe, they are only about 100 yards apart.

This sample was sent to the Specialist on such matters at the P.B.S. with the following results: -

BRITISH: Not potable bacteriologically
Test reveals evidence of faecal contamination.

AMERICAN: Potable bacteriologically
Gas formation not due to coli-aerogenes group.

It will be noted that both are unsuitable for bathing.

At the present moment and obviously with the authority of the P.B.S. an elaborate Bathing Pier is being build in the same area. On making enquires from the N.C.O. in charge of this work, it is learned that this pier is to be used by General Wilson and other Generals of the American Air Corps, including the ground staff.

As this rather disputes the fact that the water is unfit for bathing, it would be appreciated if this matter was clarified.

1. I attached a report on a camp site which may be of interest to the American Army authorities, as it states that a camp occupied by American troops is known to be a malarial area.
2. You will note that the owner does not complain of the damage done to his crops but that he points out that this is useless damage, as owing to the malarial danger the troops will have to be moved in the very near future.
3. One of my Officers went out to see the site on Friday 19th, and his report is also attached.
4. I have consulted our Malarial Control Department and they confirm that the area concerned is considered to be malarial.

SUBJECT: Report on Situation re Chinese Farm, Pozzuoli area (Meridians of Longitude-1° N, Latitude-5° E) Italy 1/250,000 sheet 35

TO : Chief of Section, Agricultural Section, Hq. Reg. III, A.C.C.

Upon your specific orders, given me 19th May 1944, the investigation was conducted by me on the above subject resulting in what follows:

The property involved can be rightfully called Naples' City' backyard garden. A natural bowl, as shown below by sketch:

Area below sea level, formed into a natural valley, commonly referred to in southwestern U.S. as a "box canyon".

The islet was chosen by a PMS reconnaissance officer to locate a Rehabilitation Center where troops of the American Armies in Italy that need correction and instillation of sense of discipline are to be concentrated and drilled intensely, etc. At present, only American colored troops, with instructors and Engineers (who are constructing the camp) are to be found in the area, plus white American officer and NCO personnel.

Further considerations given the site by the reconnaissance officer are:

1. The fact that the site being a natural enclosed camp (it is almost impossible to scale the surrounding hills) would suit the purpose.
2. That only one (1) road leads in and out to the camp, traffic easily controlled.

Considerations not taken into view by the reconnaissance officer (as no consultation seems to have been sought from Agricultural Section, Hq. Region III, A.C.C.

1. That this particular area is one of the worst malaria infested districts in this section of Naples province (past records and statistical data prove that 3 out of 5 inhabitants of the area are carriers and have had malaria before). That past records show that a count and test of the female anopholeon population in that area show and prove that at least 2 to 3 out of 5 of this mosquito species are carriers; and that the scarcity and almost unavailability of anti-malarial prophylaxial medicines, i.e. quinine, atabrine, plasmochin; to the civilian

population as a whole with the risk of infection to twice from normal; that our American troops are not at all habilitated to this tropical insect - borne disease.

2. That this valley is almost airtight and resembles closely, matted jungle, a climate naturally, highly humid and damp, unhealthy so to speak, and when the broiling Italian sun begins to beat down in earnest, even the inhabitants of the valley floor itself move themselves and livestock (anything that breathes oxygen) to the highest pinnacles of the surrounding hillsides, the heat being humanly unbearable.

3. That due to these conditions it is a wonderful garden spot, intensely cultivated (not one yard of space isn't under cultivation) producing tons of fresh fruits and vegetables which are supplied to Allied Armies and Navies as well as Naples civil population, saving the immense tonnage of importation from U.S or U.K. and containing twice the beneficial content of vitamins and iron.

4. That a ascent 900 to 1000 yards away from this area is located an uncultivated NATURAL composite, clean airy, with abundance of flat ground (for drilling, etc.) and shade trees. (That the undersigned, is an Infantry officer and knows how to evaluate and pick camp sites) and served with the U.S. Army in Central and South America.

The undersigned is first to recognize essential war necessity and if higher policy and direction so dictates, the present camp site remains, so, but my first duty is to my country and its Army, and in this sense this report is submitted.

SUBJECT: Divulging Court Martial Sentences.

TO : Commanding General, Peninsular Base Section.
(Attn: Secretary, General Staff)

1. The Chief Legal Officer, Allied Control Commission, feels very strongly that our position in insisting that the Italians impose adequate sentences on civilians involved in Black Market and other criminal cases, would be greatly strengthened if we might demonstrate by specific instances that when our own military personnel are convicted of offenses against the Italian people, they are also severely punished.

2. This general subject-matter was discussed several months ago with Colonel LeMar, Staff Judge Advocate, Peninsular Base Section, who advised that it was contrary to General Pence's policy to divulge the nature of court martial sentences. At that time, however, it was proposed actually to publish details of specific cases in local newspapers, for their psychological effect. No formal request was made upon your headquarters at that time.

3. The current situation and proposal differ from those involved in my discussion with Colonel LeMar, in that:

a. It is not proposed to publish any information in newspapers but merely to give the data to the Minister of Justice of the Italian Government, as a confidential matter.

b. No names of soldiers are to be divulged.

c. Arrangements similar to that proposed with P.B.S. have in fact been made with the JAG, A.A.I. (see attached letters).

d. Peninsular Base Section has changed commanding generals.

4. Officers of the Regional Control and Military Government Section of this headquarters believe, and I agree, that a reasonable demonstration of comity and good faith in our military legal matters would pay dividends in greater cooperation on the part of Italian officials and judicial officers, and that any objections which might be interposed to the proposal are more than outweighed by these considerations.

5. It is requested that Peninsular Base Section sympathetically consider entering into an informal arrangement similar to that reflected in the attached letter dated 20 May 1944 between A.A.L. (JAG) and our Legal Sub-Commission.

6. The present aspect of the matter has also been discussed preliminarily with Colonel LeMar.

SUBJECT : Punishment for offences against Italians.

TO : RC & MG Section (CAB)

1. Confirming my telephone conversation of today, there appears to be a definite feeling in the Italian Government that the Allied Forces, while insisting on severe punishment of Italians for acts against Allied property and personnel, have not dealt severely with their own personnel in cases involving injuries to property of Italians and to Italian citizens.
2. The British Judge Advocate General at AAI Hq has undertaken to prepare and send to this sub-commission a sample list of cases where the local populace is affected showing the punishments imposed by British Courts-Martial in various types of offence.
3. It would be extremely helpful if a similar statement could be obtained from the Judge Advocate General, PBS. The names of the offenders and their wants are not desired.
4. By making a proper showing in this regard, it is believed that our own position will be strengthened and that we will receive greater cooperation in connection with trials before Italian Courts affecting the Allied interests.
5. It is proposed that any statements with regard to punishment of Allied soldiers will be submitted to the Minister of Justice as a confidential matter only.

1. I confirm conversation on Monday last (Colonel
UPJOHN-Lieutenant-Colonel GUNNING) when we agreed to the
following:-

- (a) You would be kind enough to supply to us some examples of cases of Courts Martial where soldiers under command H.Q. A.A.I. had been court martialled for offences against Italian civilians. This was to enable us to show in conference to the Italian Minister of Justice such excerpts from your particulars as we deemed advisable so as to indicate to him that the British authorities were fully alive to the necessity for punishing severely soldiers who interfered with the person or property of Italian civilians. Such information will, I can assure you, have the most beneficial effect in assisting our efforts to persuade the Italians to punish severely Italians civilians who commit offences involving allied interests.
- (b) This H.Q. will on the other hand let you have such particulars as come into its possession from time to time of British, Polish, or French soldiers who are concerned in 'Black-Market' or other crimes in order that you may check up as to whether Court Martial proceedings have been instituted against such personnel.
- (c) Finally you will let us have the names and particulars of any Italian civilians whose names crop up in connection with Court Martial proceedings who are alleged to be concerned in any crime so that we may see that such civilians are brought to justice.

1. Request you confirm that the following is agreed in furtherance of 38/16/C, 23 January 1944, Evacuation of Refugees, AFHQ Advance Administrative Echelon:

a. Two sites have been agreed upon. One is located in COLLIGI CARMINELLO in Naples with a rated capacity of 2000. One is located along Highway No. 7 near Capua as shown on map prepared by the Engineer Service, PBS, dated February 10, 1944, scale 1/10000, proposed area for a Refugee camp, near Capua. Map is in hands of interested agencies. The area is capable of holding 10,000 refugees when developed.

b. CG PBS has been authorized to issue a minimum of equipment and transportation to supplement that which ACC can provide. Food is an ACC responsibility, but in emergencies may be issued temporarily from military stocks. Administration of the camps is an ACC responsibility.

c. It is planned to lay out initially the Capua camp for 4000 in units of 500 capacity each. Construction of two units will start at once. Additional construction will be started as needed.

d. So far as practicable CG PBS, will furnish engineering supervision and labor with the understanding that civil supervision, labor, materials, and transportation furnished by ACC will be made available to the maximum extent possible. Details in this connection will be settled between the Refugee Branch and PBS.

e. It is estimated that COLLIGI CARMINELLO will be operating to at least a capacity of 1000 by 25 February and that at least two basic units of the Capua camp will be operating by 1 March.

There has recently been a steady increase in the number of Italian refugees evacuated from forward areas. Some of these evacuations result from our advance, others are due to the necessity for clearing certain areas for training and operational purposes.

It is necessary to make prompt arrangements to deal with these refugees, in order to provide for their staging and examination pending their eventual removal to rear areas.

The plans put forward by AMG involves the provision of two forward staging camps, one in each Army area, each having a capacity of 1,000. In rear of these, two larger transit camps are proposed, each having a capacity of 10,000. It is desired to locate one of these camps at FOGGIA and the other in the NAPLES area.

The provision of the accomodation in these camps must be a military commitment. The camps will be staffed and administered by AMG and the only further assistance required from military sources will be in regard to transport and rations.

Armies are requested to submit as early as possible their proposals in regard to the provision of the forward staging camps mentioned above in their respective areas. No. 2 District and Peninsular Base Section are similarly requested to put forward their proposals for the provision of the larger transit camps at FOGGIA and NAPLES respectively. These larger transit camps must be near rail communications or near a port.

It is appreciated that the provision of tentage on a large scale presents serious difficulties and that other accomodation is not plentiful. As a partial solution, it is suggested that the flow of refugees is likely to be in inverse proportion to the influx of prisoners of war. It may, therefore, be possible to allocate prisoner of war camps, or portions of them, for accomodation of refugees.

This matter is one of definite military importance. If will ordered arrangements are not made for the evacuation of refugees, our communications will be encumbered, quite apart from the serious political repercussions and humanitarian considerations involved. You are therefore requested to give this matter most serious and prompt consideration and also to assist AMG officers to the best of your means the execution of their task.

SENDER'S COMPOSITION RADIO SERVICE TO UNITED STATES FROM ITALY

1. Effective 1 May 1944, sender's composition radio service to United States, via RCA station, Naples will be inaugurated for U.S. Military and naval personnel in Italy, including U.S. civilians attached to U.S. Armed Forces. This service is already available from U. S. to Italy.
2. Sender's composition messages (SCM) will be restricted to night letter telegrams (NLT), and will be filed with unit EFM censors in the same manner as EFM. Inclosure 1 to this letter contains the rates applicable to NLT from Italy to all points in the United States. Inclosure 2 governs the count of words in messages. Applicable rates and instructions will be carefully observed by unit EFM censors accepting SCM in order to avoid delay due to return of messages for correction.
3. Unit EFM censors will record SCM accepted by them on Forms NAP 1001. In addition to all information recorded for EFM, the amount collected for each SCM will be shown in the right-hand margin of the form 1001. Remittance of money collected will be made in the same postal money order with EFM collections. One single money order will be drawn for total amount of EFM and SCM collections less cost of money order fee. Money order will be drawn payable to Mr. T. D. Meola, Manager RCA, APO No. 790 and forwarded together with Forms NAP 1001, EFM, and SCM messages to Central EFM Station No. 3 APO #790, in one complete package.
4. The provisions of NATOUSA Circular #51, as apply, except for provisions of paragraph 2a (2) which refer to local civilian telegram or cable offices. Messages may not be handed in at such local offices. Particular attention is directed to paragraph 2d of same circular which lists "Prohibited Statements". It will be the duty of the Unit EFM censors to observe these restrictions so as to avoid unnecessary delay in transmission.
5. There is no change in the procedure for handling EFM's or on the type of blanks to be used in writing such messages. Standard RCA Radiogram form, with red heading, will be used for SCM's. (Sample attached). In upper right-hand space of SCM form, the number of words and cash collected will be so indicated. A supply of these message forms can be secured by units from Central EFM Station, located at 2nd Base Post Office.

RULES FOR COUNTING WORDS AND GENERAL INFORMATION
GOVERNING SENDER'S COMPOSITION MESSAGES. (3CM)

1. Every word written by sender for transmission is counted and charged for. This includes the address and signature.
2. The signature must contain the first name or initial and last name.
3. The City and State in the address will count as a single word if grouped together; For example:
SanFranciscoCal - 1 Word.
NewOrleansLa - 1 Word.
4. Expressions like stop, comma, and period when written out, count as one word.
5. Every isolated character, letter or figure and every sign of punctuation, apostrophe, hyphen or fraction bar, transmitted at the request of the sender is counted as one word.
6. Recognized abbreviations; such as, FOB, COD or POB are single words.
7. Words of over fifteen letters or figure groups of over five digits count as two chargeable words; For example:
Transcontinental - 16 letters - (2 words)
678201 - (2 words)
8. Running words or parts thereof together in the text or address are known as evasions and will not reduce the word count; For example:
ALBERT - (2 words)
9. The indicator NLT (Night Letter) must appear as the first word of the address and is charged for.
10. An address written:
 1. NLT Mary E. Jones, counts as (4 words).
 2. NLT Mrs Mary E. Jones (5 words).
 3. NLT Mary Jones (3 words).An example of a complete address follows:
NLT Mary Jones 225 West 79th Street
NewYorkCityNy - (8 words).
11. Here is an example of how a message would be counted:
NLT MARY JONES 48 RIDGE STREET RICHMONDVA
SALE OF HOUSE APPROVED HAPPY TO HEAR MOTHER WELL ALL MY LOVE DEAR
JOHN E DOE
The foregoing totals 23 chargeable words. As this does not exceed the minimum of 25 words, the charge for the above would be \$2.58, which is what an NLT would cost to Virginia.
