- (a) The standard ration. Of what it consists. Allied provided items. Italian provided items.
Supplementary items. What they are and how they may be obtained. Method of supply from the Unit point of view. Preparation of Indents.

Note : The exact quantity of each item of the ration should be exhibited as a visual aid to the student.

A.F.H.Q.

1. I have been considering for some time what we can do to improve the efficiency of Italian Officers, and recently discussed the matter with Gen. ROBERTSON and Gen NOCE.

2. It is evident that we cannot attempt anything very ambitious at this stage of the war and with the material we will try to improve. But I think we can do something to instil ideas of man-management and all that goes with it.

3. I have discussed the matter with the Ministry of War and as a result propose the following:-

(a) To hold a course of 2 weeks duration in the area of each Italian Adm Div for Italian Officers, regimental and Staff, up to inclusive the rank of Lt. Col.

(b) The course to be "standardised" on a uniform basis throughout ITALY, and be run by the Italians under the general supervision and with the assistance of the Allied Commanders (Districts and Armies) concerned.

(c) Curriculum to be as per Appendix "A".

(d) Lectures or notes for lectures to be written out in both English and Italian. MOIA will assist M of W in this and AFHQ will "vet" before issue to both Italian and Allied Commanders.

(e) Instructors and accommodation to be produced by Italian Commanders from within their Adm Divs.

4. Do you approve the project generally?

If so, I will take steps to have it worked out in more detail for your approval.
