Waiting at vehicle park Poetto, Cagliari for shipping 600 odd vehicles as per attached list in detail, all with good tyres and at least 5,000 miles lafe. Expect to produce about 100 per week for another 6 to 8 weeks.

Tyres may effect these later figures but will advise. Am preparing m/cycles for shipment without typres now and putting on vehicles as load.

I am told that there is also a store in Cagliari of Allied clothes and boots but have not been able to locate and investigate yet!

My interest in these lines arrises from the general condition of clothing and boots of men at workshops and my efforts to get them improved



This establishment is small but very useful and covers most artillery and small arms requirements in the following departments:-

Nowing being drawn in for shipment.

Retimated approx number of guns on island at June 30th, No. 1977, made up of various types and nationalities including Italian, French, German, Polish and Russian. According to Italian estimates about 70% are good and most are in store. At present rate of repair it is estimated that to go over all these it will take about 3 years!!!!

I feel that thisshop has ample facilities to serve the garrison requirements in its various depots and suggest that if the clothing and boot repair factory is removed to the main-land that this workshop be utilized for Garrison requirements. Already in the Saddlery dept are a few bootmakers and tailors—these could be stepped up if necessary. By detail cooperation many other types of work could be done if necessary.

I also believe that this dept could be reduced of specialists suitable to Combat groups in spite of Italian remarks of "niente".
