1. I arrived at CHQ on 11 Apr 45. On 1 Apr AGO CHQ M.M.I. were contacted and from 2 to 5 Apr nearly 400 Italian officers were interviewed at 304 PW Camp.

On 6 Apr all those selected had been medically examined and the final roll was made out. On 8 Apr all officers signed their declarations of willingness to serve with the Italian Army and I gave them their final instructions prior to repatriation.

2. Appendix "A" gives the nominal roll of the 33 officers selected. Appendix "B" (M.M.I. only) gives the British Medical Officers' health check prior to departure. Enclosed with this report and also for M.M.I. only, to be disposed of by them as required, are the declarations of willingness to serve in the Italian Army signed in triplicate by each officer.

3. The following comments are made on the selection of officers.

(a) Infantry. There was good material to choose from. Eleven Parachutist officers (serials 1, 2, 15, 16, 28, 36, 37, 38, 39, 36, 37) of the old 101st Air Div were chosen and and generally speaking officers from this unit were notably superior to officers from other divisions. Two cavalry officers (serials 6 and 7) and one tank officer (serial 5) were chosen because they were better than other available infantry divisions and also on the grounds that they will pick up the new training at the 1st ICP Camp as quickly as anyone else who has been a PW for a considerable length of time.

Appendix "A" gives the nominal roll of the G5 officers selected. Appendix "B" (MIA only) gives the British Medical Officers' howitz check prior to departure. Included with this report and also for MIA only, to be disposed of by them as required, are the declaration of willingness to serve in the Italian Army signed in triplicate by each officer.

3. The following comments are made on the selection of officers -

(a) Infantry. There was good material to choose from. Eleven paratrooper officers (serials 1, 2, 18, 19, 28, 29, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41) of the old 101st Air Division were chosen and were generally speaking officers from this unit were notably superior to officers from other divisions. Two cavalry officers (serials 6 and 7) and one tank officer (serial 5) were chosen because they were better than other available infantry choices and also on the grounds that they will pick up the new training at the A.T.F. ICF Camp as quickly as anyone else and has been a PM for a considerable length of time.

(b) Artillery. There was a dearth of good Majors, but no scarcity of good material amongst the Captains or Subalterns.

(c) Engineers. The two Majors selected are not considered above average, but there was little choice. It was not possible to select four suitable engineer Captains and therefore selected two reserve Captains (serials 43 and 46) and nine Subalterns.

1. I arrived at CAGC on 21 Mar 45. On 1 Apr AGS GHQ MAF were contacted and from 2 to 5 Apr nearly 200 Italian officers were interviewed at 304 PW Camp.

On 8 Apr all those selected had been medically examined and the final roll was made out. On 8 Apr all officers signed their declarations of willingness to serve with the Italian Army and I gave them their final instructions prior to repatriation.

2. Appendix "A" gives the nominal roll of the 63 officers selected. Appendix "B" (MMIA only) gives the British Medical Officers' health check prior to departure. Enclosed with this report and also for MMIA only, to be disposed of by them as required, are the declarations of willingness to serve in the Italian Army signed in triplicate by each officer.

Open letter to Jacques Maritain and Francois Mauriac

I had the good fortune of making your acquaintance during my training years in Paris.

I admired your integrity as thinkers and writers, your courage.

To me, a foreigner, you were not only Maritain or Mauriac, you were France, a tradition of intellectual integrity, an atmosphere to be felt with the French writers and thinkers, from the conservatives to the revolutionists (with a few exceptions of course).

French opinion has been heated up for the defence of one man who had been unjustly condemned, for you very rightly thought that this was a matter of principle, the violation of which, if accepted, would cause a lowering, a collapse of French morality. You then had Zola, you have had Peguy.

In my days, in Paris, you, Jacques, were revising a whole philosophy. You were fighting for Catholic philosophy and morality, which were then more than impugned in the intellectual milieu of France. And besides, you 'compromised' yourself doubly by attracting publicans to your faith.

It was then that Berda spoke of the 'Betrayal of the Clerks', Halévy of the 'Decadence of Freedom' and Gide taught us what 'The Unpreconceived Spirit' is.

And later on, Bernanossi and you, Mauriac, you defended the anti-France Spauldards and Basques who were killed, you, Maritain, defended persecuted Jews, and Gide, a believer of communism, had the courage to write his book; 'Back from U.S.S.R.'

We could better 'er' 'against' your statements or your principles, but to us, you were an example of men-conformism.

We tried therefore in our country to lead our fights in the same spirit of intellectual probity. Most of you believed too easily that the world ends at the Rhine, others that it begins only in Moscow, and didn't even know that in our countries there were men who had been working at the same task for generations, and were defending the same patrimony.

In my days, in Paris, you, Jacques, were reviving a whole philosophy. You were fighting for Catholic philosophy and morality, which were then more than impugned in the intellectual milieu of France. And besides, you 'compromised' yourself doubly by attracting publicans to your faith.

It was then that Benda spoke of the 'betrayal of the Clerks', Malev of the 'Decadence of Freedom' and Gide taught us what 'the Unprejudiced Spirit' is.

And later on, Bernanos and you, Mauriac, you defended the anti-France Spaniards and Jacques who were killed, you, Maritain, defended persecuted Jews, and Gide, a believer of communism, had the courage to write his book: 'Back from U.S.S.R.'

We could be fiercer 'against' your statements or your principles, but to us, you were an example of non-conformism.

We tried therefore in our country to lead our fights in the same spirit of intellectual probity. Most of you believed too easily that the world ends at the Rhine, others that it begins only in Moscow, and didn't even know that in our countries there were men who had been working at the same task for generations, and were defending the same patrimony.

What is happening at Present?

While you were returning to your liberated capitals, ours rose to fight its oppressor, and, a heap of ruins, it has now collapsed, in unparalleled conditions. This is a European case of conscience. We have a right to expect a word in defence of the victims from the French writers and thinkers such as we have known them, a word which would also have been in defence of Europe's honour and Christian conscience; and yet, till now, no such word has been pronounced.

It is difficult to speak about Warsaw, for what happens there is more than what our imagination can conceive. A town which had more inhabitants than pre-war Rome, larger than Los Angeles and twice as big as Lyon, is now down, the underground, the whole population fight without food, without arms, and do not surrender, though Warsaw has been without water for weeks with a terrible outbreak of typhus and scarlet fever, savagely defending every house and asserting their will to be free before the world.

Our Churches, our libraries, the Warsaw University, our historical palaces and thousand of houses which sheltered over one and a half million men have now been destroyed.

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There are about two hundred thousand dead or wounded.

243 thousand civilians went through the Pruszków transit camp still September 27th, forcibly evacuated by the Germans (the camp is enormous, has no sanitary installations; there are hundreds of unburied corpses, and executions take place in the camp itself).

These poor wretches were the mothers, wives, children of the Polish soldiers who were fighting in Warsaw and are fighting on all fronts.

These soldiers are worth something if the Chiefs of the allied armies do them the honour of entrusting them with the most difficult and arduous tasks; those soldiers, who conquered Montecassino and Ancona, participated in the hardest fighting in Kalais and Arras; and always with the unshaking faith that there is justice in this world and that blood is never shed in vain.

I will sum up a few facts.

In October 1943, the Polish underground movement received from its Government in London the order to collaborate with the Soviet troops. This collaboration starts when the Russian troops enter Poland, the insurrection of the capital is its logical consequence.

The Soviet troops enter Prague (suburb of Warsaw) and the Russian radio broadcasts a message to the population of "Warsaw, on July 30th. I quote a few phrases from this message:

'All the population of the town must unite round the army of the resistance. Citizens of Warsaw, rise in arms! Attack the Germans, help the Soviet troops to cross the Vistula! A million inhabitants means an army of a million men fighting for the freedom of Poland'.

At the same time, the German authorities order the population of the town to be entirely evacuated..

Under the pressure of the Soviet radio, and threatened with extermination, Warsaw rises.

Warsaw is the most important communication centre of the whole Eastern front. The insurrection blocks these arteries, upsets the plans of the Wehrmacht High Command, blocks considerable forces in this sector.

Russian tactics: the Soviet Command refuses to give any help whatever to Warsaw, tries to prevent the Allies from helping, refuses to let its air

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Russian tactics: the Soviet Command refuses to give any help whatever to Warsaw, tries to prevent the Allies from helping, refuses to let its air basis be used and maintains this refusal during forty nine days which are decisive for Warsaw, when help could still be of use, and finally decides to make a 'magnanimous gesture', about which Russian propaganda makes a terrible fuss; this gesture consists in a tardy throwing of arms and foodstuffs, which took place when people knew it was already too late to save Warsaw.

The only cause for the fall of Warsaw is the complete absence of help whatever from those who could and should have given it, during the first period of insurrection. During the last phase of the insurrection, relief came too late, and, besides, in insufficient quantity, when Warsaw was already doomed. The only operation on a big scale which took place was made by the American Air Force, with 400 flying fortresses. But, though eighty per cent of the supplies thrown by parachute fell into Polish hands, these supplies could barely last two days. Help given without delay by the Russians during the first phase of the rising would probably have brought about the liberation of Warsaw, saving the capital from total destruction, saving its inhabitants from horrible sufferings and from death.

This summing up means very little if our imagination doesn't co-operate.

Did you hear the agonized appeal of the Warsaw radio? I suppose you didn't for there are forces which attempt to stifle such appeals. There is a propaganda which, since the creation, in 1939, of the Melotov-Ribbentrop frontier, is specialized in the method for spreading thesis which do not correspond to any reality, and there is another propaganda, parallel to the first one, for not understanding awkward facts, which is proving most successful in the democratic countries of today.

Is no one willing to hear the truth in those countries? Does no one wish to know what a country is worth, what it is suffering, even when there is no way to help it?

In the Warsaw radiograms of the last two months, we read uninterrupted requests for war material and foodstuffs; on August 27th, the radio tells us that the army of the country is doing its utmost to help the Soviet army, believing that its collaboration in the fight might create a basis for a fair settlement between both countries.

Encouraged by the optimistic broadcasts of the allied radios, and by the news of huge bombardments in Germany, the population still believed in mass help from the Allies and waited for relief as our rebels did in '63, when they believed in Napoleon III's help, and even in the coming of Garibaldi and his army.

The radio of August 29th says: Two days after rising against its allies of yesterday, the capital of Rumania gets such help as we have been begging for for twenty six days. Ought we to have been enemies for five years instead of faithful allies to get relief? The radio describes the women who, during the storming of the Telephone Exchange, participated in the action with the engineers who were clearing mines, while the whole town was blazing. No fellow the fighting in the old part of the town, one of Poland's architectural masterpieces which no longer exist. The Gothic cathedral of St. John is now a heap of ashes.

We also hear of the taking of the police building after the annihilation of the Germans in the Church of the Holy Cross which they had turned into a stronghold. (Chopin's heart was buried there).

You must know these historical churches, which have been familiar to us since childhood, these peaceful cafes where we used to spend our free time, now turned into fortresses, taken and retaken by us and by the Germans, to be able to imagine, in part, the atrocity of the fight in our capital.

Through the radio, the inhabitants of Warsaw hear of the allied victories on the Western front, and listen to Churchill's speech, insisting that our Eastern provinces must go to Russia.

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'Are we to lose half Poland after such long sufferings and so much bloodshed?' asked the Warsaw radio. 'Warsaw fights not only for its rights and its liberty, but also for those of the whole of Poland. Warsaw waits, listens for voices from the West, and Churchill's speech reaches us ... Everything becomes clear now that we become conscious that Poland is strong and bloodless, that such a Poland is no longer worth taking in consideration'. And this phrase: 'We gave what we could and it helped so little to solve the Polish question. These are the words and thoughts of all Warsaw'.

However, there is still hope in all these communications; they express the joy the nation had in fighting, after being savagely kept in bondage for five years.

After a retreat, the Russians occupy again Prague, the suburb on the right bank of the Vistula. After the first enthusiasm caused by the knowledge that help is now close at hand, come the news of the deportations.

In the communique of September 30th, we read: 'We are in the world will listen to us..... Someone wants the Polish nation no longer to exist..... We

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cannot understand for what reason, for what aims England allows Russia to persecute us.... When revolt broke out, there were neither arms, nor ammunition in Warsaw. We got them from the Germans, losing one man for every other gun. We have been left without help for England decided that it didn't pay to help Poland. Too important a help for such a small country, said English statesmen... Warsaw fought against guns with rifles, against tanks with grenades. We fought under German artillery and bombs. And yet we had moments of joy: because of the storming of Prague by the Soviet armies and because of the arrival of planes. Now only, we see how mistaken we were to rejoice over the arrival of the Russians, for we thought they wouldn't act as they did in 1939. Now only we see that their coming to Poland is our undoing.

The defenders got positive news saying that the Russians deport the population to Siberia. Anger breaks out as well as rancour against the allies.

So, this is what we fought for? This is why our capital has been destroyed?

The radio of October 2nd speaks bitter words against the allies. It may be true that the inhabitants of Warsaw had no clear idea of the difficulties the allies had to overcome to organize efficacious relief. Nevertheless, the heartbreaking accents of a population in distress must be heard by the world. They do not reach you for they are true. Oh, if they had been drafted by the propaganda offices of Moscow, Berlin, London, or Washington, you would have heard them in every broadcast, every paper would quote them in large print. But these scathing, often awkward phrases, these contrary assertions of rancour and tenderness sent from a blazing city, do not reach you.

This population remembers that during the London air battle, we lost 40% of our Air Force which participated in the defence, that the Poles are at present fighting on every front. On October 2nd, at 7 P.M., the communique says: 'There is no help forthcoming. The armies of General Rokossovski are murdering our brothers'. The communique starts with these phrases. 'The Russians have ordered old people and children to be evacuated from Warsaw (from the suburb they occupied). Men 14 to 60 years old are being sent to Siberia'. And after a few hard words for the allies, 'You must know that today hundred of thousands of Poles have already died for you. You must help us at once. We are succumbing... We are being called the 'worry of fighting nations'. Why? Because of all the blood which was shed or because our nation wants to live, to breathe a free air? And you dared to proclaim the motto: 'We are fighting for the freedom of oppressed nations'. 'You have led us astray in a maze of lies. And now we appeal to just men, to those who didn't dig the grave of the exhausted Polish nation. Change the world, let it follow another road, if necessary, don't be afraid of changing leaders. Why don't you make this effort? Why shouldn't you help those who are dying? Only one road lays open before us, that which leads

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I can see modern and skeptical men smiling and feeling good humoredly superior what a romantic nation, what an old fashioned dream of national freedom and justice! But I knew, that neither you, Maraisin, nor you, Mauriac, will smile.

I quote a few bits from the communique of October 3rd. : Unfortunately, but not defeated, Warsaw is still fighting. Nobody sends us any help, Rokossowski is destroying what remains of the Polish population. In Warsaw there is only a handful of exhausted soldiers. Women, children and mothers with their babies are starving. An order of General Rokossowski has been published yesterday, demanding the evacuation of the population of Warsaw (right bank, occupied by the Russians). The soldiers of the national army are being sent to Siberia;

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the heroes of fallen Warsaw are being sent to hard labour. Where is human loyalty? We demand your help. Help must come at once, to your rear, at once, for Warsaw which is perishing. No time must be lost, no trust you only. We have put our faith in you only'.

Again this hope, this undying faith in the Allies. 'Today the Polish road to Siberia has been re-opened, a long road, leading a long way off. A road which is also a danger for England. The patrimony of many generations has been destroyed. The capital of our great men, the capital of Poland has been burnt... soldiers fighting for the independence and for the Constitution, you did your duty, you saved the honour of the bleeding and dying town. To you, men of underground Poland, her honour was dearer than your life. Warsaw was a mother to you, did you in her cellars, and when German bombs attempted to wrest your corpses from her, she buried you under her ruins. Brought up by Poland of whom Warsaw is a part, you didn't give up an inch of ground without fighting. Clery be to you. Today, we start a long road leading into the unknown. We must tear ourselves away from these ruins which are dear to us, from these stones which today are still a danger for those who occupy them. We have a right to speak for the Poles and we make use of this right to say that we wish every Pole to know Warsaw's words and appeal to the world. We know that German occupation will soon come to an end. The Polish nation has existed, exists and will go on existing. Our nation will not perish. Cheaters, however barbarous they be, won't succeed in murdering a heroic nation of 30 million men.'

The same communique gives us the last order of the day of General Ber, chief of the rising: I quote a few bits: 'We fought for a noble aim. The liberation of the Polish nation, and of all the states which share its fate. We fought to re-establish in post-war Europe an order which would be just for all, we fought for the safety of all her citizens. For the renewal of the world. It wasn't granted to us to end this fight. We had to give in to force, but our armies are fighting abroad, and the fight for Poland and freedom doesn't come to an end here, in Warsaw. The surrender of the capital doesn't prove that we have ceased to fight the Germans. Now, after such a grievous loss, in a terrible political situation, Poland who fought against them during the five years of the occupation will not give up fighting. Moscow's claims are worse than the surrender of the armies to the enemy. We had rather die than accept them. The Soviet wanted to desert and destroy us like the ten thousand victims of Katyn. No help was given to us and we fought without it, doing our duty to the end.... I feel sure that Germany, that we are fighting, is doomed.'

It is the end of the sixty three days fight. Defeat.

While fight was raging in Warsaw, a feverish and well directed activity was being organized all over the world, aiming at strengthening the men of the Polish resistance. After a furious campaign against General Gonsowski, chief of our army, who openly acknowledged the insufficiency of allied relief in an order of the day, a campaign is now being made against General Ber-Komrowski, chief of the Warsaw

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The Moscow telegrams now call 'criminals' the chiefs who are responsible for the insurrection which they demanded and encouraged by every means.

An American paper, read by thousands of soldiers, writes in large print: 'The Poles are running away from Warsaw'. I wonder whether this American editor would allow himself to speak about flight in the case of American soldiers fighting for sixty three days, surrounded by enemy forces a hundred times stronger than they were, without arms, and practically without help from their allies. And this with the prospect of being charged with treason and deported to Russia.

Other news from Poland.

The terrible Maidanek prison, near Lublin (the world press mentioned it as a centre of German atrocities) now contains 2,500 Polish soldiers of our underground army. The only difference is that while the Germans put the civilian population and foreigners brought from other countries, in Maidanek

the Soviets, the Soviets, in the name of common fight against the Germans put the soldiers who fought and could still fight against the German army.

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The officers of the Polish units who participated in the conquest of Milano with the Soviet armies were asked to dinner by the Russian command on the day of the victory and arrested on the spot. Nothing is known about their fate.

On September 20th, ten thousand people had been deported from Milano; they are at present at Melouga in Central Russia.

A telegram communicates to us that more Poles have been deported and shot than in 1939.

Do you know anything about the deportations of 1939 and 1940? Do you know that one and a half million of men, women and children were deported to the far end of U.S.S.R. and that an enormous number of them already died of hunger, cold and misery? That practically every Pole has lost some near relatives?

A nation of thirty million inhabitants is condemned to definitive biologic destruction by two totalitarian states of eighty and a hundred and eighty million inhabitants. This country which was the first to say 'no' to Hitler, with its capital nothing but a heap of ashes, cannot even make itself heard; its bleeding mouth must be gagged, and it is told that this has to be for the common cause. What is this common cause? The Atlantic Chart has already been buried and Russia is to be given half the Polish territory, while we are being promised rewards on the rest as if one's country was a cupboard which can be moved from place to place.

We will always remember with gratefulness that British, South African, Australian, American pilots lost their lives trying to bring relief to the capital of Poland.

Today, we hear that Churchill spoke solemn words in the House of Commons in honour of the defenders of Warsaw. We appreciate these fine words, repeated by the world's press: 'Warsaw's sufferings and privations remain unsurpassed, even among all the misfortunes of this war'.

But they can no longer save Warsaw. There is a Polish saying which says: 'As useful as incense for the dead'.

And then, these moving words in the House of Commons were not followed by any proof of comprehension for the meaning, the aim of this fight; the liberty and integrity of the Republic.

We understand quite well that the statesmen have their great and small combinations, and that tactics often defeat the writers whose job has always been to tell the truth; those who said 'I accuse', who couldn't keep silent, who kept 'above the turmoil'. I know where to find those who remained in Germany, in Russia, in Poland, if some of them are still left and haven't been murdered. They are condemned to silence, they are being tortured in camps, from Holland to the Pacific. But where are the great English and American writers? Why do they keep silent? I admit that the Polish drama wouldn't supply Bernard Shaw with adequate material for one of his brilliant paradoxes, but where are subtle

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Complete silence of the great writers. Have they also been reduced to silence by censorship? I understand that nowadays, it is awkward to speak about Poland, that it is far easier to keep silent or to repeat false and ready-made theories about Poland, country of landlords and reactionaries. These very handy ready-made ideas which have now been adopted by the so-called advanced part of the world press, would be a lack of honesty under the pen of a writer worthy of the name.

The defection of France, the gaping hole left by her defeat in 1940 never was so obvious, so tragical.

We put our hope and our trust in you, French writers and thinkers, who are returning to your wounded but liberated countries, in your Paris which is almost intact; we hope you are going to re-model the world's conscience, carry on the tradition which is yours. You cannot succeed in re-creating France's authority if you do not fight also for the nations which defend and stand up for the same principles of civilization.

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After a world war of five years, the cause of Poland and of all the nations of Europe which are in bondage like her, is the moral cause of the world, the cause of her conscience.

If because of so-called political requirements, France, like other countries, no longer takes an interest in their fate, you will no longer be what you were to the world - the bearer of a common patrimony, the defenders of universal ideas. Your silence would help in destroying, once and for all perhaps, the prestige which is so dear to us, the intellectual and moral prestige of France in the world.
