Responsibilities of Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3

1. General.

a. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, recommends to the Commanding General, Allied Garrison of Sardinia, policies covering all matters pertinent to employment of Allied and Italian troops on Sardinia and carries out his directives in this regard.

PASSIVE AIR DEFENSE PLAN FOR CAGLIARI AND ELMAS AREAS

Ref. Plan-- Town Plan of Cagliari. (GSCS 4378 Second Edition)
Plan to go into effect as of this date.

1. Mission-- The Mission of Passive Air Defense (P. A. D.) is to mitigate the effects of enemy air, ground, or naval action on Military personnel and installations so that the displacement of normal operational functions will be reduced to a minimum. P.A.D. does not include those measures whose functions are to harass and prevent effective enemy action.

2. Air Raid Warnings and Blackout Regulations.

a. Warning--In areas in which there are sirens, the signal will be an intermittent blast for a two (2) minute duration, for an imminent attack. In areas where this signal is inaudible, three (3) rounds of gun fire will be the signal of an air attack. All Clear signal will be one (1) steady blast of (1) minute duration.

b. Blackout Regulations--No specific Blackout Regulations will be promulgated. In this area, during alerts, at which time unit Commanding Officer will be responsible but complete blackout is maintained by all personnel.

3. Personnel Protection

a. Unit commanders are responsible for action taken to shelter their personnel during air raids. All personnel, not performing specific duties, will remain in designated shelter during an air attack.

4. Control Organization.

a. Supervision--The PAD of Cagliari, Elmas areas will be directed by the PAD Staff Officer of this Headquarters who is responsible for the supervision of PAD measures, organization, operations and training.

b. Control Center--PAD Control Center is located in Allied Garrison Headquarters, phone number 111 or, through Italian Headquarters, Black Airport, phone 10.

2. Air Raid Warnings and Blackout Regulations.

a. Warning--In areas in which there are sirens, the signal will be intermittent blasts for a two (2) minute duration, for an imminent attack. In areas where this signal is inaudible, three (3) rounds of gun fire will be the signal of an air attack. All Clear signal will be one (1) steady blast of (1) minute duration.

b. Blackout Regulations--No specific Blackout Regulations will be promulgated in this area. During alerts, at which time unit Commanding Officers will be responsible that complete blackout is maintained by all personnel.

3. Personnel Protection

a. Unit commanders are responsible for action taken to shelter their personnel during air raids. All personnel, not performing specific duties, will remain in designated shelter during an air attack.

4. Control Organization.

a. Supervision--The PAD of Cagliari, Elmas areas will be directed by the PAD Staff Officer of this headquarters who is responsible for the supervision of PAD measures, organization, operations and training.

b. Control Center--PAD Control Center is located in Allied Garrison Headquarters, phone number 111 or, through Italian switchboard, Elmas Airport, phone 13.

c. Sectors--The Cagliari, Elmas area is divided into 3 sectors, each under a sector controller, who is directly responsible to the PAD Staff Officer of this headquarters. Sectors are established as follows: (See appendix "A" for sector boundaries).

Sector I - Port area and area south and east of Via Garibaldi.
PAD Sector Controller - Lt. Colonel J. M. FORBES, Tyrrhenian Base Headquarters, phone Tyro.

Sector II - Cagliari city area, north of Viale S. Aeneas, Trento, Corso Vittorio Emanuele, Via Nanna and Via Garibaldi. PAD Sector Controller, Captain ALFRED L. JACKSON, Headquarters 310 Service Group, phone Generator 7.

Sector III - Blues Area.

PAD Sector Controller, Lt. A. H. OLSON, Room Guard House, phone
Nepher (Guard House).

d. Reporting of Incidents - all enemy action in their area will be reported immediately by unit commanders to their PAD Sector Controller. As soon as immediate action has been taken, the Sector Controller will communicate a detailed report to the PAD Staff Officer.

e. Dealing with Casualties--The Sector Controller, when he has reason to believe that casualties have occurred in his sector, will:

(1) Send out one Light Rescue Party.

(2) Order nearest First Aid Post to dispatch an ambulance to the scene of the incident.

(3) Request further assistance if necessary, from PAD Controller.

5. Communications.

a. Radiophones will be used whenever possible. The communication system will give priority to P.A.D. calls during alerts.

b. P.A.D. sector Controller will arrange for messengers with transportation in the event of a failure in telephonic communications.

6. P.A.D. Services.

a. Ambulances are available through the PAD Sector Controllers.

b. Rescue Parties--In order to deal with their own casualties as far as possible, each company or similar unit will form and train at least one (1) light rescue party of 1 NCO and six (6) enlisted men.

These parties will each be equipped with 6 picks, 2 shovels, one stretcher, 2 blankets, first aid kit, to be stored at the organization headquarters.

The Commanding Officer will have representation of organization headquarters to standing alert for these parties. These parties will stand by during alerts and will be controlled by the Sector Controllers in their respective sectors, but may be ordered to assist in other sectors by the P.A.D. Controller.

These parties will be organized by the PAD Controller.

(2) Organize the scene of the incident.

(5) Request further assistance if necessary, from PAD Controller.

5. Communications.

The telephone will be used whenever possible. The communication system will give priority to P.A.D. calls during alerts.

b. P.A.D. sector controllers will arrange for messengers with transportation in the event of a failure in telephonic communications.

6. P.A.D. Services.

a. Ambulances are available through the PAD Sector Controllers.

b. Rescue Parties--In order to deal with their own casualties as far as possible each company or similar unit will form and train at least one (1) light rescue party of 1 MCO and six (6) enlisted men.

These parties will each be equipped with 3 picks, 3 saws, one stretcher, 2 blankets, first aid kit, to be stored at the organization headquarters. The Commanding Officer will have transportation as organization headquarters. The parties will be alerted for these parties. These parties will stand by during alerts and will be ordered to assist in other sectors in their respective sectors, and may be ordered to assist in other sectors by the P.A.D. Controller.

c. Working Parties--Will be organized by the PAD Controller for from off-duty civilians in the fire and blow areas.

d. The PAD Sector Controller will organize in his sector one working party of one officer and approximately twenty (20) enlisted men for the purpose of salvage of military stores and cordoning off sites of damage. These working parties will be stationed by the PAD Controller.

e. All rescue and working parties will remain in shelters during alerts, until called to duty.

7. Fire Prevention and Fire Service.

a. The PAD Controller will establish liaison with the Civilian Fire Fighting Organization to coordinate fire fighting activities.

b. Fire Prevention--The prevention of fire is the responsibility of the Commanding Officer of each unit. Fire guards in units will proceed to their posts on the sounding of the alert. Fire guards consist of 10% of the men in the organizations with available extinguishers, hoses and wrenching bars, will be formed in all units.

c. Fire Fighting Platoon--Until further orders the Army Fire Fighting Platoon will be available only for fires in the Port Area. Location: Dock Area. Phone number: Room 44.

8. Medical.

a. First Aid Posts--All unit dispensaries will be used as First Aid posts.

b. Hospital--60th Station Hospital. Phone number: Generator 30.

c. Fatal Casualties--Commanding Officers of units will arrange that fatal casualties within their unit be placed near the scene of the incident, but screened from public view. It is the responsibility of the unit to assist in identifying casualties and arrange for the body to be properly covered before removal to the mortuary and to notify the QM Graves Registration Service, 60th Service Group.

d. Military Police--In the event of damage to military installations or units of Sector PAD Controllers, military police will proceed to the scene of the incident and prohibit access except to personnel on duty.

10. Crashed Aircraft--It is the responsibility of the nearest military unit to report all crashed aircraft to 42nd Wing, A-2, phone number, Room 2 and to take immediate security measures to protect planes and contents.

11. Unexploded Bombs, Mines or Bobby Traps--Location of suspected or known unexploded bombs, mines or bobby traps will be reported to the PAD Controller who will notify the Bomb Disposal Officer. Location of unexploded bombs, mines or bobby traps will be marked, guarded and instructions secured from the unit headquarters concerning the evacuation of the area.

12. War Gases--PAD Controller will be notified in the event of a gas attack. He will inform the Chemical Officer, Sector Controllers and Civil Defense Controller.

First Aid posts.

b. Hospital--60th Station Hospital. Phone number: Generator 30.

c. Fatal Casualties--Commanding Officers of units will arrange that fatal casualties within their unit be placed near the scene of the incident, but screened from public view. It is the responsibility of the unit to assist in identifying casualties and arrange for the body to be properly covered before removal to the mortuary and to notify the QM Graves Registration Service, 3400th Service Group.

d. Military Police--In the event of damage to military installations or upon the crash of a Sector PAD Controller, military police will proceed to the scene of the incident and prohibit access except, to personnel on duty.

e. Crashed Aircraft--It is the responsibility of the nearest military unit to report all crashed aircraft to 42nd Wing, A-2, phone number, Nephew 2 and to take immediate security measures to protect planes and contents.

f. Unexploded Bombs, Mines or Booby Traps--Location of suspected or known unexploded bombs, mines or booby traps will be reported to the PAD Controller who will notify the Bomb Disposal Officer. Location of unexploded bombs, mines or booby traps will be marked, guarded and instructions secured from the unit headquarters concerning the evacuation of the area.

g. War Gases--PAD Controller will be notified in the event of a gas attack. He will inform the Chemical Officer, Sector Controllers and Civil Defense Controller.

h. If gas is reported, normal unit anti-gas measures will be carried out. Decontamination of personnel, vehicles etc, is a unit responsibility. Contaminated areas will be marked, guarded, and reported.

i. Liaison with Civil Defense--The PAD Controller will establish Liaison with the Civil Defense Control Center for the purpose of coordinating Mutual assistance.

14. Routine Operations.

a. Between 15:00 and 18:00 hours each day, Sector Controllers will verify status of readiness of light rescue parties and ambulances within their respective sectors. He will then post his PAD tally sheet accordingly.

b. Sector Controllers will man their posts immediately on the sounding of the alert.

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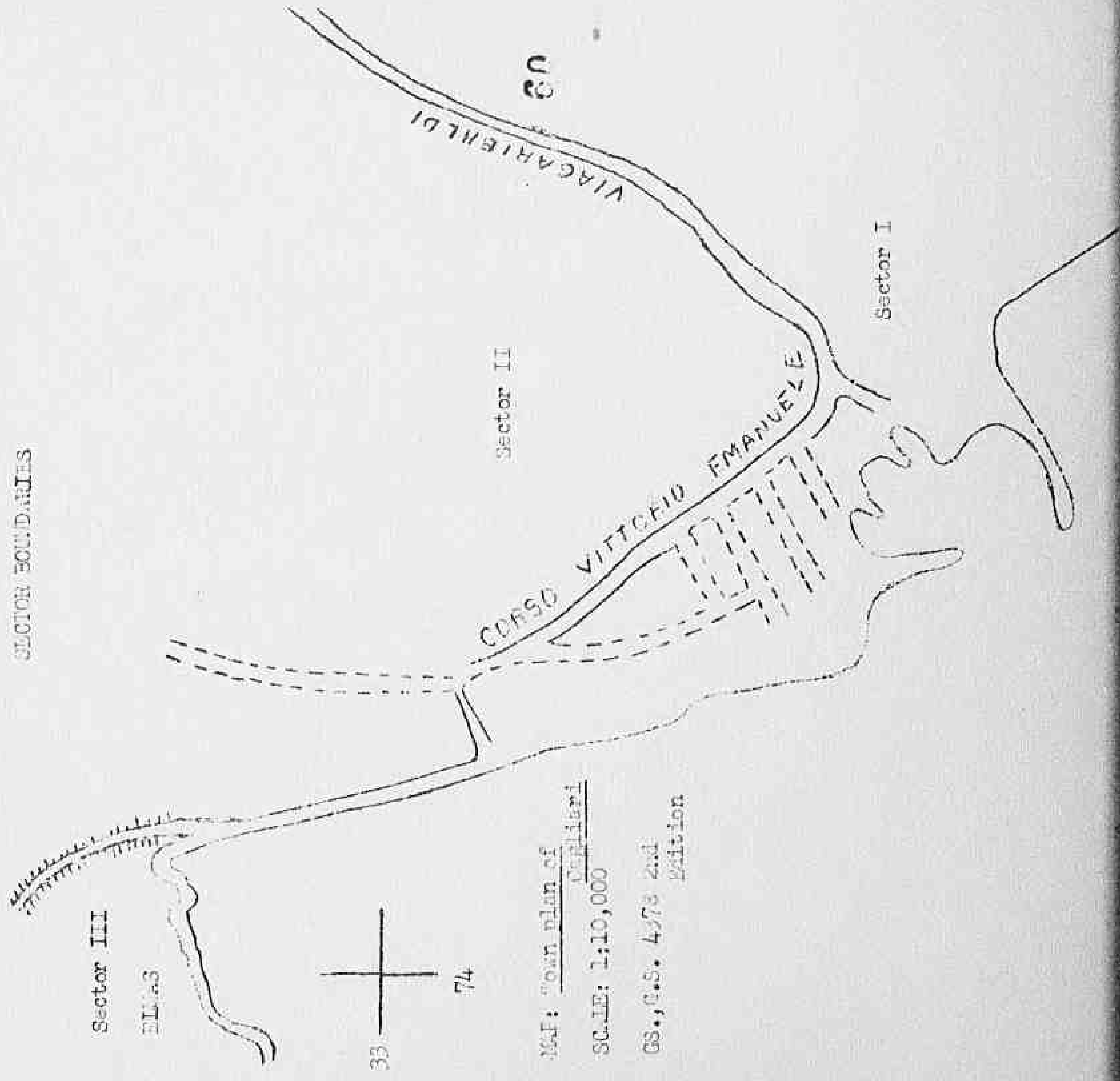
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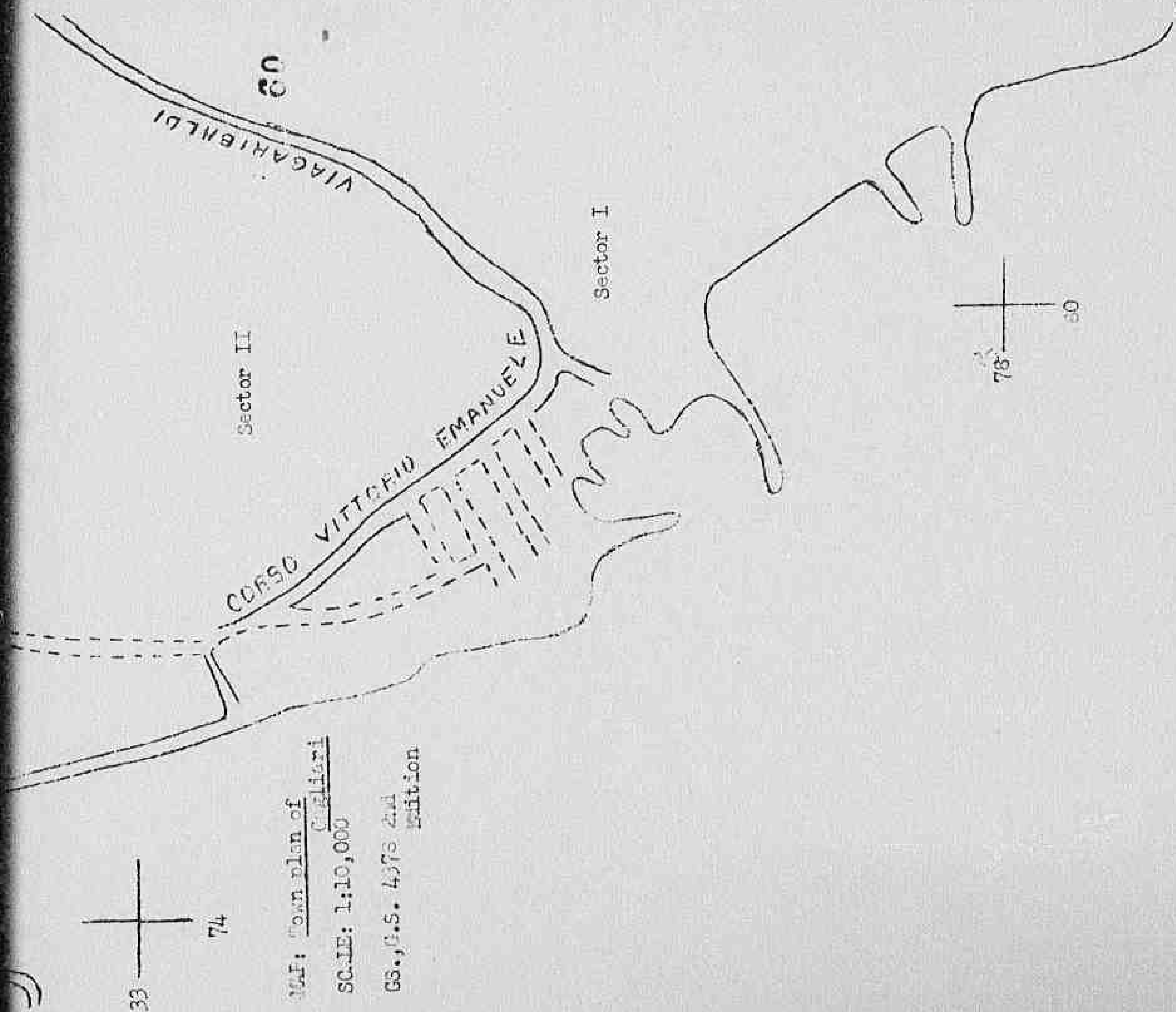

FLYING, AMERICAN AND ITALIAN AIRCRAFT

Memorandum 45-2, dated 8 December 1943 is rescinded.

I. Flying, General.

1. All aircraft departing from or arriving in Sardinia will follow routes as prescribed by higher headquarters.

II. Flying, Italian Aircraft.

1. Effective 0800, 23 December, 1943 all flights of Italian aircraft based on, departing from or arriving in Sardinia will conform to applicable procedure as outlined below:

a. Local Flights.

(1) The area bounded by an imaginary line from Porto di Masua east to Iglesias, the railroad from Iglesias to Decimomannu to Assemini, thence a line south to La Maddalena, thence the coastline to Porto di Masua is designated as the flying area for Italian land planes based on Sardinia.

(a) Flights in this area will be cleared through S.O.R at least thirty (30) minutes prior to takeoff.

(b) Flights in this area will remain below ten thousand (10,000) feet unless specifically authorized by S.O.R.

b. Cross Country Flights over Sardinia.

(1) In the event of military emergency, flights outside the area as outlined in 2 (1) above may be authorized by S. C. R.

(2) All flights to the north and return will follow the west coast of the island.

(3) All aircraft either departing from or arriving in Sardinia will, upon crossing Cape Spartivento fly one complete circle above it. Arrivals and departures will be at fifteen hundred (1,500) feet above sea level.

1. Effective 0800, 23 December, 1943 all flights of Italian aircraft based on, departing from or arriving in Sardinia will conform to applicable procedure as outlined below:

2. Local Flights.

(1) The area bounded by an imaginary line from Porto di Masua east to Iglesias, the railroad from Iglesias to Decimomannu to Assemini, thence a line south to La Maddalena, thence the coastline to Porto di Masua is designated as the flying area for Italian land planes based on Sardinia.

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(1) In the event of military emergency, flights outside the area as outlined in a (1) above may be authorized by S. O. R.

c. Clearances.

(1) Clearances from Capoterra Airdrome will be filed by telephone to S.O.R. at least thirty (30) minutes prior to proposed time of takeoff and will contain the following information:

- (a) Name of flight commander.
- (b) Type and Number of aircraft.
- (c) Proposed time of takeoff.
- (d) Destination.
- (e) Route out and back.
- (f) Altitude.
- (g) Estimated time of return.

(2) Clearance from other than Capoterra Airrome will be filed at the nearest American occupied Airrome by any available means of communications.

III. Location of Bases.

1. All Italian land aircraft located on Sardinia will be based at the Capoterra Airrome.

2. Instructions covering Italian seaplanes will be issued at a later date.

I - RESPONSIBILITY

1. The Commanding General, Allied Garrison of Sardinia, is charged with the local defense of Allied airfields and installations and those ports which are being worked in the Allied interest.

2. Local commanders are responsible for the defense of areas occupied by and immediately adjacent to their commands. They will be responsible for the full and effective employment of all means of active and passive defense available to them in the repelling of attacks and to insure security of the troops, equipment and installations in the occupied area.

3. The general defense of Sardinia against attacks by ground forces and against amphibious or naval forces approaching the coast is a responsibility of the Italian Military Commander.

II - EMPLOYMENT OF ITALIAN TROOPS

1. Italian units will be assigned by this headquarters to organizations and activities of this command for the purpose of augmenting and extending the local ground defense. Where the troops available to a commander are insufficient to provide for local defense and security a request for additional Italian troops will be made to this headquarters without delay.

2. Tactical command of Italian troops assigned for the defense of Allied installations, except as hereinafter provided, is vested in Air Base commanders and in the senior Allied commander at other activities. Such command will be exercised through the Italian commander. At every installation where Italian troops are assigned for use in local defense there will be a single Italian commander, except for such anti-aircraft troops as may be placed under the command of the local Allied AA commander.

3. All administration and supply of such Italian troops will be through normal Italian channels.

2. Local commanders are responsible for the defense of areas occupied by and immediately adjacent to their commands. They will be responsible for the full and effective employment of all means of active and passive defense available to them in the repelling of attacks and to insure security of the troops, equipment and installations in the occupied area.

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2. Tactical command of Italian troops assigned for the defense of Allied installations, except as hereinafter provided, is vested in Air Base commanders and in the senior Allied commander at other activities. Such command will be exercised through the Italian commander. At every installation where Italian troops are assigned for use in local defense there will be a single Italian commander, except for such anti-aircraft troops as may be placed under the command of the local Allied AA commander.

3. All administration and supply of such Italian troops will be through normal Italian channels.

4. Local commanders are responsible that proper instructions are issued to the Italian commander covering the disposition and action of the Italian troops. In each case the Italian commander will be required to dispose troops and weapons in a manner best calculated to provide for effective all-round security. The state of discipline in Italian units and the condition of readiness to perform the assigned role will be equivalent to that degree of excellence expected in trained Allied troops.

5. Local commanders will report to this headquarters promptly any situation where proper control is not being maintained by Italian commanders or where the defense being provided is lax or ineffective.

III - DEFENSE PLANS

1. The following defense plans will be prepared by local commanders to provide for the defense of areas under their control:

- a. Air Attack.
- b. Airborne Attack.
- c. Chemical Attack.

2. Plan for air attack will provide for the maximum use of active and passive defense measures and will include provisions for neutralizing the use of incendiaries.

Such command will be exercised through the Italian commander. At every installation where Italian troops are assigned for use in local defense there will be a single Italian commander, except for such anti-aircraft troops as may be placed under the command of the local Allied AA commander.
3. All administration and supply of such Italian troops will be through the Italian command.

4. Local commanders are responsible that proper instructions are issued to the Italian commander covering the disposition and action of the Italian troops. PERSONNEL MILITARY

OFFICIAL RELATIONS WITH ITALIAN AGENCIES

1. In order that confusion may be avoided in official matters between Allied and Italian military authorities all contact on official matters will be as prescribed in this memorandum. In case of doubt individuals concerned will consult this headquarters prior to initiating action involving Italian personnel or material.

2. General.

It is a policy of this headquarters that the transaction of business between Allied and Italian agencies involve a minimum of personnel. To this end all Allied agencies authorized direct contact with Italian agencies will, whenever possible, designate one individual to transact business with an opposite number designated by the Italian commander concerned. All are cautioned to avoid dealing with subordinates who do not have powers of decision on the matter involved.

3. Anti-Aircraft Artillery.

All matters concerning the assignment, relief or operations of Italian anti-aircraft artillery will be handled as directed by the Commanding General, 51st Artillery Brigade. Copies of any directives issued on this subject will be furnished this headquarters.

4. Local Procurement of Supplies, buildings and facilities.

Routine procurement of local supplies, buildings and facilities, is a responsibility of the Commanding Officer, 51st Service Group. All requests for such procurement will be submitted to the Commanding Officer, 51st Service Group who will screen requests, eliminate improper items and arrange for procurement and delivery of approved items.

5. Signal Communication.

All matters affecting signal communication involving Italian facilities or equipment are a responsibility of the Signal Officer, Allied Garrison Sardinia, who alone is authorized to deal with Italian agencies on this subject.

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It is a policy of this command that business between Allied and Italian agencies involve a minimum of personnel. To this end all Allied agencies authorized direct contact with Italian agencies will, whenever possible, designate one individual to transact business with an opposite number designated by the Italian commander concerned. All are cautioned to avoid dealing with subordinates who do not have powers of decision on the matter involved.

3. Anti-Aircraft Artillery.

All matters concerning the assignment, relief or operations of Italian anti-aircraft artillery will be handled as directed by the Commanding General, 81st Artillery Brigade. Copies of any directives issued on this subject will be furnished this headquarters.

4. Local Procurement of Supplies, Buildings and Facilities.

Routine procurement of local supplies, buildings and facilities, is a responsibility of the Commanding Officer, 81st Service Group. All requests for such procurement will be submitted to the Commanding Officer, 81st Service Group who will screen requests, eliminate improper items and arrange for procurement and delivery of approved items.

5. Signal Communication.

All matters affecting signal communication involving Italian facilities or equipment are a responsibility of the Signal Officer, Allied Garrison Sardinia, who alone is authorized to deal with Italian agencies on this subject.

6. Operation of Italian Aircraft.

Control of Italian aircraft flying over, arriving on or departing from Sardinia will be as prescribed by this headquarters in light of directives of higher authority and after coordination with Coastal Command agencies. The preparation of such flight regulations is specifically charged to the Air Section, Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, Allied Garrison of Sardinia.

7. Italian Military Personnel attached to Allied Units.

a. Procurement of Italian Army personnel for duty under Allied supervision is a responsibility of the Ground Force Section, Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, Allied Garrison of Sardinia.

b. Procurement of Italian AIR FORCE personnel for duty under Allied supervision is a responsibility of the Air Force Section, Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, Allied Garrison of Sardinia.

c. It is a policy of this headquarters that wherever possible Italian military personnel be employed as units, that is by platoon, company, etc., rather than as individuals.

d. All requests for the procurement of such personnel (except anti-aircraft artillery) will be addressed to this headquarters.

e. Procurement of Italian anti-aircraft personnel will be as directed in Par. 3 above.

f. Direct supervision over Italian military personnel is a responsibility of the Allied Commander to whom such personnel is assigned. Inspection of such supervision is charged to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, Allied Garrison of Sardinia.

g. Should the services of any Italian unit working under Allied supervision prove unsatisfactory in any way the case will be reported to this headquarters, attention Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3 without delay.

8. Italian Civilian Employees.

a. Civilian employees will be procured as provided in AGS Memo. No. 30-1. The 310th Service Group has established channels for the location of skilled workers which are available to Allied Commanders authorized to employ civilian labor.

b. Civilians will not be employed if military personnel qualified to perform the desired service can be obtained unless the employment of the civilian is unquestionably to the Allied benefit.

9. Issue of rations to Italian personnel.

a. Issue of rations to Italian military personnel is governed by the provisions of AGS Memo. No. 55-2.

b. Issue of rations to Italian civilians is governed by the provisions of AGS Memo. No. 55-1.

10. The Land Force Sub-Commissioner, Allied Control Commission.

G. Should the services of any Italian unit working under Allied supervision prove unsatisfactory in any way the case will be reported to this headquarters, attention Assistant Chief of Staff, C-3 without delay.

a. Civilian employees will be procured as provided in AGS Memo. No. 50-1. The 310th Service Group has established channels for the location of skilled workers which are available to Allied Commanders authorized to employ civilian labor.

b. Civilians will not be employed if military personnel qualified to perform the desired service can be obtained unless the employment of the civilian is unquestionably to the Allied benefit.

9. Issue of rations to Italian Personnel.

a. Issue of rations to Italian military personnel is governed by the provisions of AGS Memo. No. 55-2.

b. Issue of rations to Italian civilians is governed by the provisions of AGS Memo. No. 55-1.

10. The Land Force Sub-Commissioner, Allied Control Commission.

a. Movement of Italian troops, equipment or animals from Sardinia will be coordinated by the Commissioner.

b. All requests for information regarding strength, and composition of Italian units or availability of Italian military material will be addressed to the Commissioner in care of this headquarters.

c. Inspection of Italian units except those units working under direct Allied control (Par. 7) is a function of the Commissioner.

SANITATION

1. With the onset of warm weather rigid sanitary discipline is essential in maintaining a low incidence of the intestinal diseases. It is the duty of unit commanders and medical officers to inspect their installations frequently enough to maintain satisfactory sanitary conditions.

2. The provisions of sanitary regulations found in AR 40-205; F.M. 8-40; Circ. No. 106, Hq. NATOUSSA, dated 9 June 1943, subject: "Diarrhoea and Bacillary Dysentery;" Section IV, Circ. No. 218, Hq. NATOUSSA, dated 9 November 1943, subject: "Preparation of Fresh Fruits and Vegetables;" and Memorandum 20-1, Allied Garrison of Sardinia, dated 11 January 1944, will be enforced.

3. As there is considerable typhoid fever on Sardinia, it is particularly important that:

a. Immunization against typhoid fever be given in accordance with Section I, Circ. No. 12, Hq. NATOUSSA, dated 28 January 1944.

b. All raw foods and water be properly treated with an antiseptic before being consumed.

4. An inspection check-list is attached as an aid to all concerned.

GRAVES REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS

1. In the absence of Identification Tags on deceased U.S. Army personnel, a statement of identification will be required to supplement the Emergency Medical Tag. It will be signed by the Medical Officer or an Officer of the unit in which the deceased was a member.

2. Below is an example of the statement required which should be submitted in triplicate.

3. Paragraph 3 and 4 of Section I, NATOUSA Circular number 236 dated 8 November 1943 impose upon the Graves Registration Section Officer the responsibility for the proper disposal of effects found on the body, and upon the unit commander a similar responsibility for the effects found in billets and bivouac areas.

4. To safeguard against the loss of valuables such as rings, wallets, watches, etc. between the time the body is discovered and its arrival at the cemetery, they should be removed from the body of the deceased at the time of discovery and added to his personal effects for proper disposal.

LARVICIDING EQUIPMENT FOR MALARIA CONTROL

1. Diesel Oil.

Diesel oil for use in sprayers as a larvicide against mosquito larvae is available to U. S. Army organizations at the Bulk V-80 Dump in Cagliari. Except in unusual cases each issue of diesel oil will be at the rate of one drum (approximately 50 gallons) of oil per company, squadron, or similar size organization.

2. Sprayers for applying Oil Larvicide.

Sprayers, cylinder type, 2½ gallon capacity are available at the Engineer Supply Depot, 310th Service Group and will be issued at the rate of two (2) per company, squadron, or similar size organization.

3. Requisitioning.

a. Unit commanders who require diesel oil and sprayers in carrying out their responsibilities in mosquito control will submit requisitions for their requirements to the 310th Service Group in the normal manner. Requisitions for diesel oil for this purpose will bear the certificate "This oil will be used for mosquito control purpose only".

b. Requisitions for malaria control material will be marked at the top with the words "MALARIA CONTROL" in red pencil or red ink to insure expeditious handling.

VENEREAL DISEASE CONTROL

1. Attention invited to Par. 2-c, Circular Letter No. 10, Office of the Surgeon, MATOUSA, dated 10 April, 1943, entitled "Diagnosis, Treatment and Hospitalization of the Venereal Diseases", as amended by par. 1, (1) Section I, Circular Letter No. 28, same office, dated 20 August 1943.

2. With the increasing venereal disease rate and the increasing number of gonorrhea patients on this Island that are found to be resistant to the usual course of sulfa drug therapy and the resultant number of days lost by required hospitalization, it is directed that all cases of acute uncomplicated gonorrhea in this Command be treated as "Quarters" cases.

3. Personnel who have had uncomplicated acute gonorrhea will be restricted to their bivouac area for a period of two weeks following cessation of treatment to guard against transmission of disease to the Civilian population.

4. Par. I, 1 (1), Circular Letter No. 28, Office of the Surgeon, Hq., MATOUSA, dated 20 August 1943, directs that patients who fail to show satisfactory response to one course of sulfathiazole or sulfadiazine will be hospitalized not later than the fifth day following completion of the course. Several instances in which this directive has not been followed in this Command have been brought to the attention of this Headquarters. Under no circumstances will this directive be ignored in the future.

I - HYGIENE AND SANITATION

1. Existing Army Regulations and other directives for sanitation will be enforced by all unit commanders and medical officers whose responsibility for the health of the command is prescribed in paragraphs 2a., and 2b., AR 40-205 and paragraphs 5a. and 5b., FM 21-10.

2. a. Malaria is the largest single medical problem on the Island of Sardinia where its incidence is said to be the third highest in the world. Mosquito control measures will be promptly carried out as directed by par. 20e and f. AR 40-205; pars. 55 and 43, FM 21-10, and by subsequent directives from this and higher headquarters. Malaria occurs to some extent throughout the year.

b. Typhoid fever, and to a lesser extent, Undulant fever, are endemic in Sardinia. Troops will be strictly prohibited from the use of unauthorized drinking water. Foods of any kind other than those prepared and served in supervised army or navy messes shall be considered unauthorized. Permanent food handlers from attached Italian units will be examined carefully before being employed in Allied messes. Typhoid carrier suspects should be relieved from food handler's duties of any kind.

c. Respiratory disease incidence is normally seasonal, but a high incidence of Diphtheria occurs among children and young adults in Sardinia. Special care should be paid to all cases of nasopharyngitis or laryngitis, and diphtheria borne in mind in making each diagnosis.

d. Venereal disease control measures are the responsibility of organization commanders (Par 1, AR 40-435), and will be strictly enforced in all phases, including instruction of troops, semi-monthly physical inspections, use of mechanical and chemical prophylactic units, and maintenance of unit prophylactic stations. Prophylactic stations will be operated and maintained in town areas which are frequented by Allied troops. These stations will be operated by Allied medical personnel and are the responsibility of those unit commanders whose troops frequent, and are located near, the area in question.

3. Vaccinations and inoculations of all personnel will be kept current at all times, records being maintained to show that this has been done.

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Memo. No. 20-1. (Cont'd).

II - HOSPITALIZATION

1. a. Two American hospitals are established for the care of Allied troops on Sardinia. The 60th Station Hospital is located Cagliari; the 15th Field Hospital is located at Alghero.

b. Limited hospitalization facilities are available in the British naval hospital at La Maddalena. All patients from this area should be hospitalized at Alghero or Cagliari unless the condition of the patient prohibits further evacuation. Such cases which are evacuated to British hospital facilities will be accompanied by a properly filled out Emergency Medical Tag. The hospital authorities will enter the diagnosis on the back of the tag, which will accompany the patient back to U.S. control (duty or further hospitalization). Additional forms and clinical records may accompany the patient to duty or to an American hospital. For patients returned to duty, the unit surgeon will enter a final note on the back of the EMT, attach any other records received from the hospital, and forward with the Sick and Wounded Report for the month in which the patient returned to duty.

c. Italian military and civil hospitals are in many localities of the island, but will be used only in emergencies when time and transportation does not permit use of Allied hospital facilities.

2. Because of the limited number of hospital beds and the difficulties of evacuation and return of patients, it is desired that the unit surgeon treat as many minor cases on a quarters status as his professional judgement will allow. Where equipment and personnel permit, small dispensaries should be operated for the care of patients carried on quarters status.

3. a. Outpatient laboratory facilities are available at 60th Station hospital on Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday ONLY. Darkfield examinations will be done only in the mornings of the same days.

b. The 15th Field Hospital outpatient laboratory will be available on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. Darkfield examinations are not available.

4. Hospital dental clinics will accept patients only by appointment, except those cases classed as emergencies and sent in with an EMT.

5. Ambulance Service, in emergencies, can be furnished by the American hospitals at the discretion of the hospital commanding officer or his designated representative.

II - MEDICAL SUPPLIES

1. Medical supplies will be procured in accordance with directives issued by the Commanding Officer, 310th Service Group.

IV - SUBMISSION OF MEDICAL REPORTS AND RECORDS

1. General. Reports will be submitted by unit surgeons and hospitals in compliance with existing air force and ground force directives. Consolidation of reports by higher echelons will conform to standard procedures. Units giving medical service to other organizations not having medical personnel will include such organizations in their reports. All reports giving name and strength of organizations will be classified "SECRET" and will be so handled.

a. Patients admitted to dispensaries maintained by UNIT surgeons, will be carried on quarters status and may be admitted from other units having medical personnel, accompanied by an FMT. Patients arriving from such units without an FMT will be tagged by the dispensary and the carbon copy returned to the unit surgeon concerned. If patient is later hospitalized, the FMT will accompany him and the unit will be notified of such disposition. THE DISPENSARY SURGEON WILL CAREY, ON HIS REPORTS, AS QUARTERS CASES, ONLY THOSE PATIENTS FROM HIS OWN UNIT AND THOSE UNITS NOT HAVING MEDICAL PERSONNEL.

2. Reports to Allied Garrison of Sardinia

a. Information copies of the following reports will be submitted to the Surgeon, Allied Garrison of Sardinia:

- (1) Weekly Statistical Telegraphic Report
- (2) Monthly Report on VD AGO Form 86 a
- (3) Monthly Report on VD AGO Form 86c
- (4) Monthly Report of Venereal Disease

(Colored personnel will be shown separately in the report, and separate rates will be computed for colored and white troops).

b. Special Reports. The following will be submitted direct to the Surgeon, Allied Garrison of Sardinia:

- (1) Individual Report of Venereal Disease Case and Contact. (Two copies)
- (2) Special Report of Epidemic disease. (Submit by telephone, radio, or special courier)

c. Hospitals will submit usual reports through normal channels except for desired information copies and special reports listed above.

d. Prompt submission of accurate reports will be of much assistance in the control of venereal and epidemic diseases. Careful questioning of new venereal disease cases when preparing the special Venereal Disease Report will aid in apprehension of diseased prostitutes.

V - DEATHS

1. Upon occurrence of death of Allied Military personnel, the Q.M. Graves Registration Office, Headquarters 310th Service Group, in Cagliari, will be notified at once.

VI - MEDICAL CARE OF TROOPS OTHER THAN AMERICAN

1. British troops who have not unit medical personnel will be cared for by the nearest Allied medical service. Hospitalization will be in Allied hospitals except as directed in Section II paragraph 1, this memorandum.

2. Italian troops under operational control of the Allied Garrison of Sardinia will, insofar as possible, have their own medical establishments and personnel. Those small units who have no organization dispensary will be cared for by Allied dispensaries. Hospital cases will be referred, or, in emergencies, transported to the nearest Italian military hospital.

- b. This Stockade is for the confinement of prisoners of the following categories from organizations under the jurisdiction of the Commanding General, Allied Garrison of Sardinia, and from all other U. S. Army organizations which are located in the Allied Garrison of Sardinia.

- (1) General prisoners pending transfer to M.I.T.O.U.S.A. Disciplinary Training Center.
- (2) Garrison prisoners with sentence not exceeding six months.
- (3) Prisoners who have been tried and sentenced to be dishonorably discharged but whose cases are awaiting review or confirmation.
- (4) Enlisted men awaiting trial who are charged with serious offenses where Courts-Martial are likely to be recommended following investigations.
- (5) Absentees, deserters, and prisoners arrested by Allied Garrison of Sardinia Military Police pending disposition by the Provost Marshal General.
- (6) Garrison prisoners detained, including all persons lawfully in the custody of the guard except those who have been arraigned or sentenced by Court Martial.
- (7) Allied civilians arrested under authority of the Provost Marshal General.

- c. Confinement of French or British personnel will be at such place as the Senior Tactical Commanding Officer of the respective unit shall direct.
- d. The place of confinement to be designated on Courts-Martial Orders for garrison prisoners to be confined in this stockade will be the Allied Garrison of Sardinia Stockade.

2. The Allied Garrison of Sardinia Stockade will be under the supervision of the Commanding Officer, 310th Service Group.

3. Operation.

a. Permanent stockade guards will be furnished by the units as directed by this headquarters. Enlisted men furnished to guard prisoners must be of good character, efficient and entirely trustworthy. They will be placed on Detached Service for the period of their assignment with the 310th Service Group and will be returned to their parent organizations when such assignment is terminated.

b. Prisoners to be confined in the Allied Garrison of Sardinia Stockade must be accompanied by a written confinement order, signed by a commissioned officer which contains the following information:

Disciplinary Training Center, Cran, Algeria and their Service Records and allied papers indorsed in accordance with Paragraph 3 d (3), Section II, Circular Number 36, Headquarters, MATOUS., dated 17 March 1944 as amended by Circular 65, Headquarters, MATOUS., dated 9 May 1944. The Service Records and allied papers will be forwarded to the Commanding Officer, 310th Service Group, APO 650, U. S. Army, by letter of transmittal, in time to accompany the prisoners to the MATOUS. Disciplinary Training Center.

UNIFORM REGULATIONS

I -- UNITED STATES TROOPS

1. The uniform as prescribed by Section I, Circular Number 24, NATOUSA, 1 March 1944 as amended by Section IV, Circular Number 42, NATOUSA, 26 March 1944 will be worn by all United States personnel stationed in Sardinia.
2. Cotton or wool uniform will be prescribed in AGS bulletins at appropriate times.
3. Work uniforms may be worn by enlisted men only when engaged in tasks requiring the use of such clothing or when within the limits of their bivouac area. Work uniforms will be worn by officers only on occasions prescribed in par 11a AR 600-40.
4. Flying clothing will not be worn by other than flying personnel at any time and by them only as prescribed in Par 8d AR 600-40, as amended by Changes 16 AR 600-40, 29 April 1943.
5. Attention is invited to Par 2f Circular Number 24, NATOUSA, dated 1 March 1944, prohibiting wearing uniforms or parts of uniforms of foreign nations by United States personnel.
6. Neckties need not be worn. Par 31b, C-1, AR 600-40, 14 August 1942.
7. When the shirt is worn as an outer garment sleeves will not be rolled up during hours of darkness. When sleeves are rolled up during duty hours they will be rolled neatly above the elbows.
8. During the period for which cotton uniforms are prescribed the helmet, fibre, cloth covered (sun helmet) may be worn by individuals not in formation. (Par 30i, C-1, AR 600-40, 14 August 1942)

1. The uniform as prescribed by Section I, Circular Number 24, NATOUSA, 1 March 1944 as amended by Section IV, Circular Number 42, NATOUSA, 26 March 1944 will be worn by all United States personnel stationed in Sardinia.

2. Cotton or wool uniform will be prescribed in AGS bulletins at appropriate times.

3. Work uniforms may be worn by enlisted men only when engaged in tasks requiring the use of such clothing or when within the limits of their bivouac area. Work uniforms will be worn by officers only on occasions prescribed in par 11a AR 600-40.

4. Flying clothing will not be worn by other than flying personnel at any time and by them only as prescribed in Par 8d AR 600-40, as amended by Changes 16 AR 600-40, 29 April 1943.

5. Attention is invited to Par 2f Circular Number 24, NATOUSA, dated 1 March 1944, prohibiting wearing uniforms or parts of uniforms of foreign nations by United States personnel.

6. Neckties need not be worn. Par 31b, C-1, AR 600-40, 14 August 1942.

7. When the shirt is worn as an outer garment sleeves will not be rolled up during hours of darkness. When sleeves are rolled up during duty hours they will be rolled neatly above the elbows.

8. During the period for which cotton uniforms are prescribed the helmet, fibre, cloth covered (sun helmet) may be worn by individuals not in formation. (Par 301, C-1, AR 600-40, 14 August 1942)

9. Mixed uniforms, that is, uniforms composed of cotton and woolen outer garments, or work clothing mixed with uniform clothing, will not be worn at any time.

II --BRITISH TROOPS

1. Uniform regulations for British troops stationed in Sardinia will be promulgated by the senior British tactical commander in Sardinia.

III- FRENCH TROOPS

1. Uniform regulations for French troops attached to 42nd Wing (US) will be issued by the senior French tactical commander of these troops with the approval of the Commanding General, 42nd Wing (US).

ADMINISTRATIVEPROCESSING COURT-MARTIAL CASES

1. Court Martial records maintained through these headquarters indicate that there has been undue delay in the processing of Court Martial cases. The following are noted among the causes of delays:

- a. Charges not preferred within one day after an accused is confined or restrained.
- b. Delay by Investigating Officer in making his investigation and making his report.
- c. Delay in referring case to trial and in the trial thereof.
- d. Delay in preparation of the record of trial for action by the Reviewing Authority.

2. The 70th Article of War provides that when any person subject to Military Law is placed in arrest or confinement, immediate steps will be taken to try the person accused or to dismiss the charges and release him. In no case should a person be confined in a guardhouse longer than 48 hours without having charges preferred against him. The same article of War subjects to punishment any officer responsible for unnecessary delay in investigating or carrying the case to a final conclusion.

3. The commanding officer of an accused has the primary responsibility for the preferment of charges. Ordinarily, charges will be preferred and forwarded within one day of the commission of the offense (or the discovery of the offender). The investigation of serious cases will be thorough and ordinarily will be completed within three days, and where such action is necessary, forwarded to the officer exercising General Court-Martial jurisdiction over the accused, within one day thereafter. Each intervening commanding officer will immediately act upon and forward the charges, together with his recommendations to the action to be taken thereon.

4. Summary court cases should be tried and the record completed within one day after the offense. Trial by special court-martial (if charges are not forwarded to the officer exercising general court-martial jurisdiction) should ordinarily be effected, if there has been an investigation, within six days of the offense.

b. Delay by Investigating Officer in making his report.

c. Delay in referring case to trial and in the trial thereof.

d. Delay in preparation of the record of trial for action by the Reviewing Authority.

2. The 70th Article of War provides that when any person subject to Military Law is placed in arrest or confinement, immediate steps will be taken to try the person accused or to dismiss the charges and release him. In no case should a person be confined in a guardhouse longer than 48 hours without having charges preferred against him. The same article of War subjects to punishment any officer responsible for unnecessary delay in investigating or carrying the case to a final conclusion.

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4. Summary court cases should be tried and the record completed within one day after the offense. Trial by special court-martial (if charges are not forwarded to the officer exercising general court-martial jurisdiction) should ordinarily be effected, if there is soon an investigation, within six days of the commission of the offense; if the case involves no investigation, three days should be sufficient. The record in the case should be completed and forwarded within two days after trial. The record of trial by general court-martial should, in practically all instances, be completed within seven days after the trial and forwarded within twenty-four hours thereafter to the officer exercising general court-martial jurisdiction.

5. Delays in cross of those noted above will be explained by each officer concerned in the time data sheet accompanying the charges.

6. Disciplinary action, to be most effective, must be prompt, and unnecessary delays will be avoided in this command.

When such cases arise they will be referred to the Commanding Officer concerned to the Commanding Officer, 310th Service Group for trial.

2. Summary Court-Martial Jurisdiction.

a. These matters not having Summary court-martial jurisdiction and over whom there is no commander in their immediate chain of command in a chain exercising such jurisdiction shall be referred to the trial by Summary court-martial to the nearest commander having such jurisdiction. Commanders in whom Summary court-martial cases are referred will try them at the earliest practicable date.
