TO : Colonel Clayton P. Kerr

1. During my last trip to your headquarters Major Rose discussed with me the possibility of assigning Colonel Kessner to A.F.H.Q. in a liaison capacity. Nothing further has been learned of that prospect and, since the group here in Sardinia doubtless will be reduced in strength as the completion of the evacuation approaches, it seems appropriate to consider the various possibilities involved.

2. Colonel Kessner has requested permission to discuss the matter of his assignment with you and it has my unqualified approval. Of course I have no knowledge of any of the details to which matters of this nature must be subjected. However, in this period of what might be called one of reorganisation in this Theatre, it would seem desirable that, in any shuffle, the readjustment should improve the appropriate nature of assignments.

3. If the present rate of shipping continues, which contemplates a movement of over 15,000 troops to the mainland by 30 September 1944, this office should be able to carry on with three officers exclusive of Major Fossett and Lieutenant De Stefano who will be working on supply. Please advise if there is any specific information needed in connection with this matter.



SUBJECT: Shipment of Italian Troops from Corsica to Sardinia

TO : Commanding General, Italian Forces in Sardinia

1. The following is an extract of the report of Lieut Colonel Kessner, requested by Lieut Colonel Costantino in his conference with Colonel Simmons yesterday.

"On 16 May I conferred with General Lazzarini. He is very anxious to return to Sardinia but before leaving there are several problems to be settled.

a. French authorities now claim some or all of the trucks which were originally agreed on as belonging to Italians and marked TX. General Lazzarini claims that the French have no right to these trucks (about 30) and that some individuals were only asserting the claim to make trouble.

b. There are still outstanding claims against the Italians for damages sustained by French civilians. General Lazzarini states that on basis of previously allowed claims, the average settlement was 35% of the amount claimed. He is willing to pay 40% and withdraw the Italian officers from the claim commission because of possible violence.

c. Italian civilian and military personnel are being held by the French authorities without justification. They are badly treated. In many cases he cannot learn the names of the people or charges on which they are held.

d. At request of the AAO, General Lazzarini will leave a small staff in Corsica, consisting of a Lieut Colonel, Doctor, Chaplain, Administrator, some additional officers and enlisted men. These people are to administer to the Jugo-Slavs and windup affairs. The general has requested that some American personnel be quartered at Italian headquarters to avoid possible incidents.

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e. He, General Lasciarini, is retaining approximately 40 automobile drivers and mechanics in Corsica until the matter of the trucks is cleared up.

f. Thru other sources I was informed that there are approximately 300 Italian troops still on the island. The exact number is unknown. Some men have married French women and want to stay. Some men are in the interior and their exact locations could not be ascertained. Some men, particularly auto drivers are desired by the French. Exact numbers of men shipped and retained were not available."

1. As of the signals given to your office, the following units arrived between May 13-15:

2. Afterward the 7th Army Corps stated that 18 officers and 18 EM, reported as part of the 510th Bn T.M. and 7 officers and 7 EM reported as part of the 511th Bn T.M. were instead personnel destined for the Yugo-Slav Labor Companies, which were returning to Sardinia as ordered.

3. At the same time the same HQ signaled the arrival, in addition, of 67 other servicemen from various units.

For the signals received from General Lazzarini, the following is the strength as communicated to you with the amendments of para 2 above.

4. Considering:

-that the organic strength of the units doesn't agree with that of the specified strength.

-that the units coming from Corsica have in their strength many servicemen; whom, either

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- of embarkation, were attached to these units and consequently, have nothing in common with them.
- that it is necessary to arrange the identification of many of those attached servicemen.
  - that many are assigned to Eq units and larger units still in Sardinia.
  - that it is advisable to send to the Continent organic units and, as much as possible homogeneous.

I suggest that it is advisable to reorganize in Sardinia the units coming from Corsica and not to send them to the Continent in their present disorganized forms.

5. I add that although the same units, reaching Cagliari organized and with the same strength as that with they left Corsica, if your Hq deem it necessary to ship them immediately, it can be done without delay.

6. As an example I state:

a. In the strength of the 491st Field Hospital are included:  
-2 officers, in the hospital, 2 medical officers sent to Corsica on special mission as requested by your Hq.  
37 medical EM given of necessity to a Field Hospital operating in Corsica.

b. In the strength of the 1st Autogroup recently organized, when sent from Sardinia, were 46 servicemen belonging to Infantry and Artillery units of the Friuli Division now in Sardinia, and 30 other servicemen, automobile specialists, also belonging to units which are part of the VII Army Corps.

MEMO TO: Colonel Simmons

RE : Shipment of 158 Foreign Origin Italian Troops to Corsica  
Shipment of Italian Troops in Corsica to Mainland thru  
Sardinia

a. On 16 May I conferred with Lieut Col James, G-3 NORBS, and arranged to have him pick up the 158 troops on 16 May 1000-1050 hours at Bonifacio, Corsica.

b. If possible he will send their clothing to Sardinia for salvage.

c. He requests additional 600.

d. He has no knowledge of when General Lazzarini will leave Corsica.

e. On 17 May I inspected unit. There were 158 men on lists held by the officer in charge but actually only 154 Jugo-Slavs were present. Of the additional men to complete the list of 158-one was in the hospital, two were retained by their original organizations for Court-Martial and one was found to be not of Jugo-Slav origin and therefore excluded. One additional man was expected to rejoin his company which had previously been sent to Corsica. I informed the officer in charge that this last man was to be counted in the quota of 158 and that three additional men should be procured before sailing, which he promised to do. It is interesting to note that the men included in the lists but not sent were all unavailable at the time the organizations were instructed to form the group.

f. On 18 May I checked with Captain Cowall who informed me that the group had left Sardinia as scheduled. Numbers were not available.

g. On 18 May I conferred with General Lazzarini. He is anxious to return to Sardinia but before leaving, there are several problems to be settled.

a. French authorities now claim some or all of the trucks which were originally agreed on as belonging to Italians and marked TX. General Lazzarini claims that the French have no right to these trucks (about 30) and that some individuals were only asserting the claim to make trouble.

b. There are still outstanding claims against the Italians for damages sustained by French civilians. General Lazzarini states that on basis of previously allowed claims, the average settlement was 35% of the amount claimed. He is willing to pay 40% and withdraw the Italian officers from the claim commission because of possible violence.

c. Italian civilian and military personnel are being held by the French authorities without justification. They are badly treated. In many cases he cannot learn the names of the people or charges on which they are held.

d. At request of the AAC, General Lazzarini will leave a small staff in Corsica, consisting of a Lieut Colonel, Doctor, Chaplain, Administrator, some additional officers and enlisted men. These people are to administer to the Jugo-Slavs and windup affairs. The general has requested that some American personnel be quartered at Italian headquarters to avoid possible incidents.

e. He, General Lazzarini, is retaining approximately 40 automobile drivers and mechanics in Corsica until the matter of the trucks is cleared up.

f. General Lazzarini hopes to be able to get to Sardinia on 20 May and then assume command of the 225 Division at Tempio.

3. On 16 May I conferred with Lieut Col McGuire, the AAC.

a. He appears to be well cognizant of the Italian situation.

b. Contemplates a conference with French authorities re trucks. French claim is based on sabotage of vehicles originally turned over to French by Italians in presence of their officers. French claim about 17 Italian trucks to make good the damage. Col McGuire believes he can settle the matter by transfer of 5 or 6 trucks but will try to have all the trucks released to Italians.

c. Col McGuire states AFHQ has ordered that no money now held by General Lazzarini for settlement of claims is to be taken out of Corsica by General Lazzarini. Claims amount to approximately 80,000,000 francs, and the General has a fund of approximately 40,000,000 francs. (I believe the General wants to salvage what he can of this fund)

d. AFHQ has been informed of the prisoners. There are many delicate problems to be solved. General Lazzarini has no responsibility toward civilian prisoners. The whole matter must be

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decided by AFHQ and there is nothing General Lazzarini can do about the matter.

e. Col McGuire believes it to be a good idea to have a small Italian administrative force remain. There have been many complications which may take months to windup. He will arrange to quarter some American personnel at Italian Headquarters to minimize the possibility of incidents.

f. Col McGuire believes there are approximately 300 Italian troops still on the island. The exact number is unknown because the Italians themselves do not know who they have on the island. Some men have married French women and want to stay. Some men are in the interior and their exact locations could not be ascertained. Some men, particularly auto drivers are desired by the French. Some men were not recommended by him for removal and he claims not intended for removal by AFHQ. Exact numbers of men shipped and retained were not available. Col McGuire will try to get the Italians off the island but believes some will be required to stay at the instance of French authorities.

g. Col McGuire believes General Lazzarini is anxious to get away from Corsica, but has no knowledge when he will be able to go.

CERTIFICATE

12 May 1944

I certify that on or about April 26, 1944, shortly after 10 A.M. I was proceeding South from Sanluri, Sardinia in a 1/4 ton C & R truck driven by Sgt Francesco Loiero. Accompanying us was an Italian liaison officer, name not now recalled but believed to be Captain Nicola Cruciolli, Pombo Division. It was raining and the road was wet.

As we approached a point about one mile South of Sanluri, I noticed several trucks parked. It was apparent that an accident had occurred. Neither I nor any of the occupants of my vehicle saw the accident. I instructed my driver to stop, which he did.

An American enlisted man approached me, said he had just had an accident in which a woman was injured and indicated the woman to me. Observing that the condition of the woman required immediate medical treatment, I had her placed in my vehicle accompanied by a man identified as Ussimo Meloni, a friend of the injured woman. I instructed the driver of the vehicle involved in the accident to follow. Our vehicle then proceeded to the Military Hospital at Sanluri where the injured person received medical and surgical treatment. While the injured party was being treated, I questioned the driver and Ussimo Meloni. As soon as I had obtained some information as to what had occurred, I sent two American enlisted men to the scene of the accident to try to locate the drivers of the Italian vehicles who were parked on the road. They later reported these drivers could not be found.

I obtained a signed statement in Italian from Ussimo Meloni which statement was turned over to the driver of the vehicle involved, Leland R. Melvin, ASN 38691519, 1993 Engineers, Gagliari (unit Commander Lieut Middleton). He had been driving Ford Crash Truck # 503579. The statement was witnessed by Captain Cruciolli who certified thereon that the statement was acknowledged as voluntarily given by witness.

I then inspected the above vehicle for any indication of point of impact, but was unable to determine from any visible sign the exact point. The right front fender had a dent at the side. There was a rusted scratch in the dent which supported driver's statement that the dent had been there prior to the accident.

I instructed Melvin to report immediately to his Commanding Officer and submit a complete accident report form. I submitted my name and address to Melvin and to the hospital authorities. The statement of the Carabinieri that I had been a passenger on the truck involved is in error.

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The road where the accident occurred is hard surfaced, about 24 feet wide including approximately 2-3 feet soft shoulder. The Ford truck was stopped facing North on the extreme left (West) of the road with its left wheels on the shoulder. To the best of my recollection the rear of the Ford truck was approximately 25-35 feet North of two Italian trucks which were parked, facing North on the East side of the road.

Colonels James and McGuire state that:

1. There are approximately 2350 Italian troops on Corsica to be shipped. (List of units attached shows 2416)

2. AAO is extremely desirous of removing them from the island because of clashes between French and Italian troops. Fearful that many deaths may occur. Also claims operational necessity makes it advisable to have troops moved at once. Emphasizes urgency. No elaboration on operational necessity.

3. Claimed agreement with General Lazzarini whereby the latter has assumed full responsibility for movement of troops from Bonifacio to Cagliari by using Italian LCT from Bonifacio to San Theresa or Palau if possible.

4. Have set up schedule for removal of troops - 500 per day commencing 13 May 1944.

5. Had not gone into details with General Lazzarini regarding shipping of material or vehicles. Claim troops are equipped to take care of selves in field - 3 days rations. Believed to have 30 vехs.

6. Consider necessity so great that AAO has assumed responsibility for shipment without directive from AFHQ (Latest signal from AFHQ asks for opinion as to feasibility).

7. Have arranged for Control and customs commencing 12 May.

8. Inadvisable, if not impossible, to ship from Porto Vecchio because of friction.

9. Do not know General Lazzarini's plans but admit possibility that Gen Lazzarini may not have approved plans after removing troops from Corsica

2. That I would have to check with Gen Lazzarini as to arrangements made.

3. That question of whether Colonel Simmons would assume authority to accept troops on basis of last signal from AFHQ was open.

Conferred with General Lazzarini

1. Claims he had not accepted responsibility for moving troops from Bonifacio to Cagliari. Intended to send officer to Gen Magli 12 May to arrange plans. Believes he can obtain use of Italian LCT.

2. Personally prefers to move his troops to Bonifacio so he can get them all together and start shipment 17 May.

3. But will start his movement to Bonifacio on 12 May on basis of directive from Allied authorities. (AAO?)

4. Can assume full responsibility for maintaining order at Bonifacio.

5. Inadvisable to ship from Porto Vecchio.

6. No vehicles to be taken. Approximately 9-10 tons materials to be shipped. 3 days rations - troops are equipped to maintain themselves in field.

7. His officer will contact ASC after seeing Gen Magli

Phoned McGuire

1. Notified him of Gen Lazzarini position.

2. He urges necessity of having troops removed and that we do everything possible to facilitate. Advises against massing of Italian troops.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

If Italian authorities can stage troops in vicinity of Palau until 17 May or such other date when shipping is available, agreeable, and priority established, that this plan be adopted, provided that it is decided that authority to accept them can be assumed without further directive from AFHQ

Colonel Capello has personally seen the above type ammunition in a warehouse at Corte - Corsica -. He estimates that there is not more than one ( 2 ton ) truckload. He believes the Italian Authorities can take care of the matter of transporting the ammunition without a request by us for " a certain number of motor vehicles ".

Colonel Capello believes that the office initiating the request should not have made the request at all.

- 1- For your information :  
This type ammunition is packed in a box approximately 40 cm. per 30 per 20 - 2000 cartridge in a box - weight 22 Kg. each box.
- 2- Colonel Capello has received a letter of inquiry from a higher Headquarters to the effect that inquiry had been made an Allied Headquarters ( which one was not apparent ) about 12.000.000 rounds of the above type ammunition. ( The exact figure according to the files in your office is 12.423.000 as of 20 December 1943 ).

The person who sent the figure apparently did not notice that it was listed under a heading of " requirements " and that actually leaving 4.000.000 odd on hand. The exact amount on hand in Sardinia as of 20 February 1944 is 4.529.301, which is slightly more than the balance indicate on the report in your files as of 20 December.

The difference was gained from troops coming to Sardinia from Corsica.

- 3- The Italians have been experimenting with the ammunition used in the British Sten gun. Marking on cartridge WRA 9 mm. They claim this ammunition performs satisfactorily in their Beretta rifle and is a possible source for future supply. ( See par 209 J Handbook on Italian Military Forces )
