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SECTION I - RECISIONS.

1. Letter, this headquarters, dated 17 October 1946, subject: "Internal Security," is hereby rescinded.
2. Letter, this headquarters, dated 28 October 1946, subject: "Allied Commission Duty Officer," is hereby rescinded.

SECTION II - ORGANIZATION OF THE PERSONNEL FOR INTERNAL SECURITY.

3. The personnel for internal security will be organized as follows:
 - a. Duty Officer: On duty on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons, all day Sundays and Holidays, and at nights.
 - b. A Duty Clerk: On duty on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons, all day Sundays and Holidays, and at nights.
 - c. Italian Carabinieri: On duty 24 hours each day.

SECTION III - POINTS OF PERSONAL FURNISHING FOR INTERNAL SECURITY.

4. During the normal working day:
 - Italian Carabinieri:
 - (1) Ground Floor Entrance on Via Molise.
 - (2) Main Entrance on Via Veneto.

SECTION II - ORGANIZATION OF THE PERSONNEL FOR INTERNAL SECURITY.

3. The personnel for internal security will be organized as follows:
- a. Duty Officer: On duty on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons, all day Sundays and Holidays, and at nights.
 - b. A Duty Clerk: On duty on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons, all day Sundays and Holidays, and at nights.
 - c. Italian Carabinieri: On duty 24 hours each day.

SECTION III - POSTS OF PERSONNEL ASSIGNED FOR INTERNAL SECURITY.

4. During the normal working day:
- a. Italian Carabinieri:
 - (1) Ground Floor Entrance on Via Melise.
 - (2) Main Entrance on Via Veneto.
 - b. At times other than during the normal working day:
 - (1) At night.
 - (2) Duty Officer: In the Duty Officer's Room, the room to the left of the ascent of the main stairway, on the 1st Floor.
 - (3) Duty Clerk: At the Main Entrance to the Allied Commission Building.
 - (4) Italian Carabinieri:
 - (a) Two (2) Carabinieri will be posted at the Main Entrance to the Allied Commission Building during the entire night, one of whom will patrol the 2d, 3d, and 4th Floors at least once each hour.
 - (b) Two (2) Carabinieri will be posted on the outside of the Allied Commission Building until 2300 hours, after which time, one of whom will be admitted to the Building for the purpose of patrolling the 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th Floors, at least once each hour.
 - (5) On Wednesday afternoons:
 - (1) Duty Officer: In the office of the Chief Commissioner.
 - (2) Duty Clerk: At the Main Entrance to the Allied Commission Building.
 - (3) Italian Carabinieri:
 - (a) Two (2) Carabinieri will be posted at the Main Entrance to the Allied Commission Building, one of whom will patrol the 2d, 3d, and 4th Floors at least once each hour.
 - (b) One (1) Carabinieri will patrol the 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th

Floors continued.

(1) One (1) Carabinieri will be posted on the outside of the Allied Commission building.

c. On Saturday afternoons:

(1) Duty Officer: In the Duty Officer's Room, the room to the left of the ascent of the main stairway, on the 1st Floor.

(2) Duty Clerk: As at night, not on Wednesday afternoons.

(3) Italian Carabinieri: As on Wednesday afternoons.

d. On Sundays and Holidays:

(1) Duty Officer: As on Saturday afternoons.

(2) Duty Clerk: As on Saturday afternoons.

(3) Italian Carabinieri: As on Saturday afternoons.

SECTION IV - DUTIES OF DUTY AND INTERNAL SECURITY PERSONNEL.

6. DUTY OFFICER:

a. To report promptly for duty.

b. To remain at his post until properly relieved.

c. To act promptly upon any verbal orders given to him by the Chief Commissioner, or by his authorized representative, who are:

(1) The Executive Commissioner.

(2) The Executive Officer (A).

(3) The Executive Officer (B).

(4) The Adjutant, Allied Commission.

or, if he is unable to comply with the order given to him during his tour of duty, he will pass it on for completion to the officer who relieves him.

d. To insure that only authorized personnel are admitted to the Allied Commission Building during off-duty hours.

(e) All top secret cables and personal mail or cables addressed to Admiral Stone will be sent unopened to the Chief Commissioner's residence at 56 Via Gallustiana, and delivered to Lt. Rogers, Sgt. Lane, or Admiral Stone personally.

by telephone to:

(1) The Adjutant or Executive Officer (A) or (B).

(2) or, in their absence, to the Executive Commissioner.

h. To raise the American and British Flags before 0800 hours, each morning and to lower them at 1800 hours each evening.

i. To insure that all internal security personnel are performing their duties as detailed in this order.

7. DUTY CLERK:

a. To report promptly for duty.

b. To remain at his post until properly relieved.

c. To lock the main door promptly at 1600 hours on Wednesday, at 1400

Commission Building during off-duty hours.

(c) All top secret cables and personal mail or cables addressed to Admiral Stone will be sent unopened to the Chief Commissioner's residence at 56 Via Gallustiana, and delivered to Lt. Rogers, Sgt. Lens, or Admiral Stone personally.

- i. To insure that all internal security personnel are performing their duties as detailed in this order.

7. DUTY CLERK:

- a. To report promptly for duty.
- b. To remain at his post until properly relieved.
- c. To lock the main door promptly at 1600 hours on Wednesday, at 1400 hours on Saturday, and at 1000 hours on work day evenings, and to keep it locked on Sunday and holidays.
- d. To admit personnel to the building only as authorized by the Duty Officer.
- e. To retain the keys to the main door in his possession. If it is necessary to leave his post in the course of duty, he will hand the keys over to the Duty Officer.
- f. To report any unusual circumstances promptly to the Duty Officer.
- g. To inform the Duty Officer of any failure of the Italian Carabinieri to perform their duties.
- h. To report to the Duty Officer for instructions in any case not covered by this order.
- i. To require all visitors to the Allied Commission Building to state their business and the person or office they are calling on, after which a telephonic call will be made to the person or office to determine whether or not it is desired that the visitor be admitted. If the telephonic call fails to verify the fact that the visitor should be admitted, he will be courteously refused admittance and asked to return during the normal working day.
- j. To record the names of all visitors to the Allied Commission Building.

8. ITALIAN CARABINIERI:

- a. To report promptly for duty.

1. To prevent any large packages from entering the building or being placed in the near vicinity of the building. If American or British military personnel are involved, the Duty Officer will be summoned immediately.

2. To search all packages being carried from the building. If American or British military personnel are involved, the Duty Officer will be summoned immediately.

3. To report to the Duty Officer for instructions in any case not covered by this order.

4. To prevent any large packages from entering the building or being placed in the near vicinity of the building. If American or British military personnel are involved, the Duty Officer will be summoned immediately.

5. To search all packages being carried from the building. If American or British military personnel are involved, the Duty Officer will be summoned immediately.

SECTION V - PERSONS AUTHORIZED TO ENTER THE ALLIED COMMISSION BUILDING DURING OFF-DUTY HOURS.

1. The Duty Officer is authorized to admit the following personnel to the Allied Commission Building during off-duty hours.

a. Any Allied Commission Officer, or any Allied officer, whose office is in the Allied Commission Building.

b. Any Enlisted Man or Other Rank, when accompanied by an Allied Commission Officer or by an Allied officer whose office is in the Allied Commission Building.

c. Any Enlisted Man, Other Rank, or civilian when in possession of a pass signed by an Allied Commission Officer or an Allied officer whose office is in the Allied Commission Building, when authenticated by the Adjutant, Allied Commission.

d. Telephone operators with proper identification and authenticated passes.

e. Cleaning personnel with proper identification and authenticated passes.

f. Personnel of the Allied Forces Microfilm Depot with proper identification.

g. Movement, when in possession of proper identification and authenticated passes, or when entrance is requested by the Public Relations Officer, Allied Commission, or by the Public Relations Officer, AFUSA, in person.

h. Military Police personnel when on duty.

10. All passes for admission of Enlisted Men, Other Ranks, or civilians to enter the Allied Commission Building during off-duty hours will be authenticated by the Adjutant, Allied Commission, and will be submitted for authentication in duplicate, on the form attached hereto as Inclosure No. 1.

- c. Any Enlisted Man, Other Rank, or civilian who in possession of a pass is seen by an Allied Commission Officer or an Allied Officer whose office is in the Allied Commission Building, when authenticated by the Adjutant, Allied Commission.
- d. Telephone operators with proper identification are authenticated passes.
- e. Clearing personnel with proper identification and authenticated passes.
- f. Personnel of the Allied Forces Pier-Film Depot with proper identification.
- g. However, when in possession of proper identification and authenticated passes, or when admittance is requested by the Public Relations Officer, Allied Commission, or by the Public Relations Officer, TROUSA, in person.
- h. Military Police personnel when on duty.

10. All passes for admittance of Enlisted Men, Other Ranks, or civilians to enter the Allied Commission Building during off-duty hours will be authenticated by the Adjutant, Allied Commission, and will be submitted for authentication in duplicate, on the form attached hereto as Inclosure No. 1.

VI - PROCEEDURE IN CASE OF FIRE.

11. In case a fire is discovered in the Allied Commission Building, the person first observing it will:

- Shout warning in general terms.
- Attempt to extinguish the fire.
- Notify the Duty Officer by telephone, or otherwise.

12. The Duty Officer will:

- Proceed immediately to the scene of the fire, and organize such personnel and appliances as are available in order to control or extinguish the fire.
- If unable to extinguish the fire, he will call the Fire Department at telephone number 66366.
- Detail the auto-telcord operator to get off the fire alarm and to notify any persons who may be in the building at the time.
- Organize the Organization as a guard to prevent all persons from entering the Building, except:
 - The Chief Commissioner.
 - The Executive Commissioner.
 - The Executive Officer (A) or (R).
 - The Headquarters Commandant.
 - Fire Department personnel.
 - Military Police personnel.
 - The Commanding Officer, Town Area, WTCUS.

c. When the Duty Officer desires the vehicle, he will call telephone number 66258 for the American Motor Pool, or telephone number 843078 for the British Motor Pool.

d. Vehicles will be furnished for one week at a time, as indicated below:

23 to 29 December	By the British Motor Pool.
30 December to 5 January	By the American Motor Pool.
6 to 12 January	By the British Motor Pool.
13 to 19 January	By the American Motor Pool.
20 to 26 January	By the British Motor Pool.
27 January to 2 February	By the American Motor Pool.
3 to 9 February	By the British Motor Pool.
10 to 16 February	By the American Motor Pool.
17 to 23 February	By the British Motor Pool.

Later, as indicated by notice published in the Daily Bulletin.

17. Instructions to the Carabinieri when going on duty:

a. The Duty Officer will insure that the Carabinieri are properly instructed when they assume their post of duty. A supply of these orders, translated into Italian, will be available to the Duty Officer.

18. Instructions to personnel reporting for duty with the Allied Commission, during off-duty hours:

a. Personnel: Refer to the Hotel Management Section, Hotel Varesio, telephone number 47438, for reporting between the hours of 0800 and 2000; after 2000 hours, refer to the Hotel Varesio.

b. British personnel: Refer to Headquarters Company, 71 (6th) Regiment, LC, Fort 8 Italia, telephone number 66354.

c. American personnel: Refer to the Zone Commandant at either LC telephone number 44, or the Zone 4 Victoria, telephone number 45741.

d. Other personnel: Refer to the British Detachment, Fort 8 Italia, telephone number 47438.

19. Transportation:

a. If a request is made for transportation by military personnel who are not members of the Allied Commission, the request will be referred to:

- (1) Americans: American Motor Pool, telephone number 66258.
- (2) British: British Motor Pool, telephone number 843078.

20. When the Post of Duty by the Duty Officer or by the Duty Clerk:
 a. The Duty Officer is authorized to excuse the Duty Clerk from his post
 of duty for a short period.

b. When the Duty Officer is temporarily absent from his post of duty,
 for inspections or other reasons, he will insure that the Duty Clerk is present in
 the Duty Officer's Room to answer the telephone.

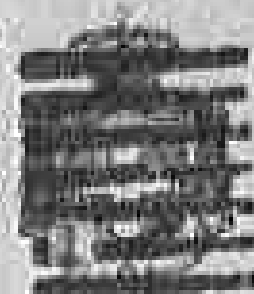

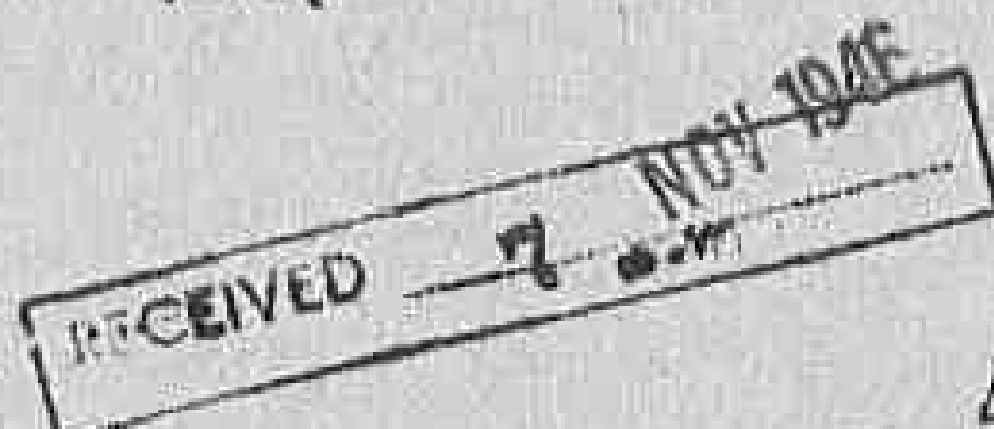

LONG DISTANCE CALLS.

1. Effective 1 September 1946 full delay working will be introduced at Rome Long Distance exchange, This will necessitate subscribers booking ALL Long Distance calls with the recording operator. The Subscriber will then be rung back in the normal manner. No calls will be connected on demand.
2. The procedure for obtaining Long Distance calls will thus be amended as follows:
 - (a) Dial 9 - the recording operator will now answer and not the Rome L. D. operator as before.
 - (b) The recording operator will take full particulars of the required and calling parties and allocate a booking number. This number should be carefully noted for possible future reference regarding progress of the booked call.
 - (c) The calling party will then be rung back as soon as possible.

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1. The MILLOCARIAN ATHLETIC CLUB was formed in 1930 with the sanction of the three Commandants of Woolwich, Sandhurst, and Cranwell, in order to encourage cadets to continue with Athletics after they had joined their Regiments.

2. Between 1931-1939 the club won many successes on the track notably in the A.A.A. Championships, the Kinnaird Trophy, the "News of the World" Whit Monday Games, besides having representatives in the Olympic Games of 1932 and 1936.

3. Now after six years of war, it is hoped to revive the activities of the Club, and this can only be done by obtaining new members who can take the place of those who have lost their lives during the War or are no longer able to compete.

4. The pre-war qualifications for joining were briefly as follows:-

"Open to all serving officers and cadets of the Royal Navy, Army and Royal Air Force provided that:-

- (i) They obtained representative Colours at their Service Cadet Colleges or
- (ii) They obtained College Colours at an English University or
- (iii) They represented their Service at the Inter Services Meeting.
- (iv) All other candidates for election may have their names submitted to the Secretary by a member of the Club, if it is considered that their athletic standard warrants their election, and that the Club would benefit by their inclusion. Records of their Athletic Abilities must be forwarded with their recommendation".

SUBJECT: Telephone Service

TO : All Units

1. Under provisions of new Civil Affairs Agreement entered into by Allied Forces in Italy with the Italian Government, the Allied Forces will be responsible for payment of all telephone services rendered, by actual dollar and pound credits.

2. In view of above policy and in accordance with current directives drastic reductions in existing telephone services will be affected. Most important amongst these are outlined hereunder for the information of all concerned:

a. Military-requisitioned Hotels to have one (1) military telephone, to be located in the Hotel Manager's Office to be used by military personnel for transaction of Official Business, both local and long distance. Each person using telephone for outgoing calls will be required to sign roster maintained by Hotel Manager, listing name and telephone number of person called. Personal calls made by residents of Hotels from room-extension telephones, will be furnished by the Civil Management of the Hotel, through their regular civilian facilities. Any charge for these calls will be by agreement between the civilian management and individual subscribers, based upon standard rates.

b. Discontinuance of the following services:

(1) Billet telephones, except as authorized, in accordance with paragraph 3, page iii, current RAAC Telephone Directory.

(2) Telephones in Officers', ES's, Sgts' or OR's messes.

(3) Access of press correspondents to military long distance service.

3. Signal Officer, this Headquarters, will take necessary action to affect above changes and all necessary personnel should be apprised of contents of this letter.

Notes on visit made by U.S.A.M.S. during period 20 - 25 June 46.

A. Florence Territorial Command.

1. Visited Florence from 20 - 25 June chiefly for the purpose of carrying on the duties of Capt. Stegeman. One who had been admitted to hospital on 10th June 1946.

2. Captured medical stores for the Italian Army were still arriving from various Allied Commands. Cpt. Florence, M.A.M., was fully occupied in checking and handling over medical stores to Italian Authorities.

3. While in Florence I followed up the police raised during my visit in April and found that:-

1. The D.B.M.S. Hygiene Officer, Territorial Command, were still having difficulty in obtaining transport to enable them to visit medical installations and units with-in the Command.

2. The Foligno Group had handed over part of their barracks (the original medical school barracks) to the Medical School, Florence. There was no need to move this part of the barracks available to accommodate 150 Medical Students.

3. Buildings were still in possession of 5 buildings to institute Chemical Pharmaceutical matters but, at the time of my visit, were clearing part of one building preparatory to handing it back to the Military.

4. The overcrowding at the clinic had now been eased and the conditions can now be considered as fair.

Remarks by U.S.A.M.S.

As the above points are solely Italian matters I was not in a position to make any observations or suggestions. The continued occupation of the buildings by civilians is seriously hampering the Military in their reconstructing the manufacture of their own dress and dressings - incidentally it is also hampering the civilian, as in previous days the Military sold drugs, etc, to civilian agencies. Until business leaves the institute the machinery arriving from Bergamo has to be stored instead of installed. I asked the local director of hospital to try to arrange for his stores to be installed.

4. The overcrowding at the Siena can have been eased and the conditions can now be considered as fair.

Report by D. L. M. S.

As the above points are solely Italian questions I was not in a position to make any observations or suggestions. The continuous occupation of the buildings by soldiers is seriously handicapping the military in their reconstructing the manufacture of their own arms and dressings - incidentally it is also handicapping the civilians, as in pre-war days the military sold drugs, etc, to civilian agencies. Until soldiers leave the institute the machinery arriving from Germany has to be stored instead of installed. I asked the local Director of Medicine to try to arrange for his stores to be distributed to other centres - I doubt if any help can be obtained by this quarter.

B. Capt. Stephens, M.C., was discharged from St General Hospital on 22nd June 1944.

C. Capt Stephens, M.C., discharge from hospital gave as reason "stress" from duties in Florence. I visited the Territorial Command at Bologna on that day. Major Driver was on tour and I saw Capt Wilson M.C. I also had an interview with the ... and the following points were discussed.

1. The Principal Hospital, Bologna is divided into 3 parts. One part is in Florence and the other parts occupying sections of two schools (both of which have soldiers attending daily) in Bologna. The original Hospital buildings have been damaged and the local Engineers state they can repair them in four or five months. Work cannot be commenced because two floors of the buildings are occupied, and by Engineers Officers and their families and the other by 450 - 550 refugees or displaced persons. There has been considerable agitation by both the towns people and the Church to get the military out of the schools. The D.M.S. has made unsuccessful attempts for the return of the original hospital to both the Minister of War and Minister.

1. The medical, etc., stores are spread out over several original sites but have been damaged and the remains are being carried out by the Engineers - but the work is proceeding very slowly.
2. The Regional Medical Store, Borneo, will be opened shortly.
3. There was no difficulty regarding shipping facilities, it was stated that the demand at OK was sufficient to last 12 months.
4. The Secondary Hospital, Anson, has been badly damaged and only one ward can be used. The remainder of the hospital is occupying a crippled building. Here again there is considerable agitation for the return of the building.

Remarks by R.A.F. V.C.

With the exception of 5 no suggestion could be offered as they are purely Italian matters. As regards 5, it was suggested by R.A.F. V.C. that part of Palcomara barracks be released to the Italian Army for the use as temporary hospital. It is understood that, at present, this barracks is being used as RAF transit camp. (I will speak to the R.A.F. on this point).
