SUBJECT : Charging of captured enemy material.

Reference your Q/1/46 E dated 4th Nov.

I have made exhaustive enquiries from the Ministry of War and Istituto Chimico Farmaceutico Militare, Florence and can find no authority for charging the Italian Army for Medical Supplies of Italian origin.

A search of the files of this branch has only revealed the letter of A.F.H.Q. quoted by you A.C. 386.3 Q(AH)-O of 2nd Oct 1945.

M.M.I.A. letter of 30 Apr 46 and file Q/006 para 3 (a) also refers to such material as being the legal property of the Italian Government.

I have issued instructions that no more medical supplies of Italian origin are to be listed on acceptance notes or passed to you for shipping tickets to be prepared.

In view of this disclosure I shall be glad to know what action you propose to take on vouchers already passed to you and what action should be taken in future when stores of Italian origin are handed over.

Presumably no vouchers have previously been passed to A.F.H.Q.

The Acceptance Notes forwarded with your letter under reply are returned herewith.

Re: Your 1142/41 of 22 May 46.

To An estimated that a medical officer in charge of a hospital or Garrison infirmary is to be given power to grant three months sick leave for men and two months to officers without any restriction.

Re: Mr. Le Poer, while investigating and agreeing with the no above and with the need for a change in the present arrangements, I do feel that the new ones are unnecessarily rigid and might lead to abuses.

I would suggest therefore that Mr. Poer, in charge of Hospital and Garrison Infirmary should be authorised to grant one month's continuous leave and re-employment etc. the same time to himself sufficient an extension to two or three months duration as necessary. Approval of this extended period would really in effect be confirmation and would enable directors to base a check on long periods of continuous leave.

I feel that such control is absolutely necessary and it agreed as suggested above will not hinder the final granting of the leave or entail any undue hardship or clerical work.

If this is so, while appreciating and agreeing with the motives and with the need for a change in the present arrangement, I do feel that the new rules are unsatisfactory fluid and might lead to abuses.

I would suggest therefore that S.C. in charge of hospital and physician facilities should be authorized to grant one month's convalescent leave and recommends it be given twice to their members in extension to two or three months duration as necessary. Approval of this extended period would really in effect be contradictory and would enable officers to keep a check on lengthy periods of convalescent leave.

I feel that such such control is absolutely necessary and if improved as suggested above would not hamper the initial granting of the leave or offend any undue hardship or clerical work.

SUBJECT: Granting of sick leave to Italian Military personnel.

The Ministry of War - Cabinet - is arranging for the bringing up to date of circular 220500/11 of 15.9.45, which regulates the granting of leave to Italian military personnel on the basis of the new necessities determined by the cessation of the state of war.

We submit, therefore, the advisability of revising the regulations regarding the granting of convalescent leaves longer than 14 days, up till now runtable by the medical directors only.

In view of the reduction in the number of military hospitals; the setting up of garrison infirmaries; the distance from them of the H.Q. of the medical directorate, sometimes hundreds of kilometres; the deficiency in the number of beds in the medical establishments, the inconveniences already pointed out because of the putting into effect of the above mentioned procedure are being multiplied for the following reasons:

1) - prolongation of the hospitalisation period with consequent increase in the military rations consumed and crowding of the hospitals whilst awaiting for the leave to be granted by the medical directors;

2) - refusal to accept responsibility on the part of hospital directors who are no longer authorised to grant convalescent leave direct;

3) - prevention of a real and practical check by the medical directors, only possible with a direct examination of the patient and unobtainable because of the distance of the hospitals;

4) - possible irregularities in the proposals for convalescent leave on the part of unit heads, less controlled by the hospital directors and uncontrolled by the medical directors. 5263

It would, therefore, be advisable:

a) - if hospital and garrison infirmary directors were authorised to grant convalescent leave, without previous approval from the medical director, of up to 60 days in the case of officers and up to 90 days for ORs, assuming all responsibility for medico-

- b) - if the medical directors were to control the medico-legal activities of the hospital directors with irregular personal examinations of the troops sent on convalescent leave at the time of their discharge from hospital or garrison infirmary.

We await information as to your decisions on the matter as this Directorate General has to refer them to the Ministry of War - Cabinet.



DISTRIBUTION OF PENICILLIN.

UNRRA penicillin is the only supply officially available in Italy for Italian civilian use.

In Rome, the High Commissioner for Hygiene and Public Health has arranged for the treatment of Italians in need of penicillin in two civilian hospitals. Medical cases are treated at the University Polyclinic under the supervision of Professor Goria and surgical cases at the Monte Verde Hospital under the supervision of Professor Antonucci.

All requests for penicillin should be made to the Medico Provinciale between 9:00 and 10:00 every morning at the Offices of the Ministry of Interior, Piazza Viminale; telephone number 489181 during office hours, or at other times at 32194.

UNRRA keeps no stocks of penicillin, but releases all supplies brought into Italy immediately to the Italian Government.

3. INTRODUCTION.

The Chairman stated that, as the problems under discussion represented in effect the re-birth of the Italian army, he proposed to take this opportunity of making known to Branches of A.T.I.s, the extent of the work involved, all of which could not be carried out by G-3 (Org) and must therefore be handed over in part to other branches. If it appeared that the agenda trespassed into the province of other branches, it was submitted that this might be accepted in the interests of coordination, a function of G-3 (Org).

The old Italian army machine has been largely destroyed. If it were to be made to work to the standard of allied requirements, allied methods might be introduced, but the Italians must be encouraged to do as much as possible themselves. Shortage of equipment, clothing, and accommodation would be the limiting factors in expansion of the army by enlistment.

The Land Forces Sub Commission (LFL) would be asked to give a brief resume of the present state of the Italian army as a forward to discussion of the detailed agenda.

4. RESULT : PRESENT STATE OF THE ITALIAN ARMY

The representative of the Land Forces Sub Commission AC (LFL), Col. Kerr, explained the present breakdown of the strength of the Italian army into categories as required by the Combined Chiefs of Staff. Ceiling figures for categories are shown at appendix 1 to these minutes.

ITI-ITIs were accepted as an International commitment for purposes of administration and supply in so far as the Italian Government were unable to provide for them. Troops of the Carabinieri, Guard Battalions, Allied Commission Security Police, and units used for purely Italian administration, including hospitals, were within this category.

US-ITIs and BR-ITIs were accepted as National Commitments by the United States and Great Britain respectively. US-ITIs were employed by PBS, LFLN Army, and by the Air Corps as Service Troops. BR-ITIs were employed by the British as Combat Troops and as Service Troops.

As part of the ITI-ITI Italian Administration, Territorial, District, and Depot H's had been re-established. These were unable to assist the Allies to any great extent as they were fully occupied in bringing order into the chaos resulting from the Italian defeat. 4. RESUME : PRESENT STATE OF THE ITALIAN ARMY

The representative of the Land Forces Sub Commission A.C. (ITIA), Col. Kerr, explained the present breakdown of the strength of the Italian Army into categories as required by the Combined Chiefs of Staff. Ceiling figures for categories are shown at appendix 1, to these minutes.

US-ITIs and BR-ITIs were accepted as National Commitments by the United States and Great Britain respectively. US-ITIs were employed by PBS, ROME, and by the Air Corps as Service Troops. BR-ITIs were employed by the British as Combat Troops and as Service Troops.

As part of the TRI-ITI Italian Administration, Territorial, District, and Depot H.S had been re-established. These were unable to assist the Allies to any great extent as they were fully occupied in bringing order into the chaos resulting from the Italian defeat. The Italian Army had been ~~broken~~ except army, and these H.S were the only means by which the Italians could ~~be~~ ^{be} brought out the records, of the old army in the old conscription centres.

5. TERRITORIAL, DISTRICT AND DEPOT H.S.

It was decided that Territorial, District and Depot H.S would remain in existence, at least until the Italians had completed all the documentation, records, and purely Italian administrative matters connected with the old army. It was accepted that this work would decrease. The number of H.S would be reviewed at a later date in the light of post-war policy for the Italian Army.

OPTION G-3(Org.)

Territorial H.S would be responsible for District H.S, Depot H.S, and also for the purely Italian Administration carried out by the Administrative Div., H.S. They would look after Italian Army Real Estate, Hospitals, Courts Martial (in conjunction with District H.S), and would represent the War Ministry throughout the areas for which they were responsible. There are at present six Territorial H.S.

In normal cases, Depots were controlled by Districts, but for the present there were some instances where District HQs acted also as Depots. The only assistance which would be given by District HQs to troops in Allied Service would be in documentation of men enlisted into the army, and in matters of discipline.

Depot HQs would be responsible for personal records of all soldiers, for the record of arms and equipment issued to ITI-TTIs, for Regimental records, and for administrative problems connected with repatriates.

The total strength of Territorial District, and Depot HQs would not exceed 2,015 and would count against the ITI-ITI ceiling.

The Land Forces Sub Commission stated that the number of HQs at present agreed (See Appendix 3) would in no way afford the Italian Government the means for reconstituting the Italian Armed Forces on the pre-war scale.

It was agreed that T2/TOS would be produced for Territorial District and Depot HQs by the Land Forces Sub Commission.

6. ADMINISTRATIVE DIV HQS.

The need for Administrative Div HQs in addition to Territorial HQs was strongly represented by the Land Forces Sub Commission and was accepted.

There are at present seven Admin Div HQs, which are under the command of the Territorial HQ in whose area they operate. They are responsible for organisation of supplies, welfare, and discipline, for all Italian Tps under the command of the parent Allied HQ, and are the recognised authority with whom the Allied HQs will deal on all local administrative matters. Administrative Div HQs would be responsible for the local administration of Replacement (Reinforcement) Depots, Schools and Transit Camps.

The Land Forces Sub Commission had prepared a T2/T0 for an Administrative Div HQ and would submit this for approval of this HQ.

7. ENLISTMENT.

It was stated by the Land Forces Sub Commission that it would be impossible to make use of the Territorial, District and Depot HQs to anything approaching the extent necessary to produce 35,000 recruits per month, even if clothes equipment and rail transport were available to deal with that number. The 5253 present arrangement whereby a special recruiting staff had been set up temporarily for each area of enlistment was considered by the Land Forces Sub Commission to be an adequate measure in the light of present conditions. It was hoped by these means to produce a monthly intake of 10,000. Accommodation at enlistment centres had been provided locally and the formation of mobile Camp Staffs with camp equipment to deal with the temporary holding of recruits awaiting transport was stated to be unnecessary. It was agreed that the Land Forces Sub Commission would continue temporarily with the present method of enlistment.

The Land Forces Sub Commission were asked to explain why they considered that it would be impossible for the Ministry of War to call up 35,000 per month. The answer was given that it would be possible, in case of need, if age groups outside the present 1911-24 classes were included in the call-up. The Land Forces Sub Commission were asked to arrange that, as the lower figure of 10,000 had been agreed, sufficient men would be examined by the centres, to ensure acceptance of 10,000 men of highest standard.

6. DEPARTIONS FROM ENLISTMENT.

Strong representations were made by employing HQs against the compulsory call-up of untrained men. It was stated that such call-up would result in serious shortage of civil labour. G-1(A) and G-1(B) were asked to arrange a separate meeting to discuss this urgent problem. Districts and Peninsular Base Section would be invited to attend.

9. LOSSAGE OF MANPOWER.

Concern was expressed at the high rate of wastage in Italian Army units, from camps, and during rail journeys. It was requested that immediate steps should be taken to find, and remove, the causes of this serious depletion of resources.

3. District stated that if the projected withdrawal of one blanket per man were made from Italian troops in their area, large losses of both men and blankets might be expected. 12. ACCOMMODATION.

It was established that the Italian Authorities were responsible for all accommodation of Italian Army Troops. Italian Military Barracks were reserved for the sole use of the Italian Army. In two months, there would be a greater supply of works stores available.

SUBJECT: Supply of Italian Armed Forces (Army, Navy and Air)

TO : All Concerned

1. Object

The following comprises a combined and revised directive covering policies and instructions heretofore issued by this headquarters, governing the supply of Italian armed forces and is for the purpose of assisting the Italian Government in its responsibility for the feeding, clothing, arming, equipping and maintenance of the Italian armed forces, in furthering the war effort. It will supersede the following:

AFHQ Administrative Memorandum Number 2, dated 10 January 1944, subject: "Subsistence for Italian Army."

Letter, this headquarters, dated 10 February 1944, to CinC AAI, Deputy President, ACC, and Deputy Vice-President, Army Sub-Commission, subject: "Disposal of Italian Army", and amendment thereto dated 15 April 1944.

Letter, this headquarters, dated 14 March 1944, to CinC AAI, subject: "Scale of Supply for Italian Army".

Letter, this headquarters, dated 14 May 1944, to CinC AAI, subject: "Single Ration Scale for Italian Military".

Letter, this headquarters, dated 21 April 1944, to CinC AAI, subject: "Organization for Supply of Effective Italian Troops".

2. Classification

For the purposes of this letter, the following abbreviations will have the meanings ascribed to them as shown:

BR - ITI - Italian armed forces under British command. 5248
US - ITI - Italian armed forces under United States command.
ITL-ITI - Italian armed forces under command of the Theater Commander through the Italian War Ministry.

3. Policy

a. All Italian armed forces will receive the same basic scale of supplies necessary for subsistence, i.e., food, clothing, medical supplies and fuel as laid down in Annexes to this letter.

BR-ITIS and US-ITIS will receive such additional equipment as may be considered necessary in order to permit them to fulfill their allotted tasks. Issues of this equipment will be controlled by this headquarters in the case of BR-ITIS and by the Commanding General, NATOUS A in the case of US-ITIS.

b. Only those classes of troops who are in fact effective will be supplied. An individual who is "in fact effective" is defined as one who is a bona fide member of the Italian armed forces, either officer, non commissioned officer, or other rank, duly enrolled or enlisted who is subject to the laws of war and the Geneva Convention, borne on the rolls of the Ministry concerned, and actually performing the duty to which assigned as shown by the official strength returns of the Ministry concerned. Security Police, ~~Cavalleria~~, Fire Brigades, and Finance Guards are not included, as they are not military organizations in the above sense of the term. Their functions are essentially civilian in character and the control is maintained through the Allied Control Commission.

4. Supply Responsibility for the Italian Army and the Italian Air Force

- a. The maintenance of BR-ITIS is a British responsibility.
- b. The maintenance of US-ITIS is a United States responsibility.

c. The maintenance of ITI-ITIS is the responsibility of the Italian Government supplemented to the extent required by the United States and United Kingdom as authorized by the Combined Chiefs of Staff. This commitment is divided between the United States and the United Kingdom as follows:

Subsistence	- US
Clothing	- Joint US - UK
Medical Supply	- UK
Fuels	- UK

5. Functions of M.M.I.A. L.F.S. B.C. (MMIA)

a. The Military Mission to the Italian Army is responsible to the Theater Commander for the coordination and supervision of supply to all categories of the Italian armed forces through the Italian Ministries.

b. When British or United States supplies are issued to ITI-ITIS in accordance with paragraph 4 c above, the senior United States Army officer of MMIA will supervise the supply of subsistence. The senior British officer and the senior United States Army officer will jointly supervise the supply of clothing. The senior British officer will supervise the supply of medical items. The procedure for handling POL is as prescribed in Annex D.

c. Paragraph 5c, change to read: "The entire resources of the Italian Army are available to all three categories of the Italian Army, thru MMIA, and will be allocated on an equitable basis. Headquarters MMIA will be responsible for control, issue and accounting of supplies so drawn from ITI-ITI Depots".

6. Responsibility of Italian Army for Supply

a. In meeting the responsibilities of distribution of supplies indicated in 4 a and 4 b above, the Italian War Ministry, by use of ITI-ITI forces will assist in the distribution of supply to US-ITI and BR-ITI categories of Italian armed forces, to the degree found necessary by the United States and British commanders concerned and in agreement with MMIA.

b. The Italian Army is responsible with certain minimum supervision by MMIA, for implementing and maintaining their own supply system in Italy, Sicily and Sardinia for the ITI-ITI category of the Italian Army.

c. The Italian Army will accept responsibility for all ITI-ITI supplies made available for its use. Acceptance will include positive assurance on the part of the Italian Army that the supplies received will be issued on the scales announced and used only for the purpose intended and that they will not be bartered, sold, or otherwise disposed of.

d. The Italian Army, through MMIA, will be responsible for arranging transportation necessary for the movement of all supplies from the point of acceptance to warehouses and from warehouses to distribution or issue points. Essential transportation assistance will be furnished from the United States and British sources as agreed between the local commander and MMIA.

e. Shelter sufficient to house properly all supplies received will be provided by the Italian Army. The location of all the points of storage, including those in which supplies of Italian origin are stored, will be reported to MMIA and the commander of the Base Section or District concerned.

f. Supplies will be warehoused in accordance with recognized procedure which will insure safety from theft, pilferage, weather, damage or loss from insects or vermin, and permit inventory and distribution with ease and efficiency. Local base section and district commanders and other commanders concerned will give due consideration to the needs for Italian depot storage and facilities in order to accomplish the above.

g. The Italian Army will be responsible for the distribution and issue of all supplies on the scales and under the conditions contained in Annexes hereto, in accordance with 4 c. ~~and~~ above.

h. The Italian Army will provide sufficient organizations of the proper type and strength with appropriate equipment to perform efficiently ^{and} ~~and~~ expeditiously the duties referred to above, based on the quantity of supplies furnished from time to time for use of the Italian armed forces.

1. Personnel from MMIA will be authorized to inspect, require inventories to be made as necessary, and otherwise satisfy themselves that all supplies turned over to the Italian Army are received, warehoused, accounted for and issued in accordance with the intent of this directive.

7. Scale of Supply

a. Subsistence

- (1) The Italian armed forces are subsisted on a single common ration scale shown in Annex "A". This scale will not be modified, amended or changed in any way for any category or group, without the prior approval of this headquarters.
- (2) The provision of local grown commodities under par. 2 of Annex "A" for all categories of the Italian armed forces is the responsibility of the Italian Ministries. When found to be more expeditious to do so, United States or British commanders may purchase available resources of these ration components for the Italian Ministries, and receive cash repayment therefor by submitting properly signed vouchers through MMIA.

b. Clothing

- (1) Clothing will be provided from the following sources in the order named and issued on the scale shown in Annex "B":
 - (a) Entire resources of Italian military clothing.
 - (b) Used clothing and individual equipment from Allied sources within the theater in accordance with the provisions of Annex "C".
 - (c) Shipments authorized by the Combined Chiefs of Staff for ITI-ITI, by War Department for US-ITI, and by The War Office for BR-ITI.

c. Fuel

- (1) Coal -- All coal and coke requirements for BR-ITI and US-ITI will be submitted through channels to the respective Army, Base Section, or GOC District for supply. Coal and coke requirements for ITI-ITI will be submitted through Italian Army channels through MMIA for screening and allocation.
- (2) Petroleum products -- See Annex "D".

d. Medicinal Supplies -- See Annex "E".

c. Transport

- (1) Italian Army transportation will be allotted to all units in the Italian Army by MMIA in such manner as to afford the minimum use of Allied transportation.
- (2) The Italian Ministry of War is responsible for maintenance of all Italian Army transportation. The Allied commanders concerned may give such assistance as is desirable in the maintenance of the transportation allocated to BR-ITIS or US-ITIS.
- (3) MMIA is charged with the general supervision of maintenance, use and manner of operation of all Italian military transport, except in the combat zone, and more particularly in respect to transport provided by or for the ITI-ITIS.

8. Supply of Italian Navy

a. The theater policy is based on the decision of the Combined Chiefs of Staff that the British Royal Navy, being in command of the Italian Navy, is responsible for repairs, maintenance and supply of the Italian Navy.

- (1) MMIA is designated as the agency to supervise the bulk distribution of rations furnished by the British Government for the Italian Navy.
- (2) Where no Italian Army depots under MMIA control are accessible, the issue of subsistence in accordance with Annex "A", from United States Army or Navy or British Army stocks direct to Italian naval vessels is authorised to meet only minimum essential operational requirements of those Italian naval vessels operating from United States or British controlled ports. Replacement in kind will be made by MMIA, for the account of the Royal Navy, to United States Army or United States Navy, as applicable.

9. Medical

a. The Italian Medical services will maintain adequate medical hospitals and services for all the Italian armed forces.

b. Evacuation will be wherever practicable to Italian hospitals.

c. In an emergency personnel may be admitted to United States or British hospitals and will be subsisted the same as United States or British patients.

d. The Italian medical service personnel in Italian hospitals and all armed forces patients will be maintained as under:

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Ltr, AFHQ, AG 400/105 D-0, 22 Sept 1944

- (1) Rations. From international ITI-ITI stocks provided by United States and controlled by MMIA.
- (2) Medical Stores (Annex "E"). From international stocks provided by United Kingdom and controlled by MMIA.

f. Paragraph 9c, first sentence, change to read "Monthly adjustments of supplies, other than Medical Stores, whereby ITI-ITI stocks will be reimbursed in kind, will be made by United States and British Armies".

10. Civilian Population

The policies set forth in this directive apply to the Italian armed forces only.

11. Cigarettes and Tobacco

Cigarettes or tobacco will be furnished from Italian sources and on the scale authorized by the Italian Army. None will be furnished from allied sources.

12. Accounting

a. All supplies issued to the Italian armed forces of any of the three categories defined in paragraph 4, from intra-theater, United States, or British Army sources, will be reported to the Chief Accountant, ACC, through MMIA, and will be charged against the Italian Government in accordance with directives published by this headquarters. Issues so reported are chargeable to the Italian Government only when made as prescribed in this letter and will not be applicable to issues in excess of the scales herein prescribed unless approved by this headquarters. MMIA is charged with the duty of ensuring that only items correctly chargeable to the Italian Government are presented to the Chief Accountant, ACC.

b. Non-expendable supplies or stores and equipment furnished in accordance with paragraph 3 above, will be issued on a loan basis to be returned to the issuing agency when the mission is completed. No charge will be made to the Italian Government for such issues.

13. Review of Supply System

The review and supervision of the supply system will be the responsibility of this headquarters.

4. Field Jackets, wool shirts, wool caps, wool trousers, overcoats, mackinaws, wool, and battle dress will be dyed green prior to issue to the Italian Army and Italian Air Force.

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ANNEX "C"

Procedure for Utilization of Allied Military Clothing
for the Italian Army and Air Force

1. In order to eliminate the shipping into the theater of clothing from external sources for the Italian Army and Air Force, maximum use will be made of used clothing that is not suitable for further use of the Allied armies.
2. All items of clothing and individual equipment on British scales or U.S. Tables of Equipment will be considered as available for the use of the Italian Army. Commanders of Communication Zone, Armies, the RAF, AAF/MTO, and Districts are responsible that items made available to the Italian Army and Air Force are carefully screened and are in such condition as to be beyond economical repair for further use of United States or British military personnel or prisoners of war of the Allied nations.
 - a. Within the capabilities of military repair installations directly under the commanders named above, items considered suitable for the Italian Army and Air Force may be repaired, if necessary, for the purpose of issue in accordance with Annex "B" to authorized Italian units of the command. Accounting will be as proscribed in paragraph 10 of basic letter.
 - b. Items in excess of the repair facilities and ability of the British Army or the United States Army, will be delivered to Italian Army ITI-ITI repair installations and will be charged to the Italian Government in accordance with paragraph 10 of basic letter. No further accounting is required. Upon completion of repair, disposition will be as follows:
 - (1) Such items are to be utilized for clothing and equipping the BR-ITI and US-ITI categories.
 - (2) Surplus items are to be utilized for clothing and equipping the ITI-ITI category.
 - c. Distinctive buttons, insignia of rank, and all other insignia will be removed prior to transfer to Italian repair installations or depots.
 - d. MMIA is responsible that proper records are maintained by Italian repair installations and depots in order that the proper charges may be made to the Italian Government and a corresponding credit be given to the country of ownership. To the extent necessary to accomplish this, commanders will comply with the accounting and reporting procedure established by MMIA.
3. Supply, sale, donation, or transfer of military clothing to civilians is not authorized except when made available to ACC by MMIA. Items of clothing and shoes (boots) not suitable for the use of the Italian Army will be transferred to ACC by MMIA. Outer clothing will be dyed black by ACC prior to issue to civilians.
4. Rags and scraps originating from clothing and equipment in British or U.S. Army Depots will be offered to MMIA for the use of the Italian Army. Should the rags and scraps not be desired by the Italian Army, the rags and scraps will be disposed of as agreed by commanders named in paragraph 2 above, and ~~00.43~~ ³

ANNEX "D"

A. Italian Military Requirements for Petroleum Products

1. Italian formations serving with the Allied Armies will, if they are located in the Army areas, normally be supplied ex Rail/Road Head through their own maintenance channels. Italian army units serving with the Allied Armies in Army areas, and Italian units, and units diluted with Italians, which form a permanent part of the Allied Order of Battle, will be supplied as if they were Allied units, through the normal United States or British maintenance systems.
2. Italian army units not included in paragraph 1 above will be supplied with petroleum products as follows:

a. Requirements: The MMIA will be responsible for the collection and submission to AFHQ Petroleum Section, Rome Allied Area Command, of requirements for the Italian army exclusive of those formations and units included in paragraph 1 above. These requirements will be submitted so as to reach AFHQ Petroleum Section, Rome Allied Area Command by the 19th of the month preceding that in which delivery is required and will specify geographical areas in which the units are located. The basis on which all of the above requirements are predicted will be set out in detail.

b. AFHQ Petroleum Section, RAAC, will make monthly allocations authorizing release of approved quantities of petroleum products from the CIP for Italian army account in the respective areas concerned.

c. The CIP will deliver to the Italian army on a contractual basis, charging only the distribution cost (including any imposed Government taxes) but not including the cost of the petroleum product.

B. Italian Naval and Air Force Requirements

3. The Italian navy and air force will be issued such petroleum products as are not "common user" items, as directed by Commander-in-Chief Mediterranean and CinC Mediterranean Allied Air Forces, respectively. Such issues will be made direct from stocks under CinC Mediterranean and CinC MAFF control and not through CIP. ("Common user" items are defined as such Petroleum Products as are included in the North African Oil Slate).

4. Aircraft of the Italian Air Force, under the operational control of CinC MAFF will be issued with such petroleum products as they require, from stocks under the control of CinC MAFF. Records of such issues will be maintained and transmitted monthly to AFHQ Petroleum Section, Rome Allied Area Command.

5. CinC Meditarranean and CinC MuAF will advise AFHQ Petroleum Section, RAAC of the requirements of the Italian navy and air force of "common user" petroleum products other than those covered by paragraph 4 above. Such requirements will be submitted to AFHQ Petroleum Section, RAAC by the 19th of the month preceding that in which delivery is requested, and will specify geographical areas in which release is required. Approved quantities will be included in the allocations authorized for the Italian army, and will be released to CIP as in 2, above.

6. CIP will maintain separate records of quantities received from Allied stocks and issued to:

- a. civilian users
- b. the three categories of the Italian army
- c. Italian navy
- d. Italian air force divided into that used by the Italian air force under British command, U.S. command, and Italian command, and will report such information monthly to AFHQ Petroleum Section, Rome Allied Area Command.

C. Transfer of Responsibility

7. Responsibilities established in this Annex with respect to particular agencies, i.e., Allied Military Government, Allied Central Mediterranean Force, Headquarters ACC, etc., in the event of transfer of, or assumption of responsibility by another agency will automatically be included in the transfer or assumption.

MEDICAL EQUIPMENT.

(CIRCULAR MEMORANDUM No. 3)

1. Excess Equipment - Disposal of.

The practice of units returning surplus medical equipment direct to 10 Command Depot Medical Store will cease. Medical equipment held in excess of scale will, when no longer required for the purpose for which it was issued, be returned to the Depot of Medical Stores from which the unit normally obtains its medical supplies.

D.Ds.M.S. and A.Ds.M.S. Commissions will ensure that Field Medical Units, on conversion to a new W.E., return their surplus medical equipment to the nearest Advanced Depot of Medical Stores or Base Depot of Medical Stores.

2. Courts of Inquiry - Losses.

Attention is invited to the Pamphlet issued as Appendix "A" to A.A.I., Routine Order No. 246 of 25 AUG 44.

3. Transfusion Apparatus.

On receipt of Apparatus Transfusion and Infusion Sets, Hospital Pattern, O.S.C. General Hospitals will return, to the nearest Advanced or Base Depots of Medical Stores, the Apparatus Transfusion and Infusion, A.B.S.D., Field Pattern in their possession.

4. Gas Cylinders.

Empty Medicinal Gas Cylinders are being returned to the 10 Command Depot Medical Stores without any means of identifying the consignor. All empty gas cylinders returned to Depots of Medical Stores will, therefore, be marked or have labels affixed to indicate the Depot or unit from which consigned.

5. Sterilized Dressings - Containers and Contents.

In order to ensure a regular supply of sterilized dressings, it is essential that all empty tins, together with used tins, are sent

The empty tins should either be crated or returned in packing cases to prevent damage and wastage of tins.

6. Regimental Medical Officers.

Incidents for the supply of medical equipment will be submitted to the A.D.M.S. 5240 Information for scrutiny and approval of issue from a selected medical unit.

7. Procedure for Inventory.

- (a) The practice of labeling drugs by trade name is misleading and may result in an item being deleted from the inventories as "N/A," when in actual fact the item is available for issue from the Depot of Medical Stores.

1. By agreement with the Allied Control Commission it has been decided that with certain exceptions all stocks of Italian Army Medical Stores on the mainland of Italy will be released to and placed under control of the Italian Military Authorities.

2. The exceptions referred to in para. 1 above are listed at Appx 'A'. These represent certain items of non-consumable medical equipment and stores, which it is difficult to obtain or which are in short supply. The issue of these items will be controlled by ACC (Army Sub-Commission).

3. In addition, at Appx 'B' is a list of consumable items now in short supply in Italy. A.C.C. (Army Sub-Commission) will draw the attention of Italian Military Authorities to these items and will ensure that the latter exercise strict economy in their use. If considered necessary, ACC (Army Sub-Commission) will impose control on issue of these items also.

4. A.C.C. (Army Sub-Commission) will make the necessary arrangements with those concerned for the handover of all stores to the Italian Military Authorities.



