It is understood that Florence Territorial Command wish to locate their Secondary Hospital in the ex Military Hospital Buildings at Leghorn. This project is supported by the Director General of the Italian Medical Services at the War Ministry.

It is understood further that the buildings in question were requisitioned after the liberation of Leghorn by the U.S. Army for a Military Hospital, and more recently as accommodation for personnel in transit to and from the United States.

It is requested therefore that the derequisitioning of these hospital buildings may please be effected as soon as is possible, and that an estimate of the date of when this is likely to take place may be given.

1. HISTORY. a. Allied combat troops drove Germans out and occupied at the fall of Rome. In unfinished and damaged condition.

b. 12 Oct 44 occupied by 1st Airborne Tng Center. No major improvements made.

c. Dec. 44, 1st Replacement Depot occupied and most of the improvements were made. In Feb. 45, Replacement and Training Comd HQ took over.

1. 1 July 1946, Replacement Co. GPTA occupied until they became non-operative, 15 Oct 46 when RAAC took over to derequisition.

2. LOCATIONS AND ACCOMMODATIONS - Six (6) miles south of Rome. Capacity 560 male officers, 30 Female officers, 20,900 EM, and 1,758 civilians. 160 buildings now in good condition.

3. NATURE OF IMPROVEMENTS - Completely refinished many bldgs. Layed water pipe line six (6) miles from camp to deep well, installed chlorination and pumping system that supplies 2,400,000 gals water daily. Installed telephone system within camp and to Rome and electric wiring and recepticals in camp. Also installed many toilets, urinals, boilers, heaters, sinks, hot water heaters, showers, windows and built many roads, sidewalks etc.

4. MEDICAL - a. No Hosp accommodations but many buildings would be satisfactory for a 250 bed Sta. Hosp.

b. Prevalent disease at first malaria but many cases have been eliminated.

5. GENERAL - a. Estimated values when U.S. took over \$15,500,000 and in poor condition.

b. Cost of improvements by U.S. \$963,792.89. However, this may be reduced to approx. \$540,717.32 if the amount paid for local labor and material were paid for by lire not backed by U.S. dollars. This question is being clarified by ANLC by 1 Dec.

4. As this Home is not authorised on the CREAT the above information is forwarded for any action that you may deem necessary.

1. The Italian Military Hospital building in GERMANY has been completely destroyed by Allied air action during active operations before the surrender.
2. The present temporary building is neither suitable nor large enough. It is most uncommensal to find and open another small building to provide the necessary bed space owing to the inevitable duplication of staff, equipment, medical stores, etc.
3. The building "PENSIONE DI PENSIONE" in Via dei PENSIONI-MARSHI-GERMANY is however most suitable and will take the necessary 250 beds with all the "usual offices" of a main hospital.
4. 23 M.F. Coy of 3rd M.F. Bn at present occupy the building but this unit is being demilitarised this month and all troops will be posted to other army units.
5. In view of the urgent necessity to establish efficient Italian hospitals in S. Italy in order to prevent any necessity to use Allied bed space, it is most strongly urged that this building be allotted for an Italian Military hospital wef 1 Sep 45.

1. The "Principe di Piemonte" Institute is located in Genoa, Via dei Platani (location Marassi).
2. The Institute - whose Prefecture Commissary is the Vice-Prefect Mr. Francesco Durante - is administrated by the "Albergo dei Poveri" located in Genoa, Via Carbonara.
3. 23 M.T. Coy of 3rd M.T. En^{ALCOM} occupies the ground-floor and partly 1st and 2nd floor with 110 soldiers.
4. Part of 3rd floor (right wing) and kitchens are occupied by 50 baby-girls with a few nuns attached to them.
5. The whole of the Institute is fit to be used as Main Military Hospital with 250 beds and all general services: scientific cabinets, depots and stores.

It is the view of the Allied Authorities that the present needs of hospital accommodation in Milan necessitates the temporary occupation of the Military Hospital Via Baggio.

This hospital is in excess of the present needs of the Italian Army whose requirements have been met by the allocation of the Banda Nera Hospital.

The arrangements were agreed between local representatives of civil and military authorities and include the adequate safeguarding of Italian medical equipment.

The Ministry may instruct their representative to set aside rooms for the safe storage of movable equipment and may, in agreement with local Allied Officers, select the rooms most suitable for this purpose.

Herewith, for information, extracts from
a SITREP by A.D.M.S., 57 Area :

" 1. The following plan has been agreed. In
making the plan the following factors had to be considered :

(i) Civilian hospital beds are extremely full,
(6274 beds occupied out of 6874), and it would be quite
impossible to empty any large sized civilian hospital.

(ii) The Ospedale Provinciale Militare QUARO
is almost empty, containing only German P.W., Italian
Military and half a dozen Partisans.

(iii) On 28 Apr 234 German P.W. and 369 Partisans
were in GENOA hospitals. Many of them are light cases, fit for
early discharge or transfer.

(iv) About 100 wounded Partisans are held in
Divisional hospital of 6 Zone outside GENOA and should be
transferred there.

(v) The Ospedale QUARO is the only available
site for an Allied General Hospital. It is a good site for
600 beds and could be expanded, but it will not take a
1200 bedded hospital.

(6214 beds occupied out of 6874), and it would be quite impossible to empty any large sized civilian hospital.

(ii) The Ospedale Provinciale Militare QUARTO is almost empty, containing only German P.W., Italian Military and half a dozen Partisans.

(iii) On 28 Apr 224 German P.W. and 369 Partisans were in GENOA hospitals. Many of them are light cases, fit for early discharge or transfer.

(iv) About 100 wounded Partisans are held in Divisional hospital of 6 Zone outside GENOA and should be transferred there.

(v) The Ospedale QUARTO is the only available site for an Allied General Hospital. It is a good site for 600 beds and could be expended, but it will not take a 1200 bedded hospital.

(vi) 2(US) Division are moving 15 Pd Hospital into GENOA but the Divisional Surgeon states that he will move them out as soon as a British General Hospital can take over. 5543

(vii) There is a very limited quantity of Italian Medical Equipment in the QUARTO Hospital as almost all was removed by the Germans.

PLAN

(a) 15(US) Pd Hospital is moving today (30 Apr) from SPANZOLA and is taking over one half of Ospedale QUARTO. This will supply immediate hospital cover for British and American troops, including surgical cover.

(b) One floor of remaining wing is being cleared and will be occupied by a British PDS - accommodation ample for 100 beds.

(c) All German P.W. fit for transfer will be evacuated after 3 May under arrangements made by 92(US) Div.

(d) Remaining P.Ws. will be concentrated on remaining floor of QUARTO which will be a small P.W. Wing, staffed by captured protected personnel and administered by British PWS.

(e) Ultimately the 600/(Br) Hospital will move in and take over the whole QUARTO Hospital. It is suggested that an initial move of 200 beds plus surgical, X-Ray and laboratory cover would be advisable.

(f) Two blocks (each 150 beds) at Ospedale SAN MARTINO will be allotted initially to Partisans and later to Italian Military. This will provide a minimum of 300 beds for treatment of Italian Army personnel.

(g) It is strongly advised that a 1200 bedded hospital should not be brought into GENOA. A suitable site will be very hard to find, whilst the suggested site at Ospedale QUARTO is excellent for a 600 bedder and could be expanded to 800 or 900.

A greater number of beds should not be required.

2. Elsewhere in the SIKREP the Ospedale QUARTO is reported on as follows:

(5) I am not aware whether the A.M.I. letter referred to in para 3 above is still in force, but if this be the case and if strict compliance must be made with these provisions, I foresee possible delay and/or complications with the Italian Military authorities.

(6) In view of this I strongly recommend that prior authority in principle be obtained now for the occupation of such Italian Military Hospital accommodation in the future as is agreed NOT to be required by MHA after final consultation with them.

Both in view of the numerous cases of cronic malaria that occur during the spring and owing to the lack of available beds at FLORENCE we deem it necessary to find an adequate solution to the problem of Hospital admission in TOSCANIA.

In this respect, the Territorial Command of FLORENCE has been continually contacted to obtain the return of the ex Military Hospitals PENDOLA and SAN MARCO of SIENA.

The American Authorities of the 5th Army contacted as regards this matter, have shown themselves agreeable.

In respect of PENDOLA Hospital the authority of SIENA's A.M.G. is required, while the SAN MARCO Hospital appears to be on the point of being evacuated by the 21 Br C.C.S. apart from other factors, we deal with the recovery of a rather large amount of material previously belonging to our Mil Admin.

When available the PENDOLA Hospital will without fail be placed on civilian rations and handed over for supervision by the SOVEREIGN MILITARY ORDER of MALTA, who have expressed willingness to carry out this task.

The SAN MARCO, ~~CONVENE~~ could become a Hospital on military rations and be added to the present list of same.

The passing of the SAN MARCO Hosp, to military rations could be compensated for by the changing from military to civilian ration scale of the SANTA MARIA NUOVA Red Cross Hosp FLORENCE;.

In this way the problem of hospitals on civilians rations in TOSCANIA would be substantially solved which is important in view of the probable repatriation of ex POW's to LEGHORN Harbour.

We hope that M.M.I.A. will kindly give full support to this above;

The 210th and 231 Divisions have 170 beds in their field hospitals. The Gruppi have 1000 beds assigned to them but only 200 beds are actually available now. This makes a total of 1430 beds in this area against 4800 which General Martin, 5th Army Surgeon states is the absolute minimum requirement for the 55,000 Italian troops in this area which figure does not include the Carabinieri and PBS troops here.

There is no more available hospitals in Florence and General Martin strongly recommends the taking over of the two former Italian Military hospitals at Siena, the Pendola and the 21 C.C.S., both now occupied by British installations. Pendola is now occupied as a billet by 120 men of the No. 3 S.P. Signal Unit, and 21 C.C.S. as the 2nd Field Dressing Station. Both of these buildings were occupied as Italian Military hospitals until October 1944, some of the equipment is still in the Siena area for these hospitals but there are no beds. General Martin states, however, in an emergency he will get cots for them.

General Martin further states, it is a violation of the Geneva Convention rules for troops to be billeted in buildings with a Red Cross on it as Pendola has. It is also a violation of AFHQ directives.

THE CHAIRMAN outlined the position with regard to Patriots and their hospitalization. He pointed out that under the present directive the treatment of Patriots was the responsibility of the Italian Military and that this treatment was limited generally only to that which would suffice to get the patients clear of the hospitals; the problem then arose over post-emergency treatment and convalescence.

7. MAJOR HEGGIE expressed the following views :

a) that the Italian Army was responsible only for emergency hospitalization and that wounded Patriots should be removed to civilian hospitals by the Allied Commission (not (MIA) as soon as possible. (Reference was made to AFHQ letter IS 400/033 GSC-O dated 13 January 1945).

b) that no Italian Army hospitals could be established for the primary purpose of handling Patriots for the simple reason that neither personnel nor equipment was available above that which was required for Italian Army Hospitals necessary for the Italian Army;

c) that the Italian Army Hospitals would be available for Patriots only to the extent that the accommodation available was surplus to the requirement for Army personnel; and

d) that it was not practicable to issue either medical supplies or army rations to civilian hospitals for Patriots.

MAJOR HEGGIE further stated that the Italian Army's present arrangements for the North were such that it was unlikely that any large numbers of Patriots could be treated by the Italian Military organisations and that there were to be only 800 beds behind each 5th and 8th Armies and that they would not necessarily be in those localities where Patriots might be encountered.

9. THE CHAIRMAN disagreed in some measure with the views of MAJOR

c) that the Italian Army Hospitals would be available for Patriots only to the extent that the accommodation available was surplus to the requirement for Army personnel; and

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8. THE CHAIRMAN disagreed in some measure with the views of MAIA in the interpretation of AMHQ's signal P.27859.

IT WAS AGREED THAT it was essential that clarification be obtained from AMHQ with a view to ascertaining exactly the responsibilities of MAIA and that if the suggestion which had been put forward that convalescent wards should be organised in civilian hospitals, authority be given for the issue of army medical supplies and rations to the hospitals concerned.

9. The discussion then turned to the transportation of wounded Patriots. Clarification was needed for the responsibility for such transport from the Casualty Clearing Stations to Field Hospitals and from Field Hospitals to Civilian Hospitals and/or Convalescent Hospitals. In this connection Brigadier Kidd pointed out that there was available in No.2 District only one motor ambulance convey and that he would be unable to give assistance in this matter.

10. IT WAS AGREED THAT Civil Affairs Section put the position to AMHQ and request clarification of the points regarding hospitalisation of Patriots.

IN VICE PRESIDENT'S OFFICE

ON HOSPITAL ACCOMMODATION IN NORTHWEST ITALY

ACTION

1. THE CHAIRMAN stated that he had called this meeting to discuss hospital accommodation in NW ITALY, with particular regard to:

- a) the use of Italian Red Cross property;
- b) accommodation and handling of Patriots in hospitals.

Some general discussion took place and the following decisions and points were made:

2. BRIGADIER KIDD stated that it was unlikely that No 2 District would requisition Italian Red Cross accommodation and that they would avoid requisitioning Italian Red Cross equipment. Brig. Kidd estimated that his total requirements in beds would not exceed 600. He understood that IV CORPS would require 400 beds, possible in the vicinity of PIACENZA. In requisitioning accommodation No 2 District's order of priority is:

1. Hospitals at present occupied by German troops;
2. Italian Military Hospitals.

3. THE MARQUIS THEODOLI produced a location list of Italian Red Cross Hospitals in Northern ITALY.

IT WAS DECIDED THAT Public Health Sub Commission should distribute this list to all concerned.

4. IT WAS DECIDED THAT the representative of Civil Affairs Section

Some general discussion took place and the following decisions and points were made:

2. BRIGADIER KIDD stated that it was unlikely that No 2 District would requisition Italian Red Cross accommodation and that they would avoid requisitioning Italian Red Cross equipment. Brig. Kidd estimated that his total requirements in beds would not exceed 600. He understood that IV CORPS would require 400 beds, possible in the vicinity of PIAENZA. In requisitioning accommodation No 2 District's order of priority is:

The representative was also to endeavour to obtain any information as to those hospitals which are at present occupied by German military. Information to be passed to No. 2 District.

5. A DISCUSSION ensued over the problem of Italian Red Cross personnel for hospitals in the North. The Marquis THEODOLI pointed out that it was most desirable to get Italian Red Cross personnel forward at an early date and he was prepared to find the requisite bodies. Public Health Sub Commission to ensure that the Senior Public Health Officer, 5th Army, called forward the requisite numbers without delay.

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7. MAJOR HERZLIE expressed the following views :

- a) that the Italian Army was responsible only for emergency hospitalisation and that wounded Patriots should be removed to civilian hospitals by the Allied Commission (not MIA) as soon as possible. (Reference was made to AFHQ letter AG 400/033 GEG.O dated 13 January 1945).
- b) that no Italian Army hospitals could be established for the primary purpose of handling Patriots for the simple reason that neither personnel nor equipment was available above that which was required for Italian Army Hospitals necessary for the Italian Army;
- c) that the Italian Army Hospitals would be available for Patriots only to the extent that the accommodation available was surplus to the requirements for Army personnel; and

- d) that it was not practicable to issue either medical supplies or army rations to civilian hospitals for Patriots.

MAJOR HERZLIE further stated that the Italian Army's present arrangements for the North were such that it was unlikely that any large numbers of Patriots could be treated by the Italian Military organisations and that there were to be only 800 beds behind each 5th and 8th Armies and that they would not necessarily be in those localities where Patriots might be encountered.

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10. IT WAS AGREED THAT Civil Affairs Section put the position to AFHQ and request clarification of the points regarding hospitalisation of Patriots.

2. Reference para 3. Only that part of the Appendix which relates to the Area for which you will be responsible is included.
3. Since receipt of the AMHQ Letter in this office further discussions on the matter have been held with DUES Land Forces Sub Commission AG. He has agreed that the bids made by the Italian Ministry of War were based on a false assumption that the hospital requirements for Italian forces in the North would be spread widely throughout the Northern Provinces. In fact the larger proportion of these forces will be operating in the N.3. Thus the military hospitals marked by an asterisk are in excess of the actual requirements.
4. ADAMS are requested to notify this office as soon as possible if it is expected that they will need to make use of any of the hospital accommodation marked.
5. The information called for in para 6 of the AMHQ Letter should be passed to DUES Land Forces Sub Commission AG through this office.

4. Since receipt of the ARHQ letter in this office further discussions on the matter have been held with DARS and Foreign Sub Commission AD. He has agreed that the bids made by the Italian Ministry of War were based on a false assumption that the hospital requirements for Italian Forces in the North would be spread uniformly throughout the Northern Provinces. In fact the larger proportion of these Forces will be operating in the N.E. Thus the military hospitals needed by an antibiotic are in excess of the actual requirements.

4. ARHQs are requested to notify this office as soon as possible if it is expected that they will need to make use of any of the hospital accommodation marked.

5. The information called for in para 6 of the ARHQ letter should be passed to DARS and Foreign Sub Commission AD through this office.

1. The provision of hospital accommodation and the supply of medical stores and equipment for the Italian Army and for the Italian Partisan forces is ultimately an Allied responsibility.

2. It is important that this commitment should not be overlooked in allocating hospital accommodation which is available at present or will become available subsequent to an Allied advance into the Northern Provinces.

3. Attached as Appendix 'A' is a complete list of hospitals situated in the region of Northern Italy still occupied by the enemy. The hospitals which the Italian Ministry of War wishes to reserve for the future needs of Italian forces are marked with an asterisk.

4. The total requirements for Italian forces in the Northern Provinces are estimated to be 5,000 beds. Allowance has been made in Appendix 'A' for expected reduction of accommodation by war damage.

5. While the requirements of the Allied Medical Forces must be given precedence it must be borne in mind that Italian Base Hospitals are not provided with Ordnance equipment which enables them to function in buildings other than existing hospitals, and that if all suitable hospital buildings are taken over by Allied Medical Services the task of equipping other buildings as hospitals for the Italian forces will to a great extent devolve upon the Allies, or alternatively it will become necessary for Italian sick and wounded to be received in Allied Military Hospitals. In either event, an added strain would be placed on Allied Medical resources.

6. It is consequently of great importance that Italian medical stores and hospital equipment which may come into Allied Control should be safeguarded. D.A.D.M.G. Land Forces Sub Commission, A.C. (MFA) should be informed whenever an Italian hospital is taken over, in order that he may arrange with the

5. While the requirements of the Allied Medical Forces must be given precedence it must be borne in mind that Italian Para Hospitals are not provided with Ordnance equipment which enables them to function in buildings other than existing hospitals, and that if all suitable hospital buildings are taken over by Allied Medical Services the task of equipping other buildings as hospitals for the Italian forces will to a great extent devolve upon the Allies, or alternatively it will become necessary for Italian sick and wounded to be received in Allied Military Hospitals. In either event, an added strain would be placed on Allied Medical resources.

6. It is consequently of great importance that Italian medical stores and hospital equipment which may come into Allied Control should be safeguarded. U.S. Army, Land Forces Sub Commission, A.C. (MIA) should be informed whenever an Italian hospital is taken over, in order that he may arrange with the Italian Ministry of War and the Italian medical services for the equipment of the hospital to be removed for use by the Italians in another site.

1. The above premises are at present being held for allocation by Rome Area Allied Command.
2. There is an urgent need for additional hospital accommodation to meet the increased demand on the Italian Army Medical Service resulting from Combat Units being engaged in operations. Application has been made by the War Ministry to the Ministry of Interior for the release of the San Michele hospital in Rome. This is at present occupied by 400 children and the Ministry of Interior are not in a position to release it.
3. It is requested that approval may be given for return of the above premises to the Ministry of War for the purpose of providing additions to Military hospital accommodation.

1. The Italian Medical Service will maintain adequate medical hospitals and services for all the Italian Armed Forces (Par 9, AFMR letter, 22 September 1944, file AG 400/108 D-0). NMIA is responsible for insuring that the Italian Army fulfills its responsibility to the maximum extent possible with its available manpower, supplies and accommodations.

2. The Italian Army willingly assumes its responsibilities. However, it must be understood that Italian responsibility must be limited to that which is available and is considered proper by Italian, not Allied, standards, and all subject to the overriding demands of the Allied Armies, so that even in some cases the meagre Italian standards cannot be maintained. The Italian Army does not complain that Allied demands prevent them furnishing their soldiers proper service.

3. The facts regarding Italian hospitalization in the PBS area are as follows:

a. Italian Army requested permission to occupy its Army hospital (400 beds) in Livorno. On 11 October 1944 Fifth Army granted permission. A part of the equipment for this hospital had been removed to Siena, by Italians when Leghorn was bombed.

b. Italian Army went to Siena to secure this equipment, and it was then found that an AMG officer had given the equipment to various civilian hospitals.

c. When other equipment was located, and the Italian Army was prepared to establish the hospital, it was found that a PBS unit had moved in on 21 October 1944. Civilian hospitals, subject to requisition, are located in the same area (see AAI letter of 1 July 1944, file 2030/12/22).

d. Surgeon's office, PBS was visited on 21 October 1944 by NMIA LO, who was informed by the Executive Officer that PBS needs would be handled by PBS utilizing the three US-ITI field hospitals under PBS Command in a part of the civilian hospital and the Italian Army hospital at Antignano (a total of 850 beds). 5514

e. On 24 October 1944, PBS was asked by signal to allot alternative accommodation in Livorno for an ITI-ITI hospital. On 26 October PBS replied that decision would be made about 30 October.

f. PBS Signal 30527 cite BPBEB of 27 October listed alternative sites as the University (civilian) Hospital in Pisa and two civil hospitals in Lucca.

g. On 28 October PBS was requested by MMIA Signal to requisition the University Hospital, Pisa. Fifth Army Signal NR 6474 stated that requisitions in Pisa and Lucca must have Fifth Army approval.

h. On 30 October MMIA asked Fifth Army for University Hospital, Pisa.

i. On 1 November AMO Fifth Army Signal 495 stated that University Hospital, Pisa was desired for civilian use.

j. On 3 November MMIA Signal asked Fifth Army to allow Italian Army to use No. 6 Italian Army Military Hospital in Lucca. This was approved. The hospital (400 beds) was established. Only about 80% has ever been used.

k. On 2 January 1945 MMIA signaled to PBS a report through ALCON channels to MMIA that additional accommodation in Livorno was needed and asked PBS if MMIA could help.

l. On 7 January PBS Signal 271 cite BPBEO asked that the MMIA Surgeon visit PBS.

m. On 11 - 12 January MMIA Surgeon visited PBS Surgeon and arrangements were made to secure a wing of the civil hospital in Livorno for the Italian Army (400 bed space). PBS Surgeon was also requested to evacuate, by hospital train, to Rome to prevent overcrowding, but to date no patients have been evacuated to the Italian Army hospitals in Rome.

n. The 165th Italian Territorial Military Hospital (400 beds) was in operation in the wing of civil hospital in Livorno on 12 February.

This is being done as rapidly as possible, and it is therefore requested that a list of property which has been loaned to Italian units be forwarded so that the necessary Italian replacement can be furnished.

1. Action was taken on 15 February 1945 to recover shipping tickets for the one hundred (100) beds, hospital, folding, shipped to the 21st Command (Italian).

2. During January of this year an investigation of Italian Field hospitals in this area revealed that because of lack of equipment they were utterly incapable of rendering even the minimum service to the U.S. Italian military personnel of this command. I, therefore, directed that, as a matter of operational necessity, equipment necessary to provide adequate minimum hospitalization be made available from American stocks. At the time, American hospitals were taxed to capacity with American hospitalized personnel.

3. Inasmuch as MMIA has not yet assumed its responsibilities for US-ITI hospitalization in this area, the one hundred (100) beds mentioned in Paragraph 1 are now held by the 21st Command (Italian) on a limited shipping ticket on a 120-day basis.

4. It is requested that necessary action be taken to cause MMIA to assume its full and proper responsibilities in this matter without further delay, so that these beds and such other property as may be on a loan basis to the Italian field hospitals can be returned to PENSEA stocks.

Subject: ~~Health~~ ^{Medical} Organisations.

A summary is enclosed of Italian Military ~~Health~~ ^{Medical} establishments existent in the northern sector of Italy on the 8 August 1943, that is, before the date of the armistice (Enclosure 1).

As can be seen, a ~~health~~ ^{medical} organisation comprising over 50,000 beds, is dealt with.

On the basis of experience gained so far on the peninsula, in the expectation of an Allied advance, it is to be presumed that a good part of the A.M. ~~Health~~ ^{Medical} establishments will fall intact into the hands of Allied troops.

Up till June 1944, Allied H.Q. (A.A.I.), in letter 3651/M, showing an understanding of Italian needs, notified that instructions had been issued to the effect that Italian Military Health establishments should be occupied by the Allies only in the event of a lack of any other buildings (barracks, schools, etc.) suitable for ^{the} installation of a medical establishment.

However, experience has shown that in Campania, Lazio, Toscana, etc. all the

best Italian Military Medical establishments have been requisitioned by the Allies, and that in many instances the respective equipment has been lost, for lack of custody.

①. Formulation of a schedule

In order to avoid any further loss of precious equipment, it is thought absolutely necessary that definite rulings must be laid down^{now}, on the part of the Italian Military Authorities as well as of the Allied Authorities, to ensure the safeguarding and speedy employment of Military Medical establishments in northern Italy.

To this end, in each regional summary, the medical establishments ~~that are up till now~~ that we would desire were reserved for F.F.A.A. Italian, are marked with a small cross. A list of these establishments is republished in Encl. 2.

This list is subject to all the ^{variations} ~~variations~~ (deviations) that are likely to be caused by Allied needs, critical situations, damage to the establishments etc. etc.

The other establishments on the general list could be made available either for Allied troops, or for medical organisations for refugees from captivity or enemy ~~and~~ ex-enemy ⁵⁵⁰³.

Measures for the safe guarding and employment of medical establishments.

The military medical establishments of German-occupied Italy may be divided into three classes.

- 1). Medical establishments occupied by German units.
- 2). Medical establishments occupied by troops of the Puppet Republican Fascist government.
- 3). Medical establishments temporarily closed.

The establishments of the first class⁽¹⁾ will presumably be abandoned upon the arrival of the Allies. Therefore, as soon as possible, they should be placed under guard either by carabinieri or other troops assigned to the task. This also applies to those under heading⁽³⁾

The establishments of the second class⁽²⁾ must, according to circumstances, be temporarily closed and garrisoned, or else kept open and in working order, according to the needs and schedules.

In the establishments which carry 5502 ~~not~~ operating, the military personnel attached, even if belonging to the puppet Republican

4

Government Forces, must be, limited to the minimum requirements, compelled to remain at their ~~posts~~ posts and continue the temporary fulfilling of their proper duties. Until such time as they are replaced, which must be carried out by this Ministry in the shortest time possible commencing with the Director and officers, the personnel employed must be entitled to the issue of military rations. It is maintained that only thus will it be possible to ensure the continuity of service and the safeguarding of equipment difficult to replace, which otherwise must eventually be requested from Allied sources.

In retaining the ~~principles of the~~ replacement as soon as possible principle, it is to be noted that the temporary employment of ^{the} medical personnel a/m is in accordance with the spirit of existing international laws for medical personnel, and with the humanitarian nature of the service.

The substitution of the personnel ^{would} ~~must~~ be effected by drawing from the planned reserve groups.

It is probable that the Combr 5501 Groups, in view of their operational role, ~~would~~ not be able to occupy themselves with

5

the problem of the guarding and reactivation of the medical establishments of Northern Italy. At the most they could utilise them in the case of emergency. It is maintained, therefore, that the duties of carrying out the necessary inspections, garrisoning the establishments efficiently, collecting the salvagable equipment which is unserviceable or damaged, could be advantageously entrusted, in agreement with the competent Allied Authorities and eventually in collaboration with the C.E.R.S.E.T.I. and C.E.R.S.I. detachments, to the Auxiliary Italian Unit H.Q.s, (H.Q.s of the 209, 210, 228, 231 Divisions, and 212 Italian H.Q.) under the control of the superior departments.

As already observed, the proposed programme is of an elastic nature. The request put forward, for a total of about 12,000 bed spaces, on the basis of an estimate of the probable requirements of the Italian armed forces, also takes into account the probable quota of establishments destroyed.

Up till now, this Ministry has had to establish afresh, in liberated areas, an adequate medical organisation, and has only been able to use to a very limited degree the existent organisations.

5500

The utilisation of an already existent organisation would alleviate future tasks to a great degree and lead to better welfare for the sick.

A cooperative study of the matter and adoption of adequate measures both on the part of the Italians and of the Allies would be of great help in solving the problem.

We trust, then, in the understanding of the competent Allied Authorities and await such time as they will contribute to ensuring the safeguarding of an important quota of the national medical reserves, solving at the same time, the problem of Italian troops' medical welfare.

1. Attached at Appendix "A" is a list of Italian Army hospitals in North Italy which has been forwarded by the Minister for War. Hospital sites marked (+) at Appendix "A" have been requested by the Minister for War for Italian Army use.
2. Current instructions (AFM Circulars Nos. 13 and 89, 1944 and AMI letter 2030/12/42 of 1 July 1944) adequately cover the policy in regard to Italian Army property. However, the implementation of these instructions presents certain problems.
3. REMARKS
To insure that all available Italian Army hospitals and equipment are preserved for (1) use by the Allied Forces, (2) use by the Italian Army, and (3) i.e. surplus accommodations, use by civilian agencies.
4. In the past, from reports, it is known that:
 - a. Italian Army hospitals have been entered by Allied and Italian Army personnel, and civilians; equipment has been pilfered or destroyed, and valuable medical supplies have been dissipated.
 - b. Allied officers have taken charge of these hospitals without making inventories of the supplies and equipment therein, so that when the hospitals were turned back to the Italian Army, no records existed.
5. Attention is invited to copy of letter, M/17/819 of 20 February 1948 attached at Appendix "B". It is not considered that this letter, while it states the needs of the Italian Army, will fully carry out the objective stated in War 3 above.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

a. That the list of Italian Military hospitals be sent to Army Commanders.

b. That Army Commanders be instructed:

(1) That "operational reasons" as defined in Par 3 of AFHQ Circular 92, 1944, is limited to "operational necessity for the Allied Forces only and not for the use of civilians", and such authority will be exercised only on written authorization of the Army Commander.

(2) Listed hospitals are to be considered in the same category as "Historical Monuments".

(3) Listed hospitals will be placed under Allied military guard immediately, and removal of equipment and supplies will be prevented.

(4) Such hospitals as are desired for use of the Allied Armies will be inventoried, and the equipment and supplies therein will be accounted for by the Allied officers.

(5) That the hospitals listed as required by the Italian Army be placed at the disposal of the Italian Army or alternative accommodations be made available.

(6) That such hospitals as are not disposed of by (3) and (4) above be turned over to the Italian Army (Italian Army detachments for recovery of property, now attached to and working under command of the Fifth and Eighth Armies).

(7) That AGO officers are not to remove equipment or property of any sort from the hospitals in (3) and (4) above, and from the hospitals in (5) above only in accordance with AFHQ Circular 92 (that is - secure prior permission for the removal and account for the property).

1. Attached at Appendix "A" is a complete list of Italian military hospitals in the enemy occupied territory of Northern Italy.

Italian Ministry of War have requested that in order to avoid previous difficulties in obtaining hospital accommodation for Italian troops fighting and working with the Allies, a proportion of these hospitals should be allotted to the Italian Medical Services. The hospital sites requested for each area have been marked (a) at Appendix "A" and a summary given at Appendix "B".

The total number of beds requested is approximately 19,000. This number was considered too high and Ministry of War have since stated that it included a 33% to 40% estimate for damaged and untenable buildings.

Basic requirements are therefore between 7,500 and 8,000 beds. At 5% cover this is not an unreasonable demand for Italian Army and Air Force troops who may possibly be moved into Northern Italy.

2. While Allied needs may make it impossible to allot the identical sites, it is requested that Italian military requirements should be included in any future planning.

3. In addition to the accommodation problem, the scarcity of hospital equipment and furniture is acute. 1. Attached at Appendix 'A' is a complete list of Italian military hospitals in the enemy occupied territory of Northern Italy.

Italian Ministry of War have requested that in order to avoid previous difficulties in obtaining hospital accommodation for Italian troops fighting and working with the Allies, a proportion of these hospitals should be allotted to the Italian Medical Services. The hospital sites requested for each area have been marked + at Appendix 'A' and a summary given at Appendix 'B'.

The total number of beds requested is approximately 12,000. This number was considered too high and Ministry of War have since stated that it included a 33% to 40% estimate for damaged and untenable buildings.

Basic requirements are therefore between 7,500 and 8,000 beds. At 5% cover this is not an unreasonable demand for Italian Army and Air Force troops who may possibly be moved into Northern Italy.

2. While Allied needs may make it impossible to allot the identical sites, it is requested that Italian military requirements should be included in any future planning.

3. In addition to the accommodation problem, the scarcity of hospital equipment and furniture is acute. I appreciate that the hospitals and convalescent camps are absolutely necessary, but I would point out that the Caserma Funzionale, Cetania was a British Army requisitioned building, and after several thousand pounds had been expended to put the place in order, including new kitchen, huts etc, it was occupied by (66) British General Hospital.

It was de-requisitioned on the clear understanding that, if required as a hospital, it would be re-requisitioned, but without any reference to this HQ the Italian Army have taken the building over.

Subject: Reactivation of the Physiological Laboratory, ROME

Reference AQ/7/1 dated 17/10/44., it has not been possible to obtain a free entrance to the laboratory for the staff because such entrance is situated in the interior of the isolation wing of the 104 British General Hospital. The Italian Army Physiological Laboratory is situated on the ground floor of the North wing, Villa Fonseca.

It results that with little work it is possible to open an entrance to the laboratory from the south wing of Villa Fonseca. The new entrance is situated on the outside of the isolation wing and coincides with the actual entrance used by the staff of the Italian Medico-Legal College. The old entrance could be closed by building a wall. Thus, all danger of contagion would be excluded.

The attached sketch shows clearly the situation.

The reactivation of the laboratory interests this office for the following reasons:-

1. It is a well equipped laboratory depending directly from this office.
2. It works mostly for the Medico-Legal College, which is located also at Villa Fonseca.
3. We wish to make use of the electro-cardiograph equipment existing in the laboratory.
4. The laboratory is not actually being used and its reactivation would not cause any inconvenience to 104 British General Hospital.

With a view to reactivation of the laboratory it is requested that MIA obtain from 104 General Hospital prior consent to the above solution.

4. The laboratory is not actually being used and its reactivation would not cause any inconvenience to 104 British General Hospital.
