SUBJECT: Notes on inspection of Territorial Commands.

Reply to letter M/33/I of 9th inst.

With reference to the notes on the inspection of military medical establishments of Northern Italy we would inform you that:

- 1) Regarding the centralisation and amalgamation of the two Sections of the Military Hospital of Genova and Varazze, the President of the Council of Ministers - High Commissariat for Hygiene and Public Health - has been approached to obtain the release of part of the building of the civilian Hospital of Quarto.
Said High Commissariat has not been able to accede to the request, nor is it possible, in view of the known destruction in the city, to find another building suitable for adaptation as a Military Hospital.
- 2) Regarding the disabled in the Varazze Section, who no longer need hospital attention, the Genoa Military Medical Directorate has been approached in order that they may be transferred to the Centre for the Disabled at Lecco.
- 3) Explanations have been requested from Milan Territorial Command regarding the displaced persons who still occupy a large part of Brescia Military Hospital.



18 Oct 46. L U C C A.

Visited No: 7 Terr. Comd. Secondary Hospital and
Medical Coy.
Hospital Director (Lt-Col. DRAGO).
Accommodation. Equipped beds 200 (can expand to 400).
Occupied 175.

The Hospital building is the premises of an old civilian hospital - the structure is very old, though roomy and airy. Staff accommodation is poor - particularly regarding cooking and feeding.

The permanent location of this hospital is at LIGHORN where their building is at present requisitioned by U.S. Forces.

The Medical Coy turned out very well and training by the Technical Staff of the hospital is satisfactory. I was impressed by the capabilities of the Chief Instructor (Lt-Col. ZICCHIERI) and his Staff.

The men are of good physique and though mostly farmers are responding well to training - about 10% are illiterate and are being given elementary education. Health is good about 1% reporting sick.

Generally a satisfactory Medical Coy and hospital - which will improve when returned to its permanent station. Accommodation for Staff and families may prove difficult in LIGHORN.

19 Oct 46. G E N O A.

No: 2 BLU had no medical points to discuss.

I visited the Principal Hospital which is divided between GENOA 100 beds and VARAZZI 200 beds.

The accommodation in GENOA is very cramped and the Hospital Staff work under difficulties - the operating theatre and X Ray Room are very small. There is practically no accommodation for observation cases, consequently the Medical Board is in almost continuous session to allow cases to return home or to their unit the same day.

The Hospital Director (Lt-Col. RUGA) and officers are working well.

(Lt-Col. ZICHTERI) and his Staff.
The men are of good physique and though mostly farmers are responding well to training - about 10% are illiterate and are being given elementary education.

Health is good about 1% reporting sick.
Generally a satisfactory Medical Coy and hospital - which will improve when returned to its permanent station.

19 Oct 46. G 3 N O A.

No 2 BLU had no medical points to discuss.

I visited the principal Hospital which is divided between GENOA 100 beds and VARAZZI 200 beds.
The accommodation in GENOA is very cramped and the Hospital Staff work under difficulties - the operating theatre and X Ray Room are very small. There is practically no accommodation for observation cases, consequently the Medical Board is in almost continuous session to allow the medical team to return home or to their unit the same day.
The Hospital Director (Lt-Col. TECGA) and officers are working well.

20 Oct 46.

I visited the overflow hospital at VARESE - this is a well run hospital - in a building used ~~before~~ before the war as children's holiday hostel and allows excellent ward space and ample room for dining accommodation for patients and Medical Coy.
Amputees are admitted to this hospital not requiring any form of hospital treatment and as settlement of their claims to pension or gratuities are long delayed - it is recommended that cases of this nature be sent to limb fitting centres or convalescent homes.

There is an overflow of the Medical Coy at this hospital and they are being trained there.

The C.O. (Capt. SOPRANI) has this hospital and detachment organized in a very efficient manner.

There is an urgent necessity for a light truck for domestic purposes at VAREZZE where there is at present two large ambulances - an economical arrangement would be to exchange one of these vehicles for a light truck.

I inspected the Medical Coy both at GENOA and VAREZZE the turn out was good and training is proceeding on the lines laid down by the Medical Directorate of War Ministry. The Medical Coy in GENOA has very poor accommodation in old barracks with very poor feeding and dining arrangements.

It is recommended that the hospital and medical Coy be centralised in accommodation at Quarto hospital by an agreement with the Civilian authorities similar to that which existed in 1940 - 43.

Staff deficiencies are dealt with in special reports.

21 Oct 46. TUE I.M.

dians, footballs and football boots are also required. The C.O. (Lt-Col. TAFF) and the secretary of this hospital take great interest in welfare generally and I recommend that every assistance be given them by the welfare Branch of the War Ministry.

A problem at this hospital is fuel - where the central heating plant requires 8 tons of fuel per day - by "coking up" in the wards a minimum of 5 tons per day will be required during the winter.

Staff deficiencies are dealt with in separate reports - urgent requirements are:- 1 Surgeon, 1 Dermatologist, 1 Ophthalmologist, 1 Neurologist.

A grant help would be the provision of a light vehicle for the use of the C.O. and domestic use generally.

The Medical Coy turned out well the recruits are of a good class and are responding well to training.

The Coy occupies its old barrack block in the hospital compound and though one corner has been damaged by bombs repairs are in hand. Kitchen, dining and welfare facilities satisfactory.

22 Oct 46.

In route to MILAN I visited CASALI O.A.R., No: 34 Field Hospital of the CRONIONA Division and the secondary hospital of 1 Terr. Comd. at NOVARA.

The hygiene, feeding and dining accommodation at CASALE was very ~~bad~~ satisfactory - except that dining hall tables should be ~~scrubbed~~ scrubbed. The small reception hospital at this CAR was unsatisfactory and action will be taken by D.D.M.S. No: 1 Terr. Comd.

34 Field Hospital located at VENEZIA is closed - quarters and equipment satisfactory.

The secondary hospital at NOVARA is situated in an uncompleted Military Hospital building, accommodation 200 beds (can expand to 400), III occupied.

This is a well run hospital and the C.O. (Lt-Col. SALVATI) is very energetic. There is an urgent need for an Administrative Officer, and two Medical Officers.

R. & R. works urgently required are protective fencing surrounding the hospital and store rooms, the mortuary also requires complete redecoration.

There is a fuel reserve for two months and a further two months stock should be authorized.

23 Oct 46. M.I.A.M.

British two weeks ago and already everything is working smoothly - the last block was taken over from 36 British C.R.S. during my visit.

A large estimate for U.N. works is awaiting approval which will re-instate the Central Meeting system etc; and provide for alterations and extension to COV ORS.

Hospital accommodation 600 - 800 (can expand to 1000), 537 occupied.

A well appointed theatre and cinema and canteens cater for the welfare of Staff and patients. This is a first class well run hospital.

24 Oct 46.

Visited 333 Field Hospital of CREMONA Division at AROIA.

The unit is closed but ready to accept patients if required.
Quarters and equipment satisfactory.

25 Oct 46.

Visited No: 3 Terr. Comd. Secondary Hospital at BRESCIA en route to BOLZANO.
Accommodation 200 (has beds only for expansion to 400)

Occupied 83.

The hospital buildings have been used for refugees and requires redecorating and repairs. Part of the buildings are still used by refugees and though this is probably unavoidable it is unsatisfactory as access to stores in the part occupied by the Military is causing anxiety with regard to safeguarding supplies and stores, moreover the sanitary condition of the refugee quarters leaves much to be desired.

Estimated requirements of fuel for winter period is 70 tons, 30 tons only have been approved for delivery in January.

Two M.O.s are required to replace two awaiting release.

A well run hospital under existing conditions. The director (Lt.-Col. RITARI) is hard working and energetic.

X Ray plant in need of repair. Equipment is also required for Dental Surgery.

As this hospital was not included in my programme, the excellent state found in all departments reflects credit on all concerned.

Visited 4 H.U. No medical points raised. Visited D.D.M.S. (Lt-Col. BLANCHINI A.) and introduced by him to G.O.C. Terr. Comd. (Gen. NEGRONI).

Visited secondary hospital BOLZANO Director (Lt-Col. PATTI).

Accommodation 150 (expanded to 200).

The hospital has suffered much war damage but works of reconstruction costing lire 3.000.000 are under way. A well run hospital doing good service under present difficulties.

27 Oct 46.

Visited CHEMICAL INSTITUTE, MERANO.

The Institute, moved to MERANO by the Germans, has nearly completed its move back to FLORENCE - about 80 railway wagon loads remain to be despatched and this should now be completed. Slight delays were caused by claims of A&AR on some of the stores and the retention of soap making materials by the local factory. These matters are receiving attention and will soon be settled. The 3.O. (Lt-Col. SCOTTI) has done excellent and hard work in sorting out, completing field equipment and taking inventories of a great mass of returned stores of all descriptions. A very capable officer.

27 Oct. 46. MERANO.

In the afternoon I visited at the request of the G.O.C. Terr. Comd. a Red Cross Hospital at MERANO which is receiving Ex-FOW T.B. cases.

This hospital is situated in a high part of the town in pleasant surroundings and is in a requisitioned hotel.

Accommodation is good and ample in large airy rooms. Three of the voluntary female Nursing Staff who have contracted T.B. were under treatment in the hospital.

Accommodation is good and ample in large airy rooms. Three of the voluntary female Nursing Staff who have contracted T.B. were under treatment in the hospital and appeared to be progressing satisfactorily. Treatment appeared to be very satisfactory and cases requiring operative treatment were under the care of a visiting specialist.

The physician in charge is energetic and has the hospital well organised. I gained the impression that although this institution was, under the circumstances quite satisfactory, it would be more beneficial if patients were treated in a properly appointed sanitorium, which I understand will soon be the case.

28 Oct 46.

Visited No: 82 Field Hospital of the DHILLI Division
at MALCESINE en route to VERONA.
This unit is closed - quarters and equipment satisfactory.

As an experiment this unit is running as a small convalescent unit for men of the Terr. Comd.
This scheme was initiated by the D.D.M.S. Terr. Comd.
and is to be commended, providing as it does for short periods of convalescence required by men who cannot afford to take leave or whose homes are outside Italy.

29 Oct 46. VERONA.

Visited principal hospital No: 4 Terr. Comd. accompanied by D.D.M.S.
Accommodation 600 (expand to 1000)
Occupied 310

The Military Hospital buildings have been severely bombed and only the administration block, officers wards and Medical Coy Qrs are habitable. General wards and specialist departments are situated in the old nearby civil hospital.

Under difficult conditions this Principal Hospital is well organised under an efficient Director (Lt-Col. BURTON) and Administration Officer (Major RICCI). I understand a large estimate for reconstruction and repairs has received sanction.

The Medical Coy turned out well and the discipline and technical training is excellent. The Director expressed a wish to retain permanently the services of the present Infantry Officer in command of the Coy.

Everything possible is done at this hospital for patients and Medical Company's welfare but I recommend welfare department of the Ministry to give assistance in restoring destroyed theatre and cinema.

A month's supply of fuel is on hand and demands for future supplies have been submitted.

General Remarks.

- 7 -

I have reduced itemised reports on the units as much as possible, but I wish to say that in all hospitals the hygiene, feeding, comfort and treatment of patients was of a very high order. Everywhere very devoted service is rendered by Nurses who control almost all the domestic life of the hospitals.

I found everywhere's desire to maintain and improve welfare facilities of patients and medical corps. At some of the smaller hospitals it is almost impossible to do much in this direction. For various reasons occupational therapy is not possible. It is recommended however that the welfare Department of the War Ministry continue to give advice and assistance as much as possible to all classes of hospitals in the Commands. Hospital diets, and their preparation and cooking, is in all hospitals excellent.

In no instance was shortage of medical supplies reported, in fact, good reserves are held.

Visited 7 AMU who had no comments to make regarding medical installations.

Visited office of Italian MD's (DMS on leave) interviewed Hygiene Officer, who spoke of the incidence of V.D. and stated he was in favour of the issue of sand from personal chemical prophylactic to troops (he favoured the American type). The monthly average is:- 9 Cases of Syphilis + 40 Gonorrhoea amongst a strength of 16,000 - 20,000. There is close liaison between the medical service (both civilian and military) and local police in the prevention of clandestine prostitution. I have no other comments regarding health of troops.

I visited the Italian Military Hospital the O.C. of which was acting DMS he accompanied me on the inspection of the Hospital.

The Hospital was clean and efficiently run in all departments considering the building is an old structure.

A shortage of the following was reported:-
Penicillin,
Insulin,
X Ray films (large size).

The medical company is trained at LUCCA Hospital and will be inspected at my next visit.

I visited the Military Chemical pharmaceutical Institute. Their work is, however, considerably retarded by the continued occupation by EDIMET of five of the blocks of buildings. It is essential that these buildings should be returned at once to the Instituto in view of the fact that they are specially constructed for certain types of machinery and alternative accommodation cannot be used.

I inspected the recruits under training and
though I consider the material poor, training appears
to be proceeding on good lines and I obtained a
copy of the training programme.

I visited SAGTIC CAR without pre-arrangement
and found all medical arrangements generally satis-
factory. The medical officer was superintending
orderlies at evening dressings etc.

The general physique of the recruits was good
and there was no undue sickness. The medical
officer expressed a wish to have some dental forceps
issued to enable him to do obvious necessary extrac-
tions and thus prevent long journeys to Udine for
this purpose with consequent loss of training time.
I recommend this. I also recommend the issue of
an microscope. Cleanliness of barracks rooms and
general hygiene good. An Ambulance should be
permanently stationed at this CAR.

24th Sep. 45

Visited PAMU Hospital.
This Hospital has been damaged by bombing but is
working well. The wards are large and airy and
were well run. In view of the number of patients
taken in for observation - recruits and ex-pows -
the authorized hospital accommodation should be
increased from 200 to 500. All equipment necessary
for this increase is on hand. Paint is required for
hospital beds. TT cases should be transferred as
soon as possible to sanitoriums.

In the afternoon I visited No. 6 RU BOLOGNA -
They had no capacity to take on medical arrangements.

Visited MANDA Hospital.

for this increase is on hand. Paint is required for
hospital beds. TB cases should be transferred as

In the afternoon I visited No. 6 HU BODOMA.
They had no comment to make on medical arrangements.
The OC Central Hospital was acting DMS. The main
Hospital situation here remains the same. The main
Hospital requires considerable repair and should
receive priority to enable the two schools now used
for overflow to be handed back to the civilian
authorities. The retention of these schools for
military purposes is causing considerable dissatisfaction
to the educational authority.
There is no shortage of medical supplies.

25 Sep. 45

On my return through Florence I visited the Military Medical School - where specialist training of Medical and Dental Officers is carried out - the school has all modern facilities but owing to present student accommodation being utilized for other purposes classes on any large scale cannot be arranged.

30th Sep. 45

Visited 10 AM and 1PM Territorial Command.

The chief concern of the DMS in the present regards to the Italian Military Hospital since vacation by U.S. Forces. These repairs are proceeding too slowly. It is an urgent necessity that these works be completed as early as possible to allow the present hospital situated in a civilian school to be moved back and the school handed over. The medical company is also occupying a school which could be handed back on completion of the military hospital buildings.

To enable a Central Medical Depot to be re-established for the supply of Southern Italy the DMS requests the return of the store buildings at "ADDALONI" at present occupied by the British, (Known as "ELIJAH BARDAH").

Visited the Italian Military Hospital ITALIA
accompanied by D.R.C.

The Hospital as stated is situated in a large
school and although such buildings are generally un-
suitable for modern hospital accommodation, excellent
use has been made of this school and provision has been
made for special departments which were working antic-
patorily. The laundry entirely manual worked was
excellent but working well.
and accommodation is
limited and none wards are overburdened but about one
accommodated on the top floor was in large airy and
pleasant rooms.

I visited the Medical Convalescent Hospital in another
school much too far away from the Hospital. The
recruiting was of a good class though of trades mostly
unsuitable for medical training. The D.R.C. has decided
that training shall take place at this Central H.C.
and not spread out over other hospitals and dispensaries.
This is an excellent idea and will ensure uniform
training and enable the best use to be made of medie-
cal instructors.

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The barrack accommodation was clean, beds and
kits in good shape and hygiene satisfactory.

I visited the Military Hospital buildings
under repair - this is a very good building, and will,
when ready, centralize the whole of the hospital
accommodation required for patients, Convalescent and ad-
ministration; but as stated, repair work is proceeding
too slowly.

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
