- 1) Anti-freeze oil for small-arms (Oil A.80= oil for light weapons) for the general lubrication of small-arms.-
- 2) Anti-freeze brake oil for cannons (oil mineral hydraulic buffer) for refilling hydraulic and hydropneumatic recoil buffers of cannons.
- 3) Special white lubricant (lubricant guns 40 m/m white - Lubricant for A.A. guns). for the mobile parts of the automatic loading mechanism and for the breach-blocks of guns and small-arms.
- 4) Anti-rust oil (oil C 70 - oil for cannons for the non painted parts and for general lubrication.
- 5) Concentrated graphited oil, for the slides, guides, recoil support bands and cradles.
- 6) Mineral Jelly for ball- bearings, general maintenance and for drum supports.
- 7) Graphited grease for the stock locking mechanisms. 6853
- 8) Petroleum (oil mineral burning) for cleaning the various parts of the arms.
- 9) Cotton waste coloured, for cleaning the various parts of the arms.
- 10) Rags cotton, for cleaning the various parts of the arms. 112/16
- 11) Flanellette for cleaning the barrels of small-arms. 112/16

The technical characteristics of the above mentioned raw

material have been defined from original British samples in order to use the most suitable raw material, to be found in Italy, which confirm with the original products so that the selected material can be used without inconveniences.

The attached table shows the various types of raw material required for the ordinary maintenance of arms.

The quantities indicated are the requirements for one month.

The units, on the basis of the number of guns on charge, will inform the Artillery Territorial Directorates concerned of their requirements of the material in question, calculated according to the data of the present circular.

1. As known, the strength present in corps and units is approximately of 1/3 inferior to that shown in the W/E as the 1/3 of the total strength is being trained at CARs. Consequently 1/3 of the arms in the W/E cannot be distributed and used regularly.

2. In view of the above we suggest two solutions:

- a - in each Formation, reduce several units to skeleton hence the weapons remaining at the Formation; 6839
- b - disband in each Formation several units to be reformed only in case of mobilisation. In such case the weapons should be stored by the Military Territorial Commands concerned.

3. In the meantime, since members of Allied Military Mission have frequently stated that the cleanliness and general conditions of British equipment and individual weapons on issue are not satisfactory, we beg:

My dear Mr. Prime Minister,

I have been requested by the Headquarters, Mediterranean Theater of Operations, United States Army, to inform you that the agencies of your Government which have purchased surplus Army motor vehicles have desired to procure many replacement parts for the maintenance of these vehicles. Since the parts desired were not available from Army surpluses, a request was made to the U.S. War Department to make arrangements in the United States so that your agencies could order the required parts direct from the manufacturers. It was also requested that if this arrangement could not be worked out by the War Department, then the manufacturers be asked as to the terms they would require for furnishing drawings and specifications of the required parts to your Government agencies in order that these items might be locally manufactured in Italy.

The reply from the War Department stated that it was desirable for normal commercial channels of trade to be re-established between the United States and Italy, and for that reason it was suggested that your Government should make their inquiries through commercial channels for the purchase of all vehicular spare parts that are not available from Army surpluses in this theater.

I am therefore advising you that your requests for prices and orders for actual delivery of spare parts should be submitted to the proper United States manufacturer and that proper United States Army part number and descriptive nomenclature must be used. Peninsular Base Section are prepared to give your agencies assistance in determining the proper manufacturer and part numbers and nomenclature to be used in correspondence on this subject.





With reference to your 1/DO/EC of 4 September and further to our conversation on 9th September.

Major Gadaby's letters did give our projected programme until the end of this year and were written on 2 August, one to SARCO Project which is overhauling engines and the other to the MALLERO Project which is occupied in overhauling vehicles.

This vehicle dump existed only for the Caproni Works and night raids had been taking place for some time with consequent losses of material.
- (b) Due to the rapid run down of forces in Austria, Italy, and Venezia Giulia there were sufficient lorries and engines of the type that Caproni were overhauling to enable the units to 'live on their fat' for many months and so further repaired vehicles were not required.

- (b) Due to the rapid run down of Forces in Austria, Italy, and Venezia Giulia there were sufficient lorries and engines of the type that Caproni were overhauling to enable the units to 'live on their fat' for many months and so further repaired vehicles were not required.

There were no factors in favour of continuing the contract, except of course to keep Caproni occupied and this could not be considered.

The Statement made by Caproni that some 5,000 hands will have to be laid off during October is not correct. The two projects together employ just over 3,000 and the great majority of these are paid on an hourly basis and are subject to a weekly notice, I do not understand therefore what staff has been signed on, under the impression that work was continuing until 31 Dec

I attach some notes concerning the numbers employed in the two factories and the amount that have been paid for work done up to the end of July 46. From this you will see that a sum of over half a million pounds Stirling has been spent in what I consider is a direct contribution to the rehabilitation of Italian Industry.

Other benefits Caproni have gained due to our contracts are that the firm is now a going concern and able to enter into direct production on civilian contracts; that we have paid their operatives during the period of the contracts, whereas, had we not done so Caproni would have had to pay the men (or a certain proportion of them) out of Capital.

Other contracts have also been placed with Caproni (quite apart from Taliado and Genoa projects) as a result of direct tendering in competition with other firms, for the manufacture of vehicle and engine spares and other items of Ordnance supply which R.A.O.C. could not provide at the time they were required.

I think you will agree that R.E.M.E. have done Caproni an immense amount of good and it is understandable that they will feel the loss when the contract ends. However some operatives will be employed during October in helping to clear stores and machinery and the method of payment for these services has been agreed.

In view of the reasons given you will also realize that it is not possible to keep on the contracts as the vehicles and engines are not required

I think your suggestion that M.M.I.A. might be able to give similar work to Caproni well worth pursuing, also my own suggestion that the Italian Government might be ablr to place orders for repair of vehicles and engines for ultimate use by civilian firms.

I have dealt with the subject at some length, but I hope I have succeeded in giving you a clear picture of the situation.

I have been approached unofficially by the British Embassy with regards to the cancellation of your contract (ME.2E.3356 of 11/1/46) with Caproni Aircraft, at Milan, intimation of which was given to them in your ME.2E.3356 of August 22.

Caproni in their approach to the Embassy make no allegation that the war office or yourselves are acting beyond the terms of the contract in giving them a month's notice under Article 19, but they do represent that on August 3rd by Major Gadsby's letter ME.2E.2329 they were led to believe that a programme of work had been laid down for them lasting until December 31st. They perhaps somewhat naturally took this letter as an indication that the contract was firm until the end of 1946, at least, and as a consequence of the letter made suitable preparation including of course, the signing on of staff, to cover the programme.

Your letter of August 22 cancelling the contract has therefore come as an unpleasant surprise to them and will incur, unless they get other work at short notice, the laying off of some 5,000 hands during October.

I have agreed with the British Embassy to bring this to your notice in a demi-official capacity (because until and unless the Italian Government take this up with us I cannot write as from the Commission) and I confine myself now to pointing out the very difficult economic and political situation with which Italy is faced in the North, and the unfortunate impression which will gain ground if it is thought that British military authorities have led Caproni to believe that the programme of work was firm until the end of the year and then break the contract from the beginning of the last quarter, thereby increasing the unemployment figures in Milan at the very outset of what is expected to be a very difficult winter.

Please don't think that I don't realize the difficulty that you must have in reconciling the directives of the War Office with the economic difficulties in this country, which I know are as much your concern as ours. Perhaps some compromise helpful to Caproni's and their workers could be found.



1. The Italian Ministry of War has asked for information on the future supply of maintenance stores for Italian equipment transferred to the Italian Army.

2. According to AG 091-711 e(SD)-O of 2 November 1945, para 11 (b), three possible sources of maintenance are envisaged:-

- (1) From indigenous Italian resources, including captured material (except German weapons) and such local manufacture as may be authorised by Allied Force Headquarters.
- (2) By purchases from appropriate US and UK surplus disposal agencies in TAIK or stocks which are available to those disposal agencies.
- (3) Through the Italian Government Import programme.

3. The first source (indigenous sources), which in present circumstances being local manufacture, cannot produce very much owing to the prior needs of Civilian Rehabilitation and the uncommercial procedure of manufacturing only small numbers of spare parts. The second source, (Allied Surplus) is now exhausted by the transfer of all surplus dumps to the Italian Government. The Italian War Ministry (after the allocation of their quota) will be left with practically no M.S. stores, and few replacements for weapons.

4. The question now arises, therefore, of importing stores from the country of origin and the terms on which these imports could be effected.

5. As an example of what is required I attach a preliminary list of spare parts required for Dodge and Bedford vehicles, of which the Italian Army holds 822 and 640 respectively and which, if no further spare parts are forthcoming, will largely have to be scrapped and their services lost to the Italian Army in addition to the severe financial loss.

6. It will be sometime before Italian industry can replace vehicles or arms of British manufacture and as the Italian Army transport and equipment is already reaching a dangerously low level of efficiency, it is recommended that steps be taken immediately to grant the Italian Government facilities to purchase, such replacements as they require from British manufacturers. As it is realised that these reported costs to date have
