Memorandum on Clothing for CC.RR

1. In accordance with the direction of the CCS, the CC.RR is a part of the present Army. The scale of clothing is prescribed, and the instructions specifically state that no issues will be made on the basis of uniformity or appearance, and no Allied provided items will be issued until all like items of Italian origin are exhausted. The scale is well known, and in general provides one outer uniform and one pair of boots. Issues to the present Italian Army will not be made in excess of the scale. There can be no argument with MIA on the scale. If you want to get it changed, you can ask the CCS.

2. The recent correspondence from General Browning to AFHQ, and the AFHQ reply to the effect that the CC.RR could have priority over the rest of the Army in no way changes the scale of issue nor does it permit issues for the sake of uniformity or appearance, nor does it permit issue of Allied items while Italian items are available.

3. I do not know the basis for the Admiral's letter to the Prime Minister regarding the possibility of issuing dyed-green battle dress to the CC.RR. Nor do I know the basis for the statement that Italian provided items are not available, since this statement is not in accordance with the facts. Someone may have confused the supply of battle dress to the Florence ²¹¹ Brigade with the balance of the CC.RR. The Florence Brigade is BR-ITI. The British Army is responsible for its supply. The British Army has no uniforms of Italian make or color. All BR-ITI troops are in battle dress. Therefore the Florence Brigade is in battle dress.

4. However, the balance of the CC.RR is ITI-ITI. It has never been intended, and it is repeated that it is not now intended nor planned, to put any part of the ITI-ITI Category in Allied-dyed uniforms where it is possible to supply Italian uniforms, within the scale regardless of uniformity or appearance. Italian uniforms will continue to be provided for the ITI-ITI CC.RR. No Allied outer uniforms can be issued until the Italian stocks are exhausted.

5. It has been necessary for us to put the guard battalions and certain other formations into Allied outer uniforms. These must remain in such uniforms, as it is not practicable to make a complete change over now. Therefore a reserve for these 30 battalions must be maintained in Italian depots. Outside of these troops mentioned, all of the ITI-ITI Category is in Italian outer uniform.

6. To agree to put any of the ITI-ITI CC.RR in Allied outer uniform would (1) promptly exhaust the present holdings in Italian depots without hope of replacement, (2) require the Allies to furnish more clothing for the balance of the ITI-ITI Category, and (3) waste, without hope of recovery for Army use, the present CC.RR uniforms. Therefore the question of issue of Allied clothing hinges on the one point - are like Italian items available? We will consider this point.

First - We do have Italian uniforms in Army depots. So it is obvious from the start that no Allied outer clothing can be made available to the ITI-ITI Category of the CC.RR.

Second - Are these Italian uniforms in depots available to the CC.RR? The answer is yes, on the same conditions as other units of the Army. But let me make it understood that the CC.RR cannot secure any issue, regardless of its priority, unless all of the conditions are complied with.

7. What are the conditions? Here they are:

First - That the issue will not provide clothing in excess of the authorized scale. It is perfectly obvious to us that if we authorize the issue of clothing in excess of the scale, the War Ministry has, quite rightly, a good case for demanding more Allied items.

Second - That the unit has no stocks which can be utilized. In other words - it has no reserves of any kind.

8. I want to tell you that we have yet to get a requisition from the CC.RR which fulfilled both of the conditions, and while issues have been authorized, it was with the understanding that "domani" the conditions would be fulfilled.

9. In order to satisfy the second condition we need inventory of stocks. These are so delayed at coming in (15 July inventory received 30 August), that it gives rise of doubt and always permits the CC.RR to say - we did have that then but not now, and the present requisition is based on the fact we have nothing now in our stocks.

10. That would set by if the facts were not known to be otherwise. The CC.RR has, in its depots, large quantities of various

items, and at the same time asks for more. For what? So that the Allies will have to furnish more, leaving the Italians their reserves? For instance you have in the depots over 9,000 dress uniforms. If you have any naked men, why not use these uniforms. And this is just a start, many men have both the dress and service uniform issued to them. I want to repeat that until the CG.RR uses up its present stocks that no issues can be authorized. And further, until the CG.RR assures us that no man has clothing in excess of the scale can any issues be authorized. Those are our orders from CCS. So it would appear that if you have any CG.RR who do not look the part, that the issue of a dress uniform will correct that. Certainly if the question of uniform is paramount in maintaining morale, you are overlooking a bet in improving the morale of at least 9,000 men by failing to give them uniforms much finer than anything the Allies provide.

11. The last inventory shows a large quantity of grey-green uniforms on hand, over 10,000. These, with the dress uniform, constitute over 20% reserve of clothing in the CG.RR depots. And yet you are asking for more. It may be that some of the grey-green uniforms are of such sizes they are not suitable. It would appear that if this is the case, the CG.RR are negligent in not arranging for an exchange with the Army depots. But one thing is certain, no additional similar items can be issued while the CG.RR maintains over 20% reserve, or any reserve in its warehouses. Again, I repeat, those are our specifications from CCS. The place for reserves is in Army warehouses, and that is where they must be kept.

12. On the matter of shoes. We gave the CG.RR 5,000 shoes so they could turn in shoes to Army depots to be repaired. No shoes have been turned into Army depots. If any CG.RR is out of shoes, it is due to the negligence of the CG.RR. All that is required is to turn in the old shoes and get another pair. But the old shoes are not turned in, yet the continued demand for more shoes. We require one pair of old shoes be turned in to get a new pair. We have not yet received the one pair. No requisition is needed in this matter, as it is a simple exchange. For that reason, no requisition for shoes can be approved. We are perfectly willing to give you good shoes for your old ones, but we want the old ones so we can repair them. We gave you sufficient shoes to make this exchange, but nothing has happened. But it is noticed on the inventory that shoes are on hand in CG.RR warehouses. In view of the stories that men cannot perform duty from lack of shoes, it can only be said that the CG.RR organization is to blame for inefficient distribution of shoes.

13. Requisitions will be honored if they meet the required conditions. Priority applies only after the required conditions

are met. No requisitions need be submitted on the basis of securing uniformity and appearance. No requisitions need be submitted which will increase the scale of issue, for they cannot be approved. No plan can be discussed to put the ITI-LTI CC.RR in Allied uniforms, as none can be issued until Italian stocks are exhausted.

14. I want to emphasize yet again that MMIA as the "independent supply agency" has specific orders from CCS which it must obey. MMIA is obeying those orders. If the CC.RR (through Public Safety Sub Commission) will also obey the conditions laid down by CCS, the CC.RR will get the clothing and shoes which it is permitted for MMIA to give them. So far, I am sorry to say, the CC.RR has not obeyed those conditions, though MMIA has explained what is necessary over and over again.

With reference to the conversation which transpired on the 14 Aug 45 at the War Commission or public security, regarding the request for clothing for the C.R. (this H.Q.'s Letter No. 3/1350/8-1 dated 30 Jul 45), on the verbal invitation of Lieut. Col. Wilson, we beg to state:

1. The request for 65,000 series covers the complete requirements for articles of clothing necessary completely and with uniformity, to furnish all the military personnel of the Arm of the C.R., with clothing for at least one year, with the intention, as stated in the said letter of request, of diminishing, as old issues in the meantime, have been made.
2. Instead, in order to meet the most urgent demands, three were made, in turn, two requests for a total of 30,000 series (one for 10,000 for ex-~~...o..~~ and one for 20,000). Having reached an agreement with the Ministry of War for the acceptance of such a request, the said Ministry has already made known its endorsement to M.I.A., specifying the stores.
3. The stores of the Legions at present are, or may be considered to be without serviceable articles of clothing, therefore this General H.Q. has already ordered that all clothing which, because of being too small or worn out is no longer serviceable to the personnel of the Arm of the C.R., should be handed in to the Commissariat stores.
4. However, with some articles, (e.g. small overcoats), owing to the great needs, alteration has been ordered into trousers or berets.
5. The request for blankets, on a scale of three to each man '3 1 4 2' can now be considered as cancelled, in that, according to a recent communication from the Ministry of the Interior, civilian firms must provide for the supply of such needs.

However, we have reason to believe that the firms supplying barracks materials are not at present capable of completely coping with demands, unless they will be able to do so shortly, the Ministry of the Interior having recently increased the wage, bringing it up to an amount of L.6 daily for military personnel.

3. The stores of the Legions at present are, or may be considered to be without serviceable articles of clothing, before this General HQ. has already ordered that all clothing which, because of being too small or worn out is no longer serviceable to the personnel of the Arm of the GC, RR, should be handed in to the Commissariat offices.

- However, with some articles, (e.g. small overcoats), owing to the great needs, alteration has been ordered into trousers or berets.
4. The request for blankets, on a scale of three to each man 2412 can now be considered as cancelled, in that, according to a recent communication from the Ministry of the Interior, civilian firms must provide for the supply of such needs.

However, we have reason to believe that the firms supplying barracks materials are not at present capable of completely coping with demands, perhaps they will be able to do so shortly, the Ministry of the Interior having recently increased the wage, bringing it up to an amount of L.6 daily for military personnel.

5. Solely because of the deficiency in clothing items, there are, up to the present 9,932 carbines in civilian clothes, distributed in the following manner:

1. Reference your AC/14501/11/P3 of 5 Oct 45, the answer to your AC/14501/11/P3 of 14 Sep 45 is that an answer is still awaited from A.F.H.Q. regarding the disposal of arms and materials in the Beretta factory. We know nothing of any proposal to allot these arms outside the theatre.

2. The allotment of arms and ammunition to the CCRR on the scales authorised is therefore a matter between the General Commanding the CCRR and the Ministry of War.

3. As you know, this whole question is at the moment somewhat complicated by the proposed changes in relations between Allied and Italian Authorities and functions of various Headquarters, Commissions and Sub Commissions concerned.

- The following points should be kept in mind:
- (a) The CC.RR made their request for arms at a time when their authorised strength was 55,000; since their increase, no request for arms has been put through channels.
 - (b) The increase in strength does not justify a blanket demand for 10,000 additional items, as some of the CC.RR are "recovered" CC.RR in the North. Where are their arms?
 - (c) The CC.RR themselves are not pressing for any additional equipment of ordinary carbines. Rather, they desire to re-equip the force with automatic carbines; to do this, the release of the captured stocks in the Beretta factory is essential. All the "flap" about arms for CC.RR has as its source their agitation for the release of the automatic carbines from the "Beretta" factory.
 - (d) The availability figures are the War Ministry's and should be noted as such. While I do not believe that there is any deliberate concealing of stocks, I do feel that the cumbersome nature of their accounting system and the general slowness of their communications make the availability figures considerably below actual amounts on hand.

Subject: Individual armament of the CC. RR.

The present scale of armament of the CC. RR. is absolutely inadequate to meet requirements and to cope with the situation. Individual scale of arms is the same as that which was in force over half a century ago, that is to say the Mod. 1891 carbine and the pistol, with the disadvantage, that, owing to lack of availability, many of the men are deficient of the pistol.

The few automatic arms allotted and issued from part of the units, moreover incomplete, and which has nothing to do with personal arms.

This situation has a marked demoralizing effect on the Carabinieri who, only too often, are obliged to face bands of civil doers, today very numerous, well organized and with modern armament. The CCRR's letter showing their deficiencies in arms is a misstatement. First of all, the figures shown as "requested" are those which theoretically would have been necessary for 65,000 men, but their request and the subsequent allotment was made at a time when the authorized strength was 55,000. Hence, the amounts allotted should be read against the amounts necessary to complete 55,000 men. At the time of the increase in CCRR ceiling, the actual bodies were recruited from CCRR in the North; Lt. Col. Wilson, Public Safety S/C, informed me that these people would be coming in with arms for the most part. It was agreed at this time that the CCRR could submit a request for whatever they might need due to their increase in strength, but this new request was to be based on actual needs, not simply a blanket indent for 10,000 extra items.

The CCRR figures showing the amounts they claim were allotted are generally just 50% of the ~~the~~ amount allotted. Further, they do not reflect issues made in the North by AMG officers direct to CCRR units.


The CCRR show 3 serious shortages in arms: Carbines, pistols and light machine guns. The carbines they are actually not interested in; they know the amount of light machine guns they have requested simply does not exist and consequently they suggest the substitution of automatic carbines. At Appx A is set out what the CCRR requested for 55,000 men in Column "A", what our records indicate was allotted in column B, what they say was allotted in Column C, the difference between B & C in Column D and present availabilities in Column E. Some of the discrepancies are due to the fact that the CCRR statement represents the position at 15 Aug., while allotments have been made since.

Your Mission informed us with the above-mentioned letter that the statement of automatic weapons turned in North by the partisans can be made to the Royal Carabinieri before the amounts ~~of~~ as well as the condition of the weapons made available by the aforementioned surrender of arms, are known; with the exception of my issues which may be authorized (MMIA LO's in urgent cases).

In this connection I deem it necessary to point out that:

- it is essential that those who are to maintain public order be given weapons at least equal to those of the disturbers of the peace who, as is known, are well supplied with automatic weapons, hand grenades and sometimes even mortars.

SEE / - the issue of arms only in urgent cases, subject to authorization by MMIA LO's cannot always be carried out in practice when the need arises,

(2) owing to possible unavailability now at the depots of the area in which they are to be used. Moreover, the use of these arms requires always a certain period of training on the part of the personnel who is to handle them, thus frustrating the exceptional character of the measure adopted.


In view of the foregoing I ask that your Mission kindly reconsider this question in order that the automatic weapons mentioned above may be urgently allotted to the Royal Carabinieri; such allotment could be made even gradually, i.e. as and when the amount of arms recovered at the warehouses becomes known.

May I be permitted to stress the importance and urgency of the ~~the~~ measure requested which would enable the Royal Carabinieri to have a greater fire power, which would offset, at least in part, the scarcity of personnel, which latter is always found to be inadequate to meet the diverse requirements of the present situation.

It appears to this Command that an Officer of the Allied Mission presented himself at the Artillery Directorate in Rome withdrawing 60 automatic rifles "beretta" which were being manufactured for the CC.RR. Force,

Besides which, the M.M.I.A. has issued instructions that the 241 automatic rifles existing in Sardinia, be assigned for another employment, while the Ministry of War intended to cede them to the CC.RR. Force on account of the 660 which are urgently needed by the Force.

Furthermore it appears that the Allied Mission wants to withdraw the 200 automatic rifles, and relative ammunitions, which were at the time given to the Rome CC.RR. Legion for the police activity carried out in the Quarticciolo hamlet. In this regard this Command represented to the Sub-Commission with letter n. 330/28-5-944 dated 28/2/45, the necessity to leave these arms to the a/m Legion which still needs them given the actual critical conditions of public Order.

The Sub-Commission is requested kindly to contact the M.M.I.A. in order to avoid that arms assigned to CC.RR. be taken away from them, as many of them are still without arms and cannot be employed in the important tasks of their services during the moments of most necessity, i.e. when the full strength must be employed, and that, in particular, the arms which have been already granted in use to the Rome Legion be not withdrawn.
