Subject: Production of the mechanical workshops. -

1. From the statistic data received, it appears that the weekly output of repairs carried out at the repair units (which were approximately 480 in the first six months of 1946) has lightly decreased during the months of August and September, having dropped to 460.

2. This is due, besides the reasons indicated by you, to the disbandment of Nos. 1 and 2 Mobile Parks and, above all, to the fact that from time to time when the LADs of the M.T. units, mobile Battalions and Carabinieri Legions commence to function, the majority of class 1 repairs and a few of class 2 repairs are carried out by the units themselves and therefore not entered in the weekly repairs.

For the same reasons the repair units, having to carry out almost all repairs of classes 2 and 3, which require more personnel and time, must show, compared with the past, a numerical reduction in the weekly out-put.

3. Regarding the administrative work carried out by the chiefs of the Repair Units it is known that the renewal of the peace administrative rules, (w.e.f. 1st July) absorbs a notable part of their activities. Unfortunately it is not possible to quickly change the laws in force, which aim at a severe administration of public funds. However provisions have been proposed - and we hope that they will be quickly approved - which will notably facilitate the management of unit accounts, permitting a speedier carrying out of the matters concerned.

4. The assignment of the funds to repair units depends on the relative allotment of the budget which cannot be exceeded. A temporary crisis in the availability of the funds has been caused by the substitution of the war administrative rules with the peace administrative rules. This has provoked a temporary less frequent assignment of funds to the local units as it was not known, then, the amount of the new allotments.

Said difficulties have now been overcome and the assignments of funds are proportioned to the importance of repair units, to their production output and to the number of vehicles remaining in the territory under their jurisdiction.

5. The employment of the personnel for Repair units was previously made in a manner not always connected with the technical efficiency required for the carrying out of the duties, as tradesmen were not available, due to them all being employed by civilian workshops with a very high rate of pay.

The prohibition of dismissals does not permit, at present, the necessary substitutions. We hope for a better future as soon as the less capable personnel can be dismissed.

6. Regarding the mess-halls and other accomodations of economical character for the workers, we would point out that they have been by this time, set up in almost all military workshops and spare parts stores and that soon they will be also set up in the repair units that still do not possess them.

a) - Engines, rear axles and gears.

It has been ordered that for engines, which have their cylinders and elbow shafts rectified, a small metal plate bearing the inscriptions of the O.A.R.E. or of the civilian firm which rectified them, should be placed on the mainblock, in a position where it can easily be seen, mentioning also the maximum or the minimum adjustments made, i.e. "Adjusted" cylinders to ..... m/m - Shaft to ..... m/m, and the progressive reference number. -

A rectangle measuring 54 m/m x 27 m/m which encloses two red stars of a diameter of 25 m/m each (that indicate by the order in which they are painted, the adjustments carried out to the cylinders and to the elbow shafts) will also be painted with red enamel paint in a position where it can easily be seen.

If one of the adjustments alone is carried out, the star which represents the other will be substituted by a horizontal line in red measuring 25 m/m x 2 m/m, and therefore if only the cylinder is adjusted a star will be shown followed by the horizontal line, and viceversa if only the elbow shaft is adjusted.

The date of the adjustment to the engine group will also be inserted in the above metal plate.

A similar procedure will be used for the repairs carried out by the Caproni Firm, which will provide a suitable plate on which the firm - date - type of repair will be shown.

b) - Guns, small and automatic weapons. -

The markings to be made on the weapons, guns and their parts, manufactured or repaired in the establishments of the Army or by private industry are already being used for all the Italian material employed by the Army.

However we will confirm by circular said instructions, explaining them, where necessary, on the basis of the suggestions contained in the above referred letter.





1. From reports received over the past 8 months I have observed that the outfit from the Repair Units in Dorsetshire Command has not appreciably increased and has in some instances fallen to a lower level. It is realized that this lack of progress is largely due to circumstances outside your control such as the lack of spare parts and the general deterioration in the condition of vehicles, but it is felt, and I am sure you will agree, that save the notes which you control road more fully investigate. The following three points are therefore brought to your notice.

2. Firstly, the general administration and routine in the workshops of these mobile units will be to very much centralized and standardized. This results in commanding officers being compelled to spend too much time at their desks or holding up subordinate batches not appreciably concerned with the making of vehicles. It is suggested, therefore, that these workshops should be granted by the commanding officer three or four days a week for the purpose of cross fitting in case of accidents &c. Furthermore it is suggested that money allocated for the purchase of spare parts is occasionally either not used at all, or not used in the best way. You will realize that stocks of essential stores held in certain units, notably those in factories, are essential if any progress is to be made in the reconditioning of the many unserviceable vehicles which still exist.

3. Secondly, on the question of available money allocated to the various repair units, I am informed that the amounts available vary very considerably from time to time and do not always correspond to the actual needs of the various units. It has also been suggested that the best way to do this is to have a unit which is responsible for the whole of the work in the best way. You will realize that stocks of essential stores held in certain units, notably those in factories, are essential if any progress is to be made in the reconditioning of the many unserviceable vehicles which still exist.

1. Within the Infantry Divisions a method of accounting for stores was introduced by BLUs when attached to the Divisions which was a slight variant on the British system. By their letter CPC/1200/S of 22 Dec. 45, the M. of W. wished (inter alia) to introduce the Italian system of accounting and this HQ letter Q 209 of 3 Jan. 46 resisted this change within the Divisions.
2. The Command Repair Units are functioning on an Italian system which is not fully understood here but it is thought to be cumbersome.
3. For the future it is felt that
  - (a) A written summary of the Divisional system might be prepared for the Ministry of War.
  - (b) The implications as regards making major changes in the accounting system of Command Repair Units are that BLUs would have to provide some detailed assistance.

TO : Ministry of War. (2)

1. With the commencement of major overhauls to R.F. & Q.F. BORNING, and the anticipated use of PIACOMA and GILSON VAL TIGRA for the major overhaul of ARTILLERY and small Arms of Allied units, it is suggested for your consideration that a system be introduced whereby repaired equipments or assemblies are marked in such a manner, that the establishment executing the repair can be identified.
2. Whilst such a system can be introduced with little trouble in the arsenals, small arms factories, QARH, and other organisations under your control, it is also highly desirable that civilian contractors carrying out major overhauls to such equipment on your behalf, should also adopt the same procedure.
3. The main benefit to be derived is that in the event of unexpected failures etc, due either to poor materials or faulty workmanship, the establishment concerned can easily be identified, and if suitable technical records are maintained, modification can be made to correct those factors.
4. As a guide to the marking etc, which could be used, we give below a brief outline of general requirements.  
(a) IN INS, REAR AXLE, AND GEAR BOX ASSEMBLIES.  
Each overhauled or rebuilt assembly should be fitted with a plate bearing a serial number, name of establishment, and in the case of engines the new dimensions of the cylinder and crankshaft bearings. In addition each establishment should keep a register and signature each serial number allotted to identification plates, should be entered all relevant technical information, source of raw material used, date of completion etc, concerning the assembly to which the plate is fitted.

(b) ARTILLERY.

All spare parts manufactured and fitted to artillery of Allied units

it is suggested for your consideration that a system be introduced whereby reported equipments or assemblies of any kind, and other civilian contractors carrying out major overhauls to such equipment on our behalf, should adopt the same procedure.

2. Whilst such a system can be introduced with little trouble into the Research, Small Arms factories, Ordnance and other organisations under your control, it is also highly desirable that on our behalf, the establishment of a major overhaul unit be identified, and all suitable technical records are maintained, modification can be made to correct those factors.
3. The usual burrkit to be derived in these in the event of unexpected failure etc, due either to poor materials or faulty workmanship, the establishment concerned can easily be identified, and if suitable technical records are maintained, modification can be made to correct those factors.

4. As a guide to the armament etc, which could be used, we give below a brief outline of general requirements.

(a) In-line, Reciprocating, and Gear box assemblies.

Each overhauled or rebuilt assembly should be fitted with a plate bearing a serial number, name of establishment, and in the case of engines the new designation of the cylinder and crankshaft bearings. In addition such establishments should keep a register and against each serial number allotted to identification plates, should be entered all relevant technical information, source of raw material used, date of completion etc., concerning the assembly to which the plate is fitted.

(b) Artillery.

All spare parts manufactured and fitted to Artillery or Armored vehicles under arms major overhaul at TICLIC, Jarrow, should be stamped with a suitable marking for the reason outlined in para (3) above. In addition an identification plate should be fitted to the complete weapon as some convenient place on the carriage.

(c) Small Arms.

In the case of small arms it is suggested that the name of the firm carrying out the overhaul and repair should be stamped on the body of the weapon. All spare parts manufactured and fitted to

weapons of allied make, should, where practicable, be stamped with a suitable identification marking.

5. When final arrangements have been completed for the base repair of vehicles and similar equipment in an Italian Base workshop this same system with modifications could also be accepted, to assist in technical control and suitability of materials used for the repair of such equipment.

1. No British personnel of the Training Increment are fully familiar with the Staghound Armoured Car but every opportunity is being taken to remedy this with the aid of the Workshop Manual. One British Craftsman, however, has had sufficient experience to instruct in Unit maintenance when the courses are in progress.
2. At the Armoured Car School there is a Naresciale with a very good knowledge of the car, who is training his own mechanics.
3. An Armoured car has been sent to the Centro Studie where a civilian expert will instruct in maintenance.
4. 155 Workshops had no trained personnel of this type of work and none are being attached to the School.



2. The opinion was formed that technical control by qualified military personnel was inadequate in some cases particularly as regards control of the engine repair shop and the final inspection of completed vehicles.
3. A technical workshop officer should be appointed to control organisation of the workshops, the standard of work therein, and the allocation of priorities of work in the auxiliary sections ( electricians, welders, etc.). This officer would spend almost the whole of his time in the workshops. Without such an officer it is not thought the workshop can function properly.
4. In all major sections of the workshop a technical N.C.O. should be appointed to see that the orders of the technical workshop officer were carried out. In addition a capable and experienced N.C.O. should be appointed as head of the inspection squad to be responsible to the Commandant that completed vehicles were given a thorough stationary inspection and a road test, in place of the present road test.
5. It is thought that the adoption of these measures together with some system of supervising the spares supply to auxiliary sections of the workshop will result in an improved standard of workmanship and a greater output of work.

Detailed equipment staff tables have been prepared showing requirements for all Schools in respect of weapons, ammunition etc for Period April - December 1946.

1. School of Tactics.

With the exception of a short course of instruction in British tactical training, instructional and administrative methods attended by six Colonels, the month under review has been spent in planning and organising the School of Tactics at its new location at CIVITAVECCHIA. General Matteoli has devoted much energy and enthusiasm towards the formation of the School. Progress has been retarded by :-

- (a) The failure of building materials to arrive.
- (b) The failure of G.M.R.E. to produce a V.E. for the School. Provided that the project is approved from the financial view point it is hoped that the School will be ready to operate on 1 June 1946.

2. Artillery Car School.

The course which commenced in February was concluded in the early days of the month. The School has now moved to a new location at TCR di QUINTO and is passing through a phase of reorganisation. The release of a further 16 Stn Hounds and 3 Dings has greatly increased training facilities.

- (c) The training of a large number of new instructors required for the School. Provided that new weapons are forthcoming it is hoped that this stage will be completed in all branches, i.e. MAC and 4.2-in Mortar by the beginning of July.

Preparation for the move of the vehicle repair centre to the School of Motorisation have progressed and it will move to CECCHETOLA during the first few days of this month. Some training models and wall charts have been obtained.

In the event of the Artillery Recruit Training Centre being established at the studio or motor barracks OTTAVIENUTA, it is proposed to move the school of E&M to Asola barracks where it is at present located into the 22nd Regt barracks.

Results of courses which concluded on 30 March 1946 at the motorisation repair centre are shown in Appendix 'D' to this report.

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**11. School of Administration and Welfare.**

DELAY IN COMPLETION OF BARRACK BUILDINGS.

During the month I have made a visit (in some cases more than one) to all the Schools comprising the Scuole Centri Militari. With the possible exception of Civitavecchia, where the Contractors are working busily and considerable progress has been made, the standard is deplorable. The Italian military authorities have, in every case, prepared an estimate and detailed memorandum of their requirements. Genio Militare prepared financial estimates of the cost of the work involved. Up to this point there can be no criticism or suggestion of negligence on the part of either the personnel of Comando Scuole or Genio Militare. But virtually nothing has been done. The position caused me considerable alarm at the beginning of the month and I visited General Cortezzza and consequently Signor Brezio, Minister of War, and encouraged us impress upon them both, that unless funds were made available to implement essential work, the position on the 1st of May (when the Schools were supposed to start) would be a serious one. Both General Cortezzza and the Minister were co-operative, but there was only one answer. The Italian Government has not yet authorised the funds to meet the cost of the contracts. In spite of promises and a certain amount of optimistic thinking the position is virtually the same at the end of the month. The work has not yet started. Without being defeatist, it can be said quite definitely that the essential buildings will not be in the condition which we hoped, by the 1st May. This fact must be accepted and I have therefore impressed on the Italian Commanders of all the Schools that this unfortunate situation must not allow them in any way either to lose hope or slacken their efforts. They must improvise.

I am glad to say that, with the possible exception of Col. Metteis, Commanding the Scuole Autieri, the response of the Commanders of the Schools has been most satisfactory. All of them have prepared interim plans to enable the Schools to operate under adverse conditions which are now inevitable. None of them have lost heart and I am confident that although we shall not attain the ideal for which we hoped, training will be able to commence and, to a large extent, the welfare factor, on which the Director has made so much emphasis, will not be neglected. Provisional Spaccio's and welfare facilities have been organised and every effort has been made to provide the maximum possible comfort under existing conditions to improve the living conditions of the men. I am glad to say the response of the military officers concerned, although deplored the inaction of the Italian Government, is, to say the least, most fortunate. As an indication to the clarity of thought and thoroughness with which the Colonels are dealing with their problems I enclose a memorandum written by Col. Mancuso on the conditions at Coccaglio, and from personal observation I am satisfied that there is not one word of exaggeration in what he says. 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Now, even if decent accommodation must be put off for the moment owing to particular reasons, even if the question of the Kitchens can be temporarily solved by using Field Kitchens, if available, even if provisionally I will try my best to provide for the electric light (switches, bulbs etc must be bought anyhow) nothing can be done to solve, in the same way the problem of the missing windows, doors, draining system and water supply.

According to my opinion it is necessary therefore, that the authority should be immediately given for the following expenditures:


