1. A meeting took place on 25 August '47 between Dr. DE MARCHÉ (President of ARAR) and Lt. Col. MOLÉAN, ADM.
2. The object of the meeting was to clarify the situation with which ARAR has been confronted recently in endeavouring to persuade the various directorates within the Ministry of Defence (Army) to purchase stocks of urgently needed technical spares ex ARAR, where prices had been considered excessive in comparison with funds available and for which immediate payment had been demanded.
3. Dr. DE MARCHÉ stated that at a recent meeting of C.I.R. (Comitato Interministeriale Ricostruzione)* a treasury grant for 1947/8 to the Ministry of Defence had been discussed, and it was decided that the grant would be utilised under two separate headings for the purpose of purchasing Army requirements from ARAR. This would automatically overcome difficulties which had arisen in the past when it was necessary for all purchases to be paid for on a cash basis.
 - a) One milliard lire would be allocated to Ministry of Defence requirements coming under the heading of stores essentially of a war like nature and of an urgent and immediate requirement.

4. ARAR are at the moment endeavouring to reach an agreement with the War Ministry as to the division of stores under these two headings.

Further more Dr. DE MARQUE stated that APAR are now in the process of reviewing these prices with the object of a further possible decrease or even meeting the War Ministry request to release them at scrap metal rates.

6. In conclusion, it is interesting to note that there is at last an endeavour to facilitate the purchase of future stores by a more convenient financial arrangement, a factor which has long been of considerable magnitude, and that stores, at least of a purely war like nature, ~~will~~ be available at more reasonable prices.

The Arsenal in Piacenza has undoubtedly the necessary lay-out, except for the engine overhaul.

It has, though, a large staff, a small part of which is highly specialized in artillery repairs, and the remainder is not sufficiently skilled to be quickly trained into another branch of repairs.

It is also far away from BOLOGNA, and it would take considerable time and money to move to PIACENZA the equipment to be repaired.

The ex-Pirotecnico has the advantage of being in a suitable location; it has not a good staff trained on mechanical repairs, it lacks personnel trained on engine repairs, it has a good set up for light mechanical repairs, but lacks machinery for heavy mechanical repairs and for engine repairs and hull repairs. The installation is also not suitable for the proposed repairs.

It is also impossible to better the installation as the 3rd Artillery Barracks is still being used by the Allies who will not release it in the near future.

By combining the 2 installations, we perceive that:-

- The ex-Pirotecnico has the advantage of a favourable location and of a good staff for mechanical repairs.

- Both establishments lack almost totally personnel and machinery for engine repairs.

- Both establishments would take a comparatively long time to be transferred for the purpose required.

The situation offered by the ex-Piroteconico would be much better if it were possible to find in Bolo another military installation which could offer the necessary staff, machinery and accommodation.

This installation exists and is the 6th Repair Unit. In this unit the ex-Piroteconico would find the necessary skilled personnel in automobilistic repairs and a large part of the necessary machinery, and a suitable accommodation.

Also, as the two installations are near each other, it would save considerable time in the transferring of the W/shops.

If this solution were accepted, it would be necessary to find some other establishment to take care of the automobilistic repairs of 6 Territorial Command. As an interim solution until another w/shop could be set up, I think that the 15 Repair Unit in PIACENZA can take care of all the necessary work.

When this is accomplished, it would be necessary to set up an organisation for the repair of the lines of communication. This would not present great difficulties.

With regard to the Service Station to be set up at the V.P., I think it is useful to regard the similar set-up in the Allied Armies:-

3. ACCOUNTING

The method outlined in Appendix A to this HQ letter Q/1/1/IF of 4 Mar. '47 has been adopted. Census Cards have been prepared in English and Italian (see attached copy) giving full particulars in relation to each vehicle. The collation of necessary data is a long and laborious task, severely hampered by lack of personnel. Vehicles have been checked for deficiencies of fitted equipment, and a list of such deficiencies is being prepared. It is proposed to hand a copy of this list to O.C., 12 Veh Park, who has promised to issue against deficiencies, if items are available.

Blocks of BI Brit. Nos. have been allotted to vehicles. (See attached list).

A physical check during the current month has been completed, and there are no vehicle deficiencies.

4. MAINTENANCE.

An honest endeavour has been made to follow the method outlined in the above quoted Appendix A. Fulfilment of the task has not been possible for the following reasons:-

- (i) Lack of sufficiently trained personnel;

- (ii) Deficiency of vehicle batteries;

- (iii) Inadequate battery charging equipment.

Generally, the condition of vehicles is an improvement on their original state at reception.

It should be noted that a large number of weapon pieces are highly corroded, and much time and labour is being expended in their cleaning and preserving.

O.C. 12 Veh. Park has promised to make good deficiencies in batteries.

Deficient armaments have now been issued.

5. INSPECTIONS.

Inadequate technical personnel has led to the cancellation of initial inspections. This is not considered serious, as all vehicles were classified at issue.

6. EQUIPMENT.

As already indicated, kits for vehicles are being delivered in bulk. A single storey building, roughly 100 x 15 x 10 metres, adjacent to the vehicle park, has been made available for storage. This building has a concrete floor and is in good condition. Racking has been promised from TURIN Arsenal. - *Arrived*

The sorting, identification, racking and bringing on charge of equipment, will take considerable time (even if a trained and competent staff were available) and it is obvious that it cannot be completed in the estimated time available. Final delivery of stores has not yet been made.

Major ALTIERIO, C.C. Veh. Park, accompanied by O.W.O. this unit, inspected the kit store at 12 Veh. Park, FOMLI, in order to give a representative of the ITALIAN Army, an appreciation of the BRITISH method of store keeping.

Catalogues, Spare Parts Lists, Identification Lists and Maintenance Manuals, have been requested from 500 A.O.D. All will need translating into ITALIAN, before they can be of use.

7. GENERAL.

Now that the inclement weather has passed, one is better able to appreciate the improvements that have been made at SAN FELICES. Roofing of the vehicle sheds is completed, and the park is well laid out and administered, with the exception of lack of fire fighting equipment of the BRITISH foam type.

The Officer Commanding, Major ALTIERIO, is a capable and enthusiastic officer, who has had previous experience of this type of work (with the BRITISH Armoured Re-inforcement Group), during the ITALIAN Campaign. He has sound ideas, but is hopelessly hampered by lack of personnel and equipment. This is dealt with in the subsequent paragraph. Given the required assistance, I have no doubt he will produce the desired result.

8. CONCLUSION.

If the ITALIAN Government is to obtain the maximum benefit from the equipments placed at their disposal, it is of primary importance that the competent ITALIAN Military Authority appreciate the vital necessity of providing the following:-

- (1) Workshops for all classes of repair work, including Base overhauls;

ITALIAN Army, an appreciation of the BRITISH method of store keeping.

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8. CONCLUSION.

If the ITALIAN Government is to obtain the maximum benefit from the equipments placed at their disposal, it is of primary importance that the competent ITALIAN Military Authority appreciate the vital necessity of providing the following:-

- ✓ (ii) An adequate sealing of spare parts;
- (iii) Sufficiently trained technical personnel, including fitters, armament, W/T and store-keeping personnel;

- ✓ (iv) Specialised equipment for recovery and transportation of A.F.Vs;
- ✓ (v) The training of A.F.V crews;
- ✓ (vi) Translations of applicable hand-books etc.

Immediate requirements at SAN FELICE are:-

- (i) An increase of working parties by at least 200%;
- (ii) Provision of trained personnel in storekeeping and accounting - a minimum of 1 Officer, 1 W.O. and 6 Rank & File;
- (iii) A mobile workshop, with requisite personnel, similar to a Type C BRITISH L.A.D.

It is suggested that trained store-keepers could be provided from Divisional Ordnance Field Parks, and radio mechanics and armament artificers from Divisions. Specialised mechanics and electricians should be made available from the Army in part, the remainder being civilians. Attachment of these personnel to a BRITISH A.F.V. Workshops for a period of 2 months, is desirable.

Failure to organise on these lines, will inevitably lead to rapid deterioration in the efficiency of the equipments, and nullify all benefits which should accrue from the issues made.

4. MAINTENANCE.

Routine servicing has been carried out to many of the vehicles during the month. Battery charging and repair has made considerable progress. Servicing of weapon pieces has also proceeded as normal.

General ROSNAGNO expressed a wish that the ex PIRONECICO be utilised as an auxiliary workshop, subject to accommodation being available. (See this H.Q. letter Q/6/4/IF of 2 Jul. '47).

5. EQUIPMENT.

Counting and checking proceeds, and the storing is generally satisfactory.

In order to check all W/T sets on charge, two sets of valves have been obtained from local military sources, and each set is in course of inspection. Small repairs within the scope of available equipment (i.e. hand tools), are carried out immediately, and large repairs noted for future action.

6. GENERAL.

A large quantity of Romney and Nissen huts have been taken over from the ex SEP Camp at MIRAMARE, and are in course of dismantling for conveyance to SAN FELICE.

Further fire extinguishers (in accordance with a request made by this HQ), have been obtained, and an agreement reached with the local Fire Brigade, in case of fire.

Railway transportation for S.P. mountings for BRACCIANO, has now been requested, and these vehicles should be delivered during the current month.

A large number of demilitarised vehicles ex A.R.A.R. Park, FORLI, have been earmarked for the ITALIAN Army. A decision as to acceptance, is awaited from the Ministry of War.

CH LIAISON VISIT TO NO. 4 ORDNANCE BASE DEPOT, U.S.A.A.

23 May, 1947.

1. DAA & QMG this Headquarters, visited No. 4 Ordnance Base Depot, U.S.A.A., LEXHAM, 23 May '47, with the intention of discussing, and agreeing if possible, a Base Depot Sealing required to cover all types of maintenance and repair, in relation to ALLIED tank holds of the ITALIAN Army.

2. Colonel EXCIES represented U.S.A.A. (Telephone No. FREEDOM 390, ext. 8 or 30).

3. Opportunity also arose, to discuss the availability of special tools and equipment, required for all types of echelon repair of AMERICAN tanks.

4. Colonel EXCIES offered the following information.

(1) The majority of spare parts for tanks had already been returned to U.S.A., and the backloading programme was still in progress.

8. It was therefore agreed that, subject to approval of Headquarters, I.I.P.A., the following policy should be accepted with regard to special and G.P. tools.

(1) The ITALIAN Army would accept all special tools, without reservation.

(2) G.P. tools would be accepted after pre-visit and agreement by the concerned representatives.

Every assistance was promised by the U.S.A.A. authority, and materials would be for view as required.

9. Col. BOWEN also stated that there were certain small items of machinery, e.g. compressors, lathes etc., which should prove of considerable value to the ITALIAN Army. It was agreed that these items should be viewed by an ITALIAN Army technician, who was authorized to accept on their behalf.

10. Finally, Col. BOWEN explained the need for a quick decision to be made regarding all materials under discussion. He said he was unable to freeze items 'ad lib', without due authority, and until such time as that authority was to hand, he would have to proceed with his normal stockpiling policy.

With Major Alterio a visit was made to ORD Sect. U.S.A.A. during the period 16-18 June. The purpose of this visit was to inspect what stores are available for transfer to the Italian Army and to assist in the selection of materials etc.

No answer had been received from Washington regarding the transfer of "controlled" items up to p.m. 17th.

The A.F.V. spares for transfer were seen and it is estimated will take 10 x 10 ton railway wagons. All spares are boxed and packing slips are nailed outside and a duplicate copy inside.

A 2/Lt. Di Cio has been left at Leghorn to liaise with the ORD Sect., supervise the loading of wagons and sign for stores as issued. It is considered that a more senior officer should have been appointed to sign all receipts.

Efforts are being made to send the initial 17 A.F.V's off this week, but difficulty is being experienced in finding sufficient war flats. The boxed spares will be shifted as and when wagons are available.

It was stressed by Col. Eccles that all this material remains the property of the U.S. Government

and that all materials must be considered frozen until the financial agreements between the two governments have been completed. In connection with this freezing, the Italian War Ministry suggestion that materials should be distributed to appropriate depots all over Italy is not considered feasible by U.S.A.A., Leghorn, for the following reasons.

- (a) Condition of issue at this stage is that all materials remain under supervision of an Allied officer of M.M.I.A.
- (b) Extra work entailed in dispatching separate trains to different destinations.
- (c) Some materials will have to be called in from 88 Div., and as Bologna is a central point it will help them to check the handing in of materials much easier.
- (d) Should this issue of materials be cancelled for any reason, it will be easier to collect from one central point.

Should the War Ministry not agree to all materials being sent to a central store at Bologna, the matter would be taken up by ORD through G4, and, pending an agreement, only materials for Bologna would be released.

Col. Eccles required an answer re the 105 m.m. M3 Howitzers which are available for collection. Apparently these pieces were not discussed at the conference, and as approx. 40 are available, enquiries were made. By noon Tues. answers to accept had been received from War Ministry & A.D.M.E., (M.M.I.A) I.L.F.B.

Contact was also made with Col. DORNEY who is Ammunition Officer and he requires an officer who is an ammunition examiner and 6 men from the Italian Army to start taking over the dump. Approx. 15,000 tons of ammunition are involved, but the dump will remain at Leghorn at this stage. The Italian Gds with the American Army will continue guarding this dump.

Major Alterio was shown the 86 W/Shops, and agreed that the equipment there would be suitable for the A.F.V. W/Shops.

A visit was made to the American Ordnance Depot at Leghorn on 6th and 7th June '47.

Capt. Myers, U.S. Army, was contacted, and he gave me a list of ALL spares available in this theatre from U.S. sources. These spares are not frozen and issues are still being made on demand. Copy of this list is enclosed. Quantities as shown were correct on 3 June, and if the Italian Army require these items they must arrange purchase very quickly.

No Special Tools are available at Ord. Dump, Leghorn. The tools required are known as "Tool Sets Armoured Force", and I was informed that the last two sets had been shipped to Greece a few weeks ago. Should it not be possible to obtain the quantities of special tools required, it is suggested that perhaps the drawings could be obtained from the U.S.A. and manufactured in Italy - providing no patent rights are infringed. If manufacture locally is necessary, the drawings would be better than the tools.

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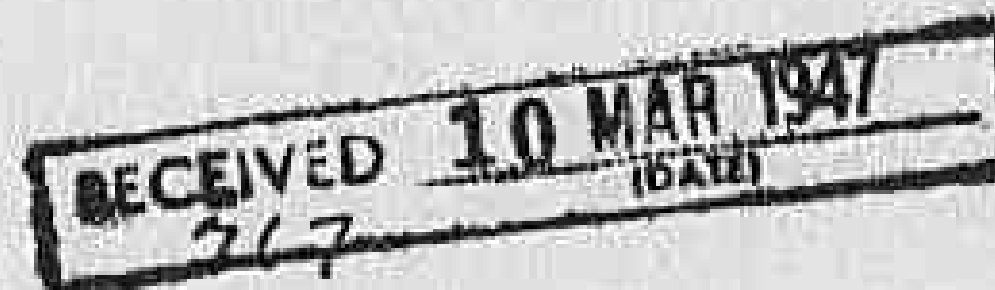

INFORMATION

The conference was the principal one of two held during the month of JANUARY '47 to decide new methods of training of Gunfitters and Armourers selected from short-service intakes of the Italian Army.

INFORMATION

1. The conference was between Col. AVILLORE, representing the Director of Artillery, (under whose direction the Artillery Repair Training Centre, now known as S.M.O.A., will fall on its transfer from CIVITAVECCHIA to TERNI) and D.A.D.M.E. 12 B.L.U.; Interpreter, Capt CINQUARDI M.M.I.,.

2. It was agreed that the existing syllabi should be scrapped entirely, and new ones made throughout.

3. Broadly speaking, the future policy to be adopted is as follows :

(a) For ARMOURERS

(i) A Course of Instruction in General Workshop Practice in the trade of FITTER, General, for a period of 6 weeks.

This to be known as the "Selection Course", and to take place at the Small Arms Factory at TERNI.

(ii) A further course of instruction in certain other Workshop Practices applicable to the trade of ARMOURER, (including some knowledge of woodwork, simple forging and heat-treatment of tools and small parts) for a period of 4 weeks. This to follow immediately after the Selection Course.

(iii) A Course of Instruction in certain specified weapons; their construction, action and repair, including a firing course on the test ranges, for a period of 8 weeks.

Students who successfully pass the entire Course will be posted as GRUNT-ARMOURERS, and will be eligible for posting to service units to gain further experience by performing the duties of ARMOURER. These GRUNT-ARMOURERS may be graded ARMOURER by the chief TECHNICAL reps. of their formations after a probationary period of approx 2 months.

MONTH OF DECEMBER 1946

- (1) Ordinary Maintenance :-

I uphold what I reported on this subject in November. We are still waiting for the obtainment of the 100 sets of keys assigned by M.O.W., from the 3rd Magazzino Ricambi Auto, Piacenza.
- (5) Regimental Workshops (L.A.D.'s) :-
The position is still the same as reported in November.
- (6) Deficiency of Technical Personnel :-
There is still the deficiency of technical personnel in the Units and the deficiency of N.C.O.'s Chiefs of the W/S.
- (7) Main Workshop of the Division :-
By the new arrangements made the deficiency of personnel became more obvious. As already reported in the last month, it will be necessary to increase the number of civilian workmen by at least 50. Concerning the output of this W/S it should be realized (taken into consideration) that, now in the depth of winter the difficulty of heating adequately the localities is particularly conspicuous and consequently the labourers have to work under difficult conditions and a high percentage of them became sick.

On 12 December 46 a visit with Lt. Colonel Baccari was made to 16 Repair Unit at Verona.

1. This Workshop which moved over 5 weeks ago to its new location, was found to be still in a chaotic state. There was no evidence of any worthwhile organization and although the site is good, it still requires a great deal of Genio work on electric light plant, building of walls, making and fitting of windows etc. Prior to the move of this W/S the previous O.C. (a new O.C. had taken over two days prior to my visit) and the previous Director of Repairs were frequently asked to render to this office a statement of the Genio work required and action taken, so that further action could be taken in accordance with ADMS letter ME/43/53 dated 28 June 1946. This statement however was never produced.

The new O.C. is now forwarding a plan layout of his W/S plus all Genio work required for each section, for approval and action by the Director of Repairs. Nevertheless it will be some time before this W/S will be a going concern.

The following day, the W/S of the 21 Recovery Commission (Vicenza) was visited with Lt. Col. Baccari. This W/S is at present a detachment of the 16 Repair Unit and has been under orders to disband. This order has been temporarily suspended for all concerned, period, which, it is felt, is most unsatisfactory for all concerned. Although the O.C. W/S still continues to show great enthusiasm. W/Shops Stores Section, no official confirmation to this has been received from the Ministry of War and consequently the O.A.R.E. is at present endeavouring to cope without an official Stores Section.

In view of the large stocks of M.T. Spares recently obtained from JESI and CEMSA and other sources, this is quite impossible and so far the accounting for 1946 is still outstanding and unless action can be taken to clarify the position it is most unlikely that the returns required by ADOS - HQ. M.M.I.A. will ever be obtained.

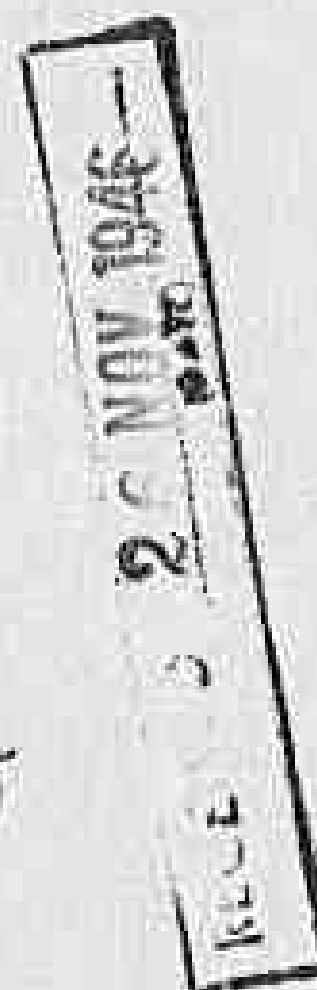

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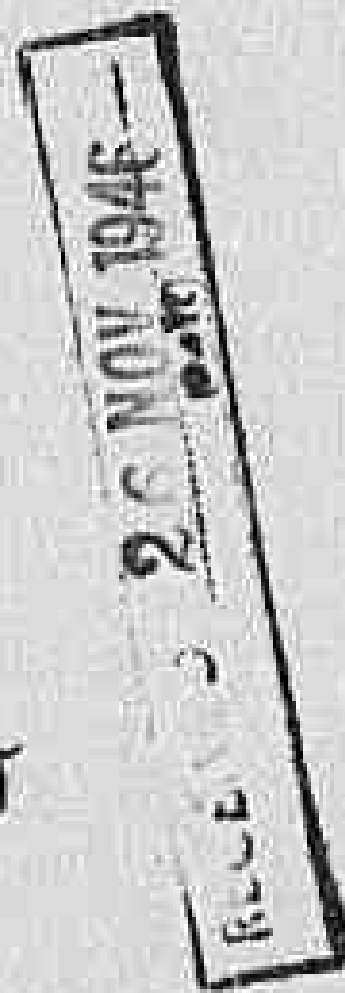

1. In conjunction with representatives from ITALIAN Ministry of War and 6 COMINTER, a reconnaissance has now been completed with a view to selecting a site for the proposed Armoured Fighting Vehicle Park. Lt.Col. BLUNT, ADME, M.M.I.A. was present to advise as technically necessary.

2. The desirability of the park being established in the vicinity of FORLI was emphasised: local conditions however, made this difficult for the following reasons :-

- (a) Ground in the vicinity of 12 Veh. Park, is entirely unsuitable for the parking of heavy vehicles during winter months. Hard standings are non-existent, and vehicles would 'bog down', or become entirely inundated. The construction of suitable hard standings on this site was considered impracticable.
- (b) The only suitable standings in the immediate area, were on the site of the local Cattle Market. It was considered that this site would accommodate 500 vehicles. Although the site had been requisitioned by the ALLIES, it was about to be handed over to the local Commune, and its procurement by the ITALIAN Army would be difficult. Further, no covered accommodation was available, and the perimeter of the area was not cordoned. The necessary GENIC work is therefore considerable, and authority for its execution is unlikely, since the property is not Government owned.
- (c) The question of accommodation for personnel at FORLI is difficult. Approx. 1,000 SEPs. are already in the area and likely to remain there for some time. Additionally, CHETNIKS employed on local administrative duties are occupying certain buildings, and the town is eventually to house some 600 POLISH married families. Tented accommodation, and its accompanying administrative complications - water, latrines, ablutions, cook-houses, lighting etc. - appeared the only alternative.

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3. It was decided therefore, that a site in the FORLI area presented so many difficulties as to make it impracticable; and in order that economical administration could be effected, the possibility of park being established at BOLOGNA, should be investigated.

4. With this end in view, the site of the PARCO di SAN FELICE, badly damaged by bombing, was recommitred, and in the opinion of all representatives was considered adequate for requirements.

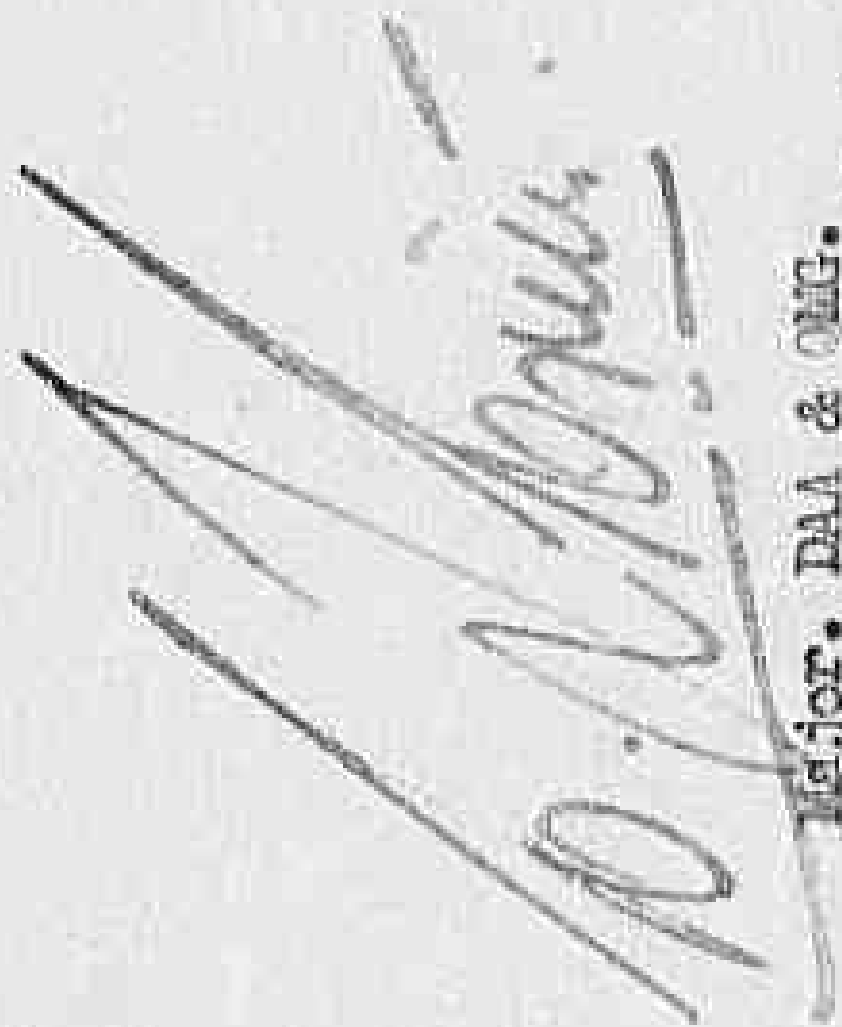

5. The following factors substantiated this opinion :-

- (a) An adjacent railhead is available.
- (b) The site comprises sufficient hard standings for approximately 500 vehs., and may be enlarged if necessary.
- (c) The property is State owned, (ITALIAN Army), and although repairs will be necessary to existing buildings required as accommodation for personnel, kitting store, servicing bay etc., authority for this work to be carried out, should not be difficult.
- (d) The site is in a 'ZONA MILITARE', the perimeter is already protected, and generally the security of the proposed park should be simple.
- (e) Road approaches are reasonable, and necessary alterations to enlarge the entrance(s) can be effected at little cost.
- (f) Petrol pumps are in situ, and electric power available.

6. It was finally agreed that Major FIORE, (SMRE), should return to ROME with plans of the proposed project, and a request for GENIO work to start immediately.

7. This matter will be further reported on as necessary.

Para 1 - As pointed out in our EME/70/19 dated 23 Sept. 46 the transformation of the 15 Repair Unit into a Major Assembly Repair Shop is only under discussion and to date no definite decision has been arrived at.

Para 2 - From inspection of several indents for M.T. Spares it was evident that in all cases the availability was fairly high. As previously stated the exact percentage of availability cannot be given as all cases are not yet opened and it is agreed that it would be possible under such circumstances to find many items in the Stores which were marked N.A. on indents, obviously due to the fact that in all probability these spares have been taken from cases opened after the original availability on indents had been notified to Units.

2. During this inspection the difficulty regarding the two Majors referred to in para 2 (e) was ~~not~~ evident, the inspection was carried out in company with Maj. FAUCI who was extremely helpful and the Stores system was found to be completely in accordance with the Italian Ministry of War Directive ref. 35000 dated 25 June 46.

Capt. DI GARROCCO A/CIE Mantova Div.

The position regarding these vehicles which are entering this w/shop because it is in Genoa whilst the Mantova W/shops are some 30 mls out, was discussed and I suggested that Mantova transfer a LAD to Genoa to deal with this work load on allied pattern vehicles. This LAD could come under the admin. command of 2 Reparto. Thus this workshop will cease to have any responsibilities for allied pattern vehicles and all the floor space at present occupied by these derelict vehicles can be cleared and made available to Italian pattern vehicles. This LAD could backload direct to Mantova W/shops any vehicles beyond there programme.

I have since visited this workshop and I find that the idea of moving a LAD has been disbanded for some unknown reason, however strict orders have been issued to all units in Genoa apparently as now this w/shop is practically free from allied vehicles. Only one derelict 150wt remains and this will be backloaded to Mantova W/shops as soon as possible.

To obtain this result it has taken approximately 10 months.

Mantova Div. W/shops.

OPRE have written to this workshop and told them not to send any more Bedford engines for overhaul to OAPR. In view of the large numbers of U/S engine assemblies in this w/shop I have instructed them to send some and get the site cleared. As a result 8 Bedford and 7 Dodge engines have been despatched whilst 4-3tonners have been backloaded for overhaul.

Motile Bn. COBR Liguria Legion.

The HQ only is at Genoa at present and the Bn have moved out to CHIAPARI for patrol duty on the Baracco pass. Apparently bandits are giving some trouble and the pass is now patrolled during the hours of darkness.

Two Stagbonds have been brought back to Genoa with transmission trouble and one is at present in 2 Reparto under investigation.

This patrol is a very heavy duty for the cars and during my visit to Chiavari I stressed to the mechanics the special need for proper vehicle maintenance to prevent major breakdowns.

General

Visit of Col. BALLANZINI.

I am not impressed with the visit of this officer. I expected a certain amount of co-operation and helpful criticism. From the moment I first met him at the Ufficio Approvvigiamiento he made it quite clear that he did not want to discuss any points with me. He had visited Cremona W/sh. the day previous and when I asked him for his opinion of this W/shop he informed me that the site was ridiculous. It would have been appreciated if this Officer had come to Turin in Sept. of last year and helped us to find a suitable site. As is well known, considerable improvement to the site has been carried out by the w/shops themselves and it is felt that casual criticism of this nature has a very dampening effect on the morale of the Officer's and men who are continually striving to raise the standard of the Workshop. He visited the Arsenal but took no interest whatever in the manufacture of various items such as Steering worms, Tool kits, Butt plates Stocks and Dies etc which are in production. He merely walked around and in one instance complained that one vehicle had incorrect tyres. When the O.C. 1 Reparto told him that they were the only tyres available in this area, we received the very helpful answer that there were plenty of the proper tyres in Sarlinia but none in Rome.

Tyre maintenance

The latest tyre pressure lists have been circulated to both Divs. and I have suggested that Div. COBR institute road patrols with instructions to stop vehicles, check tyre pressures and examine for even loading. This has been agreed to and patrols are now out checking these points and also watching for furious and dangerous driving. A speed trap has been set up in the Mantova Div. area and is producing a lot of customers for the Chief of Staff.

As will be remembered a small classroom has been laid out in the

CHIAPARI for patrol duty on the Barecco pass. Apparently some trouble and the pass is now patrolled during the hours of darkness.

Two Staghounds have been brought back to Genoa with transmission trouble and one is at present in 2 Reparto under investigation.

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"Gremona Div School"

As will be remembered a small classroom has been laid out in the workshops for teaching D&M. They are going one better now and are collecting a "Chamber of Horrors" such as seized bearings, burnt out tyres etc. and are going to make a small exhibition which will tour the Div area and an Instructor will lecture all drivers on the cause and remedy of each exhibit. Further reports will be submitted on this.

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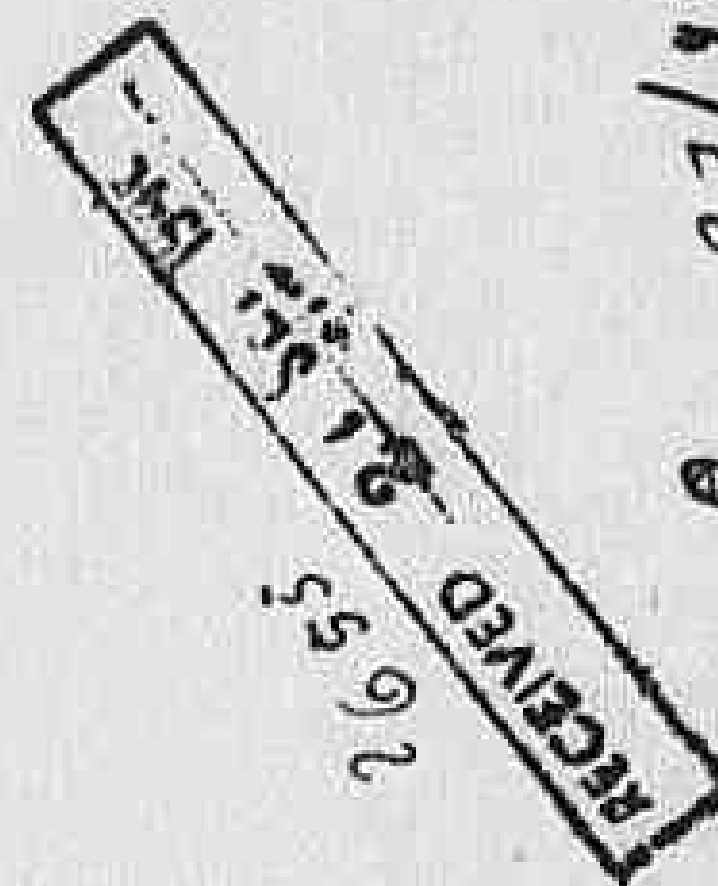

The Depot is employing approx. 250 civilian tradesmen, some on the strength of 15 Repair Unit but from the amount of repair work etc. still being done by unit personnel a further 3 personnel per each shed could be utilised.

4. Stores Buildings and Accommodation

A great deal of repair work has been accomplished by unit personnel mainly in roofing sheds whose walls etc. were in good condition. No Genio personnel were working but raw materials are received ex Genio Bologna.

All stores buildings at present in use are very efficiently organised and well kept

5. Availability of Spares

The majority of M.T. Spares are plentiful; with the return of all personnel from the Bolzano Area the job of sorting the M.T. Spares received is proceeding rapidly, but is being greatly hampered by lack of racking.

Orders have been placed with Piacenza Arsenal for racking but will not be available until Oct. Can these be obtained from Turin Arsenal?

The system of issue of stores is good. All available items are issued immediately and M.A.'s passed to Turin Purchasing Office who take all further action to Obtain.

There appears to be no difficulty over Tyres and Tubes. Demands are passed to Ministry of War who, through the Ministry of Commerce, obtain release from Pirelli and Fiat. Full quantities demanded are not always released as these firms have civilian commitments to maintain but all tyres and tubes so far required have been obtained.

Repairable Tyres and tubes are now repaired by unit personnel and a reply is awaited from Pirelli as to prices etc. for complete re-conditioning of tyres.

6. Major Assemblies

A large amount of repairable and B.L.R. engines are held and Maj. FAUCI stated that Col. BALAZZIO had visited 3 Magazzino on 17 Sept. and stated that it was now proposed to transform 15 Repair Unit to a W/Shop solely for the repair of Major Assemblies.

MEMORANDUM re ASSIGNMENTS OF RECRUITS TO THE "FRIULI" MAIN WORKSHOP.

End of April, when a first contingent of already instructed recruits was assigned to the Division, 22 recruits provided with special technical abilities were assigned to the Main Workshop.

Meanwhile the Ministry of War - General Staff 'Army' - assigned by letter No. 01/619/mob. dated 28 February: 224 recruits to the M.T. Units of the "Friuli" Division, nearly half part of which (117) were sent on route to the Division for performance of the advanced training, 20 of them were assigned to the Main Workshop.

The remaining recruits (224 less 117 = 107), which have performed the advanced training at the M.T. School Cecchiagnola, are to be distributed on arrival at the Division, equitably among the Transport & Supply Unit, the Mobile Park (A.G.A.) and the Main Workshop. It therefore can be foreseen that the Main Workshop will not get assigned more than 40 - 50 recruits of the next contingent arriving.

Summed up, the number of recruits already assigned and those of next assignment to the Main Workshop are as follows :-

WORKSHOP INSPECTION REPORT

1. General.

The workshop is organized in four main buildings named Officine A, B, C and D respectively, and in addition there are subsidiary sections such as engine shop, blacksmiths, carpenters, painters shops, stores and offices.

2. Officine A.

This is allotted for the repair of Italian cars and is choked with vehicles, a number of which will never be repaired and are apparently used as a source of spare parts. A number of cars were also seen whose repair, by reason of their age, would scarcely seem economical. This workshop had its own electricians department, store for workshop equipment, and a small machine shop, but not more than thirty workers were seen in the whole "officine".

3. Officine B.

This is set aside for minor repairs to vehicles in transit through or visiting Rome. Although eighteen vehicles were in various stages of repair, all the staff visible (nine men) were clustered around one jeep which was apparently about to go out on road test. The floor of the workshop was very tidy, which could have been due to a "cleaning-up" prior to the visit, but some of the vehicles had obviously not been worked upon for some days.

These are two large workshops which seem fairly well organized and are occupied with heavy repairs to lorries and other large vehicles. It is understood however that the Ministry are not anxious to increase output such as there is great difficulty in obtaining tyres with which to equip these repaired machines.

6. Engine shop.

This is far too small for the amount of work it has to do and is further hampered by difficulty in obtaining good engine fitters, of whom at present six only are held. Although this shop has a testing rig where engines can be run, it lacks a test bed for testing engines on the brake. A small store of spare parts for engines is held, and a store for holding complete engines (mostly awaiting overhaul) is being organised which should remove some of the unserviceable engines at present filling the engine shop awaiting repair.

The standard of cleanliness, which should be high in an engine shop, is by no means good.

Some machine tools including one crankshaft grinder were in use in an annexe to this shop.

7. Workshop stores.

This appeared reasonably well organised but was not sufficiently large to attempt to hold the large number of spare parts required to supply a workshop of this size. Tyres are stored separately under satisfactory conditions, but do not seem to be sorted or labelled. No inner tubes were seen in the store and it is believed that none of the commonly required sizes are held, local purchase being employed to provide them in every case.

8. Painters shop.

This is of adequate size but owing to its awkward entrance lorries are normally parked outside the shop which is not satisfactory in winter. In the summer it reduces the poisonous effects of the paint fumes which are more objectionable in hot weather.

9. Blacksmiths shop and Carpenters shop.

No comments.

10. Control of work.

Vehicles requiring repair are either collected from the inefficient vehicle park when required by the workshop or, if they belong to a unit, present themselves at the workshop in the hope that the workshop can accept them for repair. Few vehicles are refused and as a result the premises contain a large number of vehicles on which repair has not started, since no attempt is made to order the stores needed until the vehicle is in the workshop.

The inspecting staff (responsible to the C.O. Unit for the standard of work leaving the workshop) number only two, and as

There seems however to be no system of progressing work in progress and investigating delays with a view to enabling work to continue.

11. Spare supply.

As indicated above only small quantities of suitable spares are held, and extensive purchasing is carried out which, although it avoids tying up capital in the form of spares holdings, imposes delay in completing repairs. Provision of spares by purchase is employed in the majority of repairs executed.

12. Output.

The output of this unit has remained consistently at ten heavy repairs per week (vehicles sent to the M.V.P. on completion) and a varying number (usually between 100 and 110 vehicles per week) repaired and returned to units. In view of the large number of employees this is not considered particularly good, and it is considered that with a reasonable spares supply, the same output could be obtained from a workshop of 50 men.

The Director of Repairs stated that there were about 700 employees which is far above the allowed establishment but that pressure of work rendered this increase necessary. He also pointed out that for political reasons the Ministry were not in favour of dismissing personnel unless the reasons were particularly strong. In this connection it is known that the Director General of Civilian Personnel in the Ministry of War in March issued an instruction (1113/33 of 7 March) on these lines which it is believed has never been rescinded.

Conclusions.

This unit functions after a fashion but to improve its efficiency it is felt that:-

- (a) the O.C. unit should have greater powers of dismissal of unsatisfactory employees.

1. Mr. FANTINI explained how this contract, drawn up and signed on the 11th, March 46, which CARROTTI were given to understand at the time, would in all likelihood be of 12 months duration was currently set short as at 4 Oct 46.

2. This, he said, would throw some 4,300 to 5,000 workers out of work, a fact which at this juncture of political uncertainty and labour strife in R. ITALY, would certainly tend to make matters worse.

3. He pleaded that something be done to enable the CARROTTI works to carry on, at least until the end of the year, when the programme for 1947 would begin, which would provide work for all their personnel.

4. ALMA explained that it was the intention of MILA to place before the ITALIAN War Ministry a suitable proposal, if adopted, the ITALIAN Army would provide the necessary amount of work to enable the firm to carry on at approximately the same "tempo" which the above contract had entailed.

5. In order to formulate such a proposal it was necessary to know:

- (a) what amount of work the War Ministry required to be done, and

4. AGC explained that it was the intention of MILA to place before the ITALIAN War Ministry a suitable proposal, if adopted, the ITALIAN Army would provide the necessary amount of work to enable the firm to carry on at approximately the same "tempo" which the above contract had entailed.

5. In order to facilitate such a proposal it was necessary to know

- (a) what amount of work the War Ministry required to be done, and
- (b) what amount and type of work the GURCHI were prepared to undertake.

6. The War Ministry have some 800 vehicles awaiting spare parts, subsequent annual repairs within capacity of A.O.R.B. If spares were available.

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7. In principle, said Mr. FARINI, GURCHI would welcome a suitable arrangement, pointing out (referring to a remark by AGC) that at present the financial aspect of the transaction did not interest him provided the works were enabled to function without interruption for a further 2 or 3 months. Questions of accounting and payment could be tackled later.

8. Summarising the discussions, the picture thus presents itself:-

- (1) That the firm of GURCHI is anxious to continue the repair of British vehicles.
- (2) That they hold considerable stocks of spare parts which belong to MILA.
- (3) The War Ministry have making for repair sufficient Dodge & Bedford vehicles to keep the firm going till approx. Dec 46.

H.B.- Since the foregoing notes were typed AMED spoke (by phone) to Brig. LAURIE (Q Branch AFHQ) who stated that the spare parts now with CAPRONI will shortly be shipped to AUSTRIA for the repair of Allied vehicles in that area. They are therefore NOT available for repairs to vehicles of the Italian Army.

It now remains for the War Ministry to discuss with CAPRONI the possibility of this firm undertaking work for the War Ministry, making the spare parts themselves.

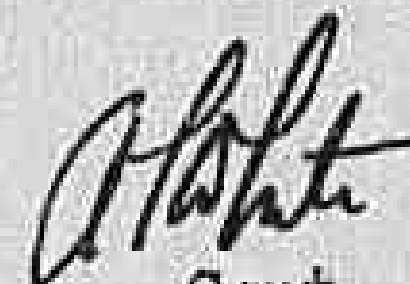

OPENING ADDRESS

GOC - Stressed the present transitional state of the ITALIAN Army, and the need to keep in mind the possibly different shape of that Army after the Peace Treaty.

DEF COMD - Stressed the progress made in the reorg of the ITALIAN Army since his first acquaintance with MMIA in 1943.

'G' DISCUSSION

BGS (a) CARS General

Referred to excellent start made by CARS, largely as a result of good work by BLUS. Amenities at CARS still required development, and further efforts were needed to popularise the Army with the people.

6. (a) Col AQ referred to the Minutes of the last Conference, outlined the progress made and referred to the many pts still outstanding which were for discussion later. With regard to visits to BLUs, the AAC's Branch, which now co-ords all visits, was instr to see that adequate notice of intended visits was given to BLUs bearing in mind the time taken by correspondence to reach BLUs.
- (b) The CC.RR Section having now reached its first objective, and being unable to proceed further in the absence of direction from higher authority, is to continue as a technical advice section and be allowed to waste to two Offrs, both of whom will be at HQ.
- (c) IPW Section is nearing the end of its task and it is hoped to be able to wind it up by the end of 1946.
- (d) Attention was drawn to Directives 1 and 2 which are still operative and to Directive No 3 which is being amended by AQMG.
- (e) The importance of the new Public Relations Branch of the War Ministry (UPEC) was stressed and BLUs were asked to refer constantly to the Directive issued by MMIA and passed to the War Ministry for guidance. BLUs to report frequently on the progress of Public Relations.
- (f) Attention was drawn to MMIA Directive No 20 of 17 Jul, stressing the importance of correct procedure in our relations with ITALIAN authorities in order to avoid misunderstandings. The responsibilities of Offrs of the Services was described as being exactly similar to those normally serving on BRIT higher and subordinate HQs. OSC BLUs were asked to watch and see that this procedure was properly observed. With regard to the future, Col AQ stated that it was impossible at the moment to give any reliable forecast but saw no reason to anticipate any major change before Oct or a complete change of regime before next Mar, after which anything might happen. OC BLUs were asked to send, wherever possible, thumb nail sketches of outstanding ITALIAN Army Offrs. 'G' Branch will be sending out a letter on this subject.

- (f) The derequisition of State Property as a priority over Industrial or Private Property was discussed. Col AQ pointed out the need for looking at the wider picture in view of the various Industrial needs, it being accepted that the ITALIAN Army had already done very well in the way of accon. Local and BRIT HQs are to be asked by BLUs to help in every way possible.
- (g) The question of the valuation of fixed assets will be taken up with the War Ministry.
- (h) See 9(a).
- (i) DADMS will examine the existing hygiene set-up with a view to advising on any necessary changes.
- (j) Inadequacy of Welfare facilities was fully ventilated and Col AQ promised to hold a Welfare Meeting with War Ministry reps with a view to considering the possibility of improvement, particularly with regard to voluntary helpers, material, and accon.
- (k) Welfare of patients in hosp, incl occupational therapy, was being taken up with the War Ministry and BLUs will be informed of the result.
- (l) The problem of regular commissions for temporary offrs being an extremely complicated one, it is difficult for MMIA to interfere. AAG will however, inquire into the matter with the War Ministry and satisfy himself that MMIA is doing everything possible to retain the services of really efficient individuals.
- (m) The retention or enlistment of specialists, both mil and civ is recognised as being important, and will be again taken up with the War Ministry by AAG with special ref to the trg aspect.
- (n) Offrs pay is under revision but that of ORs is likely to remain as at present in view of the value of Clothing, Food, etc already provided.
- (o) All recommendations for BRIT Awards to ITALIAN Offrs and Men for Services during the War have already been handed to ABHQ who are awaiting approval or otherwise, which is not expected before the Peace Treaty.
- (p) BLUs were asked to ensure that full use was made of the Army Newspaper, (NOTIZIARIO DELL'ESERCITO) and that unit notice boards containing Army Orders etc of personal interest to the men, should be universally est and kept up to date. BLUs were asked for any suggestions which might occur to them for improving the spreading of knowledge amongst the tps. At the same time taking care to avoid propaganda or controversial political matters.

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AAG PTS

8. AAG gave a detailed account of 'A' matters (see Appx 'A' att).

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AQMG PTS

9. AQMG gave a complete outline of the maint situation (See Appx 'B' att). The following action is necessary :-

- (a) HQ MMA will continue its efforts with GHQ and keep BLUs informed of the situation.
 - (b) MMA will take up with the War Ministry the question of provision or retention of specialists, particularly artificers and gun fitters and will ensure that trg facilities are adequate.
 - (c) BLUs to interest themselves in the est of the Base Wkaps and Deps enumerated in Appendix.
 - (d) BLUs to ascertain which units are experimenting with the new Army Clothing and obtain advance opinions. Boot Repair orgs will be examined by MMA with a view to the provision of adequate services.
10. The future maint of BLUs was discussed under two headings :-
- (a) The Interim Period during which ALLIED Installations were disappearing and during which many BLUs would find themselves far removed from any ALLIED Deps or HQs, whilst others would be comparatively handy.
 - (b) The Later Period when no BRIT authorities would be within practicable maint distance.

During the Interim Period means were discussed for the provision of all the necessary facilities and it was generally agreed that as former BRIT facilities disappeared we should depend more and more on ITALIAN Army systems.

In regard to Med, it was also open to us to use, on repayment from Imprest Accounts, local civ resources.

As regards pay, arrangements have already been made for paying of Imprest Account with the Local Branch of the Bank of AMERS. Offers advances should also be made from these banks in the same way as at present made from the Rd Cashier. They may not be made from Imprest.

The most difficult problem of all is EPI Supplies, for which it seemed that a credit system was the only one which would work.

As regards later infm, it was impossible to lay anything down but it seemed likely that the time may come when the whole question of living would have to be settled by a living allowance.

A great deal of useful infm was obtained from the BLUs on local and general circumstances as a result of which AQ will now make definite proposals (with the approval of GHQ) to the War Ministry and as soon as possible circulate the results to BLUs.

11. (a) Adm Questions

Conns between MMA and the BLUs was discussed at some length and will be fully examined by the 50 P.

- (d) BLUs to ascertain which units are experimenting with the new Army Clothing and obtain advance opinions. Boot Repair orgs will be examined by MMIA with a view to the provision of adequate services.

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11. (a) Adm Questions

Comms between MMIA and the BLUs was discussed at some length and will be fully examined by the SO R Sigs. Tests will be made for speed and efficiency and further instrs will be issued.

- (b) Shortage of BRIT personnel was noted. AAC will go into the whole matter of available personnel with a view to redistribution, it being borne in mind that each BLU deals direct with O2E in these matters and that each BLU should do everything possible locally to secure the transfer of personnel from other units near by which are disbanding. It is recognised that every BLU should have at least one reliable BRIT NCO.

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11. (Contd)

(c) BLU Tpt

ACMG gave a complete picture of BLU tpt. He stressed the need for the correct rendering of Veh Census Reports and took note of existing deficiencies which will be examined.

- (d) War Ministry will be asked to ensure the provision of IOs for BLUs. 9 BLU is at present deficient.
- (e) The question of Offrs travelling expenses is fully catered for in GHO 655/45.

12. At the end of the Conference the GOC referred to the value of the Conference and the great interest taken in it by all concerned, and in the work of MMIA generally, as a result of which he had already formed the opinion that the ITALIAN Army was extremely grateful to us. The GOC summed up the following important pts :-

- (a) Tactical Directive must be worked out by MMIA.
- (b) The Trg of Instrs must be tackled.
- (c) Conditions of Service for Regular Army are not satisfactory. The BRIT Plan is none too good and even if it were, the role of the ITALIAN Army is entirely different.
- (d) ALM is bound up with finance. ^{Indigenous Rates of Pay} would seem to be out of date. ^{Such rates originate, in any case by comparison with other theatres.}
- (e) The Peace Treaty, as far as it has gone, gives little indication about the future of the Military Mission. We hope to know more very soon, but it appears likely that redeployment of the ITALIAN Army may be required. *W*

The GOC expressed his astonishment at the progress already made and the efficiency existing. He felt that we should be thankful for achievements and that even though at the moment there was some criticism of the ALLIED efforts on behalf of ITALY, that a true realisation of our achievements would ultimately be felt.

- 13. Lt-Col WATHEN, on behalf of the BLUs thanked the GOC and Offrs of MMIA for this opportunity of getting together and for the hospitality provided by HQ MMIA.

(b) Man Power (NCOs & Specialists)

(i) considerable correspondence with Ministry of War has taken place as to what they proposed to do about the loss of NCOs and Specialists when the 1922 & 23 Classes were demobilised.

With regard to NCOs Ministry of War sent a letter to all Territorial Corps No 46002/4 of 22.6.46. This lays down circumstances under which NCOs can apply to defer demobilisation. Effect as yet unknown.

(ii) With regard to Specialists

Ministry of War stated that they had again approached the Treasury to hasten approval of the New Rates of Pay for Specialist and Tradesmen so as to attract these persons to apply for their retention in the Army. That they were delaying the demobilisation of the 1922 & 23 Classes until Aug 15 and that with the transfers of Specialists from the Central Schools to units in Aug and Sep the difficulties will be

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(c) Surplus Offrs

There is now in force a decree which makes it possible to retire surplus Offrs compulsorily. This decree was held up for months by the Ministry of Treasury and Education the terms are extremely favourable for those being retired, but it is now law and surplus Offrs can be got rid of. This decree was drafted many months ago and widely discussed in the ITALIAN Army long before it became law.

(d) Legal Reform

- (i) a decree setting up Courts Martial has been drawn up and is about to go before the Council of Ministers. We have been pressing for this for many months, the sole object being to speed up trial. The set up, and procedure of these Courts are not unlike our own DCMs and the earlier articles of the decree are satisfactory, but articles 16 - 20 deal with the accused right of appeal and the accusing judges right of appeal. From these articles it appears that the accused can appeal his case to a MIL Tribunal in which case the whole project is wrecked since the case on every appeal would be put back on to the MIL Tribunals.

A Meeting is taking place with Gen BORSARI to try and get the right of appeal expunged and cases merely reviewed by the MIL Tribunals.

NOTE :-

A Meeting with Gen BORSARI took place on Mon 12 Aug the matter of appeal has been satisfactorily settled. There will be no "appeal" only "review".

- (ii) the Amnesty (Mil) has not had as much effect as was hoped. Of 6,000 men serving sentence about 3,500 have been released under the Amnesty. The vast majority of cases awaiting trial 220,000 concern personnel who have not been apprehended, these people must voluntarily surrender before they can benefit by the Amnesty; the closing date for surrender to benefit by the Amnesty was extended to 18 Jul 46. Return of those surrendering not yet received.

(e) Personnel Selection

Italians have never practised this but have studied it. We arranged a Course at BENEVENTO and then applied to the War Office for authority to pass all our methods over to the Italians. War Office have agreed and further offered to show Italian reps our methods at a Course in UK. We now await from the Ministry of War details of exactly what the Italians want from us.

MAINT OF ITALIAN ARMY

9. (a) Maint of BRIT Eqp't comprises the production of Spare Parts, the org of Wksp's and the Est of Deps to hold new or reconditioned articles. The direct transfer of essential spare parts for BRIT Eqp't has virtually ceased and the War Ministry have been informed that in future they will have to rely on one of the following three sources :-
- (i) surplus stores handed over to the Chief Disposals Offr and released by him to ARAR,
 - (ii) the local manufacture of such parts as may be possible without large capital outlay to produce specialised machinery,
 - (iii) Import Programme from the UK - no action as regards imports from the UK is likely until the War Ministry have been able to take stock of their posn and government decision has been obtained on the future of the ITALIAN Army.

Unit Maint is bad and everything possible must be done to ensure that eqpt already issued is maintained and inspected according to BRIT Standards. Artificers tools and the special tools required for Arty Eqp't have now been released to the War Ministry. A serious deficiency is felt of trained artificers and gun fitters as well as Civ and BRIT Ord Tech Storemen. This requires action by G(TRG). Base Wksp's have already been est for repairs as under :-

BRIT MT	BOLOGNA

The locn of Deps has provisionally been decided and there will be a stores dep at each of the above places as well as a subsidiary Dep at NAPLES.

- (b) Little change in the ITALIAN Army for estimation to that reported in the Minutes of the Conference held 28 Jan 46. Direct release of BRIT MT is continuing and limited quantities of Class I and Class II are expected.

(c) Clothing

Summer and Winter Clothing undergoing trials. BLUs should ascertain if any unit in their Territorial Commands have been selected and interests themselves in the subject. Boot production is adequate to ensure every soldier has serviceable boots. It is essential that unit Comds obey War Ministry instructions to exchange boots, and insist on a pair of ~~re~~reparable boots being handed in whenever boots need to be replaced. The War Ministry will be approached concerning
