ADDRESS OF 300 CREMONA DIVISION

We are here to-day, the 4th of November, on the anniversary of a great victory won by the side of our British and American allies over the same enemy of yesterday, to present the decorations for gallantry awarded to the Regimental Colours of Cremona and the 28th Garibaldi Brigade "Mario Cordini", for their meritorious service in the War of Liberation.

Our ceremony, a simple military parade, gains particular importance in that General McCreery, G in C British Troops in Austria, who during the Italian Campaign commanded the 8th Army, of which both Cremona and the 28th Brigade formed part, had accepted my invitation to attend the parade and join with us in our celebrations. Bad weather, however, has prevented him from coming from Vienna, but he is present in our hearts, and his kind thoughts are illustrated in the signal I received from him yesterday:

"Much regret bad weather has prevented me from flying to attend your parade. My best wishes to all members of Cremona Gruppo and my grateful thanks for all that you have done while with the 8th Army. Good luck to you all."

There is no need for me to dwell on the achievements of Cremona and the 28th Brigade, for the people of Piedmont have already witnessed in September the presentation of Gold Medals and other awards, some of them posthumous, by the Minister of War. The promotion of 32 AGOs and men for meritorious war service is also a recent event. For the rest, it will suffice for me to read out the citations to you.

General Browning, the first Allied Officer to visit us has done much for us. He made it possible for our men to have leave to visit their families on our return from Sardinia, a gesture of sympathetic understanding of the moral needs of the troops, which we have always appreciated.

The memorable visit of Field-Marshal Alexander in November 1944 was particularly important for the great interest he took in the well-being of our men. Through his intervention we received our important increase in rations. During his visit the Field-Marshal accepted the Regimental badges from the Commanders, which he wore on a later visit to Cremona - a gesture which filled everyone with pride.

/I would have.....

I would have liked to remind General McCreery of his visits to Cremona. Besides his encouraging visits to the troops in the line, we were greatly heartened by the special interest he always took in our Welfare Organisation and Rest Centres. He always insisted on seeing everything, and learning every detail of our needs, and he afforded us at all times the most generous help, making available to us the welfare comforts and supplies, which were needed to make our quarters more useful and attractive.

Men are led, above all, by understanding and affection, and General McCreery gave us the proof, the means and the example.

It was through this moral support that, in spite of difficulties, we were able to continue our efforts, and to ask him at the start of the great Spring Offensive, when we were due for rest after three months in the line, not to leave us behind but to include us in his plan of operations. Thus from the 10th - 13th of April, we were able to take part in the operations, and earn the appreciation of the Army Commander, who sent us the following signal:

"My hearty congratulations on the successful attack by Cremona on the 10th of April. Your troops have shown great enterprise and vigour. I know that you will continue to make an important contribution to the 8th Army offensive. With best wishes".

Having crossed the Senio and Serteno and opened up Route 16, we advanced across the Po, the Adige and the Piave, and reached Venice on April the 29th with our leading troops on the flank of British Units.

The Certificates for Commendation for service with the Eighth Army, which to-day are being awarded to representatives of the Division, will represent to each member of Cremona a treasured and cherished memory. It will remind us above all of the respect and friendship accorded to us by the Allies, a standard which we must promise ourselves to live up to in the future, so that Italy, in a regime of freedom and good international relations, may again assume her rightful place in the world, in relation to the industry of her people, and the contribution which in the past she made to the progress of civilisation.

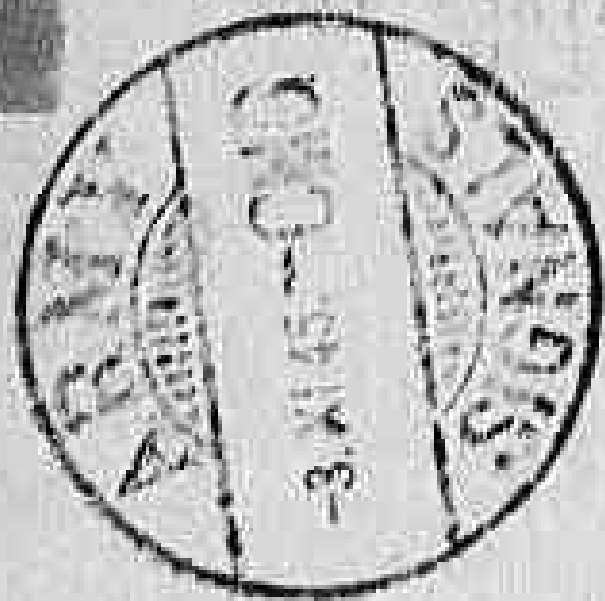
