- 1.- MILA LO Genoa has discussed the matter thoroughly with Regional Commissioner and the Prefect of Genoa. They put forward the following arguments.

(a) The Prefect states :-

- i. The Military should not requisition the building as it is not military property and was in fact built by public subscription for the people of Piemonte and Liguria.
- ii. The alternative seen offered is considered unsuitable.
- iii. His comments on the lack of give-and-take spirit exhibited by the Military authorities.

(b) The Regional Commissioner states :-

- i. It would be very bad policy to turn the orphan children out, and bad feeling would result.
- ii. Suitable alternative room for a Military Hospital exists in various hotels, etc, at S.MARCHESE and other places.
- 2.- It appears that there are approximately 130 persons in occupation of the building in question, 70 of whom are children.

However to complete the building of the orphanage and its equipment the Albergo dei Poveri had to supply three millions on its own funds in order to make it possible to transfer to the new premises the children they were housing at the time and this also with a view to move the rooms occupied by them available for the reception of a number of chronic patients which



the Comune had to remove from the General Hospital to be relieved from the burden of heavy daily expenses.

In November 1942 the children received at the Princes of Piedmonte Institution were transferred to Salsomaggiore to take them away from war zone dangers but now they have come back and are living in their normal residence. Their number amounts to only 60 as new admissions were stopped because of the new residence being too far away and because some children had gone back to their families. But the applications coming to this office and concerning really serious cases not only because of indigency but also because of the utter lack of care the poor children would suffer without a prompt intervention of the public authorities, make it reasonable to foresee that the number of the assisted will soon increase, even if the financial situation of the institution is such as to make the admission of more people inadvisable.

Therefore it is absolutely necessary that the building in question should still be used for its original purpose thus enabling this charitable institution to carry on its public welfare activities. These in regard to the assistance given to children could be carried on in no other way. As in the principal premises of the Albergo dei Poveri, which are already being exploited for various services not belonging to the institution itself such as the hospitality given to firemen, a war mess, the soup kitchen run by the Ente Comunale Assistenza (ECA) and the large jail department, there would be no room at all to receive the children dismissed from the Princes of Piedmonte. But besides these practical considerations which oppose the reversion of the building in question there are other ones, both moral and sentimental, which make it inadvisable.

This administration is also by the press taxed with negligence and lack of interest in the defense of the rights and the main purposes of the



had gone back to their families. But the applications coming to this office and concerning really serious cases not only because of indigency but also because of the utter lack of care the poor children would suffer without a prompt intervention of the public authorities, make it reasonable to foresee that the number of the assisted will soon increase, even if the financial situation of the institution is such as to make the admission of more people undesirable.

Therefore it is absolutely necessary that the building in question should still be used for its original purpose thus engaging this charitable institution to carry on its public welfare activities. These in regard to the assistance given to children could be carried on in no other way as in the principal premises of the Albergo dei Poveri, which are already being exploited for various services not belonging to the institution itself such as the hospitality given to Viranen, a war mess, the soup kitchen run by the Ente Comunale Assistenza (EOA) and the large jail department, there would be no room at all to receive the children dismissed from the Princes of Piedmonte. But besides these practical considerations which oppose the reversion of the building in question there are other ones, both moral and sentimental, which make it undesirable.

This administration is also by the press taxed with negligence and lack of sympathy in the defence of the rights and the main purposes of the "Albergo dei Poveri" for having consented to the above mentioned 1319s of which the population strongly disapproves as they are considered a violation of the intentions of benefactors who had willed their property to the Institution. This feeling of malcontent would undoubtedly increase if also the Princes of Piedmonte Institution were used for a purpose different from the original one, especially when that new use is such as to deliver indefinitely a future reinstatement. We are much concerned about the situation as it creates a feeling of mistrust which might dry up many chari-



table sources especially inheritances, while the "Albergo dei Poveri" relies on the generosity of the population to overcome the serious financial crisis it is undergoing.

On these grounds I dare appeal to your high wisdom and noble feelings requesting you to use your influence to the effect of preventing the requisition of the a/m institution, taking also into consideration <sup>that</sup> art. 3 of the R.D. 18 August 1940 N. 1741 covering the matter of requisitions forbids the requisition of any buildings directly used for the purpose of public assistance or public charity.

I must moreover point out:

The Direction of Works of the Genio Militare is preoccupied lest a further permanence of the military hospital within the Villa Sanitas might damage the private company managing it. But if this consideration is important in regard to the Villa Sanitas it should be even more so with the Principe di Piemonte Institution, which deserves for reasons of social utility and public interest, better attention than the a/m villa which if it were afforded sufficient accommodation for military medical and sanitary services in war time, will be able to afford it now that the war is over.

Even if the jurisdiction of the hospital must be extended to other towns some of which may have as great military importance as Genoa, it seems as if the a/m Direction could find in so large a territory a more convenient solution of its problem than that of sacrificing in a permanent way an institution of high social utility, which it is not possible to substitute and which bears evidence to the munificence of the Genoese. This without considering the serious consequences resulting from the closing up of the institution as the children received there would find themselves with no assistance as they would be automatically dismissed and with them all the

situation of any buildings directly used for the purpose of public assistance or public charity.

I must moreover point out:

The Direction of Works of the Genio Militare is preoccupied lest a further permanence of the military hospital within the Villa Sanitas might damage the private company managing it. But if this consideration is important in regard to the Villa Sanitas it should be even more so with the Princes of Piedmonte Institution, which deserves for reasons of social utility and public interest, better attention than the villa which if it has afforded sufficient accommodation for military medical and sanitary services in war time, will be able to afford it now that the war is over.

Even if the jurisdiction of the hospital must be extended to other towns some of which may have as great military importance as Genoa, it seems as if the a/m Direction could find in so large a territory a more convenient solution of its problem than that of sacrificing in a permanent way an institution of high social utility, which it is not possible to substitute and which bears evidence to the munificence of the Genoese. This without considering the serious consequences resulting from the closing up of the institution as the children received there would find themselves with no assistance as they would be automatically dismissed and with them all the personnel.

As to the financial consequences in regard of the ~~State~~ if the requisition of the Villa Sanitas is maintained (to which by the way the Genio Militare calls your attention) it is necessary to bear in mind that the requisition of the Princes of Piedmonte Institution will also amount to the payment of an indemnity which, if equitable, should be superior to the expense for the Villa Sanitas, while on the other hand it seems obvious that it is not justifiable to damage an institution so important in the field of public

assistance merely on the ground to allow the State to save money.

Following your verbal request please be informed:

1. The "Principe di Piemonte" Institute is located in Genoa, Via dei Platani (location Marassi).
2. The Institute - whose Prefecture Commissary is the Vice-Prefect Mr. Francesco Durante - is administrated by the "Albergo dei Poveri" located in Genoa, Via Carbonara.
3. 23 M.T. Coy of 3rd M.T. Bn occupies the ground-floor and partly 1st and 2nd floor with 110 soldiers.
4. Part of 3rd floor (right wing) and kitchens are occupied by 50 baby-girls with a few nuns attached to them.
5. The whole of the Institute is fit to be used as Main Military Hospital with 250 beds and all general services: scientific cabinets, depots and stores.
