1. During recent visits to out-stations in North Italy, I have noticed a certain lack of uniformity in the carrying out of Liaison duties.

The general situation in each Province is frequently quite different to the next, and each Territorial Commander has his own local problems on which the M.M.I.A. LO should advise him. There are nevertheless many questions, such as Captured Enemy Material, Accommodation, etc, which are similar in all areas, and these should be handled in a like manner by all LO's.

2. An out-station LO, being a "one-man band", has necessarily to work on his own to a great extent, his policy guided by letters from HQ and by the brief and unavoidable infrequent visits from myself. He therefore tends to become parochial.

3. In order to achieve uniformity of policy, I recommend that all LO's should from time to time not only visit ROME and MILAN, but also their next-door neighbours, who in most cases are only a few hours journey away, and with whom they could profitably compare notes.

4. Senior LO N. Italy will be informed of all proposed visits, which should be undertaken at times when "business is slack" and when LO's can get away from their bases.

In fact the Prefect sent a circular signal to all Cuneo Province's Lord Wards to resist any request of the Military Command, to inform of such all civilians holding any such vehicles.
2. In compliance with instructions issued by the prefecture of Savona, the Provincial Recovering Office, Savona order that all consignee of vehicles or animals, else of Italian Army origin in property, now under A.F.H.Q.'s control stipulate a special contract lasting six months with which they take the responsibility for ensuring that the traffic permit be released to the vehicle, and on the other hand the possessor will be responsible for paying the amount as follows:

1. Food Carriers: From 1000 to 3000 lire daily if consigned to civilians.
2. Food Carriers: 10% of profit if consigned to Cooperative.
3. Horses: from 70 to 150 daily according with the type of animal.

Informations received by the C.C.N.R. state that the turn-in of profit is carried out by the Prefettura of Savona and not to Intendente di Finanze.

- g) Public opinion: a) The same part of the public opinion is greatly disturbed by the above facts, that is the attitude of certain bodies named by Partisans or so called Partisans. Many people point out that it is another form of fascism when "Mortia su Roma" or "Risorgimento" were titles to occupy places for which they had neither preparation nor competence.
- b) The Prefect's attitude is often a disturbing factor for the best part of the public, thus it is said that political or party convenience is the dictating factor instead of the public general welfare.
- c) Many hope in the Allied intervention to clear away what is only a continuation of older systems, many do not hope any more, some still on the profiteers lines having lost all faith.

1. On 13th Sept, in Genoa, locality Lagaccio an explosion occurred in an Ammunition dump controlled by the Comitato Ricuperi under the management of the Prefect. The explosion caused the death of three persons, about 100 wounded and damages to nearby buildings.

2. On the following morning General Frattini, Commander No. 2 Territorial HQ., had a conference at 60 Sub Area with Major Ferry (DAAQMC) and Major Davies (PAD mines Offr.).

3. General Frattini informed:

- a) that as far back as July last he wrote to the Prefect pointing out that ammunitions and explosives were handed by a body of incompetent men;
- b) the danger to lives and property arising in consequence;
- c) that all activity regarding the collection of ammunitions, explosives and Italian Army Material should be handed over to No. 2 Territorial Command;
- d) that no reply was given to his letter and a visit made to the Prefect did not give any satisfaction;
- e) that Comitato Ricuperi which is the body created by the Prefect of Genoa continued indifferently the collection of ammunitions, explosives and all sort of materials including Italian Army Property;
- f) that material was sold to private body.

4. Further General Frattini explained the birth of all such Comitato Ricuperi. The 5th Army, when no Italian Military Commands were on the Zone, gave order to all Prefects to collect materials, especially for public safety, ammunition and explosives. To day, such conditions do not any more apply therefore the collections, the dumps etc. should be placed under control of No. 2 Territorial Command.

5. G Sub Area desired to contact also AMG., Ligurian Region HQ., consequently General Frattini had on the 15th inst. a conference with the Deputy Regional Commissioner Col. Jordan. General Frattini went over the same ground as set above. The following measures have been taken and orders issued by A.M.G. H. Genoa.

- a) Passage of all ammunitions and explosives dumps to No.2 Territorial Command, Genoa;
- b) Collection of ammunitions, explosives and Italian Army Property to be done only through No.2 Territorial Command, Genoa. No further interference of Comitato Ricuperi is admitted.

6. Already the Prefect's personnel charged with the collection and storage of ammunitions and explosives has been placed under order of No. 2 Territorial Hq. In regard to other materials no difficulties are anticipated.

7. Reference to instruction on "Recovery Italian Army Vehicles" from M.M.I.A. HQ. C/5/10 dated 5th Sept. arrangements are in progress for an Italian Army Representative to be present at allied road-blocks to identify all vehicles.

8. Reference to Hq. M.M.I.A. G/Trg/c& dated 7 Sept 45, Subject "Training of Guard Bts" translation has been sent to the Guard HQ. asking to furnish the particulars requested.

The collection of the stores during the commencement of the organization of 30,000 men released during the period of 5-20 Sept.

Flight and Transportation

- (a) Col. Longfellow visited Cenac on the 1st and 2nd Nov. requested a visit to a British Mess Hall and a V.A.C. who responded to 123.C.D. during which Mr. Dot. MacLennan informed him that he had been requested to leave his residence to look after the German P.O.W.s. Afterwards the German P.O.W.s were visited, to about three weeks the German Commandant and the British Governor, but could not be identified. Col. Longfellow and Capt. Cotton located another accommodation at the Hotel Lanne, Royal Roastery, Liverpool, 2/2 1700 hours present location.

- (b) An inspection was carried out on Cenac first. Report and visiting points were brought to the notice of the G.O. who stated he would readily send. It is understood that Lt. Marshall found other employment as hotel waiter (D.A.R.), who arrived on the evening of the 5th, a night bus paid on the 6th Sept. to Liverpool H.Q., the Admiralty Air Transport Corp. 76 T.M. and 3. Q.M. Corp. Major Miles gathered general information in connection with Cunningham and this will be the subject of a separate report by him.
