1. Ref. This HQ. letter of even ref dated 6 July 1946.
2. G.S.O.I and G.S.O.II of this BLU on 11 July '46 made a thorough inspection of DANFEMA Barracks ARREZZO, where one Bn. of the C.A.R. will be accommodated for the next recruits course. The Command Engineer representative (Major VERGILIO) and the works contractor were both present.
3. This barracks has recently been vacated by one Bn. of the NEMBO Regt. (now concentrated at PISTOIA) and it was only to be expected that the essential water, lighting etc plants were already functioning.
4. Certain parts of this Barracks remain considerably war-damaged, and the general appearance of the buildings, parade-square and surrounds is somewhat "blitzed" and untidy.
5. Now, however, there is quite an army of workmen, masons etc hard at work building, plastering, painting, plumbing and generally tidying up the barracks. Major VERGILIO (who superintended so successfully similar work at the SIENA C.A.R.) is confident that all the necessary works now in hand will be completed by the target date 16 July (and it would appear even to a foeman that he has good reason for his confidence)
6. (a) Accommodation for one Bn. and services is adequate. The bk rooms are tiled, spacious and clean; and all windows are glazed.
(b) Kitchens are now being fitted with new cooking-stoves and will adequately cater for the required numbers.
(c) Dining-hall. One spacious and bright dining hall will hold all the personnel.
(d) Latrines and ablutions are numerous, up to date, clean and in working order.
(e) Baths. There is an efficient hot-water plant which provides centrally for the adequate number of modern, tiled shower-baths.
(f) Men's Canteen with bar counter and water laid on, is being prepared; also necessary store-room.
(g) Messes, Officers' and N.C.O.'s, when complete will provide most suitable accommodation including separate kitchens. These occupy a floor of the HQ. block of the Bn.

- (h) Offices are adequate, and are on the second floor of the Hq. Block.
- (i) Officers sleeping quarters are adequate, and on top floor of Hq. Block.
- (j) Classrooms. An adequate number of indoor classrooms are being constructed by bricking-up in sections the ground-floors of two of the men's barrack blocks. Two tiered lecture rooms already exist.
- (k) Garages. An M.T. Shelter is under construction and will be adequate to hold the required number of vehicles at one side of the central parade ground.
- (l) Parade ground is now being cleared of rubble and debris, and will then be levelled.
- (m) M.T. Room, Sick Bay
- (n) Coy etc Offices and stores
- (o) Men's Recreation, Reading Room

Although the eventual allotment of accommodation is not yet decided there exists adequate accommodation to provide for all the above.

7. Married Families. No provision at present but authority is sought from H. of W. to start repairs on another Barracks in AMRSC (not visited on 11 July) which should eventually provide for a considerable number of families.

1. On 19 June 46 a reconnaissance of ROVEZZANO barracks, FLORENCE was made in company with Col. GILBERTINI (Chief of Staff 7 Terr. Comd). The question of moving one Bn. of 7 C.A.R. into these barracks was discussed.
2. Gen DE SIMONE, Comd 7 Terr. Comd. has now decided against this move and has recommended to the MINISTRY of War that one Bn. should move to GALLERIA barracks AREZZO.
3. This reasons for this decision are :-
 - (a) that GALLERIA barracks are in a better state of repair than ROVEZZANO barracks and can be made ready for occupation in a few weeks,
 - (b) that better facilities exist in AREZZO for the accommodation of married families,
 - (c) that training grounds are more accessible.
4. It is estimated that approximately six weeks work is necessary to prepare ROVEZZANO barracks for occupation at an estimated cost of 70,000,000 (seventy million) lire. In view of the lack of time available and the reasons given in para 3 above the move to AREZZO is considered desirable.

1. ROVINZANO Barracks are situated on the AREZZO road on the outskirts of FLORENCE. These barracks are at present occupied by 10th Military Prison. (Br). The O.C. prison states that he will most probably have vacated them by the end of June next.
2. An inspection of these barracks was carried out on 18th May and it is estimated that by using double bunks some 1400 - 1500 Italian recruits could be accommodated. In addition there is a block suitable for officers and another block suitable for an officers Mess. In this latter block are a number of bedrooms which could be utilised for single officers quarters. Class rooms are also available.
3. It is suggested that this location would be more suitable than AREZZO to accommodate one Recruit Bn as it would be directly under the eye of 7 IG and 7 BII.
4. There is a good parade ground in the barracks itself and being on the outskirts of the town, suitable training areas could probably be found at no great distance from barracks.
5. In addition to the accommodation referred to above there are a number of other large buildings that have been more or less seriously damaged by bombing. 1. The overcrowding at the C.A.R. SUSA has been pointed out in various reports from this HUN and was stressed in HUN/25A report forwarded with his letter H/6/183 dated 6 May. *folio 33A FILE 25*
2. In view of the available accommodation in SUSA, 7 T.C. originally suggested that one bn. of the C.A.R. should be located in ANZEO. For difficulty in training and several other reasons, this suggestion was turned down and instructions were given for all the C.A.R. to be billeted in SUSA.
3. In view of the medical report referred to in para one and the approach of the hot weather, information is requested as to whether the whole of the C.A.R. will continue to be located in SUSA or some portion of it transferred elsewhere.
4. If there is any question of "thinning out" at SUSA it is requested that as much warning as possible be given in order that the necessary moves may be carried out.

1. Ref. your HQ. Q.001 of 4 April 1946.
2. Information required in para 2 of your a/q letter is attached herewith as Appendices 1, 2, and 3 (Translations of original reports from 7 Territorial Command)
3. These reports and recommendations by 7 T.C. are in the nature of "long term policy". What are considered necessary, however, are measures which remedy immediately the present, unsatisfactory conditions of married families accommodation, most especially in permanent garrison towns and O.A.R.'s. It is felt that this can be achieved only by a reasonable system of family allowances.
4. At the O.A.R. for instance, married officers and O.R.'s receive a Family (or separation) Allowance only while they are separated; this allowance ceases while the family is living in the same station, even though there is no provision of military or requisitioned accommodation. This system would appear only to discourage the presence of the family and to encourage instead the maintenance of a local levy!
5. It is considered, further, that the question of single officers' accommodation should be seriously considered in conjunction with that of married families, as being an equally important factor in the efficiency, Morale and Prestige of the "New" Italian Army.
6. Where no military accommodation is provided for single officers (as is frequently the case) considerable financial hardship *and* embarrassment is suffered by the individual officer. For instance, in large cities such as ROME and FLORENCE accommodation is at a premium and accommodation for a single officer would cost him an average of L. 2500 and L. 1800 respectively. This high rate leaves an officer, especially a single subaltern living on his pay alone, a negligible margin for dress and

entertainment, a factor which inevitably lowers his own morale and also his prestige as an Army officer in the eyes of more affluent civilians. It is considered most important that the New Italian Army should start on the right foot from this aspect, and that the Army officer should not be considered (as in the pre-war British Army) as either a penniless idiot, or an idiot who is prepared to pay out of his own pocket for the privilege of leading a noble life! In short, if Italy wants a decent Army she should pay for it, even if it means sending the bill to her Mayfair.

7. The following are therefore recommended as immediate measures:

- (a) a reasonable and permanent system of allowances for all ranks (bachelors and married) seconded from their units in stations where no military accommodation is provided.
- (b) the requisitioning of adequate accommodation for local military needs on a permanent basis (houses, hotels, or pensions)
- (c) complementary to (b) above, the purchase by the Italian Government of adequate local accommodation to be maintained permanently by the Army and to be handed over to the Military occupant, whose pay could be adjusted accordingly.

8. As permanent or long-term policy the following are suggested:

- (a) immediate repair of damaged military buildings
- (b) building of new and suitable Army accommodation
- (c) purchase by the Government of suitable accommodation which Army personnel would then be given the opportunity to purchase on reasonable terms, rather on the lines of an English Building Society but without the profit-making motive. This scheme would have the advantage of encouraging an officer or O.R. to save money by investing his savings in property so that he may have a house or apartment of his own which would serve either as a home, or at least as a source of income during and after his military service.

9. The importance of this aspect of Army Service cannot be stressed too strongly. Any remedies how ever small of the present situation are bound to have favourable repercussions throughout the Army and that at a period when morale and welfare considerations must count for so much.


