1. The other day I was talking to General Marshall about the GAF. He is very pleased to hear that it has made such a good start. He believes that the prestige of the GAF will be enhanced if it is given a certain measure of publicity. I would like to suggest that on suitable occasions the GAF should be opened to selected members of the public. For example, on one afternoon the records of recruits might be placed on cards and are also kept, and watch their sons at work and play. I suggest that there is no need for a ceremonial parade, but that a band should play on the parade square. It might also be possible to invite civil officials and other prominent citizens, press reporters and GAF soldiers.

2. It is too early at present for a 'Victory Day', but the departure of the Artillery, Engineers and other arms from the GAF might be a suitable occasion for some publicity.

3. I do not underestimate the value of ceremonial parades, but I feel that visitors should be encouraged to observe the standards of interior economy, comfort, welfare and morale, the practical efficiency of the instruction, and the value of the GAF as a school of citizenship. They will best do this if they are permitted to walk about the barracks, watch the standards of recruits at their work, and visit barracks rooms, canteens, dining halls etc. Well behaved recruits might be detailed to act as guides.
